## Introduction

Occupational Employment and Wages in Hawaii is published annually through a federal/state cooperative agreement between the U.S. Department of Labor, Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) and the Hawaii State Department of Business, Economic Development \& Tourism (DBEDT). It contains employment and wage estimates for occupations derived from the Occupational Employment \& Wage Statistics (OEWS) survey.

The OEWS survey solicited information from a sample of approximately 6,000 establishments throughout Hawaii in six consecutive semi-annual panels:

- May 2022
- November 2021, May 2021
- November 2020, May 2020
- November 2019

For more information about the OEWS survey, refer to the technical notes section of this report. The survey definitions and concepts are included at the end of this publication.

Every state conducts the OEWS survey following the same guidelines and BLS produces national
employment and wage estimates. Therefore, data can be compared to the U.S. as well as other states. This report includes estimates for the State of Hawaii, Honolulu MSA, Maui MSA, Hawaii County, and Kauai County. BLS also publishes State and MSA data, but they do not publish County data. States use the Local Employment and Wage Information System (LEWIS) to produce employment and wage estimates for the counties. LEWIS was developed in North Carolina in cooperation with BLS and is currently maintained in Utah.

Wage data is one of the most frequently requested information and can be used in different ways. Jobseekers, employers, educational planners, workforce analysts, economists, and others use the information to formulate business economic policy, identify types of skilled workers needed, and structure training programs and vocational curriculum. The employment staffing patterns are used to project occupational employment. In addition, OEWS data are used to compute wages for the Foreign Labor Certification (FLC) program. However, employers should not use data in this publication as the prevailing wage for any FLC applications. For more information about this program, see www.foreignlaborcert.doleta.gov/

- In May 2022, Hawaii's hourly median wage was $\$ 23.35$. This was $\$ 1.09$ higher than the national median wage of $\$ 22.26$. Among the four sub-state areas, Honolulu MSA had the highest median hourly wage (\$23.88), while Hawaii County had the lowest wage (\$21.73).
- The largest major occupational group in Hawaii was office and administrative services ( $\$ 21.67$ ) with 13.5 percent of total employment, followed by food preparation and serving related occupations ( $\$ 14.45$ ) with 12.5 percent.
- Fast food and counter workers had the highest employment in Hawaii $(20,340)$, accounting for 3.4 percent of total employment. Retail salespersons were next with 16,540 or 2.8 percent of the total.
- Management (\$48.85) and healthcare practitioners (\$47.86) continued to be the highest paid occupational groups in Hawaii, while the lowest-earning occupations fell under sales (\$17.32), personal care (\$16.40), and food preparation and serving (\$14.45).
- The highest paid occupation in Hawaii was family medicine physicians with a median hourly wage of $\$ 114.98$, followed by all other physicians with $\$ 113.18$.
- The building and grounds cleaning and maintenance group still held the highest location quotient for the State (1.71) indicating a higher concentration of employment in Hawaii compared to the nation. Conversely, the production group had the lowest (0.37) location quotient.


## Occupational Employment \& Wages in Hawaii

## Hawaii's estimated employment in May 2022 was 594,880 with a median hourly wage of $\$ 23.35$.

## Major Occupational Groups

Hawaii's estimated employment in May 2022 was 594,880 , with a median hourly wage of $\$ 23.35$ (Figure 1).

Office and administrative support occupations accounted for the largest share of Hawaii's employment with 79,990 employees and had a median hourly wage of $\$ 21.67$. The largest detailed occupation was general office clerks with 16,530 employees, followed by supervisors of office and administrative workers $(9,290)$, then customer service representatives $(8,250)$. The occupations with the highest hourly median wage within the office and administrative support group were executive secretaries (\$36.16), utilities meter readers (\$31.23), and postal service clerks (\$29.74). The second largest occupational group was food

## Comparison to United States

Hawaii's median wage of $\$ 23.35$ per hour was nearly 5 percent higher than the national average of $\$ 22.26$ per hour. Wages in Hawaii were higher than their respective national averages in 14 out of the 22 major occupational groups. Table 1 lists all major groups with the wages for Hawaii and the U.S. sorted by Hawaii's median wage in descending order.

The top paid groups in Hawaii were management with a median hourly wage of $\$ 48.85$, healthcare practitioners and technical workers earned \$47.86, and computer and mathematical occupations received $\$ 42.00$ an hour. On the opposite end of the scale food preparation and serving (\$14.45),
preparation and serving related occupations with 74,060 employees who earned a median hourly wage of $\$ 14.45$. Within this group, fast food and counter workers had the largest total employment of 20,340 , followed by waiters and waitresses $(12,950)$ and restaurant cooks $(9,510)$. The jobs with the highest median pay were chefs and head cooks (\$42.18), private household cooks (\$25.30), and institution and cafeteria cooks (\$20.40). At the lower end of the wage scale were dining room, cafeteria attendants and bartender helpers ( $\$ 12.17$ ) and waiters and waitresses (\$11.04).

The top three occupational groups with the highest median hourly wage were management, healthcare practitioners and technicians, and computer and mathematical occupations.
personal care ( $\$ 16.40$ ), and sales ( $\$ 17.32$ ) were the lower paying groups.

Construction trade workers and healthcare practitioners had the greatest numerical difference in pay compared to nationwide earnings, \$12.73 and $\$ 10.48$ respectively. Construction workers in Hawaii earned \$37.04 compared to \$24.31 nationally (a 52.4 percent difference), and healthcare workers earned $\$ 47.86$ locally compared to $\$ 37.38$ (a 28 percent difference).

The installation, maintenance and repair industry had the third largest percent difference of 25.6 percent. Local workers earned $\$ 30.25$ an hour as
to \$24.08 nationally, a \$6.17 difference.

Hawaii's legal group had the largest negative numerical difference in pay (-10.16), followed by computer and mathematical (-\$6.29). Legal workers in Hawaii earned $\$ 35.60$ an hour while national workers earned \$45.76. Computer and mathematical job holders in Hawaii received \$42.00 an hour versus $\$ 48.29$ nationally.

Although legal and computer and mathematical workers in the State earn relatively high pay, the national median surpassed Hawaii.

## Location Quotient

The location quotients for the major occupational groups in Hawaii as compared to the nation are displayed in Figure 2. If this ratio is greater than one, it indicates the occupation has a higher share of employment than the U.S. A location quotient less than one means the occupation is less prevalent in Hawaii than the nation.

In Hawaii, the following occupational groups had the highest location quotients: building, grounds
cleaning, and maintenance group (1.71); food preparation and serving (1.47); protective service (1.39); community and social service (1.25); and personal care (1.25).

The groups with the lowest location quotients were: production (0.36); computer and mathematical (0.63); and business and financial operations (0.74).

## Largest Occupations

Hawaii's top 20 detailed occupations with the largest estimated employment in 2022 are shown in Table 2. Hawaii's largest occupation was fast food and counter workers which provided jobs to an estimated 20,340 workers and accounted for 3.4 percent share of total employment. Retail salespersons and cashiers, both sales jobs ranked second and fourth largest, earned $\$ 16.06$ and $\$ 14.28$, respectively. General office clerks held the third highest employment of 16,530 or 2.8 percent of total employment.

The food preparation and serving and office and administrative support major groups accounted for eight of the twenty largest occupations.

Of the top 20 largest detailed occupations, only four had median hourly wages above the statewide average of \$23.35: general and operations managers (\$48.43); registered nurses (\$57.74); supervisors of office and administrative support workers (\$28.98); and general maintenance and repair workers (\$24.85).

Hawaii's median hourly wages exceeded the United States in 15 of the 20 detailed occupations, except waiters and waitresses, janitors and cleaners, supervisors of office and administrative support workers, and customer service representatives.

## Highest Paid Occupations

The top 20 occupations with the highest pay in Hawaii are shown in Table 3. Nine of the 20 occupations fell under the healthcare practitioners and technical workers major group. Judges, categorized in the legal division, is the one occupation outside of the healthcare group within the top 5 jobs.

Hawaii reported higher median hourly wages in majority of the occupations compared to the United States.

Judges in Hawaii (\$98.11) showed the greatest difference in pay of $\$ 25.50$, when compared nationally (\$72.61). Supervisors of police and detectives working in Hawaii were also highly paid with a median hourly wage of $\$ 68.27$, while the U.S. were compensated $\$ 46.29$, a $\$ 21.98$ difference.

Between the first (family medicine physicians, \$114.98) and the last (medical and health services managers, \$56.41) job titles listed, there was a $\$ 58.57$ difference in pay.

## MSA and County Employment and Wages

Honolulu MSA's median wage of $\$ 23.88$ continued to exceed the state hourly rate (Figure 3). Workers in Maui MSA received the next highest hourly rate of $\$ 22.93$, followed by Kauai County earning $\$ 21.85$, and Hawaii County taking home the lowest wage of $\$ 21.73$. Most areas of Hawaii have remained over the national median of \$22.26 except for Hawaii County and Kauai County.

## Technical Notes

## Scope of Survey

The OEWS survey is a semiannual survey measuring occupational employment and wage rates for all full- and part-time wage and salary workers in nonfarm establishments. The OEWS survey is funded by the Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) and the State of Hawaii. BLS provides the procedures and technical support, while the State Workforce Agencies (SWAs) collect most of the data. Cross-industry estimates for the nation, states, metropolitan statistical areas (MSAs), and nonmetropolitan area levels are produced. BLS releases cross-industry estimates at all levels. The OEWS survey samples and contacts approximately 1,000 establishments in May and November of each year. Responses are obtained by Internet or other electronic means, mail, email, telephone or personal visit. In the course of a threeyear survey cycle, over 6,000 establishments are contacted with a minimum 75 percent response rate. While estimates can be made from one or two years of data, the three-year sample allows the production of estimates at finer levels of geographic, industrial, and occupational detail.

## The Occupational Coding System

The OEWS survey categorizes workers into approximately 830 detailed occupations based on the Office of Management and Budget's Standard Occupational Classification (SOC) system, which is used by all federal statistical agencies for reporting occupational data. These detailed occupations
make up 22 of the 23 major occupational groups. Major group 55, Military-Specific Occupations, is not included. For more information about the SOC, see the Bureau of Labor Statistics web site at https://www.bls.gov/soc/.

## The Industry Coding System

The May 2022 OEWS estimates use the 2022 North American Industry Classification System (NAICS). The OEWS survey does not cover the selfemployed, owners and partners in unincorporated firms, private household workers, or unpaid family workers. It also excludes the majority of the agricultural sector, with the exception of logging (NAICS 113310), support activities for crop production (NAICS 1151), and support activities for animal production (NAICS 1152). OEWS federal government data include the U.S. Postal Service and the federal executive branch only. All other industries, including state and local government, are covered by the survey. ## Survey Sample

The OEWS survey draws its sample from the State Unemployment Insurance (UI) files. Supplemental sources are used for rail transportation (NAICS 4821) because they do not report to the UI program. The OEWS survey sample is stratified by metropolitan and nonmetropolitan area, industry
and size.

To provide the most occupational coverage, larger employers are more likely to be selected than smaller employers. A census is taken of the executive branch of the federal government, the U.S. Postal Service and the state government.

## Estimation Methodology

The May 2022 estimates were produced by a model-based estimation method using three years of OEWS data (MB3). Under MB3, data provided by survey respondents are used to model occupational staffing patterns and wages for all unobserved establishments in the population, including establishments that were not sampled, sampled establishments that did not respond, and respondents that did not meet stability criteria.

A donor pool typically consisting of 10 nearest neighbor responding establishments is used to predict data for each unobserved establishment; if 10 donors are not available, then as few as 5 can be used. Donors are matched to recipients based on detailed industry, geographic area, ownership, size and survey panel. Within a given donor pool, donors that are more similar to the unobserved establishment are given more weight in determining the modeled data.

Each establishment's population employment is set as the average of its May 2022 and November 2021 employment from the Quarterly Census of Employment and Wages, the UI database from
which the OEWS sample is drawn. Using adjustment factors derived from the OEWS survey data, wages collected in earlier survey panels are adjusted to the reference data of the estimates and donor wages are adjusted for differences between donor and recipient characteristics such as geographic area and industry.

## Changes and Special Procedures in the May 2022

 EstimatesThe May 2022 estimates are the second official estimates to use the model-based MB3 estimation method indroduced in the May 2021 release. MB3 has advantages over the previous estimation method, as described in the Monthly Labor Review article at www.bls.gov/opub/mlr/2019/article/ model-based-estimates-for-the-occupational-employment-statistics-program.htm. The May 2022 estimates are the first to be produced using the 2022 NAICS, which replaces the 2017 NAICS used for the May 2017-May 2021 estimates. All six survey panels used for the May 2022 estimates were collected using the 2017 NAICS codes; these data were then mapped to the corresponding 2022 NAICS codes.

The May 2022 OEWS estimates use the metropolitan area definitions delineated in Office of Management and Budget (OMB) Bulletin 17-01. For

Response rates for the May 2022 estimates were negatively affected by the difficulty of collecting data from employers during the COVID-19 pandemic. Lower response rates may negatively affect data availability and data quality.

## Published Data

This report provides occupational employment and wages for approximately 558 occupations in the State of Hawai'i, over 505 occupations in Honolulu MSA, and roughly 242 occupations in Maui County. The data in this report are also available on the internet at the BLS website https://www. bls.gov/oes/current/oes_hi.htm. ## County Wages

OEWS data for Hawaii and Kauai County are not published by BLS. Although the data are collected as part of the BLS OEWS survey guidelines, they are combined and released as 'Balance of State'. In order to produce estimates for these counties, the Local Employment and Wages Information System (LEWIS), developed by the North Carolina Department of Commerce in cooperation with the BLS and the OEWS Policy Council was used. Currently, LEWIS is maintained by the State of Utah Department of Technology Services.

## Survey Definitions and Concepts

The following concepts and definitions are used in the OEWS Survey.

Employment is the number of persons employed in an occupation. It includes full-time or parttime employees; workers on paid vacations or other types of paid leave; salaried officers, executives, and staff members of incorporated firms; employees temporarily assigned to other units; and employees for whom the reporting unit is their permanent duty station regardless of whether that unit prepares their paycheck. Excluded are the self-employed, owners/partners of unincorporated firms, and unpaid family workers. Employees are reported in the occupation in which they are working, not necessarily for which they were trained.

Occupational employment represents an estimate of total wage and salary employment in an occupation across the industries in which it was surveyed. The data for specific occupations are collected from establishments within industries that are the predominant employers of labor in those occupations.

Metropolitan Statistical Area (MSA) is an area consisting of a group of contiguous cities and towns, which contains at least one central city of 50,000 inhabitants or more, or a Census Bureau-defined urbanized area (of at least 50,000 inhabitants).

SOC Code: a six-digit Standard Occupational Classification code. Each of the 800+ detailed occupations used in the OEWS survey is categorized into one of 22 major occupational groups,
designated by the first two digits of its SOC code:

Wages for the OEWS survey are straight-time, gross pay, exclusive of premium pay. Included are base rate, cost-of-living allowances, guaranteed pay, hazardous-duty pay, incentive pay including commissions and production bonuses, tips, and on-call pay. Excluded are overtime pay, severance pay, shift differentials, non-production bonuses, employer cost for supplementary benefits, and tuition reimbursements.

Annual Wage estimates for most occupations in this release are calculated by multiplying the mean wage by a "year-round, full-time" hours figure of 2,080 hours per year ( 52 weeks by 40 hours). Thus, the annual wage estimates may not represent the actual annual pay received by the employee. Some workers typically work less than 40 hours per week, year round. For these occupations, the OEWS survey collects and reports either the annual salary or the hourly wage rate, depending on how the occupation is typically paid, but not both. For example, teachers, flight attendants, and pilots may be paid an annual salary, but do not work the usual 2,080 hours per year. In this case, an annual salary is reported. Other workers, such as entertainment workers, are paid hourly rates, but generally do not
work 40 hours per week, year round. For these workers, only an hourly wage is reported.

Mean Hourly Wage is the total wages that all workers in the occupation earn in an hour divided by the total employment of the occupation. To calculate the mean hourly wage of each occupation, total weighted hourly wages are summed across all intervals and divided by the occupation's weighted survey employment.

Median Wage is the estimated 50th percentile of the distribution of wages based on data collected from employers in all industries; 50 percent of workers in an occupation earn wages below, and 50 percent earn wages above the median wage.
