



I suppose you are tired waiting to hear from me. Well, instead of me finding a tenant I have found a buyer. I have a cash offer of \$7590. for the property, less of course the usual fee of 5 % to the Real Estate Agentand the cost of drawing up a deed, which should not cost tore than ten dollars. After deducting the Real Estate commission of 5% and the cost of the deed, you should not about \$7200.

I estimate that the value of the property today is about 25% more than the assessed value, and since the assed value is \$6165 that would make my estimate \$7706. or a difference of \$116.






Dear Mr. Wilson:

Herewith data regarding M. J. Fortie, of whom I spoke to you this morning.

He was born in Northern Italy, of old Italian stock; he is a thorough gentleman. About 1924 or 1925, as I recall, he completed his citizenship (American, I mean) in Judge Achi's court on Kauai. I have known Mr. Fortie since 1923, and without qualification commend him as one of the most conscientious and trustworthy persons I have ever met. We first met when he wrote some articles on East Africa for the Advertiser; afterward he read proof for the paper. In the fall of 1924 he went to Kauar to teach European languages in the Kauai High School, at Lihue, and remained there until 1932. Our acquaintance became very close, a friendship that I value, during my stay in Mahelona Hospital, on Kauai, for two and one-half years, in 1925-1926 and 1927-1928. All told, Mr. Fortie taught at Kauai High for seven years, as he took a year's leave of absence in 1929 to go to South America and Europe, where he studied. He left the high school because the school decided to discontinue the languages, or some of them, that he was teaching; he was offered a position in the English department of the school, but refused it, on the ground that he was not competent, though he is far more of a master of English than nine-tenths of the persons born to the lan-As I have hinted, he is an accomplished linguist, having the following languages at his tongue's end: Italian, French, Spanish, German, and English; he also knows Swahili, the great language of the East African natives; how much Japanese he knows I cannot say, but it is more than a smattering. Otherwise he is very well read; his travels have been wide, world-wide, particularly in the tropics, though I recall that he lived for some time in Indianapolis.

Mr. Fortie left Hawaii, as I said, in 1932. Before the World War, he and a partner, a German, had had a rubber plantation in German East Africa; the German, as I recall, was deported or interned by the British, or quit the country, and Mr. Fortie also departed. An effort was made to do something with the plantation after the war, the partner carrying on alone; Mr. Fortie went to East Africa in 1932 to ascertain what could be done with the property. Thereafter he made long safaris, at least 3000 miles, and perhaps 3800 on foot --- I do not recall whether he covered an additional 800 miles that he was contemplating. He

returned to the States last year, and has had a place with the international federation of educational associations --- I do not recall the exact title. Although Mr. Fortie did not say as much, I fancy that Williard E. Givens, former superintendent of public instruction of Hawaii and now executive secretary of the National Education Association, helped him get the position, as Mr. Fortie mentioned Mr. Givens in a recent letter. As executive secretary of the N.E.A., Mr. Givens is about the most prominent figure in American sub-university circles of education. I know that Mr. Fortie is on good terms with him.

Should you wish any further confirmation of his character, I suggest that you inquire of E. H. W. Broadbent, manager of Grove Farm Plantation, Kauai. Mr. Fortie lived in a cottage on Mr. Broadbent's coconut plantation at Waipouli for several years.



My dear Sam:-

Since writing you last I have been rather too busy to dig into my junk room for the stamps. I have stored away in among a lot of old papers and belongings and hope to get at it within the next couple of weeks. Sundays about the only day I can find to do my digging, so expect to get at it real soon.

Now regarding the San Francisco Exposition. I am not so tied up that I can break away at anytime to handle the Polynesian Village when the t time comes. It has been a life hobby with me to put this show on right and it looks as if the Prisco affair will be my last opportunity. Do you remember Mr. Warriner who was in chargeb of the Hawaiian booth at the Century of Progress, well, he approached me the other day along the same lines that you did. He wants the curio concession in the Village. I told him that I had just heard from you along the same lines and he fully remembers you. I think we can raise some local money as times are not so bad now as they were in 1953.

In order that we may be able to get out a comprehensive propectus we must start gathering material. I would like to secure a copy of the report of the 1915 Expo that was held in San Francisco and also a report of the Centuary of Progress, that is the figures showing the total attendance and if possible the receipts of each concession. Every Expositer closing a report is gotton out showing receipts and the costs of each concession. I do not kn whow we can secure one of these reports but by inquiring and keeping an eye open you may run into one of them. While in Chicago isst in February of 1934 I met a group of architects, friends of Collier, who had a report on the Century of Progress. I saw some of the figures; but not thinking I ould ever need them I did not make a copy.

Now regarding the Okolehao Distillery. A company has been started and I understand they have seent about \$60,000, but not seem to be making any money. They are not turning out a v ry good article. Her total receipts for the past five years has not exceeded \$150.00, and on two occasions requested tenants to vacate. In both cases it cost her not less than \$200. to put the place in condition or a total cost of \$400. only to receive another poor tenant. The present tenant has occupied the premises since April of last year and all she has been able to collect since their occupancy is about \$15. The water bills for the year cost her more than what she has been able to collect in rents. Should the present tenant be requested to vacate, it would be necessary to make another expenditure of another \$200 for repairs and painting. Whits amount she cannot raise at this time; so is offering the place for sale. Taxes, insurance and water for last year are paid in full.

She has fared better with her Queen St. property but itnhas taken the entire income from this property to maintain both properties. The net income of thes property after paying water, repairs and insurance without taxes is about \$25. per month.

The above gives you a true picture of the two properties and if you wish to check me up on the above statement, you are at liberty to call on the present tenants and if you wish the names of the former occupants, I would be glad to furnish them. I do not think the tenants could be termed as dead beats, but simply out of employment and were only earning enough to purchase food.

I believe all penalties should be waved and should assed value of same be based on its income, then the property has been over assessed. However, Mrs. Wilson will do whatever you think or desire her to do within reason. She has no income other than the rentals from this property and whatever has been the practise. of your department in making adjustments in similar eases, I am sure she will endeavor to comply.

Dear Mr. Wilson:

Your registration with this Board expired eleven months ago on April 30, 1935. You have not renewed probably because you were not actively practicing your profession. You could, therefore, see no reason for spending money on something not immediately needed. The value of registration, however, becomes more valuable with time as requirements are raised and enforcement becomes more effective. This is reflected in the fact that only seven registrants out of a total of nearly 200 remain unprenewed.

"Every certificate of registration shall expire on the last day of the month of April following its issuance or fenewal and shall become invalid on that date unless renewed." The Auditor has given notice that he will place a strict interpretation on our law as above quoted. Under such a ruling, unfair though it may seem, the Secretary could not accept a renewal fee after Apr. 30th.

This matter was presented at a meeting of the Board today and it was decided that we might be able to put though the old renewal if paid now with the fee for the year ending April 30, 1937. Accordingly you will find enclosed two bills, one for the year which expires at the end of this month and another for the year expiring April 30, 1937.







Just a few lines to inform you that the incubator reached me on the 27th day of March and by Sunday the 29th I had it partially filled with eggs.

It arrived here in good condition with exception with a minor damage to the electric fan. I presume the box received some rough handling someway en-route which caused the fan to break loose from the base. The clip which holds the motor to the base broke off, which I got fixed at a very small cost. It would be a good idea in shipping the next time to dismantle the fan or have a heavier clip soldered on.
