

Nathaniel Fisher proposes to construct a Commercial Boat Facility and two (2) Residential Dwellings on properties identified as Lot Nos. 64 and 65 of Land Court Application No. 1076 (Map 35), and further identified as TMK Nos. (4) 1-2-013:039 and 040. The Applicant proposes to construct a Commercial Boat Facility and two (2) Residential Dwellings (collectively "Project") on the northern (mauka) side of the Subject Properties to comply with the Section 27 of the CZO. The purpose of the Project is to provide alternative boating facilities for a commercial boating operation at Kikiaola Small Boat Harbor whereby patrons will park, check-in, gear up and load up to depart to board vessels at Kīkīaola Small Boat Harbor for commercial boat tours. Additionally, the Application proposes two (2) residential dwelling units to accompany the commercial boating facility for residential, employee housing and/or long-term rental use.

In 2022, the subject parcel was acquired by DHHL from HHFDC to develop homes for its beneficiaries. The proposed project will produce approximately sixty (60) single-family residential homes on a 99-year homestead lease for native Hawaiians. The project represents a fraction of the total 5,000 housing units that were assessed in the Final EIS and access to the development will be in a location similar to what was originally proposed.

The infrastructure improvements associated with the Kaupe'a Phase 2 project are consistent with the overall intent of the infrastructure alternatives analyzed in the Final EIS. New on-site improvements will include roadways, storm drainage systems, and utilities. The project will enhance the existing off-site improvements with the installation of traffic signals at the intersection of Kapolei Parkway and Puainako Street.

The State of Hawai'i Department of Hawaiian Home Lands proposes to construct infrastructure improvements in support of the Nā'iwa Agricultural Subdivision project located within the Ho'olehua region on the island of Moloka'i, Hawai'i. The improvements will occur on approximately 341.2 acres and formally subdivide agricultural lots for use by DHHL beneficiaries in accordance with the Hawaiian Homes Commission Act of 1920. The project involves the construction of the agricultural subdivision infrastructure improvements consisting of access roadways, electrical power, and irrigation and potable water for use by native Hawaiian beneficiaries. The project will also support the construction of homes and ancillary infrastructure by beneficiaries.

The Maui Department of Fire and Safety (MFD) plans to relocate its Pūkoʻo Fire Station on Molokaʻi to ʻUalapuʻe. MFD acquired a property in 'Ualapuʻe with an existing single-family residence and will renovate the residence with new support facilities. Site improvements will consist of grading and earthwork, truck and personal vehicle parking, lanscaping, vehicular access and driveway improvements. Utility infrastructure will consist of installation of upgrades to main electrical service wires and new sewage utilities. The interior of the residence will be remodeled with new flooring, cabinets, and applicances. The facility will not be a full-service fire station but rather a fire house, used as a base for a crew of firefighters.

KCH proposes a redundant wastewater treatment system with a capacity of 50,000 gallon-per-day (gpd) to supplement its existing 50,000-gpd system, which requires a shutdown to perform critical repair and maintenance. Because hospital operations must not be disrupted, KCH will divert the wastewater flow to the redundant system while the existing system is offline, and whenever future maintenance is needed. The project is not intended to accommodate expanded wastewater flows, as the system is limited by existing absorption bed capacity. For any substantial future expansion at KCH, a new absorption bed (with a 100 % backup) or other methods to deal with the treated wastewater will be developed. No sensitive biological, hydrological, archaeological, cultural or other resources are present. The project will be timed to minimize effects to medical facility operations, personnel and patients. The project would not adversely affect surface water or groundwater.

PRIOR DETERMINATION

The Hawaii Housing Finance and Development Corporation (HHFDC) has determined no additional environmental review is required for the Hale Moena Phase 3 and Phase 4 Affordable Housing Project in Kapolei, O'ahu. The Project was initially designed as a mixed-use affordable housing project. In 2015, HHFDC approved the Kapolei Mixed-Use Development Final Environmental Assessment (Final EA) and issued a finding of no significant impact (FONSI). The Final EA/FONSI addressed potential impacts and provided mitigation measures for the full build-out of the Project site, which was proposed as three phases on an entire block in Kapolei. The first two phases have been completed, and now the applicant proposes to build a third phase for residential use compared to ground floor retail proposed initially. After careful analysis and as described in the attachment, HHFDC as the approving agency is invoking Section 11-200.1-11, HAR, that the Final EA/FONSI is applicable to the Project and that additional environmental review is not required.

Proposed Rule: <u>Endangered and Threatened Species</u>; <u>Designation of Critical Habitat for Five Species of Threatened Indo-Pacific Corals</u> (published by the Commerce Department and the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration on 11/30/2023)

On November 27, 2020, we, NMFS, published in the Federal Register a proposal to designate 17 island units of critical habitat in the Pacific Islands Region for 7 Indo-Pacific coral species listed under the Endangered Species Act (ESA). Based on public comments and new information regarding the interpretation of the records of the listed corals and application to critical habitat, a substantial revision of the proposed rule is warranted. Accordingly, we are withdrawing the 2020 proposed rule and publishing this new proposed rule. We propose to designate critical habitat for five of the seven coral species that were addressed in the 2020 proposed rule: *Acropora globiceps, Acropora retusa, Acropora speciosa, Euphyllia paradivisa,* and Isopora crateriformis. Proposed critical habitat includes 16 island units encompassing approximately 251 square kilometers; 97 square miles of marine habitat. Several areas are ineligible for critical habitat because of final Department of Defense Integrated Natural Resource Management Plans that we have determined will benefit the listed corals. We have considered economic, national security, and other relevant impacts of the proposed designations, but are not proposing to exclude any areas from the critical habitat designations due to anticipated impacts. Notice: Marine Mammals; File No. 26593 (published by the Commerce Department and the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration on 11/24/2023)

Notice is hereby given that Adam Pack, Ph.D., University of Hawaii at Hilo, 200 West Kawili Street, Hilo, HI 96720, has applied for an amendment to Scientific Research Permit No. 26593, issued on March 13, 2023 (88 FR 23400, April 17, 2023), which authorizes the permit holder to study 29 cetacean species in Hawaiian and Alaskan waters, with a focus on humpback whales (Megaptera novaeangliae). The purpose of the research is to examine the behavioral ecology, biology and communication systems of humpback whales as well as the abundance, distribution, behavior, and physiological stress levels of all cetacean species in the study area. Research may be conducted from boats, airplanes, unmanned aircraft systems (UAS), and underwater. Animals may be studied using photo-ID, videogrammetry, passive acoustic recordings, behavioral observations, collection of fecal and skin samples, biopsy sampling, and suction-cup tagging. The permit holder is requesting the permit be amended to add active acoustic playbacks to humpback whales and to authorize suction-cup tagging of an additional 98 humpback whales annually as part of the acoustic research. In addition, Dr. Pack is requesting to add UAS deployment of suction-cup tags as a procedure for humpback whales. The objective of the acoustic playbacks are to examine humpback whale responses to vessel engine noise, conspecific sounds, natural ambient noise, and tonal sounds in Hawaiian waters. The permit expires on April 30, 2028. Written comments must be received on or before December 26, 2023. Please click on the title link for further information.

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) is issuing for public comment a draft guidance on applying the recent decision of the United States Supreme Court in County of Maui v. Hawaii Wildlife Fund, in the Clean Water Act Section 402 National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) permit program for point source discharges that travel through groundwater before reaching a water of the United States. This guidance will not have the force and effect of law and it will not bind the public in any way. By issuing this guidance, the EPA intends only to provide clarity to the public regarding existing requirements under the law or Agency policies. GLOSSARY OF TERMS AND DEFINITIONS

Agency Actions

Projects or programs proposed by any department, office, board, or commission of the state or county government which is part of the executive branch of that government per $\underline{\mathsf{HRS 343-2}}$.

Applicant Actions

Projects or programs proposed by any person who, pursuant to statute, ordinance, or rule, requests approval for a proposed action per HRS 343-2.

Draft Environmental Assessment

When an Agency or Applicant proposes an action that triggers HRS 343, an Environmental Assessment shall be prepared at the earliest practicable time to determine whether the action's environmental impact will be significant, and thus whether an environmental impact statement shall be required per HRS 343-5(b), for Agency actions and HRS 343-5(e), for Applicant actions. For actions for which the proposing or approving agency anticipates a Finding of No Significant Impact (AFNSI), a Draft EA (DEA) shall be made available for public review and comment for 30 days and public notice is published in this periodic bulletin.

Final Environmental Assessment and Finding of No Significant Impact

The action's proponent shall respond in writing to comments on a DEA received during the 30-day review period and prepare a Final EA (FEA) that includes those responses to determine whether an environmental impact statement shall be required. If there are no significant impacts, then the Agency will issue a Finding of No Significant Impact (FONSI). An Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) will not be required and the project has cleared HRS 343 requirements. The public has 30 days from the notice of a FONSI in this bulletin to challenge the FONSI in the Environmental Court and seek a ruling to require the preparation of an EIS.

Final Environmental Assessment and Environmental Impact Statement Preparation Notice

An EIS shall be required if the Agency finds that the proposed action may have a significant effect on the environment. The Agency shall file notice of such determination with OPSD called an EIS Preparation Notice (EISPN) along with the supporting Final EA. After the notice of the FEA-EISPN is published in this bulletin, the public has 30 days to request to become a consulted party and to make written comments. The public (including the Applicant) has 60 days from the notice of the EISPN in this bulletin to ask a court to not require the preparation of an EIS.

Act 172-2012, Direct-to-EIS, Environmental Impact Statement Preparation Notice (with no EA)

Act 172 in 2012 amended HRS 343 by providing for an agency to bypass the preparation of an environmental assessment for various actions that in the experience of the agency would clearly require the preparation of an EIS. The agency must submit its determination that an EIS is required for an action (Act 172-2012, EISPN) with a completed publication form detailing the specifics of the action. This starts a 30-day scoping period in which the agency or applicant must hold a public scoping meeting for the preparation of the Draft EIS. Written comments and responses on the EISPN must be incorporated into the subsequent Draft EIS and oral comments from the public scoping meeting must be recorded and submitted to OPSD with the Draft EIS.

HEPA

While technically there is no "Hawai'i Environmental Policy Act," HRS 343 is often referred to by this term.

Act 312-2012, Secondary Actions in the Highway or Public Right Of Way

Act 312-2012, amended HRS 343, by adding a new section (HRS 343-5.5, entitled "Exception to applicability of chapter"). HEPA allows for a statutory exception for "secondary actions" (those that involve infrastructure in the highway or public right-of-way) provided that the permit or approval of the related "primary action" (those outside of the highway or public-right-of-way and on private property) is not subject to discretionary consent and further provided that the applicant for the primary action submits documentation from the appropriate agency confirming that no further discretional approvals are required. An aid to understanding this is to visualize residential driveway improvements in the public right-of-way.

Draft Environmental Impact Statement

After receiving the comments on the EISPN, the Agency or Applicant must prepare a Draft Environmental Impact Statement (DEIS). The content requirements of the DEIS shall contain an explanation of the environmental consequences of the proposed action including the direct, indirect and cumulative impacts and their mitigation measures. The public has 45 days from the first publication date in this bulletin to comment on a DEIS.

Final Environmental Impact Statement

After considering all public comments filed during the DEIS stage, the Agency or Applicant must prepare a Final EIS (FEIS). The FEIS must respond in a point-by-point manner to all comments from the draft and must be included in the FEIS. For Applicant projects, the Approving Agency is the Accepting Authority and must make a determination within 30 days or the FEIS is deemed accepted as a matter of law. For an Agency project, the Governor or the Mayor (or their designated representative) is the Accepting Authority, and unlike applicant actions, there is no time limit on the accepting authority reviewing the FEIS. Only after the FEIS is accepted may the project be implemented.

Acceptability

The Accepting Authority must be satisified that the FEIS meets three criteria (process, content, response to comments) to accept it. Whether the FEIS is accepted or not accepted, notice of the Acceptance Determination is published in this bulletin. The public has 60 days from publication to legally challenge the acceptance of a FEIS. For both Applicant and Agency actions, the Applicant or the proposing Agency can prepare a Revised DEIS after a non-acceptance determination.

National Environmental Policy Act

The National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) requires federal projects to prepare a Federal EA or EIS. In many ways it is similar to Hawai'i's law. Some projects require both a State and Federal EIS and the public comment procedure should be coordinated. Upon request by a federal agency, OPSD publishes NEPA notices in this bulletin to help keep the public informed of important federal actions.

Conservation District

Proposed uses of land in the State Conservation District require a Conservation District Use Application (CDUA). These applications are reviewed and approved/denied by the Department or Board of Land and Natural Resources. Members of the public may intervene in the permit process. This bulletin will include EAs & EISs for actions proposed within the Conservation District.

Special Management Area and Shoreline Setback Area

The Special Management Area (SMA) is along the coast-line of all islands; development in this area is generally regulated by HRS 205A, and county ordinance. A portion of the SMA that is addressed by HRS 343 is the Shoreline Area, which includes land between the State-certified shoreline and the county-determined shoreline setback line. This bulletin will include EAs & EISs for actions proposed within the Shoreline Setback Area. Some projects going through the SMA permit process on O'ahu are also required to go through an environmental review process that mirrors HRS 343; these "ROH Chapter 25" EAs/EISs are included in this bulletin.

Shoreline Certifications

State law requires that Hawai'i shorelines be surveyed and certified when necessary to clearly establish the shoreline setback from the certified shoreline. The public may participate in the process to help assure accurate regulatory boundaries. Private land owners often petition to have their shoreline certified by the State surveyor prior to construction. This bulletin publishes notice from the Department of Land and Natural Resources of shoreline certification applicants and final certifications or rejections.

Environmental Advisory Council

The Environmental Advisory Council is a 15-member citizen board appointed by the Governor. They serve as a liaison between the Director of OPSD and the general public concerning ecology and environmental quality. Agendas of their regular meetings are posted on the Internet and the public is invited to attend.

Agency Exemption Lists

Government agencies may keep a list describing the minor activities they regularly perform that are exempt from the environmental review process. These lists and any amendments shall be submitted to the Council for review and concurrence (HAR 11-200.1-16). This bulletin will publish an agency's draft exemption list for public comment prior to Council decision making, as well as notice of the Council's decision on the list.

Endangered Species

This bulletin is required by HRS 343-3(c), to publish notice of public comment periods or public hearings for Habitat Conservation Plans (HCP), Safe Harbor Agreements (SHA), or Incidental Take Licenses (ITL) under the federal Endangered Species Act, as well as availability for public inspection of a proposed HCP or SHA, or a proposed ITL (as a part of an HCP or SHA).

For actions that have published a draft EA or EISPN on or before August 8, 2019, use the 1996 Rules Submittal Deadline column for determining the filing date for the Final EA, Draft EIS, Final EIS, Acceptance / Non-acceptance, supplemental determinations, and supplemental EISs.

- Section 11-200.1-4(a), HAR, establishes the publication schedule of the periodic bulletin to be on the eighth and twenty-third of each month. Publication shall occur on weekends and holidays, when appropriate.
- Section 11-200.1-5(a), HAR, establishes the submittal deadline to be five working days before the publication date. The schedule does not count holidays and non-working days. Items must be submitted before the close of business (4:30 PM) on the submittal deadline. Note: Actions that have published the Draft EA or EISPN on or before August 8, 2019 shall file pursuant to Chapter 11-200, HAR ("1996 Rules"), which requires filing eight working days before publication.
- Comment periods for EAs are 30 days and for EISs are 45 days from the publication date. Section 11-200.1-3 sets forth how to count the days from publication. The publication date is day zero. Holidays and weekends are counted. When the deadline falls on a state holiday or non-working day, the deadline is the next working day.
