**Aloha Joan... I understand that the Board of Geographic Names is intending to meet on Maui the evening of May 27<sup>th</sup> to engage the public in a discussion about the proposed name of the Iao Stream being changed to Wailuku River.**

**Given that Wailuku Water Company (successor to Wailuku Sugar Co & Wailuku Agribusiness) is the long standing owner of the lands making up the West Maui Forest Reserve that encompasses the entire drainage basin of the Iao Stream we wanted to express our concerns over this proposed name change. First as the land owner we have not officially been contacted by any of the parties and only learned of this proposal thru the media. Additional we feel this name change will lead to confusion with the public both residents and visitors alike, who for what seems to be over a century of time have called the waterways of Iao Valley, Iao Stream.**

**We feel a more appropriate focus of discussion should be calling the western side mountains of Maui "Mauna Kahalawai" its original Hawaiian name as opposed to the "West Maui Mountains" the only non Hawaiian name reference to a mountain range in our State.**

Aloha e Chairperson Mills,

My name is Ty Kāwika Tengan, and I am an associate professor and chair of the Department of Ethnic Studies and an associate professor in the Department of Anthropology at the University of Hawai‘i at Mānoa. I write to lend my fullest support to the application of Mr. John Duey, President of Hui o Nā Wai ‘Ehā, to change the name of ‘Īao Stream back to its original name of Wailuku River. I served as an expert witness in the case that the Hui o Nā Wai ‘Ehā initiated to successfully restore the four great waters of Maui. The “Report on the Archival, Historical and Archaeological Resources of Nā Wai ‘Ehā, Wailuku District, Island of Maui” that I co-authored in 2007, submitted before this Board by Kapua Sproat, highlighted “the traditional, historical, and cultural significance” of Wailuku, Waikapū, Waiehu, and Waihe‘e. While there was no shortage of mo‘olelo (historical narratives) that attested to this, the one problem that we encountered in writing the report was that of reconciling the names. Most of the older sources referenced the Wailuku River as such; however, since it is officially recognized at present as ‘Īao Stream, we were forced to take up the modern name rather than the traditional. The Board would be doing an important service to cultural and historical researchers and indeed the whole of Hawai‘i by restoring the original name of Wailuku River, which would honor the true history and mana of this vital watercourse.

Mahalo for your consideration of Hui o Nā Wai 'Ehā's ("Hui's") request to change the name of 'Īao Stream to Wailuku River. Earthjustice is pleased to support this effort as a part of our long-standing commitment to Nā Wai 'Ehā's storied natural and cultural resources and the communities that depend on them.

For more than ten years, Earthjustice has partnered with the Hui, Office of Hawaiian Affairs, and community supporters on efforts to restore mauka to makai streamflow to Nā Wai 'Ehā, Maui's four great waters of Waikapū, Wailuku, Waiehu, and Waihe'e. During this legal campaign, we reviewed the extensive record on the area's geographic and cultural history, which consistently referred to "Wailuku River" by that traditional and historical name. Around the time that the plantations diverted the "wai" (or waters) of Wailuku, the River's name was lost as well. This name change to 'Īao Stream obfuscated the noble heritage and profound significance of this area for generations of residents and visitors alike, although cultural practitioners have consistently maintained the usage of the name Wailuku River.


Just as mauka to makai streamflow restores vitality to natural areas, this flowing water can restore an area's historic and cultural integrity as well. It is fitting that today, as community efforts to restore streamflow to Nā Wai 'Ehā begin to bear fruit, the Hui asks that Wailuku River's name be returned along with the flowing water. This name change would be a significant milestone in the community's journey to reclaim its true natural and cultural heritage.

In closing, we ask that you support the Hui's request. This Board's action will restore the true meaning of the name Nā Wai 'Ehā, and honor the area's significance on Maui and throughout Hawai'i nei. We are grateful for your time and consideration.

*Aloha Executive Secretary Yost,*

*Today in the Maui news was an article titled, "State panel calls for returning to 'Wailuku River' as official name". We are opposed to the name change for the following reasons:*

- 1) The originator (John Duey) of this name change is not Native Hawaiian and is hiding under the group name, "Na Wai Eha".*
- 2) Wailuku River is already being used on the Big Island and would be the first waterway in the State of Hawaii with two identical names for waterways in two different areas, a first for Hawaii.*
- 3) The definition of a river; "A LARGE natural flow of water that crosses an area of land and goes into an ocean, etc." The definition of a stream, "SMALL rivers can be referred to using names such as stream, creek, brook, rivulet, and rill". Since Iao Stream is a small river and not a large river, the proper description name would be a "stream", not a river!*
- 4) The origin of the small river called "Iao Stream" originates in Iao Valley, not Wailuku town or district! Iao Streams runs through Wailuku on it's way to the ocean, but does not originate in Wailuku.*
- 5) Yes, Iao Stream's name came after Wailuku River, but before the arrival of haoles (foreigners) it was called by another name as well. Iao is the burial place of our Alii (royalty) and Iao Stream honors our ancestor's resting place.*

*We strongly oppose the name change of Iao Stream to Wailuku River for the above reasons.*
