



Under HRS §205A, the purpose of this statewide plan is to:



- Ensure that state agency activities are closely coordinated with the activities of relevant federal and county agencies;
- Analyze, resolve conflicts between, and prioritize sector-specific recommendations included in the plan;
- Coordinate exclusive economic zone and other marine- related issues with state and county agencies;
- Provide technical assistance to the agencies on policy and issue-related matters regarding marine and coastal resources management; and
- Coordinate marine and coastal education activities

Updating the 2006 ORMP in 2012

- Responsibility of OP-CZM under HRS §205A-62 and HRS §225M-2

- Must actively involve the state agencies and the public



1. QUESTION: What is the ORMP?

ANSWER: The ORMP is a state plan that guides state agencies with responsibilities relating to marine and coastal zone management. It is outlined under Part IV of Hawaii Revised Statutes (HRS) Chapter 205A, Hawaii's Coastal Zone Management (CZM) law.

2. QUESTION: What is the purpose of the ORMP?

ANSWER: Under HRS §205A-42, the purpose of the plan is to:

- Ensure that state agency activities are closely coordinated with the activities of relevant federal and county agencies;
- Analyze, resolve conflicts between, and prioritize sector-specific recommendations included in the plan;
- Coordinate exclusive economic zone and other marine-related issues with state and county agencies;
- Provide technical assistance to the agencies on policy and interrelated matters regarding marine and coastal resources management; and
- Coordinate marine and coastal education activities.

The ORMP is needed to support a healthy and thriving ocean for today and future generations. This is achieved through integrated approaches to managing our ocean's resources by (1) restoring land and sea; (2) preserving our ocean heritage; and (3) promoting collaboration and stewardship. These are called the Three Perspectives.

3. QUESTION: Who updates the ORMP?

ANSWER: Under HRS §§205A-43 and 225M-1, the State Office of Planning (OP), through its CZM Program, is charged with coordinating the overall implementation and reviewing and periodically updating the ORMP.

Impacts from Tourism

What was said: “Dolphin tour boats off West O‘ahu need to show consideration to fishers, divers, and wildlife.”

“There is a hazardous conflict between commercial and fishing boats off Portlock and out of Maunalua Bay.”

Where this is discussed in the ORMP Update: Chapter III relates ocean resources management to the Hawai‘i Tourism Strategic Plan. Shoreline access and conflicting uses are also addressed.

Management Priorities that address impacts from tourism:

Management Priority #7: Training, Education, and Awareness

Management Priority #8: Collaboration and Conflict Resolution



Military Uses

What was said: “There is ordnance in the ocean.”

“Navy sonar negatively impacts marine life.”

“Mitigation on Drum Road is not being done effectively.”

Where this is discussed in the ORMP Update: Chapter III discusses the military presence in Hawai‘i as it relates to ocean and coastal resources.

Management Priority #8 Collaboration and Conflict Resolution presents an opportunity for agencies to work collaboratively with the military to resolve ocean resource conflicts.

Aquaculture (Traditional and Fish Farming)

What was said: “The ORMP needs to include food security.”
“The ocean is our icebox.”
“We need help to restore the fishponds at Waiāhole/Waikane.”



Where this is discussed in the ORMP Update: Chapter III discusses aquaculture and fishpond restoration.

Management Priority #6: Aquaculture, Fishponds, and Food Sources

discusses the revival of fishpond restoration with an operational plan to be developed by DLNR-DAR. Along with fishponds, fisheries and aquaculture are discussed as a way to support culturally, environmentally, and economically sustainable operations with a goal of increasing local food production.

Enforcement

What was said: “DLNR needs more funding to enforce laws.”
“There are unregulated activities at Kailua.”
“Motor vehicles and quads should not be riding on the beaches of O‘ahu.”

Where this is discussed in the ORMP Update: Chapter IV discusses the cross-jurisdictional approach between agencies at all levels.

Management Priority #7: Training, Education, and Awareness: involves educating both state agencies as well as the community about ocean and coastal protection.

Endangered Species



What was said: “The honu should be delisted.”

Where this is discussed in the ORMP Update: The NOAA National Marine Fisheries Office is working on this petition from the Association of Hawaiian Civic Clubs to classify the Hawaiian Green Turtle population as a discrete population segment and delist it under the Endangered Species Act. Because this issue is currently in status review, this issue is not discussed in the ORMP.

Watersheds and Water Quantity

What was said: “The decline in fresh groundwater has been so rapid.”

“Reduction of fresh groundwater flows is leading to reduction of limu, the bottom of the food chain.”

Where this is discussed in the ORMP Update: Chapter III includes a section on Watershed Management: Water Quality and Water Quantity, including the need not only for good water quality but also for appropriate water quantity.

Management Priority #2: Watershed Management gives an introduction on watersheds and how they are managed. This management priority requires agency partnerships at county, state, and federal levels.

Public Access to the Shoreline

What was said: “There should be unlimited shoreline access for all.”
“I should be allowed to collect salt at Makua.”
“Fishers should be able to fish off the coasts of military bases like Pearl Harbor and Kāneʻohe Marine Corps Base Hawai‘i.”

Where this is discussed in the ORMP Update: Chapter III discusses shoreline access as a right guaranteed in the State Constitution Article 12, Section 7 as well as in the Hawaii Revised Statutes Section 46-6.5.

Management Priority #1: Appropriate Coastal Development discusses the objectives of HRS 205A which include providing coastal recreation opportunities to the public. OP-CZM would coordinate with state and county agencies to accomplish this.



Runoff

What was said: “Makaha Beach is full of rubbish from streams during heavy rains.”
“The Motocross Park on the North Shore exposes dirt that will end up in the ocean at Kaunala Park.”

Where this is discussed in the ORMP Update: Chapter III discusses water quality and land-based pollution and runoff.

Management Priority #2: Watershed Management gives an introduction on the Department of Health Polluted Runoff Control Program and water quality monitoring.

Better Intergovernmental Coordination

What was said: “I am frustrated that there have been four different meetings about the ocean and its resources, and everyone wants to do thing but they focus only on their individual agencies.”
“There needs to be more than government talk story; more collaboration is needed.”

Where this is discussed in the ORMP Update: Chapter IV discusses the integrated and coordinated approach to management of ocean resources, including agencies at all levels of government as well as collaboration with community actions and stewardship.

Management Priority #8: Collaboration and Conflict Resolution discussed utilizing the ORMP Policy Group as a forum for discussion, raising and resolving issues, and conflict resolution when appropriate.
