Citrus grower seeks expedited approval to release alien insects

The Hawaii Department of Agriculture has received a request from a Big Island citrus grower to release certain insects in the State to control various pest insects. The requested changes are being submitted through an expedited rule amendment process authorized pursuant to Act 244, Session Laws of Hawaii, 1998, and section 4-71-4.2, HAR.

The insects Scolothrips sexmaculatus (a six-spotted thrips) and Encarsia formosa (white fly parasite) are currently listed on the List of Restricted Animals (Part A) which allows import, by permit, for research by universities and government agencies, exhibition in municipal zoos and government affiliated aquariums and other institutions for medical or scientific purposes as determined by the Board of Agriculture. The insects Trichogramma minutum (a moth egg parasite), Chrysoperla carnea (green lacewing), Orius insidiosus (flower bug), Chilocorus circumdatus (a ladybug), and Geocoris punctipes (a bigeyed bug) are not currently listed on any import list and, therefore, their import is prohibited. If approved, the

requested amendments to delete <u>Scolothrips</u> sexmaculatus and <u>Encarsia formosa</u> from the List of Restricted Animals (Part A) and add all seven above-mentioned insects to the List of Conditionally-Approved Animals will allow import of all of these insects, by permit, for private and commercial use for release into the State. Definitions Your guide to the Environmental Review Process

Draft Environmental Assessment

A project or action that may affect the environment cannot be implemented until an Environmental Assessment (EA) is prepared in accordance with HRS §343. If the lead government agency anticipates that the project will have no significant environmental impact, then a Draft EA is written and public notice is published in this bulletin. The public has 30 days to comment on the Draft EA from the date of the first notice.

Final Environmental Assessment and FONSI (Negative Declaration)

If, after the lead agency reviews the public comments, it feels that the project will have no significant effect on the environment, then it will prepare a Final EA and issue a Finding of No Significant Impact (FONSI) formerly called a *Negative Declaration*. The Final EA must respond to all public comments. An Environmental Impact Statement will not be required and the project may now be implemented. The public has 30 days from the first notice of a FONSI in this Bulletin to sue in court to require the preparation of an EIS.

EIS Prep Notice

If the lead agency decides that a project may have a significant environmental impact, it must prepare an Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) prior to implementing the project. The first step in preparing an EIS is publishing an EIS Preparation Notice (Prep Notice) in this Bulletin. Agencies, groups or individuals have 30 days from the first publication of an EIS Prep Notice to request to become a consulted party and to make written comments regarding the environmental effects of the proposed action. The draft EIS must respond to these comments.

Draft EIS

If a project is likely to have a significant environmental impact, the lead agency or private applicant must prepare a

Draft Environmental Impact Statement (Draft EIS) prior to project implementation. This document must completely disclose the likely impacts of a project. Secondary and cumulative impacts must be discussed along with measures proposed to mitigate them. The public has 45 days from the first publication date in this Bulletin to comment on a Draft EIS.

Final EIS

After considering public comments filed during the Draft EIS stage, the agency or applicant must prepare a Final Environmental Impact Statement (Final EIS). The Final EIS must respond to all comments from the draft stage. If deeper analysis was required, it must be included in this document. If the project is from a private applicant, the lead agency is authorized to accept the FEIS. If the project is public, the Governor or Mayor is the accepting authority. Only after the EIS is accepted, may the project be implemented.

EIS Acceptance Notice

If the accepting authority accepts a Final Environmental Impact Statement, a separate EIS Acceptance Notice will be published in this Bulletin. The public has 60 days from the date of first notice of acceptance to sue in court to challenge the acceptance of an EIS.

NEPA

National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) is the law that requires federal projects to prepare an EIS. It is similar to Hawaii's law. Some projects require both a state and federal EIS and the public comment procedure should be coordinated. Although not required by law, the OEQC publishes NEPA notices in this Bulletin to help keep the public informed of important actions.

Special Management Area Permits

The Special Management Area (SMA) is along the coastlines of all our islands. Most development in this area requires a Special Management Permit (SMP). The Counties regulate development

of this area. On Oahu, the County law requires an EA be prepared to accompany a permit application. This Bulletin posts notice of these SMP applications to encourage public input.

Shoreline Certifications

State law requires that Hawaii shorelines be surveyed and certified when necessary to clearly establish the regulatory building setback (usually 40 feet inland from the shoreline). The public may participate in the process to help assure accurate regulatory boundaries. Private land owners often petition to have their shoreline certified prior to construction. This Bulletin publishes notice of both shoreline certification applications and of final certifications or rejections.

Environmental Council

The Environmental Council is a fifteen-member citizen board appointed by the Governor to advise the State on environmental concerns. The council makes the rules that govern the Environmental Impact Statement process. The agendas of their regular meetings are published in this Bulletin and the public is invited to attend.

Exemption Lists

Government agencies must keep a list describing the minor activities they regularly perform that are declared exempt from the environmental review process. These lists are reviewed and approved by the Environmental Council. This Bulletin will publish an agency's draft exemption list for public comment prior to Council decision making.

Conservation District Permits

Use of land in the State Conservation District requires a Conservation District Use Application (CDUA). These applications are reviewed and approved by the Board of Land and Natural Resources (BLNR). Members of the public may intervene in the permit process. Notice of these permit applications is published in this Bulletin.

The applicant, Phoenecian, LLC proposes to develop three new facilities within a planned industrial subdivision adjacent to Barbers Point Deep Draft Harbor in Kapolei. The 7.5 acre project site is currently vacant. The proposed development will include the following:

- 1. A small boat repair facility. Consisting of about 3.1 acres, this facility will consist of a paved open yard for storage and boat maintenance. Proposed structures consist of a retractable spray booth, marine supply store (2,800 square feet) and parking and a gatehouse/security station.
- 2. A boat launch ramp and parking. The applicant proposes to construct a boat ramp, parking and comfort station in partnership with Ko 'Olina. These facilities will be open to the public. Ko 'Olina is proposing the boat ramp as a substitute for the boat ramp currently being operated at the Ko

'Olina Marina. The boat ramp will also be used by the small boat repair operation.

3. A liquefied petroleum gas (LPG)storage terminal facility. The Gas Company plans to relocated its storage tanks and barge terminal from Honolulu Harbor to a 99.950 square foot area within the proposed subdivision. Planned improvements include installation of nine 36-foot long styorage tanks, a portable flare stack and future tank maintenance building.

Most of the existing vegetation will be removed. Lower portions of the parcel would be graded and filled.

Construction is anticipated to commence in March 2001 and be completed within eight months.



Special Use, SMA

The applicant for the project, Hale Mahaolu, is proposing to develop the Molokai Day Care/Senior Center in Kaunakakai, Moloka'i, Hawai'i. A Final Environmental Assessment for the project was filed on March 23, 1999 for the subject project; however, there have been revisions to the project due to budgetary limitations.

The original plans called for a day care/senior center structure of approximately 6,336 square feet of floor area. The structure was proposed to be located on the eastern portion of the Home Pumehana Elderly Housing Project (TMK 5-3-2:168). Parking for the facility was proposed to be provided by consolidating with the Home Pumehana parcel.

The revised project involves a 4,500 square foot structure which would instead be added onto the existing Home Pumehana laundry/meeting facility. The structure would contain social areas, a kitchen, offices, storage, and restroom facilities. A porte cochere is proposed to allow for easy pickup and dropoff. A semi-circular driveway with 12 parallel parking stalls flank the porte cochere. The configuration of the 1.0 acre parking area also differs from the original proposed layout. Approximately 24 paved parking stalls and overflow grass parking are proposed on the 1.0 acre parcel.

Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funds have been utilized to acquire a perpetual exclusive easement on the approximately 1.0 acre of property needed for additional parking. An easement for the driveway to Kolapa Place has also been secured. The Home Pumehana site is owned by the County of Maui and under long term lease to Hale Mahaolu.



The applicant is requesting various improvements within portions of the existing Kona Inn Shopping Village, situated along the makai side of Ali'i Drive between Hulihe'e Palace to the North and Hale Halawai Park to the south. The applicant is requesting a Shoreline Setback Variance from the Planning Commission to allow the following improvements to be situated within the County's minimum 40-foot shoreline setback area:

1. construction of an outdoor seating lanai addition to an existing restaurant building that will project 20 feet into the 40-foot shoreline setback area. The 1,992 sf addition will cost approximately \$100,000 and be of a split-level (terraced) design. The terraced lanai seating area will elevated approximately 7 and 8 feet above existing grade. No roof covering over this lanai will be constructed. The applicant has noted



that the proposed lanai addition will not extend makai of the line of other improvements situated to the south of the affected area.

2. filling of an abandoned swimming pool with concrete. The existing swimming pool has fallen into disrepair and is considered a hazard. The pool will be filled with concrete to level it with the existing concrete pool deck.

All of the proposed improvements will be situated makai of the existing buildings that make up the Kona Inn Shopping Village.

The Department of Water Supply, County of Hawai'i, proposes to construct improvements to a section of its Olaa-Mountain View Water System. The proposed project is planned within the Happy Homes Subdivision located in the ahupua'a of Keaau, District of Puna, County, Island, and State of Hawai'i.

The proposed project will replace sections of galvanized iron water line that is in deteriorating condition. The Huina Road-Happy Homes section of the Ola'a-Mountain View Water System was constructed of galvanized pipes of varying size in 1954. Through years of use, corrosion and build-up inside the pipes (a process called "tuberculation") have reduced the inside diameter of the galvanized pipes thus effectively decreasing flow rates to customers serviced by the system.

Approximately 2,950 LF of 8-inch ductile iron pipe will be installed in Huina Road between North Ala Road and the main road (no street name) within the Happy Homes Subdivision. From this intersection, approximately 1,665 LF of 8-inch ductile iron pipe will be placed within the main road between Huina Road and the first subdivision intersection. Approximately 2,430 LF of 6-inch ductile iron pipe will be installed from this intersection to Thirteen Mile Road and approximately 1,500 LF of 6" pipe will be installed in a westerly direction along Thirteen Mile Road.

Three lines branching from the main line will service lots that do not front on the main road. Approximately 1,700 LF of 6-inch pipe will be installed within gravel and grass roads to service these lots.

New fire hydrants will be installed as part of the project. The fire hydrants will be spaced per Hawai'i County Fire Department and Department of Water Supply requirements.

The new waterline will be installed within the same existing road rights-of-way and easements as the existing galvanized water line but on the opposite side. The galvanized water line will later be cut, removed from service, and abandoned in place. Following installation, sections of the pipeline will be filled with water and pressure tested. After pressure testing, the pipe will be disinfected with a chlorine solution. Hydrotesting and chlorinated water will be discharged along the right-of-way and allowed to percolate into the porous lava.

The construction cost of the project is estimated at \$0.8 million and will be funded by the Department of Water Supply.

Hualalai Lodge and Farms plans to implement an approved Forest Stewardship Management Plan on its 21 acre property in the Kaloko Mauka subdivision, North Kona District, Hawaii County. The applicants primary management objectives are: 1) To establish a 10-acre Koa (*Acacia koa*) plantation forest on site that was previously cleared for residential use and christmas tree production; 2) To restore and maintain an existing 8.5 acre native forest area; 3) To maintain and improve project site soil productivity and prevent soil erosion; and 4) To construct trails to provide for education and recreational activities for community groups, schools and guests. The proposed koa plantation site is currently bare aside from a few remnant pine trees and nonnative weeds. The applicant plans to plant 680 koa seedlings/ acre into individually dug holes in order to minimize soil

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disturbance. The area will be periodically thinned to remove unhealthy or inferior trees and the plantation will be selectively harvested at maturity, or in approximately 30 years, to provide high-value timber for local processing, craft and artisan operations. The limited and selective harvesting activities that are planned will be carried out according to currently approved DLNR-DOFAW Best Management Practices (BMPs) so as to minimize soil disturbance and any other negative environmental impacts. In addition, the applicant intends to improve the health of an adjacent ohia forest by removing non-native weed species. The applicant also plans to construct 3000 feet of 3 foot wide trails through the forest area to provide for recreational and educational opportunities for visitors and guests.

A new Kamehameha Schools preschool is proposed to be developed on State of Hawaii Department of Hawaiian Home Lands in Waimea on the island of Hawai'i. 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Alien Species Permits

Before most alien organisms can be brought into Hawai'i they must receive a permit from the Board of Agriculture. The application is first reviewed by experts in biology and heard in a public meeting of the Board's Advisory Committee on Plants and Animals. Title: Request for (1) Preliminary review of 5 biological control organisms for future placement on the list of conditionally approved animals, for import and release; and (2) preliminary review of 2 biological control organisms for movement from the list of restricted animals (Part A) to the list of conditionally approved animals, for import and release.

Purpose: The 7 organisms would be imported and released for biological control of agricultural pests. If approved, these organisms would be available to the general public for import and release.

Requested Amendments to Import Rules Lists to Allow Import of Certain Insects for Release for Biological Control

The Hawaii Department of Agriculture (HDOA) has received a request to place certain insects on the Conditionally Approved List under Chapter 4-71, Hawaii Administrative Rules (HAR), Non-Domestic Animal and Microorganism Import Rules, for import for release. The requester, a Big Island citrus grower, seeks to release these insects in the State to control various pest insects.

The insects Scolothrips sexmaculatus (a six-spotted thrips) and Encarsia formosa (white fly parasite) are currently listed on the List of Restricted Animals (Part A) which allows import, by permit, for research by universities and government agencies, exhibition in municipal zoos and government affiliated aquariums and other institutions for medical or scientific purposes as determined by the Board of Agriculture. The insects Trichogramma minutum (a moth egg parasite), Chrysoperla carnea (green lacewing), Orius insidiosus (flower bug), Chilocorus circumdatus (a ladybug), and Geocoris punctipes (a bigeyed bug) are not currently listed on any import list and, therefore, their import is prohibited. If approved, the requested amendments to delete Scolothrips sexmaculatus and Encarsia formosa from the List of Restricted Animals (Part A) and add all seven above-mentioned insects to the List of Conditionally-Approved Animals will allow import of all of these insects, by permit, for private and commercial use for release into the State. HDOA takes no position on the merits of the requested amendments at this time.

The requested changes are being submitted through an expedited rule amendment process authorized pursuant to Act 244, Session Laws of Hawaii, 1998, and section 4-71-4.2, HAR. This expedited process provides for public notification and input through press release and publication in the Office of Environmental Quality Control bulletin, mailed notice to persons who make timely written request for advance notice of rulemaking proceedings, as well as through public meetings of the Board and its Advisory Committee on Plants and Animals. The expedited process provides for adoption of amendments through Board order and approval by the Governor. If adopted and approved, the changes will be published in daily or weekly publications(s) of statewide circulation and will go into effect 10 days following publication.

A copy of the proposed exact changes and the draft order proposed by the Board (if the requested changes are adopted) will be mailed to any interested person who requests a copy upon payment in advance of costs for photocopying, preparing, and mailing the copy. Fishery Meetings

The National Marine Fisheries Service (NMFS) proposes to makes changes to an emergency interim rule published on August 25, 2000, governing the Hawai'i-based pelagic longline fishery. The changes, which are only applicable to the Hawai'i-based pelagic longline fishery when fishing in Area C, as designated under that rule, expressly prohibit directing longline fishing effort toward the harvest of swordfish. The changes require vessels to set their main longline so that the deepest point between any two floats is greater than 100 meters (328.1 ft), prohibit the possession of lightsticks on board vessels, require permit holders or operators to donate to charity at least 30 percent of their gross revenues from the sale of incidentally caught swordfish, and require each longline vessel operator to have aboard the vessel an observer waiver form issued by NMFS if the vessel fishes without an observer. The intent of this action is to ensure that swordfish are not targeted by the Hawai'i longline fishery in Area C and to reduce adverse impacts on sea turtles while NMFS prepares a comprehensive environmental impact statement (EIS) that analyzes the environmental effects of fishing activities conducted under the Fishery Management Plan for the Pelagic Fisheries of the Western Pacific Region (FMP).

This emergency interim rule is effective from November 3, 2000, through February 21, 2001, except for the suspension of Sec. 660.22 (hh) and Sec. 660.33 (d)(4), and for the addition of Sec. 660.22 (kk) and Sec. 660.33 (d)(7), which are effective December 4, 2000 through February 21, 2001. Comments must be received no later than 5 p.m., local time, on **DECEMBER 18, 2000**.

Endangered Species Permit Applications

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (FWS) has received an application for a scientific research permit to conduct certain activities with endangered species pursuant to section 10(a)(1)(A) of the Endangered Species Act of 1973, as amended (16 U.S.C. 1531 et seq.) for the following:

Permit No. TE-003483, Applicant: Biological Resources Division, Pacific Island Ecosystems Research Center, Hawai'i National Park, Hawai'i. The permittee requests a permit amendment to take (locate and monitor nests) the nene goose (*Branta sandivcensis*) in conjunction with population estimates and ecological studies throughout the species range within the Hawaiian Islands, for the purpose of enhancing its survival.

Permit No. TE-032209, Applicant: Guam Department of Agriculture, Division of Aquatic and Wildlife Resources, Mangilao, Guam. The applicant requests a permit to take (collect eggs, hatchlings, and adults; band; collect blood samples; and apply radio transmitters) the Mariana crow (*Corvus kubaryi*) in conjunction with captive propagation, translocation, and release on the island of Rota, in the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands, and Guam for the purposes of enhancing its survival. These activities have previously been authorized under subpermit GDAWR-4.

Introducing Ka Makana O Lili'uokalani - A Community Council

Ka Makana O Lili'uokalani is a non-profit partnership between the community, Kaumakapili Church and the Queen Lili'uokalani Children's Center. The community council, whose mission is to generate, inspire and nurture community support for orphaned Hawaiian children and provide service through the giving of makana in keeping with the wishes of Oueen Lili'uokalani, was created in 1998 to access and provide services to orphan Hawaiian children. Ka Makana O Lili'uokalani is housed at Kaumakapili Church. Services range from referrals to appropriate community resources to financial assistance. It is the intent of Ka Makana O Lili'uokalani to service Hawaiian orphans in a timely manner, with respect and kindness, and in accordance with the wishes of Queen Lili'uokalani. Who is eligible? All children of Hawaiian ancestry below the age of 18 years, with one or both parents deceased are eligible. "Parent" is defined as either biological or through adoption. A birth certificate and a copy of the deceased parent's death certificate are required to verify ethnicity and orphan status. How do one request services? To request services, call Kaumakapili Church, telephone 845-0908, Monday through Friday, between 8:00 A.M. and 4:30 P.M., providing your name, address and telephone number and nature of request. You will be contact shortly thereafter. Be sure to have the necessary documents ready as they are crucial to processing your request. All information received is kept in the strictest confidence. Financial gifts are made directly to the vendor, and given on a one-time only basis. How are decisions made? A body of five individuals hears requests. The nature of the inquiry, age of child and the capacity of Ka Makana O Lili'uokalani to meet the request are considered.

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
