# 2012 American Community Survey 1-Year Estimates for the 

## State of Hawaii

The U.S. Census Bureau released data from its American Community Survey (ACS) for 2012 on September 19, 2013.

The Census Bureau releases 1-year data for areas with a population size of 65,000 and above due to sample size issues. About 2.0\% of Hawaii’s population was surveyed during 2012.

This 1-year ACS data contains information by the new $113^{\text {th }}$ Congressional Districts and by the new Public Use Microdata Areas (PUMAs). PUMAs have populations of 100,000 people or more and there are 8 of these subcounty areas on the island of Oahu, such as the "Ewa" PUMA and the "Nuuanu to Waikiki" PUMA.

The following are facts found in the 2012 ACS survey. Key state level data for Hawaii are available in the ranking tables such as household income, poverty, and insurance coverage. County and PUMA data follow the ranking tables.

## Hawaii's Ranking in the Nation (including Washington D.C.) (Table 1):

Looking at the population and housing characteristics and comparing them with other states in the nation, Hawaii continues to have the following trends:

More Asians: Hawaii ranked \#1 in terms of percentage of Asian population. 38.2 percent of Hawaii’s population said that they were Asian race only (selected only one racial group) in 2012 versus 5.0 percent for the nation as a whole. Our state also ranked the highest for percentage of foreign-born people born in Asia, at 77.7\%.

More Native Hawaiians and Other Pacific Islanders: Hawaii had the highest percentage of people that were Native Hawaiians and Other Pacific Islanders race only in the nation: 10.4 percent for Hawaii versus 0.2 percent for the nation in 2012.

More mixed population: Hawaii ranked \#1 in the percentage of mixed racial population at 23.3 percent compared with 2.9 percent for the nation as a whole.

Higher household size: The average household size of 3.01 persons placed Hawaii 2nd highest in the nation.
More households with elderly person: The percentage of households with one or more people 65 years and over was 31.1 and our state ranked \#2 in the nation. Not surprisingly, we also ranked high in the nation at \#2 for percent of households with retirement income. The percentage of our households receiving retirement income was 23.1.

More multigenerational households: Our state ranked the highest in the U.S. for percent of households that were multigenerational at $8.1 \%$.

Less grandparents responsible for their grandchildren: Hawaii was third from the bottom for percentage of grandparents living with grandchildren who are responsible for their grandchildren. Hawaii had 27.7\% of our households in this category.

Higher use of public transportation or car pool: Hawaii ranked \#1 in percentage of workers using carpool to go to work, with $15.3 \%$ of our workers in this category. Hawaii ranked \#7 in the nation for proportion of workers who travel to work by public transportation with $6.7 \%$ of our workers using this type of transportation.

More people work in the service sector: Hawaii ranked \#2 in the nation in percentage of workers working in the service occupations with $23.1 \%$ of our workers in this category. Nevada was the top state in this category.

Higher value of real property: Hawaii's median housing value was $\$ 496,600$ in 2012, ranking the highest in the nation, with Washington D.C. right below our state at $\$ 460,700$. The national median housing value in 2012 was $\$ 171,900$.

Lower homeownership: Hawaii's homeownership of 56.9 percent in 2012 was among the bottom 5 areas (including D.C.). Washington D.C. had the lowest homeownership at 41.5 percent. New York State was the $2^{\text {nd }}$ lowest at 53.7 percent; California was the $3^{\text {rd }}$ lowest at 54.0 percent; and Nevada the $4^{\text {th }}$ lowest at 54.9 percent.

Higher cost of living: Hawaii's median monthly housing costs for renters of \$1,379 in 2012 placed Hawaii as $\# 1$ in the nation. The U.S. median renter cost was $\$ 884$ per month. Hawaii homeowner's monthly housing cost of $\$ 2,244$ in 2012 was the 3rd highest in the nation. Our state also ranked high for proportion of income spent on housing. The percentage of mortgaged owners spending 30 percent or more of household income on selected monthly owner costs was the highest in the nation, with 47.9 percent in this category. For percentage of renter-occupied units spending 30 percent or more of household income on rent and utilities, Hawaii was ranked $5^{\text {th }}$, with 50.3 percent in this category.

More people per room: With the U.S. having $3.3 \%$ of its occupied housing units with 1.01 or more occupants per room, Hawaii stood out in this category ranking \#1 in the nation at $8.6 \%$.

Higher health insurance coverage: 6.9\% of Hawaii residents didn’t have health insurance coverage in 2012. In other words, $93.1 \%$ of Hawaii residents were covered by health insurance ranking Hawaii the 4th place in the nation. In terms of health insurance coverage for children, $96.5 \%$ of Hawaii’s children were covered, ranking 5th place in the nation in 2012.

## County Economic Characteristics (Table 2):

- Hawaii County had the highest civilian unemployment rate in 2012 at $8.6 \%$, while Honolulu County has the lowest civilian unemployment rate at $6.6 \%$. Maui County's civilian unemployment rate was $8.1 \%$ and Kauai County had a civilian unemployment rate of $7.4 \%$ in 2012.
- Honolulu County had the highest median household income at $\$ 71,404$ in 2012. Hawaii County had the lowest median household income at $\$ 50,285$. Kauai County's median household income was $\$ 59,238$ while Maui County had a median household income of $\$ 61,207$.
- Honolulu County also had the highest median family income at $\$ 82,557$ in 2012 and Hawaii County had the lowest median family income at $\$ 59,247$. Maui County's median family income was $\$ 71,311$ and Kauai County's median family income was $\$ 70,535$.
- In terms of per capita income, Honolulu County also ranked the highest at $\$ 29,187$, followed by Maui County at $\$ 27,462$ and Kauai County at $\$ 25,665$. Hawaii County had the lowest per capita income at \$23,892.
- Honolulu County had the highest health insurance coverage in 2012 at $94.2 \%$, followed by Hawaii County at $90.8 \%$, Maui County at $90.6 \%$, and Kauai County at $90.5 \%$.
- The poverty rate was the lowest in Honolulu County and Maui County where $10.3 \%$ of the county's residents were under the poverty level in 2012, while Hawaii County had the highest poverty rate at $19.2 \%$. The remaining Kauai County had a poverty rate of $11.0 \%$.


## County Housing Characteristics (Table 3):

- Hawaii County had the highest homeownership at $66.1 \%$ in 2012, followed by Kauai County at $64.6 \%$. Maui County had a homeownership rate of $57.1 \%$, while Honolulu County had the lowest homeownership at 54.4\%.
- Median housing value for owner-occupied units was the highest on Oahu at \$563,600 in 2012, followed by Maui County at $\$ 478,900$. Median housing value on Kauai was $\$ 447,000$ while Hawaii County had the lowest median housing value at \$297,900 per unit in 2012.
- Median housing cost for owners with a mortgage was the highest in Honolulu County at $\$ 2,373$ per month in 2012, followed by Maui County at $\$ 2,325$ per month, Kauai County at $\$ 2,177$, and Hawaii County at $\$ 1,678$ per month. Oahu renters paid the highest rent in 2012 at a median of $\$ 1,483$ per month, followed by Maui County renters at $\$ 1,241$ per month, Kauai County renters at $\$ 1,186$, and Hawaii County renters with the lowest rent at $\$ 1,027$ per month.


## Small Area Statistics (Table 4):

- By PUMA (Public Use Microdata Area, defined by the Census Bureau with 100,000 people as the threshold), Rural Oahu had the highest unemployment rate at $11.8 \%$ in 2012, followed by Ewa and the neighbor islands areas. The East Honolulu to Kapahulu area had the lowest unemployment rate at 4.5\%.
- East Honolulu to Kapahulu also had the highest per capita income at \$39,950 in 2012, while Rural Oahu had the lowest per capita income at \$19,283.


## Small Area Statistics (Table 4) (cont.):

- Residents in the Moanalua to Pearl City area and the Koolaupoko area had the highest health insurance coverage at $96.1 \%$, while the neighbor islands had lower health insurance coverage at near $91 \%$.
- Poverty rates were higher in Rural Oahu and Hawaii County compared with other small areas, with rates of $19.6 \%$ and $19.2 \%$ respectively.
- Homeownership was the highest in the East Honolulu to Kapahulu area at $68.5 \%$ while the Tantulus to Waikiki area had the lowest home ownership at $34.7 \%$.
- Median home value was the highest in East Honolulu to Kapahulu at $\$ 791,000$ and lowest in Hawaii County at \$297,900 in 2012.
