Ceratocystis Disease is Killing 'Ōhi'a Lehua on Big Island - Emergency Rule Proposed

There is a new disease that is devastating our state's unique 'ohi'a lehua trees. It is not yet known how the disease spreads from tree to tree, or from forest stand to forest stand. In other Ceratocystis plant hosts, such as sweet potato, cacao, mango and eucalyptus, the fungus is moved by insects, soil, water, infected cuttings, pruning wounds, or tools, and these modes of transmission may also be involved in infections of 'oni'a trees and stands. On August 18th, the Plant and Pest Advisory Committee recommended that the Board of Agriculture (BOA) take action during their planned August 25th meeting, to pass an interim emergency rule to address high-risk plant materials on the Big Island. Hawaiian Monk Seal News

The National Marine Fisheries Services (NMFS) incorporated state input into new rules aimed at protecting the critically endangered Hawaiian monk seal, by focusing protection on areas most important to foraging, pupping and resting. NMFS recently finalized a rule that identifies coastal areas in the Main Hawaiian Islands as critical habitat. This was in response to a petition by a local advocacy group, KAHEA, the Hawaiian Environmental Alliance, and two other environmental organizations. Hawaiian monk seals face extinction and are one of most endangered marine mammals in the world, with about 200 monk seals in the main Hawaiian Islands. The Endangered Species Act (ESA) requires the protection of areas that are essential to Hawaiian monk seal survival and recovery. When an area is designated as critical habitat it means that federally permitted or funded projects may need to take steps to avoid habitat damage. These science-based modifications can help state agencies, such as the Department of Land and Natural Resources (DLNR) manage the state's coastal resources. There are fewer than 1,100 Hawaiian monk seals left in the world, and they only exist in Hawaii and are a native species. They have been declining about 4 percent per year for the last decade. As an endangered species, they are protected under state and federal law. A 2013 study estimated that monk seals in the main Hawaiian Islands consume less than .01 percent of our ocean biomass. Commercial fisheries remove 27 percent and recreational fisheries remove 39 percent of available ocean biomass. It is a felony under both state and federal law to kill a monk seal. Five monk seal killings have occurred since 2011, three on Kaua'i and two on Moloka'i. Rewards of up to \$10,000 for each incident remain for information leading to the arrest and conviction of the person or persons responsible. Anyone with information on these killings is asked to call the toll-free DLNR tipline at 1-855-DLNR-TIP. The toll-free, 24 hour reporting hotline for all fishing interactions and other marine mammal incidents is: 1-888-256-9840. NOAA and DLNR urge all fishermen and other ocean users to write down this hotline and/or save it in their mobile phones for timely use whenever a seal may be found hooked or entangled.

GLOSSARY OF TERMS AND DEFINITIONS

Agency Actions

Any department, office, board, or commission of the state or county government which is part of the executive branch of that government per <u>HRS 343-2</u>.

Applicant Actions

Any person who, pursuant to statute, ordinance, or rule, requests approval for a proposed action per <u>HRS</u> <u>343-2</u>.

Draft Environmental Assessment

When an Agency or Applicant proposes an action that triggers HRS 343, an Environmental Assessment shall be prepared at the earliest practicable time to determine whether an environmental impact statement shall be required per <u>HRS 343-5(b)</u>, for Agency actions and <u>HRS 343-5(e)</u>, for Applicant actions. For actions for which the agency anticipates a Finding of No Significant Impact (AFNSI), a Draft EA (DEA) shall be made available for public review and comment for 30 days and public notice is published in this periodic bulletin.

Final Environmental Assessment and Finding of No Significant Impact

The Agency shall respond in writing to comments on a DEA received during the review and prepare a Final EA (FEA) to determine whether an environmental impact statement shall be required. The FEA must respond to all public comments. If there are no significant impacts, then the Agency will issue a Finding of No Significant Impact (FONSI). An Environmental Impact Statement will not be required and the project may then be implemented. The public has 30 days from the notice of a FONSI in this bulletin to ask a court to require the preparation of an EIS.

Final Environmental Assessment and Environmental Impact Statement Preparation Notice

An EIS shall be required if the Agency finds that the proposed action may have a significant effect on the environment. The Agency shall file notice of such determination with OEQC, called an EIS Preparation Notice (EISPN) along with the supporting Final EA. After the notice of the FEA-EISPN is published in this bulletin, the public has 30 days to request to become a consulted party and make written comments. The public (including the Applicant) has 60 days from the notice of the EISPN in this bulletin to ask a court to not require the preparation of an EIS.

Act 172-2012, Direct-to-EIS, Environmental Impact Statement Preparation Notice (with no EA)

Act 172-2012, amended HRS 343, by providing for an agency to bypass the preparation of an environmental assessment for various actions that in the experience of the agency would clearly require the preparation of an EIS. Until administrative rules have been drafted, the agency must submit its determination that an EIS is required for an action (Act 172-2012, EISPN) with a completed OEQC publication form detailing the specifics of the action to enable the public to request for a period of thirty-days, to be consulted parties in the preparation of the Draft EIS. Comments and responses must be incorporated into the subsequent Draft EIS.

Act 312-2012, Secondary Actions in the Highway or Public Right Of Way

Act 312-2012, amended HRS 343, by adding a new section (HRS 343-5.5., entitled "Exception to applicability of chapter.") HEPA now allows for a statutory exception for "secondary actions" (those that involve infrastructure in the highway or public right-ofway) provided that the permit or approval of the related "primary action" (those outside of the highway or public-right-of-way and on private property) is not subject to discretionary consent and further provided that the applicant for the primary action submits documentation from the appropriate agency confirming that no further discretional approvals are required. An aid to understanding this is to visualize residential driveway improvements in the public rightof-way, versus, retail outlet driveway improvements in the public right-of-way.

Draft Environmental Impact Statement

After receiving the comments on the EISPN, the Agency or Applicant must prepare a Draft Environmental Impact Statement (DEIS). The <u>content requirements</u> of the DEIS shall contain an explanation of the environmental consequences of the proposed action including the direct, indirect and cumulative impacts and their mitigative measures. The public has 45 days from the first publication date in this bulletin to comment on a DEIS. The DEIS must respond to comments received during the EISPN comment period in a point-by-point manner.

Final Environmental Impact Statement

After considering all public comments filed during the DEIS stage, the Agency or Applicant must prepare a Final EIS (FEIS). The FEIS must respond in a pointby-point manner to all comments from the draft and must be included in the FEIS. See here for <u>style</u> concerns. For Applicant projects, the Approving Agency is authorized to accept the FEIS and must do so within 30-days or the FEIS is accepted as a matter of law. For an Agency project, the Governor or the Mayor (or their designated representative) is the Accepting Authority, and unlike applicant actions, there is no time limit on the accepting authority reviewing the FEIS. Only after the FEIS is accepted may the project be implemented.

Acceptability

If the FEIS is accepted, notice of this action is published in this bulletin. The public has 60 days from the date of notice of acceptance to ask a court to vacate the acceptance of a FEIS. For Applicant actions, non-acceptance by the Approving Agency is cause for the Applicant to administratively appeal to the Environmental Council. For Agency actions, there is no such administrative appeal. In both instances, the Applicant or the proposing Agency can prepare a revised DEIS after a nonacceptance determination.



National Environmental Policy Act

The National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) requires federal projects to prepare an EA or EIS. In many ways it is similar to Hawai'i's law. Some projects require both a State and Federal EIS and the public comment procedure should be <u>coordinated</u>. OEQC publishes NEPA notices in this bulletin to help keep the public informed of important federal actions.

Conservation District

Any use of land in the State Conservation District requires a Conservation District Use Application (CDUA). These applications are reviewed and approved by the Board of Land and Natural Resources. Members of the public may intervene in the permit process. Notices of permit applications are published in this bulletin.

Special Management Area and Shoreline Setback Area

The Special Management Area (SMA) is along the coastline of all islands and development in this area is generally regulated by <u>HRS 205A</u>, and county ordinance. A special subset of the SMA that is regulated by HRS 343, is the <u>Shoreline Setback Area</u>. Most development in this area requires a Special Management Permit. This bulletin posts notice of these SMA applications to encourage public input.

Shoreline Certifications

State law requires that Hawai'i shorelines be surveyed and certified when necessary to clearly establish the shoreline setback from the certified shoreline. The public may participate in the process to help assure accurate regulatory boundaries. Private land owners often petition to have their shoreline certified by the State surveyor prior to construction. This bulletin publishes notice from the Department of Land and Natural Resources of shoreline certification applicants and final certifications or rejections.

Environmental Council

The <u>Environmental Council</u> is a 15-member citizen board appointed by the Governor. They serve as a liaison between the Director of OEQC and the general public concerning ecology and environmental quality. The Council makes the rules that govern the Environmental Impact Statement process (HRS 343). <u>Agendas</u> of their regular meetings are posted on the Internet and the public is invited to attend.

Administrative Exemption Lists

Government agencies must keep a list describing the minor activities they regularly perform that are <u>exempt</u> from the environmental review process. These lists and any amendments shall be submitted to the Council for review and concurrence (<u>HAR 11-200-8(d)</u>). This bulletin will publish an agency's draft exemption list for public comment prior to Council decision making, as well as notice of the Council's decision on the list.

Endangered Species

This bulletin is required by <u>HRS 343-3(c)</u>, to publish notice of public comment periods or public hearings for Habitat Conservation Plans (HCP), Safe Harbor Agreements (SHA), or Incidental Take Licenses (ITL) under the federal Endangered Species Act, as well as availability for public inspection of a proposed HCP or SHA, or a proposed ITL (as a part of an HCP or SHA).

At the request of the State of Hawai'i Department of Land and Natural Resources (DLNR) Engineering Division, the Ala Wai Canal Project is a flood risk management study being investigated by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (USACE) under the authority of Section 209 of the Flood Control Act of 1962. The Ala Wai Watershed includes Makiki, Mānoa, and Pālolo streams, all of which drain to the Ala Wai Canal. The Canal is a 2-mile-long waterway constructed during the 1920s to drain coastal wetlands, thus allowing development of the Waikīkī District. A large portion of the watershed, including most of Waikīkī, is highly susceptible to flooding.

The objective of the project is to reduce riverine flood risks in the Ala Wai Watershed. In response to identified flood-related problems and opportunities, a range of alternatives were evaluated through an iterative screening and formulation process, resulting in identification of a tentatively selected plan. The tentatively selected plan involves construction of (1) in-stream debris and detention basins in the upper reaches of Makiki, Mānoa and Pālolo streams, (2) a standalone debris catchment feature, (3) multi-purpose detention basins in open space areas in the urbanized portions of the watershed, (4) floodwalls (and associated pump stations) along the Ala Wai Canal and (5) improvements to the flood warning system. The project also includes in-stream improvements to restore passage for native aquatic species as compensatory mitigation for impacts to aquatic habitat.

The public is invited to attend a public meeting for the project on September 30, 2015 from 5:00 p.m. to 8:00 p.m. at Washington Middle School (1633 S. King Street, Honolulu, HI 96826).

Stanford Carr Development, LLC (SCD) is proposing the development of 128 unit affordable rental project. This 11 story high building will consist of 27 one bedroom, 72 two bedroom, and 29 three bedroom units. This project is planned as an essential component in providing critical affordable rental housing inventory within this rapidly growing population center. This project will also fulfill the reserved housing obligation for the landowner required by the Hawai'i Community Development Authority (HCDA) for other market housing.

The project is also integral in providing valued housing within the transit oriented development area of the Honolulu Area Rapid Transit (HART) terminus at Ala Moana Center. Within easy walking distance to the transit station, the proposed project is viewed as a beneficial and desirable workforce housing project.

In addition to the 128 affordable rental units, the project will also include 77 parking stalls, a commercial space located on Waimanu Street, and other accessory uses to support the residential units. Vehicular access to the site is located on Kona Street and Waimanu Street. Pedestrian access is located along Kona Street.

The Honolulu Board of Water Supply (BWS) plans to install a second 0.5 million gallon potable water reservoir at its existing reservoir facility at 855 Alamuku Street in 'Āina Haina. The reservoir will be an enclosed concrete structure similar to the existing reservoir at the facility. The project will involve installation of the reservoir structure, connection of the new reservoir to water, drainage, and electrical utilities, and installation of reservoir control and monitoring equipment.

Due to spacial constraints, the BWS will also acquire a small portion of the adjacent Wailupe Community Park. It is estimated that approximately 0.03 acres of the park will be acquired to accommodate the proposed reservoir. The existing concrete retaining wall surrounding the facility will be reconstructed to follow the new property boundary. The area to be acquired is currently an open, grassy space; no structures within the park will be impacted. The proposed project will improve the storage capacity and reliability of the potable water supply

and distribution system for the East Honolulu communities of Wailupe Peninsula, 'Āina Haina, Niu Valley and Kuli'ou'ou, and will address an existing storage deficit in this system.



The City and County of Honolulu (City), proposes to upgrade the Kahanahou Wastewater Pump Station (WWPS) in Kāne'ohe, O'ahu. Infiltration and inflow of rainfall into the sewer system requires increasing the WWPS capacity. Proposed improvements to the WWPS include upgrades in pump capacity from 0.654 million gallons per day (mgd) to 1.26 mgd, renovations to the existing pump station, construction of a new emergency generator building, and other associated on-site improvements. The City also proposes to increase the capacity of the force main directly downstream of the Kahanahou WWPS. Four alternative routes were evaluated, along with a delayed action and no action alternative. The preferred alternative runs west along Kahanahou Circle, turning south at Lilipuna Place, through a private residence and the Makani Kai Marina townhouse complex, and ending at the existing sewer manhole on Makahio Street. This route was selected because it meets the project objectives and design criteria, avoids problematic areas, and crosses through fewer private properties than other routes. The proposed project will have short term impacts on traffic, noise, and air quality during construction. Efforts to minimize these impacts will be implemented to the extent practicable. The City anticipates a Finding of No Significant Impact for this project.

The Applicant proposes to construct a four-story building, with 42 one-bedroom apartment units, on a recently consolidated 24,593-square-foot parcel located at 734 and 735 Kihapai Place, which is in the Special Management Area (SMA). The currently vacant lot is in the Coconut Grove Tract of Kailua and is zoned A-2 Medium Density Apartment District. The site boarders the makai side of the Kawai Nui Marsh and the flood protection levee. The development will provide 58 at-grade parking stalls, including five visitor and two ADA accessible parking stalls. The development will include landscaping and a required park area. The Project has an estimated cost of \$8 million and is anticipated to take one year to complete once construction begins. As a site located within the SMA, the Project will require the approval of a SMA Use Permit from the Honolulu City Council.

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
