Dear Governor Burns:



ORGANIZATION CHART DEPARTMENT OF LAND AND NATURAL RESOURCES



The Board of Land and Natural Resources, under provisions of the State Constitution and of applicable statutes, is responsible for the conservation, development, and effective utilization of the mineral, forest, water, land, fish, wildlife and other natural resources owned or controlled by the State of Hawaii. The broad mission of the Board is to administer and manage, through the Chairman and the staff and personnel of the Department, these basic resources for the present and future benefit and enjoyment of the general public. Goals and objectives of the Department, authorized by the Board, recognize the economic values and impact of the State-owned resources within the overall economy of the State, and in addition, give due consideration to the social values inherent in the proper development utilization and management of these assets of the State.

The Board consists of six members, including the Chairman, who are appointed by the Governor with the advice and consent of the State Senate. Two members are appointed at large from within the State, and one member

is appointed from within each of the four Land Districts of the State. The normal appointive term for members is four years, and no member may by law, serve for more than two consecutive terms or for more than eight consecutive years.

The Chairman of the Board is appointed by the Governor from among the members of the Board. He assumes cabinet rank; acts as the representative of the Board in dealing with the Office of the Governor and with the State Legislature; and serves as the full-time Executive Officer of the Department.

Several significant changes were made in the composition of the Board during the Fiscal Year. Mr. Hiroshi Tanaka, Hawaii Land District Member, resigned on August 1, 1968 after completing almost eight full years in office. Mr. Norman Koshiyama was appointed as Hawaii District Member to replace Mr. Tanaka, effective on August 9, 1968. Mr. Koshiyama completed approximately nine months in his term, and then resigned during May, 1969. The position of Hawaii District Member of the Board is vacant at the time of preparation of this report.

Mr. William Y. Thompson, previously Manager/Chief Engineer of the Hawaii Board of Water Supply, was appointed as Deputy to the Chairman on January 16, 1969, and assumed the duties and responsibilities of that position immediately thereafter.

LEGISLATION

A number of specific Acts, and several Resolutions, passed during the recent 1969 Session of the State Legislature will have some effect on either the functions or operations of the Department. Most of these actions of the Legislature call either for relatively minor changes in operational procedures, or provide guidance for the Department for the conduct of studies and research into problems of development and management of natural resources.

Specific Acts, approved by the Governor, which have more than a passing interest include, Act 264 (HB 710), which requires the Board of Land and Natural Resources to hold formal public hearings prior to approval of proposals for construction or development within Conservation Districts. Act 236 (HB 1131) establishes a Hawaii Foundation for History and the Humanities, which is authorized to work cooperatively with the Department of Land and Natural Resources for preservation and restoration of historic, scientific and cultural sites and structures, and is further authorized to solicit, receive, and expend public and private funds for such purposes. Other Legislative Actions, dealing with management of State lands, or with development and enhancement of other resources, are detailed further within the sections of this report dealing with individual Divisional programs.

Several Resolutions adopted by the Legislature are expected to have both immediate and long-range effects on the programs of the Department, and particularly with projects for development of State lands. These include a number of Concurrent Resolutions (SCR 63, 64, 65, 75, and 76) which specifically authorize the Board under the provisions of Act 68/1968 to develop through private developers and capital a number of residential and hotel/recreational projects at various locations throughout the State. It is expected that the first of these projects will be initiated prior to the end of 1969. Other authorized projects will be initiated as rapidly as plans and development contracts can be prepared.

HR 216 requests the Department to develop a comprehensive Fish and Wildlife Plan for the State of Hawaii. Preliminary planning on this project has been completed, and it is proposed to approach the Legislature in the 1970 Session with a request for funds to effectuate these plans.

PROGRAMS

The Chairman and Members of the Board have continued to emphasize development and conservation of the land and recreational resources of the State to meet the rapidly growing need of the resident and visitor population of the State.

Forestry development and utilization programs have been maintained and expanded. Particular efforts have been expended in developing management plans for all forest reserve areas under the control of the department. Recreational aspects of forest development and management are receiving special attention as a means of expanding the overall capability of the State to meet the growing outdoor recreational demands of the public.

Fish and Wildlife programs are being reviewed, with the stated objective of expanding the recreational hunting and fishing programs, culminating in the Comprehensive Fish and Wildlife Plan now in preparation. Additional efforts are being carried on to improve the tuna fishery industry of the State, and to also investigate the potentials for commercial aquaculture of prawns and oysters within State waters.

The Department is presently engaged in reviewing and reorganizing the responsibilities and organizational structure of the Division of Land Management so as to improve the overall capability for effective development and management of State lands. This project of improvement of the Division is particularly appropriate in view of the recent Legislative mandate for development by private developer and capital of a number of areas of State lands for residential and hotel/recreational uses, as well as for continuing normal responsibility for the acquisition, development, disposition, and management of all State lands.

The Division of State Parks, Outdoor Recreation, and Historic Sites, was recently reorganized to more clearly define their responsibilities and functions. This new organization should provide added capability and flexibility to deal with the rapidly growing problems of providing and administering programs for parks, recreation, and historic sites. A major test of the new organization will be posed by the overall need for planning, development, and management of 5000 acre Kahana Valley State Park. Acquisition of this major park area was virtually completed in July 1969, and initial planning has commenced for development.

A comprehensive water resources planning program is being carried on by the Division of Water and Land Development, which will utlimately provide overall plans, for each island in the State, for water development, transmission, and use. These comprehensive plans are correlated with the General Plan of the State in-so-far as it relates to present and future development of the State.

ADMINISTRATIVE SERVICES OFFICE

Adelino Coito Departmental Fiscal Officer

The Administrative Services Office performs essential staff and supportive functions for the Board of Land and Natural Resources and for the Chairman, and in addition, supports the efforts of other staff offices and of the operating divisions of the department in carrying out their responsibilities.

Primary functions of the office include providing critical support in centralized purchasing for the entire department, receipt and accounting of funds, budget preparation for operating funds, expenditure control for all funds including both operating funds and Capital Improvements appropriations, and maintenance of accounts and records, inventories, and fiscal reports.

The office computes and develops payrolls for the department, and also computes and completes reports of Federal Funds reimbursements for all divisional programs

receiving Federal aid funds or grants. Monies are collected and deposited for various other agencies of the State Government, including the Department of Taxation, Department of Transportation, and the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands, and periodic reports are made to those agencies for their fiscal records.

The staff of the office prepare various fiscal and accounting reports, detailed analyses and recommendations, and provide technical advice to the Board, to the Chairman, and to Division Heads and Program managers relative to problems of fund management and budgetary control within the department. The recent advent of Electronic Data Processing, and the initiation of Planning, Programming, Budgeting System (PPBS) techniques for fiscal management and control of programs, has generally increased the degree of sophistication required in managing and reporting fiscal problems within the department. This increased sophistication is reflected in the total workload placed on this office.

PERSONNEL OFFICE

Andrew Seki Departmental Personnel Officer

The Personnel Office maintains a comprehensive personnel program for the entire Department of Land and Natural Resources. A permanent staff of two persons provides service to six operating Divisions and two Staff Offices. During peak summer period the staff is augmented by an additional clerk. The staff provides services to the Chairman and to departmental personnel in such specialized areas as position classification, employee relations, and employee training and development; maintains a centralized system for processing, recording, reporting, and filing personnel transactions and records; and prepares recommendations for the adoption of personnel policies and procedures. As of June 30, 1969, there were 367 full-time employees. The Koko Head Job Corps Conservation Center, which had been administratively attached to this Department since its inception, was officially transferred to the Department of Labor and Industrial Relations on June 27, 1969. Responsibility for the Neighborhood Youth Corps (NYC) Program was transferred to the Department of Education on September 3, 1968.

In addition to the normal operations of the department, this office provided personnel and management services to the "Operation Mainstream" program (Nelson Amendment Program) administered by the State Parks Division and to the Divisions of State Parks, Forestry, Fish and Game, and Water and Land Development in hiring a total of 241 temporary student workers for the summer work program.

This office played a major role in assisting the Department of Personnel Services in their attempt to complete the classification of all administrative, professional and technical positions by the end of this fiscal period and in developing class specifications for those classes found in this department, namely: Aquatic Biologist series; Fishery Aids and Technician series; Wildlife Biologist series; Wildlife

Management Aid and Assistant series; Fish and Game Administrator; State Parks Administrator; and Irrigation Superintendent series. This Office will continue to assist in developing specifications for subprofessional positions within the State Parks program and the Forestry program, and also for those positions within the Land Management Division which have not yet been included in the Statewide Administrative, Professional and Technical Classification Plan.

The position of Personnel Officer vacated on October 31, 1966, was filled by the appointment of Mr. Andrew Seki on August 1, 1968.

PLANNING OFFICE

Gordon Soh Program Planning Coordinator

The Planning Office assists the Chairman and the Board, as well as Division Heads and staff of the department in formulating broad guidelines for the conservation and development programs of the Department.

At the direction of the Chairman, the Planning Coordinator and staff outline departmental goals and objectives, and integrate divisional programs and projects within these major areas of responsibility. The office supervises the conduct of planning and research studies, and the formulation of long range plans for use of lands and natural resources under State control. The staff assist in the development of and coordinate departmental programs, and in connection with this responsibility, correlate the Capital Improvements Budget for the Department and maintain periodic review of the capital expenditures of the department in relation to achievement of goals and objectives. Professional planners in the office provide planning advice and coordinate the planning efforts of subordinate divisions to insure relationships of Divisional programs with departmental objectives.

The Planning Office staff also carries out the relatively routine administrative duties of administering the Department's regulation for land uses within Conservation Districts in the State. The Planning Coordinator was deeply involved in preparation of legislative materials, and in offering testimony before Legislative Committees.

Much staff time was expended in supporting the development plans of the department and other private and public agencies, by examining plans for development and construction within or adjacent to Conservation Districts, and reviewing plans and disposition requests for beach and national parks, school complexes, and other governmental related developments.


Major personnel changes occurred within the Planning Office during the year, with an almost complete turnover of the staff. Mr. Paul Tajima resigned on August 15, 1968 to enter private business. Mr. Gordon Soh assumed the position of Program Planning Coordinator in early November 1968. Other transfers and resignations, and new appointments resulted in an almost new staff present at the end of the reporting year.

SECTION 2

Division of Conveyances

MICHIKI ADACHI, Registrar of Conveyances

RECORDATION

The principal functions of the Bureau of Conveyances are to receive, file, record, index, maintain and preserve all legal and land title documents and maps affecting land titles in the State of Hawaii, as well as the preparation and issuance of certified copies of any matter of record.

The Bureau is the sole agency within the State authorized to receive and register all land title documents and maps. During the past fiscal year, the Bureau received and recorded 90,502 documents, an increase of 5,580 documents over the previous fiscal year. Fees collected by the Bureau for the past fiscal year was nearly \$460,000 as compared to \$411,000 for the previous fiscal year, while disbursements amounted to \$339,000 as compared to \$332,000 for the previous fiscal year. Once again, the Bureau was able to operate economically by collecting more than it expended.

Additionally, the Bureau collected about \$406,000 in conveyance taxes for the Department of Taxation, while collections for the previous fiscal year amounted to \$263,000. The value of real property transferred was nearly \$810,000,000, surpassing the previous fiscal year by nearly \$281,000,000. Of this \$810,000,000, \$327,000,000 represents leasehold value of property transferred.

The land title registration programs of the Bureau are guided by Chapters 501, 502 and other related chapters of

the Hawaii Revised Statutes. Due to the different legal and procedural requirements contained herein, the general functions of the bureau are divided into two main branches and a servicing section.

The Land Court Registration Branch is primarily concerned with the filing, processing, indexing, maintaining and preserving of all land title documents and maps affecting title to land registered in the Land Court entitled to registration, the issuance of Land Court Certificates of Title guaranteed by the State, and with the preparation and issuance of certified copies of any matter of record.

The Regular Registration Branch is primarily concerned with the recording, processing, indexing, maintaining and preserving of all legal and land title documents and maps affecting unregistered land entitled to recordation, and with the preparation and issuance of certified copies of any matter of record.

The Office Services Section, primarily services the Land Court Registration and the Regular Registration Branches. The principal functions of this Section are to receive for registration all legal and land title documents and maps entitled to registration in either branch, to receive and process all orders for certified copies of matters of record, to deliver processed documents and maps to parties recording them, to collect and deposit all fees and conveyance taxes due, and to assist and service the public desiring information and use of our records.

OTHER ACTIVITIES

Microfilming — Land Court Registration Branch

During the past fiscal year, the second microfilm contract, for the security microfilming of Land Court documents was completed with Bell & Howell Company. The two contracts to date have resulted in the microfilming of 290,000 of 473,000 documents or approximately 900 rolls of 35mm film. The third and final contract, which will be awarded during FY 1969-70 will result in the microfilming of nearly 135,000 documents. Beginning with FY 1970-71, the Land Court documents security microfilming program will be a continuing program of the Microfilm Section in the Regular Registration Branch.

Microfilming — Regular Registration Branch

The Bureau continued to microfilm current Regular Registration Branch daily documents on its Recordak planetary microfilm camera. These recordings, placed on 35mm film, required 177 rolls of film as compared to 140 rolls the previous fiscal year.

The Bureau is also continuing to microfilm old libers, accumulated prior to the acquisition of its microfilm equipment. To date 2,815 libers of a total of 4,542 libers have been filmed. The Bureau has also microfilmed 17,000 of 30,700 Veteran's Discharge Certificates for security and copy purposes. The remaining 13,700 Veteran's Discharge Certificates will be microfilmed within FY 1969-70.

The security microfilming is continually being carried out in addition to the daily microfilming of current work. All original microfilms are currently being stored with the State Archives or until such time as a more appropriate State facility is completed. Duplicates of all microfilms are kept in the Bureau and are used to produce certified copies and for reference purposes. During this past fiscal year, the Bureau supplied other governmental agencies 6,118 pages of its records. This was in addition to sales of copies to the general public. The sales of certified copies amounted to \$10,816.90.

The Bureau is also continuing to make reduced size visual prints of all Regular Registration Branch current recordings for public reference purposes. 485–475-page libers were required for the visual prints as compared to 406–475-page libers for the previous fiscal year.

Condominiums

The Land Court Registration Branch accepted 27 condominiums maps representing 2,522 units as compared to 7 condominium maps representing 714 units during the previous fiscal year.

The Regular Registration Branch, accepted 33 condominium maps representing 2,286 units as compared to 15 condominium maps representing 745 units for the previous fiscal year.

Legislation


Act 11 of the 1969 Legislative Session provides that the Registrar accept for recordation, Certificates of Separation from the Armed Services, from resident veterans. Prior to the passage of this Act, only Honorable Discharge Certificates were acceptable for recordation.

SECTION 3

Division of Fish and Game

MICHIO TAKATA, State Fish and Game Conservationist

The Division of Fish and Game administers the State's fish and wildlife programs. It is generally concerned with research, development and management of the fish and wildlife resources. The task of discharging this responsibility was carried out by the division's 65 permanent employees aided by the fine support of personnel elsewhere in the department.

Major emphasis was placed during the year in the improvement of quality outdoor recreational opportunities by acquiring, developing and operating fishing and hunting areas and stocking them with game species; in the enhancement of the longline tuna fishing industry by increasing its long range fishing capabilities; and in the development of commercial oyster and prawn industries by improving aquaculture techniques. Special attention was also given to the improvement of fish and wildlife enforcement effectiveness through the institution of a citation system in all counties of the State.

LEGISLATION

Five legislative measures relating to operations of this division were adopted by the State Legislature during its 1969 session.

House Resolution No. 197 requests the Department of

Land and Natural Resources to aid hunters in gaining access to State lands on Oahu. The problem of public access to State lands and waters for recreational purposes exists on all islands but is most critical on Oahu where these areas are exceedingly limited in relation to population. The access requirements for the whole range of recreation seekers will be evaluated and action initiated that will benefit the greatest number of people.

House Resolution No. 208 requests the Department of Land and Natural Resources to prepare a shark control plan to combat the possible increase in the non-pelagic shark population. A continuous, systematic shark research and control program has been the most effective approach to this problem, but alternative approaches are being evaluated.

House Resolution No. 216 requests the Department of Land and Natural Resources to develop a comprehensive fish and wildlife plan for the State of Hawaii. Such a plan is essential in order to provide for the projected future demands that will be made upon our fish and wildlife resources. Sources for funding the preparation of a plan are now being explored.

Act 181 exempts vessels constructed under the Fisheries New Vessel Construction Loan Program prior to July 1,

1969 from the Use Tax Law (Chapter 238, HRS). Since vessels constructed under this loan program will be used to harvest fishery resources heretofore beyond the reach of our fishing fleet, numerous uncertainties will be encountered and therefore an element of risk is involved. Thus, this tax relief will be of material aid especially during the initial trial fishing phase of this new fishing venture.

Act 186 encourages landowners to make land and water areas available to the public for recreational purposes by limiting their liability toward such recreationists. This legislation will undoubtedly facilitate our efforts in providing increased fishing and hunting opportunities to the public.

FISHERIES


The Fisheries program centered on the management and development of both the freshwater and marine renewable aquatic resources for wisest and optimal utilization. Projects included introduction, stocking and establishment status survey of various exotic freshwater and marine fishes and invertebrates to enhance recreational as well as commercial fishing; the development of new commercial fisheries; the development and management of artificial shoals, public fishing areas and sanctuaries; and the conduct of biological studies oriented towards the gathering of data needed to regulate the varied fisheries.

Fish and Shellfish Introduction


Tucunare. This South American species has attained notable status as a new gamefish for fresh water sportsfishermen in Hawaii. Creel census and fishermen interview data, particularly from the Wahiawa Public Fishing Area, show that the tucunare is becoming an increasingly important part of the catch, and is rapidly developing a fine reputation here as a game and food fish.

To secure information for effective management of this species under local conditions, a study of selected aspects of its life history was initiated in October, 1968. Progress in this study has been excellent and a sizable body of knowledge of the species and its environmental conditions is being amassed.

Rainbow Trout. Hatchery facilities at the Keehi Fisheries Station were operated during the period March 12-June 4, 1969, following alterations of the system to improve water circulation. Two shipments of some 50,000 eyed eggs each were imported from a mainland Federal hatchery, and were processed during this period, with a total production of some 91,500 fingerlings. Virtually all of these fingerlings

were released into the streams of the Kokee Public Fishing Area on Kauai.

Groupers and Snappers. The documentation of captures and sightings of the six species of groupers and five species of snappers introduced into Hawaiian waters between 1955 and 1961 was continued. Since October 1966, the grouper, roi (Cephalopholis argus), and the snappers, toau (Lutjanus vaigiensis) and taape (L. kasmira), have been open to public fishing. During the year, the toau and roi were reported from Hawaii, Maui, Oahu and Kauai, and the taape was reported from Hawaii, Oahu, Molokai and for the first time from Lanai. The taape is now common on Hawaii where commercial fishermen have caught as much as 50 pounds per fishing trip off the Puna coast. Of the remaining eight other introduced species, only the grouper, rero (Cephalopholis urodelus) was sighted during the year.

Prawn. Tabulation of data on sightings and recoveries of *Macrobrachium lar*, a large fresh water shrimp introduced from Guam and Tahiti, was continued. One outstanding occurrence was the sighting of 175 specimens in the mid-reaches of the Waimanu Stream on Hawaii, during a limnological survey in July, 1968.

Top Shell. The establishment status of the top shell or Trochus (*Trochus niloticus*) which was introduced from Guam and released in the vicinity of the Pyramid Rock area of Kaneohe Bay, Oahu was monitored during the year. Two underwater surveys made at the site of release gave counts of 72 and 44 live trochus respectively. As yet, evidence of trochus reproduction has not been uncovered.

Quahog Clam. After a year in Hawaiian waters, the quahog clams (Mercenaria mercenaris) introduced into Kaneohe Bay, Oahu from Connecticut have grown from an

average size of 1¼ to 1¾ inches in length. When first introduced the largest clam measured 1 5/8 inches while the largest clam now measures 2 3/8 inches in length. The clams have adjusted well to Hawaiian conditions with a survival rate of 80 percent.

Abalone. Experimental introductions of abalone are being made to determine the survival and reproduction of this shellfish in Hawaiian waters. The Green Abalone (Haliotis fulgens) and the Pink Abalone (H. corrugata) are being shipped to us periodically by the California Fish and Game Department for studies being conducted at Coconut Island, Oahu by the Hawaii Institute of Marine Biology.

Limnological Survey

Limnological surveys of eleven streams, all on the island of Hawaii, were carried out during this report period. Seven of these streams were found to offer good potential for future development as public fishing areas. This now brings the total number of streams surveyed on Hawaii to forty-two.

On a state-wide basis, a total of 139 streams has been surveyed to date, and favorable conclusions on potential for future development have been reported for 117 of these streams, suggesting a very promising outlook for augmentation of fresh water fishing areas in the State.

Action was initiated towards publication of a catalog of streams throughout the State, based on information accumulated during this period.

Public Fishing Areas

Kokee PFA, Kauai. Fishermen checking station data collected during the 1968 trout fishing season showed that 323 fisherman-trips resulted in the taking of 317 trout. Some 1,036 fishing hours were expended, for an average of a little over 3 hours per fish. This was obviously a very poor season.

Wahiawa PFA, Oahu. Construction of fishermen facilities, consisting of an access road, parking lot, and an unusually long boat launching ramp and dock (designed to accommodate extreme fluctuations in water level) was started in July, 1967. Good progress was made until October, 1967, with favorable low water conditions. However, very heavy rainfall and consequent high water forced postponement of work until July, 1968. Subsequently, work was resumed and the project was completed in September, 1968.

Creel census and fishermen interview data collected during calendar year 1968 indicate continuing heavy usage of the Wahiawa PFA by the fishing public. An estimated 14,707 fisherman-trips were made to this facility during the calendar year 1968, and that some 34,523 hours were spent in recreational fishing. It is further estimated that about 18,840 fish weighing 13,086 pounds were caught during the same period.

Waiakea PFA, Hawaii. Six artificial fish shelters, constructed of transite pipes obtained from the State Surplus Property Branch, were installed in this facility in May, 1969. This was done pursuant to recommendations of fishermen utilizing the area, to improve the fish habitat and to enhance accessibility of the fish to shoreline fishermen.

No assessments of the effects of the shelters have yet been made.

Recreational Fishing Survey

A study to determine the economic value of recreational fishing in Hawaii was contracted to the Department of Agricultural Economics of the University of Hawaii. When completed in June 1970, this study should provide information on (1) the intensity of various kinds of recreational fishing activities, (2) the amount of money spent by people for goods and services connected with recreational fishing activities, and (3) the influence of this spending toward the production of goods locally instead of goods imported into Hawaii. The survey will allow the division to project future recreational fishing needs in the State.

Artificial Shoals and SCUBA Reconnaissance of Inshore Areas

Over the past several years, artificial shoals have been created at Maunalua Bay and Waianae on Oahu and at Keawakapu on Maui to attract and concentrate high densities of fishes in formerly barren areas. During the year, an additional 450 tons of damaged concrete pipes were sunk at the Waianae shoal, bringing the total quantity of materials placed at the shoal to 3,900 tons of concrete pipes and 94 car bodies. This year, before the additional pipes were added to a section of the shoal containing only a few pipes, an underwater survey revealed a count of 59 different species of fishes at a density of 470 pounds per acre. With the addition of the pipes, however, the density of fishes in this area has nearly doubled. At the Maunalua Bay shoal this year's underwater transect revealed a standing crop composed of 56 different species of fishes and a density amounting to an estimated 984 pounds per acre.

Reef and inshore fish population studies were continued at Kealakekua Bay and Honaunau Bay on Hawaii on a quarterly basis. Fish surveys at seven (5 at Kealakekua and 2 at Honaunau) permanently established underwater transect stations revealed as many as 120 different species of fishes and an average standing crop density of 243 pounds per acre. The yellow tang (Zebrasoma flavescens) and kole (Ctenochaetus strigosus) were the most common species noted. The results of the studies are incorporated into the report, "Biological and Physical Features of Kealakekua Bay, Hawaii", University of Hawaii, Hawaii Botanical Science Paper, No. 8, December, 1968.

Management Oriented Biological Investigations

Biological investigations designed to provide information upon which to base management regulations were continued during the year on the akule (Trachurops crumenophthalmus), Kona crab (Ranina serrata), spiny lobsters (Panulirus japonicus and P. penicillatus) and moi (Polydactylus sexfilis). The studies show that the akule is relatively non-migratory. It matures from the young hahalalu stage within a 12 to 18-month period and the fishery is supported primarily by fish that are less than two years old.

The Kona crab has also been found to be relatively

non-migratory. This crab attains sexual maturity when about two years old. The females are capable of bearing and hatching two groups of eggs during the spawning season that extends from June through August. Growth increment is realized only with each molt and although significant growth is made per molt, both the molting frequency and the growth increment decrease with age. For the older age groups, the males of the species are larger than the females of the same age. The carapace length of males five years old averages about 4 inches while that of females of the same age averages about 3½ inches.

The spiny lobsters in Hawaii seem to grow very little at each molt and therefore require a period of possibly six years before reaching the legal harvestable size of one pound. Female spiny lobsters are very prolific, laying eggs

as many as four times a year.

On the other hand, moi grows very rapidly attaining first maturity as males within a period of one to two years at an average size of about 9½ inches in fork length. During its second to third year of life, at an average size of about 12½ inches fork length, the fish then transforms into a hermaphrodite wherein both sperms and eggs are present in the gonads following which it transforms completely into a female. All moi larger than 16½ inches fork length were found to be fully transformed females.

The development of commercial oyster cultural techniques for the American oyster (Crassostrea virginica) was continued during the year. Experiments conducted in Hawaiian fishponds showed that seed oysters grow best when cultured in the surface layers of water. Reared in trays, seed oysters from West Loch, Pearl Harbor, have grown to commercial size of three inches in a year's time.

The 1968 recreational clam season was relatively poor with an estimated 28,000 participants harvesting about 8,000 gallons of Manila clams (Venerupis philippinarum) from the southeastern portion of Kaneohe Bay, Oahu. The low production of legal size clams this year was probably the result of poor spawning and survival during the previous year.

Prawn Culture

The development of techniques for the mass rearing of the giant long-legged prawn (Macrobrachium rosenbergi) was continued. Establishment of a commercial prawn culture industry in the State was brought a significant step closer to reality with the successful production of 700,000 juvenile prawns during the year. This production, representing a marked increase over the 200,000 prawns produced in the previous year, demonstrates that sufficient numbers of young prawns can be propagated to supply commercial prawn farmers. Efforts are now being directed to reduce production costs from the present \$6.47 per thousand to a more reasonable cost of about \$2.00 per thousand.

The number of privately owned fishponds cooperating with the Division for the purpose of test rearing young juveniles to marketable size, increased from two to nine during the year. These ponds vary from one-fourth to six acres in size and have a combined surface area of about 10 acreas. Approximately 207,000 juvenile prawns were stocked into these ponds. Improvement in the growth rate

of pond reared prawns was obtained through the use of supplemental feed. Where previously two years were required to raise a prawn from egg to marketable size, this can now be done in a little more than one year.

Attempts to establish wild stocks of prawns were continued with the release of 128,000 prawns in various streams throughout the State.

New Fishing Vessel Construction Loan Program

The M. V. Kilauea, constructed with funds from this program was dedicated in May of this year at Kewalo Basin in Honolulu, Oahu. The modern 79-foot, steel vessel will be capable of long-lining for tuna in areas far beyond the range of our present fishing fleet.

Marine Life Conservation Districts

Marine Life Conservation Districts are established to provide complete protection to everything, both living and nonliving, and for the restoration and preservation of the flora, fauna and natural beauty of underwater features. The Hanauma Bay Marine Life Conservation District on Oahu, established last year, was the first of its kind in Hawaii. This year, the second Marine Life Conservation District was established at Kealakekua Bay, Hawaii, by regulation of the Board of Land and Natural Resources. Unlike Hanauma Bay where the primary purpose of establishment was to restore the area from a state of overexploitation, the Kealakekua Bay Marine Life Conservation District was


established to preserve the relatively undisturbed conditions of the area.

Commercial Fish Landings

Commercial landing of fish and shellfish in the State of Hawaii during the 1968-69 fiscal period totaled 11,096,116 pounds valued at \$3,378,553 to the fishermen. Compared with the previous year, the State catch showed a decrease in landings of 1,733,210 pounds or 13.5%. However, because of the generally better prices that prevailed, the total ex-vessel value of this year's catch showed an increase of \$124,931 (3.8%) over the previous year.

The lower total harvest was due largely to decreased landings of aku (Katsuwonus pelamis) which dropped by 1,453,033 pounds or 16.1%. Other important fisheries that reflected lower production were the yellowfin tuna (Neothunnus macropterus) by a decrease of 108,262 pounds or 23.3%, akule (Trachurops crumenophthalmus) by 215,826 pounds or 20.8% and striped marlin (Makaira audax) by 172,572 pounds or 35.0%. On the other hand, fisheries that reflected increased landings were as follows: bigeye tuna (Parathunnus sibi) by 95,552 pounds or 19.5% and opelu (Decapterus pinnulatus) by 53,811 pounds or 27.7%.

Oahu led the islands in landings with 9,027,407 pounds or 81.4% of the total State landings followed by Hawaii with 897,134 pounds or 8.1%, Maui with 847,269 pounds or 7.6%, Kauai with 282,830 pounds or 2.5% and Lanai and Molokai combined contributing 41,476 pounds or 0.4%.

WILDLIFE

Major efforts in the Wildlife Research and Management program were devoted to the development, maintenance and operation of public hunting areas; management of game populations to provide sportsmen with good hunting opportunities; improvement of the game resource through the introduction and establishment of desirable game species; and the preservation of beneficial and esthetically pleasing wildlife.

Public Hunting Areas

Public hunting is controlled through regulations of the Board of Land and Natural Resources on approximately 1,000,000 acres of game producing land throughout the major islands of the State. These areas include State lands under the control of the Department of Land and Natural Resources; State and Federal lands under the control of other government agencies, on which public hunting is regulated by the Board by agreements with the controlling agencies; and, private lands on which the hunting rights were secured through cooperative agreements. Within this total acreage, 18 areas consisting of some 509,000 acres have been designated game management areas because of their outstanding game producing capabilities. These areas are more intensively developed and managed. Hunting on game management areas is closely controlled, thereby making possible the collection of reliable hunting statistics.

The reported harvest of game mammals from game management areas decreased by 31% from the previous year (see Table 1). This was due primarily to the reduction from four to two months in the rifle hunting season on the Mauna Kea Game Management Area. During this season, hunters made 2,623 trips and harvested 677 feral sheep, 262 pigs, and 27 goats, for an over-all success rate of 32 percent. During the annual axis deer season on Lanai, 1,268 hunters bagged 574 deer for a success rate of 45 percent. On Molokai, 869 hunters bagged 259 deer during a seven-weekend season for a success rate of 30 percent.

Unfavorable weather conditions during spring and summer resulted in a general decline in game bird populations. Most noticeable was the decline in the harvest of lacenecked and barred doves on Oahu, followed by a reduction in the number of chukar partridge harvested on the Lanai and Mauna Kea Game Management Areas. The Statewide game bird kill data for the year is presented in Table 2, along with comparable figures for the previous year.


For the third consecutive year, a special dove hunting area on private land at Barbers Point on Oahu was opened to public hunting. Sportsmen again enjoyed excellent hunting due to the proximity of the area to a large cattle feed lot, which attracted lace-necked and barred doves in fantastic numbers. A total of 5,201 doves of both species was harvested on this small 80-acre hunting area during the 23-day season.

A cooperative agreement between the State and the Kekaha Sugar Company resulted in the addition of 22,833 acres of land to the Kekaha Game Management Area on Kauai. This addition was open to public hunting for the first time during the annual game bird hunting season. Hunter pressure in the enlarged area was three times greater than that of the previous year, with a reported harvest of more than 500 game birds.

Maintenance of service and hunter access roads and trails, game watering devices, fences, and hunter checking stations, continued to be a major activity. Replacement of deteriorating water tanks in the Puu Ka Pele Game Management Area was carried out during the year, with the erection of a pre-fabricated 1,000-gallon rubber water unit on Polihale Ridge. Two additional 500-gallon redwood water tanks were constructed for replacement of old units on Makaha and Kauhao Ridges.

A 14,000 square foot exclosure was completed on Milolii Ridge to determine the effects of feral goats on this range, and two half-acre exclosures were erected on Polihale Ridge to measure the effects of blacktail deer on this range. A storage shed was built at the Division of Forestry nursery site in Lihue to provide much needed covered work space for development and maintenance projects.

Habitat improvement work was initiated on Maui, and continued on Lanai, Molokai and Hawaii. Strips were bulldozed through thick brushland in the Kula-Kahikinui Game Management Areas on Maui. These strips were cleared with a minimum of disturbance to the soil and have created conditions conducive to vigorous growth of seed producing plants. The resultant production of game bird food and cover plants should increase the productivity of this game management area. On Lanai, more intensive site preparation on eroded areas was completed, and a greater variety of experimental food and cover plants was planted. A contract was let for the thinning and clearing of 200 acres in the Kaohe Game Management Area on Hawaii, and excellent progress was being made at the end of the fiscal year.

The operation of hunter checking stations to gather hunter participation and game kill statistics was continued. Posting of boundary, safety zone and other signs was also continued.

Wildlife Introduction and Research

Game. No new game mammals were introduced during the report period. However, populations of previously introduced animals were monitored to determine their adaptation and range extension.

The Kauai blacktail deer herd continued to increase during the year. Population studies using a habitat-grid technique revealed that an estimated 450 deer inhabit the Puu Ka Pele Game Management Area. The normal mainland cycle is being followed by the deer, although a single case of an early fawn was recorded in February. There were no known mortalities and the general health of deer observed in the field appeared excellent. Most of the deer have remained in the Puu Ka Pele area, but a few individuals have wandered as far as sixteen miles from the original release site. Food habit studies indicated that the deer are feeding on 23 species of introduced plants and four species of common native plants, none of which show signs of being excessively browsed.

The pronghorn antelope population continues to be static at a level somewhat less than 200 animals. No hunting of pronghorns was permitted during the year. It is not known what factors are inhibiting increase of this herd.

Only eight mouflon sheep were taken during the past season. This population is increasing, but dense cover definitely favors the animal over the hunter.

Game Management Area continues to inhabit the eastern portion of the mountain. They are still found in small bands, primarily in the Kahinahina and Kole areas. Lambing has been excellent and surveys indicate the possibility of an experimental season in a year or two.

The feral sheep population on Mauna Kea was monitored frequently to determine population size and distribution as influenced by the hunting season. Ground counts were made to obtain sex and age ratios, and to assess browse conditions on the range. Approximately 40 percent of the adults identified as to sex during these ground counts were rams. Lambs were primarily in the three-fourths size class and represented approximately 20 percent of the total population. Some improvement of the mamani tree line was evident in portions of the game management area. However, heavy browse damage was being inflicted on the forest below the tree line. The feral sheep have been utilizing the lower forested areas because of the reduced season and consequent lower hunter pressure.

An aerial count of the Mauna Kea Game Management Area provided a population index of 2,500 sheep by actual count. Poor coverage of Areas A and B is probably responsible for this small index. The population is estimated to be closer to 3,000 animals.

No introduction of new game birds was made during the year. The Erckel's francolin continues to increase in numbers and extend its range on Lanai. There is an insufficient population at this time to support a hunting season for this species.

At the end of June, 10 female axis deer destined for shipment to Hawaii were in captivity on Lanai and undergoing a testing program. Preliminary examination indicated that the animals were free of tuberculosis, leptospirosis, and brucellosis. The test for anaplasmosis has been administered and the waiting period of 90 days is being observed. It is planned to trap additional animals.

Non-Game. The Nene Restoration Project was continued during the year under a \$25,000 contract grant from the Bureau of Sport Fisheries and Wildlife, U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service. Another record season for the production of nene was achieved at the Pohakuloa propagation facility with the rearing of 156 goslings, an increase of 33 over the previous season. The increase is the result of a larger breeding flock, improved fertility, and improved hatching techniques. During the year 265 nene were released into the wild; 42 on Maui in Haleakala Crater; 33 at Keauhou 2 on Hawaii, and 190 at the Kahuku Nene Sanctuary, also on Hawaii.

Nene production in the wild was adversely affected by very severe winter weather. A total of fourteen nests was located on Maui, and a brood of three goslings less than one week old was observed. An unexpected 36 inches of rain in three days, plus a heavy hail storm killed these goslings and precipitated mass desertion of nests under incubation. The brood of three goslings that failed to survive represents the first definite record of reproduction in the wild on the Island of Maui.

On Hawaii, several young were reared in the Kahuku and Keauhou 2 Nene Sanctuaries. However, nest failure was very high. Counts of nene on the summer "flyway", which is located between a roosting area on the Puu Oo Ranch and feeding grounds on the slope of Mauna Loa, were very encouraging. In July of 1968 a high count of 45 birds was obtained, while in June of 1969 a total of 114 birds was observed crossing the Saddle Road on the "flyway".

On October 30, 1968, two koloa ducks, apparently remnants or offsprings of a release made in 1959 were seen in Kamuela on the island of Hawaii. To augment the initial release, 52 young koloa from the Pohakuloa Project were released in the Kohala Mountains in December. Annual releases of koloa are planned for the next few years at the Kohala release site.

On Oahu, 32 koloa were released at the Kawainui Swamp in January 1969, and several were released at the Honolulu Zoo.

A preliminary delineation of the native forest bird habitat was completed and a field survey to define the areas which are critical to the survival of the rare species was initiated. Field trips on Oahu resulted in the positive identification of the Oahu creeper (Loxops maculata maculata), a native honeycreeper whose presence had not been verified for more than 20 years. This field survey is being coordinated with work on our rare and endangered birds being performed by biologists of the U.S. Bureau of Sport Fisheries and Wildlife.

Wildlife Refuges and Sanctuaries

A wildlife biologist made one trip to the Kure Wildlife Refuge, 1,400 miles northwest of Oahu to assess the effects of U.S. Coast Guard activities on wildlife on the atoll. Censuses of the rare Hawaiian monk seal revealed a maximum of seven using Green Island, where the station is located, and 38 on the relatively isolated sand spits within the confines of the atoll. A program to minimize disturbance to these animals was formulated with the Commanding Officer of the station. Routine biological surveys were also made with particular attention to the exotic weed infestation and Polynesian rat depredation problems.

Preliminary negotiations were made with the Trustees of the Bishop Estate for the establishment of a cooperative wildlife sanctuary area at Opacula Pond at Makalawena, Kona. This is one of the most valuable areas utilized by the Hawaiian stilt and coot.

Enforcement

Fish and Game Law Enforcement activities were focused on the enforcement of fish, wildlife, and firearms laws and regulations. These activities were carried out by a staff of 24 regular fish and game wardens assisted by a corps of over 100 voluntary deputy fish and game wardens who contributed a total of 6,900 hours toward a wide range of enforcement activities.

Enforcement activities during the report period are summarized as follows: Patrolled 280, 434 miles by vehicle, 1,837 miles by boat, and 1,398 miles on foot; conducted 679 stakeouts; made 41,664 contacts with marine fishermen, 2,007 contacts with freshwater fishermen, and 9,522 contacts with hunters; made 7,026 inspections of commercial and sport fishing crafts, 3,067 inspections of fish markets, 584 inspections of fish peddlers, 114 inspections

of restaurants, 23 inspections of game farms, and 570 inspections of license agents; and investigated 140 complaints. The foregoing enforcement effort resulted in 96 arrests and 141 citations for a total of 260 violations. The citation system was implemented in the second quarter of the report period on the island of Oahu and in the fourth quarter on the neighbor islands. The system has significantly increased the effectiveness of the wardens and was a major contributing factor in increasing the number of violators apprehended and processed.

Marine patrol and surveillance activities were intensified on Oahu during the report period through the purchase and use of a 24-foot patrol craft manned by three SCUBA-trained marine wardens, who patrolled reef and offshore waters for illegal fishing and related activities. Pending evaluation of this specialized marine enforcement effort on Oahu, it might well be extended to the neighbor islands.

In addition to their enforcement functions, the wardens contributed 1,117 manhours toward the fish and wildlife management activities through manning of hunter checking stations, stocking of fish and wildlife species, collection of biological data, censusing of fish catches and wildlife populations, etc.; issued 5,181 fishing, hunting, and related licenses and permits; presented 33 informational and educational talks at schools and meetings of sportsmen clubs and civic organizations; and distributed and posted news releases, informational materials and notices.


During the year, 1 full-time warden was added to the enforcement staff and assigned to the island of Molokai.

SECTION 4

Division of Forestry

TOM K. TAGAWA, State Forester

The Division of Forestry, under the general direction of the Chairman of the Department, manages most Stateowned wildlands within the Conservation Districts. It also promotes forestry and protects forests from fire, insects, and diseases on privately-owned lands, both within and outside the Conservation Districts.

The overall program receives substantial support from the U.S. Forest Service in the form of grants for seedling propagation, tree planting, technical assistance to private forest landowners, and protection from fire. The Division also maintains close cooperative working relations with the Institute of Pacific Islands Forestry, Pacific Southwest Forest and Range Experiment Station, a research unit of the United States Forest Service.

Major objectives of the Division are to improve both the economic climate and the physical environment for people by means of three major programs:

Forest Development—To promote: growth and utilization of forest products; conditions of soil and vegetation conducive to the conservation of water; favorable habitats for wildlife and growth of forage for livestock; establishing windbreaks; and, access and suitable surroundings for forest recreation.

- 2. Forest Protection—To prevent or reduce effects of agents which injure the soil, vegetation, and other resources of forests and related wildlands.
- Forest Research—To inventory forest resources and to provide technical support to forest managers and wood using industries.

FOREST PRODUCTS

This directly affects Hawaii's economic welfare. The Division of Forestry planted 1,499 acres with valuable trees during the fiscal year. Thirty years from now, when the forests on these acres are ready to harvest, they should yield around 45 million board feet of wood. During the time that these forests were being planted, almost 500 acres of other young planted forests were weeded, pruned, or thinned in order to improve their growth and quality.

The nurseries of the Division of Forestry produced 890,000 seedlings of which about 260 thousand were supplied for planting on private lands. Altogether, about 170 landowners and organizations received nursery stock. Around 40 thousand seedlings were used to create windbreaks. Christmas tree planting is now an active operation among small landowners. They purchased about 125

thousand Norfolk Island pines, most of which were planted for this purpose. The remainder of the trees were planted primarily for growth of wood products.

The Service Forester, assisted by the District Foresters and members of the Institute of Pacific Islands Forestry, helped to promote better forestry practices on private lands by preparing simple forest management plans, advising on the marking of timber for sale, estimating volumes of timber and supplying information on timber values. During the year, the group responded to 246 requests for assistance or counsel. Multiple-use aspects of forestry were involved in numerous cases, including:

Assistance was supplied to processors of forest products by locating timber supplies, measuring logs, and advising on harvesting and processing techniques. Information was provided the public through tours, demonstrations, and talks in meetings and at schools.

The harvest of timber from State lands fell considerably below that of the previous year as a result of cessation of operations by the Dawson Corporation on the island of Hawaii. Nevertheless, the volume of sawtimber harvested amounted to 1.3 million board feet and was valued at over \$14,000. Since each dollar of stumpage generates about

\$25 of consumer goods, the value to the economy of the State in terms of business activity was over \$350,000. This does not include the value of products harvested from private forests.

Near the end of the fiscal year, the Division was besieged by urgent requests concerning the availability of timber. Present staffing is not sufficient to fully service the numerous and complex questions which are being addressed to us. We particularly need more detailed forest inventory information. We also need more information on accessibility, rights-of-way, road construction needs, and costs of roads. Filling of three vacant professional positions has been approved. During next fiscal year, if we are successful in recruiting, considerable progress can be made on timber inventory and transportation problems.

Sales of hapuu fern on the island of Hawaii earned almost \$4,500. Hapuu is a rather small but steady source of income. On the other islands, sale of ti leaves, bamboo, and other minor products is a small but important service to the public.



Hapuu, Hawaiian tree ferns, harvested from State lands are a small but dependable source of employment in the vicinity of Hilo.

WATER CONSERVATION

Within the areas which were reforested, about one-third, 500 acres, will have a special beneficial effect on conservation of water. Perhaps of greater importance in the long run, the Division is participating with the U.S. Forest Service and the U.S. Soil Conservation Service in watershed programs within the State. The U.S. Forest Service has

assigned a forester to help on forestry aspects. His assignment to evaluate river basin problems on the island of Hawaii is now in progress. The federally sponsored watershed protection and flood prevention programs should provide excellent opportunities for intiating forestry measures designed to protect and improve soil and water relationships when the programs are put into effect.

In a management plan which was drafted for the Kahikinui Forest Reserve on Maui, a proposal was advanced to improve access to allow hunters to harvest more of the feral goats. This would reduce excessive destruction of vegetation and thus improve watershed conditions. A secondary benefit, of course, would be the increased hunting for sport. This is a good example of multiple use. The major requirement to accomplish these benefits is access roads and trails. These will be put into our request for capital improvements.


The State's wildlands are generally in better condition to conserve water than lands now in pastures, cultivation, and urban uses, although there are many localities in need of management action. However, major action programs must wait until information is produced by research and field surveys to indicate proper corrective measures and where they are needed.

WILDLIFE HABITAT

On Maui, the site preparation for tree planting at Polipoli greatly improved the habitat for pheasants. The effect begins immediately and will continue for from 5 to 10 years. Thereafter, the effect will decrease. However, the forest growth will offer recreational and aesthetic values. Improvement of habitat for wildlife is closely coordinated with the activities of the Division of Fish and Game.

FOREST RECREATION

Forest recreation is fast becoming a major outdoor activity for local residents and tourists. The Forestry

Division, in cooperation with the Division of Parks, is building access roads, hiking trails, rail shelters, lookout points, directional signs, and other facilities in order to meet the need. On Oahu and Molokai, trail maps are supplied to hikers. On Kauai, pamphlets are issued which describe trails and what may be seen from them. Opportunities for wildland recreation are offered in many different environments—from the wet rain forest swamp of Alakai on Kauai to the dry brushlands of Maui. Two of the more notable projects are the improvement of the access road to Polipoli Springs on Maui for those who enjoy coolness of the high elevation, and the trail system on the north shores of Kauai that offers solitude and grandeur of view.

During the fiscal year, over 9 miles of road, almost 4 miles of trails, and several shelters were constructed. Some 282 miles of roads and 83 miles of trails were maintained. Other recreation facilities required a total of 185 mandays of maintenance.

FOREST PROTECTION

Fire Prevention and Control

During the fiscal year, the Division responded to twenty fires that burned a total of 4,343 acres. Our goal is to limit the annual burn to not more than 1,929 acres (1/10 of 1 per cent of the area under protection). This is less than half of the actual burn. The single largest fire burned 1,650 acres of brushlands on the Big Island in the Waimea District. The fire started from the Waimea rubbish dump. Some of the major causes of wildfires during the year were escapes from debris burning, children playing with matches, and careless smokers dropping unextinguished tobacco or matches. Losses were estimated at \$31,000 including a \$9,000 cabin which was destroyed. Fortunately, most fires burned in grass and brush areas that had relatively low values.

Helicopters have proved to be useful in fighting forest fires. These versatile aircrafts are utilized to transport men and supplies and also to drop water with chemical retardants on fires. Lately, helicopters have been equipped with containers which can carry 50 to 75 gallons of water and discharge it directly on fires. Arrangements have been made to rent helicopters from private owners and also to obtain their use without charge from the Armed Services.

Rocognizing the growing need to protect our forest resources, the Legislature and the Governor appropriated and authorized additional funds to purchase fire fighting equipment. This additional equipment has expanded the Division's capabilities in coping with forest fires. A major advance has been the installation of 2-way radios in several vehicles—thus, work crews away from headquarters can be dispatched quickly and joint efforts can be more easily coordinated.

During periods when fire conditions were particularly dangerous in certain areas, the Division took preventive action. Burning of debris was stopped in some cases and in others, signs to warn of fire danger were posted. In one instance, an area was temporarily closed to entry. Motion pictures and talks to inform the public about the harmful effects of wildfires were presented in schools and to various civic groups.

Noxious Weed Control


Some of Hawaii's forest land is infested with plants classed as noxious by the Department of Agriculture. Fayabush occupies about 40,000 acres on the Big Island and is found on all islands except Molokai; blackberry, 43,000 acres, mostly on Hawaii and Kauai; clidemia, 700 acres on Oahu and rapidly spreading; and gorse, 13,000 acres on Hawaii and Maui. Other serious plant pests in forests are banana poka and black wattle.

In controlling noxious plants, guidance is provided by the Department of Agriculture. On Maui, we are trying to stop the spread of one concentration of black wattle by surrounding it with a living barrier of pine trees. In connection with this, black wattle was eradicated on 670 acres. On Kauai, a great deal of work has been done to keep trails open and free from blackberries and lantana. On Hawaii, control of fayabush was tested experimentally on 50 acres.

Insects and Disease

Last fiscal year, we reported that an outbreak of black twig borer on toona in our Waiakea reforestation area was controlled by aerial spraying with an insecticide under the direction of the Hawaii Department of Agriculture. This year, a follow-up check was made by an entomologist from the same department. He found the population of insects to be at a low level and respraying is not necessary at this time.

On Maui, a wood borer was discovered which makes galleries into the wood of the main stems of koa and saligna. The infestation covered about two acres. It has not yet been determined whether the pest is very dangerous or if control is possible.

The Division does not have the capability at this time to handle adequately detection and control of pests. The U.S. Forest Service is expected to aid us however, through a new cooperative agreement for insect and disease control with the Federal Government executed on November 15, 1968.

Investigation and control of forest tree nursery root rot diseases are being conducted in cooperation with U.S. Forest Service and University of Hawaii Agriculture Experiment Station.

Erosion Control

Torrential rains are common in Hawaii. Even in areas of moderate rainfall, surface runoff is large where the land is sloping or impervious to infiltration. While the loss of water is serious, the erosion that accompanies it is even more critical from the standpoint of soil fertility, siltation, and pollution of estuarine and coastal waters.

Erosion control is needed on over 60,000 acres of wildland, but most of these lands are in the non-commercial forest land at higher elevations and leeward sides of the islands. About 500 acres of the State's tree planting during the past year will help to prevent erosion—a small amount when compared with the need, but still a gain.

Preservation of Natural Areas

Part of the job of forest protection is to preserve, as far as possible, examples of the natural flora and associated native fauna. Today, they are valued chiefly for aesthetic purposes. Some day, these may have great value for scientific and educational purposes.

At present, the State has only one officially established area to protect native flora and fauna—the 10,000-acre Alakai Swamp on Kauai. During the current year, in a draft of a management plan for Mokuleia Forest Reserve on Oahu, consideration was given to setting aside a 1,000-acre tract for permanent closure to development. Other tracts are being considered on other islands. Such proposals are only a first step. Formal proposals must be prepared before definite commitments can be made.

On Kauai, the Division of Forestry has planted and labeled interesting and rare native plants along hiking trails and other accessible places.

Research


The Division cooperatively maintains a program of forestry research to obtain resource inventory information and to develop and refine technical knowledge. This research is conducted by the Institute of Pacific Islands Forestry, a unit of the Pacific Southwest Forest and Range Experiment Station, Forest Service, U.S. Department of Agriculture.

During the year, 6 research reports were published.

These are listed in the Appendix.

Detailed information about planted forests on each of the major islands is now available. This was an important study which required several years to accomplish. Here is a summary of the areas of planted forests and sawtimber volumes:

In making the forest plantation inventory of each of the major islands, Timber Survey Forester Wes Wong collected data on volume and quality of each forest plantation. Typical of the plantations is this stand of Robusta eucalyptus on the island of Oahu.

Last year, we reported that research on soils from Oahu watersheds revealed significant differences in characteristics which are related to soil erodibility. Further research has shown that when these soils were subjected to a simulated rainstorm, rates of soil loss were correlated with the measurable soil characteristics. More surface flow and erosion occurred from soils composed of smaller particles. Climate, vegetation, and land use strongly affect erodibility by modifying soil properties. We are continuing to study effects of land use on soil hydrologic properties.

We are testing the use of Tordon to kill stands of the noxious plant, fayabush and then underplanting with desired tree species. Fayabush was killed completely by injecting Tordon 22K into their stems. After two years, underplanted seedlings of Queensland-maple, tropical ash and Australian toon are growing satisfactorily. Saligna eucalyptus and blackwood acacia (Acacia melanoxylon)

died or grew poorly.

A fire in June, 1967 in the watershed above Hanalei, on the island of Kauai, attracted headline attention. Immediately, farmers and officials became concerned. Would flooding, erosion, and siltation follow as a consequence of the fire? Not enough facts were available to supply reliable answers. So, we initiated studies in this and other burned areas. Transects and vegetation plots were established to record surface conditions, recovering vegetation, and erosion. In September, 4 months after the fire, 86 per cent of the transect length measured had less than 50 per cent vegetation cover. By April, 1968, after 10 months, 94 per cent of the transect length had revegetated to a density of more than 50 per cent vegetation density. No evidence of widespread erosion was found. We will continue measurements in this watershed to determine any long-term effects of the fire.

Hawaii provides an excellent breeding ground for wood-destroying insects and fungi. But some woods are naturally more resistant to decay and insect attack than others. After four years of study of 6 imported and 8 Hawaii-grown kinds of wood, saligna eucalyptus and robusta eucalyptus show relatively good durability. They rank below redwood but better than Douglas-fir, Philippine mahogany, or western redcedar. Koa and tropical ash were the least durable of the Hawaii-grown woods, ranking down with white oak. These tests are continuing.


Although research is the primary job of scientists at the Institute of Pacific Islands Forestry, their expertise is used in other forestry programs in the islands. These include the important activities of assisting forest owners and timber processors and those concerned with forestry aspects of flood control projects. During the year, a specialist in small watersheds and river basin surveys was brought in by the Forest Service to help evaluate forestry aspects of programs in this field. Under a federal law (P.L. 566), the Soil Conservation Service and Forest Service from the U.S. Department of Agrilculture plan and help to perform important protective and development work to control erosion and prevent floods.

SECTION 5

Division of Land Management

Prudent management of the State's public lands is the essential function of the Division of Land Management. Operating under the broad administrative and policy guidance of the Chairman and the Board of Land and Natural Resources, the division is responsible for the acquisition, management and regulation, and disposition of the public lands of Hawaii. The division is an office of record and is responsible for the maintenance and protection of certain public records, such as land patents, leases and other documents issuing from this office.

The principal activity of the division centers around the management of lands under the control of the department and their disposition by sale, lease and permit. However, acquisition of lands for use by the various governmental agencies has become an increasingly important function of the division.

In the matter of disposition, the State land laws provide generally that State lands are to be leased only, and that all dispositions are to be made at public auction. Permitted exceptions to these basic limitations include sales of residential houselots in fee; sales or leases of agricultural lands by drawing of lots, and sales in fee of industrial, commercial or resort properties, subject to legislative disapproval at the next regular or special session of the State Legislature after the dispositions have been made. Sales and leases of State lands may also be made by negotiation which is, in effect, sale by sealed tender following public advertising.

The department may sell, lease, grant permits, licenses or easements without public auction to the Federal Government, governmental agencies or political subdivisions, and to public utilities. In the case of public utilities, all such dispositions are subject to subsequent legislative disapproval, and all such agreements must contain a repurchase provision in case of abandonment or non-use for the proposed utility purpose.

NEW LEGISLATION

No legislation materially affecting the provisions of the land laws was passed by the 1969 Legislature. Of great significance to the department, however, were five concurrent resolutions passed authorizing the department to

proceed with five development projects under the so-called Private Developers Act (Act 68 of the 1968 Legislature). This act provides that the State may contract with a private developer to develop State lands with private capital.

The development projects authorized are:

- 1. Kuliouou, Oahu: An area of 35 acres which will be developed into 120 houselots and a 10-acre school lot.
- 2. Waimanalo, Oahu: A 33-acre parcel which will be developed into 180 houselots.
- 3. Kekaha, Kauai: A total of 35 acres is planned for a 105-lot residential subdivision.
- 4. Kealakehe, Hawaii: This will be an incremental development beginning with a marina and commercial hotel sites. A yacht club will be part of the development. Other hotel sites, vacation cottages and a 100-lot residential subdivision will comprise the total development for the first three phases which is the extent of present planning. There will also, of course, be an 18-hole golf course. There will be plenty of land left for any amount of development which may later prove feasible.
- Magic Island, Kewalo Peninsula, Oahu: This development, to be initiated by filling off-shore areas, will consist of a commercial hotel complex surrounded by a large park.

The present order of priority accepted for these developments is Kekaha, Kuliouou, Waimanalo, Magic Island and Kealakehe. The first unit is planned for development early in 1970. The department is presently drawing up the procedures, and standards and criteria to be applied to the projects.

PROGRAMS

The activities of the Division of Land Management are organized generally into four major programs: Land Acquisition; Land Disposition; Land Development; and, Land Management Services.

Land Acquisition

This program includes negotiating for and acquiring non-State lands required by governmental agencies, and making such lands available to the agencies for which they were acquired. Acquisitions are for such public purposes as sites for schools, public buildings, parks etc; rights of way, except for federal aid highways; air rights and lands for expansion of airports; development of Legislature-approved projects; to straighten boundaries for more economical use of State lands; for access to land-locked State lands, and to clear title to State lands, as in the case of multiple claimants with the State to certain kuleanas.

During the past fiscal year the program has completed 36 acquisitions covering 278 acres at a cost of \$11,689,298.00. In the same period 16 new acquisitions have been initiated covering 45 acres at a cost of approximately \$178,360.00. There are 106 acquisitions in progress covering 5,686 acres with an estimated value of \$10,812,699.00.

Among the lands acquired in the past fiscal year are 13 school sites for the Department of Education; 3 parcels for the Waimea-Lalamilo Irrigation System; 2 parcels for the Moiliili-McCully Branch Library; 4 acquisitions for the Community College; 4 parcels for the Honolulu Civic Center; one reservoir site for the Molokai Irrigation System; one addition to the Manoa Campus of the University of Hawaii and several miscellaneous sites.

Land Disposition

This program consists of processing requests for and making dispositions of State lands by sale in fee, lease, license, revocable permit, easement, concession and executive order. Executive Orders, of course, are issued by the Governor with the approval and recommendation of the Board. Dispositions may be for residential, agricultural, commercial, industrial, resort, recreational and public uses.

During the past fiscal year the disposition program has accounted for 64 sales in fee covering 16 acres for total sales price of \$716,636.00. In the same period 46 units were leased for an annual rental of \$727,938.00 on an area of 39,162 acres. Revocable permits issued totaled 148 covering an area of 1,933 acres for an annual rental of \$340,848.00. With the approval and recommendation of the Board, the Governor issued 74 executive orders covering 2,543 acres. Of these, 42 were setting lands aside to interested government agencies with a total area of 871 acres; 32 orders covering 1,573 acres were cancellations of existing executive orders, or withdrawing portions of set-aside lands.

Land Development

This program involves selection of public lands suitable for development; preparation of plans and engineering




Anuenue (Rainbow Island) - new container facility under construction.

studies; contracting for development through the Division of Water and Land Development; and turning the developed lands over to the Disposition Program for disposition.

No new projects were initiated during the past fiscal year, as none had been authorized by the Legislature. However, work proceeded on several projects previously authorized, but which had not been completed. In the

Waimanalo Core Development, the new sewage treatment plant was completed. A maintenance ramp into Kahawai Stream was built as a prerequisite for the City and County of Honolulu's acceptance of Kahawai Stream for maintenance purposes. Banyan Drive in Hilo was realigned better to serve the new resort hotel developments on Waiakea Peninsula. It was turned over to the County of Hawaii in a



Diamond Head View Lots- luxury homes on the slopes of Diamond Head.


dedication ceremony held recently. A water pipeline was installed to serve the Kekaha, Kauai, houselots subdivision, and a pump and pipeline was added to the Hanapepe, Kauai, water system. Units II and III of the Shafter Flats Industrial Subdivision are under construction and five more industrial lots will be leased at public auction late this year. Planning has started for the fifth increment of the Wahikuli, Maui, houselots, and planning is ongoing for another increment of the University Heights houselots in Hilo, Hawaii.

A number of projects are expected to be undertaken in the coming year, most of them under the Private Developers Act which was discussed under Legislation.

Land Management Services

This program is essentially a support program and consists of regulation and enforcement of Land laws and regulations, preparation of reports to the Governor and the Legislature, appraisal, title searching and translations from the Hawaiian, planning and research, public information and service, and document services (indexing, filing, review and recordation, and custodianship as an office of record). It is closely linked with administration of the division in that it makes recommendations for policy determinations, organization and the like.

The objective of the program is to support other programs of the division, to maintain records of the activities of the division, to prepare reports, to produce plans and recommendations, and to provide service and information on land matters to the general public and to public and private agencies.




Shafter Flats Industrial Subdivision under construction.

During the fiscal year just ended the program produced 70 appraisals and 475 reviews and recommendations for rentals for revocable permit. Also, 13 independent appraisals were reviewed. The Title Searcher prepared 9 certificates of title, 30 memoranda of title, 14 abstracts of title, 5 pending memorandum titles and 2 Land Court Citations.

Division of State Parks, Outdoor Recreation & Historic Sites

The new designation, Division of State Parks, Outdoor Recreation and Historic Sites, results from a reorganization of the former Division of State Parks to more accurately reflect a gradual broadening of its recreation and preservation functions. The three operations branches, bolstered by a large staff and supportive service also reflect a spread in emphasis from operations and maintenance, to developing and enhancing opportunities to meet the overwhelming increase in usage. A 50% increase in staff is proposed as part of the reorganization plan.

The goal of the Division remains the same; to help ensure the enrichment of the individual during his increasing hours of leisure time. Opportunities for enrichment include understanding, respect and appreciation of man's relationship to his natural environment, to his fellow men and to other cultures. Although Hawaii's recreation potentials are vast, and well illustrated in our rich Hawaiian history and natural beauty — they are limited. The

acceleration of urban and tourist development requires an equally accelerated drive to see that prime open spaces are acquired by the State, preserved and developed.

Toward these statewide goals, the Division, in coordination with other government and private agencies, provides the optimum variety and number of quality outdoor recreation, natural and historic opportunities. These opportunities are met by building and operating facilities and by conducting cultural enrichment and outdoor recreational programs. This not only helps provide a pleasant place to live but also helps provide tourist attractions for this vital segment of the state's economy.

LEGISLATION

Several actions of the 1969 State Legislature significantly increase the capability of the Department to provide better opportunity to the public for outdoor recreation and cultural enrichment.

Act 182 requires planning and land use and management controls for the preservation of open space. By its definition of open space, the law enables the protection and preservation of potential outdoor recreational and historic land.

Act 186 limits the liability of any property owners making private lands available to the public for recreation and site visitation purposes. This is expected to stimulate grants of such public privileges on private lands, making more opportunities available to meet growing needs.


Act 216 clarifies the function and responsibilities of the Department for the control and protection of archaeological and historic values on State lands. Funds are provided for this purpose to a maximum of one percent of appropriations for public improvements. Controls are also extended to designated privately owned prehistoric and historic sites and to the reproduction of prehistoric or historic objects. This law should enable more effective discovery, evaluation, and preservation of archaeologic and historic resources, which can then be interpreted for public enjoyment and cultural enrichment.

Act 236 establishes a semi-private Hawaii Foundation for History and the Humanities. Structured to conduct a historic preservation program cooperatively with the Department, it may receive gifts of funds, properties or materials from donors who prefer not to or cannot donate directly to the State. The Foundation may thus contribute

greatly to the State's cultural enrichment.

ACQUISITION AND PLANNING

A scheduled payment of \$1,000,000 was made during the year for Kahana Valley on windward Oahu, the principal state park acquisition in progress. The final appropriation of \$1,000,000, to complete the \$5,000,000 purchase, was received from the 1969 Legislative session. Planning is in progress to determine the best park, botanical garden and compatible uses to be made of this beautiful natural valley. Other acquisitions in progress include such major acquisitions as the incomparable Ke'e Beach vicinity of Haena, Kauai; and inholdings in Kalalau Valley, in the Na Pali wilderness.

State lands are also being studied for appropriate designation as state parks, resulting in 688 acres of State land being added to Wailua River State Park, Kauai. Three hundred and seventy-seven acres of State land are in the process of being transferred to Keaiwa Heiau State Recreation Area, Oahu. The objective is to manage prime recreational lands for their most appropriate use.

Acquisitions of historic sites are continuing with appraisals completed for the Russian fort (Fort Elizabeth) situated at the mouth of the Waimea River, Kauai; Iliiliopae Heiau and the Smith-Bronte Landing Site on Molokai.

Master planning by consultants is in progress or has been completed for several state parks and park proposals. Work has been completed on the South Kona historic and recreation area, Hawaii; including state park and historic site proposals for Kaawaloa and Kealakekua Bay, Mokuohai Battlefield, and Honaunau Bay areas. Work is essentially complete on a master plan for Wailua River State Park and vicinity, Kauai; and, for Wailoa River State Park, Hilo. Work is well started on Iolani Barracks and Palace, Oahu. Historic research has been completed for a master plan to be prepared for the Iao Valley region, Maui. Scheduled to start shortly are planning projects for Hapuna Beach State Park, Hawaii.

DEVELOPMENT

Expenditures of nearly \$1,000,000 were made during the year for construction projects. This included development funds for two new parks; Kalopa State Park, Hawaii and a new cooperative State Parks-Job Corps project, Waahila Ridge atop St. Louis Heights, Oahu.

The six-acre Wahikuli Wayside north of Lahaina, Maui is now officially open to the public. Lahaina Junior Chamber of Commerce volunteers are playing a major part in the landscape planting of this favorite swimming beach. Expansion projects recently completed include campground facilities at Keaiwa State Park, Oahu, and a water supply system for the Kokee-Na Pali State Park Complex, Kauai.

Facilities are being expanded or improved at six of the neighbor island state parks; adding cabin, camping, picnicking, access, management and other facilities. The work is being done by contract except for a cooperative project with the Hawaii Job Corps Center at Kokee, Kauai, where a new lookout will afford a view of Kauai's superb Na Pali and Alakai Swamp as well as a different view of Kalalau Valley.

Construction projects to be let for bids shortly include a sewer system at Wailua Marina, Kauai; a water system for Hapuna Beach State Park, Hawaii; road construction and improvement at Waianapanapa, Maui; improvement of the Rainbow Falls Lookout, Hawaii; and expansion of Palaau State Park, Molokai.

HISTORIC & ARCHAEOLOGIC RESEARCH & DEVELOPMENT

During the past year, the Division was deeply involved in implementing the National Landmark and historic preservation programs. The National Historic Preservation Act of 1966 expanded the National Register to include places of State and local significance and also provided certain safeguards, as well as a Federal grant-in-aid program. A complementary National Natural Landmark Registry was previously established in 1964. Twenty-two National Historic Landmarks in Hawaii have been designated as being worthy of registration, and Diamond Head has become a National Natural Landmark. Of the selected sites the following five National Historic Landmarks were dedicated during the past year.

Kamakahonu, Residence of King Kamehameha I – Kailua, Kona Hawaii Honokohau Settlement — Honokohau Bay, Hawaii Puu O Mahuka Heiau — Waimea Bay, Oahu Wailua Complex of Heiaus — Wailua, Kauai Cook Landing Site — Waimea, Kauai

The Division is coordinating restoration of the Iolani Palace Complex which is now underway. A research publication on the complex was compiled under the aegis of the Honolulu Junior League, while The Friends of Iolani Palace contributed \$10,000 to hire personnel for the project. University students, working under the direction of the State Archaeologist, have completed an archaeological investigation of part of the Hale Akala or "Royal Bungalow" within the walls of Iolani Barracks.

Other activities included an interpretive publication of the significance of Diamond Head. This was carried out with the generous assistance of the Department of Education and copies distributed to all schools. The publication of the State Archaeological Journal was initiated, including a reference booklet, The Archaeology of the State of Hawaii, Uniform Rules and Regulations. A report has also been published on the essentially completed findings of archaeological reconnaissance of the new Kailua-Kawaihae Highway and Keahole Airport, Hawaii. This project was conducted for the Department of Transportation.

The Division, jointly with the University of Hawaii and the Bishop Museum, initiated formation of the Coordinating Committee for Hawaiian Archaeology. The committee's initial cooperative project, coordinating plans and resources, resulted in the largest archaeological site investigation ever carried out in the state. The ancient fishing village and inland agricultural settlements of Lapakahi, North Kohala were investigated by a team of students from the University of Hawaii and National Science Foundation grantees from several nations. The project was photographed and copies of the film will be distributed internationally for educational television.

The Division intends to reconstruct and interpret the site complex as a State Monument following an additional summer of archaeological field work.

MANAGEMENT

Accelerated planning and development of new parks and park facilities, restoration and preservation of historic and cultural sites and buildings, and the burgeoning public participation and visitation in these areas has greatly increased the complexity and workload of managing and maintaining these public facilities.

Park usage estimates for the fiscal year just ended indicate phenomenally active growth, increasing nearly 29% from last year's record 4,766,000 to 6,142,000 recreation visits. This gain seems attributable in part to four basic factors which affect recreation demands: population, leisure time, mobility and disposable income. In Hawaii these factors are compounded by our tourist industry.

In the past, management of state parks and other facilities was concentrated primarily in maintenance and protection of the resource. There is increased need, and public demand for interpretation of the resources within the parks and other sites, as well as for better guidance and protection of the visitor.

MAINTENANCE STANDARDS


The head and staff of the Resources Management Branch have developed, and are using maintenance performance standards for planning and control of all maintenance tasks within the systems. This includes normal upkeep in daily operations, as well as preventive maintenance of facilities and utilities systems, and care of grounds, turf, and landscaping. All levels of maintenance personnel utilize these established standards in planning their work schedules, and in reporting task accomplishments at all units of the parks system. Utilization of these standards throughout the entire system has led to a high degree of uniformity of maintenance, and to substantial improvements in overall efficiency.

PERSONNEL

In response to the greater workloads, and consequent levels of responsibility in the field, all supervisory personnel

previously classed as District Park Foreman, have been up-graded to Parks Superintendent level. Direct responsibility for planning and management of the operations and maintenance of the districts has been placed in their hands. Initial analysis of this change in management responsibility indicates that there is a substantial improvement in parks operations.

A permanent operations and maintenance staff of forty-five persons supports this overall program. This regular staff is at times supplemented by fourteen maintenance crewmen employed on the Island of Oahu under the federally funded Nelson Amendment Program (Operation Mainstream). This is primarily a training program for the chronically unemployed, the enrollees are receiving useful work training experience in areas of grounds maintenance, protection, and improvement and beautification of park areas. Considerable benefits are realized, to the State in the form of skills and services, and to the participants in the form of developed employable skills.

The Division also employed approximately seventy student helpers during the summer school vacations, on the Islands of Hawaii and Kauai to assist in park maintenance, trail clearing, eradication of noxious weeds, and on other operational tasks.

The changing patterns of responsibility for management and protection of the parks, protection of both the resources and the visitors, have led to serious proposals that Park Lifeguards and Park Rangers be added to the operational staff of the Division.

MANAGEMENT FUNCTIONS

New and unusual problems were created during the past year by assumption of added responsibilities in the Management Program. Of particular interest are:

Marina Operations—A marina was recently opened at the Wailua River State Park on Kauai, with seven piers providing space for pleasure craft and for excursion boats on the river. This is the first operation of its kind within the system, and new functions include supervision and the collection of state revenues from tour boat operations, a restaurant, and from several small concessions.

Mountain Skiing—The undeveloped high slopes of Mauna Kea, Hawaii, came alive during the winter months, from November, 1968 to April, 1969. More than 400 skiers, beginners as well as advanced, enjoyed the only ski slopes in the State. Experts found that the slopes of Mauna Kea were equal to or better than those of some of the more well-known resorts on the U.S. Mainland. The Division was responsible for control of skiing, and for safety of the participants during the period, and particularly for a ski meet held during the long Veterans' Day weekend.

Iolani Palace—Responsibility for management, operations, and maintenance of Iolani Palace, the only royal palace in the United States, was transferred to the Division during FY 1968-69. The Palace, until the transfer, had been occupied by the offices of the Governor and Lieutenant Governor, and by chambers and offices of the State Legislature. Restoration of the

Palace has started and it is proposed to maintain it as a major historic museum of the later monarchy period. The Palace, together with the Governor's official residence, Washington Place, has a very high priority within the maintenance programs of the Division.



Division of Water and Land Development

The Department of Land and Natural Resources is the State water agency and administers the State's water program through the Division of Water and Land Development. The Division provides professional civil engineering support services to all divisions of the Department of Land and Natural Resources. The Division also has responsibility for administration of the Department's programs for water, flood prevention and control; and provides administrative support to the political subdivisions of the Soil and Water Conservation Districts.

WATER

The Division coordinates statewide water resources planning, research, development and management activities; carries out comprehensive statewide water resources planning; maintains basic water resources data; conducts hydrologic investigations and studies; regulates and enforces ground water statutes; and provides general water resources

information service. Hawaii's growth over the past year places an increasing demand on Hawaii's water planning, research, development and management. Federal, state, county and private organizations have shown great concern for and are developing programs to meet specific needs.

Planning and Research

During the past year major emphasis was placed on the statewide comprehensive water resources planning program. The State Legislature appropriated \$100,000 for this purpose and Federal matching grants were received from the Water Resources Council under Title III of the Water Resources Planning Act of 1965, the U.S. Geological Survey, Corps of Engineers, Office of Water Resources Research, and the Soil Conservation Service for specific phases of this program. Planning efforts are being accomplished on an island-by-island basis. The Island of Hawaii is currently being evaluated and an island-wide inventory of

all water and related land resources data was completed and is presently being printed. Formulation of guidelines for future planning, research, development and management of the islands's total water resources is well underway. The Island of Maui will be the next island to be evaluated and reconnaissance studies have been initiated.

Considerable emphasis is placed on evaluating the present data collection networks and on designing new networks. With the assistance of the University of Hawaii Water Resources Research Center, a program of relocating and establishing new stations based on the future needs of the federal, state, county and private agencies in Hawaii was implemented. The major elements include data on precipitation, streamflow, ground-water occurrence and availability, water use, and flood data.

A cooperative agreement with the U.S. Geological Survey continues the Division's data collection on comprehensive stream gaging, ground water monitoring, and areal hydrologic investigations. During the year the Survey operated and maintained about 300 stream gaging stations and is in the process of publishing daily streamflow records in a report entitled, "Water Resources Data for Hawaii and Other Pacific Areas—1968." Reconnaissance water resources investigations which generally state the water

situation in an area and point out water problems which require a program of data collection and hydrologic investigations were completed for the Lahaina District of the Island of Maui. The results of the reconnaissance investigation will be used in evaluating data collection networks and in preparing the comprehensive water resources plan for the islands. Areal hydrologic investigations for the island of Oahu, which are detailed studies of hydrological conditions, were completed in North-Central Oahu, and are continuing in the Waianae area. The final report for windward Oahu was printed and distributed and the reports for Kahuku and North-Central Oahu are being published by the federal Government Printing Office.

The Division, in cooperation with the U.S. Weather Bureau and the Hawaii Sugar Planters Association, is continuing to maintain records from approximately 1,000 gaging stations throughout the State. Periodic field inspections are carried out to assure the reliability of rainfall records under this cooperation venture.

Statewide exploratory well drilling is designed and programmed to provide subterranean, hydrological and geological information in selected areas. A well was drilled at Kalaoa, near the proposed Keahole airport at the 680-foot elevation; test results indicated that the water was brackish. Another well was drilled at Pohakuloa in an attempt to locate high-level ground water, but no water was encountered.

Enforcement

Five hundred existing wells were inspected and tested under the Division's enforcement activity to determine compliance with existing statutes governing artesian wells in Hawaii. Twenty-two wells were found in violation and were corrected through such action as sealing, controlling or repairing the wells.

The Division is represented on the Advisory Board of the Water Resources Research Center at the University of Hawaii and on the Air and Water Pollution Control Advisory Committee of the Department of Health.

Development

Under the water program, the Division has kept abreast of the growing water needs in the Kona area through the expansion of the Kona water system. A contract to drill a well and to install a deep-well pump in Kahaluu has been awarded and it is expected that this well will be in operation in the latter part of 1969. In North Kona, the pipeline to the new Kealakehe School was completed in time for the opening of the new school. In South Kona, construction has commenced for the continuation of the 8-inch pipeline from Keokea Junction to Hookena School. Also under construction are the 8-inch pipeline along Kuakini Highway to Palani Road and the 16-inch pipeline from Palani Road to Honokohau. The contract for the continuation of this pipeline to the proposed Keahole Airport will soon be awarded.

Construction of the Molokai Water Project which is being financed in part by a federal loan of \$4.5 million from the U.S. Bureau of Reclamation is continuing. The 1,400-million-gallon Kualapuu Reservoir is not under construction and scheduled for completion in late 1969. Most of the massive grading work has been completed and the contractor is now ready to install a butyl-rubber lining over the entire reservoir surface. When completed, the Kualapuu Reservoir will be the largest butyl-rubber lined reservoir in the world.

A water resources feasibility study for the development of water from the Waikolu and Pelekunu Valleys on the Island of Molokai has been completed. The plan proposes the development of a water transferring collection system to convey the water from Pelekunu and Waikolu Valleys to the areas of Central and Western Molokai in four stages over

a period of 26 years. Work is continuing in the development of the Kohala Mountain water sources. By the end of 1969, the 50million-gallon Waikoloa Reservoir will be completed and will increase the domestic water supply to two million gallons per day. Plans and specifications have been completed for the construction of the water treatment plant in Waimea. The construction of this plant will be financed in part by a federal grant from the Housing and Urban Development agency. As soon as approval is received from HUD, a request for bids will be advertised. Plans are now being prepared for the construction of diversion works and pipelines to develop additional water from the Kohakohau Stream in the Kohala Mountain. The extension of the 12-inch main transmission pipeline to Hapuna Bay in the Kawaihae area will soon be completed. To stay ahead of the anticipated water demands of resort and urban development in the Kawaihae-Puako area, the Division has engaged the services of a consultant to conduct a feasibility study for the construction of a large impounding dam across Kohakohau Stream.

Water development on the Island of Kauai includes the installation of a pump and an 8-inch pipeline in the Hanapepe system which will activate a new well in the area to boost the capacity of the system. In Kekaha, the construction of a 12-inch pipeline to serve the proposed Kekaha land development project has been completed. In Haena, construction has begun on the installation of an 8-inch pipeline from the Haena well to Wainiha Bay.

FLOOD PREVENTION AND CONTROL

The Department of Land and Natural Resources is the State Flood Control Agency, and as such the Division coordinates all federal, state and county flood control projects undertaken in Hawaii; and provides technical assistance and/or recommendations for financial assistance to meritorious flood control projects.

Planning and Research

The Division maintains a general flood control plan which is regarded as a guide for the orderly and coordinated implementation of a statewide flood control program. To carry out its mission, the Division compiles, evaluates, interprets and disseminates information for technical use; renders technical assistance in matters of master planning, zoning, qualifying for and constructing federal and state flood control projects, obtaining flood fighting units and other related flood control activities; reviews federal flood control projects for state approval; and initiates flood control projects. The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers and the U.S. Geological Survey provide assistance in preparing flood plain information reports which point out the flood hazards and recommend corrective action necessary to minimize damage. The flood plain information study report for the Pupukea-Paumalu area on Oahu was published and distributed to planners, land developers and other interested parties. Final drafts of the flood plain information study reports for Kaaawa, Oahu, and Anahola, Kauai, were completed. Studies requested by the Division and now in progress include Kihei, Maui; Waialua, Oahu; Waiahole-Waikane, Oahu; Makaha, Oahu; Waimanalo, Oahu; and Punaluu-Hauula, Oahu.

The Division maintains a complete file on flood damage in the State of Hawaii. The file includes newspaper reports, reports from flood agencies and survey reports of actual damage conducted by the staff. Immediately following any flood occurrence in the State, the Division, in cooperation with state and county Civil Defense Agencies, the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers and the U.S. Soil Conservation Service, canvasses the inundated areas to determine the extent and severity of damage. All information compiled through this joint effort is evaluated in the Division's Honolulu office for justification of future flood control projects.

Under a cooperative agreement with the U.S. Geological Survey, the Division plans and maintains a network of crest-stage stations in operation throughout the State. Data and analysis of the data collected from these stations are collated and published in an annual progress report.

Through the cooperative efforts of the U.S. Geological Survey, Department of Transportation, and Department of Land and Natural Resources, a network of rain gages and stream gaging stations was installed in the Moanalua Watershed to provide data for a rainfall-runoff study.

Development

Construction of the Puukapu Watershed Project was completed. This project was constructed under Public Law 566, administered by the U.S. Soil Conservation Service; and provides flood protection for the Waimea Community

on the Island of Hawaii. The project includes a flood retarding dam, flood water discharge wells and a diversion channel from Lanimaumau Stream to the dam. This Department, together with the County of Hawaii, Mauna Kea Soil and Water Conservation District and the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands co-sponsored the project. Other projects sponsored under Public Law 566 include modification of the Naalehu Watershed Project and construction of the Kona Watershed Project on Hawaii. A draft of the work plan for Kahaluu Watershed Project on Oahu was completed, and final planning for the Honolua Watershed Project on Maui is continuing. Under a trust fund agreement with the U.S. Soil Conservation Service, the Department contributed \$20,000 to accelerate three watershed projects-the Wailuku-Alenaio Watershed and the Waiohinu Watershed Projects on the Big Island, and the Honouliuli Watershed Project on Oahu.

The Corps of Engineers provides federal assistance under Section 205 of the Flood Control Act of 1948 and has begun construction on the Kuliouou Flood Control Project, which is sponsored by the City and County of Honolulu.

Together, the Corps of Engineers and the Soil Conservation Service are investigating thirteen flood control projects to determine their economic feasibility and qualification for federal assistance.

Under the flood prevention and control program, a contract to clear the Kahawai Stream and to construct a maintenance ramp to the channel floor has been completed. Construction was initiated on improvements to the drainage canal and culvert at the corner of Kumuhau and Waikupanaha Streets in Waimanalo. Contract plans and specifications have been completed for the construction of a masonry-lined drainage ditch near the corner of Pensacola and Prospect Streets. All of these projects are on State land and the improvements are being constructed to protect the residences in the area.

MINERAL PROGRAM

The Division continues to administer a cooperative agreement with the U.S. Bureau of Mines for canvassing mineral production in the State. This information is

published annually in the Minerals Yearbook by the Bureau. Principal mineral commodities include crushed aggregate, sand and gravel, volcanic cinder, cement, lime, gem stones (black and pink coral), clay and solar-evaporated salt.

Serving as the State agency for mineral resources and mining information, the Division maintains a current listing of mineral producers and quarry operations of the State. It also provides technical assistance to the Department, other governmental agencies and the general public on all matters relating to mineral resources.

During the fiscal year, more than 300 requests for technical information and rock samples were handled.

ENGINEERING SUPPORT

The Division continues to provide engineering services on request for development programs of the Department.

Detailed project planning and feasibility studies are done only for the water development program, while the preparation of contract plans and specifications as well as inspection of capital improvement construction is provided

for all programs.

Under the land development program the Division is actively engaged in the development of state-owned lands for residential, industrial, recreational, resort, and other uses. On Oahu, state-owned lands in the Kewalo district adjacent to Fort Armstrong will be developed into a wholesale food distribution center. A consultant firm has completed a preliminary engineering report and is presently preparing the construction plans for construction of the first increment of the food distribution center.

At Shafter Flats a six-lot subdivision is being constructed to provide sites for the State agencies which must be relocated from the Ft. Armstrong area.

In Waimanalo, construction has been completed for the Waimanalo sewage treatment plant and the effluent disposal well. Land acquisition problems have delayed the completion of a sewage pumping station and the interceptor pipeline extending from the plant to the completed first-stage of the core development.

On the Island of Maui, construction plans are being prepared for the development of 72 lots in the fifth series of the Wahikuli Houselot Subdivision.

On the Island of Hawaii, the widening and realigning of Banyan Drive within the Waiakea Peninsula of Hilo has been completed. This project provides the much needed access to adequately support the rapidly expanding hotel

area

A tabulation of the projects accomplished by the Division includes seven projects under the land program, 18 projects under the water program, 13 projects under the State Parks program, three projects under the Forestry program, two projects under the Flood Prevention and Control program, and one project each under the Fish and Game and Job Corps programs.

IRRIGATION SYSTEMS

The Division operates and maintains three irrigation systems—Waimanalo, Lalamilo, and Molokai. The Waimanalo Irrigation System, completed its 15th year of service to 95 farmers, who occupy 921 acres of Oahu's largest diversified agricultural area. Waimanalo experienced the driest August month, according to U.S. Weather Bureau's recordings. This dry spell increased the water consumption, and water sales for the year jumped to 127 million gallons from 75.4 million gallons the year before. Total rainfall during the year was gaged at 56.45 inches. Waimanalo has become the leading string bean producing center in Hawaii. Hybrid banana plantings have increased and production in vanda orchids and plumerias were stepped up to meet the continued expansion of the tourist industry.

The Waimea-Lalamilo Irrigation System completed its 8th year of service to 24 farmers who cultivate 196 acres. Water sales for the year declined to 88.6 million gallons from 93.8 million gallons last year. This decline was due to heavy rainfall during the month of December, January, February and April. Crop production decreased slightly due to farm labor shortage, and land left idle. This year, the vacuum-cooling plant processed about 4.8 million pounds of produce, most of which comes from the area served by the State Irrigation System. The Military services purchase an average of 65,000 pounds of produce per month from this area. The 4.5 million gallons service reservoir was completely relined with butyl rubber. Additional improvements are being planned to improve the operation of the system.

The Molokai Irrigation System completed its 4th year of operation. During this period, the distribution pipeline along Farrington Avenue was completed and construction begun on the 1,400 million gallon Kualapuu Reservoir. Libby, McNeill & Libby completed the construction of their feeder line which serves the Maunaloa area and is presently taking water from the system for spraying purposes. The introduction of the seed corn industry to the

island of Molokai has encouraged additional areas of agricultural lands to be opened. Molokai Farm, Inc. who had 267 acres of potato under cultivation was abandoned. The total acreage of pineapple lands irrigated by this system was increased from 5,000 acres to 6,677 acres and the acreage of diversified crops irrigated is now 93 acres. Water sales of the past year totaled 256.6 million gallons, a decline from the 344.6 gallons last year. This reduction is largely due to the closing of the Molokai Farm, Inc. At present there are 23 homesteaders in the Hoolehua area connected to the system and applications are still being received for connection to the newly installed pipelines.

SOIL AND WATER CONSERVATION DISTRICTS

The Department of Land and Natural Resources provides administrative support to the Soil and Water Conservation Districts in the State. The Districts are political subdivisions of the State and the 15 districts cover about 96 percent of the total land area in Hawaii. Each district is governed by five directors who serve without compensation. Through cooperative agreements with public agencies and private organizations, the districts assist individual land operators in the application of sound land treatment measures to prevent erosion and flooding and to conserve water.

The Division coordinates the activities among the districts on a statewide basis and the activities between the districts on a statewide basis and the activities between the districts and other public and private organizations. This is accomplished through correspondence, and through meetings with the district directors and other interested parties. The Division also assists in the election and appointment of directors. This year, three directors were elected and two directors were appointed by the Chairman and Board of Land and Natural Resources. To streamline the election process, the 1969 Legislature passed a law eliminating the need to conduct a formal election when the number of nominees for a district director does not exceed the number of vacancies for directorship. When this occurs, the unopposed candidates can be elected outright and the Board will certify the election of the candidates nominated.
