


FUNDING ALLOCATIONS



- ⌘ Billions of dollars of Federal aid are distributed to States and local areas according to formulas based on Census figures.
- ⌘ Census data for small areas are especially useful for identifying pockets of need in communities.

Good Data...




- ⌘ Comes from a reliable source
- ⌘ Presented clearly
- ⌘ Relevant to the need you have identified
- ⌘ Drawn from or closely related to your target population
- ⌘ Tells a story—more than just a series of numbers
- ⌘ Presented both in narrative and graphic form

Census Data Drives Key Elements of Grant Applications



- ⌘ Describes target population and community
- ⌘ Helps identify problem/need for project
- ⌘ Critical for measurable objectives:
 - ⊞ Who, What, Where, When, & Why of proposed project

External Data--Government



- ⌘ Census, surveys, estimates
- ⌘ Generally available to the public through a variety of sources: reports, CD-ROM, websites
- ⌘ Reliable, not always easy to find
- ⌘ Often specific to individual communities—usually by State, county, city, neighborhood

External Data—Non-Government



- ⌘ Private industry reports, news media, surveys
- ⌘ May have low reliability, validity, biased
- ⌘ Difficult to access
- ⌘ Make sure you understand its limitations—
if any

Internal Data



- ⌘ Studies, surveys, client data
- ⌘ Can provide clear picture of target population or impact of your proposal
- ⌘ Can be expensive, time consuming, difficult to collect
- ⌘ Should be supplemented or complemented with census data


Census Data

- ⌘ Provides a picture of your target group or community
- ⌘ Can be relatively specific to your target area
- ⌘ Easy to compare to other areas, States, counties, cities, census tracts
- ⌘ Changes in population can be tracked over time
- ⌘ Access to census data continues to improve



Census Data for Community Analysis

- ⌘ Detecting a problem
- ⌘ Determining its seriousness
- ⌘ Planning ways to solve it



Evolving Uses of the Census--Revenue Implications

⌘ Census data contributes not only to political impacts but economic urgency as well. Federal funds are allocated by formulas that rely on census data beyond total population size. Characteristics such as per capita income, unemployment rates, housing conditions are vital to Federal fund distribution.



Census data were instrumental in determining the allocation of \$183 billion dollars involving over 100 Federal assistance programs in FY 97.



⌘ In Fiscal Year 1997, \$43.8 billion of federal funds, and an undetermined amount of State funds were allocated to cities and counties based on population census data.



Presenting Census Data in a Grant Proposal



- ⌘ Paint a clear picture of your target group or community
- ⌘ Present data relevant to showing a need
- ⌘ Reflect funding agency priorities
- ⌘ If you are serving a small neighborhood, use census data available for census tracts that comprise your “neighborhood”
- ⌘ Show both data and statistics—gives them two reference points
 - ⌘ Example 15% or 3,000 families below poverty

Presenting Census Data in a Grant Proposal




⌘ Provide a comparison

- ☑ Over time (1970, 1980, 1990, 2000)
 - ☒ Demonstrate emerging issues affecting your population
 - ☒ Beware of changes in census tract boundaries
- ☑ Compare subset data to larger group
 - ☒ State to national
 - ☒ City/town to county or State
 - ☒ Census tract to other tracts or to city/county

⌘ Counteract data that may work against you with data that may work for you

Presenting Census Data in a Grant Proposal—Charts & Graphs

- ⌘ Make sure charts, graphs, maps are reproducible
- ⌘ Consider best use of limited space
- ⌘ While chart/graph should be self-explanatory, include reference to it in the narrative and why it is relevant: "the chart on the next page illustrates increases in the Hispanic population over the past 30 years".



Charts and Graphs Continued...



- ⌘ Keep it simple—remember your reviewer(s) may not have a lot of time to study your charts/graphs
- ⌘ Ask third party to read and interpret charts
- ⌘ Use charts, graphs, or maps to convey most important information—should be directly related to purpose of proposal

Limitations of Census Data




- ⌘ Some concepts/definitions not easily understood
- ⌘ Might not be in exact tabular form as funding agency is requesting
- ⌘ Can be cumbersome to get specific data by tract or other small area
- ⌘ Most socio-economic census data is based on a sample estimate
- ⌘ Conducted every ten years

Changing Demographics and Their Impact on Federal Funding




- ⌘ Changes in population growth and distribution
- ⌘ Changes in age structure that will challenge schools, the labor force, healthcare systems, etc.
- ⌘ Changes in household/family composition

- ⌘ Choose the appropriate data product/format
- ⌘ Locate the proper table


- ⌘ It's mostly free

Reliable Data



- ⌘ Accurately reflects target population to be affected by the proposal
- ⌘ Collected using statistically sound methods
- ⌘ Limitations of data are understood and conveyed in proposal if necessary
- ⌘ **Census data**—respected source and methodology, accepted as reliable
