





# DIVISION OF AQUATIC RESOURCES

### Henry M. Sakuda Administrator



he Division of Aquatic Resources manages the State's marine and freshwater resources through programs in commercial fisheries and aquaculture, aquatic resources preservation, enhancement and education, and aqua-

tic recreation. Major program areas include projects to maximize commercial fishery and aquaculture productivity, protect native and resident aquatic species and their habitat, and provide facilities and opportunities for recreational fishing consistent with the interests of the State.

### Commercial Fishery and Aquaculture Program

This program assists commercial fishery enterprises by increasing productivity through improvements in production methods, product processing, equipment usage and management methods. The program also develops new and improved aquaculture products by providing technical assistance and demonstration projects to enhance the quality and diversification of Hawaii's commercial fishery and aquaculture production.

### Fish Aggregating Devices (FADs)

### ACCOMPLISHED 1989-90

- ▶ Monitored 54 FAD sites; replaced 12 FADs; recovered 5 off-station FADs; performed light pack maintenance on 36 FADs
- ► Acquired the former National Data Buoy Center (NDBC) station #51005 mooring along with one 8′x20′ Coast Guard buoy in the Alenuihaha Channel between Kipahulu, Maui and Upolu Point, Hawaii as a new state FAD
- Deployed a total of 12 midwater buoys in 4 locations 1-2 miles off South Molokai
- Purchased and refurbished five 40-foot cargo containers for storing additional FAD mooring lines to expedite the replacement of lost FADs
- Recorded 7,842 fishing trips to the FADs and 970,969 pounds of fish caught

### PLAN TO ACCOMPLISH 1990-91

- Assess FADs and relocate to more productive areas, specifically "X" and "V" buoys off West Oahu
- Deploy series of midwater FADs off Kaena Point, West Lanai

- Monitor fishing trips and landings at FADs
- Refurbish newly acquired Coast Guard buoy in the Alenuihaha Channel
- ▶ Deploy two new FADs off Hawaii and Kauai
- Continue volunteer buoy catch reply card system for recreational fishermen

### Tuna Product Development

#### ACCOMPLISHED 1989-90

 Initiated study to investigate frozen storage characteristics of aku pattie developed for fish burger

#### PLAN TO ACCOMPLISH 1990-91

 Conduct monthly sensory taste tests of frozen vs. freshly prepared patties, and analyze chemical/mineral changes in the stored product

### Commercial Fishing

### ACCOMPLISHED 1989-90

- ▶ Issued 2,952 Commercial Marine Licenses
- Monitored commercial fish catches
- Monitored increase of longline fishing fleet to some 110 vessels from 76 in 1989 and 50 in 1988; new entrants primarily from U.S. mainland ports

### PLAN TO ACCOMPLISH 1990-91

- ▶ Issue 3,000 Commercial Marine Licenses
- Monitor catches and value
- Continue to monitor fishing fleet and interaction among user groups

### Aquaculture

### ACCOMPLISHED 1989-90

- ▶ Produced and sold approximately 5.6 million post-larval freshwater prawns to 22 local growers for stocking ponds; estimated value nearly \$90,000
- ▶ Provided technical assistance to 29 prawn growers; assisted private growers with development and operation of small recirculating hatchery and larval rearing systems.
- Maintained mahimahi broodstock and distributed viable eggs to the University of Hawaii Institute of Marine Biology, the Oceanic Institute, and Waikiki Aquarium for larval rearing studies; tested tagging and release of limited number of juvenile and adult mahimahi
- Conducted larval rearing studies with mahimahi, penaeid shrimps, akule and crabs

### PLAN TO ACCOMPLISH 1990-91

- Meet the seed stock needs of local prawn growers until private hatchery available
- Provide technical farm and hatchery assistance to prawn growers
- Construct mahimahi rearing tank system at the Anuenue Fisheries Research Center; tag and release juvenile mahimahi
- Conduct larval rearing studies with various species including mahimahi, penaeid shrimps, akule, moi and crabs
- Maintain mahimahi and disease-free marine shrimp broodstock
- ▶ Construct baitfish holding and transfer facility in Hilo

### **DIPIRM Projects**

### ACCOMPLISHED 1989-90

- Purchased microcomputer equipment to upgrade and enhance Fisheries Information System of Hawaii, Phase II
- Hired consultants to implement Commercial Fisheries Licensing System
- Implemented the Anuenue Fisheries Research Center acquisition, analysis and information processing system

#### PLAN TO ACCOMPLISH 1990-91

 Continue implementation of FISH and Commercial Fisheries Licensing System

### Aquatic Resources Protection Program

This program preserves and enhances native and other resident fish and aquatic species and their habitats through active protection and other management measures.

### Marine Life Conservation Districts (MLCDs)

#### ACCOMPLISHED 1989-90

- Monitored 9 MLCDs; surveyed potential sites at Waimea Bay on Oahu and Red Hill, Kaiwi Point, Wawahiwaa and Honokohau on the Big Island
- Completed environmental assessment for a mooring system in the Molokini Shoal MLCD

#### PLAN TO ACCOMPLISH 1990-91

- Monitor established MLCDs and continue surveys of potential sites; propose new MLCDs as appropriate
- Obtain permits for establishing and maintaining a permanent mooring system in the Molokini Shoal MLCD

### Main Hawaiian Islands Marine Resources Investigation (MHI/MRI)

#### ACCOMPLISHED 1989-90

▶ Implemented MHI/MRI project through contracts with the Oceanic Institute, UH Sea Grant College Program and University of Hawaii Institute of Marine Biology; preliminary studies include stock assessment, ecological and resource use in Kaneohe Bay, Oahu and Hilo Bay, Hawaii; other studies address nutrient subsidies in nearshore waters, pelagic fish resources, biomass and species diversity around sewage outfalls and in recreational areas where fish feeding is practiced

### PLAN TO ACCOMPLISH 1990-91

 Continue MHI/MRI project; develop inventory of the current status of nearshore resources; evaluate results and use findings to propose management strategies as appropriate

#### PLAN TO ACCOMPLISH 1990-91

 Implement project to assess trends, new developments, problems, issues, opportunities and status of Hawaii's commercial and recreational (consumptive and nonconsumptive) fisheries



### **Education Program**

#### ACCOMPLISHED 1989-90

- Established permanent Information Specialist positions on islands of Oahu, Hawaii, Kauai and Maui
- ▶ Began development of aquatic education curriculum supplement materials in cooperation with the Department of Education for use in schools at K-12 grade levels
- Conducted public awareness campaign to prevent release of unwanted fish species into Hawaii's streams and reservoirs
- Initiated fishing education project on Oahu emphasizing conservation ethics

#### PLAN TO ACCOMPLISH 1990-91

- ► Complete aquatic education curriculum supplement materials; test materials in selected public schools statewide
- ► Continue unwanted fish species campaign; promote aquatic conservation through media
- ▶ Expand fishing education program to neighbor islands

### **Endangered Species Program**

#### ACCOMPLISHED 1989-90

- Assisted the National Marine Fisheries Service in tagging 195 green sea turtles on Molokai; monitored green sea turtle nesting activity at Kawaaloa Bay, North Molokai
- Assisted Federal monk seal "Project Headstart" at Kure Atoll in the Northwestern Hawaiian Islands through provision of state permit; seven monk seal pups were born this year, with three females placed in a beach pen

#### PLAN TO ACCOMPLISH 1990-91

Assist Federal programs on marine mammals and sea turtles, including the issuance of necessary state permits and the preparation and implementation of recovery plans for threatened and endangered species

### Aquatic Recreation Program

This program enriches the leisure time of people of all ages by providing opportunities and facilities for developing skills and participating in non-organized outdoor aquatic recreation activities such as saltwater and freshwater fishing, underwater photography, snorkeling and nature studies of aquatic organisms and their habitats.

### Public Fishing Areas (PFAs)

### ACCOMPLISHED 1989-90

- Cage cultured and released 8,800 post-fingerling channel catfish in the Nuuanu PFA, Oahu to enhance survival
- Hatched 85,000 rainbow trout fingerlings for stocking in the Kokee PFA, Kauai; initiated experimental cage culture of 33,000 fingerling rainbow trout at Kokee using methods developed in the Nuuanu Reservoir
- ▶ Intensified evaluation of the effect of accidentally introduced species in freshwater streams and reservoirs and began to implement control measures

### PLAN TO ACCOMPLISH 1990-91

▶ Maintain and improve PFA gamefish stocking programs

- ▶ Provide special fishing opportunities for the disabled
- ▶ Increase the availability of public fishing areas

### Artificial Reefs

#### ACCOMPLISHED 1989-90

- ▶ Completed restoration of Keawakapu Artificial Reef, Maui by adding 1,200 concrete-tire module fish shelters; continued development of Waianae Artificial Reef, Oahu by adding 750 concrete-tire modules; continued buildup of Ewa Deepwater Artificial Reef, Oahu by adding 1,000 tons of boulders and concrete materials
- ▶ Monitored fish populations

#### PLAN TO ACCOMPLISH 1990-91

- ► Continue development of Waianae, Maunalua Bay and Ewa Artificial Reefs, Oahu; expand boundaries of Ewa and Maunalua Bay reefs; locate potential new reef sites on neighbor islands
- Begin tag-recapture study on recently established fish communities at Keawakapu Artificial Reef, Maui
- Phase out construction of concrete-tire modules; initiate contract building of fish shelters using waste concrete

### Waikiki-Diamond Head Shoreline Fisheries Management Area (SFMA)

#### ACCOMPLISHED 1989-90

▶ Opened area to fishing for one year from January 1, 1990 under special conditions; monitored public use and fish population trends

### PLAN TO ACCOMPLISH 1990-91

▶ Close Waikiki-Diamond Head SFMA to fishing from January 1, 1991 to recover fish population growth and continue monitoring fish population

#### Native Fish Protection

#### ACCOMPLISHED 1989-90

- Conducted a workshop/symposium for reviewing the status of known native stream fisheries and ecosystems
- ► Initiated a literature review of aquatic insects in Hawaii with Bishop Museum
- Altered plans for a fish ladder in the Waikolu Stream, Molokai to more effective management actions to reduce the impact of dewatering in favor of the goby Lentipes
- Developed better surveying methods for identifying, counting and estimating size of native gobies in streams
- Intensified reconnaissance surveys of freshwater streams

### PLAN TO ACCOMPLISH 1990-91

- Publish proceedings of the workshop/symposium on native stream fisheries and ecosystems in Hawaii, conducted in FY 1989-90
- Apply systems dynamics modelling to stream ecosystems problems
- Design and implement a monitoring plan to define native species occurrence and population cycling in streams
- Initiate a research program to collect background information essential for the management of freshwater stream ecosystems in Hawaii
- Begin to identify freshwater streams in need of special protection



# DIVISION OF CONSERVATION & RESOURCES ENFORCEMENT

Malama Pono I'a Hawai'i—to preserve and protect Hawai'i. The Division of Conservation and Resources Enforcement Officers proudly wear this motto on their uniforms. These officers are responsible for the enforcement of

laws and rules regulating fish and wildlife, state parks, land management, forests and beaches. It is also

DOCARE's responsibility to educate the public about conservation and preservation of Hawaii's land and natural resources and to protect the people who use these resources.

Eradication of marijuana on State-owned lands is a priority function of the division. Marijuana cultivation in our forest areas adversely affects the safety and well-being of residents and tourists who use these areas for hunting, hiking, and other recreational purposes.

The Division of Conservation and Resources Enforcement also is responsible for the administration of the Hunter Education Program. The eleven-hour certification course is designed to educate Hawaii's residents in outdoor safety and resource conservation and is offered free of charge to the public.

### ACCOMPLISHED 1989-90

- Reviewed policy and procedures relating to patrol, marine patrol and canine programs, began work on revising and updating the manual
- Established a computer program to evaluate data on patrol activities and enforcement actions
- Evaluated test results and reviewed aerial eradication of marijuana using glyphosate, a biodegradable herbicide



- Destroyed 232,274 marijuana plants with a street value of \$464,548,000 in operations on islands of Hawaii and Molokai
- Received legislative appropriation of \$992,322 for the marijuana eradication program for FY 1991
- Acquired office and classroom space at a centralized location to accommodate the hunter education program
- ► Certified 1,742 outdoor sportspersons in the Hunter Education Program
- Continued efforts to locate a suitable site for an Oahu outdoor recreational facility to support firearm and archery target shooting

### PLAN TO ACCOMPLISH 1990-91

- Finalize draft of policy and procedures manual, implement revisions as required
- Upgrade statewide communications system with emphasis on improving equipment capabilities on the islands of Kauai and Hawaii
- ▶ Acquire a new patrol boat for the island of Hawaii
- ▶ Develop an eradication program plan for FY 90-91 based on geographic priority areas
- Continue to meet the needs/demands of the public by providing as many hunter education courses as funding and resources will allow



## Bureau of Conveyances

### Archie K. Viela Registrar



ince the Great Mahele of 1848, real estate transactions have been preserved in the Bureau of Conveyances. Chapters 501-502, Hawaii Revised Statutes, authorize the Bureau to record all legal documents relating to

real estate transaction. The State of Hawaii is unique in that it is the only State that maintains a single statewide recording office for the transfer of land titles.

Due to the different statutory requirements, the division operates as two parallel units, Land Court Recording Branch and Regular System Recording Branch. The Land Court Recording Branch process and preserves documents and maps affecting title to lands registered in the Land Court and issues a Land Court Certificate of Title showing the vested ownership, which is guaranteed by the State of Hawaii. The Regular System Recording Branch process and preserves legal and land title documents affecting unregistered lands.


#### ACCOMPLISHED 1989-90

- Examined, recorded and processed 205,445 documents in the Regular System
- ▶ Reduced the Regular System document processing backlog from 3 months to 2 months
- Examined, recorded and processed 98,943 documents in the Land Court System and issued 20,826 new Certificate of Titles
- Reduced the 3 years backlog to 2½ years in the Land Court System
- ► Contracted with data processing firm for data input services of the Land Court Certificates of Titles
- ► Drafted and submitted revisions of the Hawaii Revised Statutes, Administrative Rules relating to recordation in Regular System
- ▶ Promulgated the Rules of the Land Court System
- Collected: \$8,090,748 Conveyances Taxes; \$11,109,245
   Regular System fees, and \$8,889,464 Land Court fees
- ▶ Received approval to reorganize division

#### PLAN TO ACCOMPLISH 1990-91

- Examine, record and process 213,000 documents presented for recordation in Regular System
- ▶ Reduced the Regular System document processing backlog from 2 months to 10 days
- ➤ Examine, record and process 104,000 documents presented for recordation in the Land Court System and issue 21,000 new Certificates of Titles
- ▶ Reduce the 2½ years backlog to 1½ years in the Land Court System
- ▶ Implement reorganization of division
- Promulgate the Hawaii Revised Statutes, Administrative Rules relating to recordation of Regular System documents





# DIVISION OF FORESTRY AND WILDLIFE

Michael G. Buck



he Division of Forestry and Wildlife is responsible for the management of State-owned forests, natural areas, public hunting areas, and plant and wildlife sanctuaries. Program areas cover watershed protection, native

resources protection including unique ecosystems and endangered species of plants and wildlife, outdoor recreation, and commercial forestry.

# Watershed Protection and Management Program

The goal of the Watershed Protection and Management Program is to continue to protect, improve and enhance the condition of the vegetative cover and soil to retard rapid run-off of storm flows, prevent soil erosion and improve infiltration of water into the soil to help ensure viable water yields of the quality and quantity needed.

#### ACCOMPLISHED 1989-90

- ▶ Controlled noxious plants and weeds on 177 acres
- ► Controlled erosion on 5 acres
- Planted 3,000 tamarisk seedlings on Kahoolawe for a total of 2.4 miles of windbreak protecting 74 acres
- Removed 115 wild cattle in forest reserves on Maui and 43 in Kau and Kapapala forest reserves on Hawaii
- Conducted a basic fire training class on Maui for new employees from DOFAW as well as for other State agencies
- ▶ Fought 17 fires encompassing 2,458 acres
- ▶ Supported legislation regarding watershed management, which was eventually passed by the Legislature and signed into law by the Governor (Act 201). This law requires lessees to jointly develop and implement watershed management plan with DLNR.
- ▶ Established the Banana Poka Eradication Program on Māui. Removed 414,300 seedlings, 259,513 juveniles, 67,953 vines with flowers, and 57,550 vines with fruits of the banana poka on 166.4 acres using 563.1 hours of work by volunteer groups and prison inmates.
- Distributed the Colletotrichum fungus on Hawaii, Maui, Molokai, Oahu and Kauai and monitored its biological effect on Clidemia hirta, a noxious weed
- Distributed the Cyanotricha insect on Hawaii and Kauai and monitored its biological effect on the noxious weed Banana Poka

#### PLAN TO ACCOMPLISH 1990-91

- Fight fire aggressively and safely in the wildland fire protection areas and render assistance to cooperators as needed and dictated by mutual aid pacts
- Provide advanced fire training classes to DOFAW employees and other State agencies
- Continue the Banana Poka Eradication Program on Maui
- Establish procedures in developing watershed management plan as required by Act 201
- ▶ Continue the planting of windbreaks on Kahoolawe

# Native Resources Protection and Enhancement Program

The goal of the Native Resources Protection and Enhancement Program is to protect and enhance unique native plant and animal species and examples of relatively unmodified native ecosystems for their productive value to science, education, and industry and the cultural enrichment of future generations.

### Native Ecosystems

#### **ACCOMPLISHMENTS 1989-90**

#### Non-Native Animal Control

- ▶ Removed 25 pigs from the West Maui Natural Area Reserve (NAR) in cooperation with Maui Land and Pineapple Co.; eliminated 1,052 goats, 54 pigs, and 24 deer from the pali areas adjoining the Puu Alii and Olokui (Molokai) reserves
- ▶ Started pig control in the Mt. Kaala and Pahole (Oahu) reserves
- Increased intensive rodent control on Green Island, Kure Atoll (226 acres)
- ▶ Developed a program for dealing with the possible introduction of the brown tree snake, including training on snake detection and control methods for the Brown Tree Snake Contingency Plan Committee and the establishment of seven snake watch attack teams, 2 on Oahu and 1 on each of the other main islands
- Installed pig monitoring transects in the lower half of the Waimanu National Estuarine Research Reserve

#### Fencing

- ► Constructed, in cooperation with the Nature Conservancy, a one-mile pig control fence across the adjoining Kamakou Preserve on Molokai to prevent pig migration into the Puu Alii (Molokai) NAR
- Purchased fence materials for the Puu Makaala (Hawaii) and Kuia and Hono O Na Pali (Kauai) Natural Area Reserves
- Constructed a 1.3-mile fence section in the Hanawi (Maui) NAR
- Completed 6 barrier fences to prevent the mauka movement of pigs into the Eke Summit region of the West Maui NAR
- Constructed a pig control fence on the Mt. Kaala (Oahu) NAR summit plateau to protect the montane bog ecosystem

### Weed Control and Vegetation Enhancement

- Treated Ficus trees in a 16-acre section of the Laupahoehoe (Hawaii) NAR with herbicide by tree injection methods
- Monitored and cleared 25 acres of blackberry in the Mt. Kaala reserve



- Established and monitored herbicide test plots to measure effectiveness of various treatment methods
- ▶ Planted 5.4 acres of trees, shrubs, and herbaceous plants on Oahu's coastal Wildlife Sanctuaries
- ► Controlled vegetation on 154 acres of Paiko Lagoon and Mokuauia Wildlife Sanctuary

### Logistics and Infrastructure

- Designed and constructed a portable field shelter to house equipment and staff which was transported to the newly established base camp in the remote Hanawi NAR
- Maintained the loop trail in the Manuka (Hawaii) NAR as well as trails in the Pahole reserve and the boardwalk in the Mt. Kaala reserve
- ▶ Installed a portable radio-repeater in the Puu O Umi NAR to provide radio communication from the bottom of Waimanu Valley of the Waimanu NERR

### Personnel and Administration

- ► Established the 876-acre Kanaio Natural Area Reserve (Maui) which includes some of the best remaining native dryland forest in the State
- ▶ Coordinated and guided 370 volunteers who contributed 1,370 hours of labor maintaining trails, building pig control fences, controlling noxious weeds and removing litter
- Provided hunter safety and fire fighting training classes to NARS personnel
- ➤ Completed all requirements (public hearings, land use approvals) for the preparation of the Executive Order set aside for the 3,600-acre Waimanu National Estuarine Research Reserve (Hawaii)
- ► Five permanent natural area specialists jobs were approved by the 1990 Legislature
- Conducted resource evaluation surveys of Kawainui Marsh and worked for the passage of an act which mandates a fee simple acquisition of the Marsh by the State

#### Research

- ► Taped oral history accounts from 5 former residents of Waimanu Valley
- ▶ Started a study on the ecology and community structure and dynamics of native fish species in the Waimanu NERR estuary by the University of Hawaii personnel
- Initiated a 1-year detailed archaeological survey in the Waimanu NERR

 Awarded 11 grants to support research related to the management of resources in Natural Area Reserves to University of Hawaii and Bishop Museum scientists

### PLAN TO ACCOMPLISH 1990-91

- Manage non-native plants and animals to reduce their damaging impact on native ecosystems
- Maintain and improve access into Natural Area Reserves
- Establish nature study trails; initiate the development of environmental education programs
- Provide opportunity and guidance to volunteer groups to participate in natural area management
- Maintain the undisturbed condition of priority natural area reserves

### **ACCOMPLISHMENTS 1989-90**


### **Endangered Plants**

- Built a pig exclosure fence in the Pahole (Oahu) NAR to protect 1 of 2 remaining populations of Cyanea superba, an endangered species candidate
- ► Established a plant sanctuary for the last known Nau (Gardenia brighamii) on Moloka'i
- ► Continued propagation work on the *Kokia cookei* on Maui, so that 3 trees and 12 grafts, which comprise two thirds of the world's population of this critically endangered plant, now grow on the grounds of the Kahului DOFAW Nursery
- Established field exclosures to protect 2 endangered plant species: Sesbania tomentosa at Mokolea, West Maui and Lycopodium mannii at Manawainui, Kahikinui, East Maui
- Developed and funded cooperative agreement with the National Tropical Botanical Garden to collect rare plant material and develop propagation techniques for future outplanting
- Maintained 36 acres of native plant sanctuaries on Hawaii
- ▶ Developed 1 acre of native plant sanctuary on Hawaii

#### Olinda Endangered Species Facility

- ▶ Produced 1 alala chick (Kinohi) at the Olinda ESF
- ► Transported 10 pairs of nenes and 17 Hawaiian ducks (koloa) from Pohakuloa facility on Hawaii to the Olinda FSF
- Produced 9 nene for release from 4 pairs of nene at the Olinda ESF
- ▶ Constructed 4 new buildings at Olinda ESF (Endangered Species Facility): Isolation/Infectious Quarantine Building; Injured/Non-infectious Building; Brooding/Foster Development Building; and a 10-unit Breeding Pair Building for nenes
- Added an emergency water supply (10,000-gal. tank) and constructed 2,600 feet of perimeter security-fence at Olinda ESF.
- Completed the Phase II CIP project and developed plans for new endangered forest bird captive propagation facilities for Phase III at the Olinda ESF

- Released 8 pairs of koloa ducks on Kanaha Pond, Maui
- ► Captured 1 pair of wild nene for captive breeding and banded 22 nene at Haleakala Crater
- ▶ Conducted a resource evaluation of Heeia Marsh, Oahu
- ▶ Coordinated and cooperated in planning initiatives between DOFAW, USFWS, and mainland zoos for the implementation of a surrogate captive breeding program for endangered Hawaiian forest birds
- Processed 20 Scientific Collecting Permits for studies of Hawaiian birds
- Conducted 2 statewide waterbird surveys
- ► Conducted surveys of the Hawaiian crow and other forest bird species at the Waiea tract, South Kona; at Puu Waawaa Wildlife Sanctuary, and at Honaunau Forest Reserve on Hawaii
- Monitored successful nesting of Nene in the wild on Kauai

- ► Salvaged 49 barn owls and pueos for diagnosis of disease problems occurring on Kauai
- ► Conducted 2 censuses of the endangered palila on Mauna Kea, Hawaii
- ▶ Developed a cooperative nene nutritional research program with the Wildfowl and Wetlands Trust, Slimbridge, England, U.S. National Park Service, and the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service
- ▶ Developed a 5-year plan for the management and restoration of Hawaiian wildlife with federal funding
- ▶ Obtained \$182,000 of federal monies for endangered wildlife programs

### PLAN TO ACCOMPLISH 1990-91

- ▶ Increase the number of *Kokia cookei* to be propagated on Maui
- ► Continue to develop native plant sanctuaries throughout the State

### Outdoor Recreation Resource and Development Program

The goal of the Outdoor Recreation Resource and Development Program is to enrich leisure time of people of all ages and capabilities by providing opportunities and facilities for developing outdoor skills and participating in recreational activities such as hiking, hunting, camping, photography, and nature study.

### ACCOMPLISHED 1989-90

Trails, Roads, Shelters

- ► Constructed 8.4 miles of roads, 10.7 miles of trails, 4 trail shelters, and 5.2 miles of fence line
- Maintained 285 miles of road, 264 miles of trails, and 37 miles of fenceline
- ► Maintained 1,062 acres of arboreta
- ▶ Maintained 39 trail shelters, 34 picnic campsites, 7 hunter checking stations, 96 wildlife water units and 47 viewpoints

### Public Hunting

- Posted 220 hunter informational, boundary, and safety zone signs
- Maintained 20 and constructed 4 new game feeding sites
- Planted 15 acres of herbaceous cover and cleaned 167 acres of noxious shrubs for game habitat improvement
- Constructed two hunting area entrance gates (Kauai) and two self-checking hunter check stations (Oahu)
- ▶ Instituted first primitive firearm (black powder) hunting season for Axis deer on the island of Lanai and extended public hunting season for Axis deer on Lanai from 13 to 22 weekends



- Coordinated special public hunts, through lotteries, for Axis deer, Blacktail deer, mouflon sheep and wild goats
- ▶ Amended Section 183D-10.5 (Act 083), HRS to authorize the charging of fees for works of art and wildlife stamps for revenues for the Wildlife Revolving Fund
- Opened up 19,540 acres of new public hunting area on state-owned (leased) land at Kapapala on the island of Hawaii
- ▶ Established a new public hunting area at Kahakuloa on the island of Maui by action of the Board of Land and Natural Resources. The addition of this 1,056-acre area will provide new opportunities for both game bird and feral pig hunting
- Commenced a study of the black Francolin Partridge, a game bird, to determine life history information for management implementation on the island of Molokai

### Na Ala Hele Trails and Access Program

#### STATEWIDE ACCOMPLISHMENTS

- ▶ Obtained approval by the 1990 Legislature for 6 permanent positions
- Completed and circulated the Draft Management Plan.
   The final plan is due 1/90
- Designed and purchased signs for highway markers, trail identification, and hazard warnings

- ▶ Completed 45% of the Statewide Trail and Access Inventory; began data collection of the shoreline trail and access portion of the Statewide Inventory through grants to the four counties. Target date for completion of the first major data collection phase is January 31, 1991.
- ▶ Supported an amendment to the Na Ala Hele law, Chapter 198D, HRS, to enable the Department to publish only the portion of the Statewide Inventory which identifies trails/accesses that are available for public use
- ▶ Completed 6 land title searches for 5 ancient trails on Lanai—1 old government road on Kauai, 1 ancient trail on Molokai, 2 ancient trails on Hawaii, and 1 old government road on Hawaii
- ▶ Formed a legal issues task force to assist in drafting legislation that will help to further relieve landowners of liability when permitting public recreation, free of charge, on their lands; hired a part-time coordinator to assist in the analysis of problems, potential short- and long-term solutions and to identify further research needs

### Ala Kahakai Trail System (Hawaii)

# Forest Products Resource and Development Program

The goal of the Forest Products Resource and Development Program is to grow high quality forest products in sustained yield systems to create job opportunities in rural areas and broaden Hawaii's economic base.

### ACCOMPLISHED 1989-90

Produced and distributed 404,398 tree seedlings

- Donated 2,000 native trees seedlings toward Earth Day's goal of planting 10,000 native trees in Hawaii
- ► Donated to the public 12,600 trees statewide for Arbor Day
- ▶ Prepared 171 acres for tree planting
- ▶ Planted 152 acres of trees
- ▶ Fertilized 145 acres of trees
- ▶ Pruned and thinned 23 acres of trees
- ▶ Established natural reproduction of trees on 10 acres
- ▶ Provided forestry assistance to over 80 landowners
- ▶ Sold over \$21,000 worth of forest products
- Provided urban forestry assistance to over 65 individual homeowners and groups

### PLAN TO ACCOMPLISH 1990-91

- ► Increase the production of seedlings available for distribution and planting
- ▶ Increase forestry assistance to landowners
- Continue the timber stand improvement programs on all districts
- Draft and submit Forest Stewardship Assistance legislation for approval and implementation

### Human Resource Development Program

The goals of the Human Resource Development Program are to inform the general public about the wise use, uniqueness, and management programs necessary to protect, maintain, and develop Hawaii's natural resources and to develop volunteer programs for people to participate in appropriate natural resource management activities.

#### ACCOMPLISHED 1989-1990

- ▶ Coordinated and guided 370 volunteers who contributed 1,370 hours of labor maintaining trails, building pig control fences, controlling noxious weeds and removing litter
- Renovated the Kiolakaa cabin for use by the NARS field personnel and volunteers
- ▶ Developed an informational brochure for the Mt. Kaala reserve
- Assisted Hawaii Educational Television (KHET) in the production of a video documentary of the Heeia Wetlands, Oahu
- ▶ Completed production and distribution of the endangered bird video to the Hawaii Department of Education and 27 other agencies, conservation groups and individuals
- ▶ Participated in the ad hoc committee on leptospirosis and posted 50 leptospirosis warning signs
- ▶ Distributed over 700 "Hawaii Wildlife Plan" booklets

# DIVISION OF STATE PARKS, OUTDOOR RECREATION & HISTORIC SITES

he Division of State Parks, Outdoor Recreation and Historic Sites administers the State Park System, the State recreation planning program and the historic preservation program. Basic activities relating to these


functions are divided among two programs of the State's budgeting system: Heritage and Recreation Parks and General Administration for Culture and Recreation.

### Heritage and Recreation Parks

The purpose of this program is to enrich the leisure time of people of all ages by providing opportunities and facilities for nonorganized outdoor park recreation activities and by preserving and making available for appreciation and study places of historical, scenic and natural significance. Activities in this program include the acquisition of parklands, and the planning, development and management of parks with heritage and outdoor recreation values.

#### ACCOMPLISHED 1989-90

- Hired a park manager who began program development at Kahana Valley State Park, Oahu
- Renewed curator agreements at Ulu Po Heiau State Monument, Oahu and at Wailua River State Park, Kauai
- Acquired two parcels for establishment of Laie Point State Wayside, Oahu
- ▶ Initiated acquisition of lands at Kukaniloko Birthsite, Oahu to establish new State park; and at Wailea Beach for expansion of Hapuna Beach State Recreation Area, Hawaii
- Completed historical research on land use at Kaawaloa, Kealakekua Bay State Historical Park, Hawaii
- Initiated preparation of park plans for Kiholo Bay area, Hawaii; Polihale State Park, Kauai; and Waianapanapa State Park, Maui
- Initiated planning and design for golf course and beach park at Hapuna, Hawaii
- Replaced hazardous fireplaces in housekeeping cabins at Kokee State Park, Kauai
- ▶ Undertook joint project with Hawaii Army National Guard to install playground equipment at Honolulu Stadium State Recreation Area, Oahu; and to relocate parking area and do other improvements at Sacred Falls State Park, Oahu
- Completed installation of emergency phones at Haena State Park and at Polihale State Park on Kauai



- Improved water system and constructed additional picnic facilities at Puaa Kaa State Wayside, Maui
- Completed construction of State parks maintenance storage building within Hilo baseyard of Division of Forestry and Wildlife

- ▶ Install new irrigation system and reconstruct walkway for handicapped accessibility at Aina Moana State Recreation Area, Oahu
- ▶ Replace comfort station at Heeia State Park, Oahu
- Clear and grub selected areas for future development at Kahana Valley State Park, Oahu
- ► Continue coordination with Hawaii Community Development Authority and Office of State Planning for development of Kakaako Waterfront State Recreation Area, Oahu
- Install safety railings and construct walkways and decks at Makapuu Point State Wayside, Oahu

# Administration for Culture and Recreation

The purpose of this program is to enhance program effectiveness and efficiency by formulating overall policies and plans, directing operations and personnel, and providing other administrative and housekeeping services. Major activities include: general administration, planning, contract administration, and reviewing projects for their impact on outdoor recreation resources and opportunities and for compliance with historic preservation procedures. This program also administers the Land and Water Conservation Fund and the National Historic Preservation Fund, and prepares the State Recreation Functional Plan and the State Historic Preservation Functional Plan.



# DIVISION OF WATER & LAND DEVELOPMENT

### Manabu Tagomori Manager-Chief Engineer



he recent enactment of the State Water Code has resulted in the reorganization of the former Division of Water and Land Development into a new Division of Water Resource Management that has been empow-

ered to administer the State's programs in water resource management, mineral resource assessment, flood prevention and control, and dam safety. The State Water Code also resulted in the creation of a Commission on Water Resource Management to oversee and develop State policies for the division's implementation of water programs.

### Basic Data Collection and Resource Assessment

Basic climatic data (such as rainfall, temperature, wind, humidity, and solar radiation), hydrologic data (such as streamflows and water levels in wells), and water development data (such as water use, well characteristics, and stream diversion characteristics) are collected, analyzed, and disseminated in this program.

#### ACCOMPLISHED 1989-90

- ▶ Continued an ongoing program of collection of basic climatic and hydrologic data throughout the State, with information being disseminated through publications and the Division's Information Center, renewed the division's annual cost-sharing agreement with the U. S. Geological Survey for hydrologic data collection
- Developed techniques to relate the combined effect on rainfall and groundwater pumping on ground water levels, and to determine rainfall trends in watersheds
- Initiated a statewide program to field inspect and verify all water sources and uses, targeting Windward Oahu as the first area
- Completed the drilling of 1 exploratory well at Wailua, Kauai (Makaleha Exploratory Well No. 2)
- ▶ Initiated the construction of 7 exploratory wells elsewhere in the State

#### PLAN TO ACCOMPLISH 1990-91

- Begin field installation of computerized rain gauges in remote mountain areas to strengthen the existing rain gauge network
- Update publications on rainfall data (through 1989) and maps of the State's raingauge network

- Initiate a pilot project for real-time collection and analysis of climatic and hydrologic data using telemetry technologies
- ▶ Initiate a program to compile and analyze reports of water use to be submitted monthly by water users throughout the State
- Prepare plans and specifications for new groundwater sources at 5 locations in the State
- ▶ Initiate the construction of 3 exploration wells (Keei, Kona; Makakilo, Oahu; and Wahikili, Maui)

### Regulation of Water Development and Use

The State Water Code calls for the designation of water management areas by the Commission on Water Resource Management for the purpose of establishing administrative control over withdrawals and diversions of ground and surface waters in critical locations. The intent is to ensure proper husbandry of the resource, by allowing only beneficial and reasonable uses of water, as determined and approved by the Commission.

#### ACCOMPLISHED 1989-90

- ▶ Processed and acted on declarations of water use filed by 2,600 respondents who registered water sources and declared water uses at more than 7,000 locations throughout the State, as required by the State Water Code
- Received, processed and issued over 100 permits for well construction and pump installation activities
- ▶ Held a public hearing and conducted an investigation of the hydrology of Lanai to determine whether Lanai should be designated as a water management area, resulting in the Commission deciding not to designate Lanai as a water management area

### PLAN TO ACCOMPLISH 1990-91

- ► Establish criteria to quantify "reasonable-beneficial uses" of water
- Begin to issue Certificates of Water Use for declared water uses that are determined to be reasonable and beneficial
- ▶ Initiate a program to identify and quantify appurtenant water rights throughout the State
- Continue to process and issue well construction and pump installation permits statewide
- Continue to regulate water use in existing water management areas through the issuance of water use permits
- Act on the petition to designate Windward Oahu as a water management area
- Conduct hydrologic investigation and public hearing on the petition to designate Molokai as a water management area

### Water Resource Planning

The State Water Code requires the Commission on Water Resource Management to formulate a Hawaii Water Plan to guide long-range water resource management in the State. The Hawaii Water Plan is to consist of four component sub-plans, to be prepared by various State and county agencies and to deal with water resource protection, water use and development, State water projects, and water quality.

### ACCOMPLISHED 1989-90

- Completed a plan of work for the development of the Hawaii Water Plan, including preliminary research and data gathering, in collaboration with retained consultants, and disseminated the draft documents for public review
- ▶ Held a series of public informational meetings on all islands to familiarize the public with the Hawaii Water Plan; subsequently, held formal public hearings to receive testimony and incorporated comments and concerns into the final Plan
- Adopted the Hawaii Water Plan on June 27, 1990, thereby meeting the statutory deadline of July 1, 1990

### PLAN TO ACCOMPLISH 1990-91

- ▶ Update and expand the Hawaii Water Plan and its various sub-plans to include new information and additional public input; also, incorporate into the Plan the findings and recommendations of the Hawaii Stream Assessment study and the Reporting-of-Water-Use program
- Hold workshops and public informational meetings to solicit public comments on the updated Hawaii Water Plan
- Establish a process for biennial reviews of the Hawaii Water Plan. Conduct workshops to explain and clarify sustainable-yield data for groundwater aquifiers on the island of Oahu
- Collaborate with the Department of Attorney General, Hawaiian Homes Commission, and the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands to detail a program to identify and quantify native Hawaiian water rights
- Initiate a newsletter on water resources for dissemination to the public
- Initiate a drought forecasting study in conjunction with the University of Hawaii's Water Resources Research Center

- Initiate a consumptive water use for taro study in conjunction with the University of Hawaii's Water Resource Research Center
- Initiate a determination of reasonable-beneficial water use study
- Initiate a survey of appurtenant water rights phase I study

### Instream Use Protection Program

The protection of instream uses, such as aquatic and stream-based wildlife habitat, recreation, aesthetics, and conveyance of water to downstream points of diversion, etc. is accomplished under the State Water Code through the maintenance of instream flows and the regulation of stream alterations.

### ACCOMPLISHED IN 1989-90

- ▶ Enforced the prevailing instream flow standards through the general requirement that any streamflow reduction can take place only by amending the applicable standard; processed 8 petitions to amend instream flow standards
- Processed 8 applications for permits to construct diversion works within streams
- ▶ Processed 27 applications for permits to alter streams
- Issued 11 emergency authorizations for work in stream channels
- ▶ Investigated 7 complaints regarding work in stream channels and brought to the Commission on Water Resource Management 1 violation case for resolution
- Continued to monitor approved permits to ensure compliance with permit conditions
- Completed the Hawaii Stream Assessment, a joint National Park Service-Commission on Water Resource Management statewide inventory and assessment of Hawaii streams and rivers



# Land Management Division

he State of Hawaii, being Hawaii's largest landowner, is responsibile for the proper management and control of all State-owned lands as defined by Section 171-2, Hawaii Revised Statutes. The effective and efficient use of these

lands, for both public and private purposes, is in accordance with established policies. Lands that have not been set aside for public purposes are made available to the public by sale, lease, or month-to-month tenancies.

The Land Division is also responsible for the acquisition of private lands for public purposes. Public purposes include such acquisitions as the Honokahua burial site easement where the State acquired all above-ground rights. This action precluded the landowners from any development that would desecrate this ancient Hawaiian burial site and the Kawainui Marsh acquisition for wildlife and conservation purposes. Acquisitions are accomplished by negotiation, land exchange, or condemnation proceedings.


#### ACCOMPLISHED 1989-1990

- Processed 28 Executive Orders issued by the Governor totalling 380.109 acres of land for school sites, park sites, water tank sites, a film production complex and a fire station site
- Acquired 17 parcels of private land for public purposes totalling 1,012.618 acres of land and costing \$30,994,870 for harbor, school, agricultural, housing and wildlife sanctuary purposes
- ▶ Issued 5 leases and 49 revocable permits for private use of State lands generating \$291,227 in annual revenue
- Sold land parcels to individuals and government agencies for \$345,867
- ► Generated \$13,632,722 in revenues, of which \$1,507,869 was transferred to the Office of Hawaiian Affairs (OHA), \$749,627 to Department of Hawaiian Home Lands and \$5,362,188 to the State's general fund

# AQUACULTURE DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM

long tradition of harvesting of the ocean's bounty using uniquely Hawaiian, coastal ponds has provided a launch pad for modern Island aquaculture efforts. Today, Hawaii's ancient coastal fishponds are part of a

mix of sophisticated technologies and business approaches that grow over 30 products for local and export customers and provide worldwide sales of research, training and technology transfer services. The Aquaculture Development Program (ADP) was established in 1979 to guide, promote and develop the aquaculture industry for the State.

The major principles of Program operation are defined with the publication of the first State aquaculture plan as:

- Participation of the aquaculture community in development decision-making
- Education of government, private sector and publicat-large
  - · Advocacy and facilitation within government
- Direct and indirect marketing of Hawaii's resources, products and expertise
- Direct problem-solving assistance with staff support and research, development and demonstrations project funding

ADP has become a unique development and problemsolving organization whose chief goals are to "clear roadblocks" and catalyze aquaculture activities that contribute to industry growth. When a farm is started, ADP carries out support activities through its staff, and research and development budget. Major target areas are production cost reduction and yield improvement. Marketing is also emphasized, as greater amounts of product are produced and research and consulting capabilities increase.

Results are encouraging in this new high-risk endeavor, with the industry growing from \$2 million a year in direct production and service revenues in 1979 to nearly \$21 million a year in 1989. Production is currently over a million pounds of products each year, which accounts for about twenty percent of the overall value of State fisheries. Along the way, the image of


Right, assistance from the Aquaculture Development Program and the University of Hawaii Sea Grant Program Marine Extension Service has improved pond harvesting techniques for marine shrimp and freshwater prawns. Hawaii's high quality cultured products and superior technological know-how has been firmly established in both the national and international aquaculture communities. More importantly, the Hawaii industry is positioned for still greater achievements in what amounts to a long-term global growth industry with a brilliant future.

World aquaculture production is expected to double by the end of the century, with the bulk of that expansion occurring in Asia and the Pacific. The industry's multiplying diversity and segmentation provides a market mosaic of great complexity and untold opportunity for Hawaii interests. ADP continues to play a critical role in fostering a more positive development environment, identifying niche opportunities and broadcasting the message that aquaculture is a "preferred industry" for Hawaii to achieve its long-term economic and environmental goals.




he Office of Conservation and Environmental Affairs (OCEA) coordinates conservation and environment-related matters for the Department in collaboration with its operating divisions, the Department of the Attorney

General, the Department of Accounting and general Services and the counties of the State. OCEA maintains constant awareness of environmental factors affecting the State's natural resources and proposed activities on public and private lands classified Conservation.

OCEA processes all Conservation District Use Applications (CDUAs. An important function of the office is developing departmental positions and recommendations regarding the use of the State's natural resources.

These positions and recommendations are developed with Federal, State and county agencies, public and private organizations and individuals. The policies often involve environmental impacts of proposed actions by government and private-sector projects on Urban and Agriculture as well as Conservation lands. OCEA also develops policies relating to land and



natural resources and submits them with petitions from the State Land Use Commission.

This office processes requests for film permits for Conservation Districts and State lands and handles inquiries and complaints from the general public.

The number of film permits declined slightly from the previous year, but revenues increased slightly to \$23,010 from the previous year's \$19,326.

OCEA maintains a central library of publications relating to natural resources and the Department's programs.

### **CDUAs**

#### ACCOMPLISHED 1989-1990

- ► Completed the initial computerized transfer of the CDUA history from the Hawaii Permit & Application Support System to the OCEA System using Data Base III
- ► Established client feedback system so that every applicant receives, along with the Board's letter of decision, a form on which to rate OCEA's service
- ▶ Processed 88 CDUAs, including 25 within 150 days rather than the 180 days as required by law

### **Environmental Affairs**



# ADMINISTRATIVE SERVICES OFFICES

he Administrative Services Office provides administrative support services, internal management, and comprehensive fiscal services to the Chairperson and Members of the Board, and to the eight operating divisions

and four staff offices of the Department. Major services include processing the departmental payroll, processing all vendor encumbrances and payments, billing and collecting State land rentals and water licenses and also collecting all other revenues and deposits except those revenues collected by the Bureau of Conveyances, and preparing financial reports.

This office also coordinates and assists in the preparation and implementation of the Departmental budgets, which in FY 1989-90 amounted to over \$31 million for the operating budget and over \$42 million for the capital improvement project budget; coordinates and provides internal and external audit functions for the Department; maintains a centralized system for monitoring Federal grant awards and processing reimbursement claims; and coordinates and assists with the electronic data processing and other telecommunications needs of the Department. Recently added responsibilities are departmental records management, risk management, and reorganizations.

The Administrative Services Office also provides specialized liaison services with the Department of Accounting and General Services, the Department of Budget and Finance, the Legislature, and federal agencies.








he Personnel Office maintains a comprehensive personnel program for the department. The staff provides supportive services to the Chairperson and to the seven operating divisions and the five staff offices.

# PART TWO

# AQUACULTURE DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM

## Fiscal Year 1989-90

The Aquaculture Development Program (ADP) provides a wide range of support for Hawaii's aquaculture industry. This support includes planning and coordination; research funding; information dissemination; species technology and site selection assistance; marketing and promotion; business counseling; and disease prevention. Industry development activities center on helping farmers achieve greater profitability. Research funding is directed toward reducing risks, lowering production costs, increasing yields, and investigating new species for commercial culture in Hawaii. Expenditures to date have played a major role in the expansion of the industry.

#### Growth of the Industry

Aquaculture is one of the most rapidly expanding segments of the State's diversified agribusiness or, by another measure, the fastest growing segment of ocean-based industries. In FY 1989-1990, the industry reached a value of approximately \$21 million, up from \$18.2 million in 1988-1989, with 51 farms raising some 35 different plants and animals. In the Commercial Production Sector, 1.3 million pounds of product, valued at \$6.8 million, were harvested in 1989. This was an increase from the 1988 total of \$5.5 million. Research, training, consulting and conferencing activities were valued at \$14.2 million in 1989. By the end of the year, there were over 500 people working in aquaculture in Hawaii in a wide range of skilled and semiskilled jobs.

#### The Production Sector

Commercial production value set a new record during the year: increasing from \$5.5 million in 1988 to \$6.8 million in 1989. The leading aquacultured species continued to be marine shrimp, with total production of 557,200 pounds, valued at approximately \$2.7 million. Shrimp were followed by freshwater prawns, microalgae and *Gracilaria* (ogo). Plant aquaculture enjoyed an especially strong year. Sales of Cyanotech Corporation's microalgae rose to a record \$1.3 million in 1989, and the company posted a first-ever profit for the second quarter of 1990. The State's three ogo farms

also reported improved sales for the year. Another fast-growing segment of the industry is Chinese cat-fish. The price for the whole product (as high as \$6.50/pound) has attracted seven farmers into production. They harvested 41,000 pounds of fish, worth \$216,000.

#### The Research and Technology Transfer (R&TT) Sector

Hawaii is an important center for tropical aquaculture research, training and technology transfer. The University of Hawaii and the Oceanic Institute have been in the the forefront of research efforts on such species as marine shrimp and freshwater prawns. Hawaii-based consultants are active in nations throughout the Asian Pacific Region and Central and South America

In fiscal year 1989-1990, the value of RT&TT activities was approximately \$14 million, up from \$12.7 million of the previous fiscal year. This sector is expected to greatly increase in value after the national Center for Applied Aquaculture (CAA) at the Oceanic Institute becomes fully operational. Construction is projected to begin in October, 1990. During the fiscal year, the Institute initiated projects in Egypt and Indonesia to transfer U.S. finfish technology.

#### **Program Activity Highlights**

ADP program activities are divided into three areas: 1) planning and coordination; 2) support services; and 3) research, development and demonstration.

#### Planning and Coordination

During the fiscal year, work continued on the final phase of an update of the State Aquaculture Plan. The update is expected to include a long-range strategy for the "Blue Revolution" in Hawaii, as well as detailed action plans. The draft will be disseminated for widespread review in November, with publication expected in early 1991.

To address the need for large-scale research and demonstration facilities to transfer technology and experiment with new species and systems, staff managed contracts for funding the State portion of the national Center for Applied Aquaculture (CAA) (supported by both State and Federal funds) and the expansion of the University of Hawaii's Mariculture Research & Training Center (MRTC) into a major pond research and training facility. Upon completion, MRTC will have the capability of addressing local, national and international needs.

During the year, the Natural Energy Laboratory of Hawaii and the Hawaii Ocean Science and Technology Park at Keahole Point on the Big Island merged, forming the Natural Energy Laboratory of Hawaii Authority (NELHA). Consolidation will streamline operations. The success of this facility in stimulating pilot aquaculture and energy projects has led to the proposed Kealia Aquatech and Renewable Resources Park (KAARP). ADP provided key planning information and testimony to create both NELHA and KAARP.

In addition, various proposals were submitted to ADP for expert review and recommendations. These

included proposals for training assistance from the State Department of Labor's ASSET program; a joint US-China pearl project; use of the Heeia Fishpond on Oahu; a shrimp farm on Kauai; and research projects proposed by the University of Hawaii Sea Grant College Program and the National Coastal Research Institute in Oregon.

A major constraint to the development of aquaculture in Hawaii has been a lack of funds for start-up or expanding operations. The Aquaculture Loan Fund of the Department of Agriculture has been an important source of capital for the State's aquaculture farms. During the fiscal year, ADP was asked to comment on loan applications from three farms. All three loans were approved by the Board of Agriculture.

During fiscal year 1989-1990, ADP worked closely with the Department of Education on their rapidly expanding high school-based aquaculture program. Staff met several times with Department of Education officials and provided comments for proposals for projects at McKinley and Waianae High Schools, and served on the Advisory Board for the McKinley project. In addition, ADP testimony before the Legislature was a key factor in securing a \$25,000 appropriation for establishing aquaculture training at Kahuku High School.

Government officials in the US and abroad have expressed considerable interest in Hawaii's experience in developing an aquaculture industry. In June, the ADP Manager presented a staff paper entitled "Strategies for Public-sector Aquaculture Development" at the World Aquaculture Society convention in Halifax, Nova Scotia. At the same conference, staff participated in a meeting of the National Aquaculture Information Network and a meeting of the National Research Council's Mariculture Study Group.

The Hawaii Aquaculture Advisory Council (HAAC) met three times during the year. ADP provides staff support for this State/Councy/private-sector body which advises the Board of Land and Natural Resources on statewide aquaculture development. At the July, 1989 meeting, staff led a panel discussion of financing for aquaculture and presented an update of effluent discharge issues. At the November meeting, ADP provided information on the availability of shrimp nauplii, and discussed program efforts to strengthen laws against poaching, a problem of major concern to the industry. At the May, 1990 meeting, the topics covered included the marketing of aquacultured products, effluent discharge, and new opportunities in aquaculture.

#### Support Services

ADP offers a wide range of assistance to the industry, including marketing aquacultured products and services, and encouraging investors to consider opportunities to start aquaculture businesses in Hawaii. The year was notable for expanded ADP participation in promotional events, held both locally and abroad, and in assisting the media to "spread the word" about aquaculture in the State.

The DLNR display at the State Farm Fair captured the "Grand Champion" award, besting nine other exhibits with an agricultural theme. ADP played a key

role in designing and constructing the attraction. The ADP booth, which attracted more than 30,000 visitors, featured live and fresh-on-ice aquacultured products. In addition, ADP participated, on behalf of the industry, in Waikiki 2000, at the Hilton Hawaiian Village; Maui Ocean Expo '90 in Kahului, Maui; the 1990 Consumer Fair at the Ala Moana Shopping Center; the Hoolaulea Festival at Windward Community College; Cuisines of the Sun at the Mauna Lani Hotel on the Big Island; and World Aquaculture '90 at Halifax, Nova Scotia. Also, ADP presented an exhibit at a reception for members of the National Fish & Seafood Promotional Council, held at the Maritime Museum in Honolulu. The federally-funded Council has taken a strong interest in boosting aquacultured product sales. In order to publicize Hawaii's aquaculture consultant expertise, ADP published Hawaii's Aquaculture Consultants Directory.

During the year, aquaculture in Hawaii was featured in numerous magazine and newspaper articles. Noteworthy was the special attention the industry received in an article entitled "Aquapreneurs" in World magazine. This publication from the accounting firm, KPMG Peat Marwick, is distributed to 150,000 top business executives throughout the world. In addition, Seafood Leader, one of this country's foremost seafood industry magazines, published a highly favorable article on Island aquacultured products, entitled "Ponds in Paradise". Staff introduced the author to farmers, restauranteurs and seafood wholesalers. Also, staff produced an article on Hawaii's aquaculture industry for Aquaculture Today, an international trade publication.

Distinguished visitor's to ADP's office included Mr. Haniteli Fa'anunu, Director of the Ministry of Agriculture, Forests & Fisheries from the Kingdom of Tonga, Dr. Natth Bhamarapravati, President of Thailand's Mahidol University, and Commodore Mohammad Razi Ahmad, formerly the Director General of Pakistan's Marine Fisheries Department. An important topic of discussion was the establishment of cooperative aquaculture research and training programs. Also, ADP assisted a delegation from the Maine Lobster Institute who were interested in establishing a lobster-holding facility in the Islands. Aquaculture techniques used by the Institute would keep the animals healthy before shipment to Japanese customers.

ADP's aquaculture veterinarian and his staff of two technicians made l04 trips into the field to advise farmers on methods of preventing disease, and handled 207 case submissions for diagnostic assistance from commercial farm and research organizations. In addition, he prepared six research papers for publication in international journals.


#### Research, Development and Demonstration

ADP's research funding program focuses on improving the profitability of commercial farms through increasing production and reducing costs. The competitive developmental research program also investigates the feasibility of culturing new species with commercial potential. The results of this research are published and directly transferred to farmers through

AQUA-CULTURE DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM an ADP/Sea Grant program of field extension assistance.

In FY 1989-1990, ADP funds targeted marine shrimp, finfish, marine biotechnology and small-scale aquaculture. These included investigations of species with considerable commercial potential: tilapia, marine shrimp and mahimahi; and seaweeds that would be raised in land-based systems for food, industrial uses, or pharmaceuticals. Market-oriented research in-

cluded a study of the nutritional values of Hawaii's major aquaculture products. *Hawaii Backyard Aquaculture, A Practical Manual,* based on research funded by ADP and the UH Sea Grant College Program, was published by Windward Community College. In addition, ADP published *Research Progress, 1988 to 1989,* which provided detailed descriptions of ADP-funded research projects to interested persons for the 1988—89 time period.

# ADMINISTRATIVE SERVICES OFFICE

### Fiscal Year 1989-90

#### Native Hawaiian Rehabilitation Fund

As provided by the State Constitution, 30 percent of the State receipts derived from the leasing of cultivated sugarcane land and from water licenses was transferred to the Native Hawaiian Rehabilitation Fund. The amount transferred to the fund during the 1989-90 fiscal year was \$749,627. The total amount transferred to the fund since the 1978 constitutional amendment was \$8,802,517 as of June 30, 1990.

#### Office of Hawaiian Affairs Public Land Proceeds Fund

Act 273, Session Laws of Hawaii 1980, provides that 20 percent of all funds derived from the public land trust described in Section 10-3, Hawaii Revised Statutes, be transferred to the Office of Hawaiian Affairs (OHA). Funds are transferred on a quarterly basis. The amount transferred to OHA during the 1989-90 fiscal year was \$1,599,871. This includes \$1,507,869 from State land revenues and \$92,002 from State park concessions. The total transferred to OHA since the approval of Act 273, Session Laws of Hawaii 1980, amounted to \$14,066,254.

# DIVISION OF WATER & LAND DEVELOPMENT

## Fiscal Year 1989-90

#### Basic Data Collection and Resource Assessment

The collection and dissemination of climatic and hydrologic data continues to be an ongoing primary activity. Under the State Water Code, the collection and dissemination of water development data, consisting of information on well and stream diversion characteristics and water use, has been made an additional primary activity.

Current records of climate-related data, including rainfall, temperature, evaporation, wind, humidity, and solar radiation, are maintained and disseminated through the Division's Water Resources Information Center.

A cooperative program with the U.S. Geological Survey (USGS) continued to provide basic data on streamflows, ground water withdrawals, and water quality. Streamflow data were collected regularly from 50 measuring stations; low flows were measured periodically on six streams; flood discharges were obtained from 62 crest-stage gages; water levels, specific conductance, and chloride concentrations of ground water were measured at 187 wells; field measurements of specific conductance, temperature and pH of stream water were made at scheduled intervals; and rainfall data were collected regularly at 30 sites in mountain watershed areas. Data collected are published in the annual USGS report series, "Water Resources Data for Hawaii and Other Pacific Areas -Volume 1, Hawaii".

Hydrological investigations are also conducted under the cooperative program with the USGS to appraise the State's water resources and assess their characteristics and availability. Investigations were carried out to determine median discharges for the instream use protection program and to monitor ground-water levels in the Pearl Harbor Aquifer. During 1990, a program was initiated to field inspect and verify all water sources and uses throughout the state as were declared by 2,600 firms and individuals. This task is expected to take several years, and is one element of the Division's expanded data collection role under the State Water Code. A second major task of the Division under the Code is to receive, compile, and analyze water use reports submitted monthly by all water users statewide.

#### **Exploratory Well Drilling**

The Exploratory Well Drilling Program, inaugurated in 1961, has played a major role in the discovery of new ground-water sources throughout the State. During the past 29 years, over 100 wells have been drilled, of which 70 produced fresh water and 22 produced brackish water. Most of the wells have been turned over to the county water departments for their use in

providing municipal water. A few of the wells will be turned over to the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands for its use. During Fiscal Year 1990, two exploratory wells on Oahu, Pia Well in Niu Valley and Waianae II in Waianae, were successfully constructed and tested. Four wells on the Big Island are presently under construction, at Honokaa, Kau, Kawaihae, and North Kona (Kalaoa). Planning and design activities were completed for three exploratory wells at Anahola, Kauai; Keei, Hawaii; and Wahikuli, Maui. Planning and design activities were initiated for five wells at Hualalai and Puukapu, Hawaii; Wahikuli, Maui; and Kawaihapai and Mokuleia, Oahu.

#### Flood Control

Under its flood control program, the Division coordinates government actions for flood prevention and control, dam safety inspection, and stream maintenance.

The Division administers flood plain management activities in connection with the Federal Emergency Management Agency's National Flood Insurance Program. Activities included community assistance visits to the four counties of the State, participation in the regional State coordinator's meetings on the Mainland, holding flood loss-reduction workshops, public informational displays on flood retrofitting, and general technical assistance to counties and individuals.

Under its newly instituted dam safety program, the Division adopted administrative rules for program implementation, conducted dam safety workshops in each county, updated the Hawaii National Dam Inventory, and processed applications for the construction of dams.

The Division continued its investigation of flood complaints and pursued the complaints to their resolution.

In addition, the Division participated in workshops addressing mitigation measures for the Big Island's Kalapana lava flow disaster. Results of the workshops will be used to formulate recommendations for the future regulation of land developments on the island.

## Regulation of Geothermal Resource Development

The Division continues to regulate geothermal development activities within the four geothermal resource subzones designated by the Board of Land and Natural Resources. Regular field inspections were conducted at all geothermal sites to ensure compliance with rules governing the leasing and drilling of geothermal resources.

The commercial exploration and development activities of Puna Geothermal Venture and True/Mid-Pacific Geothermal Venture, as well as the University of Hawaii's Scientific Observation Hole (SOH) Project, were monitored daily to properly regulate well drilling activities and enforce permit conditions.

Puna Geothermal Venture, under approvals received from the Board of Land and Natural Resources and the County of Hawaii, initiated the construction of a 25 MW geothermal power plant and well field within the Kapoho Geothermal Resource Subzone. True/Mid-Pacific Geothermal Venture, under a Conservation District Use Permit issued to Campbell Estate, began drilling an exploratory well within the Kilauea Middle East Rift Subzone.

The University's SOH Project completed one of four planned observation holes, drilled to a depth of over 6,500 feet. Core samples and tests are expected to provide valuable downhole information on the underlying geothermal resources.

# Permitting of Geothermal and Cable System Development

The Geothermal/Cable Permit Center, established in 1988, continues to provide assistance and permit information to interested parties. A master application form and an interagency processing and review procedure were developed.

The Permit Center also continued its monitoring of existing geothermal projects to gather additional data and experience and in preparation for coordinating and regulating the proposed geothermal/undersea cable project.

## Instream Use Protection Program

Protection of Hawaii's instream uses, such as the maintenance of aquatic species habitat, stream ecosystems, and stream-related aesthetic, recreational and cultural values, began in 1982 with the passage and implementation of the Hawaii Instream Use Protection Act, a pilot program that focused on Wind-

ward Oahu stream resources. In 1987, the Hawaii Water Code extended the provisions of the earlier law to all streams in the state. Resource protection is now accomplished by the regulation of stream channel alterations and the enforcement of instream flow standards.

The regulation of stream diversions and channel alterations is extremely important because these actions can severely stress aquatic species and destroy stream habitat values, as well as compromise stream-related aesthetic, recreational, and cultural values. Essential projects that affect streams must be designed to ensure that instream values are protected.

During 1989-90, the program staff processed 8 petitions to amend interim instream flow standards, 8 applications for stream diversion works, 27 applications for stream channel alterations, and issued 11 emergency authorizations. The staff also investigated 7 complaints and brought 1 violation case to the Commission on Water Resource Management for resolution. In addition, program staff routinely monitored work authorized by permits to ensure their compliance with permit conditions.

Projects regulated under the instream use protection program included hydropower developments, agricultural diversions, drainage improvements for flood control, revetments for erosion control, utility installations in streambeds, maintenance dredging, and installation of maintenance ramps, bridges, and drainage outlet structures.

Knowledge of Hawaii's streams and stream resources continues to grow to meet the continuing demand for information that will lead to better protection and management. Research support for the Division of Aquatic Resources is a long-term primary goal because the protection of aquatic species habitat is often the driving concern in regulating activities within Hawaii's streams.

Completion of the Hawaii Stream Assessment, a joint National Park Service-Commission on Water Resource Management project to inventory and assess Hawaii's streams and stream-related resources, is scheduled for late 1990. This assessment, Hawaii's first, provides a comprehensive inventory database, an appraisal of streams and rivers for possible inclusion in a wild and scenic rivers system, and guidelines for future actions to maintain, enhance, manage, and preserve Hawaii's stream resources.

### Regulation of Water Development and Use

The Commission on Water Resource Management began regulating well construction activities statewide, starting in September 1988, through the issuance of well construction and pump installation permits. Prior to September 1988, the Division processed well drilling permits statewide, except for Windward Oahu and the Waianae District, where drilling activities were regulated by the Honolulu Board of Water Supply. The Division processed a total of 85 well construction permits and 10 pump installation permits during the past year. Well construction permits and pump installation permits issued by the Commission on Water Resource Management during Fiscal Year 1990 are listed below.

#### Water Use Permits

In the Pearl Harbor, Honolulu and Waialua Water Management Areas on Oahu, regulatory activities also included the processing of permit applications for the development and use of ground water. Generally, a water use permit application is reviewed by staff and then sent to the State Department of Health and to the mayor and water board of the appropriate county for review. In addition, a public notice of the application is published in the news media and sent to interested parties. The public notice procedure gives interested parties the opportunity to voice their support of or objections to any proposed development or use of ground water. The Commission acts on an application within 90 calendar days if there are no objections, or within 180 calendar days of an application requiring a hearing due to valid objections.

# Petitions to Designate Water Management Areas

In December 1988, the Commission received a written petition to designate Windward Oahu as a Water Management Area for the purpose of preserving regional ground-water and surface-water resources. In July 1989, the Commission held public hearings on the proposed designation. In early March 1990, the Commission completed its "Findings of Fact," and circulated it for review and comments. The Commission is scheduled to take action on the petition in December 1990.

In March 1989, the Commission received a written petition to designate the Island of Lanai as a Water Management Area. In March 1990, after public hearings, the Commission decided not to designate the Island of Lanai as a Water Management Area because none of the criteria for designation contained in the State Water Code were met. In place of designation, the following five actions were approved to ensure the protection of Lanai's water resources: 1) require Lanai Company to report monthly pumpage, water level, chloride, and temperature data from all ground

water sources; 2) require Lanai Company to monitor the hydrologic situation; 3) require Lanai Company to formulate a water shortage plan for approval by the Commission by January 1991; 4) hold annual public informational meetings on Lanai in the month of October to furnish and receive information regarding the island's water conditions; 5) authorize the Chairperson to reinstitute designation proceedings and reevaluations if and when: a) the static water level of any production well falls below one-half its original elevation above mean sea level, or b) any non-potable alternative source of supply contained in Lanai Company's water development plan fails to materialize and full land development continues as scheduled, or c) items 1, 2, and 3 are not fulfilled by Lanai Company, or d) actual water use exceeds 4.3 million gallons per

In March 1990, the Commission received a written petition to designate the entire Island of Molokai as a Water Management Area. The Commission is scheduled to hold a public hearing on Molokai in November 1990.

### **Engineering Services Program**

Under its engineering services program, the Division implements various water and land development projects. Projects administered under this program are guided by the goals, objectives, and policies of the Hawaii State Plan.

The Division also provides engineering services to other divisions within the Department and to other State agencies, particularly the Department of Agriculture. Responsibilities in this area include the planning, design, and construction of capital improvements.

During the year, engineering plans and specifications were completed, and bids were opened, for 67 projects. The construction of these projects will be initiated in the coming fiscal year. Sixteen construction projects earlier initiated were completed during the current year.

### Soil and Water Conservations Districts

The Department's Soil and Water Conservation District (SWCD) program is associated with a national program to promote better husbandry of the nation's farmlands. In Hawaii, the districts have the added responsibilities of reviewing agricultural grading plans and providing field inspections to enforce compliance with county grading ordinances. They also assist the Department of Health in protecting our water resources from land-generated pollution.

The present 16 districts now cover nearly all of the lands of the State. Each district has five directors and many cooperators who volunteer their time to help the Federal, State and County governments implement land conservation policies.

The Division provides administrative support and operating funds to the districts. Hawaii County provides additional funding to its districts for help in administering the County's grading ordinance. The Department of Health also provides EPA funding to assist districts with their pollution control work. The USDA Soil Conservation Service provides technical services needed for the districts' operations, including conservation activities carried out under the Food Security Act.

Watershed projects, Resource Conservation and Development projects, and River Basin projects, all being implemented with the assistance of the Soil Conservation Service, and listed below:
