
Hawaii Appointment of Tax Review Commission, Question 1 (1998)



Hawaii Question 1 was on the <u>November 3, 1998</u> election ballot in <u>Hawaii</u> as a <u>legislatively referred constitutional amendment</u>, where it wasdefeated with 33.6% of voters in favor.

Text of measure

The language that appeared on the ballot:

The proposed amendment would change the appointment of a tax review commission from every five years to every ten years. The problem expressed by the Legislature has been the lack of time to adequately assess and implement, if appropriate, the recommendations of the commission. Under the proposed amendment, if the tax review commission is appointed every ten years, then the Legislature will have more time between appointments to consider tax review commission recommendations.

Hawaii Appointment of Tax Review Commission, Amendment 2 (2000)

Hawaii Amendment 2 was on the <u>November 7, 2000</u> election ballot in <u>Hawaii</u>. It passed, with 70% of voters in favor. It would appoint a tax review commission every ten years instead of every five years, starting in the year 2005.^[1] Election results
