Description of property:

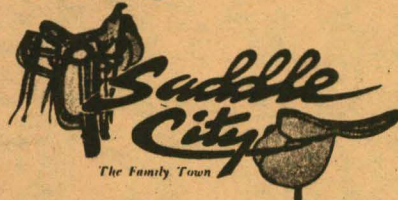

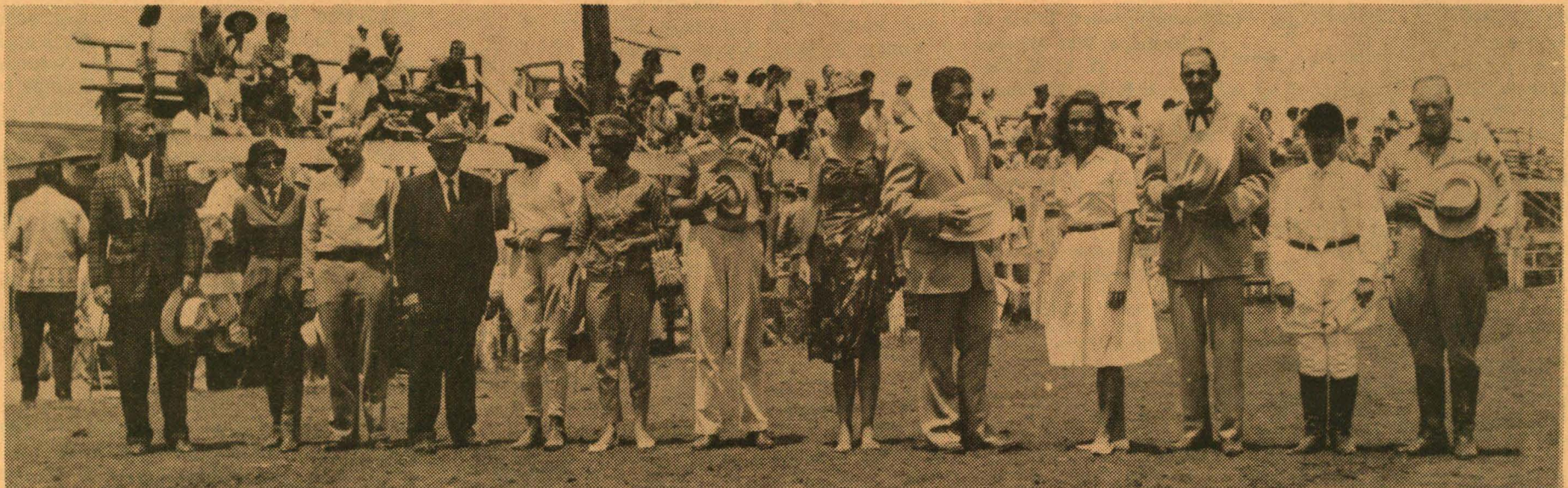
Girl Scout Mounted Troop 11

We made quite a profit on our shaved ice sales too. This cold stuff with the juice is real popular.

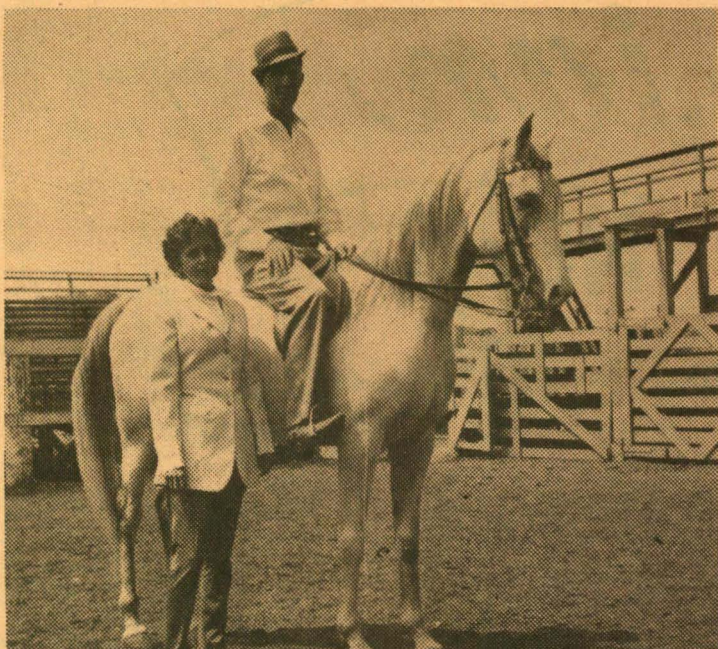

I think that the best de-
scription of our children is
exemplified in our Pony Club
Pledge, which is as follows:

"As a member of the
United States Pony Club,
I stand for the best in
sportsmanship as well as
horsemanship. I shall com-
pete for the enjoyment of
the game well played, and
take winning or losing in
stride, remembering that
without good manners and
good temper, sport loses
its cause for being.

I shall endeavor to main-
tain the best traditions of
the ancient and noble skill
of horsemanship, always
treating my horse with
consideration due a part-
ner. I shall strive at all
times to uphold the high
ideals of the Pony Club
and of my country."

Our dismounted meetings
alternating with the mounted
ones are moving along well
with good practical work com-
ing in heavy doses. I am cer-
tain that our last meeting
proved that cleaning tack and
reassembling it can no longer
be taken for granted. Having
discussed our programming at
mounted sessions with you last
month and a bit about our pro-
gram from a practical stand-
point in the sentence above,
now seems to be an appropri-

ate time to describe our ef-
ficiency certificates and rat-
ings.

Certificates are awarded by
the Pony Club as an encour-
agement to members to take
an interest in their work and
to improve their knowledge.

There are four standards of
efficiency: A, B, C and D of
which A is the highest and D
the lowest.

It is the intent of the Pony
Club that these ratings be not
merely the passing of tests
but rather a state of being.
When a member reaches a cer-
tain age and sense of respon-
sibility, he is potentially qual-
ified to be tested for upgrading
if he has the skill, knowledge
and ability of a more advanced
horseman. Failure to be up-
graded at the proper time
could result in unfair compe-
tition at inter-club rallies and
a misunderstanding of Pony
Club standards.

Our test requirements
are set-up on the national level
allowing for flexibility on the
regional and local levels. The
Lio Lii testing program is be-
ing prepared by the instructors
... our first test day will un-
doubtedly be sometime in the
near future. In the meantime,
we are having fun while we
learn ... ask any of the moth-
ers and fathers who are listen-
ing and learning with us.

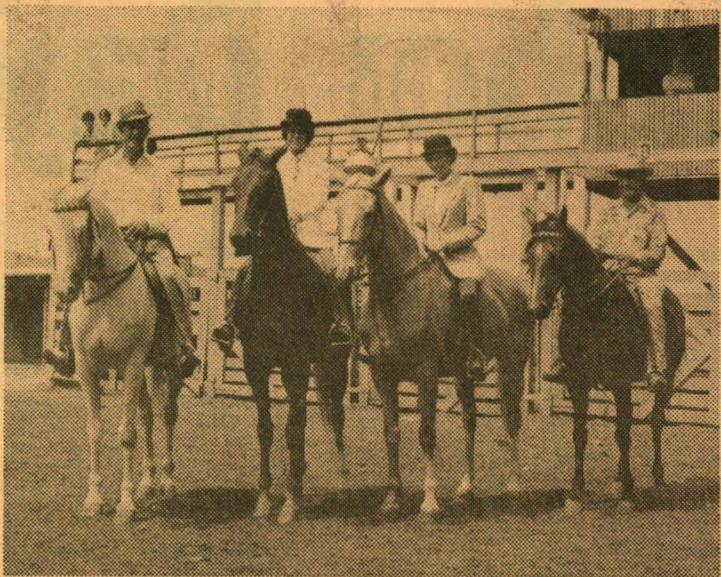

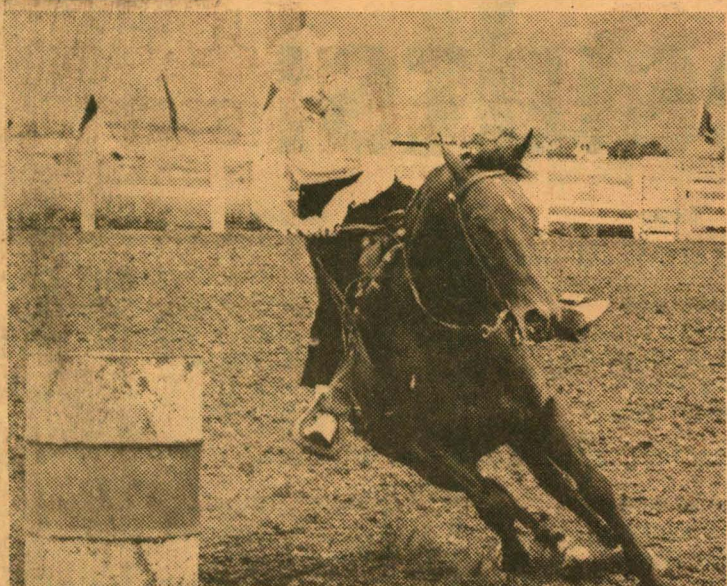

Gayle graduated from Kailua High School in 1959 and from Kapiolani Technical School in 1961.

Then, Miss Liput took the big step and became Mrs. MacDonald on January 13, 1962. She gave her hand in matrimony to Gary MacDonald from Scott City, Kansas. Gary is now Assistant Trainer at Weaver Ranch in Waimanalo.

Gary is quite a rodeo fan, too. He's an up-and-coming calf roper. Both Gary and Gayle are great inspirations to each other. Isn't it wonderful to see such enthusiastic horse interest in one family?

Ella serves as Secretary and Treasurer of the Hawaii Quarter Horse Association, and is a member of the American Horse Shows Association, American Quarter Horse Association, and the Rodeo Cowboy's Association, in which she is an official timer for rodeo events. Ella has shown actively at many shows and has won many stock horse and Western pleasure classes.

Ella is also a star in another right. This March and April she doubled and stood in for one of the stars for Paramount Studio's production "Diamond Head," which meant doing all the riding for Yvette Mimieux. Filmed on Kauai, this movie should be released at the end of this year. The excellent cast includes Charlton Heston, Yvette Mimieux, George Chakaris, Jimmy Darin, and Eliabeth Allen. The leading lady Yvette was mounted on Ella's Palomino Quarter horse, "Elkhorn Mark" and Jimmy Darin rode another of the Brown's Quarter horses, "Star Speck," throughout the picture.

The Browns have three children, Bob junior, Ramona, and Bruce. They seem to be following in the footsteps of the parents both in fondness for horses and ability to ride them.

If anyone does not know Ella personally, it is a cinch that they may see her at work at the next "horsey" event of the islands. At the Saddle City's Jackpot Rodeos she may be found, as she terms it "in the Crow's nest," handling the official clock for the events. Whether timing, organizing, or secretarialing if Ella is responsible, one can be sure it will be a well run, smoothly handled event. Next month there will be more news and I hope to start an "Outstanding Drill Member" feature. Until then . . . aloha.

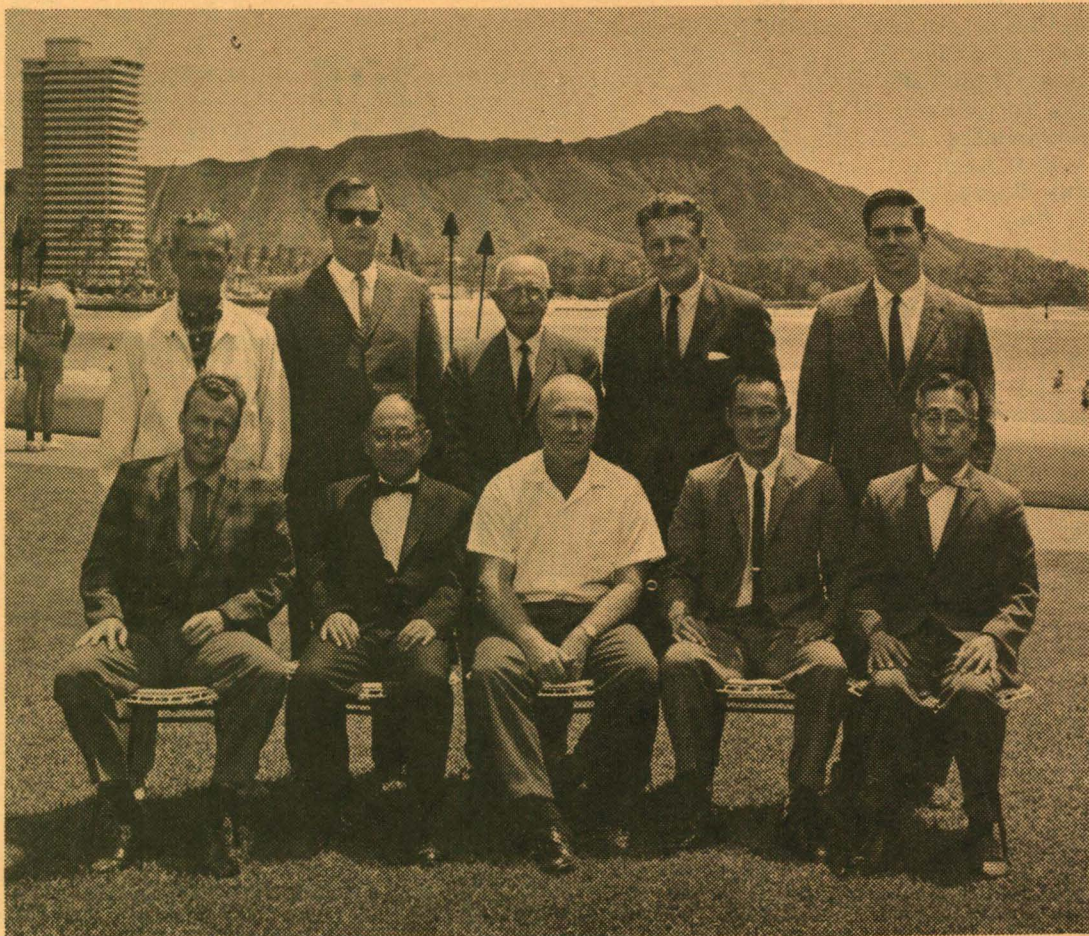

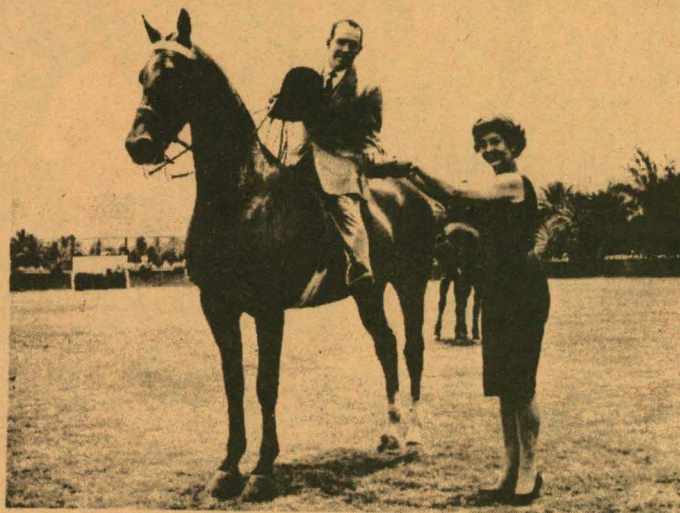

STAFF REPORT

SP(T) 62-20

Temporary District Classification: AGRICULTURAL

APPLICATION OF DEE GIBSON (SP(T)62-20), for Special Permit to erect and operate a small food-serving and bar facility on property described as TMK 4-1-13: 02, containing 3.728 acres, situated in Waimanalo, Oahu, approximately 1200 feet makai of Kalaniana'ole Highway.

The petitioner has stated that he is the owner in fee of subject property and is utilizing the property and other surrounding parcels for the caring and exercising of houses, and equestrian use.

With reference to testimony received during the public hearing on this matter, subsequent communication from Mr. Leighton Louis on behalf of the applicant, and additional investigation by the staff, the following comments and recommendations are made:

1. The applicant has, over the past several years, engaged in a legal operation which, through its success, has engendered a demand for additional food-service which, though it could possibly not succeed on its own, may very well be a proper adjunct to the existing operation, provided the plans of the City and County are not interfered with, and health standards are maintained.
2. Regardless of whether or not the Land Use Commission could allow a use which the City and County would not allow, such an action without further approval of the local agencies has not in the past, and is not now, recommended.

3. No proposed public use of this or adjacent land, leased by the applicant or not, should be given weight in the consideration as to whether or not a restaurant and bar facility should be allowed on the subject property. Rather, consideration should be based on the question as to whether the proposed operation is a reasonable, as well as an unusual, request in this particular situation.

The staff believes that the applicant should be given permission to carry his case further, to the appropriate State and City-County agencies; and accordingly recommends approval of a food-serving and bar facility, subject to the following conditions, in the interests of proper commercial-recreational development of the area, community appearance, convenience and safety:

1. That approval of the City and County of Honolulu be secured for all uses, which may, if the City and County approves, include a food-serving (restaurant) and bar facility.
2. That approval of the City and County of Honolulu be secured for all structures and improvements, and for siting, arrangement and exterior design of same; for design of vehicular access, egress, circulation and parking layout; and
3. That the City and County of Honolulu may require and specify allowable upper limits of density of occupancy, maximum building heights, minimum setbacks and distances between buildings, adequate utilities and adequate offstreet parking to serve the approved uses; and may require that the property be landscaped in keeping with resort use and the surrounding area, and to screen unsightly areas from public view; *and*

Gentlemen:

I wish to thank you for the opportunity to present facts and express my client's views on his application for a special permit during the public hearing held on Wednesday, September 19.

At the public hearing, no party other than myself had presented concrete evidence nor made any recommendations protesting against the proposed use; however, I wish to file additional comments to help clarify the applicant's position.

1. The applicant does not hide the fact that there is an area set aside for the cooking and dispensing of food which resembles a small size kitchen, similar to a large ranch house facility. Chuck wagon style of serving has been conducted and is an incidental operation of the ranch, rodeo, and equestrian activities. Because of the growth in Saddle City's operations and the increase in the number of users of the facilities, daily operations of the chuck wagon type of facilities are desirable and requested by the patrons. In addition, the patrons have continually requested the privilege of being served with beer and liquor as they congregate to discuss their common interests--breeding, care, training of horses and other related activities.

2. Although the use of the mess hall and the kitchen facilities, as they now exist to serve the patrons of Saddle City, is and can be considered an incidental operation, the applicant wishes to eliminate any doubt of the legality of enlarging and improving his facilities to serve a growing clientele.


He does not desire to invest heavily in food dispensing facilities or new building construction without having clear cut authorization to serve food and liquor as part of Saddle City's operation.

3. Notwithstanding the present City and County ordinances, the undersigned is of the opinion that your Honorable Commission may grant a special permit for the uses requested as stated in Section 7 of Act 187. To elucidate, Section 3 of said Act states: "Zoning powers granted the county under Sections 138-42 shall govern the zoning within the districts," Section 7 of said Act states: "The commission may permit, by regulation, certain unusual and reasonable uses other than those for which the district is classified." This latter sentence states in no uncertain term, that the commission, notwithstanding the zoning district created by the county, may permit unusual and reasonable uses (within agricultural districts). Section 7 goes further and states: "If any person desires to use his land in a certain specified manner but is denied such use because.... (b) Either the county planning commission rules that the use for which the district in which his land is situated is classified or the regulations adopted by the commission do not permit such desired use, he may petition the commission for permission to use his land in the manner desired." This provision states that the Land Use Commission may grant permission for the special use when the local zoning laws prohibit such use. Therefore, it seems clear to the undersigned that although Act 187 permits the county governments to retain their zoning powers within the agriculture and urban districts, the Act also gave the Land Use Commission the authority and power to grant special permits for uses prohibited by or not provided for by the local zoning laws.

4. The operations conducted by Saddle City over the short period of two years and its growth from a \$75,000 per annum business to over \$200,000 per annum indicates the demand and need for these types of facilities. Saddle City has the most complete range for equestrian activities on the entire island and in order to serve this growing activity and business, food and liquor serving facilities should be provided on a daily basis. There appears no doubt as to the desirability of the requested operations as part of the services rendered to the thousands of people who utilize and enjoy Saddle City's facilities. I believe that your Honorable Commission can provide aid to the economic development for the State of Hawaii by encouraging and providing for this type of operation.

Reference is made to your request for comments and recommendations regarding an application for a Special Permit by Mr. Dee Gibson, dba Saddle City, to operate a bar and restaurant as an incidental use to equestrian activities conducted at Waimanalo, Oahu.

The Planning Commission at its meeting on Thursday, September 13, 1962, reviewed the matter. The staff made a field check of the premises and reported to the Commission as follows:

1. The area in question is about a quarter mile in from Kalaniana'ole Highway served by a coral road and a large parking area.
2. There are four structures. One is used as an office, the second for selling saddles, the third is unused, and the fourth seems to be operated as a restaurant. A thorough check of this use could not be made since the building was locked.
3. A stable for horses.

September 19, 1962

The Acting Planning Director reported that the area in question is general planned for fair ground purposes by the State. The existing operation established about two years ago is not a non-conforming use since zoning of the area to Rural Protective zone, by Resolution No. 563, became effective in 1954. There may be a question of legality of the suspected operation of a restaurant on the premises. The operation in essence is a "dude ranch" and as such it could be established in a resort area where restaurant facilities and the concessionary uses will be permissible.

The Commission raised the following questions which remained unanswered:

- a) How soon does the State intend to develop the subject area for fair ground purposes?
- b) Will the equestrian activities cease should the State revoke the lease, or is there sufficient land for the petitioner to continue his operation?

After further deliberation, the Commission voted to advise your Honorable Body that action will be deferred due to insufficiency of data to base an appropriate recommendation.
