The covid pandemic forced the Council of Geographic Names Authorities (CoGNA) to cancel the 2020 and 2021 conferences where we traditionally hold elections during the annual business meeting. Nonetheless, as your State's Geographic Names Authority, you are a member of CoGNA and a voting member at our business meeting or for emergency elections.

In February 2021, we held an informal meeting of the Executive Committee to discuss CoGNA's future. At that meeting, I announced that after 25-years of service to CoGNA, I would like to retire June 30, 2021. At the time we did not have a candidate to take over the Executive Secretary duties. We now have a candidate; Dr. Christine Johnson, of the Nevada State Board on Geographic Names has self-nominated for the position. With approval of the Executive Committee, I am calling for an emergency election to do the following:

Acknowledge my retirement, to become effective after the 2021 IRS 990-N tax report is filed;

Elect Christine Johnson as the new Executive Secretary; the transfer of some duties and documents will follow an affirmative vote, with the remainder to happen at the time of my official retirement.

According to CoGNA's Constitution and Bylaws (available on the website under "Founding Documents"), these actions can occur via an emergency business meeting, conducted by email, with at least 20% of the states casting votes.
