

- Five offices on four islands


















Sanctuary History




1992 - Congress, in consultation with State of Hawaii, designates sanctuary

1997 - Became effective and is comanaged with the State of Hawaii

2002 – New management plan revised and implemented

2007 – Governor approves moving forward with the process to consider the addition of new species to the sanctuary

2009 - Started reviewing management plan

- Consider additional protection for marine resources of national significance










Sanctuary MPR Timeline


