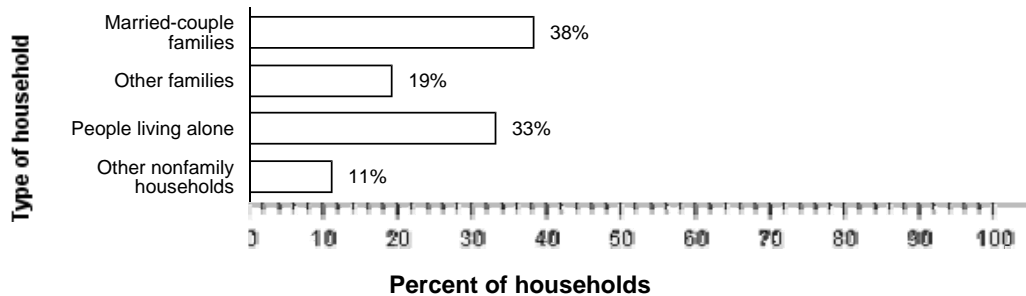
NOTE. HOUSEHOLDS AND FAMILIES: In 2005-2009 there were 11,000 households in State House District 26. The average household size was 2.4 people.

Families made up 57 percent of the households in State House District 26. This figure includes both married-couple families (38 percent) and other families (19 percent). Nonfamily households made up 43 percent of all households in State House District 26. Most of the nonfamily households were people living alone, but some were composed of people living in households in which no one was related to the householder.

The Types of Households in State House District 26, Hawaii in 2005-2009

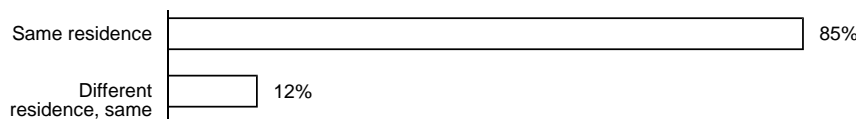


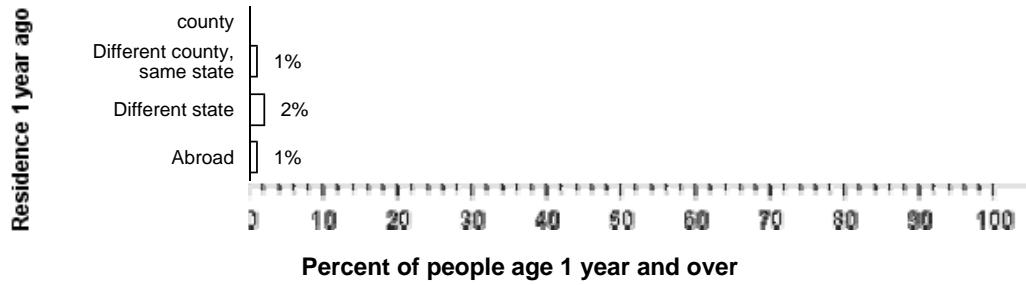

NATIVITY AND LANGUAGE: Fifteen percent of the people living in State House District 26 in 2005-2009 were foreign born. Eighty-five percent was native. Among people at least five years old living in State House District 26 in 2005-2009, 25 percent spoke a language other than English at home. Of those speaking a language other than English at home, 6 percent spoke Spanish and 94 percent spoke some other language; 45 percent reported that they did not speak English "very well."

GEOGRAPHIC MOBILITY: In 2005-2009, 85 percent of the people at least one year old living in State House District 26 were living in the same residence one year earlier; 12 percent had moved during the past year from another residence in the same county, 1 percent from another county in the same state, 2 percent from another state, and 1 percent from abroad.

Geographic Mobility of Residents of State House District 26, Hawaii in 2005-2009



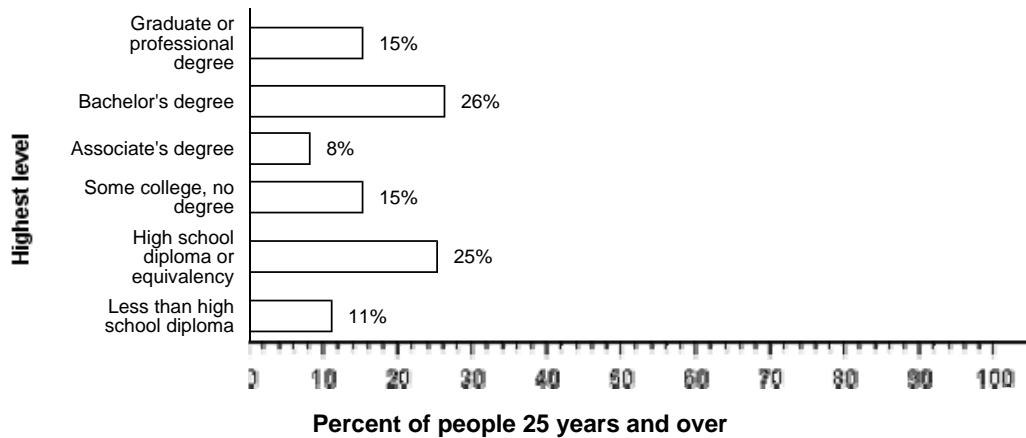

EDUCATION: In 2005-2009, 89 percent of people 25 years and over had at least graduated from high school and 41 percent had a bachelor's degree or higher. Eleven percent were dropouts; they were not enrolled in school and had not graduated from high school.

The total school enrollment in State House District 26 was 4,900 in 2005-2009. Nursery school and kindergarten enrollment was 460 and elementary or high school enrollment was 2,400 children. College or graduate school enrollment was 2,000.

The Educational Attainment of People in State House District 26, Hawaii in 2005-2009

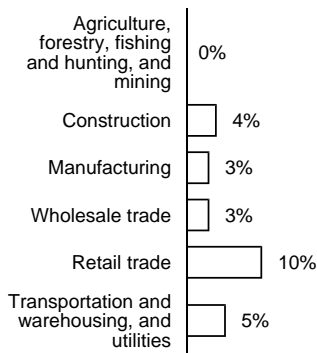


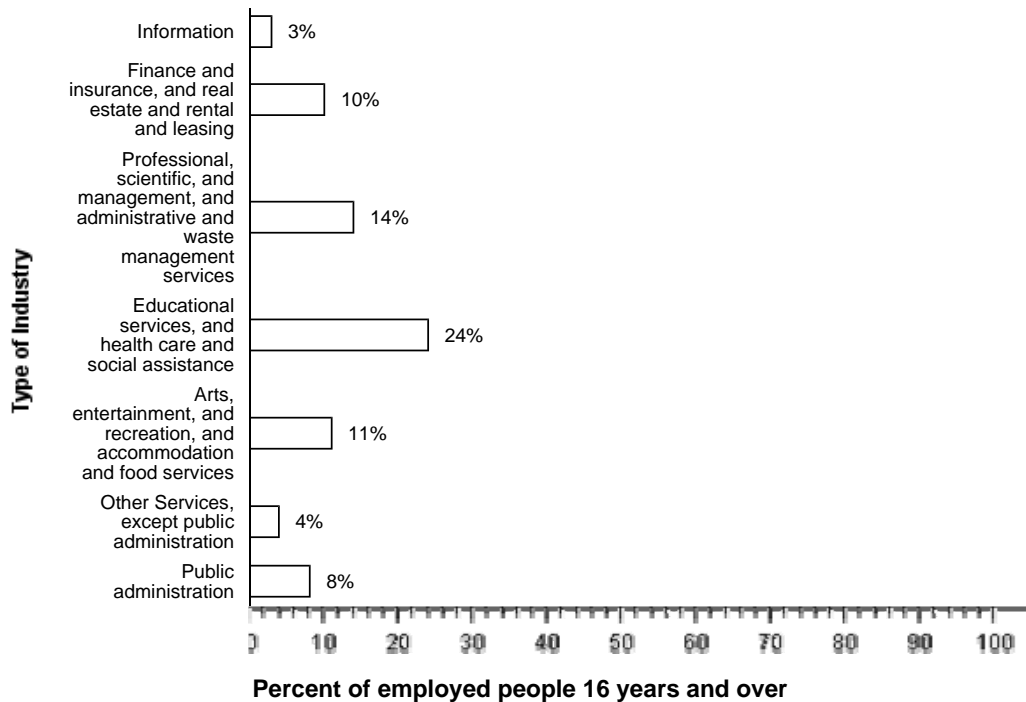

DISABILITY: In State House District 26, among people at least five years old in 2005-2009, percent reported a disability. The likelihood of having a disability varied by age - from percent of people 5 to 15 years old, to percent of people 16 to 64 years old, and to percent of those 65 and older.

INDUSTRIES: In 2005-2009, for the employed population 16 years and older, the leading industries in State House District 26 were Educational services, and health care, and social assistance, 24 percent, and Professional, scientific, and management, and administrative and waste management services, 14 percent.

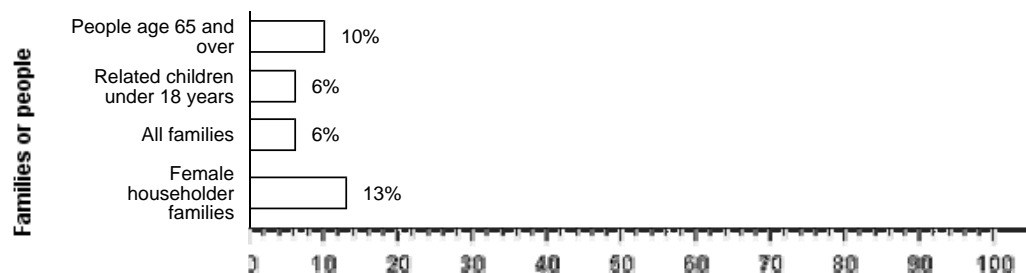
OCCUPATIONS AND TYPE OF EMPLOYER: Among the most common occupations were: Management, professional, and related occupations, 44 percent; Sales and office occupations, 25 percent; Service occupations, 18 percent; Production, transportation, and material moving occupations, 7 percent; and Construction, extraction, maintenance, and repair occupations, 6 percent. Seventy-three percent of the people employed were Private wage and salary workers; 20 percent was Federal, state, or local government workers; and 7 percent was Self-employed in own not incorporated business workers.

TRAVEL TO WORK: Sixty-three percent of State House District 26 workers drove to work alone in 2005-2009, 15 percent carpooled, 8 percent took public transportation, and 10 percent used other means. The remaining 3 percent worked at home. Among those who commuted to work, it took them on average 19.8 minutes to get to work.

INCOME: The median income of households in State House District 26 was \$62,746. Eighty percent of the households received earnings and 23 percent received retirement income other than Social Security. Thirty-four percent of the households received Social Security. The average income from Social Security was \$15,271. These income sources are not mutually exclusive; that is, some households received income from more than one source.

POVERTY AND PARTICIPATION IN GOVERNMENT PROGRAMS: In 2005-2009, 8 percent of people were in poverty. Six percent of related children under 18 were below the poverty level, compared with 10 percent of people 65 years old and over. Six percent of all families and 13 percent of families with a female householder and no husband present had incomes below the poverty level.

Poverty Rates in State House District 26, Hawaii in 2005-2009

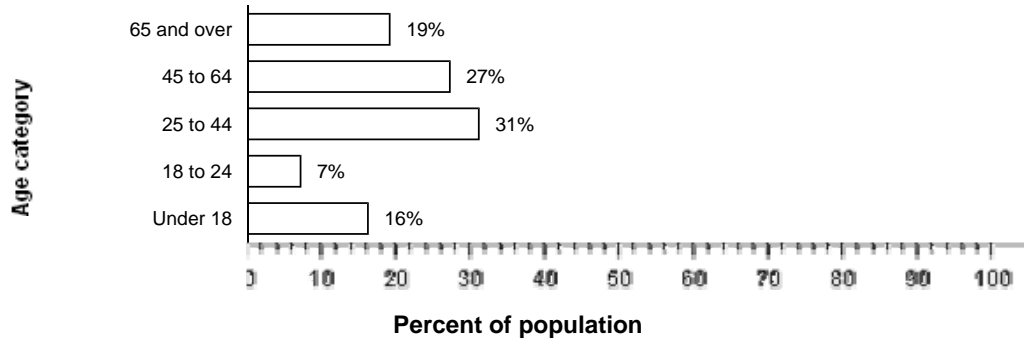


Percent below poverty level

POPULATION OF State House District 26: In 2005-2009, State House District 26 had a total population of 25,000 - 12,000 (49 percent) females and 13,000 (51 percent) males. The median age was 42.5 years. Sixteen percent of the population was under 18 years and 19 percent was 65 years and older.

The Age Distribution of People in State House District 26, Hawaii in 2005-2009

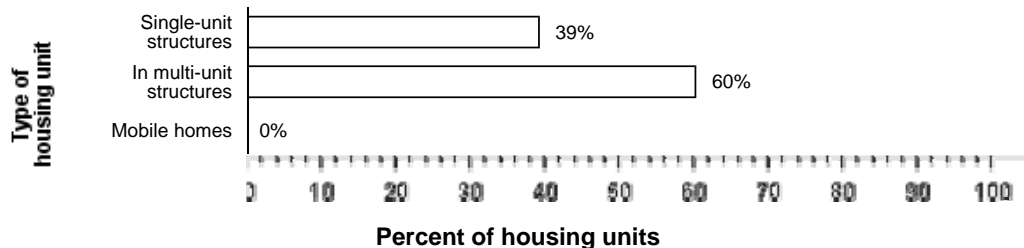

For people reporting one race alone, 22 percent was White; 1 percent was Black or African American; less than 0.5 percent was American Indian and Alaska Native; 47 percent was Asian; 10 percent was Native Hawaiian and Other Pacific Islander, and 1 percent was Some other race. Nineteen percent reported Two or more races. Five percent of the people in State House District 26 was Hispanic. Twenty percent of the people in State House District 26 was White non-Hispanic. People of Hispanic origin may be of any race.

HOUSING CHARACTERISTICS: In 2005-2009, State House District 26 had a total of 11,000 housing units, 6 percent of which were vacant. Of the total housing units, 39 percent was in single-unit structures, 60 percent was in multi-unit structures, and less than 0.5 percent was mobile homes. Ten percent of the housing units were built since 1990.

The Types of Housing Units in State House District 26, Hawaii in 2005-2009

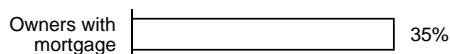


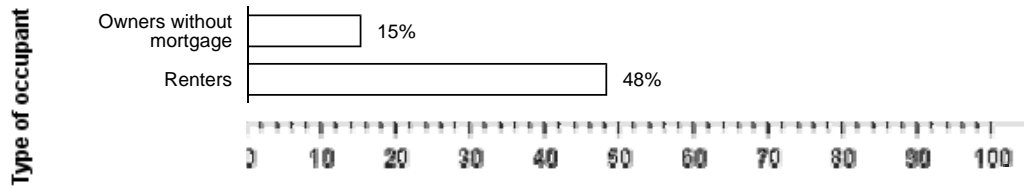

OCCUPIED HOUSING UNIT CHARACTERISTICS: In 2005-2009, State House District 26 had 11,000 occupied housing units - 5,400 (51 percent) owner occupied and 5,300 (49 percent) renter occupied. Five percent of the households did not have telephone service and 9 percent of the households did not have access to a car, truck, or van for private use. Twenty-six percent had two vehicles and another 12 percent had three or more.

HOUSING COSTS: The median monthly housing costs for mortgaged owners was \$2,040, nonmortgaged owners \$465, and renters \$1,202. Thirty-five percent of owners with mortgages, 15 percent of owners without mortgages, and 48 percent of renters in State House District 26 spent 30 percent or more of household income on housing.
