Dear Chair Chang and Secretary Kaaa,

I am a conservationist and former statewide land manager for the Hawai'i Army National Guard, former interim director of the Nature Conservancy Maui and Lāna'i programs, volunteer coordinator for Haleakalā National Park, and presently work in wildfire science communication with the University of Hawai'i and the Hawai'i Wildfire Management Organization.

I have worked since 1996 in land conservation, land restoration, endangered species protection, wildfire risk reduction. I lived and worked on Maui for 16 years helping to conserve many of the mauka forested places above the current impact zones of the Kula and Lāhaina fires. (We moved to my dad's place here in Hāmakua 5 years ago, and retain deep ties to the lives and lands on Maui.) The places I have worked include the 5,000+ acre Waikamoi Preserve (on East Maui), and across the West Maui Watershed (Mauna Kahalawai) at Kapunakea Preserve, Wahikuli, Kahoma, and elsewhere.

I write to you my personal and professional observations (not on behalf of any of my current or former employers) to implore you to consider the hazards of setting aside the Maui Komohana Water Management Area designations. These were hard won, necessary designations to replenish the aquifer, as well as important aquatic organisms, as well as traditional and customary farming practices which would green and provide food for Maui Komohana residents at risk of food insecurity and wildfire.

It is profoundly disheartening to hear about the suspension of Maui Komohana's important water management designation (and re-assignment of Kaleo Manuel) in favor of a fiction that points the blame of "not enough water to fight fire or build houses" at subsistence farmers. Along with submitting a request to testify at the meeting virtually, I am also asking the board to utilize the following as an additional written testimony from myself.

Amidst the chaos and suffering in Lāhainā, West Maui Land Company official Glenn Tremble exploited the unfolding tragedy to gain access to more water and roll back water management protections established for Maui Komohana. Tremble falsely claimed that had they had access to more diverted stream water, there would have been more water for fighting the Lāhainā fires on August 8. Without verification of the actual facts, Commission on Water Resource Management chair Dawn Chang unlawfully "re-deployed" the Water Commission's deputy director, Kaleo Manuel, while the Governor suspended hard-fought water management measures protecting West Maui's streams, aquifers, and farmers from corporate water hoarding.

The facts are clear: diverting more water to Launiupoko reservoirs would not have supplied more water for firefighting—the reservoirs are not connected to the county's fire hydrants, and even helicopters could not be used for water drops on due to the high winds of August 8-9. Instead, increased diversions would have cut off stream flow that may have been downstream farmers' only source of water for fire suppression. West Maui Land Company's Glenn Tremble simply tried push a dishonest narrative about the fires to hoard stream water and dismantle the water management tools that Maui Komohana communities have long fought for - and the Governor's administration fell for it, hook, line and sinker.

Let there be no mistake—there is enough water for everyone. In the climate crisis era, appropriately managing this precious resource and protecting it from corporate water hoarding are paramount – for our ecosystems, communities, and overall resilience. The Water Commission made more strides towards achieving these goals under Deputy Manuel than any other deputy in the history of the State Water Code – and now both Deputy Manuel and the code itself are being attacked by corporate and political powers-that-be.

The future of Maui Komohana's watersheds and aquifers are at stake. Moreover, letting the Governor and Commission Chair's actions stand could also impact water management measures across the islands. This is a moment for people power to push back against a future where money and influence continue to dictate the disposition of our islands' most precious resource.

The next few meetings of the Water Commission provide a key opportunity for the people of Hawai'i to voice their support for managing and fairly sharing our wai, and to stop the government from helping corporations steal our water – whether it is in West Maui, East Maui, West Kaua'i or Hawai'i Island.

Aloha Chair Chang and Honorable Members of CWRM,

My name is Jen Mather and I currently live in Kahului; previously a long time resident of Lahaina, and consider it to be my one hānai. I work at Waiola Church where many community meetings were held in our hall, Keōpūolani, and where the dedicated staff of CWRM, especially Deputy Director Kaleo Manuel, worked with our people through the painstaking processes of IIFSs and the ground and surface water management area designation.

I write to you today, a little over a month since the fires devastated our community, to ask you to honor the commitment and hard work that the people of Maui Komohana, the CWRM staff, and you, as commissioners, have been a vital part of through the years. It pains me to see the current narrative of our water laws, and thereby, our kalo farmers, as nefarious evil doers promulgated by West Maui Land Company and their agent, Glenn Tremble, has been accepted. It is also infuriating to see that same fictitious narrative then given further agency by Governor Green, resulting in an international media frenzy that paints a single kalo farmer and Deputy Director Manuel as wrong-doers and principal agents in the destruction of our town. Long Beach and nearby San Pedro, CA host one end of the annual Transpacific Yacht Race, which traces the waterways long established between the Kanaka Maoli, Tongva, Acjachemen, and other Indigenous seafarers and travelers to the sacred meeting place of Tovaangar. Long Beach and Greater Los Angeles also host the largest communities of Asian/American settlers outside of Asia.

Thus, Long Beach is closely connected to Lahaina, Maui, Oceania, and Asia by history, people, and ecosystems.

I research histories of science, media, and technology, including water and reservoir systems (see forthcoming 2024 special issue on "Reservoirs" in the journal of *History* & *Technology*: https://www.tandfonline.com/journals/ghat20). Water has been historically diverted from Indigenous peoples instead to settler

colonizers, especially those representing government and corporations pursuing wealth extraction and profits. This has

Aloha e Chair Chang and Commissioners,

We are the alaka'i of 'Ahahui o Hawai'i ("the Hui") at the William S. Richardson School of Law. We are the oldest student organization at the law school and the only one dedicated to advocating for Native Hawaiian justice and uplifting the Lāhui. Our current membership consists of 88 law students, many of whom choose to focus their legal studies in areas most likely to affect Native Hawaiian communities, providing us with a stronger understanding of the laws governing traditional and customary practices, water management, and environmental protection. Additionally, many of us have spent time over the last year assisting community members with their water use permit applications and advocating for the restoration of streamflow in Maui Komohana, especially in light of the recent wildfires.

We submit this **<u>testimony in strong support</u>** of the following:

- 1. The Water Commission should uphold the State Water Code to ensure public trust water resources are shared equally, especially for Native Hawaiian water rights;
- 2. Chair Dawn Chang should reinstate Kaleo Manuel as the Deputy Director of the Commission on Water Resources Management;
- 3. The Water Commission should verify that West Maui Land Co. is complying with instream flow standards and hold corporate interests accountable;
- 4. The Water Commission should respect the existing designation of Maui Komohana Water Management Area; and
- 5. The Water Commission should re-center Maui Kamaʿāina in the decisions about their future and hold its October 17 meeting on Maui to hear directly from those most affected by the fires.

Through our legal studies and our engagements with community members we have become intimately familiar with the State Water Code (HRS Ch. 174C), the Hawai'i State Constitution and its provisions describing the public trust doctrine (Art. XI, §§ 1, 7) and traditional and customary practices (Art. XII, § 7), and the relevant case law concerning water rights in Hawai'i. These laws, both in letter and in spirit, clearly establish that this Commission's essential duty is to ensure fair distribution of water

resources for the benefit of present and future generations. We believe that this duty was effectuated most successfully through the work of Deputy Director Kaleo Manuel and the unanimous designation of Maui Komohana as a Water Management Area. We believe that this duty can not be met through decisions based on the agendas of for profit corporations, such as West Maui Land Co., who have historically enriched themselves through the diversion and exploitation of water. Likewise, regardless of the position taken by the current administration, the Commission cannot meet this duty if designation is lifted or the Water Code is suspended, as it was in the immediate aftermath of the August 2023 wildfires. The only way for this Commission to uphold its legal duty in a pono way is to reinstate Deputy Director Manuel, respect the designation of the Maui Komohana Water Management Area, and re-center Maui Kamaʿāina in all decisions being made about their future.

We represent a growing number of Hawai'i born and raised citizens and Kānaka Maoli, fed up with the influence of corporate greed affecting our communities. Our Hui stands apart as a group dedicated to long term change by standing up whenever the Government falls short of their duty to the Hawaiian people. As our members continue to enter various fields in service to Hawai'i, we stand as beacons, aimed at upholding Constitutional obligations for the betterment of our future generations. We are a voice of Hawai'i's law in the present, past, and future as we commence our 50th year as a student organization dedicated to protecting Native Hawaiian Rights. We have and will continue to stand with the rights of the people as members of the community, and as students of the law.

The Hui has faith that the Commission will remedy the mistakes of the past and make the necessary reparations to Lahaina community members directly impacted by over a century of mass diversion and the recent devastation of the August 2023 wildfires. Through this process, the Commission must not afford undue influence to the corporate entities who would seek to profit from the disaster and have lobbied the Commission both publicly and in private to lift designation and amend IIFSs in their favor. In this time of hulihia, we need the Commission's help to uphold the law and ensure the equitable restoration and management of freshwater in Maui Komohana.

I am a lawyer, tenured law professor, and legal historian with familial ties to West Maui, but I write today in my individual capacity to express comments regarding the role of the Commission on Water Resource Management ("Commission") as it relates to water resources in Maui Komohana.

As you are aware, for generations, Kānaka Maoli created and stewarded a unique system of resource management, which included continuous stream flow from mountains to the ocean that supported traditional agriculture and aquaculture, recharged groundwater supplies, and sustained productive estuaries. Water would ultimately return to its original source to allow for a continuous cycle. This sophisticated system comprised all resources necessary for entire communities to survive and thrive.

Kānaka Maoli understood the importance and value of fresh water and worked to ensure its protection. Indeed, given that water was divinely revered, water could not be commodified or reduced to physical ownership. Instead, ali'i managed water as a resource for the benefit of the region and island community. Because water was the society's lifeblood, laws developed around water management reflected its vital role as a public trust resource for present and future generations.

Over time, the ali'i kuleana to steward our precious water resources for the benefit of the community transferred to the State and now the Commission. Unprecedented constitutional amendments, bold statutory mandates, unyielding case law, and strong administrative rules have been developed to <u>empower</u> the Commission—alongside the community—to steward our water resources and bear the kuleana of our ancestors.

Under Deputy Director Kaleo Manuel's servant leadership, the Commission has—for the first time in a long time—taken significant steps toward fulfilling its kuleana. The Water Management Area designation in 2022 for Maui Komohana was one of those major steps. The

Commission took its legal obligations seriously and respected the need for stewarding the precious fresh water resources of that community. The age where corporate interests would dewater streams for private use and continue to rip apart the community was coming to an end. The path seemed set for a reimagining of what the community, rich with flowing water, could be in Maui Komohana.

It was, thus, absolutely disgusting to see, following the devastating fires in Lāhainā, disaster capitalism rear its ugly head. It was particularly disheartening to see the corporate maneuvering and media coverage that falsely painted Deputy Director Manuel as complicit in the fires for his role in upholding the legally required kuleana he bears with the Commission. Instead of standing behind Deputy Director Manuel, I was absolutely shocked to read about the decision to reassign him. In one fell swoop, whether intentional or not, the reassignment of Deputy Director Manuel provided corporate interests success in effectively sidelining one of the staunch protectors of water as a public trust. In one fell swoop, whether intentional or not, the reassignment of Deputy Director Manuel sent a message that our leaders were willing to ignore all the community-driven work, in partnership with the Commission, to create the Water Management Area designation. But, perhaps even more troubling for the system, in one fell swoop, the reassignment of Deputy Director Manuel undermined the historic gains of the Commission in fulfilling its kuleana and destabilized the Commission's credibility in the community.

<u>The Commission needs to take control of this situation</u>. Before it even considers actions on water resources in the Lahaina Aquifer Sector Area, the unnecessary reassignment of Deputy Director Manuel must come to an end. I, thus, respectfully implore you to reinstate Deputy Director Manuel. Please send an unequivocal message to the community that their voices were heard, that Deputy Director Manuel did nothing wrong, that the Water Management Area designation and water use permitting process will proceed, and that the Commission still respects the rule of law. Furthermore, please show your respect and aloha for those in Maui Komohana seeking water by holding your next meeting on Maui.

Our beloved William S. Richardson, former Chief Justice and namesake of Hawai'i's only law school, concluded in *McBryde Sugar Co. v. Robinson* that water could not be privately owned. He famously said, after being about *McBryde* and how he came to that decision, "Think of the little guy, the guy downstream." Everything he did as a judge and leader came down to thinking about the little guy downstream who will ultimately bear the consequences of his actions. I urge you to heed CJ Richardson's advice, and to think about everyone downstream as you make your decisions. In the end, it is the community all the way downstream whose access to water has been diverted for decades that will continue to bear consequences of your actions.

Aloha Chair Chang and Commissioners,

My name is Meikaila Makahanaloa, and I live in Lahaina, Maui.

I testify today to share my profound aloha for Maui Komohana. In the wake of the wildfires and during this time of hulihia, we need the Water Commission's leadership kōkua now more than ever. I write this in hopes that you will listen to the people of this 'āina and make changes that we know will make a difference not only for us in this time but for the future of this 'āina and the generations to come. Now you have a chance to make that change, do not make the same mistakes.

In June 2022, this Commission unanimously designated Maui Komohana as ground and surface water management areas. In good faith, many of us on Maui invested the better part of a year putting together water use permit applications with the hope that our water rights would finally be recognized. We submitted those applications on August 7, 2023, a day before the wildfires ravaged Lahaina. While we grieved and struggled to recover, the Governor suspended the Water Code and Chair Chang "reassigned" Deputy Director Manuel. Chaos ensued as diverters filled their pools and reservoirs and our streams ran dry.

We are here today to ask you to honor the Water Code, as well as your decision to designate our community for more proactive water management. Fresh water is key to Maui Komohana's future, and our community's needs must be centered in decision making. In particular, we request that you immediately reinstate Deputy Director Manuel. His leadership and integrity is desperately needed both by this Commission and the larger community. Please hold your October 17, 2023 meeting on Maui so that you can hear directly from those of us who were most affected by the fires.

All future development project on maui should be affordable housing. I'm tired of looking at property for sale on the continent because I can't afford a home in my home town Lahaina Maui.

With that said, I want to personally say the Kaleo Manuel should not be reinstated. He failed our Lahaina town by stalling to provide water. Kaleo is also very biased towards what kind of a Hawaiian you are. He made that very clear on how close relationships he has with the so called activists.

I live in Kahoma Valley, my neighbors and I did not want CRWM on the west side. It would mean more regulations and permitting procedures to go through when all we want to do is farm. We didn't succeed, so now we are here. I filed for the appropriate water applications. I even filed for my Kuleana rights permit as a kanaka.

These activists have said in these water meetings that they don't have to get a water permit. Kaleo let's these people use as much water as they want. So why does Kaleo make someone like me and my neighbors have to apply for a permit? Because like I said Kaleo is biased.

Who ever holds a position like that he used to hold, should not be biased. They shouldn't have personal relationships with activists, developers, or any future water permit candidates.

These activists wanted CRWM here on the west side, so they as in the activists, all need to apply for water permits just like I and so many other farmers on the west side had to do in July.

To Whom It May Concern,

Aloha, my name is Lili'u Tomasello. I am the daughter of Maximilian Otto Eckart and June Leinani Eckart (nee Kala'au). I am a kanaka maoli who was born and raised in Waimānalo, O'ahu and have genealogical ties to the island of Maui. I am also a wife, mother, hula 'ōlapa, and educator within the HIDOE system.

I humbly request that Mr. Kaleo Manuel be reinstated as deputy chair, that the Commission on Water Commission Management uphold the West Maui Water Management designation, and that the CWCM ensures that interim instream flow standards for West Maui are being met. The West Maui Water Designation helped to protect priority Native Hawaiian rights and the environment from the gross exploitation of West Maui water by plantations and developers, exploitation that has been continuous for over a century.

As the commission is aware, "in 1978, Hawai'i's people elevated resource preservation to a constitutional mandate by adding specific provisions protecting Hawai'i's natural resources and indigenous culture. Article XI, § 1 of Hawai'i's Constitution provides that "all public natural resources are held in trust by the State for the benefit of the people." Article XI,§ 7 of Hawai'i's Constitution makes specific reference to water, including the directive "to protect, control, and regulate the use of Hawai'i's water resources for the benefit of its people" (*Ola I Ka Wai: A Legal Primer for Water Use and Management in Hawai'i, D. Kapua'ala Sproat, pg. 7*).

Additionally, the courts have since identified "public trust purposes, including: environmental protection, traditional and customary Native Hawaiian rights, appurtenant rights, domestic water uses, and reservations for the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands. Waiähole I, 94 Hawai'i at 137-39, 9 P.3d at 449-51; Wai'ola o Moloka'i, 103 Hawai'i 401, 431, 83 P.3d 664, 694 (2004). Public trust purposes **have priority over private commercial uses**, which do not enjoy the same protection. The public trust dictates that "any balancing between public and private purposes must begin with a presumption in favor of public use, access, and enjoyment" and "establishes use consistent with trust purposes as the norm or 'default' condition." Waiähole I, 94 Hawai'i at 142, 9 P.3d at 454. Offstream diverters who seek to use water for their private commercial gain have the burden of justifying proposed uses in light of the protected public rights in the resource" (Ola I Ka Wai: A Legal Primer for Water Use and Management in Hawai'i, D. Kapua'ala Sproat, pg. 8)

Since the Hawai'i constitution clearly states that "all public natural resources are held in trust by the State for the benefit of the people", any decisions being made in regards to the wai of West Maui need to be discussed publicly. The people of Hawai'i deserve full disclosure on the reasons why Mr. Manuel was removed from his position, and why Governor Josh Green and DLNR Chair Dawn Chang have effectively given total legal control of the West Maui water in question to a real estate developer, West Maui Land Company. The people of Hawai'i are aware of the ways in which the WMLC has capitalized on the tragedy at Lāhainā to push back against the West Maui Water Management Designations that were <u>unanimously</u> voted for by the water commission in June of 2022. Dawn Chang's decision to remove Mr. Manuel from his position as deputy chair, and Governor Josh Green's submission to the request by the WMLC that the water flow standards established by the water commission be suspended, is not only unjust, but also contributes to the further erosion of trust in our elected officials.

My name is Kawaiuluhonua Scanlan, and I am from Pālolo, O'ahu. I testify today to request the **immediate reinstatement of Deputy Director Kaleo Manuel** and to remind the Commission of its duty to **uphold the Water Code**.

I am a third-year law student at the William S. Richardson School of Law and I am pursuing a certificate in Native Hawaiian Law. Through my studies over the last few years, I have become quite familiar with the state Water Code (HRS Ch. 174C), the Hawai'i Constitution including the provisions related to the public trust doctrine (Art. XI, §§ 1, 7) and Native Hawaiian traditional and customary practices (Art. XII, § 7), and relevant case law concerning water rights (*see e.g.*, *Kaua'i Springs, Inc. v. Plan. Comm'n*, 133 Haw. 141 (Haw. 2014)). These laws clearly require that the State and all its political subdivisions protect Hawai'i's water for the benefit of present and future generations.

In June 2022, this Commission upheld their legal duty by unanimously designating Maui Komohana as ground and surface water management areas. As a result, I have spent numerous hours, in good faith, helping community members with their water use permit applications with the hope to return water to the Maui Komohana streams that have been bled dry by gluttonous corporations, like West Maui Land Company. My classmates and I timely submitted those applications the day before the wildfires ravaged Lahaina. While folks were grieving and trying to gather basic necessities, the Governor suspended the Water Code to push his personal agenda and prioritize developer-interests over the interests of actual victims of the fires. Chair Chang supported the Governor's political antics when she "reassigned" Deputy Director Manuel because the rich guys sent one baseless letter. As a result, diverters, whose homes were protected from flames by saturated lawns and irrigated landscaping, greedily filled their pools and reservoirs while the streams ran dry.

These recent political maneuvers are unlawful. In fact, our courts have repeatedly held that agencies, such as the Commission, have to apply a presumption in favor of public use, access, enjoyment, and resource protection (*Kaua'i Springs*). In other words, public use and particularly Native Hawaiian traditional and customary water usage must be prioritized over private commercial usage (*see, e.g., Waiāhole I,* 94 Haw. 97 (Haw. 2000)). It is the duty of Hawai'i's government to aloha 'āina and to ensure that water is properly regulated for the benefit of our

people (*see, e.g., Ching v. Case*, 145 Haw. 148 (Haw. 2019)). As of late, the Commission has failed to make decisions congruous to this duty.

Chief Justice Richardson ("CJ") advocated for the creation of the law school 50 years ago so that local kids like me could access a legal education. He believed in social justice and Native Hawaiian rights, which was evident in his jurisprudence that was foundational to water law today. When asked about the *McBryde* case, in which his court ruled that water cannot be privately owned, he said "think of the little guy, the guy downstream." (Mari Matsuda, *A Richardson Lawyer*, 2010).

As a beneficiary of his advocacy, I am writing today to do as CJ would do: I am asking the Commission to **honor the Water Code**, as well as your decision to **designate Maui Komohana** in pursuance of your Constitutional duty to protect water resources for the benefit of present and future generations. Restoring stream flow is imperative to Maui Komohana's future, and the community's needs must be centered in future decision making. In particular, I am requesting that you **immediately reinstate Deputy Director Manuel**. His leadership and integrity is desperately needed both by this Commission and the larger community. As you make your decisions, please keep in mind the little guys downstream.

The reality is that the water reservoirs that West Maui Land Co. asked to fill up could NOT have been used to fight the Lāhainā fires. This is because these reservoirs only serve the luxury estates above Lāhainā, and are not connected to the county water system or any fire hydrants. Plus, the 80-mile-an-hour winds from Hurricane Dora meant no helicopters were allowed to make water drops.

When West Maui Land Company's request to divert water was not immediately granted, they insinuated that stream protections were to blame for the fire, going so far as to blame a single Hawaiian kalo farmer for the lack of water to fight the fire. This resulted in misleading media articles and ultimately Kaleo Manuel, Deputy Director of the Department of Land and Natural Resources' Commission on Water Resources Management (Water Commission), being swiftly removed from his position.

Kaleo helped to advance stream restoration throughout the state and served nearly four years on the Water Commission. He is the longest-serving Water Commission Deputy Director and the first Native Hawaiian to serve in this position.

West Maui Land Co. is exploiting the tragedy in Lāhainā to further justify increasing water diversions under their corporate control. Not only did they unfairly position Kaleo Manuel as a scapegoat for decades-long debates over their own water misuse, but they are now asking the Water Commission to suspend and change the Water Management Designation Area of West Maui (Maui Komohana), which adds permitting and accountability for privatized commercial water use, now and into the future.

My name is Gretchen Losano, and I live in Honokōhau Valley, Maui.

I am writing in support of the immediate reinstatement of Deputy Director Kaleo Manuel. The recent designation of Lahaina Aquifer as a Special Management Area was crucial for Maui Komahana to finally start to evolve away from the archaic plantation ditch system that has private land developers controlling our most critical resource. Immediately after the fire, that developer made completely false claims regarding the in-stream flow standards and the causes of the fire, when in reality, it is the diversion of the streams and the abuse of the power over the water that has caused Lahaina to become so dry and prone to wildfire. The abuse of the water is the very reason Lahaina burned to the ground. Had this precious resource been managed properly, Lahaina would still be a lush wetland. The re-designation of the Lahaina aquifer was just the very first step of correcting this grave plantation era mistake, and yet the commission's decision making immediately after the fire seems to have blatantly favored the private developer's interests. Please prove our suspicions wrong and re-instate Kaleo Manuel, showing us you do value fair resource management and support the end of plantation-era water mismanagement.

Those of us that rely on the in-stream flow of these rivers (supposedly) protected by the special management designation had just completed the year long process of filing current usage permits and turned them in the day before the fire. My 'ohana is one of the many that filed. And then our water in Honokōhau was shut off FOR AN ENTIRE MONTH. In Honokōhau we currently rely on the plantation ditch system that diverts water from the river, sends it to a treatment facility, and then back to our pipes. That same management system left us without water for a whole month, while every other place in west Maui had more than enough. Driving out of the valley after having to fill up buckets from the stream to flush our toilets and use bottled water to brush our teeth, just to see sprinklers watering lawns in Kapalua, was the harshest reminder of the exact reasons we need this commission to uphold instream flow standards and give the proper oversight to the current management practices. When left to their own devices, those in charge of the water diversions do not make good choices. They have been consistently proven to prioritize their gentleman's estates over the community's basic needs. We are entrusting you, the Commission on Water Resources Management, to not be as corrupt as the entities that currently control the water, and bring the balance back to Maui Komahana that we so desperately need, now more than ever.

In addition, it is very important to hold your October 17, 2023 meeting on Maui to hear from our community in the wake of this devastating fire. If tourism is slated to return to west Maui on the 8th, there is no reason not to hear from us in person on the 17th. Please show us you respect us and honor the water codes and Special Management Area designation.

Please accept this testimony on Item C-1 relating to Water Resources in the Lāhainā Aquifer Sector Area.

Aloha Commissioners,

My name is Lillie Makaila and my connection to West Maui is through my kupunahine kualua Cecilia Kaleikoa Puailihau, who was born in Honokōhau, and whose lineage extends throughout Maui Nui.

Firstly, I would like to mahalo each of the Commissioners for your time & service, and acknowledge that you all serve on this important Commission and receive no compensation for the long hours and good work that you do. You each must care deeply for our water resources to take on this kuleana, and I appreciate your contribution.

In June of last year, the Commission accepted the recommendation to designate Lāhainā Aquifer Sector as both a Surface and Groundwater management area. This was a huge decision, and I mahalo you for choosing to place added protections to the precious waters of West Maui. I understand that the existing water users in this aquifer sector have submitted their applications for water use and patiently await further determination by this Commission. I ask that in light of the tragedy in Lāhainā on August 8 of this year, decisions regarding West Maui surface & groundwater be stayed for another year. The people of West Maui most impacted by decisions on Lāhainā Aquifer Sector water resources have so much on their plate at this time, let's please give them more time to handle pressing matters in their home region without making long-lasting decisions about their water resources while they are stretched so thin and may not have the capacity to participate.

I ask that the Commission ensure that the interim in-stream flow standards for Lāhainā Aquifer Sector are met by surface water users. I have seen troubling footage of the intake at Kauaula Stream that alleges that the West Maui Land Co is not adhering to the flow standards set. Please direct staff to investigate these claims in person and check the state of the stream diversions where these, and any other claims have been made.

I noticed that the agenda for this meeting still lists Kaleo Manuel as the Deputy Director. Kaleo must be reinstated to his position. Chair Chang, as an administrator, you do have the authority to reinstate Kaleo as Deputy, as you had the authority to remove him. I would guess that the AGs might not advise doing so in light of the petition filed on this matter, but you do still have the authority to reinstate him regardless. Please do so. Our community can forgive this wrongdoing if it is corrected as swiftly as the error was made. I encourage you to listen to the voices of the community who are passionately asking for Kaleo's reinstatement. I encourage you to tune out the voice of the Governor and his staff who likely asked you to reassign him to begin with. I ask that you reinstate him in spite of those telling you that it cannot be done.

As time passes without your reinstatement of our trusted Deputy, our capacity for forgiveness wanes, and our demands will not stop at his reinstatement, but will include your removal as

Chair. We cannot support a Chair who is not willing to mihi when an egregious error has been made. Please use your authority to reinstate Kaleo.

Lastly, to the Commissioners besides the Chair. I do understand that you do not have the authority to make personnel decisions regarding the Deputy or any staff. I also agree that an argument can be made that there is much important work to be done and that this work must continue regardless of the politics at play surrounding the removal of the Deputy. I ask that you folks consider that though you do not have a direct say in the reinstatement of the Deputy, you have great power to influence the decision to reinstate him. Consider respectfully demanding his reinstatement by not issuing any approvals until he is reinstated. Consider staunching the flow of the work of the Commission until Kaleo is brought back. Consider that your individual choice to continue to participate without him is a choice to uphold the decision to remove him. Consider echoing the voices of all of us who are calling for his reinstatement by using the authority you do possess as a Commissioner to abstain, to deny, and to disrupt. Perhaps business cannot continue as usual, and perhaps it is your voices and actions that are needed to tip the scales to get Kaleo reinstated. Be radical. We need your help on this matter too.

Aloha Chair Chang and Members of the Commission on Water Resource Management:

Mahalo nui for the opportunity to testify. We are third-year law students at the William S. Richardson School of Law. We have had the great privilege of working closely with Maui Komohana community members who are restoring lo'i kalo and exercising their traditional and customary Native Hawaiian rights on their kuleana 'āina. Most of the 'ohana we have gotten to know through our Native Hawaiian Rights clinical course have, for years, been experiencing drought and related declines in stream flow. Many were directly impacted by the wildfires that ravaged Lahaina last month.

Earlier this year, this Commission voted unanimously to reappoint Kaleo Manuel as its Deputy Director. Days later, Deputy Director Manuel visited our class to talk about the Commission's water resource management efforts across the pae 'āina. To break the ice and build pilina, he asked us, "What is your wai story?" It is a question he said he asks most people, including those who disagree with him, because everyone has a wai story. We can find common ground in wai. Designation was contentious, but at each public meeting leading up to the Commission's vote, Lahaina residents, lo'i kalo farmers from Ukumehame, Kaua'ula, Kahoma, and Honokōhau, grandparents, parents, children, and law students showed up in overwhelming support of designation. "Everything comes down to pilina," Deputy Director Manuel explained.

The water use permitting process threatens status quo power structures by requiring all non-domestic water users to apply for permits within one year of designation—which is why, in the wake of Lahaina's devastation, this process has been used as a scapegoat to undermine community-led advocacy for proactive water management. After suspending the Water Code, Governor Green voiced his support for *reversing* the designation of the Lahaina aquifer. For many, this designation represented a hard-won, community-led victory for water rights and for pono management of our precious freshwater resources. For years, the Maui Komohana community advocated for the water use permitting process and ardently supported this

designation—despite the immense burden they knew it would place on themselves as applicants—because they had full faith that this Commission would enforce the law.

As this Commission knows best, the law is clear: Under Article XI, Sections 1 and 7 of Hawai'i's Constitution, water is a Public Trust to be managed for the benefit of present and future generations. And, as fiduciaries of the Public Trust, decisionmakers-including this Commission—have a legal duty to aloha 'āina. In other words, this Commission cannot shirk its constitutional obligation to safeguard Hawai'i's streams and aquifers or the traditional and customary practices that are intrinsic to them. The Hawai'i Supreme Court in Ching v. Case articulated and affirmed this legal duty to aloha 'āina. Ching v. Case, 449 P.3d 1146, 1160 (Haw. 2019). Fundamentally, aloha 'āina requires an understanding that people are not "apart from" but "a part of" the natural world. This reciprocal relationship arises from Holly's and all Native Hawaiians' mo'okū'auhau (genealogy) which connects kānaka to everything-animate and inanimate—in our world. The mo'olelo of Haloanaka articulates this worldview best. It teaches Native Hawaiians that kalo is their elder sibling and that it is our kuleana to care for kalo by cultivating it with aloha and respect. Kalo, in turn, gives us life by nourishing our bodies and spirits. The practice of aloha 'āina emerged from this pilina (intimacy or connection) and has evolved from foundational cultural precepts around kānāwai (Native Hawaiian ancient law; literally translates to "relating to water") to the legal duty it is today. See generally, D. Kapua'ala Sproat & MJ Palau-McDonald, The Duty to Aloha 'Aina: Indigenous Values as a Legal Foundation for Hawai'i's Public Trust, 57 HARV. C.R.-C.L. L. REV. 525, 537 (2022). We believe that Deputy Director Manuel asked us about our water stories that day because he deeply believes in his, and this Commission's, fiduciary duty to aloha 'āina.

Now, when we contemplate our own water stories, we think, in part, of Maui Komohana and the many resilient 'ohana we have gotten to know. As aspiring attorneys, we believe that law—if applied in alignment with the duty to aloha 'āina—can be a powerful tool for restorative justice. After all, the constitutional amendments crafted during the 1978 Constitutional Convention enshrined the state's restorative justice commitments to Kanaka Maoli. But if this Commission fails to live up to its kuleana ko'iko'i, its fiduciary duty, it will perpetuate the same cycles of harm that western capitalists started when they exploited our 'āina and our wai for profit. This Commission faces an opportunity to fulfill its kuleana. Designation and the water use permitting process are key to ensuring Public Trust uses are protected and prioritized over private commercial uses, which do not enjoy the same legal protections. Under HRS § 174C-47, this Commission cannot rescind designation unless it makes findings "substantially similar to that for the designation of a water management area." Such findings would be impossible to make because none of the findings that overwhelmingly supported designation have improved, let alone been addressed. Thus, any attempt to "rescind" or "modify" designation would be illegal and would significantly undercut this Commission affirmative obligation to protect the community's water rights as the recovery in Maui Komohana continues.

So, we ask you: what will this Commission's water story be? In the wake of the wildfires and during this time of hulihia, we need the Water Commission's leadership and kōkua now

more than ever. Deputy Director Manuel's leadership and integrity is desperately needed by this Commission and the larger community. We implore you to reinstate Deputy Director Manuel immediately and honor the Water Code, as well as your decision to designate Maui Komohana for more proactive water management.

Aloha nui e Chair Chang and to the Commission on Water Resource Management,

Mahalo nui for this opportunity to testify on agenda item C.1. relating to wai in Maui Komohana. My name is U'ilani Tanigawa Lum and I am an attorney and a professor at Ka Huli Ao Center for Excellence in Native Hawaiian Law at the William S. Richardson School of Law. I submit this testimony in my personal capacity. As you consider a path forward, I ask that you please do what is pono: respect and uphold the law, honor the water management area, and reinstate Deputy Manuel as a trusted and brilliant public servant. Deputy Manuel is the leader that we need at this time. I also ask that you re-center the kama'āina of Maui Komohana in decisions being made about *their* 'āina hānau. They are the experts of that place.

Our people are intimately familiar with their 'āina and its resources. For example, we have specific names and terms for the many water forms. Whether it be rain, water in streams or below the surface, our mo'olelo, oli, and mele detail how water moves, where to find it, and when to find it. This specificity is based on the close and consistent interaction with wai. For both practical and spiritual reasons, Kānaka Maoli know that in water, there is life. For Kānaka Maoli, wai shapes all aspects of life. It also shapes our laws here in Hawai'i. As this Commission well knows, our cultural and natural resources enjoy special protections under Hawai'i law. In fact, Hawai'i's people, who have thrived on islands in the middle of the vast ocean, elevated these protections into the state constitution. The law already outlines the pono path forward.

Although I consider Maui my 'āina hānau, I was hesitant to submit this testimony given the outpouring of support and wisdom of individuals and organizations who have been leading the charge for the betterment of our 'āina and our shared resources for decades. Earthjustice, for example, has championed many of the water issues that have shaped the mo'okū'auhau of our laws today. There are many more that I am sure you will hear from in person on Tuesday. I was also inclined to leave space for the kupa of Maui Komohana. But this just underscores the immense opportunity you have in front of you. You have the opportunity to uplift the experts of this 'āina. Rather than make decisions in Honolulu about a place you may have visited before, you have the opportunity to give the kupa of the place the agency at this body to chart a path forward. Against a backdrop of colonization and injustices in Maui Komohana in particular, this is a remarkable opportunity. You also have incredible resources available to you: experts in law, resource management, traditional and customary practices, and indeed, experts in wai in Maui Komohana. You just have to listen.

As commissioners with kuleana over one of our most precious resources, I thank you for shouldering this immense kuleana and ask that you listen to the many experts available to you as well as the kama'āina with generational ties to this place: reinstate Deputy Manuel, respect the law, and uphold the water management area. Mahalo for this opportunity to testify.

These false arguments have unfairly scapegoated small taro farmers and former Water Commission Deputy Director Kaleo Manuel.

Given that the water reservoirs that West Maui Land Co. asked to fill up could not have been used to fight the Lāhainā fires, it is concerning that this false logic appears to have been used to justify Mr. Manuel's removal from his position and to challenge the rigorous processes and decision making at the Water Commission. Chair Chang is no doubt aware that these reservoirs only serve the luxury estates above Lāhainā, and are not connected to the county water system or any fire hydrants. Plus, the 80-mile-an-hour winds from Hurricane Dora meant no helicopters were allowed to make water drops.

When West Maui Land Company's request to divert water was not immediately granted, they insinuated that stream protections were to blame for the fire, going so far as to blame a single Hawaiian kalo farmer for the lack of water to fight the fire. This resulted in misleading media articles and ultimately Kaleo Manuel, Deputy Director of the Department of Land and Natural Resources' Commission on Water Resources Management (Water Commission), being swiftly removed from his position.

West Maui Land Co. is exploiting the tragedy in Lāhainā to further justify increasing water diversions under their corporate control. Not only did they unfairly position Kaleo Manuel as a scapegoat for decades-long debates over their own water misuse, but they are now asking the Water Commission to suspend and change the Water Management Designation Area of West Maui (Maui Komohana), which adds permitting and accountability for privatized commercial water use, now and into the future.

These decisions will have ripple effects across Hawai'i. The unfair removal of a Water Commission official based on corporate pressure rather than performance metrics sets a dangerous precedent. Undermining the Maui Komohana Water Management Designation Area that communities worked with the Water Commision for decades to create sends the message that corporate interests can easily leverage false narratives to undermine hard won and well deliberated stream protections.

My name is Dru Hara and I am a third-year law student at the William S. Richardson School of Law.

I testify today to share my profound aloha for Maui Komohana. In the wake of the wildfires and during this time of hulihia, we need the Water Commission's leadership and kōkua now more than ever.

In June 2022, this Commission unanimously designated Maui Komohana as ground and surface water management areas. Over the past year, I have had the privilege of supporting a number of community members with their water use permit applications. Two things have stood out to me throughout this process. The first is how difficult the permitting process has been for community members to navigate without the assistance of an attorney. The forms are not intuitive and the requisite information is not easily accessible, particularly for community members living in rural areas without regular access to the internet. The second thing is how much, despite the administrative burden placed on them by designation, this community invested in the permitting process. In good faith, these kupa'āina Maui Komohana invested the better part of a year putting together water use permit applications with the hope that their water rights would finally be recognized. This willingness to engage with the permitting process is reflective of the belief that this community held in the promise and protections of the Water Code as effectuated by the Water Commission under the guidance of Deputy Director Kaleo Manuel.

Applications for existing uses were submitted on August 7, 2023, a day before the wildfires ravaged Lahaina. While the community grieved and struggled to recover, the Governor suspended the Water Code and Chair Chang "reassigned" Deputy Director Manuel. In the weeks that have passed, I have been shocked by the bare knuckle politics employed by legacy diverters and development interests as part of their continued effort to hoard and control even more of Maui Komohana's freshwater resources. Further, I have been profoundly disappointed by the

extent to which this political posturing has been allowed to influence this Commission's decisionmaking and the permitting process.

We are here today to ask you to honor the Water Code, as well as your decision to designate Maui Komohana for more proactive water management. Aloha e Chair Chang and Commissioners:

My name is Ashley Obrey and I am submitting this testimony in response to Agenda Item C1. I offer this perspective as a Senior Staff Attorney at the Native Hawaiian Legal Corporation and as a member of the West Hawai'i community.

The East Maui communities that NHLC represents have fought for decades against the plantation economy to establish interim instream flow standards ("IIFS") for streams that had been diverted for over a century, to protect public trust purposes, including the protection of Native Hawaiian traditional and customary practices, and to end the illegal practice of continuously issuing temporary permits, diverting up to 100 million gallons a day ("mgd") out of East Maui streams for commercial use without environmental review or findings that such action is in the best interest of the state.

Likewise, our West Hawai'i community, of which I am a part, has advocated for stronger protections of Kona's groundwater, including a thorough analysis of impacts on coastal resources and related traditional and customary practices while our community has been targeted for endless development despite the limitation of our water resources.

NHLC represents a history of legal advocacy on behalf of communities across the pae 'āina to uphold the rights of Native Hawaiians and protect public trust resources consistent with the laws and constitution of Hawai'i, which require the state to protect and manage water in ways that will ensure its availability for the benefit of present and future generations. *See* Haw. Const. Art. XI, § 1. It is a history that continues in the present, because, while the value of water is immeasurable to many, there is certainly a price tag on water for those who view this resource merely as a means to obtain financial gain.

With West Maui on the agenda following last month's wildfires, NHLC is here today to remind our decision makers just how critical this historic moment is as we begin to address the needs of our hoa in Maui Komohana. Now, more than ever, protection of our waters resources is required.

We know that Lāhainā was once a thriving wetland that was drained and dried by plantations and that the impacts have continued even after the plantations closed. This very Commission clearly understands that, given its formal recognition just last year that water in Maui Komohana should be subject to more state oversight and public scrutiny as a Surface Water and Ground Water Management Area.

August's tragic fires serves as a dire reminder of just how critical the protection and restoration of life-giving natural resources, such as water, is for the health of the environment and how important decisions related to water are in this modern time in these islands with such limited resources, especially in the context of today's climate emergency. Additionally, recent actions taken by the government to (1) attempt to roll back legal protections for natural and cultural resources, public participation, and transparency in government and (2) remove key leadership whose focus has always been on properly implementing the law add to our serious concerns about what happens next.

At NHLC, we have witnessed firsthand the impacts of the exploitation of water resources for commercial purposes in east Maui, Kona, and elsewhere. But we have also seen positive steps forward under the direction of Deputy Director Kaleo Manuel, who, in the absence of any previous leadership in water issues in West Hawai'i, truly took to heart his kuleana to affirmatively protect our public trust resources consistent with the letter and spirit of the Hawai'i Constitution and the Water Code by leading a long effort to engage meaningfully with community, ensure that the rights of Native Hawaiian practitioners were considered, and find the balance that the law requires.

When thinking about what comes next for Maui Komohana, this Commission has a huge opportunity to continue taking positive steps forward and create a legacy that outlasts any individual commissioner's limited term — a legacy marked by compliance with the rule of law, and that embraces the Commission's trust obligations to ensure water is truly held for the benefit of the citizens of the State, rather than corporate interests. A legacy upholding the values of pono (to do what's right/what the law requires); mālama (to care, genuinely, for our wai), and kuleana (both a responsibility and privilege).

Aligning with these values means making decisions that reflect the state's legal "affirmative duty to take the public trust into account in the planning and allocation of water resources, and to protect whenever feasible" public trust uses. *In re Water Use Permit Applications*, 94 Hawai'i 97, 141, 9 P.3d 409, 453 (2000); *see also Kauai Springs, Inc v. Planning Comm'n of the County of Kaua'i*,133 Hawai'i 141, 172, 324 P.3d 951, 982 (2014) (recognizing public trust uses as waters in their natural state, domestic water use, Native Hawaiian tradition and customary rights, and the reservation of water for the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands).

It means: upholding the Water Code and the Water Management Area designation of Lāhainā surface and groundwater and providing thoughtful, thorough, and timely review of water use permit applications; vigorously following the rule of law and implementation of the Code, to set new IIFSs, and to designate areas that need better management; listening to community voices – centering Maui kama'āina in all decisions related to the future of their water; and

appointing (or re-appointing) the most qualified person in your division who exemplifies these values of kuleana, pono, mālama in fulfillment of the role and responsibilities vital to a Deputy Director.

It also means standing on the right side of history by formally acknowledging this immense kuleana to this public trust resource and the people not only of Maui but also all of Hawai'i. Mahalo for the opportunity to testify. Ola i ka wai!

Agenda Item C1: Update on Water Resources in the Lahaina Aquifer Sector Area

Ano 'ai Chair Chang and Members of the Commission,

Wai is a finite resource that is necessary for life. The tragic death and devastation that happened in West Maui on August 8th, 2023 was a result of decades of water diversions for monocrops and development and the covering of Lahaina springs and fishponds. We are at a crossroads when it comes to the future of these islands because of the water crises taking place across ko Hawai'i pae 'āina - Red Hill, Mauna Kea, Wai'ale'ale, East Molokai, and West Maui.

The Kanawai (Laws) of King Kamehameha III laid out the Native Tenant rights to water that are grounded in 2,000 years of cultural practice, stewardship and understanding of this place and water sources. The State of Hawai'i has encoded many of these traditional Kanaka Maoli water rights in the Water Code HRS174C stating that the 'protection of traditional and customary Hawaiian rights is in the public interest.' Despite these legal protections Kanaka Maoli kuleana land owners in West Maui are still fighting for stream restoration and access to water.

In addition to Kanaka Maoli rights to water the Kuleana land owners of Kaua'ula, Kahoma, Kanaha also have appurtenant rights to water. These Native land owners should have access to the same amount of water that was used by their ancestors during the time of the Mahele and the Kuleana Land Act of 1850. Water that usually came from streams which our Kūpuna used for the cultivation of kalo and for domestic uses. These rights never extinguish and exist whether or not the Native Tenant applied for a water permit from the Commission or not. The Hawai'i State Constitution Article XI, Section 7 requires the Commission to protect appurtenant rights.

The Water Commission must protect stream flow that can support life and will allow for the protected cultural practices of gathering of hihiwai, o'opu, 'opae and limu. Please restore the streams of West Maui to the flow standards that were set during the Mahele and hold accountable those businessmen who are using the human tragedy of the Lahaina fires as an excuse to illegally divert water, water bank and silence Kanaka Maoli water protectors like Kaleo Manuel. We humbly ask that he is restored to his position as the Deputy Director of CWRM.

Aloha Chair Chang and Members of the Water Commission,

The Sierra Club of Hawai'i, on behalf of its 20,000 members and supporters, offers these comments strongly urging greater and more proactive action, including by commissioners in their individual capacity, to implement the water code and uphold the public trust in the water resources of Maui Komohana and throughout Hawai'i.

As an initial matter, the Sierra Club is deeply disturbed by the still-unexplained "redeployment" of commission deputy Kaleo Manuel, who has demonstrated the highest levels of diligence, commitment, and objective solution-seeking in his leadership of commission staff and the implementation of the State Water Code. His ability to understand and apply the law and balance the numerous rights and interests in our islands' most precious resource have served to better the conditions of our islands for generations to come. Under his leadership, the Water Commission and its staff have been able to successfully realize the prudent planning and protective mechanisms envisioned in our State Water Code in many arenas, including by:

- Establishing updated interim instream flow standards *and* water management designation for Maui Komohana, and thereby protecting the agricultural potential of and Native Hawaiian rights in the region, including and particularly from the ongoing threats posed by luxury, "gentleman-farm" developments;
- Providing for meaningful and updated instream flow standards for streams throughout East Maui, mitigating decades-long concerns and conflicts arising from the historical neglect of public trust purposes and reasonable beneficial uses in these critical surface waters;
- Updating the instream flow standards for five streams on Moloka'i, providing meaningful protections against waste and in furtherance of the island's ecological, cultural, and agricultural integrity;
- Updating the interim instream flow standard for He'eia stream, O'ahu, enhancing Jānaka 'Ōiwi efforts to restore the ecological and cultural integrity of one of our islands' few remaining "intact" ahupua'a;
- Similarly updating the interim instream flow standard for Wai'oli and Lāwa'i streams on Kaua'i; and
- Overseeing and working to address implementation and enforcement concerns to ensure that the Commission's orders and laws are better and more meaningfully upheld.

The progress made by the Water Commission in implementing the State Water Code has been unprecedented, and has been made possible not only through Deputy Manuel's great expertise and diligence, but also through his ability to work with and leverage broad relationships with other agencies, institutions, and communities, while also understanding and balancing the needs of all stakeholders consistent with the policies and priorities embodied in state law.

For this reason, the redeployment of Deputy Manuel has removed one of our most effective government leaders at a time when his responsibilities, and the responsibilities of the Water Commission, may be more important than ever before. The Sierra Club strongly urges every commission member to use their position to take a critical look into the circumstances of Deputy Manuel's redeployment, and to take appropriate action including by calling for his reinstatement.

On a similar note, the Sierra Club urges the Water Commission and each of its commissioners to take action to uphold and enhance the recent progress made to properly manage the water resources of Maui Komohana. In its recent water management area designation and instream flow standard updates, the Water Commission recognized how decades of neglect and misuse of the region's water resources have impaired the water security, food security, cultural integrity, and ecological health of the region. Notably, as Commission staff's instream flow standard assessment reports demonstrated, every day millions of gallons of water which could and should have been used and managed for public trust purposes and reasonable beneficial uses have instead been sequestered for landscaping and non-agricultural uses, including for luxury developments on agricultural lots - leaving vast acreages of land fallow and impeding traditional agricultural activities and nearshore ecological cycles that may be key to the island's food security. This in turn has significantly increased the vulnerability of Maui Komohana to climate impacts and other environmental threats, while foreclosing critical opportunities for socioeconomic development and diversification. Without adequate state oversight that can ensure water use accountability, the future security, resiliency, and overall well-being of Maui Komohana and its residents, including Kānaka 'Ōiwi lineal descendants, will continue to be at stake.

Accordingly, the Sierra Club urges the Water Commission and each of its individual commissioners to take all necessary action to uphold the Maui Komohana Water Management Area designation; ensure that the updated interim instream flow standards for Maui Komohana are being met; investigate and address the removal of Kaleo Manuel as as water deputy; and urge staff to continue their efforts to implement our Water Code in a timely manner, in order to manage and protect our most precious resource for our communities, 'āina, and future generations.

My name is Torie Hoʻopiʻi, and I am a Kupa a Maui Komohana. I am also an aloha 'āina activist with Kākoʻo Haleakala and a UH Maui College student earning a degree in Hawaiian Studies.

I am writing today to support the West Maui communities who have worked to restore their freshwater resources for many years and established management practices that ensure enough water for everyone.

I also want to express my appreciation to the commission and your work to manage and uphold the public trust in our precious wai - especially the immense strides made under the leadership of Kaleo Manuel.

My Uncle Keeaumoku Kapu and Auntie Uilani Kapu of Nā 'Ai Kane o Maui, Cousin Kaipo Kekona, Cousin Danny and Jaime Palakiko, Cousin Charlie Palakiko, Cousin Mark and Ku'ulei Palakiko are ancestral and lineal descendants of Kau'aula Valley, in Lahaina. They are kalo farmers, who, along with many others, including myself, have fought tirelessly to restore "Ka Malu 'Ulu o Lele," or the historical breadbasket of Lahaina that existed in history, to the leeward community. To have this restored, we must have the natural water flowing.

It is a shame that we have to fight for our water rights. This is especially true when you consider that the aboriginal people of this land, the legal landowners, are affected. In the past, no one owned the water. Instead, we relied on a communal living system known as the traditional 'aphupua'a system. Under this system, everyone from the mountains to the sea had equal rights to this precious resource. This is where the concept of "Ola i ka wai" comes from, meaning that water is life, and without it, there can be no life. Water is essential for everything to grow and sustain itself. In the past, no one had to pay for access as it flowed freely. The people took responsibility for managing and maintaining the upkeep of the river and 'auwai system.

A perfect example is my husband's ancestral home in Kahakuloa, on the northwest point of Maui, in the Moku of Kā'anapali.

We have strayed from this concept because of what the plantations have done to our home, Lahaina.

"I ka wā ma mua, ka wā ma hope," through the past is the future.

It is time for us to revert to the ways of our kūpuna and hear what the community is saying. For us to be self-sustainable for Lahaina to rise again, I beg you and kindly ask that the commission uphold the Maui Komohana Water Management Area designation, ensure that the updated interim instream flow standards for West Maui are being met, reinstate Kaleo Manuel as deputy director, and urge staff to continue their efforts to implement our Water Code, and manage and protect our most precious resource for our communities, 'āina, and future generations.

My name Is Shelley Muneoka and I'd like to submit testimony on agenda item C-1. I'd like to express my support to Maui Komohana, the place and the people, and the waters therein. Particularly, I write in aloha for the years of community commitment and struggle to restore freshwater resources and establish management practices to ensure that water is shared fairly.

Many across the pae'āina and around the world, watched with brokenhearts the tragic fires in Lahaina on August 8th without clarity on how to alleviate the overwhelming impacts of the extreme winds and flames. The man-made political disaster in the days that followed were also deeply disturbing, particularly Governor Green's emergency proclamation and later the decision to remove Kaleo Manuel as deputy director of CWRM. This body is uniquely positioned to help Maui Komohana -- I humbly make the following requests:

Uphold the West Maui Water Management Area designation. This designation was long and hard fought for by water advocates. Upholding it is a concrete way to honor the desires of the people of Maui Komohana.

Ensure the updated interim instream flow standards (IIFS) for West Maui are being met. The events of the last month did not occur in a vacuum. West Maui Land Co has a long history of bad behavior in regards to West Maui water at the expense of the rest of the community (including the natural environment), which more recently includes building an unauthorized concrete dam on Olowalu stream (2018), cesspool violations (2021) and overdrawing stream water (2022). This history should have brought extra scrutiny on their requests for *more* water – instead, their requests were granted. While consistent, it is disgusting that they used the Aug 8 fires as an opportunity to forward their ongoing push for luxury development in West Maui. I commend CWRM for their previous enforcement actions on West Maui Land, and ask similarly that the IIFS for West Maui are being met.

Reinstate Kaleo Manuel as Deputy Director of the Water Commission, who along with this commission, has made immense strides to uphold the public trust in our water. The false narrative that emerged that had Deputy Manuel approved more water to be diverted to the Launiupoko reservoir would have made any difference in firefighting efforts that day needs badly to be corrected. Even if one sets aside Deputy Manuel's years of committed leadership to protect our water, we cannot let his reassignment stand. Chair Chang should not be allowed to unilaterally remove Deputy Manuel without the majority approval of the members of this body. I urge members of this commission to assert their power and push back on Chair Chang and Governor Green's decision to remove Kaleo. The testimony you are receiving for the 09/18/23 commission meeting should have been heard before such a decision was made and doing so after the fact does not serve as a meaningful substitute.

Aloha Commissioners,

The International Longshore and Warehouse Union is Hawai'i's largest private-sector union, with 16,000 members. One thousand seven hundred fifty of our members are residents of Lahaina. Most of these members lost their homes in the Lahaina fire. Additionally, 2,700 of our members work in West Maui. The impact of the fires on employment adds an additional aspect of instability for our members. Since the fires, the ILWU has worked tirelessly for our members and put much time and resources into supporting the community.

The ILWU has a long history in Lahaina. For close to 80 years, our members have dedicated themselves to organizing across ethnic and cultural lines to overcome corporate exploitation. Workers at Pioneer Mill, originally unionized by Honolulu Longshoremen, hold a place in our union history as some of the strongest and most militant of all the plantation workers.

The ILWU's history in Lahaina, along with the number of our members whose lives were forever changed following the fires, puts immense kuleana upon us as a union to be very active and involved in questions about the future of Lahaina.

The fires themselves bring to bear questions about the impact of the plantations on both the land and the water. As they closed operations, Pioneer Mill sold lands and water infrastructure to West Maui Land Company. More questions emerge through this period and to the present about land and water management.

How much water has been allocated over the decades for the benefit of people experiencing poverty, working-class people, and Native Hawaiians - the indigenous people of this land? What has been allocated for luxury developments, which are not built for working-class, local, and Native Hawaiian families?

Additionally, we have heard much concern in the community over the removal of Kaleo Manuel as the Deputy Director of the Commission on Water Resources Management. We've learned that many in the community valued his knowledge and consideration of diverse interests, especially of those who have been historically marginalized in decisions on water management for the sake of corporate interests. Our investigation of this issue and others raised here continues.

What is clear to us right now, however, is that all decisions about resource management, and especially water, must center the survivors of the Lahaina wildfire. Their ability to not only build back their lives but to rebuild a Lahaina that will sustain their families for generations is a priority of the ILWU Local 142.

Our members are all working-class. And they are part of the community at-large. Many are actively involved in the community. They need and deserve both living wage jobs and access to clean water. As our members, the broader Lahaina community, labor unions, and government agencies work together to rebuild Lahaina right, we encourage the Commission to do the following:

1. Uphold the State Water Code to ensure public trust water resources are shared equally.

2. Uphold the existing designation of Maui Komohana Water Management Area.

3. Prioritize water in West Maui for all working-class residents, which also includes most Native Hawaiians in Lahaina, who now have to rebuild their homes and their community.

4. Enact a moratorium on any new water applications for luxury developments.

5. Verify that West Maui Land Co. is complying with instream flow standards.

We are committed to further investigating water struggles and governance in West Maui. We are committed to organizing our members to ensure that they and their community are centered in rebuilding Lahaina.

I am kindly asking that the Chair and Commissioners think about the greatest amount of return on investment, greatest amount of happiness for the indigenous people of Hawai'i, and the greatest amount of benefits for future generations to live a life with abundant levels of natural resources by not reducing amount of water rights since the streams and rivers produce plants. Port of Honolulu, September 19, 1820.

John Coffin Jones, Jr. (also known in Hawaiian documents as John Aluli) was appointed Agent for Commerce and Seamen on September 19, 1820. He began to serve in October of 1820, at the port of Honolulu. The post of commercial agent was raised to consul effective July 5, 1844, and held by Peter A. Brinsmade, who had already been appointed commercial agent on April 13, 1838.

Lahaina (Rahaina).

Earliest Date: April 22, 1850 (confirmation of appointment of consul) Latest Date: April 9, 1869 (confirmation of appointment of consul). Before 1845, Lahaina was the capital of Hawaii. Lahaina is located on the island of Maui.

Treaties and Agreements

Treaty of Friendship, Commerce, and Navigation Between the United States and the Sandwich Islands (Hawaii), 1826.

On December 23, 1826, the U.S. signed articles of arrangement in the typical form of a treaty of friendship, commerce, and navigation with the Kingdom of Hawaii in Honolulu, which confirmed the peace and friendship between the peoples of the two countries. The agreement was signed by the captain of the U.S. sloop of war Peacock Thomas ap Catesby Jones, who was appointed by the U.S., and Guardians of Kauikeaouli, King of the Sandwich Islands: Elisabeta Kaahumanu, the Queen Regent; Karaimoku, the Prime Minister; Boki, Governor of Oahu and personal guardian of the King; Howapili, guardian of Nahienaena, sister of the King; and Lidia Namahana, who was a dowager queen of Kamehameha I. This was the first treaty that the Kingdom of Hawaii signed with any foreign power. It was never ratified by Congress, although both countries acted in accordance with its articles.

Treaty of Friendship, Commerce, and Navigation and Extradition, 1849.

On December 20, 1849, the U.S. and the Kingdom of Hawaii signed a Treaty of Friendship, Commerce, and Navigation and Extradition. The treaty, negotiated by U.S. Secretary of State <u>John M. Clayton</u> and the Hawaiian special Commissioner to the Government of the United States James Jackson Jarves, was signed in Washington, D.C.

Treaty of Reciprocity, 1875.

On January 30, 1875, United States Secretary of State <u>Hamilton Fish</u> and the Kingdom of Hawaii's Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary to the United States Elisha H. Allensigned a Treaty of Reciprocity. This treaty provided for duty-free import of Hawaiian agricultural products into the United States. Conversely, the Kingdom of Hawaii allowed U.S. agricultural products and manufactured goods to enter Hawaiian ports duty-free. This treaty was originally intended to last for a duration of seven years.

Reciprocity Convention, 1884.

On December 6, 1884, the United States and the Kingdom of Hawaii signed a Reciprocity

Convention, pertaining to commercial reciprocity, which was an extension of the 1875 Treaty of Reciprocity.

WHEREAS, Under what superiority and whose authority? ags.hawaii.gov

The Declaration of Rights of 1839 recognized three classes of persons having vested rights in the lands; 1st, the Government; 2nd, the Chiefs; and 3rd, the native Tenants. It declared protection of these rights to both the Chiefly and native Tenant classes.

Kauikeaouli succeeded as King Kamehameha III upon the death of his brother, Kamehameha II. During his rule, the Hawaiian kingdom's first Constitution was granted in 1840, the laws codified and the government reorganized into Executive, Judicial and Legislative branches. It was also at this time that the system of fee simple land ownership was established in Hawai'i.

The māhele, or division of lands between Kamehameha III, the chiefs, and the konohiki was authorized by the Privy Council in December 1847. The māhele is a single transaction that commenced on January 28, 1848 and ended on March 7, 1848. The transaction is recorded in the *Buke Kakau Paa no ka mahele aina i Hooholoia i waena o Kamehameha III a me Na Lii a me na Konohiki ana*, commonly referred to as the Māhele Book.

Clause 2 Supremacy Clause

This Constitution, and the Laws of the United States which shall be made in Pursuance thereof; and all Treaties made, or which shall be made, under the Authority of the United States, shall be the supreme Law of the Land; and the Judges in every State shall be bound thereby, any Thing in the Constitution or Laws of any State to the Contrary notwithstanding.

On May 28, 1892, in her opening address to the last lawful Legislature, her Majesty Queen Liliuokalani declared her intentions and legislative agenda:

"...I shall firmly endeavor to preserve the autonomy and absolute independence of this Kingdom and to assist in perpetuating the rights and privileges of all who are subject to our laws and in promoting their welfare and happiness..."

On November 25, 1892 'An Act, To Reorganize The Judiciary Department' was enacted by the Hawaiian Kingdom Legislature, and became law on January 1. 1893:

'The common law of England, as ascertained by English and American decisions, is hereby declared to be the common law of the Hawaiian Islands in all cases, except as otherwise expressly provided by the Hawaiian Constitution or laws, or fixed by Hawaiian judicial precedent, or established by Hawaiian national usage, provided however, that no person shall be subject to criminal proceedings except as provided by the Hawaiian laws' [Section 5. Chapter LVII. An Act, To Reorganize The Judiciary Department, enacted on November 25, 1892, effect on January 1. 1893]

While this law was modified by the Territory of Hawaii in 1903, today it's the first, and foundational Hawaii Revised Statute. HRS §1-1 Common law of the State; exceptions. Contains the door to Hawaiian Kingdom Law:

'...except as...fixed by Hawaiian judicial precedent, or established by Hawaiian usage...' An interesting side note is the modern HRS §1-1 Common law of the State; exceptions. Traces its legislative intent directly to the law to Queen Liliuokalani wanted to protect 'the autonomy and absolute independence of this Kingdom', in 1892.

The Supreme court in Hawaii indicated on June 22, 1977.that '"Hawaiian usage" must predate November 25, 1892.' (58 H. 106, 566 P.2d 725.)

'An alien, whether his native country be at war or at peace with this kingdom, owes allegiance to this kingdom during his residence therein, and during such residence, is capable of committing treason against this kingdom. 'All laws now in force in this Kingdom, shall continue and remain in full effect, until altered or repealed by the Legislature; such parts only excepted as are repugnant to this Constitution. All laws heretofore enacted or that may hereafter be enacted, which are contrary to this Constitution, shall be null and void.' ARTICLE 79. Constitution of the Hawaiian Kingdom. 1887.

Aloha Chair Chang and members of the Commission on Water Resource Management, My name is Candace Fujikane, and I am an English professor at the University of Hawai'i. I live in He'eia Uli, and I write books about land and water struggles in Hawai'i. I am writing today to support Maui Komohana (West Maui) communities' years of hard work to restore their freshwater resources and establish management practices that benefit all peoples of Lahaina. Deputy Director Kaleo Manuel's leadership has been critical to the just restoration of water in Lahaina, and I also write to urge his reinstatement.

I am testifying in support of the 2022 Maui Komohana Water Management area against the governor's attempt to repeal the management area, but I also urge that there be a dual system that recognizes the water rights of kuleana land holders. The public eye has been directed to the attempts of West Maui Land Company's Glenn Tremble to roll back newly established water management protections for Maui Komohana by trying to hoard water being returned to kuleana landholders, even suggesting that kuleana land holders and Water Commission deputy Kaleo Manuel were at fault for preventing water from filling the reservoirs as Launuipoko with diverted stream water that could have been used for fighting the wildfires in Lahaina. We know this is false. The public now knows that this is false. The reservoirs were not connected to the county's fire hydrants, and helicopters could not be used for water drops because of high winds. In fact, if the return of stream waters had been stopped, farmers would not have had water for their own efforts to fight the fire. It is appalling to find that the governor has issued an emergency proclamation suspending the Water Code for Maui Komohana without public consultation with the Commission on Water Resources Management. The Water Code was established for the protection of water, and I find this emergency proclamation as disturbing as the governor's other emergency proclamations lifting environmental and labor protections.

I also want to point out that kuleana landholder rights to water is not in conflict with that of the general public, and that there is enough water for everyone if we protect water from corporate water banking. In the historic lawsuit of Horner v. Kumuuliili (1895), the Hawai'i Supreme Court recognized that water was subject to the rights of kuleana land holders and other native tenants in Kaua'ula Valley. In this case, Pioneer Mill sued sixty West Maui Kānaka Maoli kalo farmers who claimed water in Kaua'ula Valley. The Hawai'i Supreme Court ruled against the Pioneer Mill in favor of the historic eleven day rotation system to ensure the just distribution of water. Jonathan Scheuer and Bianca Isaki write about this history in their book, Water and Power in West Maui. We also have to remember that under the Kingdom of Hawai'i, water was not privatized and according to Section 7 of the Kuleana Act of 1850, all Land Commission Awards were emblazoned with the words, "koe na'e ke kuleana o nā kānaka," that is, all lands and waters are "subject to the rights of Native tenants." That protection continues today in the recognition of water as a public trust, but we need a dual system that recognizes that kuleana land holders continue to have a unique right to waters, as developers like West Maui Land and corporate interests continue the processes of quieting title to kuleana lands and seizing water. We have seen over and over again how privatized watersheds lead to hikes in water prices that kuleana landholders cannot afford. Kuleana land holders have historically been the best stewards of waters for *everyone's* benefit, and we need to recognize this by supporting their needs with infrastructure that will give them access to the watershed that is not dependent on the water structures built by developers.

I urge you to uphold the Maui Komohana Water Management Area designation while recognizing kuleana land holder rights to water; ensure that the updated interim instream flow standards for West Maui are being met; reinstate Kaleo Manuel as deputy director; and urge staff to continue their efforts to implement our Water Code. I also urge you to work with the kuleana land holders whose families have worked for generations to steward water in Lahaina and who know best the practices that will sustain *all peoples of Lahaina* for generations.

Aloha e Chair Chang and Commissioners,

My name is Paanakala Tanaka and I am from Lahaina. I am a community member, teacher in the Hawaiian Immersion middle school in Lahaina, as well as the Education Director for the Lahaina based Hawaiian voyaging canoe non-profit, Hui o Wa'a Kaulua. Thank you for taking the time to receive my testimony as I was born and raised in Lahaina, my family home was one of the many homes consumed by the fire. I am a lineal descendent of Kahoma Valley and have lo'i kalo in that valley. I testify to share my profound aloha for Maui Komohana. In the wake of the wildfires and during this time of hulihia, we need the Water Commission's leadership and kōkua now more than ever.

In June 2022, this Commission unanimously designated Maui Komohana as ground and surface water management areas. In good faith, many of us on Maui invested the better part of a year putting together water use permit applications with the hope that our water rights would finally be recognized. We submitted those applications on August 7, 2023, a day before the wildfires ravaged Lahaina. While we grieved and struggled to recover, the Governor suspended the Water Code and Chair Chang "reassigned" Deputy Director Manuel. Chaos ensued as diverters filled their pools and reservoirs and our streams ran dry.

We are here today to ask you to honor the Water Code, as well as your decision to designate our community for more proactive water management. Fresh water is key to Maui Komohana's future, and our community's needs must be centered in decision making. In particular, we request that you immediately reinstate Deputy Director Manuel. His leadership and integrity is desperately needed both by this Commission and the larger community.

On an island surrounded by ocean, Lahaina within feet of that water, we know the water designation did not prevent the spread of wildfire, we have more than enough ocean water that should have been used to extinguish the fire. Our fresh water resource is the key to Maui Komohana's successful recovery and future thus Water Management Area designation must be respected and water use permitting must proceed.

Please hold your October 17, 2023 meeting on Maui so that you can hear directly from those of us who were most affected by the fires.

My name is Momilanionākūpunaaloha Nu'uhiwa. I am a descendant of Martha Kamaka Lua'ehu, daughter of John Lua'ehu Pauahi and Ane Poole. John Lua'ehu Pauahi is the son of Kalaauala Lua'ehu Pauahi and Keahi Mii Keliihanaole. Kalaauala Lua'ehu Pauahi is the son of Manono and Kā'anā'anā Puou. I currently live in Hilo, in the ahupua'a of Pu'ueo on the banks of the 'Āwehi river which receives it's life giving water from Mauna Kea. My Lua'ehu 'ohana descends from Maui and my relatives there have suffered tremendously as a result of the Lāhainā and Kula fires.

I assert a collective kuleana to malama our precious water resources. Protection of the public trust protects Hawai'i's people. I answer the call for solidarity amongst all working class people of Hawai'i to resist corporate control of resources and to demand a future that puts the needs of our people, our 'āina and our environment before the profits of corporations and luxury developers. I call on Governor Joshua Green and the Water Commission to respect and uphold West Maui's Ground and Surface Water Management Areas. I call on the Water Commission to enforce stream flow standards to ensure that kuleana users, small family farmers and the streams themselves are getting the water they need before water is taken for luxury homes and other development. I call on the Water Commission to process water use permit applications for public trust purposes- such as lo'i kalo, loko i'a and other traditional and customary Native Hawaiian practices and individual domestic uses FIRST, before applications for developers, luxury homes, private commercial uses and the county of Maui. I call for Deputy Director Kaleo Manuel's immediate reinstatement. I reject the false narrative that a single Water Deputy who has proven to be highly impactful in his job, somehow impeded firefighting efforts on August 8, 2023. I reject the continued corporate dominance of water and land resources that should be used to better the quality of life of people and our homes. I reject corporate misinformation and lies that allow the continued theft of water throughout Hawai'i and in Lāhainā in particular. I reject the legacy of water theft in Hawai'i that is rooted in colonial exploitation, oligarchical control, manipulation, and exploitation of people, land, and water. I reject plantation disaster capitalism that puts corporate profit before the well-being of Hawai'is people, especially while they are most vulnerable. I reject the status quo approach of Chair Dawn Change and Governor Joshua Green that utilizes manipulative tactics to further the interests of private, for-profit developers at the expense of the community atlarge and the public trust.

West Maui Land Company is using the tragedy of the Lahaina wildfires and the Governor's emergency proclamation as an excuse to undermine water rights and decades of

community advocacy that helped restore Maui's streams and protect small farmers from the exploitation of big business. Lahaina was historically a wetland, an area abundant in freshwater and a vibrant native ecosystem. But a century of excessive stream diversions took millions of gallons of freshwater from across Maui Komohana (West Maui) for private corporations– first sugar plantation owners and now luxury estates.

One of these companies is West Maui Land Company: a real estate developer who sucked public streams dry in order to build hotels, golf courses, luxury homes, and colonial-style subdivisions. Their subsidiary is Launuipoko Irrigation Company, which takes all of the water from Kaua'ula Stream to provide water for exotic landscaping, pools, golf courses, and decorative fountains. On the day of the Lahaina fires, West Maui Land Company wrote a series of letters to the Governor and the Hawai'i Department of Land and Natural Resources requesting more stream water be diverted than allowed under state law in order to fill their water reservoirs for firefighting. The truth and reality is that the water reservoirs that West Maui Land Co. asked to fill up could NOT have been used to fight the Lahaina fires. This is because these reservoirs only serve the luxury estates above Lahaina, and are not connected to the county water system or any fire hydrants. Plus, the 80-mile-an-hour winds from Hurricane Dora meant no helicopters were allowed to make water drops. When West Maui Land Company's request to divert water was not immediately granted, they insinuated that stream protections were to blame for the fire, going so far as to blame a single Hawaiian kalo farmer for the lack of water to fight the fire. This resulted in misleading media articles and ultimately Kaleo Manuel, Deputy Director of the Department of Land and Natural Resources' Commission on Water Resources Management (Water Commission), being swiftly removed from his position. Kaleo helped to advance stream restoration throughout the state and served nearly four years on the Water Commission. He is the longest serving Water Commission Deputy Director and the first Native Hawaiian to serve in this position.

West Maui Land Co. is exploiting the tragedy in Lahaina to further justify increasing water diversions under their corporate control. Not only did they unfairly position Kaleo Manuel as a scapegoat for decades-long debates over their own water misuse, but they are now asking the Water Commission to suspend and change the Water Management Designation Area of West Maui, which adds permitting and accountability for privatized commercial water use, now and into the future.

I call on Governor Josh Green, Hawai'i state legislators, and the Department of Land and Natural Resources to do the following:

- 1. Recenter Maui Kama'āina in the decisions about their future
- 2. Return Kaleo Manuel as the Deputy Director of the Commission on Water Resources Management
- 3. Reinstate the State Water Code
- 4. Respect the Maui Komohana Water Management Area

5. Reinstate Sunshine Law to restore public meetings and decision making transparency The actions taken now by the state Government must ensure the long-term recovery and sustainability of Maui for future generations. Colonialism and climate change are what created the conditions that spread the devastating wildfire in Lahaina.

There is a path forward that balances affordable housing needs, traditional and customary practices, and long term stream health. We can chart that course together so long as the greed of some is properly controlled.

Aloha e Commissioners,

My name is Davis Price, I am the Hawai'i Regional Director for NDN Collective, a national organization that centers the empowerment of indigenous communities to develop sustainable solutions that foster justice and equity for people and our planet.

I am testifying today in regards to agenda item C.1. regarding water resources in the Lahaina Aquifer Sector Area. In order to properly administer resources and decisions at this time of great urgency and immense pressure, it is imperative that leadership be up to the task. That leadership should have the background and experience on water issues in order to artfully navigate the needs of various interest groups. That leadership should have knowledge of the law and policy on the matter such as the Water Code and be capable of elevating solutions that uphold the spirit and integrity of the law and the intent behind its adoption. And most importantly, the leadership needed right now must have the trust of the people of West Maui.

It is apparent that this leadership under Governor Green and Dawn Chang has proven untrustworthy to carry forward this Commission's kuleana. The swift removal of Deputy Kaleo Manuel immediately after a single unverified news story broke just days after the fire, with no further investigation and with no consultation with the commission, is baffling. This sequence of events seems to have been set in motion by a letter from West Maui Land Co. executives to Chair Chang.

The letter communication and subsequent actions by Chang Chang is alarming as it gives the appearance that one stakeholder group (West Maui Land Co.) is operating with greater influence and access to decision-makers than others from the community in Maui Komohana. Furthermore, this is alarming because the relationship between West Maui Land Co. and Lahaina community members has been extremely adversarial over many years and the community has relied on bodies such as the CWRM and individuals such as former Deputy Manuel to balance the interests and arbitrate this tenuous relationship amongst competing stakeholders. The playing field has never been level and the community has fought to protect precious water resources, despite being highly disadvantaged and outmatched with financial resources that West Maui Land Co. has access to. In sum, the CWRM and Water Deputy should be able to balance these interests as Deputy Manuel was able to do, and it seems he has been punished for doing this job

effectively and as a result the people of Maui Komohana and the public at-large so too have been punished.

Until this matter is resolved via an investigative inquiry as to how and why a letter from West Maui Land Co. executives resulted in the removal of an effective official, the commission will be challenged to move forward with any semblance of trust from the community at-large, thus making recovery efforts all the more challenging. It behooves this commission to investigate the matter of West Maui Land Co.'s role in Deputy Manuel's removal, so as to uphold the integrity of any decisions this body makes going forward. Additionally, the Commission should move to **reinstate Kaleo Manuel immediately.**

Finally, we cannot allow the interest of large landowner corporations undermine the integrity of the Water Code and the effectiveness of the Commission's work. I respectfully urge the commission to adhere to the requests below. Mahalo

Item C-1: Regarding Water Resources in the Lāhainā Aquifer Sector

Mahalo for the opportunity to address the Commission on the public confusion regarding water resource issues in the Lāhainā Aquifer Sector. I am not attending person, as a call has gone out for many to ply a false narrative, and such a spectacle is just too much for me any more. I appreciate your graciousness in sitting through that.

First, I applaud the difficult step of designating the Sector's ground and surface waters, as this seems to be the only way a community rife with conflict can air out the necessities of water resource management. Over many years of pursuing rational decision-making, and witnessing Maui County's repeated efforts to promote community planning, it is plain enough that rational community decision-making could not unfold in this contentious environment. Rather, quasi-judicial proceedings may provide the context for ultimately resolving these conflicts to greater but doubtless not complete satisfaction.

A false narrative has arisen over the reasons for Deputy Manuel's reassignment. While I do not have all the facts, it is quite clear that his lack of training in public administration has been a disaster, as the staff's efficacy, reputation, and collaboration with the myriad actors in water management have been mangled. The idea that greater stream diversion for fire fighting was the context for that decision seems off-base, despite appropriate anger over continued efforts by West Maui Land to illegitimately usurp the use of water. Unforeseeable fire developments rendered choices moot and resulted in a firestorm incapable of containment. Finger-pointing is the refuge of ignorance and weak-mindedness. I was among the first to call for the Deputy's removal for administrative malfeasance long before this event, but I support his decision in this matter.

Having approved many wells in the hobby farming subdivision adjacent to Lāhainā, in accord with law, rule, and procedure, despite my disapproving the purposes of hobby farming, the result is an optimally appropriate draw upon available ground water, and the startling prospect that these wells and an awakened community of hobby farmers might provide key resources for the restoration of a landscape long abused by their forebears. There are possibilities of restoring a more traditional Hawaiian landscape, by dedicating those water resources to the grow-out of more fire-adaptive native plant materials to replace the invasive grasses that burned, and the cultivation of compostable materials to begin rebuilding a depleted and now burned soil. In addition, of course, this "agricultural subdivision" could provide greatly improved food security by raising fresh food crops for the community at large. The land owners could all become "cooperators" with the U.S. Natural Resource Conservation Service, gaining access to resources to facilitate these efforts.

Far more important, in my view, is that this water resource solution could finally release all the water in Kaua'ula Stream for its traditional service to lo'I kalo, the full restoration of the stream to its mouth, and the slow restoration of the wetland at Moku'ula and Mokuhinia as a more traditional community center. Native planters have been struggling for this result for generations, and it is time to recognize their proper priority in the use of water resources. The Commission should adopt a fifth public trust use of water for food agriculture, to resurrect ancient Hawaiian tradition.

The outpouring of compassion for this community is an opportunity to reconcile long-standing divisions, rather than reigniting them and distracting from building a viable future. I appreciate the opportunity to share some ideas, in the confidence that leadership rising for Maui Komohana can establish priorities for the future.
