Section 11

SOCIAL INSURANCE AND HUMAN SERVICES

This section presents data related to governmental expenditures on social welfare; programs for old-age, survivors, disability and health insurance; public employee retirement; unemployment insurance; aid to the needy; and child and other welfare services. Also included here are selected statistics on disability, United Way campaigns, foundations, and the quality of life. Related data are cited in Sections 9 and 13.

Total social welfare costs reached \$731 million in fiscal 1994, compared with \$336 million a decade earlier. About 59 percent of the 1994 total came from State funds and the remainder from the Federal government. The monthly average number of persons served by major welfare programs in 1994 was 75,000, or 6.3 percent of the resident population of the State. Fifty-six percent of all public assistance payments and 43 percent of all recipient cases were accounted for by aid to families with dependent children. The average monthly payment per case for public assistance was \$507, or 55 percent more than in 1984. Participation in the food stamp program included 48,000 households and 111,000 persons. Among workers receiving unemployment compensation in 1994, weekly benefits averaged \$259. Out of 673,000 persons 16 to 64 years of age, 27,000 reported a mobility or self-care limitation in 1990. About 162,000 Hawaii residents were receiving Social Security benefits in December 1994, and about 145,000 were enrolled for Medicare. There were also over 22,900 State and county government pensioners in 1994, with annual benefits of \$331 million. Child adoptions in 1994 numbered 500. The United Way reported revenues of \$18.9 million and agency allocations of \$13.8 million in 1994. A recent comparative study of the "quality of life" in 300 American metropolitan areas ranked Honolulu in the top third.

Major data sources include reports and records of the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, the Hawaii State Department of Human Services, the Hawaii State Department of Labor and Industrial Relations, the Hawaii State Employees' Retirement System, and the United Way. *Historical Statistics of Hawaii*, Section 8, contains data for earlier years. Section 12 of the *Statistical Abstract of the United States: 1995* presents comparable Mainland data.
