

NOTE. Although the American Community Survey (ACS) produces population, demographic and housing unit estimates, it is the Census Bureau's Population Estimates Program that produces and disseminates the official estimates of the population for the nation, states, counties, cities and towns and estimates of housing units for states and counties.

HOUSEHOLDS AND FAMILIES: In 2005-2009 there were 20,000 households in State Senate District 10. The average household size was 2.2 people.

Families made up 55 percent of the households in State Senate District 10. This figure includes both married-couple families (40 percent) and other families (15 percent). Nonfamily households made up 45 percent of all households in State Senate District 10. Most of the nonfamily households were people living alone, but some were composed of people living in households in which no one was related to the householder.

Percent of households



NATIVITY AND LANGUAGE: Nineteen percent of the people living in State Senate District 10 in 2005-2009 were foreign born. Eighty-one percent was nativeAmong people at least five years old living in State Senate District 10 in 2005-2009, 29 percent spoke a language other than English at home. Of those speaking a language other than English at home, 5 percent spoke Spanish and 95 percent spoke some other language; 45 percent reported that they did not speak English "very well."

GEOGRAPHIC MOBILITY: In 2005-2009, 82 percent of the people at least one year old living in State Senate District 10 were living in the same residence one year earlier; 12 percent had moved during the past year from another residence in the same county, 1 percent from another county in the same state, 3 percent from another state, and 2 percent from abroad.

Geographic Mobility of Residents of State Senate District 10, Hawaii in 2005-2009



EDUCATION: In 2005-2009, 94 percent of people 25 years and over had at least graduated from high school and 41 percent had a bachelor's degree or higher. Six percent were dropouts; they were not enrolled in school and had not graduated from high school.

The total school enrollment in State Senate District 10 was 12,000 in 2005-2009. Nursery school and kindergarten enrollment was 1,200 and elementary or high school enrollment was 4,400 children. College or graduate school enrollment was 6,700.



The Educational Attainment of People in State Senate District 10, Hawaii in 2005-2009



DISABILITY: In State Senate District 10, among people at least five years old in 2005-2009, percent reported a disability. The likelihood of having a disability varied by age - from percent of people 5 to 15 years old, to percent of people 16 to 64 years old, and to percent of those 65 and older.

INDUSTRIES: In 2005-2009, for the employed population 16 years and older, the leading industries in State Senate District 10 were Educational services, and health care, and social assistance, 25 percent, and Arts, entertainment, and recreation, and accommodation and food services, 15 percent.


OCCUPATIONS AND TYPE OF EMPLOYER: Among the most common occupations were: Management, professional, and related occupations, 41 percent; Sales and office occupations, 32 percent; Service occupations, 17 percent; Construction, extraction, maintenance, and repair occupations, 5 percent; and Production, transportation, and material moving occupations, 5 percent. Seventy-one percent of the people employed were Private wage and salary workers; 21 percent was Federal, state, or local government workers; and 8 percent was Self-employed in own not incorporated business workers.

TRAVEL TO WORK: Fifty-eight percent of State Senate District 10 workers drove to work alone in 2005-2009, 14 percent carpooled, 10 percent took public transportation, and 15 percent used other means. The remaining 4 percent worked at home. Among those who commuted to work, it took them on average 20.7 minutes to get to work.

INCOME: The median income of households in State Senate District 10 was \$53,757. Eighty percent of the households received earnings and 21 percent received retirement income other than Social Security. Thirty-one percent of the households received Social Security. The average income from Social Security was \$16,274. These income sources are not mutually exclusive; that is, some households received income from more than one source.

POVERTY AND PARTICIPATION IN GOVERNMENT PROGRAMS: In 2005-2009, 11 percent of people were in poverty. Fourteen percent of related children under 18 were below the poverty level, compared with 4 percent of people 65 years old and over. Seven percent of all families and 17 percent of families with a female householder and no husband present had incomes below the poverty level.







Percent below poverty level

POPULATION OF State Senate District 10: In 2005-2009, State Senate District 10 had a total population of 45,000 - 23,000 (51 percent) females and 22,000 (49 percent) males. The median age was 40.6 years. Fourteen percent of the population was under 18 years and 19 percent was 65 years and older.

The Age Distribution of People in State Senate District 10, Hawaii in 2005-2009






For people reporting one race alone, 22 percent was White; 1 percent was Black or African American; less than 0.5 percent was American Indian and Alaska Native; 54 percent was Asian; 5 percent was Native Hawaiian and Other Pacific Islander, and 1 percent was Some other race. Sixteen percent reported Two or more races. Five percent of the people in State Senate District 10 was Hispanic. Twenty percent of the people in State Senate District 10 was White non-Hispanic. People of Hispanic origin may be of any race.

HOUSING CHARACTERISTICS: In 2005-2009, State Senate District 10 had a total of 21,000 housing units, 7 percent of which were vacant. Of the total housing units, 31 percent was in single-unit structures, 69 percent was in multi-unit structures, and less than 0.5 percent was mobile homes. Seven percent of the housing units were built since 1990.


OCCUPIED HOUSING UNIT CHARACTERISTICS: In 2005-2009, State Senate District 10 had 20,000 occupied housing units - 8,900 (46 percent) owner occupied and 11,000 (54 percent) renter occupied. Four percent of the households did not have telephone service and 16 percent of the households did not have access to a car, truck, or van for private use. Twenty-five percent had two vehicles and another 10 percent had three or more.

HOUSING COSTS: The median monthly housing costs for mortgaged owners was \$1,938, nonmortgaged owners \$469, and renters \$1,036. Forty-two percent of owners with mortgages, 10 percent of owners without mortgages, and 53 percent of renters in State Senate District 10 spent 30 percent or more of household income on housing.
