
NOTE. Although the American Community Survey (ACS) produces population, demographic and housing unit estimates, it is the Census Bureau's Population Estimates Program that produces and disseminates the official estimates of the population for the nation, states, counties, cities and towns and estimates of housing units for states and counties.

HOUSEHOLDS AND FAMILIES: From 2005-2007 there were 301,000 households in Honolulu County. The average household size was 2.9 people.

Families made up 70 percent of the households in Honolulu County. This figure includes both married-couple families (53 percent) and other families (18 percent). Nonfamily households made up 30 percent of all households in Honolulu County. Most of the nonfamily households were people living alone, but some were composed of people living in households in which no one was related to the householder.


NATIVITY AND LANGUAGE: Nineteen percent of the people living in Honolulu County from 2005-2007 there were foreign born. Eighty-one percent was native, including 54 percent who were born in Hawaii.

Among people at least five years old living in Honolulu County from 2005-2007, 27 percent spoke a language other than English at home. Of those speaking a language other than English at home, 6 percent spoke Spanish and 94 percent spoke some other language; 47 percent reported that they did not speak English "very well."

GEOGRAPHIC MOBILITY: From 2005-2007, 84 percent of the people at least one year old living in Honolulu County were living in the same residence one year earlier; 10 percent had moved

during the past year from another residence in the same county, less than 0.5 percent from another county in the same state, 5 percent from another state, and 2 percent from abroad.

Geographic Mobility of Residents of Honolulu County, Hawaii in 2005-2007



EDUCATION: From 2005-2007, 89 percent of people 25 years and over had at least graduated from high school and 30 percent had a bachelor's degree or higher. Eleven percent were dropouts; they were not enrolled in school and had not graduated from high school.

The total school enrollment in Honolulu County was 227,000 from 2005-2007. Nursery school and kindergarten enrollment was 24,000 and elementary or high school enrollment was 134,000 children. College or graduate school enrollment was 69,000.

The Educational Attainment of People in Honolulu County, Hawaii in 2005-2007



DISABILITY: In Honolulu County, among people at least five years old from 2005-2007, 13 percent reported a disability. The likelihood of having a disability varied by age - from 4 percent of people 5 to 15 years old, to 9 percent of people 16 to 64 years old, and to 37 percent of those 65 and older.

INDUSTRIES: From 2005-2007, for the employed population 16 years and older, the leading industries in Honolulu County were Educational services, and health care, and social assistance, 21 percent, and Arts, entertainment, and recreation, and accommodation, and food services, 13 percent.

OCCUPATIONS AND TYPE OF EMPLOYER: Among the most common occupations were: Management, professional, and related occupations, 35 percent; Sales and office occupations, 27 percent; Service occupations, 20 percent; Construction, extraction, maintenance and repair occupations, 10 percent; and Production, transportation, and material moving occupations, 8 percent. Seventy-one percent of the people employed were Private wage and salary workers; 22 percent was Federal, state, or local government workers; and 6 percent was Self-employed in own not incorporated business workers.


TRAVEL TO WORK: Sixty-five percent of Honolulu County workers drove to work alone from 2005-2007, 16 percent carpooled, 8 percent took public transportation, and 8 percent used other means. The remaining 3 percent worked at home. Among those who commuted to work, it took them on average 26.8 minutes to get to work.

INCOME: The median income of households in Honolulu County was \$64,355. Eighty-three percent of the households received earnings and 23 percent received retirement income other than Social Security. Thirty percent of the households received Social Security. The average

income from Social Security was \$14,952. These income sources are not mutually exclusive; that is, some households received income from more than one source.

POVERTY AND PARTICIPATION IN GOVERNMENT PROGRAMS: From 2005-2007, 9 percent of people were in poverty. Ten percent of related children under 18 were below the poverty level, compared with 8 percent of people 65 years old and over. Six percent of all families and 17 percent of families with a female householder and no husband present had incomes below the poverty level.


Poverty Rates in Honolulu County, Hawaii in 2005-2007

POPULATION OF Honolulu County: From 2005-2007, Honolulu County had a total population of 905,000 - 449,000 (50 percent) females and 456,000 (50 percent) males. The median age was 37.3 years. Twenty-two percent of the population was under 18 years and 14 percent was 65 years and older.

The Age Distribution of People in Honolulu County, Hawaii in 2005-2007





For people reporting one race alone, 28 percent was White; 4 percent was Black or African American; less than 0.5 percent was American Indian and Alaska Native; 56 percent was Asian; 10 percent was Native Hawaiian and Other Pacific Islander, and 2 percent was Some other race. Twenty percent reported Two or more races. Seven percent of the people in Honolulu County was Hispanic. Twenty-one percent of the people in Honolulu County was White non-Hispanic. People of Hispanic origin may be of any race.

HOUSING CHARACTERISTICS: From 2005-2007, Honolulu County had a total of 332,000 housing units, 9 percent of which were vacant. Of the total housing units, 54 percent was in single-unit structures, 46 percent was in multi-unit structures, and less than 0.5 percent was mobile homes. Eighteen percent of the housing units were built since 1990.

Type of nousing unit





OCCUPIED HOUSING UNIT CHARACTERISTICS: From 2005-2007, Honolulu County had 301,000 occupied housing units - 171,000 (57 percent) owner occupied and 130,000 (43 percent) renter occupied. Five percent of the households did not have telephone service and 10 percent of the households did not have access to a car, truck, or van for private use. Multi Vehicle households were not rare. Thirty-four percent had two vehicles and another 20 percent had three or more.

HOUSING COSTS: The median monthly housing costs for mortgaged owners was \$2,078, nonmortgaged owners \$410, and renters \$1,161. Forty-three percent of owners with mortgages, 9 percent of owners without mortgages, and 48 percent of renters in Honolulu County spent 30 percent or more of household income on housing.
