

CORRECTION TO THE **1990 CENSUS STF3 PROFILES**

The correct Honolulu CDP profile should be a combination of three profiles in this set – Honolulu, Aliamanu and Fort Shafter CDPs.

The original Honolulu CDP was erroneously split into three separate CDPs in the 1990 Census. A correction to this error was made, but these profiles were not revised.

Use the PDF file currently open and add data from the other two CDPs to obtain the correct Honolulu CDP profile. Some computed items, however, will not be available for the combined area, i.e. household median income.

The profiles for Aliamanu CDP and Fort Shafter CDP should not be used separately. The data should only be used to produce the correct Honolulu CDP profile.
