Thanks ever so much for your very interesting letter of July 26 with enclosure of letter of introduction to Hon. Samuel W. King. I expect to be in Washington about Sept 8 unless held here in N.Y. and will contact Mr. King on arrival in the Capitol

Since writing you on July 15th President Roosevelt appointed George Creel, U.S. Commissioner to the San Francisco Expo and Edward J.Flynn, secretary of state for New York, the U.S. Commissioner for N.Y. World's Fair. Trying now to get the attention of both men for my ideas of a "seperate exploitation unit" to publicize jointly the two fairs San Francisco and New York thruout Hawaii, the Philippines, China, Japan, South Africa and Australasia.


Patronage from these countries comes via the Pacific and for both exploitation departments to be battling for publicity one trying to outdo the other would be silly. If they join hands and let a special unit do the work, greater results can be secured. Hawaii being a pivot point on the traffic lane should benefit tremendously if given a break in newsy press notices as well as pictorial flashes.

The New York Fair is going to be an all eclip sing spectacle -Bigger, Better and Sensationally startling in every department than heretofore conceived by the mind of man. Don't side -step it if you can frame an interesting exhibit. The pland you had --A Polynesians Village impresses me as a very live exhibit as it takes in Hawaii, Samoa, Tahiti, Maqueses and the New Zeland Maori's. Getting ample space for attractive exhibit, also display of the fruits and novelties of each respective race also their amusement shows -wrapping everything under one impressive flash should get results and be distinctly beneficial for riveting attention on Honolulu for an outing.

Very shortly Mr. James H.R. Cromwell and his wife Doris Duke will be at their home in your town or section. He is credited with being a pretty good scout. You might secure him for a backer if he became impressed with the set up. Think this over if the suggestion appeals. Cromwell and his wife have millions and as they have elected to spend a fortune (as we up here are informed) building a home in Honolulu, its reasonable to infer they might welcome an invitation to back an exhibit of Hawaii or the Polynesian Village for the N.Y. World's Fair. Diplomatically handled I'm impressed success would be registered.

In a few weeks when I get some action on my efforts will write again. And if you think up anything interesting send it along. Considering the "battle royal" ahead re the fight for the position of Mayor twixt LaGuardia, Mahoney and Copeland I'll probably be blocked until the situation clears in Nov election. 

Honolulu, Hawaii. Aug.11th.1937 Wednesday.

My dear Kini:-

I am using thin paper to save postage. This will be my last chance to write to you by Clipper, because the next Clipper will not be leaving for another week and by that time you will have left Hong Kong and probably be in Yokohama. If the Clipper is on time and I think I can make it, I will take a chance and address it to Yokohama care of the S.S.Hoover.

I received three letter from you by the last steamer President Coolridge. The letters dated July 11th from Peiping, 18th. from Tiensen and 23rd from Shanghai, and was really glad to learn that you all got through war zone without much difficulty.

Mrs. Lum came in to see me the day she arrived so learned from her more about your trip.

Now as regarding money, T told you when you left here, I would have money waiting for you in Hong Kong and not to buy anything on your way to Manila but, do your buying on your way home, then able oe luhi ika auomo and or pay freight. I sent you \$100 which you should have received when you got to Hong Kong on Aug 3rd or 4th. for the mail which I sent it on, the Empress of Japan arriving in Hong Kong on July 30th about 4 or 5 days before you reached there. I also intended to send you another \$100 American money by the Hoover which left here on July 29th., but as that was two days before pay day I did not send it but waited for the Clipper, but, when I learned that the weather was very stormy in Manila and Shanghai I was afraid to send it by the last Clipper, so thought I would wait until you arrived in Hong Kong then I would send it by cable, it only cost me \$5 to send by cable, so this afternoon I went over to the Bank of Hawaii and had them send you \$100 in American money, which will be \$316 in Mex. I hope you will receive this money okay. I sent it care of Yew Char Tours, Hotel Glocester, Hong Kong. If you did not receive it upon receipt of this letter, you had better go to the National City Bank of New York in Hong Kong, better known as the Citibank.

I did not expect you would buy any rugs for us at all, but, I did expect you to get the name and address of the store and when you got home we could decide on what was needed and we could write for it. Another reason I did not want to give you too much money, I was not sure that you would travel without getting held up. It was safer to have it waiting for you at different playesw hen you reached there thannto carry it with you. I know he wahine poins wale oe.

I am now bargaining with the Bishop Estate for a new lease, and I am sure we will get a new lease with a slight boost in price.

Mrs, Gibbons and daughter is still here, but, will be leaving this coming Saturday for Washington. Billy Wells is giving a party at Law Yee Chai's Friday night and we all will be there to the farewell party. She is sorry you are not here to meet you. She is a big woman like Mrs. Farley and is of the same kind.

There is a wahine haole just dropped in to see me from San Jose, Calif., who's father works for the Postal Department. She is on her way to Shanghai, just came in this morning on the Clipper and will be leaving early tomorrow morning, which will be the same Clipper that will take this letter to Hong Kong, which is due in Hong Kong on the 18th. I have given her a letter to you for she knows nobody in Hong Kong and will be there one day only. Whatever you can do to make it pleasant for her during her stay, would be nice. She is a writer and school teacher. and making this btrip to find something to write about. Her name is Dorathy Kaucher.

I am enclosing an article which appeared in the Bulletin last Tuesday a day after the President arrived. Yew Char is quite a writer.

Why do keep talking about Mrs. Blalock. Why can't you be reasonable. I have told you more than once that when I was staying at the Raleigh Hotel I had to pay \$4 per day for a small room about the size of our kitchen, and in addition to that my telephone calls cost me ten cents for every call and besides that it cost me at least \$4 more per day for my meals besides the tips. You add this all up it brought my cost up to about \$10 per gay or \$300 per month. When I moved in with the Blalocks it cost me less than one half and I got my washing done included. As for her sister, if there was anything doing between us, it would have been better for me to stay at the hotel and not with the Blalocks. You would take your kane's to your sisters or brothers house would you, if you were a married woman? Pela no me lakou. I don't see why you fly off at times. The same with money. I told you plainly, when you left that I would send you money at Hong Kong as it would be bettervto buy while on your way home and you agreed with me. I just asked the custom house people what the duty was on rugs and they tell me they charge FIFTY CENTS per square foot for big rugs and 45 cents per square foot for small rugs, so you see a rug that is 10 % 10 would measure 100 square foot and the duty on that rug would be \$50 American money, so you see I doubt whether a person saves very much money in buying rugs over there and bringing them here for hoopukapuka. It is alright if you buy it for your own use, but not to speculate.

I hope you will get Harry a few shirts and my Philapinno hat, and if you have enough money and you find it cheap, get me camera, otherwise, I do not want it unless Yew Char think it is cheaper than what we can buy here.

Ua lawa paha kaua maanei, acle mea hou ano nui loa. Everything at home is okay. The old woman never showed up until today. I owe her for the time she worked before you left., She probably thinks I should look her up, but, I think we are lucky we got rid of her. This old woman, (hacle) is really good but is a crank.

I must close now, time is up. Eia mai ka poe Inspectors ke hele mai nei, so aloha kuau. Keia paha ka leta hope loa au e leta ai ia oe, hope you are still enjoying yourself.

I am enclosing copy of letter received today from Mr. Delegate King, in which he definitely states in the thrid paragraph that he will introduce the bill for the relief of Princess Theresa Owana Kaohelelani.

I have prepared such a bill and it will be in Mr. King's hands for introduction during the current week. The bill will request the usual one year's salary granted to the widows of members of Congress, who died while in office. I understand that these are the facts in the case of the Princess' husband. I have been following the Congressional Record for a number of years and do not ever recall seeing one of these bills rejected. The only obstacle in its way is, of course, the length of time which has transpired since the death of Mr. Wilcox, and your expression to Mr. King of your willingness to be of assistance to the Princess will be of immense comfort to all those interested in the case.

Dear Mr. Pharr:

Please pardon my rather belated reply to your letters of June 29th and July 21st, regarding the claim of Princess Theresa Owana Kaohelelani.

Due to the pressure of legislative duties and the constant struggle in trying to make Congress recognize the right of Hawaii to equal treatment with the several States, I must admit that my correspondence has suffered somewhat.

I have not as yet heard from Mr. Wilson relative to the facts of Princess Theresa's case, but shall be very glad to introduce a bill for her relief. With the probability of an adjournment of Congress within the next two or three weeks, I do not believe it will be possible to have such a measure enacted into law at this session. It would however be before the appropriate Committee, so that early consideration would be given it when Congress convenes in January.

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



The Empress boat arrived yesterday and I received two letters from you. One was written in Shanghai but no date, which you said would go by by the same beat with Mrs. Hardesty, ance maoli, only arrived yesterday. The other letter dated Aug 4th an written from Hong Kong, saying you received the \$100.

I am glad to hear you are on schedule and standing the heat and travel oway. If you find the puupuu too maneo, you should rub yourself with Listerine or Ponds Extract.

Both Harry and I watch the apers every day about the war and knowing that you were on schedule, as the papers announced that you had left Shanghai on the President Taft, so in that way we know you were safe out of the war zone. We see by the papers wher the President Hoover was taken over by the United States Government to take troops to Shanghai and to take American refuges from Shanghai to Manila then go on her regular run to Hong Kong then on to Japan and Honolulu. Knowing this, I am quite certain this letter will catch you still in Hong Kong as you have no way of getting out of there until theb Hoover returns. Unless the Clipper run into bad weather this letter should be in Hong Kong in 5 or 6 days or Thursday Aug 26th.

Our papers here is full of Chinese and Japan war news and they also say there is plenty of decease in Hong Kong and Shanghai, that is cholera. You had better be careful what you eat and drink. Don't eat any raw stuff, either fruit or fish or vegetables see that it is all cooked well, and so with the water, unless you are about ship, then you will be sure to get good water for the water on ships probably was put aboard either in Honolulu or Manila.

Poor old John Wise died last week. I did not go to the funeral because it was held in the afternoon at 2 o'clock and I had 4 postal inspectors here checking up our books at the time, but, I sent flowers for both of us.

In my letter of Aug llth. I told you about sending you \$100 by cable. on that same day. I hope you received it okay. I will repeat the name of the Bank I sent it to, incase you did not get my letter dated the llth and you did not get that money, you can get it by calling at the National City Bank of New York at Hongkong. Some people know the bank by the name of Citibank also.

I also wrote you about a wahine haole who was on her way to Shanghai, by the name of Dorothy Kaucher. She is a writer and a friend of one of our Post Inspectors. As she was going out the next day on the Clipper I asked her to call on you and let you know that I am alright. I doubt whether the Government will allow her to go to Shanghai with all the fighting going on.

Ella and Lou returned from Hilo yesterday and rang me up immediately inquiring about you. Sou Lang just poked her head in the window while I am writing this letter and also inquired about you. She sends her aloha and said if she got the time she would write you tonight.

Lydie Lucas keep ringing up at least once a week wanting to know if I hear from you etc. Emma Samson is another one. I tell them all you have joined the Pake Army as a General and may be they will not let you come back to Hawaii. They all laugh when I tell them you are a General in the Pake Army.

Harry Mills is another one of our boys who has been very sick and almost past out. Charlie Rose and Hiram are back to work.

If you get stuck in China and cannot come home you had better let me know by Clipper mail. You can find out by going to the Hong Kong or Macao post office and ask them when the Clipper mail, closes. You can get a letter to me in five days coming from that siade and if you are pilikia, I can send you some more money if you need it for hotel expenses. I can send it by cable like the last money that I sent.

If you are detained there by no fault of yours, I should think the Dollar Steamship Company will give you free hotel while you are waiting for the Hoover. If the Hoover broke down or got pilikia on account of bad weather then you would have to pay your own expenses, but, in this case the Steamship Company is making money out of the Government. They are not hauling soldiers to Manila for nothing.

I heard from Kini last Monday from Hong Kong. She has been lucky, the fighting started just a day or two after they would be leaving a city. A couple of days after she left Shanghai, the Japanese started to blow up the city. She is now waiting in Hong Kong for a ship to bring them home. I think she will be back on the Pr sident Hoover.

Dear Mr. Wilson:

Recently I had the pleasure of receiving a nice letter from an old Stanford acquaintance, Frederick G. Krauss, who has been connected with the Hawaiian University but has recently retired. He is now acting as Consulting Agriculturist. He lives at 2437 Parker Place, Manoa. He has in his letter told me of so many fine things that I am enthused with a further desire to visit the Islands. Both Mrs. McDonnell and I are hoping that we might make that our objective this winter sometime. On the other hand, I am hardly in a position to make the trip unless I can at the same time tie it in with some engineering work.

We have had some correspondence with B. F. Rush, City and County Engineer, relative to the making of an appraisal of the electric light and street railway properties -- the appraisal to be used as a basis for either purchase or rate regulation. This matter seemed very hot at the time, and I thought we were going to get an engagement. Then again we have had considerable correspondence with Mr. Frederick Ohrt, Manager of the Water Supply Board, relative to improving the water works and extending same. None of these projects has materialized, but I just thought I would drop you a line and see whether you know of these projects, whether they are dead, if they might be revived, and who would be the best one for me to meet with on the projects. In other words, to be frank with you, I want to work up a job or project, or at least some excuse for coming to the Islands this winter.

It hardly seems right that I should mention this because we have our hands full of work right here. We never in our experience have had so much engineering work under way. Our principal engagements are the new water supply project at Little Rock, Arkansas, costing \$2,500,000; a new water supply project at Toledo, Ohio, that will cost about \$9,000,000; the new light and power plant for Kalamazoo, Michigan; one for Reading, Pennsylvania; water works appraisals at Camden, New Jersey, at Newport, Rhode Island, and at Roanoke, Virginia. These are the major engagements. Our business has been greatly stimulated by the new deal, and we are entirely in sympathy with it and what it has accomplished, especially in light and power projects.

I assume that you are still serving as Postmaster, with Farley as your boss.

It would have been extremely interesting if the same article could have carried the picture of both of you taken forty years ago. I imagine your condition has changed in proportion with the building equipment of forty years ago. It must be rather gratifying to both of you to look back on this work of forty years ago. I enjoyed the pictures very much, and they were especially interesting because I had taken the trail up Pali before the road was constructed. This, I think, was in the summer of 1895.

I am sincerely hoping that Mrs. McDonnell and I may visit the Islands this winter. Should we be fortunate enough to do so, would enjoy a little reminiscing with you and Mr. Whitehouse.

My dear Sir:-

I am taking the liberty of tresspassing upon your good nature by asking you a special favor to make some inquires at the New Asia Hotel, Shanghai, regarding certain luggage which was left there last August by my wife, Mrs. John H. Wilson.

She was one of a group of people who left here last June on a tour of Japan, Korea, China and Manila. She left Shanghai the first week of August for Hong Kong on the S.S.Taft and left her baggage at the hotel with intentions of picking it up after the return from Hong Kong and Manila.

She returned on the S.S.Hoover on that eventful trip when the Hoover was bombed off Shanghai on August 50th., consequently, the Hoover continued right on through to Japan and Honolulu.

My wife is much worried over her luggage and for that reason I am writing this letter in the hopes that we may get some information that may lead to the recovering of her belongings.

There were four packages or parcels in all, viz:-

- 1-Brown leather suit case with brown canvas cover. New. Had it made to order in Shanghai.
- 1-Chinese Telescope basket, containing Chinese rugs, neck furs, and trinkets.
- 1-Brown paper box, containing souvenirs etc. and tied up with a leather strap/
- 2-Chinese bamboo umbrella hats just tied together with some twine.





gurdan I claced him to the Queen's Hospital first and agreed to pay \$2.50, for his expenses. Being personally acquainted with the doctors and upon their advise he was given the radium treatment.

In order that he be given the radium treatment, which is considered a very expensive treatment to those able to pay, I had Harry declared indigent, inorder that he be given the treatment as a City patient. He being an old City employee is entitled to a pension and since he has never applied for a pension, it was agreed between the doctors and I that he be accepted as a City patient.

I had in mind. Should the treatment prave successful, we could offer to pay his hospitalization and not for the treatment, that is, we can reimberse the city for his maintenance at the hospital.

His throat however is still raw and sore and only able to swellow soft foods.

I make at least weekly calls to see him and when able I call on him twice each week. I think the above gives you a clear understanding of the situation and from time to time I will write and keep you informed.

CHICAGO, Oct. 28 (INS).—For the world's most dreaded disease—cancer—there is no medicinal cure in sight.

Blasting and debunking all the recently announced "cancer cures," Dr. J. P. Lockhart-Mummery of London, internationally known cancer authority and directing head of the British Empire cancer campaign, today flatly declared:

"There is no hope at present time for the development of a cure, and there is no treatment for cancer, aside from operation and radium. By operations and radium rays when the malignant disease is in its early stages, some

types of cancer can be eliminated."

He said one in every seven persons is a sufferer of cancer.

"There probably always will be quack remedies," Dr. Lockhart-Mummery declared. "The trouble is that people who are suffering from cancer jump at anything that looks like it might be a cure."


Asked to comment on the possibility of future cures, the British surgeon replied:







As I have informed you in my other letters, I makenit a point to call and see Harry at least once a week and on several occasions I have gone there within three or four days of my previous visit, therefore, soon after receiving your letter of the 30th. wherein, you offered at \$200 to be used in his behalf, I called on Harry and informed him of your generous offer and suggested that he return to the Queens Bospital or the St. Francis. His answer was that helmould rather remain at the City Hospital because he was receiving the best of care and many of his old cronies are also patients in the same ward, consequently he has agreeable company.

I am also in touch with Dr, Mossman almost three or four times each week by telephone so I am well posted from that end also. I informed the doctor that I had received money from you and I also conveyed your ideas as to moving him to the St Francis. I also told him that I endeavored to get Harry to move but was unable to get him to agree to the change, so would leave it with him to do what he could in having Harry consent to the change.

Father Valentine calls on me quite often. He calls for his mail almost daily and steps in to so me in passing. He told me he had heard from you, but thought Harry would be better off where he is due to the company he has. In looking over the proposed draft of a new lease for Lots, 126, 127, and 128 Waialae-Nui Farm Lots, I find a clause, "That be will not keep, nor permit to be kept, any dairy cattle, nor operate or permit to be operated any dairy on the demised premises, nor permit or suffer charcoal etc." if this remains as one of the terms of the new lease with me and the same is enforced, you would place a rather unpleasant hardship upon me, provided, we accept Websters definition of the word dairy.

I have an investment of at least \$20,000 in buildings and equipment on the three above mentioned lots and as a part of the main building, which I use as my residence, is a MILK ROOM equipped with a cream separator etc. Butter is also made in this room, but, for home use only.

On Lot #128 I have a milking shed of sufficient size to accommodate 7 to 8 come and I do not intend to enlarge this shed.

I am not in the regular milk business for profit, but, I do sell silk indirectly. I reise ailk fed poultry and pigs and naturally I send them to market.

I presume you are endeavoring to prevent the rejetition of the over stocking of the land with cows as in the case of Matsucka and the Costas.

I believe, you have fully protected your interests in the following clause: "That he will, during the whole of the said tell, keep the said premises in a strictly clean and sanitary condition and observe and perform all the laws, ordinances, rules and regulations relating to health and saitation for the time being applicable to the said premises; etc. etc."

In view of the fact, that I have for the past 14 years, as one of your tenants, complied in every respect with the City Ordinances and Rules and Regulations of the Board of Health, and there is no reason to believe that I will do otherwise in the future, therefore, I see no neadofor the double restraint on the same matter, and therefore, I respectfully request that the clause refering to dairy cattle be deleted.
