The above Special Permit was approved by the Land Use Commission on December 17, 1971 and allowed the petitioner, Boise Cascade Recreation Communities Group (now known as Boise Cascade Realty Group) to establish a quarry and allied uses on 309 acres of land in the Agricultural District at Waikoloa, South Kohala, Hawaii.

One of the conditions of approval of the Special Permit was that it shall expire within five years from the date of approval by the Land Use Commission. By letter dated August 2, 1976, Mr. Walt Southward, petitioner's Manager of Public Affairs, has requested that the expiration date of December 17, 1976 be extended for a period of five years to December 17, 1981.

In support of the extension request, Mr. Southward indicates that:

"Nearly all of the materials quarried from this site are used in road building and manufacturing concrete, with the exception of some material that will be used for golf course cover material. The rock quarried consists primarily of aa lava and basalt (blue rock).

"The materials quarried at the makai site are a better quality rock than that found in the mauka quarry located near Waikoloa Village.

"Another factor in the need for a quarry at the makai location is the five mile distance between the two quarries, over a road that is a steep climb from about 150 feet elevation to 900 feet elevation. Standard industry estimates indicate that the cost of hauling quarried material is at least 20 cents per ton mile; thus the excess cost for each 20-ton truck load of material quarried and transported from the mauka quarry to the lower area would be \$20.

"For major road work, this additional cost of transportation would be a substantial amount.

"The makai quarry provided much of the base course and all of the AC paving for the Queen Kaahumanu Highway, and is expected to provide all of the material for the Waikoloa Beach Resort.

"The quarry continues to play a very important part in the operations of Waikoloa, and with the anticipated development of the Waikoloa Beach Resort, will continue to be of importance to us.

"All of the conditions established by the Planning Commission at its meeting of October 14, 1971, and adopted by the Land Use Commission, are being adhered to."

For the Commission's information, there are two other quarries within the Waikoloa development. The Pu'u Hina'i Quarry is at a cinder cone of the same name. This quarry provides a heavily burnt 'a'a and ash material which is used as a form of topsoil for nursery and landscaping operations. It also provides the cover material for the petitioner's sanitary landfill. The other site has been identified as the Village Quarry and provides basically a blue rock aggregate which is used for road construction and base course material. The petitioner presently uses material from this quarry site for the construction of driveways, paved areas and road repairs and expects to use it in the future for road construction in the remaining urban classified area of Waikoloa Village. The Village quarry has also been the source of base course for the County for road maintenance in the area. At this quarry there is a screening plant, rock crusher, scales and AC and concrete batching plants.

These two quarry sites were established by Special Permit 70-85, approved by the State Land Use Commission on December 11, 1970. A 5-year time extension until December 11, 1980, on the Special Permit for these two quarries and related uses was granted by the State Land Use Commission on December 23, 1975.

At its meeting on September 30, 1976, the Hawaii County Planning Commission voted to approve a five year extension based on the following considerations:

"That the subject quarry site is a necessary and integral part of the petitioner's overall development. The material obtained from the site is used to meet various construction needs. The subject quarry provides quality 'a'a and basalt (blue rock) which is used as base course and subbase material for road construction as well as for manufacturing concrete and for golf course cover material. These materials are essential for the improvements which must be made by the petitioner.

"The petitioner's development is an ongoing project, and the need for the quarry operation and allied uses allowed by the Special Permit will continue for sometime into the future. The petitioner has made substantial improvements to date in the form of water, sewer, electricity, telephone service, roads, etc. Other amenities (including an 18-hole golf course, a clubhouse and restaurant, tennis courts, a swimming pool, equestrian center, condominium units and a general store) have been developed. It is also expected that the petitioner will proceed with the development of the makai resort area in the near future. The quarrying operations have been essential in the development of improvements and amenities there and will continue to be essential for further improvements, particularly in the makai area of the project.

"In addition, it is determined that approval of the continuation of the quarrying operations and allied uses will contribute to the petitioner's compliance with the intent, purpose and requirements of land use changes which were previously approved. The continuance of these operations and allied uses will have minimal adverse effects on public health and welfare.

"It is further recommended that approval of the extension request be subject to all conditions stipulated in the granting of the original Special Permit. In addition, the petitioner shall comply with all applicable Department of Health regulations.

"Should the stated conditions not be met, the Special Permit shall be deemed null and void."

Staff presented background information on file with recommendation for a public hearing. Staff pointed out the feasibility of providing the front lot with the 40,095 square foot area and the rear lot with the 43,561 square foot area because the easement area of 2,769 square feet would further reduce the size of the rear lot.

Representative Donald Murray of Murray, Smith & Associates stated that the applicant has no objections to switching the lot sizes. He mentioned that although the adjacent parcel is zoned RS-10, the applicant desires a fairly large lot, therefore, she had elected to apply for a variance rather than a zone change.

Mr. Murakami moved for a public hearing; seconded by Mr. Sakamoto; carried.

Time extension request to Special Permit No. 71-117 granted by the State Land Use Commission on December 17, 1971. The Special Permit allowed the operation of a quarry, including allied uses such as a portable screening plant, rock crusher, and scales until December 17, 1976. The quarry site, consisting of 309 acres, is located mauka of the Queen Kaahumanu Highway and along the Waikoloa Road, Waikoloa, South Kohala, TMK: 6-8-01:portion of 5.

Staff presented background information with recommendation for a five-year extension to allow the continuance of quarry operations and allied uses, based on the findings and with conditions, on file.

Representative Walt Southward stated that he had no further comments to offer on the staff report. He pointed out the location of the quarry on the drawing and stated that it is situated about 3/4 mile from Queen Kaahumanu Highway. He indicated that at the present time, the quarry use is very light; but when the work in the resort area begins, it would be in operation five days a week.

Mr. Mielcke moved to send a favorable recommendation to the SLUC for a fiveyear extension for the reasons and with the conditions as outlined by the staff; seconded by Mr. Asai; carried unanimously.

Staff presented background information with recommendation for a time extension until March 6, 1977.

Representative Ted Sugai, Real Estate Officer of the Department of Public Works, Bureau of Plans and Survey, stated that the acquisition of the 10-foot strip along Kekuanaoa Street would also include the necessary radius curve on Kanoelehua. Additional 10-foot strip on the mauka side of Kekuanaoa Street will also be acquired from the State for the widening of that street, according to the representative.

Mr. Murakami moved to approved the time extension according to the staff recommendation; seconded by Mr. Asai; carried.

The Planning Commission at its meeting of September 16, 1976 considered the above request for a time extension to Special Permit No. 71-117 granted by the State Land Use Commission on December 17, 1971. The Special Permit allowed the operation of a quarry, including allied uses until December 17, 1976. The quarry site, consisting of 309 acres, is located at Waikoloa, South Kohala, Hawaii. The Commission then voted to recommend to the State Land Use Commission a five-year extension to allow the continuance of quarry operations and allied uses.

We learned today that certain provisions of the Sunshine Law had not been fully complied with. Chapter 92-7, HRS, requires, in part, that the agenda be filed with the County Clerk's office at least seventy-two hours before the meeting; additionally, the law requires that a copy of the agenda be mailed to the press. Because of an oversight, those activities were not done.

The law further notes that any final action taken in violation of the Sunshine Law shall be voidable upon proof of willful violation. We contend that there has not been a willful violation of the law; it was an inadvertent oversight on our part. Thus, the meeting could probably be left to stand.

Nonetheless, after discussing this matter with our Corporation Counsel, Planning Commission Chairman, and the Mayor; the Mayor encouraged the Commission to reschedule another meeting to fulfill the "spirit" of the Sunshine Law. The Mayor further noted that because the agenda was not filed with the County Clerk's office and the press did not have a copy, the public may not have had a

reasonable opportunity to provide its comments to the Commission. More so, such a meeting would be needed to eliminate even the appearance of having a secret meeting.

As such, we would like to apologize for this inconvenience, but beg your understanding of this matter.

# TIME EXTENSION: BOISE CASACADE REALTY GROUP - SP 71-117

Boise Cascade Realty Group, formerly known as Boise Cascade

Recreation Communities Group, has submitted a request for a 5-year time
extension of Special Permit 71-117. Special Permit 71-117 was
granted by the State Land Use Commission on December 17, 1971 and
allowed the operation of a quarry and allied uses such as a portable
screening plant, rock crusher and scales within the State Land Use
Agricultural District. The subject quarry site consists of 309
acres and is located mauka of the Queen Ka'ahumanu Highway and along
Waikoloa Road in Waikoloa, South Kohala (TMK: 6-8-01:por 5). It is
approximately one (1) mile east of the Anaeho'omalu Urban District and
3-1/2 miles west of the Waikoloa Urban District.

One of the conditions of approval of the Special Permit was that it shall expire within 5 years from the date of approval by the State Land Use Commission. The petitioner is requesting that the expiration date of December 17, 1976 be extended to December 17, 1981. In the original Special Permit application, the petitioner had requested a 10-year permit.

In support of the subject request, the petitioner has stated the following:

"...The quarry in question provides a base course material and a subbase material for road construction.

"Nearly all of the materials quarried from this site are used in road building and manufacturing concrete, with the exception of some material that will be used for golf course cover material. The rock quarried consists primarily of aa lava and basalt (blue rock).

"The materials quarried at the makai site are a better quality rock than that found in the mauka quarry located near Waikoloa Village.

"Another factor in the need for a quarry at the makai location is the five mile distance between the two quarries, over a road that is a steep climb from about 150 feet elevation to 900 feet elevation. Standard industry estimates indicate that the cost of hauling quarried material is at least 20 cents per ton mile; thus the excess cost for each 20-ton truck load of material quarried and transported from the mauka quarry to the lower area would be \$20.

"For major road work, this additional cost of transportation would be a substantial amount.

"The makai quarry provided much of the base course and all of the AC paving for the Queen Kaahumanu Highway, and is expected to provide all of the material for the Waikoloa Beach Resort.

"The quarry continues to play a very important part in the operations of Waikoloa, and with the anticipated development of the Waikoloa Beach Resort, will continue to be of importance to us.

"All of the conditions established by the Planning Commission at its meeting of October 14, 1971, and adopted by the Land Use Commission, are being adhered to."

For the Commission's information, there are two other quarries within the Waikoloa development. The Pu'u Hina'i Quarry is at a cinder cone of the same name. This quarry provides a heavily burnt 'a'a and ash material which is used as a form of topsoil for nursery and landscaping operations. It also provides the cover material for the petitioner's sanitary landfill. The other site has been identified as the Village Quarry and provides basically a blue rock aggregate which is used for road construction and base course material. The petitioner presently uses material from this quarry site for the construction of driveways, paved areas and road repairs and expects to use it in the future for road construction in the remaining urban classified area of Waikoloa Village. The Village quarry has also been the source of base course for the County for road maintenance in the area. At this quarry there is a screening plant, rock crusher, scales and AC and concrete batching plants.

These two quarry sites were established by Special Permit 70-85, approved by the State Land Use Commission on December 11, 1970. A 5-year time extension until December 11, 1980, on the Special Permit for these two quarries and related uses was granted by the State Land Use Commission on December 23, 1975, as recommended by this Planning Commission.

#### RECOMMENDATION: BOISE CASCADE REALTY GROUP - TIME EXTENSION

It is recommended that the request for a five-year extension to Special Permit 71-117 to allow the continuance of quarry operations and allied uses be given a favorable recommendation, based on the following considerations:

That the subject quarry site is a necessary and integral part of the petitioner's overall development. The material obtained from the site is used to meet various construction needs. The subject quarry provides quality 'a'a and basalt (blue rock) which is used as base course and subbase material for road construction as well as for manufacturing concrete and for golf course cover material. These materials are essential for the improvements which must be made by the petitioner.

The petitioner's development is an ongoing project, and the need for the quarry operation and allied uses allowed by the Special Permit will continue for sometime into the future. The petitioner has made substantial improvements to date in the form of water, sewer, electricity, telephone service, roads, etc. Other amenities fincluding an 18-hole golf course, a clubhouse and restaurant, tennis courts, a swimming pool, equestrian center, condominium units and a general store; have been developed. It is also expected that the petitioner will proceed with the development of the makai resort area in

the near future. The quarrying operations have been essential in the development of improvements and amenities there and will continue to be essential for further improvements, particularly in the makai area of the project.

In addition, it is determined that approval of the continuation of the quarrying operations and allied uses will contribute to the petitioner's compliance with the intent, purpose and requirements of land use changes which were previously approved. The continuance of these operations and allied uses will have minimal adverse effects on public health and welfare.

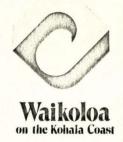

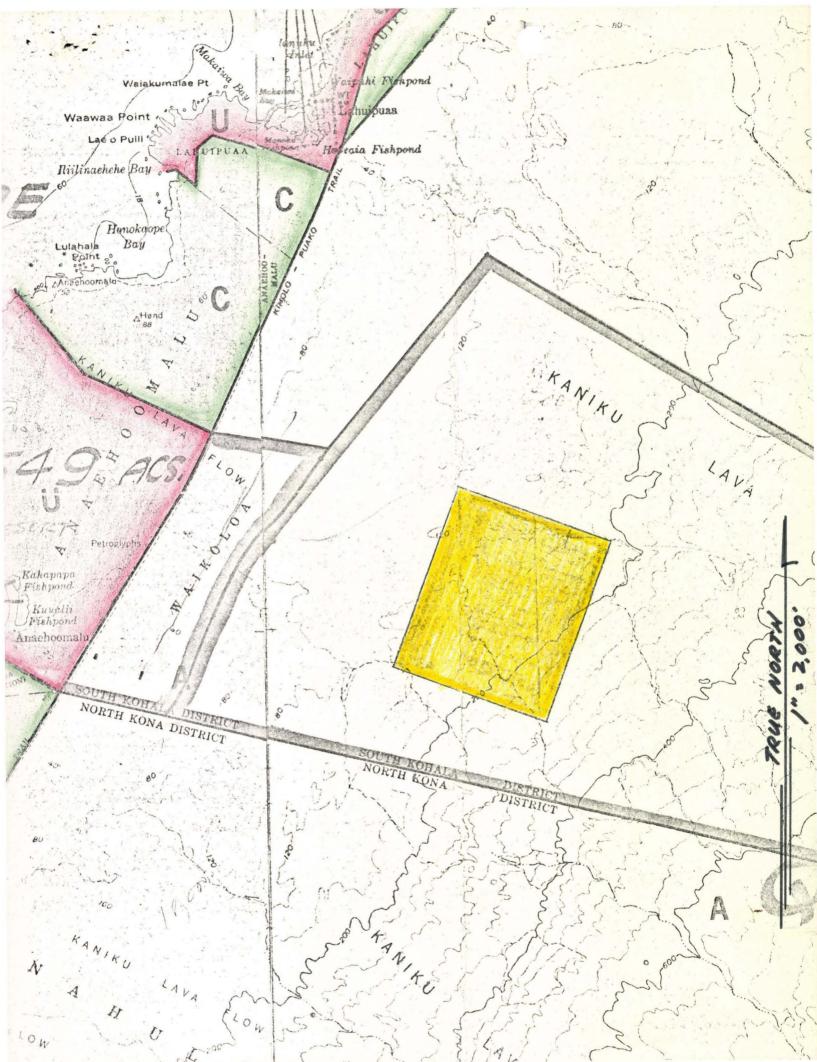

Mr. Ah Sung Leong, staff planner, presented the staff memo recommending approval of the special permit, based on staff's findings, subject to the four conditions established by the Hawaii County Planning Commission, and subject also to the fifth condition which was reconsidered and deleted by the Hawaii County Planning Commission (see copy of report on file).

Mr. Leong described the subject property on the district map.

Mr. Walt Southward, Manager of Public Affairs for Boise Cascade, commended the staff for its comprehensive summary of petitioner's request. However, he requested that the Land Use Commission concur with the Hawaii County Planning Commission's recommendation that condition #5 be deleted, since it would be mutually advantageous for the petitioner as well as its neighboring industrial establishments, if petitioner were allowed the flexibility of selling quarry material removed from the subject site. He added that Boise Cascade did not anticipate going into the guarry business but the availability of quarry material may help to lower the operation cost for some adjacent industry.

In response to questions raised by staff and the Commissioners, Mr. Southward advised that initially 100% of the material will be used by the petitioner, and that there were presently two quarries located in the general area.

Commissioner Sakahashi moved that the special permit be approved with the deletion of condition #5 restricting the sale of quarry material, subject to the conditions imposed by the Hawaii County Planning Commission. motion was seconded by Commissioner Kido and unanimously carried.

SPECIAL PERMIT APPLICATION BY CONCRETE INDUSTRIES (SP71-118) TO OPERATE A PORTABLE CONCRETE BATCHING PLANT AT HONOKOWAI, MAUI

Mr. Fujimoto, Executive Officer, read the staff report recommending approval of this request subject to the condi tions imposed by the Maui County Planning Commission, as amended, and with the further conditions imposed by the Land Use Commission (see copy of report on file).

Mr. Fujimoto confirmed that a copy of the letter from the State Department of Transportation concurring with the suitable access to the Honoapiilani Highway was on file in the records.

#### STAFF REPORT

SP71-117 - BOISE CASCADE RECREATION COMMUNITIES GROUP

A special permit to allow the operation of a quarry, including allied uses such as a portable screening plant, rock crusher, and scales within the State Land Use Agricultural District has been requested by Boise Cascade Recreation Communities Group. The subject site comprises approximately 309 acres and is located at Waikoloa, South Kohala, Hawaii, Tax Map Key 6-8-01: 5.

The applicant has submitted maps and metes and bounds which specifically identify the area in question.

The applicant states that there exists a need for crushed aggregate for various construction needs within the Waikoloa project. Some of the construction projects which will utilize the quarry material include roads, a golf course, curbs and gutters, drainage structures, water storage tanks, encasements for ducts and other structures such as bridges.

The applicant has submitted the following in support of his special permit request:

 The subject area has been designated as a desirable site for quarrying clinker material by Ahsing, Mills and Associates, Soil Consultants. Boise Cascade intends to remove aggregates for construction on an "as needed" basis.

· · ·

- 3. At the end of quarrying operations, a grading plan will be done, the natural contours will be restored and the site will be made to appear as natural open space.
- 4. The request will not be materially detrimental to public health, safety, and general welfare, nor will it be injurious to property rights relating to the adjacent property owners because:
  - a. The nearest property owner is approximately

    ½ to 1 mile from the subject site.
  - b. Lava flows occur extensively throughout the proposed site indicating minimum dust problem.
  - c. No urban population exists within 7 miles of the site.
- 5. The denial of this special permit would result in practical difficulties and unnecessary hardship because Boise Cascade would then have to import processed aggregate from an existing quarry located approximately 6 miles away.

Two quarry sites already exist on the Waikoloa project site. The makai site #1 is a cinder quarry; and, the lower site #2 consists of a blue rock aggregate source, crusher plant, repair shop, and an A.C. and concrete batching plant.

The proposed quarry site (referred to as site #3 on map) is presently vacant and characterized by extensive lave lands. The Anaehoomalu Urban District is about a mile west of the subject area, and the Waikoloa Urban District is approximately 3½ miles to the east. The access road to the Anaehoomalu Urban District runs along the northern boundary of the subject area.

The Land Study Bureau classification shows that the parent material of the subject area consists of an and pahoehoe with sharp and clinkers, contains no soil material, is unsuited for machine tillage, contains slopes ranging from 0 to 20 percent, and is very poorly suited for overall agricultural use. The mean annual rainfall ranges from 15 to 20 inches, and the elevation is about 200 feet above see level. The prevailing winds are from the ocean blowing inland in a westerly or northwesterly direction.

At its October 14, 1971 meeting, the Hawaii County
Planning Commission recommended approval of this special
permit based on the following findings:

- "1. That the desired use would not adversely affect surrounding property. The proposed use may be looked upon as being of a temporary nature, and highly desirable for the development of the entire project.
- "2. That such use would not unreasonably burden public agencies to provide additional services.

"3. That the proposed use will not substantially alter or change the essential character of the land and the present use. "4. That the proposed use will make the highest and best use of the land involved for the public welfare. The quarry operation and allied uses will be of great benefit and convenience to the development of the Waikoloa project." The approval was subject to the following conditions: "1. That all State and County standards and appropriate safety measures be taken by the applicant to safeguard vehicular traffic during the entire period of the operation, 24 hours a day. "2. That the applicant shall take every precaution not to create any inconvenience from noise and dust

- problems during the operation.
- "3. That the operation be confined within the metes and bounds descriptions as submitted.
- "4. That this permit shall expire within 5 years from the date of approval by the State Land Use Commiscion should the agency approve this request. If, at the end of 5 years, the applicant reapplies for the special permit and is denied, or if the applicant fails to reapply for the special permit, then all temporary support facilities, along with equipment. will be removed. A grading plan will then be done and the natural contours will be restored. At the end of quarrying operations, the site shall appear as natural open space and not as a scar on the landscape.
- "5. The materials removed from the subject site shall be restricted to use within their own development."

By letter dated November 16, 1971, the Hawaii County Planning Commission wrote that:

"This is to inform you that the Planning Commission, at its meeting of November 11, 1971 reconsidered the fifth condition imposed on the permit. It was voted to allow the sale of excavated material and not limit the use to their own development; and with this allowance, it was recommended that an annual check be made by the staff to see that there is a reasonable control on the excavation."

Upon evaluation of this request, staff finds that:

- 1. The applicant has supplied sufficient information concerning the actual scope and operation of the quarrying and processing activities including a site selection analysis by Ahsing, Mills, and Associates.
- The quarrying operation would not unreasonably burden public agencies to provide services.
- 3. The proposed quarry site is remotely situated and will have little, if any, adverse effect on neighboring populated areas.
- 4. Although the quarry operation and allied uses would somewhat alter the physical character of the land. the applicant has stated that every effort will be made to simulate contours which will appear natural in character to the surrounding area after quarrying operations terminate. The County has also included a condition which assures that a grading plan will be done and natural contours restored.
- 5. The applicant has stated that according to the Bishop Museum, no historical sites, caves or

burial grounds, etc. are situated on the proposed quarry site.

that tentative design for the Kailua-Kawaihae

Coastal Highway will run approximately 1 mile makai of the subject area. The scheduled operation for the highway is sometime in 1976. The tentatively scheduled completion date of the highway, which closely coincides with the termination date of the special permit, alleviates the concern that the quarry operation will be visually distracting from the new highway.

Based on the above findings, staff recommends approval of this request, subject to the 4 conditions established by the Hawaii County Planning Commission. With regard to condition #5 which was reconsidered and deleted by the Hawaii County Planning Commission at its meeting of November 11, 1971, the Land Use Commission staff feels that the restriction is justified and reasonable, and should be imposed for the reason that all of the evidence submitted by the petitioner in substantiation of his request relates to the needs of the Waikoloa project. No evidence has been submitted to justify the use of the quarried material for other projects, nor was there any mention in the application that the material was partly intended for commercial purposes.

Mr. Veriato moved to approve as circulated the minutes of the special meeting held on October 14, 1971 and the first part (20 pages) of the minutes of the regular meeting held on October 28, 1971 and hold the second part in abeyance. The motion was seconded by Mr. Kawasaki and carried unanimously.

Mr. Veriato requested for staff recommendation;

Staff Planner Onuma recommended approval based on the following findings:

- 1. Proposed uses are deemed justifiable and desirable because of the great distance from any support facilities for residents in this area.
- Gradual build up of area (approximately 75 homes) substantiates need.

Recommendation for approval is subject to the following conditions:

- Proposed development shall conform to all applicable regulations including "Plan Approval."
- Plan shall substantially follow sketch as submitted with the application.
- Construction shall begin within one year from the date of approval 3. should the State Land Use Commission grant this permit or special permit shall be deemed null and void.

RECONSIDERATION The Vice Chairman announced that the request LAND USE COMMISSION by Boise Cascade for reconsideration on the SPECIAL PERMIT condition imposed in their special permit to BOISE CASCADE RECREATION operate a quarry at Waikoloa was not taken COMMUNITIES up for action at the last meeting. He called WAIKOLOA, SOUTH KOHALA on the staff for background information. The Deputy Director stated that on this matter, the Planning Commission approved the special permit to operate a quarry in Waikoloa for the Boise Cascade development. Under this approval, a condition was imposed to restrict use of material within their own development. The letter received from Boise Cascade requested that this be deleted from the condition. They requested for reconsideration of this condition and this is what is before the Commission. Mr. Veriato inquired as to whether a similar stipulation was imposed on the Signal Properties' request.

The Deputy Director replied that no action was taken on their request.

Staff Planner Onuma explained that in their testimony, the Signal Properties specifically requested that they be allowed to sell from their quarry site for the construction of the coastal highway project.

The Deputy Director pointed out that the Commission concurred with the staff's recommendation that this condition be installed. He mentioned that previously, the Commission approved an earlier special permit to a quarry operation in Waikoloa in the upper area. The staff have since found that they have been using this quarry site, not only for their development, but for outside development. If this is the case, he felt that it is adequate as far as Waikoloa is concerned. He did not see why the Commission should approve two of these. Because the proposed site is in close proximity to the proposed highway, they were required to cover within 5 years, and it was felt that the materials from the site should be utilized only for their development.

Mr. Watt commented that it should be left the way it is unless they can come in with a definite proposal of exactly how many yards they are going to excavate and what they are going to do and how long they are going to be on this project.

Mr. Kawasaki expressed that they would have to determine why the Commission approved the special permit, such as the need of materials in their subdivision. In the case of Signal Properties, he stated that they are asking for a special permit to sell from their quarry.

Mr. Watt added that the bid on the road is let out in that area, so that there is a need; but there is no need in this area yet.

Mr. Kawasaki remarked that if Boise Cascade has come before the Commission asking for a special permit to quarry and sell at the same time, what would they have done in their action.

Mr. Watt expressed concern about too much excavation done near the high-way. He mentioned that if there should be more than one quarry in the area and if there is need when the highway construction gets close to their site, he did not see why they cannot apply again.

Messrs. Veriato and Kawasaki brought out that they have specifically stated the need for their own development and not for commercialization.

Mr. Don Korth, Project Construction Manager, stated that they didn't feel it necessary to mention that they might want to have this sold off because there had not been such restrictions in the previous quarry. As mentioned in their letter to the restriction that they had sold some materials from their first quarry for the Mauna Loa highway job in Kona, he indicated that it is expensive to set up a quarry operation; and pointed out that the more material that they can produce, the lower the cost, both in their project and for any other people that would require, such as the developers on their site - the hotel or condominium or individual home owners. He reiterated that if they can/a large quantity, it would be at a lower cost for them and the others. He mentioned that they are not in business of making money from the quarry. Mr. Watt queried as to whether they had anything definite in mind. Mr. Korth stated that they had recently come into agreement with Concrete Rock to handle their present quarry. They had made a change and that they are moving in there now according to him. Mr. Watt then asked whether he felt the other quarry was inadequately located even though they can sell outside. Mr. Korth replied that this second quarry is more advantageously /it is closer to the resort area; and if the new highway comes through, they could satisfy the other end. He stated that this is not an eyesore to the new highway because this is going to be on the far side of the Waikoloa road going down to the resort and that/State is only bringing their highway as far as the developer's road and the construction from there on to Kona won't be for several years. He reiterated that they have a 5 year restriction to operate and that they have to restore to its natural looking condition therefore he felt it won't be an eyesore. Mr. Watt inquired what type of a quarry it would be and whether they would be digging a hole in the ground or take away a hill. Mr. Korth stated that they have 300 acres so they will search around for their material that they need. They don't intend to make a hole because it is expensive to restore to natural state. He felt that this quarry would satisfy some of the need of the area when the State highway comes through. It would preclude the necessity of establishing a new quarry and they could make the material available to other people. He mentioned that at the termination of their operation, if they still need for their future use, they could come back for an extension. Mr. Kawasaki questioned whether their raw material is readily available and enough for their own resort area as well as to developers outside since they are talking about searching around the 300 acres. He thought it would be expensive to be moving around. Mr. Korth indicated that they know of some spots where it is desirable to start since they made some preliminary investigations and they figured that within that area, they would find what they need. He mentioned that they don't want to go into a wholesale quarry operation; and if they can lower the operation cost for themselves and for others, they will do it. He commented that the chances are they won't use all 300 acres and they can't use it within the 5 years. He mentioned that their resort development comes first; and at any time, there is a need or desire for outside purchasers, it would be sold only with their approval so that it would just/enough to keep their contractors going. It is a sideline; and having an ability to sell outside, they have an opportunity to sell and augment at a lower cost. He brought out that it might be lot more economical for the government to buy from this quarry than to run some 10 to 15 miles to another quarry. - 23 -

Mr. Watt commented that they might have to limit the yards of materials being taken away if it comes to worse, unless they put there back into shape.

Mr. Kawasaki wondered who would be policing the conditions that will be put on this special permit; and the staff replied the County is responsible.

Mr. Watt asked where can they sell it.

Mr. Korth stated that from the new quarry, it would not be economical to take it to Kona. The only potential would be between their project and the extension of the State Highway which was just let over to Kawaihae. He thought the Signal Oil is getting ready for options in this direction but he did not know what their intent is.

Mr. Watt moved to reconsider the condition imposed on the permit and to allow the sale of excavated material and not limit the use to their own development; and with this allowance, it was recommended that an annual check be made by the staff to see that there is a reasonable control on the excavation. The motion was seconded by Mr. Kawasaki and unanimously adopted.

MEETING SCHEDULE

The next meeting was suggested to be held in Kona on December 10 and that an annual get-together be planned for the evening following the meeting in the afternoon.

ADJOURNMENT

The Vice Chairman adjourned the meeting at 5:30 p.m.

## Planners Clear Way For Boise Permit 10-17-71

Hawaii County Planning Commission Thursday recommended that a special permit to operate a quarry at Waikoloa, South Kohala, be granted to Boise Cascade.

Boise Cascade now will ask for final approval from the State Land Use Commission.

In recommending approval, the commission laid down five restrictions. They are:

-Safety measures must be taken;

-Inconvenience due to dust and noise must be kept to the minimum;

-The size of the quarry must be same as stated in the application;

—The special permit will expire in five years and is subject to renewal or review; and

-Materials from the quarry must be used within Waikoloa. The quarry and its accessory facilities will be located in the makai portion of Boise Cascade's 31,000-acre complex.

Walt Southward, Boise Cascade's public affairs director for Waikoloa development, said restriction on the use of quarried materials may cause inconvenience, since, he said, the State might purchase materials to construct the proposed Kailua-Kawaihae Coastal highway.

Southward also pointed out the length of the permit may not be long enough because Boise Cascade may not be able to complete the development at Waikoloa in five years. Boise had requested

a ten-year permit.

The minutes of the regular meeting held on September 16, 1971 were approved as circulated on a motion by Mrs. Kahumoku, seconded by Mr. Kai and carried.

REPORT The Chairman announced that he had one item of interest to the members. This was a correspondence from the County Clerk stating that the action of the Hawaii County Council at its meeting of October 6 had approved and recommended passage of Bill 825 on first reading, which is the General Plan amendment.

LAND USE COMMISSION SPECIAL PERMIT BOISE CASCADE RECREATION COMMUNITIES GROUP WAIKOLOA, SOUTH KOHALA

Application to allow the operation of a quarry, including allied uses such as a portable screening plant, rock crusher and scales in Waikoloa, South Kohala.

Mr. Watt requested for staff recommendation.

Staff Planner Onuma stated that the staff evaluation of this request under the special permit guidelines as established by the State Land Use district regulations found that this application is in conformance with such based on the following findings:

- That the desired use would not adversely affect surrounding property. The proposed use may be looked upon as being of a temporary nature, and highly desirable for the development of the entire project.
- That such use would not unreasonably burden public agencies to provide additional services.

That the proposed use will not substantially alter or change the essential character of the land and the present use. That the proposed use will make the highest and best use of the land involved for the public welfare. The quarry operation and allied uses will be of great benefit and convenience to the development of the Waikoloa project. The staff recommended approval of the special permit request with the following amendment and conditions: That all State and County standards and appropriate safety measures be taken by the applicant to safeguard vehicular traffic during the entire period of the operation, 24 hours a day. That the applicant shall take every precaution not to create any inconvenience from noise and dust problems during the operation. That the operation be confined within the metes and bounds descriptions as submitted. That this permit shall expire within 5 years from the date of approval by the State Land Use Commission should the agency approve this request. If, at the end of 5 years, the applicant reapplies for the special permit and is denied, or if the applicant fails to reapply for the special permit, then all temporary support facilities, along with the equipment, shall be removed. A grading plan will then be done and the natural contours shall be restored. At the end of quarrying operations, the site shall appear as/natural open space, and not as a scar on the landscape. The materials removed from the subject site shall be restricted to use within their own development. The Chairman called on the representative for comments as far as compliance with the restrictions. Mr. Walt Southward, Manager of Public Affairs for Boise Cascade, stated that he sees no extreme problem except/the fifth provision which restricts removal of materials from the site other than for use within the development. He mentioned that the State is in the process of calling for bids for the highways from the Hapuna area to a point indicated on the map. They have not been approached nor have approached them, but should they want to buy materials from their quarry operator for use on that highway, he thought it would be of great convenience to the State and it would mean that they wouldn't have to haul materials from Kona. He expressed that this is a very spur-of-the-moment because they haven't researched nor asked whether they want to buy and they are not sure whether their demands wouldn't be so great that they wouldn't be able to sell. He stated that if the State would like to use these materials, it could mean that they would have to come back and ask for that exception from the restriction. He didn't think that they are going into quarry operation and he didn't think that is an overly necessary requirement. However, he agreed to abide by the Commission. Other than that, he pointed out that they did ask for a 10-year permit and the recommendation was for 5 years. He felt that they could possibly get a renewal at the end of 5 years as they envisioned at least 10 years to develop the makai area. Watt directed a question to the staff asking whether they would be will/to amend that to include for public use. - 2 -

The Deputy Director believed that this is a condition which the staff felt should be incorporated within this special permit at this time because a quarry site for the construction of State highways will be permitted as an accessory use. He didn't foresee any need for Boise Cascade to provide quarrying for the State highway at this time. He mentioned that there will be requests for other quarry sites also. He cited that the Signal Properties might be asking for it in the near future.

Mr. Watt so moved to recommend approval to the Land Use Commission based on the stipulations outlined by the staff. The motion was seconded by Mr. Kawasaki and adopted unanimously.

CHAIRMAN: I note also that the proposed State highway passes in close proximity to this area, and this project I think was being rushed up when you were asking for your quarrying operation for 10 years. Did you take this proximity of the quarrying and highway into consideration? Are there any natural features that would hide the quarry from the highway?

SOUTHWARD: I think that the pictures will show pretty much in direct line but there is a little bit of the roadway but also natural features of the type of ash that are present here that makes it particularly good for this quarry site.

DUBBS: This quarry site is hardly for developing a golf course. It is located in a keopuka, it is low, down, it can't be seen over the natural terrain. Because of the very nature of the material, we are planning to quarry from the site. It would be necessary to get a permit. \_/very spread out area therefore not having deep excavation, and I do not believe that it will appear as a scar. I doubt very much that it can be seen from the State highway although I have no way of knowing as I don't know the elevation of the State highway at that point.

COMMISSIONER KAWASAKI: Does the staff know how close it's going to be to the proposed highway.

STAFF PLANNER ONUMA: Not offhand. The proposed alignment would come just about the extent of the highway here (indicated on the map) that meets the mauka-makai road/somewhere there would terminate the first phase of their construction.

DUBBS: At the time this map was prepared, this is the future corridor of the highway, this is prior to the establishment of the route (presented the map). If I may sketch on this, the route is below this turn here. It actually came out something like this. It is actually farther from this quarry site than shown.

COMMISSIONER KAWASAKI: It is substantially away from the quarry site?

DUBBS: Yes, it is. That would be quarter of a mile or better.

CHAIRMAN: All right. Any further questions from the Commissioners?

If not, is there anyone else here wishing to give testimony concerning this project? Did you have a question Mr. Cooper? You would like to ask?

ALIKA COOPER: I have a question. What's the elevation? How far away is this from the ocean?

DUBBS: Eighty-five hundred feet according to that. Is it mile and a half? Further than that?

I am sorry I do not know the elevation. Just from memory and visualizing the contours of that area, I would guess in excess of 100 feet.

COOPER: Elevation, and you are how far from the ocean?

DUBBS: A mile and a quarter, probably.

COOPER: Are there any historical sites, cave burials, etc. on that piece of property?

DUBBS: Not according to Bishop Museum in their initial survey.

CHAIRMAN: Anyone wishing to give further testimony at this public hearing?

If not then, if there is no further testimony, I would entertain a motion that the public hearing be closed.

COMMISSIONER VALERA: So move.

CHAIRMAN: Is there a second?

COMMISSIONER NAGATA: Second.

CHAIRMAN: Motion is made and seconded that the public hearing be closed. All those in favor, would you signify by saying aye.

COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

CHAIRMAN: Any oppose, would you say no. Motion is carried.

This being a hearing on special permit, there will be no action for 15 days.

The public hearing was adjourned at 4:00 p.m.
