LAW ENFORCEMENT, COURTS, AND PRISONS

Statistics in this section refer to crimes, stolen property, internet crimes, arrests, police personnel, attorneys, the judiciary system, prisons, and correctional facilities.

Statistics on law enforcement, courts, and prisons in Hawaii appear in the annual reports of the county police departments, the Hawaii State Judiciary, the Hawaii State Department of Public Safety, the Administrative Office of the United States Courts, and the Federal Bureau of Investigation. The Hawaii State Department of the Attorney General issues crime summary reports, based on reports submitted by the counties' police departments. Figures on crime, the courts, and corrections in earlier years appear in *Historical Statistics of Hawaii*, Section 10.
