I suppose you are tired waiting to hear from me. Well, instead of me finding a tenant I have found a buyer. I have a cash offer of \$7590. for the property, less of course the usual fee of 5% to the Real Estate Agent and the cost of drawing up a deed, which should not cost more than ten dollars. After deducting the Real Estate commission of 5% and the cost of the deed, you should net about \$7200.

I estimate that the value of the property today is about 25% more than the assessed value, and since the assessed value is \$6165 that would make my estimate \$7706. or a difference of \$116.

Herewith data regarding M. J. Fortie, of whom I spoke to you this morning.

He was born in Northern Italy, of old Italian stock; he is a thorough gentleman. About 1924 or 1925, as I recall, he completed his citizenship (American, I mean) in Judge Achi's court on Kauai. I have known Mr. Fortie since 1923, and without qualification commend him as one of the most conscientious and trustworthy persons I have ever met. We first met when he wrote some articles on East Africa for the Advertiser; afterward he read proof for the paper. In the fall of 1924 he went to Kauai to teach European languages in the Kauai High School, at Lihue, and remained there until 1932. Our acquaintance became very close, a friendship that I value, during my stay in Mahelona Hospital, on Kauai, for two and one-half years, in 1925-1926 and 1927-1928. All told, Mr. Fortie taught at Kauai High for seven years, as he took a year's leave of absence in 1929 to go to South America and Europe, where he studied. He left the high school because the school decided to discontinue the languages, or some of them, that he was teaching; he was offered a position in the English department of the school, but refused it, on the ground that he was not competent, though he is far more of a master of English than nine-tenths of the persons born to the language. As I have hinted, he is an accomplished linguist, having the following languages at his tongue's end: Italian, French, Spanish, German, and English; he also knows Swahili, the great language of the East African natives; how much Japanese he knows I cannot say, but it is more than a smattering. Otherwise he is very well read; his travels have been wide, world-wide, particularly in the tropics, though I recall that he lived for some time in Indianapolis.

Mr. Fortie left Hawaii, as I said, in 1932. Before the World War, he and a partner, a German, had had a rubber plantation in German East Africa; the German, as I recall, was deported or interned by the British, or quit the country, and Mr. Fortie also departed. An effort was made to do something with the plantation after the war, the partner carrying on alone; Mr. Fortie went to East Africa in 1932 to ascertain what could be done with the property. Thereafter he made long safaris, at least 3000 miles, and perhaps 3800, on foot --- I do not recall whether he covered an additional 800 miles that he was contemplating. He

All told, Mr. Fortie taught at Kama'i High for seven years, as he took a year's leave of absence in 1939 to go to South America and Europe, where he studied. 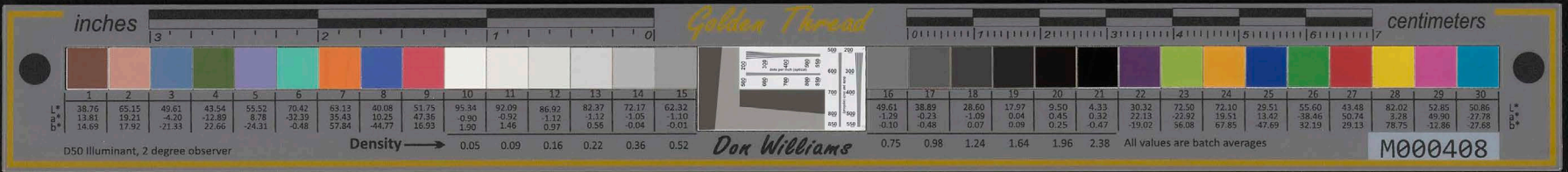

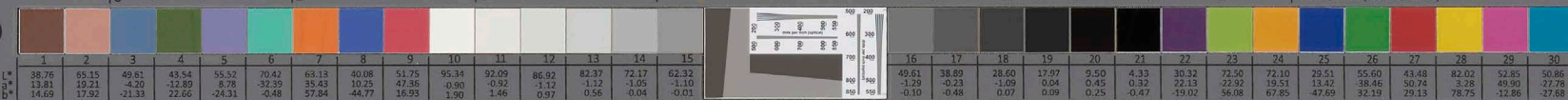

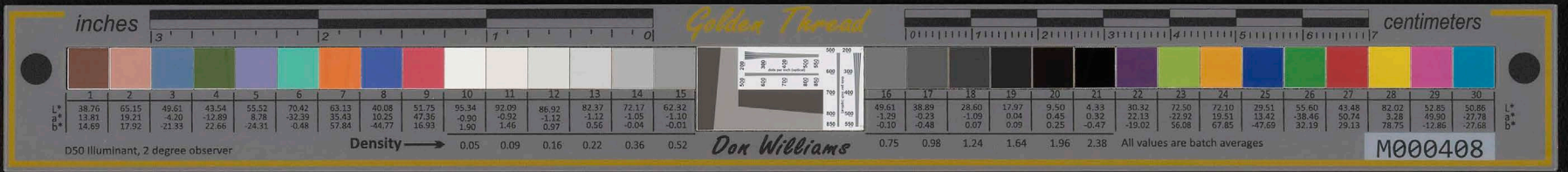

Mr. Evans promised to get it out for me, but since his severance from the department, I do not know whether or not he left instructions with others to attend to the matter.

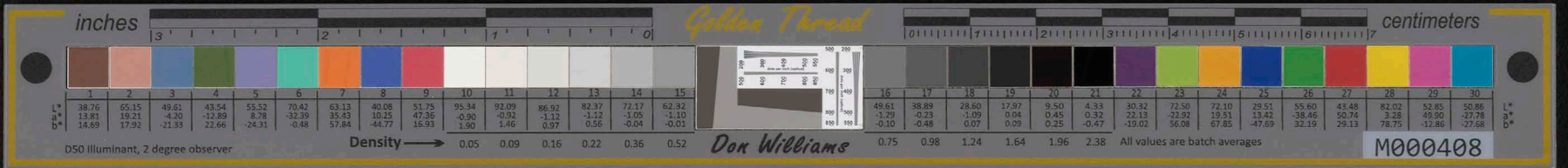

Dear Sir:-

I beg to acknowledge receipt of your notice regarding my wife's delinquent taxes, (Mrs. Jennie K. Wilson), she owns two pieces of property, one is located on Mokiha St., being lot 11 Block D. Kapahulu Tract, area 5,000 square feet and the other is located on Queen St., having an area of 1653 square feet.

The Kapahulu property has a house on it which at one time brought a rental of Thirty-five, (\$35.00), per month, but for the past FIVE years, since January or February 1931 to date, she has had four tenants who all turned out to be poor payers. Her total receipts for the past five years has not exceeded \$150.00, and on two occasions requested tenants to vacate. In both cases it cost her not less than \$200. to put the place in condition or a total cost of \$400. only to receive another poor tenant. The present tenant has occupied the premises since April of last year and all she has been able to collect since their occupancy is about \$15. The water bills for the year cost her more than what she has been able to collect in rents. Should the present tenant be requested to vacate, it would be necessary to make another expenditure of another \$200 for repairs and painting. which amount she cannot raise at this time, so is offering the place for sale. Taxes, insurance and water for last year are paid in full.

She has fared better with her Queen St. property but it has taken the entire income from this property to maintain both properties. The net income of this property after paying water, repairs and insurance without taxes is about \$25. per month.

The above gives you a true picture of the two properties and if you wish to check me up on the above statement, you are at liberty to call on the present tenants and if you wish the names of the former occupants, I would be glad to furnish them. I do not think the tenants could be termed as dead beats, but simply out of employment and were only earning enough to purchase food.

I believe all penalties should be waved and should assessed value of same be based on its income, then the property has been over assessed. However, Mrs. Wilson will do whatever you think or desire her to do within reason. She has no income other than the rentals from this property and whatever has been the practise. of your department in making adjustments in similar cases, I am sure she will endeavor to comply.


Your registration with this Board expired eleven months ago on April 30, 1935. You have not renewed probably because you were not actively practicing your profession. You could, therefore, see no reason for spending money on something not immediately needed. The value of registration, however, becomes more valuable with time as requirements are raised and enforcement becomes more effective. This is reflected in the fact that only seven registrants out of a total of nearly 200 remain un-renewed.

"Every certificate of registration shall expire on the last day of the month of April following its issuance or renewal and shall become invalid on that date unless renewed." The Auditor has given notice that he will place a strict interpretation on our law as above quoted. Under such a ruling, unfair though it may seem, the Secretary could not accept a renewal fee after Apr. 30th.

This matter was presented at a meeting of the Board today and it was decided that we might be able to put through the old renewal if paid now with the fee for the year ending April 30, 1937. Accordingly you will find enclosed two bills, one for the year which expires at the end of this month and another for the year expiring April 30, 1937.

If you do not wish to maintain your registration won't you please append a note to this effect at the bottom of this letter or by simply signing your name in the margin opposite this paragraph?
