

The <u>State of Hawaii Data Book</u>, a compilation of statistical data, covers a wide range of demographic and economic subjects. Its purpose is to provide analysts and other research personnel with the factual tools needed in their work.

The Data Book is, in effect, a statistical abstract and represents in many areas an up-dating of the <u>Statistical Abstract of Hawaii 1962</u>, published by the former Department of Planning and Research. It follows where practicable the format and context of the <u>Statistical Abstract of the United States</u>. However, statistical series are limited to those felt to be most useful in research and analysis related to planning and economic development. Complete time series are given where possible, but analysis is not offered.

The text within each section explains the scope and sources of the data presented. Methodology is discussed where methods used are peculiar to Hawaii or differ from customary sources. More detailed information and related data can often be obtained from the sources mentioned.

Because of size limitations, much available information could not be included. For further information or for questions concerning subjects not covered in the Data Book, readers should contact the Department of Planning and Economic Development or the agencies listed as data sources in footnotes or text.

Acknowledgment is gratefully made to the personnel of the many public and private agencies who assisted materially in the preparation of this Data Book. Without their cooperation and help, this publication would not have been possible.

The Data Book was compiled by the Office of Information, Department of Planning and Economic Development under the review of the Department's Research and Economic Analysis Division. Suggestions or comments for future editions are welcome.

POPULATION

Hawaii's population is young, well-educated and it is increasing at a rapid rate. Median age of the population is 24.3 years; the median education is 11.3 years of school completed.

Hawaii's people are of many races. No single race is in the majority. Recent figures show 38 percent of the population is Caucasian; 28 percent is of Japanese descent and the remainder includes Hawaiian, Chinese, Filipino, Korean and many other races.

There are three major estimates of the population — the number of inhabitants, by the U.S. Bureau of the Census; the "resident population", by the Department of Planning and Economic Development; the "defacto civilian population", by the Department of Health. The estimates differ because they are prepared by somewhat different methods and are used for different purposes.

The "resident population" is computed semi-annually for January 1 and July 1 by the Department of Planning and Economic Development for the state, counties, the cities of Honolulu and Hilo and the individual islands of the state. The resident population figure includes civilian residents of the state, civilian dependents of military personnel residing in Hawaii, and military personnel stationed in Hawaii or on ships homeported in Hawaii. It includes the estimated number of residents temporarily absent from the state. It excludes the tourist population of the state.

The "de facto civilian population" is computed semi-annually by the State Department of Health for the dates January 1 and July 1 for the same areas. The de facto civilian population excludes all military personnel stationed in Hawaii although it includes civilian dependents who are living in the state. It also includes visitors to the state at their physical location on the two dates computed. No adjustments are made for civilian residents temporarily absent.

The de facto population is estimated from birth and death records of the state plus records of incoming and outgoing overseas and inter-island passengers on ships and planes. The estimates provide the basic data needed by state and local governments for the civilian needs of health and protection services.

The U.S. Bureau of the Census enumeration of the population appears every 10 years, with estimates published annually. The estimates are prepared at the national level, using symptomatic data to estimate immigration and a different definition of military personnel than that used by the Department of Planning and Economic Development. It is felt that the standard rate of increase may not be accurate for Hawaii. The Bureau of the Census includes only those military personnel who are actually in Hawaiian ports on the date of the estimates.

LABOR AND WAGES

The civilian labor force for the state increased 42 percent between 1950 and 1965. The annual average for 1965 was 266,500 or approximately 37 percent of the civilian population. During the peak summer pineapple canning season, the civilian labor force rose to a high of 279,790.

Annual average unemployment for Hawaii dropped from 9.4 percent in 1950 to 3.5 percent in 1965—a figure considerably below the national average.

Hawaii's labor force is young, well-educated and has proven its ability to master the sophisticated equipment and techniques of today's space-age industries.

Primary source of information on employment statistics in Hawaii is the Department of Labor and Industrial Relation, Research and Statistics Office. The department publishes monthly and annual labor force estimates for the state and the islands of Oahu, Hawaii, Kauai, Maui and Molokai-Lanai. It also issues a monthly bulletin, <u>Labor Force Developments</u> and an annual report, <u>Employment</u> and Payrolls in Hawaii.

The Department of Planning and Economic Development publishes reports dealing with employment and projected employment of certain industries and areas within the state.

Rates of pay throughout the state are published annually by the Hawaii Employers Council. Rates are determined by a statewide survey conducted by the Council and representatives of state and county governments. The Employers Council also maintains wage and hour statistics on sugar, pineapple, longshore and other industries, and publishes research reports on personnel practices, labor laws and related subjects.

MILITARY PERSONNEL

Although world conditions produce fluctuations in the number of military personnel stationed in Hawaii, the total number of members of the armed forces and their dependents has been over 110,000 for several years. The number of uniformed personnel stationed ashore or on ships homeported in Hawaii has been more than 55,000 for some time but dropped below that figure in July 1966. The figure has been increasing since July and it is anticipated that previous levels will be attained.

All branches of the armed services are represented in Hawaii. The unified military command for the entire Pacific, CINCPAC, is located at Camp Smith, Oahu. The Navy, with approximately 27,000 officers and men in Hawaii had the largest representation, followed by the Air Force with 10,600 and the Army with 6,700.

A central source of information on the number of military personnel and dependents in Hawaii is the Department of Planning and Economic Development which publishes a semi-annual report, <u>Military Personnel and Dependents in Hawaii</u>, based on information supplied by local commanding officers of the armed forces.

The Bureau of the Census, Office of Business Economics and the Department of Defense estimates of the number of military personnel in Hawaii differ from those of the Department of Planning and Economic Development primarily in their treatment of personnel aboard ship. State estimates include men aboard ships homeported in Hawaii on the dates given. The Census and Department of Defense count armed forces afloat only if they are actually in port on the date of the estimate. Office of Business Economics omits personnel aboard ship.

INCOME

Personal income in Hawaii exceeded two billion dollars in 1965—an all-time high for the state. Recently revised figures by the U.S. Department of Commerce show that the annual percentage increases in Hawaiian income from 1958 to 1961 were more than double that for the United States. Per capita income for Hawaii is above the national average.

Primary sources of information on income are the U.S. Department of Commerce series on personal income, per capita income and per capita disposable income which appear in the <u>Survey of Current Business</u>.

The Department of Planning and Economic Development analyzes and projects state income from various sources in reports and studies, and includes income statistics in informational brochures.

The First National Bank of Hawaii, Department of Economic Research, prepares annual estimates of personal and per capita income for the four counties. The Bank of Hawaii, Department of Business Research, publishes an annual midyear economic report which summarizes income to the state from sales of goods and services in various industries. The Department of Health includes income in the data surveyed in the Health Surveillance Program. Studies on Hawaii's income are prepared from time to time by the Economic Research Center and other agencies of the University of Hawaii.

Extensive summaries of income data for Hawaii by geographic area and other classifications are published in the U. S. Census, <u>Social and Economic Characteristics</u>, Hawaii, 1960.

COST OF LIVING

The Honolulu Consumer Price Index measures the change in cost for a "market basket" of goods and services customarily purchased by families of wage earners and clerical workers in Honolulu. Components of the "market basket" are determined by the Bureau of Labor Statistics, U. S. Department of Labor, in conformance with standard practices used for urban areas throughout the country.

Since December 1963, Honolulu has been included in the cities surveyed by the Bureau of Labor Statistics in the determination of the national average cost of living index. The December 1963=100 base has been used since that time. In prior years, the Department of Labor and Industrial Relations published a quarterly consumer price index and food index for Honolulu with a December 1943=100 base.

The Western Regional Office of the Bureau of Labor Statistics publishes a monthly comparison of prices for selected food items in Honolulu, San Francisco, Los Angeles and Portland.

It should be emphasized that consumer price indexes for each city show only how prices have changed in that city since a certain date. They are not intended to be used to measure differences in living costs between cities.

The Federal Civil Service Commission surveys Federal workers periodically in areas where cost of living allowances traditionally have been paid. They evaluate typical expenses in these locations with those in Washington, D. C.

TAXES AND GOVERNMENT EXPENDITURES

Hawaii's tax structure has many features which provide a favorable tax climate for industry and investment. All major taxes are State administered and collected. There are no multiple local taxes, no personal property taxes, no special levies for school districts, etc. Real property tax rates, set by the county governments, are levied on a uniform statewide assessment ratio and administered under a statewide property reappraisal program.

Hawaii's per capitatax payment for state and local governments of \$297 in 1965 ranked eighth among the states. However, when per capitatax is measured as a percent of per capita income, Hawaii ranks 18th among the states.

Information on taxes and tax collections in Hawaii can be obtained from the Department of Taxation. Publications of the Department of Taxation include the monthly and annual reports of Tax Base for Certain Taxes, Hawaii Income Patterns, and Outline of Hawaii's Tax System. The Department of Planning and Economic Development publishes a brief resume of the tax laws in Hawaii's Tax Climate.

Government expenditures and Federal grants are reported annually by the Department of Accounting and General Services, the Department of Budget and Finance, County auditors, and the U.S. Department of Commerce.

A convenient compilation of information on these subjects is the publication, Government in Hawaii, A Handbook of Financial Statistics, published annually by the Tax Foundation of Hawaii, a privately-supported, non-profit organization.

FINANCE AND BANKING

A tremendous increase in investments in Hawaii by mainland United States and foreign capital has taken place during the past few years. Insurance company investments, for example, doubled between the years 1959 and 1964.

Stocks and bonds are traded actively in Hawaii. Six members of the New York Stock Exchange have offices in Honolulu. Representatives of Japanese and other foreign investments companies operate in Honolulu. The value of stocks traded on the Honolulu Stock Exchange in 1965 was \$15 million. Trading in mainland stocks is many times this amount.

Hawaiian banking laws allow branch banking. The seven banks in Hawaii have a total of 123 branch facilities throughout the state and in the Pacific area. Permissive legislation recently enacted by the State legislature allows banks to perform trust functions. One trust company and bank merged in 1966; others may follow suit.

All banks and other financial institutions operating in Hawaii come under the regulations of the Department of Regulatory Agencies, Bank Examination Division. Insurance companies—including domestic (Hawaiian-based), foreign (mainland U.S.) and alien (non-United States)—come under the jurisdiction of the Department of Regulatory Agencies, Insurance Division.

These two divisions are the primary sources of information for statistics on banking, insurance and other financial operations in Hawaii.

PUBLIC UTILITIES

The use of telephones, gas and electricity have continued to increase with the rapid expansion of population and economic development in Hawaii.

Electric power throughout the state is supplied by six commercial power companies—Hawaiian Electric Co.; Hilo Electric Co.; Kauai Electric Co.; Lahaina Light and Power Co.; Maui Electric Co.; and Molokai Electric Co. In addition, some plantations and military installations generate and distribute their own power.

Hawaii has no natural gas supply, but manufactured gas is used extensively in the state. Metered gas is available in many urban areas and bulk or cylinder propane gas is used elsewhere. Gas is supplied by the Honolulu Gas Company and its Isle Gas Division.

Telephone service throughout the state is furnished by the Hawaiian Telephone Company. Dial service is available on each of the islands. Radio telephone service is used between the islands; undersea cables provide transpacific service to the mainland U.S., Pacific areas and the Far East.

Satellite communications systems are available, through the military SAT-COM system and the commercial COMSAT system, both of which have ground stations in Hawaii. Hawaiian Telephone is one of the six companies participating in COMSAT.

All public utilities operate under the regulations of the Public Utilities Commission, Department of Regulatory Agencies. The Commission and the utility companies are the major sources of information on rates and usage within the state.

Bus and taxi service and rates also are under the jurisdiction of the Public Utilities Commission. Information on services and other transportation statistics are available through the Commission.

TRANSPORTATION

Because of its mid-Pacific location, Hawaii's transportation is particularly important to the economy of the state.

Far-reaching technological changes have occurred in both air and sea transportation over the past decade. Jet aircraft have reduced flight time across the Pacific almost in half; reduced fares and increased visitor travel have greatly increased the number of flights. In 1965, Honolulu International Airport, ranked as the 16th busiest airport in the nation with an average of 790 aircraft operations a day.

Containerization and use of ships especially designed for specific cargo have made important changes in the ocean shipping industry in Hawaii. American and foreign shipping lines bring passengers and cargo to Hawaii from ports throughout the world. There were more than 1,900 ocean-going ship arrivals in Honolulu Harbor in 1965.

Within the state, travel between the islands is almost entirely by air. Two intra-state airlines provide jet service between major points in each county. Air taxi and charter services are also available and plans for an inter-island passenger and car ferry service are being pursued.

Modern highways link major destination areas on all the islands. Scheduled bus service is available on Oahu; chartered bus service is available on the other islands.

Primary sources of information concerning transportation are the three divisions of the Department of Transportation: Airports Division, Harbors Division, Highways Division and the Public Utilities Commission. The major air and ocean carriers have extensive statistical data on traffic between different points; some of this information is made available for specific purposes at their discretion.

Information on bus services and rates can be obtained from the Public Utilities Commission, Department of Regulatory Agencies.

VISITOR INDUSTRY

Tourism continues to be one of Hawaii's most rapidly growing industries and a major source of income to the state. In 1965, a record 606,000 visitors stayed overnight or longer in Hawaii. About 45 percent of these visitors traveled to one or more of the neighbor islands. One million visitors annually are expected by 1970.

Statistics on visitors, their origin, mode of travel, length of stay, destination areas, expenditures and other characteristics are collected and reported by the Research Department of the Hawaii Visitors Bureau. Statistics on hotel units, occupancy rates and a <u>Visitor Plant Inventory</u> of current and planned hotel units are published also by the Bureau.

Information on the development of new visitor facilities and destination areas and economic studies relating to tourism are available in the Department of Planning and Economic Development. A collection of reports and studies of the visitor industry are kept in the Department's library.

The Visitor Satisfaction Program of the Department of Transportation distributes maps of Hawaii and maintains information booths at the major airports in the state.

AGRICULTURE

For many decades, Hawaii's agriculture has been primarily concerned with the raising of two major crops: sugar and pineapple. All other agriculture in Hawaii is classed as "diversified" agriculture. This includes production of fruit, vegetables, melons, beef and poultry, eggs, milk, honey and certain "exotic" crops such as taro, tropical flowers, macadamia nuts and coffee.

A variety of climate, ranging from hot, aridareas in some coastal sections; to humid, tropical areas and temperate mountain regions make possible a wide range of agricultural activities.

It has been estimated that Hawaii raises slightly more than half the food it needs to feed its own population plus the half-million or more annual visitors and members of the armed forces stationed here. Predicted increases in both population and the number of visitors indicate an expanded market for Hawaii's agriculture.

One of the primary sources of information on Hawaii's diversified agriculture is the Crop and Livestock Reporting Service, Department of Agriculture, which publishes the annual Statistics of Hawaiian Agriculture. The Hawaii Agricultural Experiment Station and the Cooperative Extension Service at the University of Hawaii have available information on agricultural research, production techniques and agricultural economics.

The Department of Planning and Economic Development administers product research and promotion programs for a number of promotional cooperatives. At present these include programs for Kona coffee, fresh fruits, jellies and jams, anthuriums and other tropical flowers, taro and macadamia nuts.

SUGAR AND PINEAPPLE

The sugar and pineapple industries have long been the dominant factors in the Hawaiian economy. Although today the visitor industry and federal expenditures exceed pineapple and sugar as the top sources of income for the state, they are still major industries. In the rural areas in particular, these two industries and their related services provide the major sources of employment.

Primary sources of information on all phases of both industries are the Hawaiian Sugar Planters Association and the Pineapple Growers Association. Each publishes an annual factbook giving acreage, production, payroll, sales and other data.

The Business Research Department of the Bank of Hawaii prepares industry figures on income to the state from sales of pineapple and sugar products. The Hawaii Employers Council maintains wage and hour series for both industries.

OTHER INDUSTRIES

Other industries closely related to Hawaii's natural resources include forestry, fishing and mineral products.

Development of Hawaii's forestry resources has been the subject of extensive study by the U.S. Forest Research Center; the Department of Land and Natural Resources, Forestry Division; and the Department of Planning and Economic Development. Locally grown woods are now being used quite extensively for construction and for the manufacture of furniture, pallets, handcrafts and other goods.

Hawaii's fishing industry is quite extensive with the annual catch in 1965 valued at \$3.6 million. Research in fishery resources and methods are being carried on by the Bureau of Commercial Fisheries, Honolulu Laboratory; the Oceanic Foundation; the University of Hawaii; the State Department of Land and Natural Resources, Fish and Game Division; and the Bureau of Sport Fisheries.

Hawaii's mineral production is primarily the manufacturing of cement, the processing of sand, stone, gravel and pumice for construction purposes, and the production of lime. Black coral and olivine are found in Hawaii and fashioned into jewelry. Pink coral of gem quality has been found recently in deep waters off the coast of Molokai. Fairly extensive bauxite and titanium deposits exist in Hawaii but as yet are undeveloped.

CONSTRUCTION

Contract construction is a major industry in Hawaii and during 1965, Honolulu ranked fifth nationally in the value of building permits issued. Only New York, Los Angeles, Houston and Chicago exceeded Honolulu in this respect according to a Dun and Bradstreet report.

In a study of all housing units authorized by each of the jurisdictions included within metropolitan areas, only 20 other metropolitan areas exceeded Honolulu -- even though Honolulu ranks 54th in population.

The value of construction put in place during 1965 totaled \$339 million, according to the Department of Taxation. During 1965, an average of 17,600 persons were employed in contract construction.

Sources of information on construction include the F.W. Dodge reports of building permits issued for private construction by the building departments of the four counties. The Department of Planning and Economic Development serves as a processing center for these reports and receives monthly and annual summaries. The value of construction put in place for the state and counties is reported monthly and annually for both fiscal and calendar years by the Department of Taxation. The value of construction contracts awarded, government and private, are reported monthly and annually by the General Contractors Association of Hawaii.

A summary of job bid schedules and construction news are published weekly by the magazine, <u>Builders Report Pacific</u>. A monthly construction cost index and an annual review of construction plans are published by the same company.

HOUSING

Housing in Hawaii has continued to expand to meet the needs of the rapidly increasing population. Since 1960, more than 33,000 housing units have been completed in the state.

Honolulu, although ranking 54th among metropolitan areas in population, ranked 21st in number of permits issued for housing units in 1965.

Most single-family homes are of one-story design, well adapted to the "indoor-outdoor" type of living encouraged by the year-round warm climate. Land is expensive in Hawaii, and houses are often sold on a "leasehold" basis in which the purchaser owns the home but leases the property for a set time, usually 55 to 99 years.

High-rise apartments and apartment hotels, once found only in Waikiki, are now being built throughout the state. Hawaii was the first state to permit condominium ownership and this type of housing is becoming increasingly popular.

Sources of information on housing are numerous. County Building Departments report the building permits issued for private construction. The Department of Planning and Economic Development processes these reports for the F. W. Dodge Company studies. The Honolulu Redevelopment Agency publishes an annual report, Redevelopment and Housing Research, with monthly supplements. The Bank of Hawaii issues a quarterly report, Housing Activity on Oahu. The Hawaii Housing Authority (public housing), the City-County of Honolulu's Office of the Urban Renewal Coordinator, the Housing Action Council of Hawaii, the Home Builders Association and the Honolulu Board of Realtors are among government and private agencies providing information on various aspects of housing.

MANUFACTURING

Manufacturing in Hawaii has traditionally been dominated by sugar processing and pineapple canning. This has given rise to the Hawaiian practice of reporting sugar processing and pineapple canning as separate industries and grouping all other manufacturing together as "diversified" manufacturing.

Although pineapple and sugar processing are still extremely important, representing a great portion of Hawaiian manufacturing, there have been many additions to general manufacturing in the past decade. A petroleum refinery, two cement plants, a rolling mill for reinforcing rods, and a concrete pipe plant are among the newcomers.

In light manufacturing there are nearly 70 garment manufacturers, textile printing plants, plastics processors, furniture manufacturers and printing plants. There are many processors of food products, including Hawaiian and oriental food specialties, guava and passion fruit juice and macadamia nuts.

Primary sources of information on manufacturing in Hawaii include the Department of Planning and Economic Development; Hawaii Manufacturers Association; the <u>Census of Manufacturers</u>, published every five years with annual sample-based reports, by the U.S. Department of Commerce; and ES 202 reports of employment and employer contributions to employment security computed quarterly by the Department of Labor and Industrial Relations. The latter are published on a two-and three-digit basis quarterly and on a four-digit basis for one quarter each year. Employment data for manufacturing are given in the Labor and Wages section of the Data Book.

TRADE AND SERVICES

Hawaii with its 750,000 resident population, plus more than a half-million visitors each year, is a prime market for retail and wholesale trade and services. Members of the armed forces and their families stationed in Hawaii provide a constantly rotating group of "first-time" customers for Hawaiian goods and services.

In 1964, Hawaii ranked second among the 50 states in estimated per capita retail sales. Hawaiian merchants rangup a record-breaking \$1.1 billion in retail sales in 1965. Honolulu's newly enlarged multi-level Ala Moana Shopping Center is said to be the largest in the world. Smaller shopping centers are found throughout the state.

The major sources of information on retailing, wholesaling and services in Hawaii are the U.S. Census of Business: Retail Trade, Wholesale Trade and Services, published every five years, and the annual and monthly reports of "Tax base data" published by the State Tax Department. There is considerable difference in the two series and care must be taken not to use them interchangeably.

The Census is based on a mailed survey of all establishments engaged in retailing, wholesaling or services as defined in the Standard Industrial Classification system. Taxbase data cover gross receipts from retailing, wholesaling and services as reported for State general excise and other taxes. In the case of multi-unit organizations, County tax base information may be reported in the district where the tax is submitted rather than where the unit is located.

FOREIGN TRADE

Hawaii's foreign trade increased 87 percent between 1960 and 1965. Government and private agencies especially interested in the encouragement of foreign trade include the Foreign Trade Zone, No. 9 in Honolulu; the U. S. Department of Commerce Field Office in Honolulu; the Department of Planning and Economic Development and the Chamber of Commerce of Hawaii.

Major sources of statistical and other information on imports and exports include the organizations listed above, the economic and business research departments of the Bank of Hawaii and the First National Bank of Hawaii, and consulates of foreign countries.

Reference publications include the U.S. Department of Commerce, Import Trade by Customs Districts and Export Trade by Customs Districts; the Bureau of the Census, U.S. Imports of Merchandise for Consumption and U.S. Exports of Merchandise for Consumption; and the U.S. Army, Corps of Engineers, Waterborne Commerce of the United States.

HEALTH

Hawaii is a healthy place to live and work. It is one of the few places in the world free of rabies, malaria, dengue fever, yellow fever, filariasis and cholera. The last case of smallpox was reported in 1913.

The State Health Department is the oldest in the United States and was founded in 1850 by King Kamehameha III. Vital statistics have been kept continuously since that time.

The Department of Health, Research, Statistics and Planning Office, publishes a semi-annual estimate of civilian population for the state, each of the islands, and the cities of Honolulu and Hilo. Estimates of civilian population and dwelling units by census tract are available for the City-County of Honolulu and Hawaii County. The annual statistical report of the department gives statistical series for all major divisions within the department.

Hospitals and nursing homes in the state are licensed by the Hospitals and Medical Facilities Branch of the Department of Health. This branch also issues reports of present and planned medical facilities in accordance with provisions of the Hill-Harris Act. More than half the 34 hospitals in the state are accredited by the American Hospital Association. Several hospitals on Oahu have approved training programs for residents and interns.

Licensing of physicians, dentists and other medical personnel is under the jurisdiction of the Department of Regulatory Agencies, Vocational Licensing Division.

EDUCATION

Hawaii has excellent schools and colleges which provide modern educational facilities from nursery school through the doctorate program at the University of Hawaii and post-doctoral programs at the East-West Center.

All public schools throughout the state are under the administration of the Department of Education. The Department of Education is responsible for the employment and assignment of teaching and administrative personnel, maintenance of standards and curriculum of all public schools, and the licensing of private schools.

Hawaii has the ninth largest public school system in the United States under one school board.

Primary sources of information on education in Hawaii are the Research, Statistics and Data Processing Office and the Information Office of the Department of Education. The Department of Planning and Economic Development maintains information on the number of graduates in certain fields of work and publishes a brochure, <u>Hawaii's Educational Resources</u>, which describes public and private schools and colleges throughout the state.

Comparisons of Hawaii's educational costs and expenditures with those of other states are published annually by the National Education Association in their research report, Rankings of the States.

AREA, GEOGRAPHY AND CLIMATE

Hawaii, the 50th state, has an area of 6,424 square miles. It ranks 47th in size, being larger than Rhode Island, Delaware and Connecticut. It consists of eight major islands and the string of small islands and reefs of the Hawaiian archipelago stretching 1,367 miles northwest of Honolulu to Kure Island.

Hawaii's climate is almost ideal throughout the year with an average temperature ranging from 72 degrees in February to 79 degrees in August. Temperature and rainfall vary within the state depending more upon elevation and location rather than season.

The Department of Planning and Economic Development serves as a general source of information on geographic and climatological statistics. Primary data on land area and geology are obtained from the U.S. Geological Survey, the U.S. Coast and Geodetic Survey, the University of Hawaii Geology Department and the Hawaii Geophysical Institute. Information on land use is available from the State Land Use Commission and the Land Study Bureau at the University of Hawaii. Climatological data are supplied by the U.S. Weather Bureau. Distances between airports are obtained from the Federal Aviation Agency.
