PUBLIC COMMENT

I attend DCCA's public comment meetings in Hilo on February 1, on Maui February 15, on Molokai February 16 and on Oahu February 22.

At each of those meetings I provided public testimony.

I was truly amazed at the testimony at all the meetings, which was overwhelmingly in support of the community services provided by the non-profit public, educational and government television access organizations serving communities throughout the state. Testifiers were almost in unanimous support of DCCA seeking an exemption for the access providers from procurement by competitive means as dictated in the procurement law.

I was also amazed at the ad hoc manner in which the public comment meetings were carried out with different rules applied by DCCA to how the meetings were conducted on each island.

After experiencing DCCA putting a time limit on the Maui meeting and closing the sessions after hearing from only 24 of 70 signed up to testify, and then a few days later on Oahu allowing the meeting to continue for as long as it took to hear from all of the 75 or so people who wanted to testify, I decided I wasn't going to submit written testimony.

However, I changed my mind when I received a copy of a letter below, which was sent out today, February 24, 2006 by Governor Linda Lingle.

February 24, 2006

Dear Molokai Resident

Having lived on Molokai for a number of years, I know first hand how much community spirit and participation our Molokai residents have on issues affecting the island.

Thank you for expressing your views regarding Akaku and the RFP process.

For your information, the State Procurement Office and the Attorney General informed the Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs (DCCA) that the state procurement laws must be followed in the awarding of public access television contracts. As a result, state law dictates that the DCCA needs to pursue future Akaku and all other public access contracts through an RFP process.

I appreciate your comments and concerns and will be sending a copy of your email to Director Recktenwald to be included in the public comment file.

Again, thank you for sharing your views with me.

Governor Linda Lingle

This letter seems to confirm what one Hilo resident told me at the first DCCA public comment meeting in Hilo. He said that he felt that the public meetings DCCA was conducting were just for show and DCCA had already made up its mind to go for a Request for Proposal (RFP) and subject the public access providers to a competitive bid process.

So here are some of my general thoughts. Take them for what they are worth.

To start off, I would recommend that DCCA ask the State Procurement Office for at least a 12 month extension in order for DCCA to do its homework and work with the public you serve to make sure that things are done right and valuable community resources around the state which have been nurtured through community building over a 15 year period are not lost.

Because once they are lost, they will not be recovered again and the public will have lost something that is very special in to the residents of our state.

During this extended time period I would go out for another round of public comment meetings better prepared to educate the public which in turn will lead to more constructive and focused testimony.

Below are some of the thoughts I put together when I forwarded the Governor's letters to others around the state.

DCCA mentioned at the Hilo meeting that nowhere else

in the nation is a public, educational and government television access services contract subject to an RFP. This lead to the question, "So why start in Hawaii?" If it 'aint broke why try and fix it.

On the website of the State Procurement Office there is a lot of information. In that information, two objectives are mentioned.

1. Maximize best value to the fullest extent practicable, and
2. Increase public confidence in the procurement processes

The procurement law provides for the state's Chief Procurement Officer, Aaron Fujioka, to grant an exemption if he determines that procurement through competitive means is either "not practicable" or "not advantageous to the State". These are the exemption standards right out of the procurement code.

At the Hilo meeting DCCA was asked, "Who is the State...is it the people?" DCCA's moderator, Clyde Sonobe Administrator of DCCA's Cable TV Division, could not answer the question. DCCA's attorney also was unable to provide an answer.

In addition, the State's Chief Procurement Officer has made it clear that even if there are many valid arguments for exemption DCCA's public access service contracts from a competitive bidding process, he would be inclined to deny the exemption request if just one entity wanted the opportunity to submit a "serious bid" for the contracts.

So much for the rhetoric on the State Procurement Office website of wanting to "maximize best value" or to "increase public confidence in the procurement process"

Another question raised during the public comment meetings was, "If Mr. Recktenwald inquired of the AG's office about the procurement law applying to Akaku and the other access providers, which are funded by cable

access fees paid directly to each non-profit access organization ('Olelo \$4,100,000, Akaku \$813,000, Na Leo \$692,00 and Ho'ike \$336,000), why didn't Mr. Recktenwald inquire of the AG's office about the application of the procurement law to PBS Hawaii Public Television, which takes in \$2,200,000 in franchise fees paid to it by the cable company?

DCCA's response is that Mr. Recktenwald only asked the AG for advice on the public access providers not on PBS. The question still remains, "Why?"

DCCA is permitted to charge the cable company up to 5% of its gross revenues as "rent" for using the public rights of way to lay their cables etc.

DCCA charges only 4% currently. 3% of the gross revenues derived from each county go to the respective access organization serving that county (SEE ABOVE \$ TOTOALS). PBS gets 1% of the cable operator's gross revenues statewide. This amounts to more than \$2,150,000, significantly more than the three access organizations serving communities on the neighbor islands.

So the question still remains, "Why isn't Mr. Recktenwald inquiring of the AG's office about the procurement laws applying to PBS's affiliate in Hawaii?"

DCCA had mentioned that as far as it knew none of the PBS affiliates in the other 49 state's receives any of the cable franchise fees intended for the public, educational and government television access providers.

The other question that came up was, "Why is PBS even entitled to a share of the franchise cable fees?"

It is sad to see the Governor acquiesce to DCCA's ad hoc handling of the public comment process. On Maui, DCCA allowed only 24 of 71 people who had signed up to testify at the February 15 meeting. There were 125 people at the meeting, and more than 71 would have

testified had they been given the opportunity.

The excuse for cutting the meeting short was that the Governor's liaison booked the room at Maui Community College knowing that the room would only be available for two hours. DCCA informed the press those two hours was enough time to be allotted.

On Oahu the February 22 meeting went well beyond two hours, and all those who attended were given the opportunity to testify whether they signed up or not. DCCA set no time limit on the meeting. Different rules for Oahu?

Hopefully, the Governor and her appointee Mr. Recktenwald, will consider their strategies and work with the public to do things right. The state procurement office has indicated that it does not want to jeopardize the delivery of the service provided by Akaku and others and is amenable to working with DCCA if DCCA requests a time extension (i.e. 12 months) to make sure it is in a position to make an informed decision.

DCCA had said it advised the State Procurement Office that it would make a decision on how it intended to proceed with the procurement process by sometime in April.

The decision of DCCA Director Mark Recktenwald, which most likely will have the Governor's blessing since the public response has been so strong and passionate, will impact vibrant community resource operations that have developed statewide over the last 15 years through community networking, volunteerism and partnering. They have become true community resources with a proven, successful track record, especially in underserved communities such as Molokai, Waianae, Kahuku, and Hilo.

The access organizations have provided education training service in the public schools where DOE has either not elected to fund or ceased funding to the elementary, intermediate and/or high schools. They

are provided services to the charter schools and private and independent schools also, and interacted with UH and other colleges.

And they have provided the people with a voice....a voice that would otherwise go unheard. Our society can not afford to allow these voices to be silenced, as most likely would be the case if public access service were taken over by a for-profit corporation or a state institution with a cumbersome, homogenized agenda designed to stifle creativity and the public spirit.

I remember Jean Aoki, a graceful, elderly Japanese lady who testified at the legislature last year concern the importance of public television access. As I remember, she stated that public access television is the people's "soapbox". It is the public's only outlet for free, extended media coverage. Without public television the people will be left with either writing a short letter to the editor which may or may not be published and if it is published most likely will be edited, or a three minute speech before a government body.

Akaku, 'Olelo, Ho'ike and Na Leo were formed as private non-profit organization for the sole purpose of serving communities throughout the state and providing that soapbox where free speech and free expression are still alive and well.

Unlike the daily newspapers and regular TV stations, the public access TV stations are non-commercial and cannot accept any paid advertising. They are there to serve the public's agenda. This is refreshing in an era when money seems able to buy anything or any decision desired.

According to the state procurement officer, if the DCCA's access services contracts are subject to a competitive bid process any legal entity established to do business in Hawaii can bid for the contracts. It will be open to for-profit corporations, state agencies such as the UH and companies that are based

in the Mainland.

This is a real threat to our local communities that have worked so hard to build up public access resource centers, which they feel comfortable with and are very proud of.

The Governor and Mr. Recktenwald need to view the rebroadcast of the February 22 public comment meeting in Oahu. The testimonies were diverse, passionate, dramatic and focused and were all about community values, dreams, accomplishments and goals. Our politicians need to start remembering where they came from.

TESTIMONY OF JAY APRIL, CHAIRMAN, AKAKU BOARD OF DIRECTORS CONCERNING PEG ACCESS SERVICES

The Akaku Board of Directors has authorized me to provide testimony strongly in favor of the Department seeking an exemption from the SPO regarding the RFP process. The Board has also expressed the desire to inform the Department that if it does decide to go ahead with an RFP, that it seek additional time from the State Procurement Office in order to proceed responsibly in a manner that incorporates maximum input from the existing PEG's and the public. We believe in our valuable community resource and it is our desire that we achieve nothing less than the vibrant PEG access entities that our island's deserve – diverse community television that emulates "best practice" anywhere else in the nation.

For more than thirty three years, community television in local cable franchise jurisdictions throughout United States has provided public, education and government nondiscriminatory access to television, the dominant medium of information and communication in society. Public access to information from diverse and often antagonistic forces via cable television has helped local communities to enjoy a vibrant exchange of ideas necessary to build a healthy democracy, extend the reach of public discourse and involve an informed electorate.

Maui's PEG provider, Akaku: Maui Community Television has been recognized by the Governor of Hawaii and many others as an innovator and national leader in the field. It's success in helping to engage the community in the affairs of government and in providing education, training and media literacy to all segments of our community are legion. This did not happen overnight. It is a result of Akaku's demonstrated commitment to it's mission statement and a community building effort that has taken nearly a decade to evolve. *It is not practicable or advantageous to the people of Maui, Molokai or Lanai to change it.*

It is important to note that the philosophy and skills set necessary to operate a successful PEG access

entity are unique and not easily attainable. They require an expertise that is the opposite of commercial, institutional, educational or public television. Whereas most television broadcast entities provide highly restricted content in a one to many, one way, autocratic communications flow where success is measured by ratings; PEG access entities function according to a different paradigm. PEG access entities facilitate communication and information from, by and for the community. Content is not restricted, there is a many to many communications flow where diversity of viewpoint and empowering the communities voice is of paramount importance. The simple fact is that in general, PEG access entities are television anomalies. It is not practicable or advantageous to the state or local jurisdiction to replace them without proper deliberation.

Any meaningful reorganization of existing PEG structures in Hawaii will require a comprehensive review and audit of DCCA including a full accounting for the allocation, dispersement, disposition and rationale for all PEG access funds, consultation with outside experts in the field and a great deal of community involvement where the public on each island is afforded full participation in that decision.

Since marketplace forces are deficient in meeting the fullest range of community communications needs, citizen participation at every level is essential. Just as the federal government should not preclude state government from acting in the best interests of its citizens, state government should not preclude local authorities (the state appointed PEG Access Boards) to act on needs and interests of all their residents. The issues before us bring to the fore the proper role of the state in regulating PEG access in the public interest.

It is extremely problematic, therefore to hear statements by the DCCA Cable Administrator in public comment sessions that the Department has not ruled out for-profit or other state agencies being allowed to bid on PEG contracts should the DCCA not seek an exemption from the State Procurement Code. Should the Department seek these options, it would appear to be in violation of the statute that set up the PEG's to begin with which states in Section 440G-3:

"Access organizations" means any *non-profit* organization designated by the Director to oversee the development, operation, supervision, management, production, or broadcasting of programs for any channels obtained under section 440G-8..."

Should the DCCA allow state agencies such as UH and MCC to bid, it would create a huge liability that would not be advantageous to the state. Not only would these state institutions have inherent conflicts of interests with competing educational voices, such an action would run counter to long standing democratic principles. State-run television is the hallmark of dictatorial, autocratic regimes not becoming in a democracy. It runs counter to the 1997 DCCA commissioned study, Disputes over PEG Resources, which recommended that the "DCCA use its authority to deter raids on PEGs by other state agencies"; and to the DCCA's own statement that "These access organizations are intended to be independent, they are not intended to be state agencies"

It is also troubling that the Department has not released the opinion of the Attorney General regarding its compliance with the State Procurement Code prior to conducting public comment sessions and that the Department has put forth an unrealistic June 30, time frame for the resolution of these matters. These actions call into question whether the PEG access issues are being dealt with in an open, fair and equitable manner. This lack of transparency may be advantageous to the state cable monopoly provider or to certain bureaucrats and agencies but it is definitely not advantageous to the state if the interest of the public holds any weight.

With respect to the DCCA's desire to seek comment on whether to seek an exemption for the PEG's from the State Procurement Office or to issue an RFP, it is the position of Akaku and an overwhelming majority of Maui citizens, that the DCCA seek an exemption. In addition to the reason's cited above, to issue an RFP would be "not practicable", nor would it be "advantageous to the state" because:

1. LOCAL DECISION MAKING IS BEST PRACTICE

By definition, independent community access channels can best meet community communications needs with an emphasis on localism and decentralization of media.

It is not practicable or advantageous to the state or for the DCCA to supercede or intrude upon the demonstrated legitimate community communications needs of Maui Nui and the informed local decision making of the local PEG access boards.

2. A REQUEST FOR PROPOSALS IS NOT PRACTICABLE IN TIME FRAME

PEG Access on Maui is not broke and does not need to be fixed. Good government oversight requires intelligent solutions to bureaucratic error. To provide a quick fix to an issue of this magnitude by attempting to prepare an informed and fair RFP in the time frame allowed is **not practicable** or realistic. The DCCA, by its own admission lacks expertise in this area and needs to acquire it. 5. HAWAII PUBLIC TELEVISION MUST BE INCLUDED

Using the same rationale for issuing an RFP for the PEG's , it would appear that KHET which receives 1% of PEG access funds annually from the DCCA would also be subject to an RFP process which would be cumbersome at best.

6. PEG SELF SUFFICIENCY AT RISK

A regular RFP process with contracts that are not co-terminous with cable franchises would have the effect of de-stabilizing the individual PEG's by making it difficult to meet DCCA mandated long term self-sufficiency goals

In conclusion, due to the unique nature and character of PEG entities in Hawaii, an RFP process put forth in this way in this time frame as a solution to one hand of government not knowing what the other hand is doing is a terrible idea.

If the state still wants to move ahead and issue an RFP and not seek an exemption, it should do so judiciously and in a meaningful way. It needs to facilitate Community Television conferences and genuine discussion on each island in order to develop criteria subject to the approval of local PEG access boards. It would need to complete a thorough review and

analysis of PEG access that includes the full participation of local access stakeholders including a series of public hearings on each island. It would need to conduct audits of the DCCA itself and all entities which have received cable access funds in the past including UH,MCC,DOE and KHET It would need to bring in the best and brightest from successful PEG access operations around the nation and commission a informed plan of action with maximum community involvement that meets the fullest range of community communications needs.

We were asked to email our thoughts related to our
testimony on 2/15/2006 at the meeting regarding public
access cable held at Maui Community College

I did not have my testimony written at that time but these
are my reflections. I teach a course for Nursing

Assistants at MCC that is rebroadcast several times so
that students in Maui County who are working or caring
for small children can access this course without
coming to our TV classroom. They do have a lab
instructor who meets them in small groups for their
clinical experience in long-term care. I taught for 30
years at the School of Nursing at the University of Texas
in Austin, Texas. This experience of teaching on TV with
cable access was a new experience for me when I
started teaching this course at MCC approximately 10
years ago. I realized that I was reaching a lot of the
public who needed similar information regarding the
care of their family members. I am constantly being

stopped in the community and given comments about
classes that the family member or patient has viewed on
our cable access channel. I have added specific material
for this population. When I have attended national
nursing meetings on distance education, I have been
surprised to learn that many of my professional
colleagues in other states were opposed to the public
viewing of information in courses that they have not paid
for. I think Maui Community College does a tremendous
public service by offering courses on cable and
Skybridge to encourage access to education for many
that need to work in order to attend college. I think we
should have public access. However, I think there are
limits to what we can present through this forum.

Several years ago, i viewed an Akaku TV presentation on
a Day in The Life Of An Older Woman In This County
Who Had Alzheimer's Disease. It was very well done
until It showed the son changing his mother' s briefs. I
would never show this on public access TV. Did his
mother sign a release to have this part of her body

shown on TV to people in this community that probably knew her? She was not mentally competent to sign such a release at this time in her life. I would not be able to show this kind of film in my class. We are not free to broadcast all materials using this medium without any attention to the ramifications of a public presentation.

Thank you for the opportunity to comment on Akaku's PEG Access services and whether the Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs (DCCA) should seek an exemption from the State procurement competitive bid process.

Akaku would like the DCCA to seek an exemption from the requirement that the services provided by Akaku and other Public Education and Government (PEG) access centers across the state be procured through a competitive bid process.

Over the past few weeks, people from PEG providers respective communities have shared their valuable time and come forward to voice their concern and views with the DCCA. It was a great learning experience. The message consistently heard is to exempt the PEG providers throughout the State of Hawaii from the procurement process. Their messages affirmed their support for the services they receive and personal value they placed on them.

Akaku conducted an online survey to garner input based on questions raised by the DCCA. The outcome mirrors those voices heard during the public comment sessions which are to seek the exemption.

As the DCCA considers the input gathered from the public hearings, please take the time to consider the far-reaching effects that decision has and how it could impact Akaku and the other community access providers' ability to continue to serve our unique and diverse communities. There are many intangible, unquantifiable aspects of what Hawaii's PEG Access providers do. We are not merely service providers in the community; we are part of the community.

Akaku's approach to community building empowers everyday citizens with more than just equipment, but also the encouragement and support needed to share their message and issues with viewers so that we may all learn from one another's experiences and points of view.

Akaku has been doing business in Maui County since 1992. We have a proven track record with the DCCA and our community at large as being the sole provider of public access services in our community. The many years of service is built on relationships and community trust. The strength of our services is attributed to the invaluable and skilled staff resource we have established over the years. Although services on Maui have been put to a test this past year we are an organization that communities in Maui County have grown to trust and have come to rely on for providing services above and beyond what is expected.

Akaku's ability to attract and retain qualified staff on a long-term basis would be hurt by annual or frequent contract bidding process. Due to Hawaii's low unemployment rate it is difficult to attract and retain qualified staff. Insecurity in Akaku's longevity would disrupt daily operations

as staff dwell on the what ifs and uncertainties as well as drive staff to find more “secure” employment elsewhere. Additionally, the voluminous request for proposal process would take valuable staff time reducing time available to provide direct services to the community. As with all non-profit organizations, Akaku has stringent operational requirements for reporting and accountability. Akaku has been accountable to the DCCA and its numerous funders and the community at large. The community has a right to expect accountability and ongoing services that evolve to meet its ever-changing needs. Competitive bid would disrupt continuous and reliable service to our PEG (public, education, and government) access customers. Longstanding partnerships and continuous services would be in jeopardy. If the contract was awarded to a new entity, service would be disrupted, stalled, or delayed, to the detriment of viewers and individuals and entities that rely on and create PEG access programming.

Over the years, Akaku has demonstrated its ability to provide fair, equitable, accessible services along with transparent governance. The complexity of this public access deliverable serving public, education and government is not easily replicated, transferred or substituted.

As stated in the DCCA fact sheet, PEG access services would continue even with the procurement process in place however the instability and constant uncertainty of losing the PEG contract each contract period is detrimental and not reasonable if the PEGs goal is self-sufficiency and long-term sustainability.

Currently, the DCCA’s contract with PEGs allows it substantial flexibility. On Maui as with other PEG providers, public access services are designed to meet DCCA’s requirements and the community’s needs. The provider has the flexibility to create and design customized programs to best fit these needs. An RFP awarded contract would restrict flexibility in developing new programs that meet changing community needs. Changes to contract terms and service will cause delay in service delivery and flexibility for both PEG provider and DCCA. In the bid process, the scope of service and deliverables are specific and detailed. Changes in the scope of service or deliverable would require considerable time for discussion and adjustments to contract services and allocation. The PEG provider would delay service delivery while processing the change and the State would also incur additional costs in personnel time. The competitive bid process is not practicable and not advantageous to the State as it hampers this flexibility and delivery of services as well as adds additional financial burdens on both parties.

One of the greatest fears in the competitive bid process is creating a cookie cutter service that is unyielding, impractical and not advantageous for the community it serves, and creating a monopoly among a very limited pool of qualified providers.

The DCCA’s task of designing the requirements and scope of services for the competitive bid process is daunting. Substantial staff time would be required in consulting, developing a request for proposal, administering the bid process and addressing any change adjustments. Additionally, crafting proposals to address each County’s complexity and uniqueness would require additional personnel, increasing administrative costs for the DCCA.

As the DCCA closed it’s public comment hearings, reviews input, and determines the best process to act upon, it keeps in mind the many voices heard from Hilo to Lihue, from youth as young as 11 years old to kupunas... “if it ain’t broke, don’t fix it!”

Aloha Mr. Recktenwald,

Please consider all our comments carefully. Mahalo! We are sending this testimony in hopes of thoughtfully resolving the current crisis and unanswered questions regarding Akaku Community Television.

1) Current Service Provided By Akaku. We think the current level of service is very good. We live in an isolated area, Hana, and appreciate Akaku for the wide variety of community presentations that otherwise would not be available. We are better informed for the programming.

Akaku has made outreach training in Hana available. There has been a sincere effort to involve our community.

2) RFP Process. First, we request a copy of the ruling made by the State Attorney General regarding the RFP process. Perhaps, you can send it via email. It is our understanding this ruling has triggered the current public hearing process.

Because the board of directors situation at Akaku has become so divided and politicized, we think a waiver of the RFP process is appropriate provided there are conditions attached that will insure the Public part of Public, Education and Government (PEG) is fairly represented on the Akaku Board.

It is very clear there is an organized effort to take over the Akaku Board by special interests. That needs to be avoided. The RFP process would enable the inappropriate, unwanted and possible illegal organized takeover.

3) Akaku Board Members. A reorganization of the requirements for board members should be considered as part of the solution. We suggest the board should be made up of representatives from non profit community organizations that represent the different parts of the island. For example, Hana Community Association, Haiku Community Association, Kihei Community Association, Kula Page 2, Blumer-Buell Testimony

Community Association and so forth. This would help to insure the Public part of PEG is represented fairly. There could be additional components to this idea.

4) Collaboration. There is a need for more collaboration between the PEG components. Here is a concrete example: Maui Community College (MCC) has a remote, interactive, classroom in Hana. Akaku has live broadcasts from the Maui County Building to Hana via cable. However, neither Hana residents or our Hana District Council Representative can participate in meetings live from Hana. This should be easily achievable not only for Hana, but Molokai and Lanai.

The County of Maui envisioned interactive live broadcasts from the Hana Council Services Office. This is only a hundred feet from the MCC classroom. Why can't MCC, Akaku and Government, the PEG components, collaborate to make this possible? Democracy would be better served if we could participate in our County and State Government without an enormous sacrifice of time and money.

5) Money Issues. The division of cable funds needs to be publicly explained and collaborated by a group of non partisan parties. We do not like what appears to be a political interpretation of this issue. What are the laws, without "political interpretation"? It would be unfair for Akaku to be undermined by what may be the unfair taking of Akaku's rightful funds. It is equally true for the other PEG components.

The same non partisan look needs to be taken regarding the purchase of the shopping center by Akaku. What is legal? Again, we do not think this should be subject to political interpretation. Has the DCCA previously taken a position on the purchase? What has been done with the income?

The issue of funds going to MCC has been raised. Please clear the air regarding the issue with a long-term accounting.

Finally, accusations have been made that the State Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs is acting with a political agenda. We want the DCCA to act above board, without any appearance of impropriety or prejudice.

There needs to be unbiased accountability across the board.

It seems obvious to me that the DCCA should request an exemption for all the NON-PROFIT PEGS throughout the state;

1. the Non-Profit PEGS should be grandfathered as they were formed before the State required an RFP
2. The money assigned to the non-profit PEGS is not from a State agency but from a private corporation that utilizes the public owned right of way to sell a service and make a profit. (cable run through the telephone poles)
3. Community support for the existing Non-Profit PEGS is undeniably in favor of the status quo.

Seeking an exemption should be the main focus for the DCCA in order to maintain public order. We do not like what appears to be a political interpretation of this issue. What are the laws, without "political interpretation"? It would be unfair for Akaku to be undermined by what may be the unfair taking of Akaku's rightful funds. It is equally true for the other PEG components.

The same non partisan look needs to be taken regarding the purchase of the shopping center by Akaku. What is legal? Again, we do not think this should be subject to political interpretation. Has the DCCA previously taken a position on the purchase? What has been done with the income?

The issue of funds going to MCC has been raised. Please clear the air regarding the issue with a long-term accounting.

Finally, accusations have been made that the State Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs is acting with a political agenda. We want the DCCA to act above board, without any appearance of impropriety or prejudice.

There needs to be unbiased accountability across the board.

Mr. Sonobe and the Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs, thank you for your time.

I've been a member of MauiCommunity College's Preserving Our Recollections committee since its inception in 1999 and an interviewer since 2001. Preserving Our Recollections is an oral history project where elders in our community share their life experiences of Maui. These interviews are videotaped and broadcast on channel 55.

At first, PEG access funding allocated by Akaku supported the taping of the interviews with staff, equipment and supplies. If you watch the earlier interviews, you'll see that there was far more editing, with photographs shot separately rather than the interviewer holding pictures up.

When the funding stopped in 2001, the future of Preserving Our Recollections was in jeopardy. Our committee discussed the very real possibility of ending the project. It continued because of Mike Albert, Media Center Coordinator and his staff, who have taken time from their busy schedules to produce these videos. Unfortunately, a consequence is that fewer interviews have been shot because only one or two Friday mornings a month is scheduled for our segments.

The other interviewers and I have all experienced many positive comments when we are out in the community. It's surprising to me how many people watch these interviews and appreciate the work we're doing. As a person born and raised on Maui, I'm interested in what Maui was like in the 20's, 30's, 40's and what life was like during our parents' and grandparent's time.

Also, I'm a member of a UH system wide distance education committee which meets once a month. I remember a meeting a couple of years ago where one of the representatives from a community college on Oahuspoke about having their cable courses supported by HENC. She explained that HENC and Olelo Television have worked out an agreement where PEG money is allocated among the community colleges on Oahuto support their televised distance educational programming. Without this funding many or most of the cable classes originating from these campuses would be impossible to produce. I remember feeling so envious and wishing that we at MCC could have the same kind of funding. The Oahucampuses have one island where most of their distance education students reside. We have three islands and serve students at three outreach sites—Molokai, Lanai, and Hana—in addition to our statewide distance education students. I strongly feel that we are shortchanging our distance education students and our community because of the lack of resources to provide educational programming.

I'm in favor of going through a competitive bidding process if it results in the PEG access funding being restored to both the DOE and MCC.

Thank you for allowing me to comment on this matter.

Akaku has successfully served the tri-isle community of Maui County on numerous levels for many years. Akaku plays a vital role in providing Maui Nui with news and information regarding community affairs, non-profit activities, and political issues. The station also provides educational and entertainment programming that is not facilitated through other institutional or for-profit media. Akaku also teaches people of all ages and persuasions how to use video equipment and how to produce television programs. To change the egalitarian dynamic of what is taking place at Akaku would be both a mistake and a tragedy.

One look at Akaku's programming will reveal that this modest television station in central Maui is one of the most heavily utilized, equal-opportunity institutions on the island. Here is an organization that is doing something right, as is evidenced by the colorful blend of those utilizing all the station has to offer. In fact, I can think of no other public or quasi-public institution that so vibrantly represents and involves the entire demographic make-up of Maui County. Akaku's programming reflects Maui County's wide diversity in regard to ethnicity and culture, age, gender, socioeconomic status, political affiliation, religious or philosophical beliefs—you name it. Akaku provides an open dialogue and an invaluable service to our community.

During election seasons, Maui's people rely heavily on Akaku to provide them with information

regarding political candidates and voter issues. All candidates are invited, free of charge, to express their concerns to the public in equal-length presentations. Candidate debates and other political forums are also taped and presented. Given the fact that Maui County voter turnout is the lowest in the state (and the nation), it is obvious that our community needs all the voter support it can get. By the way, this is one example of how the general Akaku programming provides a great deal of the "G" in the PEG mandate (outside of regularly scheduled county council and legislative meetings.) It is also an example of how the "P" "E" and "G" often overlap: As relates to the above-described political/educational programming, would the programming be considered Public access, Education, or Government? Indeed, it's all three.

Akaku provides the public with easy access to classes regarding television production. I have taken tv production classes, my son has taken two production classes offered to teenagers, and I have numerous friends who have availed themselves of Akaku's excellent training and open studio policy. Many young people who are not otherwise involved or enthused about traditional education are able to learn valuable skills and have access to sophisticated television equipment through Akaku's outreach programs. By teaching individuals from all walks of life how to shoot and produce a television program, Akaku is able to give voice to those who might otherwise be disenfranchised.

Because I do volunteer work with several organizations in the community, I have interfaced with Akaku on many levels. I have always found Akaku's staff to be organized, helpful, polite, and supportive. In fact, I have seen staffers bend over backwards to assist with getting a show on the air. And of equal importance, Akaku has maintained a steadfast policy of openness. All views, no matter how conservative or how liberal, are aired. In this regard, I find Akaku to be a particularly amazing organization. (I was deeply saddened by the departure of Akaku's former CEO, Sean McLaughlin, who rigorously defended the public's right to freedom of expression. It was a shameful commentary when special interests successfully manipulated and displaced a highly skilled and dedicated individual.)

I believe it is misguided to attempt, through whatever means, to dismantle the tremendous community success that is Akaku. The fact that Akaku's Board has suffered some bumpy rides in recent months is in keeping with the messy nature of the institution of democracy. Dissenting viewpoints are the very fabric of all that is right with our hard-won freedoms. I hope that those who are involved in determining the future of Akaku will exercise their power with a great deal of wisdom. Maui County needs Akaku to continue with its mission of serving the diverse community that comprises Maui Nui. Our community television station is not broken and it doesn't need fixing.



The DCCA is the State of Hawaii Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs. DCCA SAYS "REQUESTS FOR GRANT PROPOSALS" (called "RFPs") WILL BE SENT OUT BY JULY FOR EVERY PUBLIC ACCESS TV STATION IN HAWAII seeking new people and entities to operate and be members of the Board of Directors of each Public Access TV Station in Hawaii. The dangerous implication of this is the THREATENED TAKE-OVER BY LAND DEVELOPERS OF EVERY PUBLIC ACCESS TV STATION IN THE STATE. This would obviously substantially cut off the free flow of information by the Public Access TV Stations that is so welcomed on Maui and the other islands.

There is obvious, substantial concern about whether it is even legal for the State to do this.

GOVERNOR LINGLE IS OBVIOUSLY BEHIND THESE GIGANTIC MOVES. THESE HIGH IMPACT DECISIONS CANNOT BE MADE WITHOUT HER APPROVAL. The highly questionable DCCA Director Mark Recktenwald announced the startling arbitrary, state cutbacks in Public Access TV Stations' funding -- but allegedly only with Lingle's tacit approval behind him. It is well known that one of Governor Lingle's favorite land developers is EVERETT DOWLING. The following is the approximate testimony that I gave orally at the public meeting held at Maui Community College on Wednesday, February 15, 2006:

My name is Patricia Adams. I am the department chair for Career and Technical Education, and I teach English classes here at Maui Community College. Welcome to MCC. Thank you for coming and allowing us to testify.

I would like to tell you what access to education over TV means to our students and our community. We offer a wide range of TV courses and programs day and night for all of our AA students at MCC. Through the University of Hawaii Center Maui, we also offer baccalaureate and graduate degree programs from the University of Hawaii campuses at Manoa, West Oahu, and Hilo.

Each semester, in addition to working full time and taking care of their families, between 250 and 300 students attend these evening classes at the UH Center. Some are single parents; many are the first in their families to be able to attend college. All are grateful for the opportunity to fulfill their lifetime educational goals and to build better lives for their families without leaving their homes and jobs on Maui, Molokai, and Lanai. If you want a real chicken skin experience, just attend a graduation on Molokai and see what it means to those families to have this opportunity for their children.

Also, we are not only educating students who are taking the classes for credit, but we are also educating the community. I know this because when I teach over TV and I go to the Post Office or Safeway or Long's, people often comment and ask me questions and tell me how much they learn by watching our classes.

It takes resources to equip, maintain, operate, and upgrade MCC's TV Education Channel--resources that for MCC are in such short supply that we have to turn down some programs that our students need. We need to be able to continue and to expand the college's distance education capabilities--and continue to make a difference in the lives of so many deserving people in Maui County.

I'd like to tell you about one of these people, a young lady who came to MCC eight years ago when we offered a weekend college for working adults who had never had the opportunity to attend college. She was a struggling single mother working at a minimum wage job and receiving assistance. Her self-esteem was very low. I was her English teacher. After a few classes, she came to me and said that she just didn't think

that she was smart enough to succeed in college. After talking with her about her situation, I told her that she had no choice. She had to stay and earn a degree, if not for herself, for her two young sons. And then I told her what I tell all my self-doubting students: if she stopped attending classes, I would call her every morning at 2 a.m. to remind her to come to school and I would be sitting in front of her door when she left for work every day until she returned to school.

After we talked about how she could succeed, she stayed. She went on to earn an AA--and a promotion at work. Then through the University Center, she earned a BA--and a new job in the area of her studies. Then she earned a master's--and a promotion. Eight years after I first met her in my English class, I was serving as the Acting Director of the UH Center, and I had the pleasure and honor of officiating at the graduation when this lovely, confident lady received her master's degree. What a happy occasion for both of us! Because of her education, she has a wonderful job where she is helping other people--and encouraging them to attend college. She is proud to be able to send both of her sons to college.

This is what we at MCC are all about--educating people and making a difference in their lives. We want to be able to continue doing this. Thank you.

P.S. (This is not part of my testimony) I want to commend DCCA Deputy Director Clyde Sonobe for his patience and good humor throughout a trying evening. He is truly a saint! Sincerely, Patricia Adams

Aloha Mr. Ricktenwald:

Just today I have read that the board at Akaku has come to an arbitration decision to make certain changes in funding and board membership. I am encouraged that an agreement has been reached but I still have concerns and they are as follows. Please bear with me and my rambling letter.

There is so much RE development money flowing into Maui County it boggles the mine and now it appears to be muddying the river of public access, (paid for with our cable dollars)..that is Akaku. Anytime we read that Everett Dowling , a developer, is involved in a decision process.... like who goes onto the Akaku board of directors via new legislation or funding decisions (House bill 784)....skepticism surfaces. I remember that Mr. Dowling resigned from the Board of UH because of conflict of interest issues because he sold his land in Kula to a university entity. We have an empty shopping center here in Kula that no one wanted. It has remained empty and unbuilt for years. Why? Mr. Dowling has proposed a very large development (millions upon millions of dollars) requiring rezoning in the MacKenna area of Maui. There have been public demonstrations against this project. Akaku has reported on this project through it's coverage of Planning Commission meetings. Mr. Dowling does what developers do...they develop...but at what cost to the community and when and where must have planning attached to it.

When I read that our former Mayor Apana has his right hand man Mr. Inokuma put on the board of Akaku, doubts bubble up. Our recent Mayor Apana was the guy who said he was using private monies to buy computers for schools and then proceeded to use public funds to cover the bill. He is also the same Mayor who left us with a cost of Millions of dollars for Lime Kiln Beach house and more junk cars than we know what to do with by overlooking an illegal junkyard run by a relative? Hummmmm? (you can Google any of these references) Should I place my faith in a free and open media on these two fellows and a state legislature that works in the dark? The sunshine loving citizens of Maui county who work at Akaku and use their facilities have nothing but good to say about Akaku....albeit one fellow....one out of hundreds who work there. I wish I knew MCC's Mr. Sakamoto reputation better...he is my neighbor here in Kula just two houses up the hill... but we have never met. I have met his wife as she sells real estate here on Maui and has held open houses in our neighborhood...a very charming lady. But that is beside the point. What I want to make clear is that I depend on Akaku to bring me the news of who is doing what in Maui County, how our various agencies and boards function and I make my voting decisions on what I hear and see. I believe the more we know about decisions being made in regard to our island home the better off we will be. Information is power. Akaku is information.

To me, this whole Akaku Board changeup begins to smell of the dirty waters polluted by political special interest influence (PAC Money and K-Street Mall) and NOT the transparent waters that Maui citizens like to row

and toe into.....we do require SUNSHINE here in Maui County not like our state legislature , I'm afraid, who choose to meet in the dark. Another issue I have flashes red. I can't help but feel that the money to education issue feels like a dead red fish..... a red herring....a fish I'm afraid is too popular with lobbying cronies (read Apana). We continue to swallow status quo and test scores keep declining... accountability and better management (local)are being proposed. Thanks for the opportunity to testify at this open public meeting.
Truly, openness and transparency are essential for the State and your agents to honestly govern local media resources in the public interest.

Please note that formal objections were earlier raised to this hearing location due to the controversy surrounding MCC. As you know, special private interests are supporting MCC's false and misleading entitlement claims on cable franchise resources to the detriment of the State's designated PEG access provider and local community voices of Maui Nui. Many individuals have shared their feeling of discomfort here at MCC, where access to media is highly discriminatory.

The lack of scheduled hearings on the island of Lana'i is a further indication that these proceedings are rushed and ill considered. In future, we request that such hearings be held on every island with cable service and in remote underserved communities such as Ka'u, Hana and

Lahaina.

PEG Services for Maui and Kalawao Counties

Maui Nui is well served by the accomplishments of Akaku over the past decade. Akaku is known around the world as a leading and visionary organization - always true to the mission and fully accountable to the people they empower. Congratulations to the amazing staff and the dedicated volunteers who make the vision real and give all of our communities a voice.

Akaku provides local cable TV channels, a radio station (KAKU 88.5FM) and online media outlets (akaku.org) along with digital media production and post-production facilities and training - available to everyone without discrimination.

But clearly Akaku is greater than the sum of its parts. By empowering the community's voice, Akaku engages people and builds community involvement - with free speech and expression, lifelong teaching and learning, and direct citizen participation in local self-governance.

Akaku provides a civic network connecting neighbors with neighbors, effectively building diverse communities of common and uncommon interests.

Issues to Consider for an RFP Process

If Akaku, or any community media provider, is allowed to be run in a closed, private and exclusive manner - like the chamber of commerce or a country club - then the potential for favoritism and corruption will be unchecked. The powerful temptation to use the community's media to support special friends, to benefit political supporters, and to trade favors for personal gain is just too great.

From personal experience I know that community media is often asked to do special favors for powerful people, including covering a

friend's
retirement, commercial business activity, political event or
other
occasion. While it's hard to say "no" and some individuals may
remain
bitter that their requests are denied, it is essential that no
favoritism is granted for private and special interests.

Some private interests demand special consideration with
threatened
lawsuits, but ethical management of community media must not bow
to
their selfish demands.

Secret closed deliberations among board officers, in violation of
adopted bylaws and sunshine rules, must not be allowed.

The allocation of community media resources must be made in the
light of
day for all the community to see - thus ensuring honesty,
diversity and
non-discrimination.

Designated PEG access providers are managing public money and
priceless
assets that rightfully belong to the entire community. From
examples of
socialized media in totalitarian regimes we know that State
agencies and
institutions should not be allowed to control community access to
media
⌘ that would be the end of Free Speech and a model for failure.

Of even greater concern - and this is the root of the present
crisis
here - Akaku was called upon to silence voices that challenge or
disagree with special private interests. Beginning last year
Akaku was
assaulted with stealth legislative maneuvers and threatened
litigation
because the organization refused to censor community voices. The
free
speech mission is ⌘empowering our community's voice⌘ without
discrimination.

State cable regulators and their appointed agents must not seek
to curry
favor or personal benefits by offering privilege to special
private
interests - least of all when asked to censor or silence the
voices of
our community.

Community access providers of PEG media services must not be afraid of free speech and must not be intimidated by powerful interests that seek to control and direct our community's voice.

Please be ever vigilant and always remain aware that there are special private interests who profit from controlling media and building imbalance.

Building im-balance in darkness and out of public view these interests can fatally corrupt the oversight of community access media, divert community resources to State control, undermine guiding principles of free speech, and taint the basic operations of free media access.

DCCA must increase the public accountability of cable regulation first, and then hold their agents accountable. Questions regarding unethical and incompetent State regulation of Time Warner must be answered. The DCCA has a duty and a responsibility to provide fully transparent accounting for cable operator regulation and for all the channels, facilities, network connections, operations and funding derived from State cable franchises and related activities.

All the public resources that derive from State regulation of Time Warner should be subject to similar oversight, including priceless Institutional Network assets and the cable franchise funds that the DCCA currently diverts to State education institutions and to PBS Hawaii.

Keep in mind that cable franchise funding directed by DCCA to either the Hawaii Education Network Consortium or to PBS Hawaii (both Honolulu-based) is far greater than the total cable franchise fees provided for PEG operations throughout Maui Nui.

Although it may not be sufficient to ensure balance, operating in the Sunshine with open meetings and records is clearly necessary to ensure that Akaku continues to serve the highest vision for Maui Nui,

with
non-discriminatory open access to local media for all the people.

State regulators and their agents who run cable access have a solemn duty to uphold the basic American principles of liberty and justice for all. This is true not only when their personal interests are served, but even more so when they are called upon to sacrifice personal interests for the founding principles of a free society and the greater good of Hawai'i Nui.

Thank you for being here in the sunshine to consider these thoughts.

Hawaii's accredited education providers conveyed our unified view on Educational Access as part of the DCCA's PEG Access Plan hearings held during the Fall of 2003. Our comments on the current DCCA RFP process echo our shared position as expressed at that time.

Educational institutions on all islands have played fundamental roles in the development of access programming throughout the State. Since 1999, the University of Hawaii (UH), the Hawaii Department of Education (HDOE) and Hawaii Association of Independent Schools (HAIS) have worked together to build and leverage the Educational ("E") aspect of Public, Education and Government (PEG) services provided for the people of all islands. These three organizations encompass all public and private education in the State of Hawaii.

Accredited education proudly points to our successes in serving the community through cable television. On Maui alone the MCC and Maui DOE have provided more than hours of educational programming on the two cable channels available to us. This includes a diversity of programming ranging from credit courses for students to teacher education to consumer education for seniors to informational programming for the community. And all this programming is made available to all islands using Education's interisland transmission systems.

The partners in accredited education throughout the State ask that DCCA take this opportunity to ensure a continued setaside of channel capacity for educational access and a continued setaside of financial resources to support the provision of educational services to our citizenry on all islands.

Through years of difficult and painful experience we know the tensions that can be unleashed as passionate advocates for Public ("P") access promote the allocation of resources for the P portion of PEG. Our mission as educators is to provide educational services to the people of Hawaii. We have demonstrated our commitment and success since the beginnings of cable access in Hawaii, and we ask that DCCA implement a

setaside to ensure that we can continue to do so. This setaside should ensure:

- 1) The continued assignment of Channel 55 and 56 as dedicated statewide channels for educational access programming from Hawaii's accredited educational institutions. This must also include high-quality transmission capability from educational origination facilities into the cable networks.
- 2) The continued allocation to accredited education of a fixed portion of the cable franchise fees allocated for PEG to fairly support the "E" component of PEG. At a minimum, this should be at least equal to the E funding levels currently established through previous and painful negotiation.

We firmly believe that Educational Access broadly adds value for the people of Hawaii and that a firm setaside of resources as requested will best ensure the continuation of our statewide services to the people of all islands and a holistic P, E and G program.

Dear Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs,

I think it is legally arguable that the competitive bidding requirement does not apply to public access television because it is not funded by State taxes. But I am not versed in the details.

In any case, competitive bidding belongs to a model of exchanging money for products or services that is not appropriate to an outlet of free speech rights as Akaku is. Rather, a democratic governance model, such as is practiced by the Pacifica Foundation and its affiliates, or KQED public broadcasting, is ideal. A Board of Akaku democratically elected by the subscribers would control policy and management of the station.

A public access television station is not like a road, which is built and the contractor then leaves; it is an institution established to promote the expression of free speech, and as such, cannot be governed by a single competitive bidding screen; the stakeholders require continuing democratic influence on the governance of the station.

I hope that the Department will pursue whatever institutional or legislative changes are necessary to implement a democratically elected board in Hawaii's public access TV stations.

SUBJECT: **Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs hearing on Akaku services and a ruling that requires – for the first time – competitive bidding for public-access TV.**

I extend my mahalo to you and the Department for the public hearings held throughout the State regarding the proposed competitive bid process for public-access TV.

I urge that a permanent exemption from the competitive bid process be granted our community public-access providers so that they will be saved the disruptive penalty and financial inefficiencies that could result should a new operator be awarded the bid contract.

It is important to note that it is not the quality of services provided by the public-access TV entities that is being called into question, rather, it is the enforcement of the law that applies to all State contracts that are not exempt. The fact that the State has not enforced the law for a number of years would argue that the State considered that public-access TV contract ought to be exempt.

Public-access community media resource centers could be negatively impacted by having to adhere to the state procurement law, therefore I request that you do not rush to judgment to meet the deadline of June 30, 2006. I believe that advice ought to be obtained from nationally qualified experts and the staff and management at our public-access centers before moving forward on this complex question.

I hope that the DCCA will decide to make a strong case to convince the State Chief Procurement Officer that its contractual history with the public-access providers has resulted in vibrant resource centers serving the best interests for both the public and the State, therefore granting the exemption is the wisest course of action.

Written Comments of DARREN J. CORRAO, Wailuku, HI

My name is Darren Corrao. I have been a Certified Producer and regular volunteer at Akaku since the Fall of 2005. I am also a regular viewer of its programming. I have taken all the classes provided by Akaku and, through my regular volunteer services, have had the opportunity and pleasure to have numerous technical, production and programming discussions with the Akaku staff.

The quality and quantity of training Akaku provides is exceptional. The quality and broad scope of the staff's technical and creative knowledge is astounding, particularly in a small community such as Maui. The staff is made up of extraordinary people doing an extraordinary job.

I volunteer regularly for Akaku, because I wish to give back to my community -- this wonderful island of Maui, which gives so much to me. What I appreciate the most about Akaku and its staff is their unwavering commitment solely to the best interests of the Maui community. As I see it, Akaku is a non-profit organization with no self-interest on its agenda. It has no interest in censoring or skewing any voice on any issue. Akaku exists solely for the benefit of the community – to provide a medium for all voices and to give the community full access to all available information impacting the community. These five cable stations are all about “public access” – that is Akaku’s sole mission, and it does it very well. I would not volunteer my valuable time if Akaku were not solely committed to the people of Maui.

In getting to know all of the Akaku staff, I have found not one of them to have any political agenda. When it comes to programming and production, they have no bias on any issue. These are very talented and committed people who want to provide the highest broadcast standards and highest quality public access station possible.

To open up the competitive bidding process – particularly to for-profit organizations – would be to threaten the Maui community’s “public access.” It would invite the risk of censorship, potentially leaving the Maui community with less – and/or skewed – information and less of a voice. It would invite personal agendas into the mix, to the detriment of our community.

The State of Hawaii would save no money by requiring a competitive bid process, since the funds for the stations are fixed by formula and provided by Time Warner. Also, given my exposure to Akaku, its facilities, and its staff, I find it inconceivable that any other organization could provide better, more trusted broadcast and production services on the same budget.

I trust and appreciate Akaku, and the people I know on Maui trust and appreciate Akaku. It's a caring member of our community. Please don't put that at risk. Exempt it from the competitive bid process.

- 2) I think station board members should be elected by cable subscribers not appointed.
- 3) At Akaku I see too many shows coming in from the mainland instead of locally produced shows.
- 4) Editing equipment at Akaku is sadly lacking, it does not meet broadcast standards. And the staff is not trained in Final Cut Pro, waveform monitors and vector scopes to bring it up to broadcast standards. Dear Members of The Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs:

Thank you for the opportunity to address The DCCA regarding my concerns for PEG (public, education, and government) television access for the County of Maui.

Akaku Community Television has operated under contract with the Department of Commerce and Community Affairs to provide public access television services to Maui County since 1990. This contract for services has been automatically renewed to Akaku each year since that initial agreement. For the past ten years, Akaku Community Television has provided a consistent, reliable service to Maui County. However, I feel it is in the best interests of our Maui County residents that a formal Request for Proposal be implemented. There are a number of reasons why I feel a formal bid process should commence, however, in the interest of time, I will name just two:

- 1.) An opinion by the states procurement officer has determined that DCCA is violating state procurement laws by awarding annual contract renewals to Akaku without going through a competitive request for proposal process (RFP). Therefore I feel it would be in the public's best interest to open formal bid requests to non-profit, profit, public or private organizations to provide public access television services to Maui County.
- 2.) Following the "Education Agreement" signed between MCC/DOE and Akaku on April 7, 2005, which allocated a percentage of PEG access funds to assist and support the Educational access component of Akaku Community Television, on April 21, 2005, then CEO of Akaku, Mr. Sean McLaughlin, sent this memo to concerned DOE members:

Subject: DOE channel

Aloha!

According to the agreement that Pat Hamamoto signed with Akaku, DOE became completely responsible for one PEG access channel on April 7th. I sent a note to Geriann Hong explaining the services Akaku currently provides, and our offer to continue those services at the rate of \$1,000. per week starting April 7, 2005 until DOE is prepared to operate the channel...

We will plan to discontinue Akaku's free service to DOE on Thursday April 28 (three weeks since the Superintendent signed), unless we are duly authorized by DOE to provide channel transmission services at a reasonable fee.

This action, taken days after the Education Agreement was signed, to begin charging a fee of \$1,000 per week to DOE for a link between Akaku facilities and Time Warner

Studios “head-end” was, in my opinion, a clear violation of contract agreements to provide educational access programming via Akaku and the PEG network. This action, taken by Mr. McLaughlin, was not in the public’s best interest. MCC, in partnership with DOE, now provides the necessary link required to allow DOE programming to air on Cable 56. MCC does not charge a fee to DOE for this necessary link.

Again, in the interest of time, these are just two reasons why I believe it is in the public’s best interest for The DCCA to begin a formal RFP Proposal to provide public access television services to Maui County. If you would like to discuss this matter further, please feel free to contact me anytime.

Thank you for the opportunity to speak this afternoon.

"Empowering the Community to Serve Itself" -- Maui Media Lab Charter

Aloha,

My name is Sam Epstein. I am Executive Director of the Maui Media Lab. Thank you for this opportunity to address the commission. As you are aware, this is a tumultuous time in broadcasting. Issues abound with regard to open access, must carry, won't carry, competition, regulation, coalescence, Cable, DSL, satellite, wireless, telecommunications services, information services, broadcast flag, ad nauseum...It becomes clear that these are not at all just abstractions to be discussed at a national level.

I think it is important to recognize that many of the contentious issues that public access television systems find themselves facing are based on preconceived arbitrary constraints, inherited from previous generations of rule makers who attempted to set reasonable rules for sharing a scarce community resource, licensed television channels.

At the same time it is important to recognize the efforts of those individuals that have devoted their time and energy into building the public access stations around our country that attempt to address the diverse requirements of their constituent communities, often with limited resources.

I would like to invite all members of the public access community to move the discussion of the future of public access television here on Maui, into, well, the future. Digital Television and Digital Radio Netcasting technology provide the means for much more local access programming to be made available to many more members of the community including customers of dial up, DSL, satellite, wireless network operators.

National broadcasters and syndicators are now recognizing the opportunities posed by new digital media technologies including, direct downloading of video, podcasts, vodcasts, netcasting and more. With more and more people turning off the television, and turning to their computer for audio and video content, new opportunities abound for providing diverse local access programming that truly can begin to address the individual needs of individuals, as well as groups within the community that have divergent or even opposing perspectives.

On behalf of the Maui Media Lab, I would like to:

- . Encourage the commission to adhere to the RFP process
- . Encourage the commission to ensure that all services provided by all Public, Education and Government access centers across the state be procured through a competitive bid process.
- . Maui Media Lab Foundation would like the opportunity to compete, vigorously, within the guidelines set up by the RFP process.
- . Maui Media Lab has a solid record within the County of Maui, as does its parent organization, SenseMedia Netcasting, in the State of Hawai'i, providing electronic media arts & science, product, curriculum and professional development, as well as professional production, post-production, computer and network related technical services.
- . Maui Media Lab has helped to fill a void over the last several years, providing audio and video production and post-production, training and

professional development services to individual and groups of community members, as well as Department of Education Teachers, Instructors and their students, including helping to construct the video editing studio and radio station at Hana School.

. Maui Media Lab operates a 2000 square foot facility occupying the back of the old Ikeda Department Store in Paia, Town, equipped with access to Oceanic Cable, DISH Satellite Downlink, high speed, dedicated DSL Internet and includes full digital media netcasting capabilities, 4 studios, including a 1000 square foot HDTV production studio; a professional high definition, multi-track audio recording studio; 3 HDTV and Multi-track audio edit bays, a blue room, and two classrooms. Maui Media Lab staff and Instructors are some of Maui's most accomplished Musicians and artists in their own right as well as enthusiastic mentors from within our own community.

. Digital Media and Broadcasting technology have undergone fundamental shifts since the inception of public access television on Maui. Reviewing the current

level of service availability, and incorporating what works well, with what now works better, provides the opportunity to lower cost, while simultaneously improving the quality of service provided to the community.

. The requirements and scope of services both for the community and from within the community are well defined with regard to the RFP process. Maui Media Lab believes that there are opportunities to enhance the availability of non-discriminatory PEG access to community communications media enabled by the availability of new technology within the community.

. PEG Access services are most certainly uniquely local in character for each island community. In the case of Maui, each neighborhood has its unique requirements, Molokai, Lanai, Upcountry, East Maui, West Side, South Side, Kahului, Wailuku,... For this reason, training, production and post-production facilities should be made available in each local neighborhood and in local schools.

. It is the opinion of the Maui Media Lab that the RFP process is in the best interest of the community, by providing the community with the opportunity to select providers of services based on objective cost/value analysis from as many different options available within the community.

. An RFP awarded contract would ensure that access to new technology is made available to meet the needs of the community. Advances in digital media communications and broadcasting technologies provide opportunity for both considerable cost savings along with a substantial improvement in the quality, availability and diversity of applications available to the community.

When is a Fee a Tax?

Cable Franchise fees are a direct result of the negotiated agreement that grants the licensee the right to operate a government franchised monopoly within the jurisdiction at hand. Community members that wish to access cable television services are compelled to patronize the single cable access provider as mandated by the government and are therefore mandated to pay the Cable Franchise Fee, which given the government mandate could be at least arguably described as the Cable Franchise Tax.

In any case, whether or not the RFP process is appropriate for procuring local access television services is certainly a discussion worth having in the context of considering the best interests of the community. It seems that if this tax was a fee, then either the independent public access entity is either being operated by the franchisee, in contradiction to the concept of being run by the public, or that the public access entity would be compelled to accept large annual donations predominantly from the local monopoly cable franchisee, in order just to operate. A seemingly clear conflict of interest for an independent public access television organization.

Lastly, I would like to request that the commission consider recent FCC filings by the local DSL provider, successfully reclassifying their service as an information service as opposed to a telecommunications service, predominately to seek regulatory parity with Cable Access Providers in local jurisdictions.

In the spirit of this filing, not to mention local harmonization, we would like the Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs to consider that all other local information service providers, as well as the local cable access provider, be compelled to reserve dedicated public access bandwidth and be equally subject to the Franchise Tax in support of comprehensive access to community communications media.

The local issues currently facing Maui's citizens may be some of the most daunting in the thousands of years our little island has been inhabited; sustainability, the availability of clean, drinkable water, development, over development, not enough development, responsible development, the school system, drug addiction, institutional corruption, economic opportunity....

The true clear and present danger to the security of our island would be not having the forum of public access television to both illuminate, and reflect, upon, well, ourselves.

I would like to thank the commission and everyone else participating in this important process for taking the time to consider my comments.

Re: PEG Funding Exemption Testimony

I am submitting this written testimony in regards to the recent request for community feedback to determine whether PEG funding is to be an open RFP process and should there be exceptions to this action.

To give a simple yes or no response to this matter is to not fully understand what you are asking. My perspective stems from being an Akaku: Community Television producer and a Media Literacy program director and service provider for the Hui Malama Learning Center. While I do not speak on behalf of my employer it is important to note that our programs serve as a safety net of educational services for not only the youth on Maui from whom the traditional school system cannot serve but also adults challenged with literacy and immigrants seeking to improve their the use of the English language.

My formal training and education are in the fields of film production, radio broadcasting and public health. When I moved to Maui years ago after residing in cities such as New York, Chicago, Dallas and Portland I found myself thoroughly impressed with the community cable access services provided by Akaku and other Hawaii cable access stations. I was introduced to these by my auntie who is a health educator for Maui Community College and who appears regularly on the distance learning channel.

For the last 2 years I have taken every certification program offered by Akaku, worked closely with every member of their staff and contracted their expertise on numerous occasions. With Akaku as an educational partner during this last school year we offered our students at Hui Malama, who are outside the DOE and thus ineligible to take DOE offered media classes, the opportunity to become certified cable access producers. We held classes at four different service sites on Maui in Makawao, Kihei, Kahului and Wailuku.

Akaku provided all of the critical technical assistance and key program facilitation for us to certify 30 youth between the ages of 11-17. To say that the coordination and facilitation of these classes was demanding would be a grave understatement. Akaku staff, most especially their Education

Coordinator, consistently delivered professional services above and beyond the scope of our contractual agreement. It was astoundingly clear that Akaku as an agency has a passion for sharing their resources and equipping their students with the best they have to offer.

The success of this partnership was recently shared in a free community event held at the Maui Arts & Cultural Center where 40 youth produced video shorts and Public Service Announcements were showcased to hundreds of peoples.

As a business professional, educator and public health community activist I rely on the services Akaku provides me to do my work and in so doing train others. It is a most affordable and rewarding experience to have them as my instructors, technical support and collaborators. I cannot praise them highly enough.

That said, you might expect me to shout out a reverberating "Exemption!" in support of Akaku in the PEG funding RFP process, far from it. I would instead recommend to you a completely difference scenario altogether.

I understand RFP processes all too well as I manage several private foundation and state funded grants myself totaling 100s of thousands of dollars. While the RFP process in regards to PEG funding might provide distinct benefits I believe by its' mere administration the costs involved it will drain vital funding away from the services it was meant to support. Additionally the RFP process would make PEG funding vulnerable to government and corporate interests thus undermining the community powerbase it was created to strengthen.

Instead I believe the existing PEG funding allocation should continue in similar way but with some distinct differences to stave off RFP administrative costs and reduce the risk of having the resources plundered by private interests. My suggestions are as follows:

- **Strengthen support in the communities these funds were meant to serve.** Each county can create their own PEG funding Community Television Oversight Committee (CTOC) comprised of the people who actually use and receive the services provided. For instance on Maui this would be Akaku certified producers and students from MCC and the DOE. Each service provider, through their own democratic process, can provide for their representation.

- **Fund providers according to deliverable services.** Rather than a predetermined percentage split of PEG funding to all service providers, such as in Maui's case the 33% between MCC, DOE and Akaku, instead base the percentages on actually numbers served in the previous year(s) and potential numbers to be served for projected years. These numbers can be determined and verified by ongoing reports to and sites visits by the CTOC.
- **Plan for the future.** Develop a 5-year statewide strategic plan with all of the county CTOCs utilizing a consulting firm with expertise in PEG funding. Make drafts available for input and feedback by the I communities served.

I do not believe that private corporations, school and non-profit boards or CEOs of any kind should be making these decisions. Our students and our community participants have the aptitude and clarity needed in these matters that so closely affect their lives.

I make these suggestions as an alternative to what I have read is being considered. I am concerned with the entire notion of exemptions as I fear this act will create resentment within the communities and destabilize partnerships by PEG funded service providers. I believe through supportive cooperation and collaboration we will be much more likely to actualize this vital community resource.

The government on the other hand has worked in conjunction and harmony for most of Akaku history, but still by splitting the moneys straight to them, limits the access to equipment and training also limiting individuals ability to make and air shows.

Akaku is already a P.E.G. and anyone and everyone is already welcome to come and participate in television production and distribution.

In closing I would like to see the FCC come in and clarify the very definition,
the original architectural ideas and intents for which access television was originally created.

The U.S. Supreme Court landmark decision in 1925 ruled in *Gitlow v. New York*:


"... that the First Amendment prohibition against government abridgment of the freedom of speech applied to the states as well as to the federal government."

If the DCCA acts against these freedoms, they may be subject to class action law suits for violations of human rights and disregard for the 1st and 14th Amendments to the Constitution of the United States.

I urge you to leave public access stations alone. Say "No" to competitive bidding for public access T.V.

Aloha kakou.

I'm Buck Joiner, Here to Help. That is my lifetime mission statement and is printed on my business card, checks, and philanthropic efforts such as Newspapers in Education. I dedicate my energies and resources to making Maui, Hawaii and the world, a better place and have done so for the past 23 years on Maui. My efforts are broad ranging from small children to the elderly, medical, educational environmental and social issues. My efforts over the decades have resulted in an embarrassing amount of recognition and awards, including five outstanding volunteer awards from various state governors.

I am a fanatical supporter of community TV and consider its establishment by the FCC as being one of the most brilliant actions by the federal government. I produced more than 200 programs on Akaku in ten years, primarily on social problems with many of the programs distributed state wide. The purpose of my programs was to inform and motivate the public into facilitating solutions to social and environmental problems.

Producing these 200 programs at Akaku cost me a significant amount of money and incomprehensible amount of time. I had a tremendous number of dedicated viewers and a loyal crew of 10 with several on a waiting list. Some of my crew actually took time off from their regular jobs in order to volunteer on my program. All this dedication was acknowledged when we won recognition in a national contest. That is all background.

We are now at a decision point on community access, particularly with respect to the Public access part of community TV. The question today is NOT whether public access TV should continue in Maui County. That is guaranteed. The question is WHO should provide that service.

I would like to speak in very strong support of opening the process to the possibility of some other entity providing public access TV in Maui County. I don't know if there is a competing entity but I welcome them. Under the leadership of ~~Sean McLaughlin~~, Akaku has become an organization with extreme abuse of power and has metastasized into chronic malignant corruption.

Free speech at Akaku is a myth. It is a privilege reserved for supporters of ~~Sean McLaughlin~~ whom I shall refer to as McLaughlinites. As we have seen over and over, anybody who does not agree with the McLaughlinites at Akaku is eliminated, whether it is employees, volunteers or board members.

When the PEG community ~~Access~~ TV was set up on Maui, Akaku was put in charge of the distribution of PEG funds. Initially this worked just fine. However, about 6 years ago the McLaughlinites, the P part of PEG, started taking funds from the E and G. At that time, there was ONE board member representing the Educational sector. All the others represented the P portion. There is not now, nor has there ever been, a member of the Board representing the Government sector. But what about Myles Inokuma under Apana and Danny Agsalog under Arakawa and Benita Brazier? Those were indeed government employees but they did NOT represent the Government. They

represented their own interest, just as Swami Nikhilananda is or was a substitute teacher in the public schools but he most certainly does not represent the Educational sector. However, the one educational representative was eliminated from the Akaku Board.

About six years ago, the McLaughinites started eliminating funding to the Educational and government sectors of the PEG partnership. In 2000 Akaku received \$34,700 from the County in addition to the G funding from cable funds. This year 2006 the amount in the county budget is \$232,000.

Akaku retained the E and G funding for itself. What happened to those funds? Akaku bought a shopping center. Akaku has now become a significant holder of commercial real estate and this represents the vast majority of its assets. Where in the guidelines set out by the FCC or in the charter for Akaku does it grant permission or direction for a public access TV non-profit to become a commercial real estate investor and management company? This is a gross violation of the mission of Akaku.

Today, recognizing all the gross violations, abuse of power and corruption by Akaku, I am filing a formal complaint with the DCCA against the Akaku Board of Directors for malfeasance, misappropriation of funds, deviation from mission, abuse of power and possible illegal activity.


One of the central issues in this complaint is that the Board of Directors has refused to address grievances and complaints brought to the board by employees and volunteers and that individuals who brought significant complaints or grievances were eliminated from Akaku. I believe most of the people here and in the TV audience are aware of my letter in the Feb. 14 Maui News. I made a challenge of a \$1000 donation to the charity of choice for any president of the Akaku Board of Directors who can prove that the Akaku Board investigated a single grievance or complaint by an employee or volunteer against McLaughlin's abuse of power, and that the whistleblower was not eliminated from Akaku one way or another.

It is my greatest wish that Public Access TV be in Maui County but that it is operated with integrity, and fairness to all, including the cable customers, all members of the PEG sections, to the paid staff, and absolutely, to the volunteers.

Every morning I thank God for being granted the privilege of being born an American citizen and to be allowed the incredible pleasure of living in paradise. Premier among the rights of living in the United States is the freedom of speech. Akaku did not invent the first amendment to the constitution. And in actuality, that freedom of speech is limited to the supporters of the McLaughlinite philosophy at Akaku. The opportunity for other groups to be the provider of Public access TV in Maui County is an idea I strongly support and I will evaluate the contenders at the appropriate time.

I respectfully request the DCCA to act expeditiously on my formal complaint and to insure public television access on Maui.

I am writing in support of Akaku's right to remain an unlimited public access, commercial-free medium.

Media have fallen under increasing corporate consolidation in recent years. In our isolated island environment, local media hold an exceptional amount of influence; public access to Akaku's channels ensures our population a unique and powerful opportunity to have its voice heard in an environment free of sponsorship and censorship. Akaku has handled its role effectively and with integrity, and should be commended for its drive to provide media access to Maui's general public-as a public entity.

I completed the station's studio-production course last month, and was impressed with the knowledge and desire to educate exhibited by Akaku's staff. With the producer certification I gained from taking the course, I am now allowed to make my own television show-whether I want to engage in political debate, play the guitar, or make a surfing documentary. I worry that opening public access television to competitive bidding could potentially stifle my-or anyone else's-right to communicate my ideas with Maui's television-viewing public.

Privatization of a formerly public medium is an alarming and damaging prospect that is occurring too much today. Private media have their forum: networks and cable stations, where companies are free to use the airwaves for advertising and other, more indirect public influence (using the threat of pulling sponsorships to effectively blackmail stations into censoring programming, for example); corporate America has enough existing sway over citizens' freedom to attain information. Allowing public-access television to be swept up by the highest bidder is a daunting prospect, and is destructive to Mauians' already-crumbling capacity to obtain information without the taint of commercial pressure. Thank you for allowing me to contribute to this extremely important public hearing.

Please exempt Akaku from the requirement that PEG access services be procured through competitive bid.

Getting our State government so deeply involved in a small Maui county dispute between the very small group of 13 board members at Akaku is a poor expenditure of the states time, money and resources. This dispute is around financing and power. What is most disturbing is that Akaku's mission of unedited and uncensored community access may be compromised and even possibly lost forever in this legislative process.

It is imperative to keep public access PUBLIC and to keep our constitutional rights and freedoms FREE!!! By getting the State government so deeply involved in our County public access programs, I feel there will be a lot of censorship, control and manipulation by the government and the big businesses that will be bidding for the access services. This will not serve the community and will do more harm than good.

I am not one who creates the video programs to be viewed on Akaku, so am unable to speak of or know the quality of their service to the people who make videos for the air.

I am a viewer of the Akaku stations and I do appreciate all the programming - educational, government meetings that I cannot attend personally, and the videos created by private citizens about their views, ways of life, or concerns for the environment et all. The guidelines that Akaku has in place seem to be good to me. I never see anything that I would consider to be amoral or x-rated.

I very much enjoy the videos made by the private citizens, including the ones that I may disagree with. I like to know ALL opinions and views of islanders that are out there. I also like to know there is a venue for expression for people who are passionate enough about a perhaps unpopular view to create a video. If someone cannot be heard at this level, they may take a more unpopular violent level of communication until they are heard. This public programming, *the way it is now*, helps to create peace and goodwill in our community.

I am very disappointed in our State government officials for allowing themselves to get caught up and involved with what was originally a financial and power dispute between a very small group of board members of a County public access station. Unfortunately the governments involvement and new course of legislative action that is

being proposed has the potential to undermine the main mission of Akaku to provide free access, uncensored and unedited communication to the entire community of Maui, not just special interest groups. I hope the State government will take a hard and honest look, and see this for what it is and see that the majority of the community does not want the changes that are being proposed to go through a competitive bid process - especially to For Profit business.

What requirements should be included in the proposal???

First choice - Exempt Akaku from the requirement that services be procured through competitive bid. Period. Leave Akaku alone. Leave it the way it is. The MAJORITY of the community is happy with Akaku!!!!


Second choice - If you go ahead and go against the public's wishes....

I am submitting this written testimony in regards to the recent request for community feedback to determine whether PEG funding is to be an open RFP process and should there be exceptions to this action.

To give a simple yes or no response to this matter is to not fully understand what you are asking. My perspective stems from being an Akaku: Community Television producer and a Media Literacy program director and service provider for the Hui Malama Learning Center. While I do not speak on behalf of my employer it is important to note that our programs serve as a safety net of educational services for not only the youth on Maui from whom the traditional school system cannot serve but also adults challenged with literacy and immigrants seeking to improve their the use of the English language.

My formal training and education are in the fields of film production, radio broadcasting and public health. When I moved to Maui years ago after residing in cities such as New York, Chicago, Dallas and Portland I found myself thoroughly impressed with the community cable access services provided by Akaku and other Hawaii cable access stations. I was introduced to these by my auntie who is a health educator for Maui Community College and who appears regularly on the distance learning channel.

For the last 2 years I have taken every certification program offered by Akaku, worked closely with every member of their staff and contracted their expertise on numerous occasions. With Akaku as an educational partner during this last school year we offered our students at Hui Malama, who are outside the DOE and thus ineligible to take DOE offered media classes, the opportunity to become certified cable access producers. We held classes at four different service sites on Maui in Makawao, Kihei, Kahului and Wailuku.

Akaku provided all of the critical technical assistance and key program facilitation for us to certify 30 youth between the ages of 11-17. To say that the coordination and facilitation of these classes was demanding would be a grave understatement. Akaku staff, most especially their Education

Coordinator, consistently delivered professional services above and beyond the scope of our contractual agreement. It was astoundingly clear that Akaku as an agency has a passion for sharing their resources and equipping their students with the best they have to offer.

The success of this partnership was recently shared in a free community event held at the Maui Arts & Cultural Center where 40 youth produced video shorts and Public Service Announcements were showcased to hundreds of peoples.

As a business professional, educator and public health community activist I rely on the services Akaku provides me to do my work and in so doing train others. It is a most affordable and rewarding experience to have them as my instructors, technical support and collaborators. I cannot praise them highly enough.

That said, you might expect me to shout out a reverberating "Exemption!" in support of Akaku in the PEG funding RFP process, far from it. I would instead recommend to you a completely difference scenario altogether.

I understand RFP processes all too well as I manage several private foundation and state funded grants myself totaling 100s of thousands of dollars. While the RFP process in regards to PEG funding might provide distinct benefits I believe by its' mere administration the costs involved it will drain vital funding away from the services it was meant to support. Additionally the RFP process would make PEG funding vulnerable to government and corporate interests thus undermining the community powerbase it was created to strengthen.

Instead I believe the existing PEG funding allocation should continue in similar way but with some distinct differences to stave off RFP administrative costs and reduce the risk of having the resources plundered by private interests. My suggestions are as follows:

- **Strengthen support in the communities these funds were meant to serve.** Each county can create their own PEG funding Community Television Oversight Committee (CTOC) comprised of the people who actually use and receive the services provided. For instance on Maui this would be Akaku certified producers and students from MCC and the DOE. Each service provider, through their own democratic process, can provide for their representation.

- **Fund providers according to deliverable services.** Rather than a predetermined percentage split of PEG funding to all service providers, such as in Maui's case the 33% between MCC, DOE and Akaku, instead base the percentages on actually numbers served in the previous year(s) and potential numbers to be served for projected years. These numbers can be determined and verified by ongoing reports to and sites visits by the CTOC.
- **Plan for the future.** Develop a 5-year statewide strategic plan with all of the county CTOCs utilizing a consulting firm with expertise in PEG funding. Make drafts available for input and feedback by the I communities served.

I do not believe that private corporations, school and non-profit boards or CEOs of any kind should be making these decisions. Our students and our community participants have the aptitude and clarity needed in these matters that so closely affect their lives.

I make these suggestions as an alternative to what I have read is being considered. I am concerned with the entire notion of exemptions as I fear this act will create resentment within the communities and destabilize partnerships by PEG funded service providers. I believe through supportive cooperation and collaboration we will be much more likely to actualize this vital community resource.

The services provided to government have been invaluable as an educational tool and also in helping to permit transparency in the entire process.

The monies that AKAKU receives are utilized in the most efficient manner and without the volunteer work that is provided by those who care about our community, we would lose our connection to the public.

To put the community access contracts out to bid would not only be a disservice to AKAKU but would be a hardship on the public that is so well served by them.

The PEG monies are critical to allowing an alternative to those who can afford college courses and also have the time to attend such courses at the hours offered. While AKAKU has classes that are subject to a schedule, their entire operation is geared to fit around the community rather than having the community fit their schedules around their services.

I cannot imagine a more important or unique service within Maui County and as an elected official, to even have this come up for discussion shows a complete lack of understanding of the subject of self-determination/direction.

As a separate and unique community, we do not wish to be governed by Oahucentric thinking and despite the opinion received, it is just that - an opinion and until a legal challenge in the courts determines otherwise, it is inappropriate to disrespect the wishes of the community which is most impacted by a decision that is not demanded by our citizenry or even welcomed.

I view this action as one that is most difficult to comprehend when the theme of most state actions has been centered upon home rule. Let the people of Maui decide what is best for us and let things sort themselves out.

Also, it is inappropriate to have members who have a clear conflict of interest to vote

on issues which do not support the mission and goals of AKAKU. To have anyone who potentially will be impacted in funding through a competitive process and who has a duty and obligation to protect their own institution's best interests is in clear conflict when an oath is taken. While they may serve as an advisory body in cooperation with AKAKU it is not proper to have them voting on measures.

exposure to Akaku, its facilities, and its staff, I find it inconceivable that any other organization could provide better, more trusted broadcast and production services on the same budget.

I trust and appreciate Akaku, and the people I know on Maui trust and appreciate Akaku. It's a caring member of our community. Please don't put that at risk. Exempt it from the competitive bid process.

Comments: It would be highly beneficial to Cable Access in the state of Hawaii to have the requirements for the operations of the cable access provider organisations to based on Federal and Hawaiian State law rather than have such requirements dictated by extra-legal and extra-contractual means. Recent pressure on Akaku to disburse funds to Hawaiian State agencies have no basis or standing either in the law or language in the contract for services between Akaku and the State of Hawaii. In the words of the Legislative Reference Bureau of the State of Hawaii, the role of the access organisation is as follows:

" The connection between the State and the access organizations is contractual. After each access organization was created, it entered into a contract with the State to:

- (1) Manage the PEG channels;
- (2) Provide facilities and equipment for the production of PEG programming;
- (3) Train governmental, educational, and community organizations and the general public to use the facilities and equipment;
- (4) Market and promote the organization and the channels; and
- (5) Provide support services to the users of the channel(13) in exchange for the access fees and equipment and facilities funds paid by the cable companies in the respective counties (the "access fees" are apparently the access organizations' share of the franchise fees).

The State's part of the connection is its ability to appoint a majority of all board members by the Director of DCCA."

The research performed by the State's LRB does not indicate that the access organisations should have any authority or duty to disburse funds to Agencies of the State of Hawaii, merely, that the access organisation should provide facilities, training, and support for the use of those facilities, period.

It is hoped that when the DCCA undergoes a proper Request For Proposal authoring procedure, that the resulting RFP document would properly define the role of the access organisations as provided for in Federal and Hawaiian State Law, as well as proper adherence to the contractual obligations required by the agreements of service with the State of Hawaii.

Comments: You might want to change your last question, or at least offer a clear explanation. I don't know how to respond to the last question because I don't clearly understand how my answer might impact Akaku. But I do know this: as someone who has volunteered in the political arena, and worked on several community and non-profit fundraisers and events, I know first hand that Akaku plays a critical role in reaching out to the community. During election season everyone I know spends a good deal of time watching Akaku so they can get to know the various candidates and issues. Because all candidates have equal time to address their issues, everyone is on a level playing field. In this way the public has a greater opportunity to become educated and informed and to participate in the democratic process.

Akaku gives voice to people who may otherwise not have a voice in their community. Those voices are amazingly diverse; they range from informative, to entertaining, to boring, to whacky. I don't always enjoy the Akaku programs, but I am delighted that the diversity of programming is there. It would not bode well for our community or society if those voices and viewpoints were silenced.

Over the years I have learned a great deal from programs I've seen on Akaku. When I think of all the county council hearings, the interviews, the instructional shows, the talent showcases--it's amazing to think of the wealth of information that has come through that little tv station in Kahului.

I can't imagine life without Akaku, and I can't imagine what a financially hobbled Akaku might look like. Our tv station is a subtle, but powerful and effective cornerstone in our

community. It is open to anyone who has something to say. It is the only venue that I can think of where all cultures, all colors, all creeds, all ages, all persuasions--all, everyone--anyone and everyone can pass through those doors in Kahului and, if they're willing to do a bit of work and organize their message, they can put their message out to the community. Think of it--where else does that happen on Maui, or in Maui County? Where else do you find the entire, diverse cultural range that represents our island population, coming together under the auspices of a single community resource? Just sitting here and writing in the moment, I cannot think of another public resource that is actually utilized by all cultural, political, religious, and non-profit groups. Whether we like it or not, we have to admit that there is a kind of racism that exists in our islands, and that racism is effected not so much by skin color as by economic status and cultural differences. Akaku has!

been perhaps the most democratic community resource I can think of, as is evidenced by the diversity of programming that is presented to the public.

The fact is, Akaku plays an increasingly vital role in our community. As our island continues to develop and grow, our local communities are pushed more and more to the fringes of our economic society. Look at the problems we're having with housing, traffic, water, and ocean resource management. These problems are huge and they need to be addressed in the public forum. These problems need educated and informed citizens to go to the polls and vote in every election. These problems need to be examined from multiple perspectives, our community needs to hear from every voice, every corner. I believe Hawaii already has the lowest voter turnout in the country, and Maui the lowest in the state. This is a profoundly troubling situation. More and more people are feeling disenfranchised and dissociated from civic and governmental processes. Akaku serves a vital role in our community by bringing people back into those processes--and it brings them in more effectively than any other organization that I can think of.

To our elected or appointed officials, those who find themselves in a decision-making capacity in regard to our Akaku, our community voice, I hope that each of you will center yourself in wisdom as you consider the broad implications of any decisions you make. Please recognize that this rather non-descript little tv station in Kahului is one of Maui County's most important treasures, that it is actually accomplishing what many government and community agencies attempt to do--it is giving voice to all of Maui's people--big, small, rich, poor, old, young--whatever--Akaku serves us all. Please do not hurt one of the few agencies in our community, and perhaps the only agency, that is truly democratic. Please recognize that our entire Maui Nui community needs Akaku.

Below you will find the transcription of the testimony of Council member Michelle Anderson. Mr. Sonobe stated that transcriptions would be taken as written testimony if someone was willing to do it, and I was. This is the first of several testimonies. Please forward each of them to Mr. Sonobe, as I do not have his email address.

Councilmember Michelle Anderson speaking on her own behalf

I would like to mention that the staff of AKAKU are setting up out at the water resource meeting right now, so those of you that are missing that to be here will be able to see it at a later time.

I think this is a really really important issue so I made it a point to come here. The service that we have received from AKAKU since 1990 has been exemplary. They have built an organization that is envied nationwide. And anything that would threaten that organization and the investment in the public's cable access fees I see as a direct threat to public access on Maui and to free speech on Maui. (applause)

Why is AKAKU so important to us? We are small islands and a small county and we have only one daily paper with which to get the news of the day, and print media is many times written with some bias by the reporter. So you don't necessarily get the whole truth and all the facts connected with any event and any issue in the print media. They are constrained by daily deadlines, space, whatever it might be and also they may be constrained by any personal bias that the reporter might have. And that's why it's so important that we continue have our services continued by AKAKU, to our community because it gives the community the right to see what's actually happening in their community and within their government. Because by

sitting at home and watching AKAKU they are able to participate in their government and see exactly what's going on without any bias being applied to the outcome of whatever decision making may be going on. This is the people's business and they have a right to a front row seat to what is going on in their county government And AKAKU provides this, and they provide that in an exemplary way. I think if you open this up to any kind of a bid process you are exposing AKAKU to the possibility of losing what they have built over the last 15 years. We need to protect this investment. This is an invaluable service for everybody in the county and any threat to this service is really unacceptable. (Applause) This organization has displayed their ability to provide the service to the community time and time again. Prior to becoming a council member I was an aide to a council member so I have been intimately involved in what AKAKU has been able to provide for the county for the last 8 years and they have always stepped up to the plate. Any time there has been a problem they have always solved it immediately and saw to it that it never happened again. So I believe that you have in HRS 103(d)-102 provides you with exemptions to the bid process and I believe that AKAKU fits within these exemptions and I would plead with you to exempt them from the open bid process and protect the investment that the community has put in to AKAKU all these years. Thank you very much.

Regardless of what we say in this hearing, all the public access stations in this state are fighting for their lives. It's a life or death situation. Now somebody there at the DCCA must play a lot of fantasy football. I looked at this little handout that you've given and you implied in the first paragraph of this handout that this hearing has nothing to do with the performances of any of these stations. I think it has everything to do with the performance of these stations. I think you guys are playing fantasy football. Number one, I was in the first graduating class of AKAKU, I think I it was '92 or '93, I even helped paint the walls for the station, and in all these years I've never seen a Public Access station anywhere that is so dedicated and does such a good job. Now you say here in your handout that the AG's office has asked you to look in to the procurement procedures of your office, I think that you're the ones that should be investigated. I think the AG should be looking in to the way the DCCA acts, not the way Public Television acts. I think that you're the ones that should be investigated. I think that we should find out and possibly we should ask for the federal AG's office to investigate the state AG's office because there's a lot of politics behind this because the real economic terrorists not only on this island, but in the whole state, are the developers and the people that gave the politicians too much money. (applause) Now should the Public Access stations be subjected to the competitive bidding process? The answer is NO, NO, NO. I believe that the first and the fourteenth amendments protect the public access stations. I also believe that the bill of rights extends this to the state of Hawaii. The U.S. Supreme court landmark decision in 1925 said that the first amendment prohibits government infringement of freedom of speech applied to the states as well as the

federal government. That's when the southern states were claiming states rights and that they had a right to go around the Bill of Rights. This decision was the first of a number of rulings holding that the 14th amendment extended the guarantees of the bill of rights to state action. If the DCCA acts against these freedoms they may be subject to class action lawsuits for violation of human rights and disregard of the first and fourteenth amendments to the constitution of the United States. I urge you to leave Public Access stations alone. Say no to competitive bidding to public TV access.

I am a self employed fibre-artist paper maker woodworker for a living and an amateur videographer for AKAKU. I'm a certified producer for AKAKU. I have five shows currently airing on AKAKU. I brought my file up here for dramatic effect. These are all the articles that have been written in the Maui News and other newspapers across the state and this baggy is all the letters to the editor that have been written. There's about 60 Letters to the Editor in there, most of them in support of AKAKU. The reasons for this meeting and others like it across the state, and the events that led to these meetings are very confusing. On the DCCA CATV website you post two job descriptions. The first says CATV issues franchises to cable companies, monitors quality of service, regulates basic service rates and handles complaints about cable TV matters. The second description after you click on the website is a much longer and more elaborate version of the first, but oddly enough neither description says anything about regulating Public Access TV stations.

Over on the side of your site there are two ~~go to~~ centers, one called PEG access centers and another called PEG plan. The PEG Access site has responses from all the Public Access stations from July 2005, which is the P in PEG and to the Marina and Company third party review but conspicuous in its absence are the responses from E & G, the Education and Government entities of the PEG. Why is it that only the Public part of the PEG part has to account for their administration of cable franchise funds and not the Education and the Government Entities? The PEG plan ~~to go~~ on your websites last posting is a July 2004 amendment of the final PEG plan of January 2004. According to your website nothing has happened with DCCA CATV since July of 2005. No rulings, no letters, no hearings, nothing for the past 8 months. Thousands

of community access TV Board members, employees, producers students and other concerned citizens across the state know different. Other than the AG's ruling and subsequent state procurement office concurrence with the ruling, the DCCA and CATV doesn't seem to have a clue as to why they are holding the hearings like the one here today and the one on Molokai tomorrow and what they are going to do with their testimony. Neither the AG, the State Procurement Office, the DCCA nor the CATV officials seem to have a handle on what it is they can and cannot do in regards to community access television. So you're now coming around to the community to ask us what we think you guys should be doing. Last Sundays' paper Honolulu Advertiser, ~~Lingle aides bypass procurement process~~.

So Linda Lingle can bypass the procurement process. If I can read a little bit from this article. ~~Lingle administration officials may have violated state procurement laws last year when they selected a Honolulu non-profit organization to handle finances for the Governor's trade mission to China and Korea.~~ Procurement laws are meant to insure the state gets the best value for it's money and that potential state suppliers are treated fairly. Ted Lu, the Director of the dept of business and economic development, said the state was not obligated to follow the state's usual procurement policies. ~~That doesn't pass the smell test says Sen. Sam Slom. If people are going to believe in the procurement process then everybody has got to do the same thing and everybody has to be above board. And I don't think that's happening with the procurement process. It seems to me that since 1997 and especially in the past 8 months you have been getting quite a bit of input from the general concerned citizenry that you either don't know what to do with or have chosen to disregard.~~ It seems that the DCCA and CATV was either unaware or have been ignoring state rules and regulations governing the oversight of local media access and also are not familiar with the bylaws of each of the independent Community Access Stations. A point of reference AKAKU Bylaws state a that a perspective Board member must be nominated by one of the P, E or G sectors, and a letter then be sent

to the DCCA to review their qualifications for approval. After the DCCA approval, the Board votes Yea or Nay on the prospect. The DCCA circumvented that process with at least two AKAKU Board members in complete disregard for the Bylaws contributing heavily to the discord the Board was experiencing due to an attempted hostile takeover by a special interest faction. The DCCA is guilty of all this and more in spite of numerous attempts by outside producer organizations like the Hawai'i Community Television Producers Association and suggestions by the PEG Access Stations themselves, and this smells of special interest intervention. The state AG's office and the state procurement office ~~accidentally~~ found (and I don't think they accidentally found it, I think it was shown to them) that certain laws have been broken by DCCA and CATV for all these years, then they should fire themselves and be prosecuted for incompetence (applause) and not try to divert attention away from their inability to be knowledgeable of and interpret state rules and regulations by trying to shuck the blame on the stations. That's exactly what the DCCA is doing. What is the DCCA knee jerk reaction to the AG and SPO ruling? Amazingly, you guys didn't take a good hard look in the mirror. Your first official act was to slash funding to the public access stations to a trickle. Like it is somehow their fault that you guys don't know what it is you are supposed to be doing. In the past few months at the hands of the DCCA CATV, AKAKU has been reduced from being a viable and vibrant Non-profit Public Access entity with PEG funding in excess of \$800,000 to a ~~you might not even be here in 4 months~~ ~~Here's token~~ Hundred and twenty five thousand for you guys to slide by on~~s~~, all at the hands of the DCCA. You have in effect penalized AKAKU financially and have put in to question the actions and hampered the ability of AKAKU and other Public Access Stations to function while attempting to breath the poisoned air and atmosphere of ineptitude and incompetence known as the DCCA. You created and have sustained this obstruction of community service for

far too long. What has AKAKU done to deserve this kind of treatment from the DCCA? The very organization assigned to ensure the advancement and continuance of their highly successful Cable Access Program. The DCCA aided and abetted in the firing of CEO Sean McLaughlin by helping special interests to stack the BOARD 7 to 6. At every juncture that the DCCA has authority, and somewhere they didn't DCCA has made a ruling that further hinders the ability of AKAKU to function. The DCCA seems bent on intentionally crippling AKAKU. This stinks of special interest intervention. Taking the track record of the DCCA/CATV for the past few years into consideration, do you honestly think that in four short months you can formulate and implement a solid plan of how and where to disburse the PEG funds, prepare an accrediting criteria for bidders, create a fair bidding formula, and execute to administer a plan of evaluation to be sure that the stations be run efficiently and fairly? Otherwise what's to stop our favorite special interest groups from submitting a low bid and hiring a group of sub-par employees and just running AKAKU or whatever they might call it in to the ground. That is an on the record, stated goal of at least one developer here on Maui. In any case your timeline seems extremely ambitious to me and to many others. If the DCCA in fact decides to put public access out to a competitive bidding process, January 2007 will be a more reasonable deadline. It still remains that one person initiated and perpetuated this hurricane of controversy that has enveloped the community of maui. He used his wealth and political connections as a former UH Regent to introduce to two bills to the State Legislature. Bills HB 784 and SB 959 to launched his campaign to destroy AKAKU. He has committed hundreds if thousand of dollars attempting to pass those bills, flying people to O'ahu to testify, hiring lobbyists, lawyers and consultants. He tried everything in his power to stack the board with his business associates. It is very perplexing how a well-educated, well-connected, and wealthy individual decided tha in order to achieve his goal of high end gated community development on Maui that he was going to have to end the existence of the highly successful little television station AKAKU. Developer Everett Dowling and his cronies have become obsessed with shutting down one of the best community access TV stations in the entire nation so that he can develop Makena and sell multimillion-dollar estates to off-islanders. It is my opinion that Dowling & Company has had a heavy hand in escalating his assault on AKAKU to now include ALL of the states public access stations on all the islands. Why shake up just one when you can shake up all of them? The satisfying

aspect of why one person would go to such great lengths is because AKAKU must be doing something right. Maybe it is simply that AKAKU allows freedom of speech without censorship, or as their mission statement says, ~~#~~Empowering our community's voice through access to media.~~#~~ DCCA wants to reduce the public's access to public television, not expand it. I watched the video on the Feb 10 Board meeting last Sunday night, and I was actually pleasantly surprised that two of the special interest members were somewhat agreeable and seemed to have some compatible interests with some of the other Board members, and that was pretty refreshing. It looks as though the mediation might possibly be working, but it also seems that a new monster looms on the horizon in the form of unreasonable state regulation. As thousands of people are waiting and watching to see what becomes of unreasonable regulation only public access and free speech venue available to the community voice on the islands of Maui. Traditional television and cable programming have hundreds of channels at their disposal. Let the PEGs have their five channels without censorship or government intervention. In conclusion, nothing was wrong with the system until special interests and state regulators got involved , and I ask that you take that into consideration when you make your decision about whether or not to put public access television out to competitive bidding.

We are all citizen's here, this is our county, we pay our taxes. This is something to do with us and our children and our future. We want to be able to speak and be heard. As most things in democracy, it begins with a request in the beginning, and it goes from there. So I'd actually like to have this last as long as possible until the police show up at this door over here and tell us we can't be here. Let's go back to what kind of began this whole potpourri of problems that the DCCA, I'm sure would quite rather be doing other things besides what we are doing right here today. It all came down to a point that, we are looking at in government all over the United State, especially here in Hawaii now and definitely here in Maui. (Unintelligible) The group has a way of distributing funds (unintelligible) MCC. And what happened was they definitely wanted to have an accountability of the funds so that they could go back and say fine the funds are being spent in this way, and they've never gotten an accountability from Mr. Sakamoto or MCC as to how the funds are being spent or have been spent in the past. Now, they're Board members that have a fiduciary responsibility to the corporation to ensure the funds are being spent properly. Who is it falling to?# It's falling to the volunteers like myself and the other public access producers who are picking up the slack really and trying to provide what should be provided by the professionals. And so I'm at these meetings and I'll see a Maui News reporter over there, and an article will come out the next day in the paper. And I'll read the article and I'll realize, My gosh, they left out this important information in this article! And I'll know because I was at the meeting video taping it. I wasn't going to get in to the details, but I just can't hold back on this one. I went to the BOE meeting in the Kihei Library. The first speaker there was the President of HSTA, and he asked the Board #Ca you please have some teachers included on the Committee of Weights?#. The Committee of Weights is going to determine what the budgets are going to be for the schools. And when the article came out in the paper, they didn't even mention it. There was no mention that the president of HSTA was a speaker, what he talked about, what he asked for, nothing . The whole slant was should schools be permitted to have waiver days. And the light went on, and I said #Oh,

get it. I get it now. The Maui News has so much power and control to direct what people will know and think and understand. If you aren't at that meeting and you don't sit through the whole thing and hear everything and you read the paper and that's the only information you are going to get, they can crush good ideas and move forward their ideas which are represented by the Corporation. I said the Maui News needs a baby sitter because they are not doing their job properly. And I'm sure there must be some corporate interest going on here. I'm not going to go on and on. There was this article, interestingly in the Maui News, Feb 13. It says ~~Rice, Democracy in Russia heading in the wrong direction~~. Let me just read a couple paragraphs. ~~Citing troubling behavior by the Kremlin, Secretary of State Condoleezza Rice expressed skepticism on Sunday about the future of Democracy in Russia.~~ And then it goes on to say about how democracy is in trouble and this and that. And then ~~Other nations and human rights groups have expressed concern as a Putin guided Kremlin has established control of parliament, ended popular elections for regional governors, placed new rules on political parties and cut back on the independence of national media.~~ Now what is the point? If Condoleezza Rice is criticizing Russia for not having an independent media, the same is true here on Maui. We must have independent media. (Applause) It is so true. CS speaks about the discussions about the contracts. He seems to feel that those negotiations were the trigger to the question. (Interesting, he couldn't speak to the Director's thought previously) Then he goes back to the timeline. #I'm just giving you the facts.

Mr. Ching Johnson And I believe that. I believe that's why they have you here. Basically, I believe that you honestly can go for the deniability thing. You are doing your job. But what I'm saying is I believe what's going on behind the scenes is what we need to discuss. When we started building AKAKU MCC, everybody wanted more money.

CS the director made sure he was in compliance with all state laws.

Mr. Ching Johnson; I believe that. Whether the laws are just, that's another topic. For example, as far as this big review going on now, when there is a big piece of a pie, everybody wants a little bit of it, and some people want more than a little bit of it. When we started AKAKU there was a huge dispute over who got what percentage of the funds, and it was that the cable company, being a monopoly, put a percentage of its gross in a holding tank and we were entitled to it, and education wanted more than they were going to get, and there were threats and back and forth. Now money is once again added and whether it was something real or something imagined like say development of our favorite beaches or whatever it is, there's money involved and that's what is causing this whole thing, because right now it really ain't broke and it doesn't need to be fixed.

I'm deeply, deeply distressed that Director Recktenwald is not here. I don't understand. Is he planning on watching the tapes from these meetings? I'd really like him to get the word from the people, not through another employee, I think that's very important. My comments are highly inhibited due to the limbo status of the mediation at this time. I am very unhappy about that, and I am very startled that Chancellor Sakamoto felt comfortable talking about that. Putting PEG channels out to RFP. I'm having a real hard time wrapping my mind around the concept of putting free speech out to the lowest bidder. I don't get that at all. The potential of putting it in the hands of profiteers, of having it go to somebody that's running a for-profit company. I think that's the first thing you need to rule out in these deliberations. I don't think our young people are being maimed and dying in Iraq so we can put our public right to free speech here in Maui out for bid. I don't think that's right.

I find this a very onerous kind of project for the state to take on as well.. You have four counties that are very, very, very different. You have the Big Island, which has two very distinct areas on it. You have O'ahu which has a huge population. You have Kauai which is a fairly small entity, and then you have Maui, which is 3 and now 4 islands with our new budding Kaho'olawe growing right before our very eyes, that we need to service. So to figure out RFPs for each county seems to me to be a very, very, very difficult task to take on, and to complete it within a few months would seem to me to not be very practical. You said you would not be deciding this by June 30th, then I would ask you sir, please give us our money. If that's the reason you withheld it, which is what I'm told, was because you were going to do this RFP thing as of June 30th, and you say you are not, please give us our money.

CS The dept plans to inform the state procurement office whether or not they will seek an exemption.

NLP You are putting yourself under an impossible time crunch, and no offense, but I worked for the state. It ain't gonna happen, dude. As you can see, emotions are running very, very, very high throughout Maui Nui. Even your choice of location and timing has brought suspicion upon you. I think that it's important to recognize that we are not talking about AKAKU, we are not talking about some little entity, we are talking about free speech. And we are talking about a group that has allowed free speech from the day they opened their doors. I don't know if you are aware of it, but if you took a VHS tape in to AKAKU and you handed it to the guy at the desk, and you filled out the paper, they would air it. They won't look at it first. They won't care that you live on Oahu. They will put it on the air. If someone doesn't like it, you will get the phone call. Trust me dude, I've gotten them. But that is free speech. That is the ultimate of free speech, And in our recent history Everett Dowling has tried with his corporate buddies to take that away from us. And guarantee you that Maui County will not tolerate it. They will not accept Everett Dowling taking control of AKAKU. Now he's got a real close friendship with Mr. Sakamoto.

Maybe you can help me with this. The only two groups that I am aware of that would like to go up for bid against the current PEG channel companies are UH Hilo and MCC. Is that correct? Has anyone else expressed interest?

CS I have never heard from either entity regarding the RFP. Interest in bidding.

NLP Oh that's very interesting. I've gotten emails on both, so that is very interesting to hear that. I would like to address that potential, especially after our last three speakers, because it seems to me they're trying to pave the way for something, I don't know what it is, but... Mike Alpert testified before the Board, and I am proud to say that we allocated as much time as the people of Maui Nui needed from us, and I would appreciate it if you would arrange another meeting and do the same and allow these good people to speak to you. He, in his testimony tried to explain to us that censorship was a good thing. You get rid of all the bad words and all the things that are unpleasant for people. And I'm very concerned that with his association with MCC that censorship would happen. I don't see how a Community College, or a

State entity, could not censor, I don't know how they can't do that. So unless you have someone else that wants to bid, we are talking about a moot point here, because the college campuses are not able to not censor, and they've said that, they've made that very clear themselves.

If you put the PEG channels up for RFP are you also going to put the money you give to PBS up also for RFP and how are you going to do that? Why wouldn't they be subject to the RFP process, what do you give them, one million, two million dollars? Of those funds? Why wouldn't they be?

Mr Sonobe stated that this activity at this time is limited to the PEG organizations.

Nancy Lee Potter: Well then I'd suggest that you take that in to consideration. Well, I find it very strange that we are the only state in the USA that does give money to PBS and yet they are not being held to the same standard. That reeks,sir. That stinks.

(Comment from audience ♦Well they (PBS)paid for the Governor's debate♦.)

I think you are also being unrealistic when you say there will not be a break in services. I don't think you can change from one management company to another and not have a break in services. That doesn't make any sense to me. If you do decide to have an RFP process, which I am absolutely against in this situation, I would like to ask you that your number one issue be than any company bidding refuse to censor under any circumstances. That they would refuse to limit access. MCC only allows access to their current student body. They do not allow access one minute after you finish their class. Well, I shouldn't say that, a few people have been given that access, but for us normal folks, they don't do that. You need to not have it go to a for-profit company, You need to not have it be under the control of any state agency or any other politically controlled body.

I want to mention also that several of my producers say that if you want to do an RFP process, I'm the Board member that is elected by the producers, my producers would like you to split it up so that the E can go to Everett, it's his initial anyway, and the Government can do, they cost us money to provide the services that we do. We don't begrudge it, I don't think, as a board, but they do cost us money. And to have the Public Access be controlled by the producers, by the people of Maui County. We have a very diverse

group as you can see, and they rarely are shy about keeping their opinions to themselves. That's one of the things I really appreciate about Maui. I grew up on O'ahu and moved over here and have never regretted the move. The people of Maui are beyond delightful.

I thought Nathan Perriera made a good point when he said ~~all~~ they wanted was to tell the truth and let the people speak. I know that there are people that have testified before you that have stories that are not pleasant, in their experience at AKAKU, and in my opinion, their experiences were their own doing. And I'm glad somebody finally told the truth, Buck. I'm really glad somebody finally shined the light on that.

It's about time that the truth came out why you are so venomous.

I'd like to ask can you explain to the people of Maui Nui why Director Recktenwald would refuse to get involved in the issues at AKAKU. Why, when I begged him months and months ago, to put us in mediation, he refused until finally the tide turned against Everett.

Can you tell me what caused that change in him?

Mr. Sonobe states he cannot speak for the Director.

Nancy Lee Potter: And I want to know also, you came up with a million and a half dollars recently. And gave it back to the cable companies. In consideration of what's going on at AKAKU, you'd have to be deaf, dumb and blind in your job, sir, to not know that we needed that money. And you don't look any of those to me. Why would you give it back to the Cable Companies?

At his juncture Mr. Sonobe states he has no idea what money I am talking about.

NLP: I guess they were supposed to be for administrative funds and weren't used. Did you just not take money from them that we could have used? A million and a half bucks we're talking about here, so that must ring some kind of chime in your head.

Mr. Sonobe continue to deny any knowledge of a million and a half dollars that was not collected from the cable companies. This is real money, and playing dumb is not appropriate.

An ADDENDUM

Mr. Recktenwald, Mr. Sonobe denied any knowledge of what I could be talking about. The money could have been but was not collected from the cable companies. His denial of any knowledge was at the least disingenuous, and at worst tantamount to a lie. It

also came out during the course of the hearing that it was you that requested the opinion from the AG's office regarding this issue in August. Your actions and the timing are highly suspicious, and the fact that you are targeting only PEG channels, and excluding PBS gives many pause for thought as to the possibility of political influence overriding common sense within your position as Director. The testimony that followed mine shows you that the people of Maui Nui see what is REALLY going on, and are not falling for the slippery answers they are being given.

At this point Mr. Sonobe stopped the meeting. Only 29 of the 80 people that wanted to speak were heard. We had checked and there were a number of state rooms available that could have accommodated a hearing long in to the evening. It is clear that the DCCA is not interested in hearing what the people of Maui have to say.

As I have stated before, I am against an RFP process. That process is designed to help the state monitor it's money. THIS IS NOT THE STATE'S MONEY. It comes from the cable subscribers. These access non-profits were formulated to fulfill the necessary requirements.

You have not received a request for an opportunity to bid, and you have not received complaints that would warrant such a process being instigated. IF, however, you should choose to ignore the masses and decide to support an RFP process, I would suggest that you use the services that AKAKU was giving BEFORE OUR FUNDS WERE SPLIT, as your standard for any RFP you decide to issue. Then I would suggest that you take that million and a half dollars that Mr. Sonobe seems to have forgotten and give it to the Public Access stations, where it should have gone in the first place. The people of Maui County are very clear that the service provided by AKAKU meets their needs fully.

It is a perfect standard for an RFP should you continue in your placement of obstacles in the path of free speech.

The people here are clear as to what is really going on behind the scenes. That the Governor is clearly supporting your continued inability to assist Public Access in functioning honorably and ethically is a matter of much discussion on Maui and Molokai. It did not go unnoticed that you refused to get involved until the Board was taken over and placed back within the law and Robert's rules of Order, as required by our Bylaws. The assumption with those that speak to me is that the Governor, through her old association with Everett Dowling's friends on Maui, is ASSISTING

IN THE DESTRUCTION OF FREE SPEECH IN MAUI COUNTY. If you wish to change that perception, you need to take a stand for what is right, and not only request an exemption for RFP because of the fact that you are not dealing with state monies, and because it is not practicable when the current entities are clearly fulfilling the needs of the people. Then you need to give us enough money to function again. Otherwise, the people of Maui County will know that you are not on their side, on the side of free speech.

IF you need more definition on how AKAKU runs, I will be happy to ask our Chair to ask our acting CEO to send you any information you might need to design an RFP that will provide exactly what is currently being provided.

It would also be good for you to personally come to Maui and hear what the people have to say to you. It was clear that your dept didn't give a damn by scheduling this last meeting the way they did.

And they run on a reduced budget where they have had to let some of their best people go because they don't have enough funds. Funds have been held, things like that and I see these people disappearing and they are really fine people. They are really dedicated people. And that's about all I have to say.

Thank you for taking the time to hear the community. I am a resident of Maui County, a cable subscriber, a regular watcher of AKAKU. I am also a producer, and regular volunteer. I've taken all the classes offered. Through my volunteer and class time, I've had the opportunity and the pleasure of talking to the staff of AKAKU about technical, production and programming issues. The quality and quantity of training that AKAKU provides is exceptional. The quality and broad scope of the staff's technical and creative knowledge is extraordinary, particularly for such a small community. The staff is made up of extraordinary people, and every time I walk in to the station I learn something new. I volunteer regularly at AKAKU because I want to give back to the community. I want to give back to Maui, a place that has given me so much. What I appreciate the most about AKAKU and its staff is its unwavering commitment solely to the best interest of the Maui Community. As I see it AKAKU is a nonprofit organization with no self interest and no agenda. It has no interest in censoring or skewing any voice on any issue. It exists solely for the benefit of our community. It wants to provide a medium for all voices and give the community full access to all available information that impacts the community. These five cable stations are all about public access. That's AKAKU's sole mission and it does it very well. I wouldn't volunteer my time at AKAKU if it did anything else. In getting to know the AKAKU staff, I found not one of them to have any

political agenda. When it comes to programming and production, they have no bias on any issue that I am aware of. These are talented and exceptional people and they are very committed. They want to provide the highest broadcast standards and the highest quality public access station possible. To open up the competitive bidding process, particularly to for-profit organizations would be to threaten the Maui community's public access. It would invite the risk of censorship, potentially leaving Maui community with less or even worse, skewed information and less of a voice. It would invite personal agendas in to the programming mix to the detriment of our community. As I understand it the State of Hawaii would save no money by requiring the competitive bidding process, since the funds for the stations are fixed by a formula and are received from Time Warner and don't come from the State. My understanding is the difference in the quality of services that could be provided. Given my exposure to AKAKU I find it inconceivable that any other organization could offer a better, more trusted broadcast and production service. I didn't realize I could ask a question. I thought I'd throw in one question that hasn't been answered yet. Should an entity particularly a for-profit entity take over the services. If there were censorship, what would the state do about it? How could that be handled?

Mr. Sonobe's answer is difficult to decipher on my DVD.

And the process by which a producer would complain? Whenever we receive a complaint we prefer that the complaint be handled by the PEG Access organization because we don't want to be involved in the day to day operations.
