

#### [EXTERNAL] Expressing Opposition to the University of Nations Master Plans

Aloha Chair and Members of the Commission,

Mahalo for the opportunity to testify. My name is Deirdre Roney. I am a resident of Hōlualoa and this project is very near to my home. **I oppose** the University of the Nations' proposed Master Plan Update.

I'm appalled by the University of the Nations' **extractive**, **expansionist business model**. It's not about education but rather the expansion of a religiously driven institution resembling a cult, where absolute obedience (PreK-12), insular social structures and dependence upon the institution are expected. This model does not bring balance to Hawai'i's multicultural landscape. It threatens to overwhelm it.

#### A Pattern We Have Seen Before

Hawai'i has already lived through the devastating impacts of missionary control. Just like Native American communities, Native Hawaiians experienced the **systematic dismantling of culture**, **language**, **land ownership**, **and spiritual practice**. This project echoes that painful history:

- A single religious worldview seeking physical, economic, and ideological dominance
- Expansion onto lands reclassified away from agriculture
- · A growing disconnect between the development and the community it impacts

We must not repeat this cycle.

# Land Reclassification Was a Mistake — Don't Deepen It

The land in question was originally under the **State Agricultural Land Use District**. Under HRS §205-4.5, Bencorp was required to petition the Land Use Commission for reclassification. In 2003, the LUC approved a **boundary amendment** based on a completely different project:

- Market-rate condos
- A for-profit Pacific Cultural Center
- Retail, museum, performance arena

· A small educational facility

That approval does **not** justify the massive, faith-based campus expansion now being proposed. This new Master Plan — adding a PK–12 school, university classrooms, athletic facilities, meeting halls, and expanded housing — is **an entirely different development with an entirely different impact**. Why should a 20-year-old decision, based on a defunct project, allow this expansion today?

## **Water and Land Protection Are Not Optional**

Water is a public trust. Yet somehow, the Water Commission allowed increased water commitments without adequate analysis of cumulative impacts — especially in West Hawai'i, where water availability is already strained.

This is not just bureaucratic oversight — it is a **breach of trust**.

'Āina and wai cannot be sacrificed so a religious institution can build a larger footprint.

### **We Cannot Ignore Public Safety**

Kailua-Kona has failed every tsunami evacuation in its modern history.

Adding thousands more residents, students, staff, and visitors — many of them housed mauka and commuting makai — **increases the risk dramatically**.

Development in the wrong place is not just irresponsible — it is dangerous.

#### The Withdrawal of the FEIS Raises Serious Concerns

The Applicant has withdrawn its Final Environmental Impact Statement, citing an "omitted comment letter."

But the explanation only raises more questions:

- How does a single missing comment justify withdrawing an entire FEIS?
- Why did this error only surface after publication?
- What else was overlooked?
- Why rush to resubmit instead of committing to true public accountability?

This withdrawal undermines trust in the process and highlights the fundamental instability of the proposal.

# This Is Not the Project Our Community Was Told to Expect

The University of the Nations' plan is not:

· culturally grounded,

- · environmentally safe,
- aligned with original zoning intentions, or
- in balance with our community's needs.

It is an **extractive**, **expansionist**, **religious business model** that concentrates land, power, water, and influence into the hands of one institution — at the expense of the people of Kona.

## I urge you to reject this proposal.

Kona deserves development that:

- protects our 'āina and wai,
- · honors Hawaiian culture, history, and especially its archeological sites,
- · keeps our residents safe,
- · respects zoning integrity, and
- strengthens our multicultural community not replaces it.

Please do the right thing. Reject the University of the Nations Master Plan Update.
