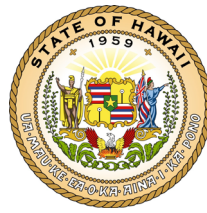

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# Introduction

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*Occupational Employment and Wages in Hawaii, 2020* is published annually through a federal/state cooperative agreement between the U.S. Department of Labor, Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) and the Hawaii State Department of Business, Economic Development & Tourism. It contains employment and wage estimates for occupations derived from the Occupational Employment & Wage Statistics (OEWS) survey.

The OEWS survey solicited information from a sample of approximately 6,000 establishments throughout Hawaii in six consecutive semi-annual panels:

- May 2020
- November 2019, May 2019
- November 2018, May 2018
- November 2017

For more information about the OEWS survey, refer to the technical notes section of this report. The survey definitions and concepts are included at the end of this publication.

Every state conducts the OEWS survey following the same guidelines and BLS produces national

employment and wage estimates. Therefore, data can be compared to the U.S. as well as other states. This report includes estimates for the State of Hawaii, Honolulu MSA, Maui MSA, Hawaii County, and Kauai County. BLS also publishes State and MSA data, but they do not publish County data. States use the Local Employment and Wage Information System (LEWIS) to produce employment and wage estimates for the counties. LEWIS was developed in North Carolina in cooperation with BLS and is currently maintained in Utah.

Wage data is one of the most frequently requested information and can be used in different ways. Jobseekers, employers, educational planners, workforce analysts, economists, and others use the information to formulate business economic policy, identify types of skilled workers needed, and structure training programs and vocational curriculum. The employment staffing patterns are used to project occupational employment. In addition, OEWS data are used to compute wages for the Foreign Labor Certification (FLC) program. However, employers should not use data in this publication as the prevailing wage for any FLC applications. # Effects of COVID-19 Pandemic on OEWS, May 2020

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Due to features of the Occupational Employment and Wage Statistics (OEWS) methodology, the May 2020 estimates do not fully reflect the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic. Estimates for a given reference period are based on a sample of 6,000 business establishments collected in six semiannual panels for three consecutive years. Each year, two new semiannual survey panels are added, and the two oldest panels are dropped. Older panel wage data are aged to reflect the reference date of the estimates, and employment data are benchmarked to reflect known employment for the average of the two most recent panels. Using six data panels to produce each set of estimates allows data to be produced at very detailed levels of occupation, geography, and industry, but also means that sudden changes in staffing patterns or wages are reflected in the OEWS estimates only gradually.

The May 2020 employment and wage estimates were calculated using data collected in the May 2020, November 2019, May 2019, November 2018, May 2018, and November 2017 semiannual panels. Because five of the six survey panels used to produce the estimates date from before the COVID-19 pandemic, only the most recent (May 2020) survey panel would reflect changes in occupational proportions related to the COVID-19 pandemic.

The employment from the six panels has been benchmarked to the average of the November 2019

and May 2020 employment from the Quarterly Census of Employment and Wages (QCEW) for each industry/area cell. The November 2019 QCEW employment data precede the COVID-19 pandemic, and therefore do not reflect the effects of the pandemic. The May 2020 QCEW data reflect the early employment effects of the COVID-19 pandemic. Because the OEWS employment estimates are benchmarked to the average of QCEW employment for November 2019 and May 2020, the estimates will reflect only part of the pandemic's impact on employment as of May 2020.

As a result of the pandemic, response rates for the November 2019 and May 2020 panels were lower in some areas. This is due to the timing of attempts to collect data from employers during the months following both reference dates. Lower response rates may negatively affect data availability and data quality. To minimize the impact, a supplemental nonresponse follow-up mailing and additional targeted nonresponse follow-up were conducted.

To reduce follow-up questions from sampled establishments, the program made changes on the data collection website to clarify that establishments where all employees were working remotely, or were not working but received pay, should report their employment and wage data.

# Highlights

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- In May 2020, Hawaii's hourly median wage was \$22.44. All areas of Hawaii have remained over the national median (\$20.17) except for Hawaii County (\$19.52).
- The largest major occupational group in Hawaii was office and administrative services (\$20.02) with 12.7 percent of total employment, followed by food preparation and serving related occupations (\$16.14) with 11.5 percent.
- Retail salespersons had the highest employment in Hawaii (20,500), accounting for 3.6 percent of total employment. Fast food and counter workers were next with 15,750 or 2.7 percent of the total.
- Management (\$48.13) and healthcare practitioners (\$46.00) remained the highest paid occupational groups in Hawaii, while the lowest-earning occupations fell under food preparation and serving (\$16.14), sales (\$15.92), and personal care (\$14.71).
- The highest paid occupation in Hawaii was nurse anesthetists with a median hourly wage of \$94.80, followed by dentists with \$83.81.
- The building and grounds cleaning and maintenance group still held the highest location quotient for the State (1.81) indicating a higher concentration of employment in Hawaii compared to the nation. Conversely, the production group had the lowest (0.38) location quotient.

# Occupational Employment and Wages in Hawaii

*Hawaii's estimated employment in May 2020 was 574,010 with a median hourly wage of \$22.44. At this time, the state's minimum wage was \$10.10.*

## Major Occupational Groups

Hawaii's estimated employment in May 2020 was 574,010, with a median hourly wage of \$22.44 (Figure 1).

Of the 22 major occupational groups, office and administrative support occupations accounted for the largest share of Hawaii's jobs with 12.7 percent (or 72,700) and had a median hourly wage of \$20.02. The largest detailed occupation was general office clerks with 12,150 employees, followed by secretaries and administrative assistants (8,730), then customer service representatives (8,070). The occupations with the highest hourly median wage within the office and administrative support group were executive secretaries (\$31.95), postal service clerks (\$30.28), and postal service mail carriers (\$30.21).

The next largest occupational group was food preparation and serving related occupations with

66,100 employees who earned a median hourly wage of \$16.14. Within this group, fast food and counter workers had the largest total employment of 15,750, followed by waiters and waitresses (13,590) and food preparation workers (7,920). The jobs with the highest median pay were chefs and head cooks (\$32.00), bartenders (\$28.56), and waiters and waitresses (\$28.43). At the lower end of the wage scale were fast food and counter workers (\$12.45) and all other food preparation and serving related workers (\$12.06).

The top five occupational groups with the highest median hourly wage included: management; healthcare practitioners and technicians; architecture and engineering; computer and mathematical; and legal. Although these groups had the highest wage they accounted for a smaller share of employment in the state.

## Comparison to United States

Hawaii's median wage of \$22.44 per hour was 11.3 percent higher than the national average of \$20.17 per hour. Hawaii's median earnings exceeded the U.S. wages in 15 out of the 22 major occupational groups, highlighted in green in Table 1.

The top paid groups in Hawaii were management with a median hourly wage of \$48.13, healthcare

practitioners/technical earning \$46.00, and architecture and engineering occupations receiving \$40.36 an hour. However, food preparation and serving (\$16.14), sales (\$15.92) and personal care (\$14.71) were the lowest paying groups.

The construction industry had the greatest percent difference of 46.7 percent. Construction workers

locally earned \$34.29 per hour compared to \$23.37 nationally, a \$10.92 difference.

The wage for healthcare practitioners and technical workers in Hawaii (\$46.00) surpassed the nation’s (\$33.59) with the highest numerical difference of \$12.41 and second largest percent difference of 36.9 percent.

The national median hourly wage for computer and mathematical workers was \$43.92, a -\$5.23 difference to Hawaii’s wage (\$38.69), followed by legal occupations (-\$4.71 difference).

## Location Quotient

The location quotients for the major occupational groups in Hawaii as compared to the nation are displayed in Figure 2. If this ratio is greater than one, it indicates the occupation has a higher share of employment than the U.S. A location quotient less than one means the occupation is less prevalent in Hawaii than the nation.

In Hawaii, the following occupational groups had

the highest location quotients: building, grounds cleaning, and maintenance group (1.81); food preparation and serving (1.42); protective service (1.37); and personal care and service (1.35).

The occupational groups with the lowest location quotients were: farming, fishing, and forestry (0.76); computer and mathematical (0.58); and production (0.38).

## Largest Occupations

Hawaii's top 20 detailed occupations with the largest estimated employment in 2020 are shown in Table 2. Retail salespersons is by far the largest occupation in Hawaii with 20,500 employees or 3.6 percent of total employment. Both retail salespersons and cashiers, another sales job which ranked fifth largest, earned \$14.80 and \$13.31, respectively.

The second largest occupation was fast food and counter workers with 15,750 employees, with a 2.7 percent share of total employment, and a median hourly wage of \$12.45. Another food preparation and serving job, waiters and waitresses earned \$28.43 an hour (including tips), which continued to top national earnings of \$11.42.

Of the top 20 largest detailed occupations, only five had median hourly wages above the statewide average of \$22.44: waiters and waitresses (\$28.43); registered nurses (\$53.08); general and operations managers (\$48.67); supervisors of office and administrative support workers (\$27.96); and general maintenance and repair workers (\$23.29). This shows that many of Hawaii's workers are employed in below-average paying jobs. However, Hawaii's median hourly wages exceeded national earnings in all occupations except general and operations managers and supervisors of office and administrative support workers.

## Highest Paid Occupations

The top 20 occupations with the highest pay in Hawaii (Table 3) typically fell under two major groups – healthcare practitioners and management. Healthcare practitioners accounted for seven occupations on this list, and there were five management occupations.

Hawaii reported higher median hourly wages in 15 of the 20 listed occupations compared to the United States. Between the first (nurse anesthetists, \$94.80) and the last (power distributors and

dispatchers, \$53.16) job titles listed, there was a \$41.64 difference in pay. Farmers, ranchers, and other agricultural managers in Hawaii (\$63.97) showed the greatest difference in pay of \$31.24 when compared nationally (\$32.73)

## MSA and County Employment and Wages

Honolulu MSA's median wage of \$23.23 was 3.5 percent higher than the state hourly rate (Figure 3). Workers in Kauai County received the next highest hourly rate of \$21.97, followed by Maui MSA earning \$21.21, and Hawaii County taking home the lowest wage of \$19.52. All areas of Hawaii have remained over the national median of \$20.17 except for Hawaii County.

Figure 3. Median Hourly Wage for Hawaii State, MSA, and County, May 2020

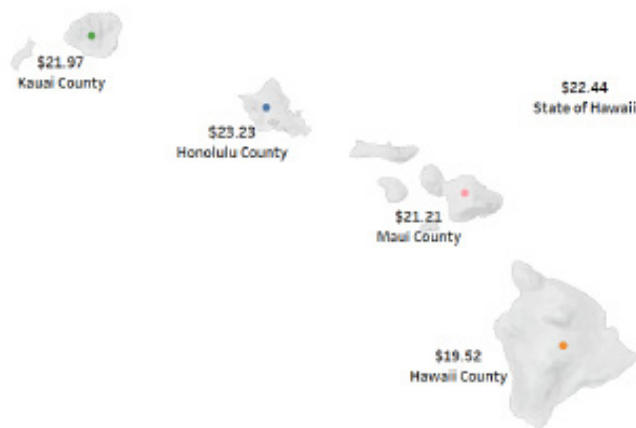

# Technical Notes

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The OEWS survey is funded by the Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) and the State of Hawaii. BLS provides the procedures and technical support, draws the sample, and produces survey materials, while the State Workforce Agencies (SWAs) collect most of the data. Cross-industry estimates for the nation, states, metropolitan statistical areas (MSAs), and nonmetropolitan area levels are produced. BLS releases cross-industry estimates at all levels.

## Scope of Survey

The OEWS survey is a semiannual mail survey measuring occupational employment and wage rates for all full- and part-time wage and salary workers in nonfarm establishments. The estimates use the 2017 North American Industry Classification System (NAICS). Surveys collect data for the payroll period including the 12th of May or November. They do not cover the self-employed, owners and partners in unincorporated firms, private household workers, or unpaid family workers. It also excludes the majority of the agricultural sector, with the exception of logging (NAICS 113310), support activities for crop production (NAICS 1151), and support activities for animal production (NAICS 1152). The OEWS survey samples and contacts approximately 1,000 establishments in May and November of each year. In the course of a three-year survey cycle, over 6,000 establishments are contacted with a minimum 75 percent response rate. While

estimates can be made from one or two years of data, the three-year sample allows the production of estimates at finer levels of geographic, industrial, and occupational detail.

The state Unemployment Insurance (UI) file provides the universe from which the OEWS survey draws its sample. Supplemental sources are used for rail transportation (NAICS 4821) because they do not report to the UI program. The sample is stratified by metropolitan and nonmetropolitan area, industry, and size. The 2000 Metropolitan Statistical Area standards were used to define the metropolitan areas. To provide the most occupational coverage, larger employers are more likely to be selected than smaller employers. An annual census is taken of the executive branch of the federal government, the U.S. Postal Service, and state and local governments. The OEWS survey collects wage data for 12 contiguous non-overlapping wage intervals, rather than in exact dollar amounts. The uppermost interval (interval L) is open-ended. Solicitation letters and forms are sent to all sampled establishments. In addition, two other mailings were made to non-respondents at one-month intervals and a third follow-up mailing was made to establishments that had less than 50 employees. Responses were obtained through the mail, internet, email, and telephone calls.

The OEWS survey categorizes workers into approximately 800 detailed occupations based on the Office of Management and Budget's Standard

Occupational Classification (SOC) system, which is used by all federal statistical agencies for reporting occupational data. These detailed occupations make up 22 of the 23 major occupational groups. Major group 55, Military-Specific Occupations, is not included. For more information about the SOC, see the Bureau of Labor Statistics web site at <https://www.bls.gov/soc/>. The OEWS program provides occupational employment and wage estimates at the major group and detailed occupation level.

The May 2020 OEWS estimates use a hybrid of the 2010 and 2018 SOC Systems. For more information on the hybrid classification system, please see the “Changes and special procedures in the May 2020 estimates” section of this technical note.

### **Estimation Methodology**

The OEWS survey produces estimates by combining six panels of data collected over a three-year period. This methodology was designed to provide significant reductions in sampling error. In particular, the combined data producing estimates at detailed levels of geography, industry, and occupation with a reasonable degree of reliability.

*Wage Updating.* Significant reductions in sampling errors are obtained by combining six panels of data, particularly for small geographic areas and occupations. Wages for the current panel need no adjustment. However, wages in the five previous panels need to be updated to the current panel’s reference period.

The OEWS program uses the BLS Employment Cost Index (ECI) to adjust survey data from prior panels before combining them with the current panel’s data. The wage updating procedure adjusts each detailed occupation’s wage rate, as measured in the earlier panel, according to the average movement of its broader occupational division.

*Imputation.* Some establishments do not respond for a given panel. For most employers, a “nearest neighbor” hot deck imputation procedure is used to impute missing occupational employment totals. A variant of mean imputation is used to impute missing wage distributions. In some cases, data for nonrespondents are available from earlier panels. In those cases, the older data may be used and aged to represent the current reference period.

*Weighting and benchmarking.* The sampled establishments are weighted to represent all establishments for the reference period. Weights are further adjusted by the ratio of employment totals (the average of November 2019 and May 2020 employment) from the BLS Quarterly Census of Employment and Wages (QCEW) to employment totals from the OEWS survey.

### **Reliability of the Estimates**

The occupational wage rates in this report are estimates derived from a sample survey. Two types of errors are possible in an estimate based on a sample survey - sampling error and non-sampling error. Sampling error occurs because observations are based on a sample, not on the entire



population. Non-sampling error occurs because of response, non-response, and operational errors during the survey process. Examples of non-sampling error include receiving incorrect data from the respondent, entering data into the database incorrectly, and processing data improperly. Sampling error is measurable; non-sampling error is not. A statistic known as relative standard error (RSE) is used to measure sampling error. It is the ratio of an estimate's standard error to the estimate itself.

Because the survey includes only wage and salary-type compensation, hourly earnings for some occupations may not be accurately reflected. For example, apartment managers often receive rent-free housing. In addition, years of experience and professional levels, apprentices and journeymen, new and experienced workers, and union and non-union workers are not usually distinguished in the OEWS survey questionnaire.

### **Changes and Special Procedures in the May 2020 Estimates**

Due to features of the OEWS methodology, the May 2020 estimates do not fully reflect the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic. Because five of the six survey panels used to produce the estimates date from before the COVID-19 pandemic, only the most recent (May 2020) survey panel will reflect changes in occupational proportions related to the pandemic.

In addition, because the OEWS employment esti-

mates are benchmarked to the average of QCEW employment for November 2019 and May 2020, the estimates will reflect only part of the pandemic's impact on employment as of May 2020. Although the May 2020 QCEW data includes the early employment effects of the COVID-19 pandemic, the November 2019 QCEW employment data precede the COVID-19 pandemic, and therefore do not reflect its impact.

As a result of the pandemic, response rates for the November 2019 and May 2020 panels were lower in some areas. Lower response rates may negatively affect data availability and data quality. *Hybrid Classification System.* With the May 2019 estimates, the OEWS program began implementing the 2018 SOC. Because the May 2019 estimates are based on a combination of survey data collected using the 2010 SOC and survey data collected using the 2018 SOC, these estimates use a hybrid of the two classification systems that contains some combinations of occupations that are not found in either the 2010 or 2018 SOC. These combinations may include occupations from more than one 2018 SOC minor group or broad occupation. Therefore, OEWS will not publish data for some 2018 SOC minor groups and broad occupations in the 2020 May estimates. The May 2021 estimates, to be published in Spring 2022, will be the first OEWS estimates based entirely on survey data collected

using the 2018 SOC.

In addition, the OEWS program has replaced some 2018 SOC detailed occupations with SOC broad occupations or OEWS-specific aggregations. These include home health aides and personal care aides for which OEWS will publish only the 2018 SOC broad occupation 31-1120 Home Health and Personal Care Aides.

### **Published Data**

This report provides occupational employment and wages for approximately 575 occupations in the State of Hawai'i, over 530 occupations in Honolulu MSA, and roughly 250 occupations in Maui County. ### **County Wages**

OEWS data for Hawaii and Kauai County are not published by BLS. Although the data are collected as part of the BLS OEWS survey guidelines, they are combined and released as 'Balance of State'. In order to produce estimates for these counties, the Local Employment and Wages Information System (LEWIS), developed by the North Carolina Department of Commerce in cooperation with the BLS and the OEWS Policy Council was used. Currently, LEWIS is maintained by the State of Utah Department of Technology Services.

# Survey Definitions and Concepts

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The following concepts and definitions are used in the OEWS Survey.

**Employment** is the number of persons employed in an occupation. It includes full-time or part-time employees; workers on paid vacations or other types of paid leave; salaried officers, executives, and staff members of incorporated firms; employees temporarily assigned to other units; and employees for whom the reporting unit is their permanent duty station regardless of whether that unit prepares their paycheck. Excluded are the self-employed, owners/partners of unincorporated firms, and unpaid family workers. Employees are reported in the occupation in which they are working, not necessarily for which they were trained.

**Occupational employment** represents an estimate of total wage and salary employment in an occupation across the industries in which it was surveyed. The data for specific occupations are collected from establishments within industries that are the predominant employers of labor in those occupations.

Employment **Relative Standard Error (RSE)** is a measure of the reliability or precision of the employment estimate. The relative standard error is defined as the ratio of the standard error to the survey estimate. For example, a relative standard error of 10 percent indicates that the standard error is one-tenth as large as the survey estimate.

An **establishment** is a physical location of a certain economic activity, for example, a factory, mine,

store, or office. Generally a single establishment produces a single good or provides a single service. An enterprise (a private firm, government, or non-profit organization) can consist of a single establishment or multiple establishments. A multi-establishment enterprise can have all of its establishments in one industry (i.e., a chain), or can have various establishments in different industries (i.e., a conglomerate).

**Metropolitan Statistical Area (MSA)** is an area consisting of a group of contiguous cities and towns, which contains at least one central city of 50,000 inhabitants or more, or a Census Bureau-defined urbanized area (of at least 50,000 inhabitants).

**SOC Code:** a six-digit Standard Occupational Classification code. Each of the 800+ detailed occupations used in the OEWS survey is categorized into one of 22 major occupational groups, designated by the first two digits of its SOC code:

- 11 Management
- 13 Business and Financial Operations
- 15 Computer and Mathematical
- 17 Architecture and Engineering
- 19 Life, Physical, and Social Science
- 21 Community and Social Services
- 23 Legal
- 25 Education, Training, and Library
- 27 Arts, Design, Entertainment, Sports, Media
- 29 Healthcare Practitioner and Technical
- 31 Healthcare Support
- 33 Protective Service
- 35 Food Preparation and Serving

- 37 Building & Grounds Cleaning & Maintenance
- 39 Personal Care and Service
- 41 Sales
- 43 Office and Administrative Support
- 45 Farming, Fishing, and Forestry
- 47 Construction and Extraction
- 49 Installation, Maintenance, and Repair
- 51 Production
- 53 Transportation and Material Moving

**Wages** for the OEWS survey are straight-time, gross pay, exclusive of premium pay. Included are base rate, cost-of-living allowances, guaranteed pay, hazardous-duty pay, incentive pay including commissions and production bonuses, tips, and on-call pay. Excluded are overtime pay, severance pay, shift differentials, non-production bonuses, employer cost for supplementary benefits, and tuition reimbursements.

**Annual Wage** estimates for most occupations in this release are calculated by multiplying the mean wage by a “year-round, full-time” hours figure of 2,080 hours per year (52 weeks by 40 hours). Thus, the annual wage estimates may not represent the actual annual pay received by the employee.

Some workers typically work less than 40 hours per week, year round. For these occupations, the OEWS survey collects and reports either the annual salary or the hourly wage rate, depending on how the occupation is typically paid, but not both. For example, teachers, flight attendants, and pilots may be paid an annual salary, but do not work the usual 2,080 hours per year. In this case, an annual salary is reported. Other workers, such as entertainment workers, are paid hourly rates, but generally do not work 40 hours per week, year round. For these workers, only an hourly wage is reported.

**Mean Hourly Wage** is the total wages that all workers in the occupation earn in an hour divided by the total employment of the occupation. To calculate the mean hourly wage of each occupation, total weighted hourly wages are summed across all intervals and divided by the occupation’s weighted survey employment.

**Median Wage** is the estimated 50th percentile of the distribution of wages based on data collected from employers in all industries; 50 percent of workers in an occupation earn wages below, and 50 percent earn wages above the median wage.
