# Section 20 Construction and Housing

This section presents statistics on construction activity and costs, the size and composition of the housing inventory, occupancy of housing, and residential financing. The principal sources of these data are the 1960 United States Census of Housing, the Honolulu Redevelopment Agency's semi-annual Redevelopment and Housing Research, and reports of county building departments. Additional detail is often available from the Hawaii Department of Planning and Research research division, Hawaii Housing Authority, county building departments, and Hawaiian Telephone Company. Mainland statistics appear in Section 29 of the Statistical Abstract of the United States: 1961.
