## PROJECT DESCRIPTION

1

The Department of Parks and Recreation is proposing to demolish and remove an existing comfort station including the existing concrete slab and plumbing. A portion of the existing concrete walkway will also be removed. The existing cesspool will also be taken out of further service.

The old comfort station will be replaced by a larger structure 711 square feet in size. The new comfort station will include interior space for the park keeper and for storage. The comfort station will be joined to the existing sewer lines by a new 4" lateral line.

The project will also include an additional 300 square feet of exterior storage enclosed by a sixfoot high chain link fence.

The existing concrete walkway will also be replaced by a new 541 square foot concrete sidewalk, extending from the comfort station to the nearest parking lot.

The project will serve the health and sanitation needs of the large numbers of general public who regularly use Koko Head District Park. In addition the new comfort station will enhance the efficient management and maintenance of the park. The project will have no other social impacts.

These improvements will be funded by the City and County of Honolulu. It is anticipated that the entire project will cost \$200,000.

The project is located within the State's Conservation District in the General Use subzone. The District Park was established pursuant to Conservation District Use Permit G-1. The Department of Land and Natural Resources (DLNR) has reviewed this project and concluded that no new Conservation District Use Application would be required, however previous conditions require that future construction plans be submitted to the DLNR for approval. Plans will be submitted upon completion of the City permitting process.

The project site is also located within the Special Management Area. A permit application for a major permit will be submitted to the Department of Land Utilization, upon completion of the environmental assessment process.

# DESCRIPTION OF THE AFFECTED ENVIRONMENT

Koko Head District Park is part of the much larger 1,275 acre Koko Head Regional Park. While much of Koko Head Regional Park has been left in its "natural" state for passive use, the District Park at Koko Head has been thoroughly developed for active recreational use.

The District Park includes a recreation building complex comprised of four separate buildings.

The buildings include arts and crafts facilities, community rooms, administrative offices, and a gymnasium complex.

The District Park also includes two lighted outdoor basketball courts, one volleyball court, six tennis courts, a baseball field, three softball fields, and a BMX course and 187 parking stalls.

This project will provide badly needed improvements to the park's facilities by replacing the single comfort station which services the many participants and spectators using the outdoor recreational facilities with a larger capacity facility.

La servicio de la companya de la com The District Park primarily serves some 50,000 residents living in the Koko Head-Hawaii Kai area, however, because of the excellent athletic facilities the park is often the site of regional athletic competition (primarily baseball) and it is not unusual for the park to be crowded with hundreds of ball players from all over the island plus their families and other spectators.

#### SHORT TERM ENVIRONMENTAL IMPACTS

#### Air Quality

The project will result in a small increase in air pollution emissions from construction activities. The environmental impacts of these small increases will be reduced due to the fact that the project is located hundreds of yards from the nearest residence. For these reasons, emissions associated with this project are not anticipated to generate any significant impact.

#### Noise

The construction of the project will result in an increase in noise in the immediate vicinity during work hours. However, because of the small size of the project and its distance from the general public no significant noise impacts are expected.

#### Traffic

Because of the small size of this project, its construction is not anticipated to generate any significant traffic impacts.

#### Public Health and Safety

Construction sites often pose safety hazards to the public, especially as "attractivenuisances" when the sites are closed after work hours. Precautions will be taken to ensure that the public safety will be safeguarded through all phases of construction. During nonwork hours, construction areas will be secured by warning signs and other safety measures, in compliance with the regulations of the City and County of Honolulu as well as the State of Hawaii.

#### Recreation

During demolition and reconstruction the comfort station will not be available for public use. This will present some inconvenience to park users but alternate accommodations in the form of temporary lavatories as well as the restroom facilities within the recreation complex will be available for their use.

#### Traffic

#### Public Health and Safety

The proposed project will improve public health and safety by replacing a small, outdated comfort station- serviced by a cesspool, with a new larger comfort station directly connected into the regional sewer system.

#### Recreation

By improving the support facilities at the park, this project should enhance the recreational experience of park users.

#### Hydrology

The park area immediately surrounding the project site has been graded and grassed and is well drained. The proposal involves only a modest increase in surfaced area in the same location as the existing comfort station, therefore we do not anticipate that the proposal will involve any hydrological impacts.

#### Flora and Fauna

The District Park has been subject to significant alteration and intensive use. No endangered flora or fauna are present at the project site.

# Population and Socioeconomics

The project will have no impact on population or socioeconomics.

#### Housing

The proposed project will not impact the demand or supply of housing.

#### Visual Impacts

The design of the proposed structure has been selected to harmonize with existing themes in the park. The comfort station is located between a parking lot and ballfields; there are no visual planes that will be impacted by this project.

## Fire and Police Services

This project will not impact the need for fire or police services.

#### Schools

The project will not impact the demand for schools.

Utilities

This project will utilize existing sewer utilities, and will not generate demand for any other utilities.

Cultural Resources

The proposed project is not anticipated to result in adverse impacts to any significant cultural resources. The reconstruction is not expected to result in the alteration or destruction of prehistoric or historic archaeological resources within the project area.

The site has already been intensively developed and thoroughly modified to accommodate active recreational use, and much of the small project site is occupied by the existing comfort station and sidewalk.

All construction work will be monitored. If any artifacts are uncovered, work will be halted and the Office of Historic Preservation will be notified.

# ALTERNATIVES TO THE PROPOSED ACTION

One alternative to the proposed project is to take no action.

Under this alternative the Parks Department would maintain the present comfort station. At peak use, recreation staff estimates there may be over 500 people in the ball field area of the park. The existing comfort station provides only one toilet for men and one toilet for women. We believe this is inadequate to meet the public's needs.

### CONSIDERATION OF THE PROJECT'S SIGNIFICANCE

In considering the significance of this project's potential environmental effects, the Department of Parks and Recreation has considered the sum of these effects on the quality of the environment. As required under Chapter 200 (Environmental Impact Statement Rules) of Title 11, Administrative Rules of the State Department of Health, Section 11-200-12, the following criteria have been considered:

(1) Does the project involve an irrevocable commitment to or loss or destruction of any natural or cultural resource?

No, the project area has already been significantly altered for recreational purposes and is currently occupied by the existing comfort station.

(2) Does the project curtail the range of beneficial uses of the environment?

No, the project will enhance the public use of an active recreational resource.

(3) Does the project conflict with the State's long-term environmental policies or goals and guidelines as expressed in Chapter 344, Hawaii Revised Statutes, its revisions and amendments, court decisions, and executive orders?

The project does not conflict with the goals and guidelines expressed in Chapter 344.

(4) Does the project substantially affect the economic or social welfare of the community or state?

This project will have no affect on the economic or social welfare of the community or state.

(5) Does the project substantially affect public health?

The project is designed to increase available restroom accommodations for the general public and improve the disposal of human wastes generated at the park. Therefore the project should substantially improve the public health.

(6) Does the project involve substantial secondary impacts, such as population changes or effects on public facilities?

The project will not have any substantial secondary impact.

(7) Does the project involve a substantial degradation of environmental quality?

The project will enhance environmental quality by replacing the existing cesspool system with connection to a nearby sewer line.

(8) Does the project have a cumulative affect upon the environment or involve a commitment for larger actions?

The project does not involve a cumulative environmental effect and does not involve any commitment for larger actions.

(9) Does the project substantially affect a rare, threatened or endangered species, or its habitat?

No.

(10) Does the project detrimentally affect air or water quality or ambient noise levels?

During construction the project may have small impacts on air quality and ambient noise levels, however these impacts will only be temporary and are unlikely to extend beyond the park's boundaries at any significant levels.

(11) Does the project affect any environmentally sensitive area such as a flood plain, tsunami zone, erosion-prone area, geologically hazardous land, estuary, fresh water, or coastal waters?

The project is not located in an environmentally sensitive area.

#### FINDING OF SIGNIFICANCE

Based upon the previously described criteria and analysis the Department of Parks and Recreation has concluded that the proposed comfort station and storage area will <u>not</u> involve significant environmental impacts, the Department accordingly issues a negative declaration for the environmental impacts associated with this project.

We have the following comments to offer:

- 1. There is an existing 4-inch meter currently serving Koko Head District Park.
- 2. If additional water is required, the developer will be assessed Water System Facilities Charges for resource development, transmission and daily storage.
- 3. The on-site fire protection requirements should be coordinated with the Fire Prevention Bureau of the Honolulu Fire Department.
- 4. If a three-inch or larger meter is required, the construction drawings showing the installation of the meter should be submitted for our review and approval.
- The proposed project is subject to Board of Water Supply cross-connection control requirements prior to the issuance of the building permit application.
- 6. We reserve further comment until additional information about the project is submitted for our review.






