Dear President Kouchi, Speaker Saiki, and Members of the Legislature:

On behalf of the Hawai'i Interagency Council for Transit-Oriented Development (TOD Council) established pursuant to Act 130, Session Laws of Hawai'i 2016, we are pleased to transmit for legislators' consideration a list of recommended transit-oriented development (TOD) capital improvement project (CIP) budget requests, which are included in the proposed Executive Budget (House Bill 1600/Senate Bill 2176).

The TOD Council is charged with reviewing TOD-related CIP budget requests to the Legislature pursuant to Hawai'i Revised Statutes Section 226-63. At its February 18, 2022 meeting, the TOD Council reviewed and endorsed the following CIP requests for TOD projects for funding by the Legislature for Fiscal Year 2023.

OPSD – State Transit- Oriented Development (TOD) Planning, Statewide	Funds would be used for planning and feasibility studies, master plans, infrastructure assessments, cost estimation, preparation of environmental review documents as needed to advance TOD priority projects identified in the State TOD Strategic Plan, including support for coordination and collaboration of State and county agencies to plan and implement key projects. DOT – Farrington Highway Widening, Kapolei Golf Course to Fort Weaver Road, Oʻahu	Farrington Highway is being widened from Fort Weaver Road to Kualaka'i Parkway to accommodate East Kapolei development and traffic demands. Plans are for a three-lane highway with one lane in each direction and a shared turn lane throughout the route, providing additional room to install bike lanes and pedestrian walkways. Most of the congestion is at intersections. The intent is to keep high-capacity traffic on the freeway. The project will be completed in one phase. The roadway will interface with three rail stations: Honouliuli/Ho'opili, Keone'ae/UH West O'ahu, and Kualaka'i/East Kapolei.	TRN501	\$95,000,000
PSD – O'ahu Community Correctional Center (OCCC) New Housing and Support Facilities, O'ahu	The existing OCCC facility, the State's largest jail, has been operating at its current location since 1975. Due to its current age and obsolete facilities and infrastructure, PSD plans to relocate and construct a modern facility at the Hālawa Animal Quarantine Station site. The quarantine station needs to be relocated to accommodate the new OCCC facility, and the existing OCCC facility needs to be relocated before the 16-acre parcel in Kalihi can be evaluated for its TOD potential. The CIP request includes funding for design and improvements to the existing Laumaka	PSD900	\$15,000,000

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	Work Furlough Center (LWFC) on an adjacent site. The existing LWFC facilities were assessed as being in poor physical condition and not meeting current standards for security, health, and safety.		
UH – West Oʻahu, Campus Expansion and Development of University Village	The CIP request will provide essential planning and design funds for infrastructure to spur development of the University District lands, including TOD on District lands at 2 transit stops. The vision for the University District is a vibrant, sustainable mixeduse community that will be integrated and complement the UHWO campus. It presents an opportunity to create a new "college town" for future generations.	UOH900	\$10,000,000

Provided that the funding and appropriations do not replace or adversely impact priorities in the Executive Budget, the TOD Council also requests your support of the following measures or similar proposals:

• HB 2023, HD1(FIN)/SB 2154 (Dead) – Relating to Transit-Oriented Development (Rep. Nakamura/Sen. Kouchi)

Authorizes the issuance of general obligation bonds and appropriates funds for certain transit-oriented development projects identified in the state Strategic Plan for Transit-Oriented Development. Effective 7/1/2050. (HD1)

The TOD Council is comprised of 25 members representing State agencies, the counties, the Senate and House of Representatives, the Honolulu office of the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development, and affordable housing, business, and development interest groups. The TOD Council is charged with coordinating and facilitating State agency TOD planning and facilitating consultation and collaboration between the State and the counties in support of State and county TOD and Smart Growth initiatives. TOD/Smart Growth Need/s to be Addressed	Enable implementation of TOD projects that aim to increase delivery of affordable housing, mixed-use development, economic opportunities, and services in walkable communities around transit nodes or centers served by scheduled public bus transit and other public infrastructure.
Community Benefits/Impacts if Funded	Implementation of keystone projects could provide needed affordable housing in more compact, complete communities, increasing walkability and multi-modal transportation options, promoting health and economic opportunity, reducing reliance on automobiles and fossil fuels in the transportation sector, and conserving open space and rural lands.
Impact on Project if Funding Deferred	Implementation of keystone projects will be delayed or put on hold, as will opportunities to advance planning for affordable housing in TOD communities.
Addtional Information	Response to FY22 funding call for proposals exceeded amount appropriated; all six projects were funded due to their critical juncture. Scope of Project	Plans are to construct a three-lane highway- with one lane going in each direction and a shared turn lane throughout the route. It is planned to be completed in one phase.
TOD/Smart Growth Need/s to be Addressed	The highway design will create a catalyst for more housing opportunities and mixed-use development in the area while supporting current capacity needs like Hoopili, UH-West Oahu, DLNR lands, and Queens Medical Center - West Oahu. Also, the three-lane highway will provide a more space for walkable neighborhoods and add more transportation choices like biking, walking, bus and rail transit, etc.
Community Benefits/Impacts if Funded	By having a smaller roadway, the intent is to keep high-capacity traffic on the freeway. The extra space will provide room for bikeways and wider sidewalks. It could provide a more sense of place and community.
Impact on Project if Funding Deferred	Possible delays in housing development and increase in roadway construction costs.

#### Project Information and Justification

Scope of Project

Plans, Land, and Design for the Professional services to develop, facilitate, and assist the State on the Solicitation, Procurement, and Project Delivery for the New Oahu Community Correctional Center (OCCC). This process will include, but not limited to, a Request for Invitations (RFI) and/or Expression of Interest (EOI), Request for Qualifications (RFQ), Request for Proposals (RFP), Review of Qualified Proposals, and the Award to the Most Qualified Developer Team. The selected Professional Services Consultant shall be part of a Project Mgmt Team providing professional services and support to the State of Hawaii and Department of Public Safety, from project solicitation to project completion of a New turnkey OCCC Facility and provide professional support in executing innovative project delivery initiatives not withstanding methodologies such as leveraging multiple projects if deemed beneficial to the State.

TOD/Smart Growth Need/s to be Addressed Improvements to the public transportation corridors servicing the Halawa Valley Industrial Area and Hallawa Valley commercial district will need to be upgraded to address the increase in commercial, industrial and public useage of the area. This woulld included, but not limited to, improvements to existing utilities (electrical, sewer, water, gas, etc.) and improved public and pedestrian access to and from the area.

Community Benefits/Impacts if Funded Community benefits includes improved transportation and infrastructure improvements promoting future growth and commerce in the area.

Impact on Project if Funding Deferred

If funding deferred, PSD will continue to operate its existing OCCC Facility, currently located at the end of Kamehameha Highway-Dillingham Blvd, where its current design life have now far exceed its capacity and would require significant improvements and upgrades to meet current security and operational demands mandated by the State of Hawaii.

Addtional Information

Attached Maps and Figures were submitted in the OCCC Plans Review Use (PRU) permit filing for the new OCCC site. Proposed Layout of the new OCCC Facility are CONCEPTUAL ONLY with the FINAL DESIGN to be determined later via the project delivery process selected which is most advantagous to the State.
