


The Environmental Notice April 8, 2024



Hilo Medical Center proposes a new 2-story, ~15,000 sf Administrative Services Building on the site of the former West Wing Building. Design includes private office, open office and common areas for administrative, nursing, marketing and contracts staff, as well as 35 physician residents. The architectural style follows the "New Formalism" style of contemporary healthcare buildings. It would support existing functions and staff and would not increase staff, vendors, patients or traffic. This addition is essential to improve the efficiency of medical services delivery. No sensitive biological, hydrological, archaeological, cultural or other resources are present on the cleared, graded site.

DHHL proposes to place into production an existing drilled and cased test well (State Well No. 5639-04) in Honokōwai. A pump would be installed within the well, with the well pump discharge piping installed above-ground. Other major above-ground components include fencing, a 50,000-gallon control tank, a single-story 30 feet (ft.) by 18 ft. control building to house electrical components and a sodium hypochlorite system for disinfection of the water, a transformer located on a concrete pad, and a standby generator on a concrete pad. The site will be graded to accommodate a potential future 500,000 gallon storage tank. A 12-inch ductile iron transmission waterline is proposed to convey water from approximately 8,000 feet from the well site to a proposed 500,000 gallon mixing tank near the Māhinahina Water Treatment Facility. The transmission line would cross the access road into Honokōwai Valley at the bottom of the gulch as it crosses over Honokōwai Stream.

The Draft Environmental Impact Statement (DEIS) for the Ledcor South Maui Properties and Improvements has been submitted for republication due to the loss of quorum of the Maui Planning Commission at their March 25, 2024 meeting. By republishing the DEIS, another comment period will be made available so the Maui Planning Commission will have an opportunity to submit comments on the DEIS. The resubmitted DEIS is exactly the same as the one previously published in The Environmental Notice on February 23, 2024; no changes have been made to the DEIS.

Hi'ipaka LLC proposes the Economic Resiliency Project at Waimea Valley on the North Shore of O'ahu, which includes: (1) renovation and expansion of the gift shop and the bathrooms at the Visitor Center; (2) reconstruction of a Community Resource Center; (3) Pavilion enhancement; (4) construction of a new Traditional Hawaiian Hale; (5) installation of rockfall fences near the Community Resource Center; (6) water system upgrades; and (7) Sewage Treatment Plant replacement. In addition, erosion control measures and additional rockfall mitigation are proposed on an as-needed basis. Related offsite improvements include a new fire hydrant along Kamehameha Highway near the Valley entrance and potential traffic improvements, as may be required by the Department of Transportation. A Major Special Management Area Permit and a Conservation District Use Permit will be obtained for the project.

FEDERAL CONSISTENCY REVIEWS

The following federal actions are being reviewed for consistency with the enforceable policies of the Hawai'i Coastal Zone Management (CZM) Program, including the CZM objectives and policies in Hawai'i Revised Statutes, Chapter 205A. Federal consistency, pursuant to Section 307 of the Coastal Zone Management Act of 1972 (CZMA), as amended, generally requires that federal actions, within and outside of the coastal zone, which have reasonably foreseeable effects on any coastal use (land or water) or natural resource of the coastal zone be consistent with the enforceable policies of a state's federally approved coastal management program. Federal actions include federal agency activities, federal license or permit activities, and federal financial assistance activities. This public notice is being provided in accordance with § 306(d)(14) of the CZMA, and federal regulations at 15 CFR § 930.2, § 930.42, and § 930.61. Proposed Action: The National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) proposes to designate the waters surrounding the Northwestern Hawaiian Islands as Papahānaumokuākea National Marine Sanctuary to protect nationally significant biological, cultural, and historical resources and to manage this special place as part of the National Marine Sanctuary System. The purpose of this proposed action is to provide comprehensive and coordinated management of the marine areas of Papahānaumokuākea to protect nationally significant biological, cultural, and historical resources through a sanctuary designation.

Seagoing Buoy Tender Mooring and Structure Pier Upgrades, O'ahu

Proposed Action: The US Coast Guard (USCG) proposes mooring and structure pier upgrades at Base Honolulu which include demolition and disposal of the existing floating dock with foundations and piles; construction of a new 110-foot fixed, pile-supported pier; a new floating dock (connected by a small dolphin); and a new small lateral pier extension to fill in a triangular gap between Berth F bulkhead and the new Berth G pier extension. The pile-supported pier extends the existing berth to accommodate a second 225-foot Seagoing Buoy Tender (WLB) and the three existing Fast Response Cutters (FRCs). The floating pier would be used as another berth for the existing FRCs and period of maintenance and on/offloading that would otherwise require shifting berth positions at Base Honolulu.

Rule: <u>Endangered and Threatened Wildlife and Plants</u>; <u>Listing Endangered and Threatened Species and Designating Critical Habitat</u> (published by the Fish and Wildlife Service and the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration on 04/05/2024)

We, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (FWS) and the National Marine Fisheries Service (NMFS; collectively, the "Services"), finalize revisions to portions of our regulations that implement section 4 of the Endangered Species Act of 1973, as amended. The revisions to the regulations clarify, interpret, and implement portions of the Act concerning the procedures and criteria used for listing, reclassifying, and delisting species on the Lists of Endangered and Threatened Wildlife and Plants (Lists) and designating critical habitat. This final rule is effective May 6, 2024. Click on the title link above for further information

Rule: <u>Pacific Island Fisheries</u>; <u>2024 Northwestern Hawaiian Islands Lobster Harvest Guideline</u> (published by the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration on 04/05/2024)

GLOSSARY OF TERMS AND DEFINITIONS

Agency Actions

Projects or programs proposed by any department, office, board, or commission of the state or county government which is part of the executive branch of that government per $\underline{\mathsf{HRS 343-2}}$.

Applicant Actions

Projects or programs proposed by any person who, pursuant to statute, ordinance, or rule, requests approval for a proposed action per <u>HRS 343-2</u>.

Draft Environmental Assessment

When an Agency or Applicant proposes an action that triggers HRS 343, an Environmental Assessment shall be prepared at the earliest practicable time to determine whether the action's environmental impact will be significant, and thus whether an environmental impact statement shall be required per HRS 343-5(b), for Agency actions and HRS 343-5(e), for Applicant actions. For actions for which the proposing or approving agency anticipates a Finding of No Significant Impact (AFNSI), a Draft EA (DEA) shall be made available for public review and comment for 30 days and public notice is published in this periodic bulletin.

Final Environmental Assessment and Finding of No Significant Impact

The action's proponent shall respond in writing to comments on a DEA received during the 30-day review period and prepare a Final EA (FEA) that includes those responses to determine whether an environmental impact statement shall be required. If there are no significant impacts, then the Agency will issue a Finding of No Significant Impact (FONSI). An Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) will not be required and the project has cleared HRS 343 requirements. The public has 30 days from the notice of a FONSI in this bulletin to challenge the FONSI in the Environmental Court and seek a ruling to require the preparation of an EIS.

Final Environmental Assessment and Environmental Impact Statement Preparation

An EIS shall be required if the Agency finds that the proposed action may have a significant effect on the environment. The Agency shall file notice of such determination with OPSD called an EIS Preparation Notice (EISPN) along with the supporting Final EA. After the notice of the FEA-EISPN is published in this bulletin, the public has 30 days to request to become a consulted party and to make written comments. The public (including the Applicant) has 60 days from the notice of the EISPN in this bulletin to ask a court to not require the preparation of an EIS.

Act 172-2012, Direct-to-EIS, Environmental Impact Statement Preparation Notice (with no EA)

Act 172 in 2012 amended HRS 343 by providing for an agency to bypass the preparation of an environmental assessment for various actions that in the experience of the agency would clearly require the preparation of an EIS. The agency must submit its determination that an EIS is required for an action (Act 172-2012, EISPN) with a completed publication form detailing the specifics of the action. This starts a 30-day scoping period in which the agency or applicant must hold a public scoping meeting for the preparation of the Draft EIS. Written comments and responses on the EISPN must be incorporated into the subsequent Draft EIS and oral comments from the public scoping meeting must be recorded and submitted to OPSD with the Draft EIS.

HFPA

While technically there is no "Hawai'i Environmental Policy Act," HRS 343 is often referred to by this term.

Act 312-2012, Secondary Actions in the Highway or Public Right Of Way

Act 312-2012, amended HRS 343, by adding a new section (HRS 343-5.5, entitled "Exception to applicability of chapter"). HEPA allows for a statutory exception for "secondary actions" (those that involve infrastructure in the highway or public right-of-way) provided that the permit or approval of the related "primary action" (those outside of the highway or public-right-of-way and on private property) is not subject to discretionary consent and further provided that the applicant for the primary action submits documentation from the appropriate agency confirming that no further discretional approvals are required. An aid to understanding this is to visualize residential driveway improvements in the public right-of-way.

Draft Environmental Impact Statement

After receiving the comments on the EISPN, the Agency or Applicant must prepare a Draft Environmental Impact Statement (DEIS). The content requirements of the DEIS shall contain an explanation of the environmental consequences of the proposed action including the direct, indirect and cumulative impacts and their mitigation measures. The public has 45 days from the first publication date in this bulletin to comment on a DEIS.

Final Environmental Impact Statement

After considering all public comments filed during the DEIS stage, the Agency or Applicant must prepare a Final EIS (FEIS). The FEIS must respond in a point-by-point manner to all comments from the draft and must be included in the FEIS. For Applicant projects, the Approving Agency is the Accepting Authority and must make a determination within 30 days or the FEIS is deemed accepted as a matter of law. For an Agency project, the Governor or the Mayor (or their designated representative) is the Accepting Authority, and unlike applicant actions, there is no time limit on the accepting authority reviewing the FEIS. Only after the FEIS is accepted may the project be implemented.

Acceptability

The Accepting Authority must be satisified that the FEIS meets three criteria (process, content, response to comments) to accept it. Whether the FEIS is accepted or not accepted, notice of the Acceptance Determination is published in this bulletin. The public has 60 days from publication to legally challenge the acceptance of a FEIS. For both Applicant and Agency actions, the Applicant or the proposing Agency can prepare a Revised DEIS after a non-acceptance determination.

National Environmental Policy Act

The National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) requires federal projects to prepare a Federal EA or EIS. In many ways it is similar to Hawai'i's law. Some projects require both a State and Federal EIS and the public comment procedure should be coordinated. Upon request by a federal agency, OPSD publishes NEPA notices in this bulletin to help keep the public informed of important federal actions.

Conservation District

Proposed uses of land in the State Conservation District require a Conservation District Use Application (CDUA). These applications are reviewed and approved/denied by the Department or Board of Land and Natural Resources. Members of the public may intervene in the permit process. This bulletin will include EAs & EISs for actions proposed within the Conservation District.

Special Management Area and Shoreline Setback Area

The Special Management Area (SMA) is along the coast-line of all islands; development in this area is generally regulated by HRS 205A, and county ordinance. A portion of the SMA that is addressed by HRS 343 is the Shoreline Area, which includes land between the State-certified shoreline and the county-determined shoreline setback line. This bulletin will include EAs & EISs for actions proposed within the Shoreline Setback Area. Some projects going through the SMA permit process on O'ahu are also required to go through an environmental review process that mirrors HRS 343; these "ROH Chapter 25" EAs/EISs are included in this bulletin.

Shoreline Certifications

State law requires that Hawai'i shorelines be surveyed and certified when necessary to clearly establish the shoreline setback from the certified shoreline. The public may participate in the process to help assure accurate regulatory boundaries. Private land owners often petition to have their shoreline certified by the State surveyor prior to construction. This bulletin publishes notice from the Department of Land and Natural Resources of shoreline certification applicants and final certifications or rejections.

Environmental Advisory Council

The Environmental Advisory Council is a 15-member citizen board appointed by the Governor. They serve as a liaison between the Director of OPSD and the general public concerning ecology and environmental quality. Agendas of their regular meetings are posted on the Internet and the public is invited to attend.

Agency Exemption Lists

Government agencies may keep a list describing the minor activities they regularly perform that are exempt from the environmental review process. These lists and any amendments shall be submitted to the Council for review and concurrence (HAR 11-200.1-16). This bulletin will publish an agency's draft exemption list for public comment prior to Council decision making, as well as notice of the Council's decision on the list.

Endangered Species

This bulletin is required by HRS 343-3(c), to publish notice of public comment periods or public hearings for Habitat Conservation Plans (HCP), Safe Harbor Agreements (SHA), or Incidental Take Licenses (ITL) under the federal Endangered Species Act, as well as availability for public inspection of a proposed HCP or SHA, or a proposed ITL (as a part of an HCP or SHA).
