CORRECTION TO APRIL 1 EIS NEWSLETTER
The "EIS Preparation Notices... Relating to CDUA's" section of the April 1 Newsletter was in error on 2 points:

1. an EIS has not yet been required for either the "park development of forested area" or the "small craft mooring" proposals, as both are still being assessed for environmental impact;
2. should an EIS be required for either action, it will not be in relation to the Conservation District Use Application process, as reported.

THE EQUITY STUDY

In his Equity Message of April 18, 1973, Governor Nelson announced his decision to defer any drilling in the Atlantic Outer Continental Shelf and in the Gulf of Mexico until the environmental impacts of oil and gas production in those areas can be studied by the Commission on Environmental Quality. On EQC's behalf, this study first focused on the potential impact of drilling on the marine environment, as well as on the likely economic impacts of exploration, drilling and growth related to production of oil and gas. "Oil and Gas - An Environmental Assessment," a report by the Commission's findings, is now available for study at EQC.

EQC RULES AND REGULATIONS

The Environmental Quality Commission approved Rules and Regulations on April 3 for transmittal to Governor Ariyoshi, culminating in lengthy deliberations on the EIS process that spanned thirty-one months since the appointments of the Commissioners on August 6, 1974. These deliberations included the consideration of more than 500 pages of testimony received at six public hearings in November.

If and when the Governor approves the document, it will be filed with the Office of the Governor and will take effect ten days thereafter. A copy of the official Rules and Regulations will be sent to all members of those on the "EIS Newsletter" mailing list and to those who attended public hearings. Additional requests may be addressed to the Commission's office at 850 Waikopua St., Rm. 301, Honolulu, Hawaii, 96813; phone 246-1315.

EQC NEWSLETTER

From the effective date of Rules and Regulations, EQC's "EIS Newsletter" will be discontinued and replaced by the "EQC Bulletin," which shall, as required by Chapter 213, Revised Statutes, carry information filed by agencies or commissions that statements are or are not required; the availability of statements for review and comment; EQC recommendations on acceptability; the acceptance or non-acceptance of statements; the filing of appeals; and the Commission's affirmations or reversal of appeals. Other EIS-related items will also be reported in the "EQC Bulletin." It is anticipated that the "Bulletin" will not differ significantly in format or content from the "Newsletter."

The one, or that will differ, however, is publication date. Although the "Newsletter" is published on the first and fifteenth of each month, the "Bulletin" will be issued on the eighth and twenty-third of the month. These dates are subject to section 213(1)(f) of the Rules, which stipulates that EIS's shall be submitted "and only on the fifth and twentieth days of the

month--a provision that was made to assure a 30-day public review period for all EIS's.

All those on the "Newsletter" mailing list will be transferred to the "Bulletin" mailing list. Changes in address, other requests, and, in particular, suggestions for improving the "Bulletin" are welcome at this time.

EIS SEMINAR AND BRIEFINGS

An EIS seminar is now tentatively planned for government officials in late June. The purpose of the seminar is to foster better understanding of the purposes, potentials, and limitations of the EIS process. In particular, the seminar will feature a briefing on EIS requirements in Act 246, SLH 1974, and EIS rules and regulations. There will also be opportunity for officials to engage in group discussions on several problem areas.

After the EIS seminar, it is anticipated that a series of public seminars will be held to better acquaint the general public, EIS consultants, and other interested persons with EIS requirements. Details will be announced at a later date.

Meanwhile, agencies, citizen groups, and individuals may request information on new EIS requirements. If desired, a briefing by EIS staff members can be arranged as mutually convenient. The purposes of these briefings are to present the major provisions of Act 246 and EIS rules and regulations and to provide an opportunity for questions and answers in an informal setting. Requests for briefings will be accepted at the Commission's office.
