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TESTIMONY OF LAWRENCE AND JASON MIYAHIRA

1. This testimony is provided in support of Surface Water Use Permit Application ("SWUPA") No. 2258, filed with the Commission on Water Resource Management on April 23, 2009, for a parcel in Waiehu, Tax Map Key ("TMK") Nos. (2) 3-3-002:009 ("Parcel 9"), (2) 3-3-002:021 ("Parcel 21"), and (2) 3-3-002:010 ("Parcel 10"). Our family has lived on TMK No. (2) 3-3-002:009 for about 90 years. My grandfather and father (Yasunobu Miyahira) leased two acres from Solomon Hano for over 40 years, who sold the property to my father in 1966, 49 years ago. For over 30 years, our 'ohana has owned parcel 9 in a hui with the Smith, Alexander, and Molina 'ohanas. While the entire TMK No. (2) 3-3-002:009 is 3.38 acres, this request is limited to water use for our lo'i and non-commercial garden on the 2.08 acre portion that we utilize, hereinafter referred to as "Parcel 9, Lot A." Our family has lived on Parcel 9, Lot A since 1966. In 1999 we purchased Parcel 21 and Parcel 10.

2. The deed to this land contains a reservation of appurtenant rights for Parcel 21 and 10. We understand that because of this reservation, the appurtenant water rights to these Parcels may be extinguished. Nevertheless, as stated in our application, we reserve the right to claim appurtenant water rights. Therefore, in the event of a legal determination that these appurtenant rights were not extinguished, we are providing further information regarding water use at the time of the Māhele.

3. Our domestic water use is a protected public trust purpose.

4. Based on the information set forth below, if appurtenant rights survived the deed's reservation for Parcel 21 and Parcel 10, we request recognition of appurtenant rights for Parcel 9, Lot A, Parcel 21, and Parcel 10 in the amount of 666,000 gallons per day ("gpd"). We request a Surface Water Use Permit for our current reasonable-beneficial use for Parcel 9, Lot A, Parcel 21, and Parcel 10 of 154,020 gpd, which was the existing use as of April 30, 2008.

#### **QUANTIFICATION OF APPURTENANT RIGHTS**

5. Parcel 9 is in its entirety Land Commission Award ("LCA"), LCA No. 2572:1 to Naheana, confirmed by Royal Patent No. 8051. Parcel 21 and Parcel 10 are both a part of LCA 8559B:20.1, a konohiki grant to William C. Lunalilo. We are attaching various Māhele documents that confirm water use on Parcel 9, Parcel, 21, and Parcel 10 at the time that it was converted to fee simple.

6. Attached as "2258-MIYAHIRA-1" is a true and correct copy of LCA No. 2572:1 to Naheana, in the 'ili of Papahawale, the foreign testimony supporting the award, a translation of the native testimony, and the native register with the transcription and translation.

7. Attached as "2258-MIYAHIRA-2" are two true and correct screen shots of Parcel 21 and Parcel 10 from the Kīpuka Database.

8. Attached as “2258-MIYAHIRA-3” is a true and correct copy of a map that shows how our land hui’s ownership is physically divided. The map shows that the land my ‘ohana cultivates is located on the 2.00 acre portion of the property with the two pō‘alima, and is labeled “Lot A.” Additionally, we have attached true and correct two screenshots from the County of Maui Real Property Tax Division Database showing the acreage of Parcels 21 and 10.

9. The documents in 2258-MIYAHIRA-1, referring to LCA No. 2572:1, confirm that ‘āpana one was in kalo cultivation at the time of the Māhele: the LCA itself describes the boundaries of two “poalima” within ‘āpana one; the foreign testimony states that ‘āpana one is a “section of lois in Papahawale;” the translation of the native testimony notes “5 Poalima’s” in ‘āpana one and also notes ‘āpana one as being a “taro pauku at Papahawale;” and the translation of the native register notes “33 lo‘i at the ili at Papahawale.” Having consulted with experts in Nā Wai ‘Ehā land tenure at the time of the Māhele, we understand that pō‘alima in Nā Wai ‘Ehā, including mine, were all cultivated in lo‘i kalo. A pō‘alima means there was lo‘i, therefore when documents specify pō‘alima it refers to one or many lo‘i.

10. Screen shots from Kīpuka in 2258-MIYAHIRA-2 label Parcel 21 and 10 as pō‘alima.

11. Our land, Parcel 9, Lot A, Parcel 21, and Parcel 10, is a total of 2.22 acres (2.08 acres (Parcel 9, Lot A) + 0.06 acres (Parcel 21) + 0.08 acres (Parcel 10) = 2.22 acres). As explained above, these parcels were all cultivated in wetland kalo at the time of the Māhele. Parcel 21 and 10 are clearly noted as pō‘alima.

12. Based on the Māhele documents in 2258-MIYAHIRA-1 through 2258-MIYAHIRA-3, if appurtenant rights survive the deed’s reservation of rights, the quantification of

the appurtenant rights is the amount of water sufficient to grow kalo on 2.22 acres using traditional methods.

13. It is our understanding that, on average, taking into account fallow lo'i and uncultivated areas such as banks between lo'i, healthy wetland kalo requires between 100,000 and 300,000 gallons of water per acre per day ("gad"), and that areas with greater proportions of lo'i in cultivation will require an amount closer to the upper end of this range.

14. Thus, in our best estimation, the water right appurtenant to Parcel 9, Lot A, Parcel 21, and Parcel 10 is 666,000 gpd (2.22 acres x 300,000 gad).

#### **AMOUNT REQUESTED UNDER PERMIT**

15. We use water from the kuleana 'auwai in the lower reaches of South Waiehu, which runs along the 'Iao side of South Waiehu Stream. The water that is diverted from the stream continues makai in open ditches and pipes until it passes our property where we divert some water by pipe and ditch for our lo'i kalo and other crops. After flowing through our lo'i and irrigating our non-commercial garden and yard, water flows back into the 'auwai and into neighboring properties before returning to South Waiehu Stream, above the confluence of North and South Waiehu. The amount of water returned to stream varies, depending on weather conditions, the amount of water consumed by our crops, etc. We are requesting a permit for the amount of water necessary for kalo cultivation and these domestic uses.

16. Based on the water duty for kalo, to grow kalo on 0.5 acres of Parcel 9, Lot A we require 150,000 gpd (0.5 acres x 300,000 gad). Based on the 2002 State of Hawai'i Water System Standard for Maui County of 3,000 gad for 1.34 acres (1.2 acres (Parcel 9, Lot A) + 0.06 acres (Parcel 21) + 0.08 acres (Parcel 10) = 1.34 acres) we require 4,020 gpd (1.34 acres x 3,000

gad) for my domestic uses. In total we require 154,020 gpd for our existing water use for our wetland kalo cultivation and non-commercial gardening.

### **REASONABLE-BENEFICIAL ANALYSIS**

17. In the event of a legal determination that our appurtenant rights were extinguished, our existing use is still “reasonable-beneficial,” defined as: “the use of water in such a quantity as is necessary for economic and efficient utilization, for a purpose, and in a manner which is both reasonable and consistent with the state and county land use plans and public interest.” Hawai‘i Revised Statutes § 174C-3.

18. The quantity we are requesting is necessary for the economic and efficient irrigation of our home garden, which includes lo‘i kalo for our consumption by us, our ‘ohana, and neighbors. Our use of the stream water is economic and efficient, as we use only the amount needed to irrigate our garden and we implement measures to minimize water loss, reduce evaporation and leakage.

19. Our use of stream water to irrigate our garden is also consistent with the state and county land use plans and the public interest. Our land is classified by the State as rural, and zoned by the County as residential. Our water use on our land for domestic cultivation is in the public interest and fulfills a public trust purpose.

### **ALTERNATIVES ANALYSIS**

20. Because our land has appurtenant rights to stream water in the nature of an easement that was conveyed at the time of the Māhele, we are not required to provide an alternatives analysis to show that we have no practicable alternative source of water. Our appurtenant right is for stream water, not for water from any other source, and our exercise of

this right enjoys maximum protection and first priority under the law. Nonetheless, the Alternatives Analysis set forth in our SWUPA remains applicable, true, and correct.


21. We have always used a reasonable amount of 'auwai water to maintain our non-commercial garden, along with other community members along this traditional 'auwai. Other alternatives, such as municipal water, reclaimed wastewater, water from other ditch systems, desalinized water, and groundwater, are not practicable alternatives to the 'auwai water from South Waiehu Stream. Requiring us to pay for these alternatives instead of diverting the small amount of stream water via the 'auwai that runs alongside our land would impose an unfair and impracticable cost on our family, given that we are small, non-commercial, domestic water users who have always used the 'auwai that runs alongside our land to water our home garden.

**SUMMARY**

22. In sum: (1) the exercise of our appurtenant right is a protected public trust purpose; (2) our domestic water use is also a protected public trust purpose; (3) if appurtenant rights survived the deed's reservation for Parcel 21 and Parcel 10 and because we have appurtenant rights for Parcel 9, Lot A we are entitled to 666,000 gpd; (4) at this time, we request a permit for our current and existing reasonable-beneficial uses on the property of 154,020 gpd, and this amount will be used to irrigate our non-commercial garden and cultivate lo'i kalo, which is a reasonable-beneficial use of stream water. There is no practicable alternative.

We, LAWRENCE AND JASON MIYAHIRA, do declare under penalty of law that the foregoing is true and correct.





Screen Shot of Parcel 21





Sugar Company's map.




