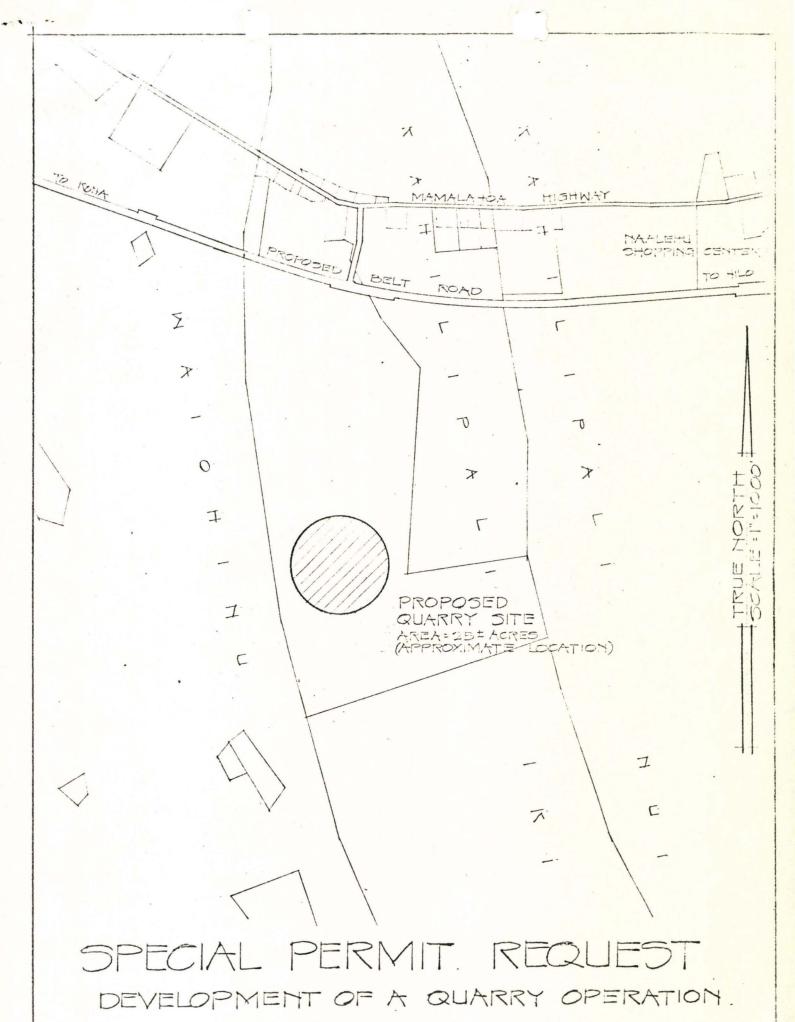

SUBJECT: SP72-128 - Tommy Ishimaru

The petitioner, Tommy Ishimaru, is requesting a time extension of Special Permit 72-128 to continue operation of a quarry on approximately 25 acres of land situated within the State Land Use Agricultural District at Naalehu, Kau, Hawaii, Tax Map Key 9-5-7: portion of 29. The subject area is located about 4,000 feet south of the Mamalahoa Highway between the Waiohinu and Naalehu urban districts.

Special Permit 72-128 was granted by the State Land Use Commission on June 2, 1972, subject to the conditions set forth by the Hawaii County Planning Commission. One of the conditions of approval stated that: "The quarrying operation and its allied uses be terminated five (5) years after the date of approval of the Special Permit or upon written request of the adjoining properties which prove that the operation is causing them excessive inconvenience." Prior to the June 2, 1977 termination date, the petitioner submitted a request for time extension. The time extension request is for a five-year period extending to June 2, 1982.

During the active five-year period of the Special Permit, the property was not quarried continuously. Prior to the termination date of the Special Permit, the crushing and batching facilities were removed from the property and active quarrying ceased. If the requested time extension is granted, future quarrying operations are similarly not expected to be done on a continual basis.

In support of the request, the petitioner has in part stated the following:

"Crusher and batching plant were taken out as there are no big jobs to be done in the area right now. However, we are running out of material that was crushed previously and will need a crusher back on the site. Much of the crushed material is sold to home owners who need just a few yards for driveways, patios and other home improvements. An aggregate yard in the district is a real convenience and economical for all concerned. Otherwise, home owners would have to go to Hilo, a distance of 120 miles round trip for their material."

On July 21, 1977, the Hawaii County Planning Commission voted to approve the five-year time extension request until June 2, 1982, as it was found that:

"...the subject quarry operation is an essential and integral part of present and future developments of the Kau area. The materials obtained from the site will be used to meet various construction needs in the area since there are no other quarries in the immediate area. Futhermore, the site will not be quarried on a continual basis."

The Planning Commission additionally stated that:

"...the requested time extension be given favorable consideration subject to the additional condition that the petitioner or his authorized representative obtain a Grading Permit from the Department of Public Works prior to commencement of the operation and that all other conditions spelled out in the Special Permit be complied with. Should any of the stipulated conditions not be met, the Special Permit may be deemed null and void."

For the Commission's information, the staff report done for the original Special Permit request has been attached.

STAFF REPORT

SP72-128 - TOMMY ISHIMARU

A special permit to allow the operation of a quarry including allied uses such as crushing plant, a concrete batch plant, and an asphalt concrete plant on 25 acres of land located at Naalehu, Ka'u, Hawaii, has been requested by Mr. Tommy Ishimaru. The land is located within the Agricultural District and identified as TMK 9-5-7: portion of parcel 29. Parcel 29 is owned by Mr. Ishimaru and consists of a total of 166.5 acres.

The proposed quarry site is situated between the Naalehu and Waiohinu Urban Districts, approximately one-half mile east of the Naalehu Police Station and about 4,000 feet makai of Mamalahoa Highway.

Mr. Ishimaru is requesting this special permit to
establish a quarry operation to supply quarry material for
the construction of a variety of proposed developments in
the Ka'u area. It was indicated that there is no quarry
operation in this district at the present time. The petitioner
identified C. Brewer & Co., Ltd., Hawaiian Ranchos, Hawaiian
Ocean View Estates, Discovery Harbor and Green Sands,

Hutchinson Sugar Company, Hawaiian Agricultural Company, the County, and the State as possible developers that will be needing quarry material for a number of proposed construction projects in the Ka'u district. Mr. Ishimaru further stated that, "at the present time, material has to be brought in from Hilo or Kona which involves a 128 mile round trip and takes from 5 to 6 hours."

The petitioner also indicated that the excavated area can be made available for dumping debris from the Naalehu

Flood Control basin since the present site is nearing capacity.

The subject area is vacant, covered with shrubbery, and accessible only by a very poor unimproved road. The surrounding areas to the south, east, and west are predominantly pasture and open land. The closest residence to the subject site is situated approximately one-half mile north of the proposed quarry site and along Mamalahoa Highway.

The Land Study Bureau classification shows that the soil productivity rating for the area in question is "D" or poor.

The quarry site consists of well-drained, shallow volcanic ash and pahoehoe, and gently sloping terrain with slopes generally under 20 percent and a mean annual rainfall range between 40 to 60 inches. The elevation is at the 800 foot level. The prevailing wind pattern is generally northeast to

areas. The Kona wind which blows from southwest to northeast occurs primarily between December and March, on an average of no more than 3 to 5 days a month.

At its April 13, 1972 meeting, the Hawaii County Planning Commission voted to recommend approval of this special permit based on the following findings:

- "1. that the proposed use would not unreasonably burden public agencies to provide roads and streets, sewers, water and drainage improvements. The applicant will provide his own access to and from the proposed quarry site, and no public improvements will be necessary;
- "2. that there are no operating quarries in the Ka'u district now, the largest district on the Big Island. The need for a quarry in the district is surely warranted to sustain the existing and anticipated public and private developments."

The recommendation for approval was subject to the following conditions:

- "1. that all State and County standards and appropriate safety measures be exercised by the applicant to assure optimum vehicular traffic safeguards during the entire period of the operation;
- "2. that the applicant obtain an authority to construct from the Department of Health prior to construction of the facilities;
- "3. that the applicant obtain a permit to operate from the Department of Health prior to operation and for continued operation of the facilities;

- "4. that every precaution be taken by the applicant to avert any inconvenience such as traffic, noise and dust problems, to surrounding properties;
- "5. that excavation shall not commence until a complete historical survey of the area is conducted and reviewed by appropriate agencies. All historical sites shall be preserved;
- "6. that the operation be confined to approximately twenty-five (25) acres and within the area indicated on the map submitted;
- "7. that the quarrying operation and its allied uses be terminated five (5) years after the date of approval of the special permit or upon written request of the adjoining properties which prove that the operation is causing them excessive inconvenience;
- "8. that upon expiration of the permit, the applicant shall remove all temporary support facilities and equipment from the area. The land shall then be graded to blend with the surrounding area. Prior to the grading, however, the applicant shall prepare a grading plan, subject to the approval of the County Planning and Public Works Departments;
- "9. that the Planning Department shall make periodic inspection of the site to see that no adverse effects are being created by the quarry operation such as dust, noise and indiscriminate excavation which will substantially alter the land. If it is determined that adverse effects are created, the Planning Commission shall have the authority to require the applicant to cease and desist the quarry operation.
- "10. that operation be limited to only during regular working hours."

The subject site is zoned Ag-20 acres and general planned for extensive agricultural use.

At the hearing, it was reported that the Department of Public Works and the Department of Water Supply have no objections to the proposed quarry site.

In a letter dated March 28, 1972 to the Hawaii County
Planning Department, Mr. James M. Nakahara, Chief Sanitarian,
Hawaii District, Department of Health, stated in part that:

"The proposed equipment to be located on the site for the quarrying and batching operations are classified as new sources and thus are required to obtain an Authority to Construct and a Permit to Operate from the Department of Health under the provision of the recently adopted Air Pollution Regulations which became effective on March 21, 1972."

Mr. Nakahara further suggested that the special permit be approved under two conditions. These conditions have been incorporated in conditions #2 and #3 of the County's conditions.

The County planning staff further informed that there are no historical sites or listings of any historical sites on the subject parcel.

The County Planning Commission has received seven letters requesting favorable action on the petition and one letter opposing the proposed operation as follows:

In support of the petition

1. In his letter dated February 15, 1972, Mr. J. Hewetson,
Manager of Hutchinson Sugar Company, Ltd., stated

that the quarry operation would benefit the community and urged approval. He added that the hauling charge for a ton of crushed rock alone can be as high as \$6 and that this was a major factor in the high construction costs on the Ka'u coast.

- 2. In his letter dated February 17, 1972, Mr. James K. Kuwaye, President of Kuwaye Brothers, Inc., strongly recommended approval for the reasons that there is an economic need for a source of supply of quarry material in the Ka'u district; a source of quarry material in this area will greatly reduce building material and construction costs; the quarry operation will eliminate hauling material from Hilo and thereby reduce traffic; and the quarry operation will provide jobs and income.
- 3. In his letter dated February 17, 1972, Mr. R. E.

 Hopkins of Morrison-Knudsen Company, Inc. strongly
 supported this special permit request. He
 informed that his company was the low bidder
 for the Hawaiian Discovery Harbor project and
 that if Mr. Ishimaru's proposed quarry site

- becomes operational, they would avail themselves of this source.
- 4. In his letter dated February 17, 1972, Mr. Charles Menning, President of Shield-Pacific Ltd., requested that this quarry operation be approved since there are no commercial concrete aggregate or ready mix concrete facilities in Ka'u. The nearest facilities are located in Hilo, 60 miles away, and hauling concrete for a long period reduces its strength. Savings of approximately \$5,000 to \$10,000 to taxpayers for the Waiohinu flood control project alone could be realized if the project is approved.
- 5. In his letter dated February 17, 1972, Mr. Ernest A. Smith, Manager of Hawaiian Agricultural Company, requested favorable action on this request since there is a need for a source of quarry material in the Ka'u area and that this service would reduce the high hauling cost from Hilo.
- 6. In his letter dated February 23, 1972, Mr. Edward
 E. Crook, Vice President of Administration, Inc.,
 stated that on behalf of his company and Swinerton
 Hawaii Venture, they endorse the project. He
 believes that the proposed location will have no

- adverse effect upon the lives or businesses of others.
- 7. In a letter dated February 23, 1972, Mr. George A. Arthur, Project Manager of Cal-Pacific Resources of Hawaii, Ltd., recommended favorable action.

 He informed that his company was developing the Discovery Harbor project and that the availability of a quarry facility in the Ka'u area will contribute to the economy.

In opposition

1. In a letter dated February 11, 1972, Mr. Larry 0. Hawkins, Vice-President and Manager of Hawkins Audio Engineers, Inc., advised that he was a partial owner of the 67 acre parcel adjoining the proposed quarry site and that he was opposed to the quarry operation at the proposed site because the geographic location and pleasant and mild climate were more conducive to resort development, residential subdivision, or a shopping center and business development. He added that the proposed quarry site is approximately a mile from the center of an existing town and that to allow this type of industrial development would

lower property values, increase pollution, and the noise levels would be unbearable. The Halawa quarry on Oahu was cited as an example of the ill effects that may arise from a quarry operation.

. . .

In addition, Mr. Hawkins stated that if the proposed quarry operation was allowed, it would drastically hamper expansion of Naalehu.

Upon evaluation of this request, staff finds that:

- 1. The comprehensive conditions stipulated by the County will adequately protect the surrounding areas, alleviate and minimize pollution, health, and safety hazards, and insure the restoration of the area.
- 2. The proposed quarrying operation would not unreasonably burden public agencies to provide additional services, nor would it be contrary to the objectives of the Land Use Law.
- 3. The proposed quarry site would be a convenient and much needed source of quarry material for the construction of both private and public work projects in the Ka'u district since there are no operating quarries located in the area.

4. A quarry source in the Ka'u area would eliminate hauling of material from Hilo and thereby reduce heavy equipment traffic on the highways.

Based on the above findings, the staff recommends approval of this request, subject to the County's conditions.

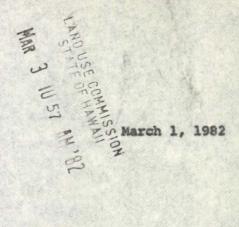

TIME EXTENSION (S.P. 72-128): TOMMY ISHIMARU

Tommy Ishimaru has submitted a request for a five-year time extension of Special Permit No. 72-128. This Special Permit was granted by the State Land Use Commission on June 2, 1972, and allowed the operation of a quarry including allied uses such as a crusing plant, a concrete batch plant, and an asphalt concrete plant on approximately 25 acres of land situated within the State Land Use Agricultural District. The area involved is situated about 4,000 feet makai of the Hawaii Belt Highway between Waiohinu and Naalehu, approximately one-half mile from Naalehu Village, Kahilipali Iki, Ka'u, (TMK: 9-5-07:Portion of 29).

Condition No. 7 of the Special Permit stated that "The quarrying operation and its allied uses be terminated five (5) years after the date of approval of the special permit or upon written request of the adjoining properties which prove that the operation is causing them excessive inconvenience." Since the date of approval was June 2, 1972, the termination date was on June 2nd of this year (1977). Although the deadline has passed, the petitioner submitted the extension request prior to the expiration date (letter dated May 17, 1977). The extension request is until June 2, 1982.

According to the petitioner, the land is presently not being quarried, and there are no crushing or batching facilities on the site. The petitioner has further stated the following:

"Crusher and batching plant were taken out as there are no big jobs to be done in the area right now. However, we are running out of material that was crushed previously

and will need a crusher back on the site. Much of the crushed material is sold to home owners who need just a few yards for driveways, patios and other home improvements. An aggregate yard in the district is a real convenience and economical for all concerned. Otherwise, home owners would have to go to Hilo, a distance of 120 miles round trip for their material."

RECOMMENDATION: TOMMY ISHIMARU

Staff is recommending that the request for a five-year time extension of Special Permit 72-128 until June 2, 1982, be given favorable consideration. It is felt that the subject quarry operation is an essential and integral part of present and future developments of the Ka'u area. The materials obtained from the site will be used to meet various construction needs in the area since there are no other quarries in the immediate area. Futhermore, the site will not be quarried on a continual bases.

It is further recommended that the requested time extension addition that all be given favorable consideration subject to the condition that all other conditions spelled out in the Special Permit be complied with. Should any of the stipulated conditions not be met, the Special Permit may be deemed null and void.

Deputy Director Kanuha announced that Mieko M. Kawasaki, secretary to Sidney Fuke, will be acting as secretary until a Planning Commission secretary can be selected; hopefully in about a month-and-a-half.

PUBLIC HEARING SPECIAL MANAGEMENT AREA (SMA) USE PERMIT PACIFIC PARADISE OCEAN FRONT ESTATES, LTD. KAPAAHU, PUNA

A duly advertised public hearing on the application of Pacific Paradise Ocean Front Estates, Ltd. for a Special Management Area (SMA) Use Permit to allow the installation of underground utilities and roadway improvements within the Pacific Paradise Ocean Front Estates Subdivision located off of the Chain of Craters Road, Kapaahu, Puna, TMK: 1-2-28:79.

The staff presented the background information and recommendation on file.

On the question of whether most of the lot owners were absentee owners; the reply was that they were equally divided between the people of the State of Hawaii and those living outside of the State.

It was pointed out that when the subdivision was originally sold, it was not the intent of the developer to put in utilities but now felt that the underground utilities will benefit the property owners and beautify the area and that the cost of these improvements will not be passed on to the property owners; it will be borne entirely by the developer.

A news article in the Chicago Sun-Times which was submitted by a landowner was read into the record. According to the article, the petitioner was suspended from selling lots in Hawaii until they file certain information with HUD. It was clarified that the information has been filed with HUD, however, the article was misleading as the suspension of this sale was not for this particular subdivision.

The earthquake caused a subsiding of about 2-1/2 feet but most of the roads were above elevation and therefore not affected. Those portions of the roads which subsided will be elevated so that they will be above the high water mark.

It was stated that none of the lots closest to the ocean were affected by the earthquake because the elevation there were higher than five feet.

One of the property owners voiced the need of the utilities and improvements and how much it means to them.

It was moved by Mr. Murakami and seconded by Mr. Sakamoto that the Commission approve the application with the recommendation and conditions set forth by the staff. Motion was carried unanimously with five members present.

Continuation of a public hearing of the County Planning Commission, Laupahoehoe Community School Library, Laupahoehoe, Hawaii, was called to order at 1:30 p.m. with Chairman Jitchaku presiding.

In addition to the five Commissioners and others present at the first hearing, Commissioner Shigeru Fujimoto joined the group and approximately 11 people in attendance.

SPECIAL MANAGEMENT AREA (SMA) USE PERMIT
DEPT. OF PARKS AND
RECREATION, COUNTY OF HI
HILO, HAWAII

A duly advertised public hearing on the application of the County of Hawaii, Department of Parks and Recreation for a Special Management Area (SMA) Use Permit to allow the improvement and further development for the Laupahoehoe Point Park for recreational uses. The proposed

pavilion and restrooms, expansion of boat ramp, two (2) new restroom facilities, a new pavilion, four (4) new picnic shelters, ten (10) camp sites, and other related improvements. The area involved is the present site of the Laupahoehoe Point Park, Laupahoehoe, North Hilo, TMK: 3-6-02:24 & 26.

The staff presented the background information and recommendation on file.

The Department of Parks and Recreation informed the Commission that this piece of property was turned over to the County by the Coast Guard for recreational purposes.

On the question of when will the two road projects previously approved will be started; the reply was that due to unavailable funds at this time, no schedule is set but that they will try again next year to obtain funds.

As suggested by the Police Department, pathway lighting will be incorporated into the design of the parking areas.

On the question of how this project will be handled, it was stated that the project will be broken down into two different phases with different increments in each phase. This would all depend on available funding and could be a long range project.

The question of right-of-way of property owners in that area were cleared up to the satisfaction of the inquirers.

A request was made by the North Hilo Community Council President that the County place boundary pins so that the property owners can do something to their yards. This matter will be looked into by the Department of Public Works.

It was moved by Mr. Fujimoto and seconded by Mr. Sakamoto that the Commission give full support to the application; motion carried unanimously.

The Planning Commission reconvened at 3:30 p.m. in the Councilroom, County Building, with Chairman Jitchaku presiding.

SPECIAL PERMIT
ALLIED AGGREGATES CORP.
KAUNALOA, PUNA

Application of Allied Aggregates Corporation for a Special Permit to allow the establishment of a temporary quarrying operation, including crushing and processing facilites, and an

asphaltic concrete batching plant on 25± acres of land situated within the State Land Use Agricultural District. The property involved is located along the mauka side of the Kalapana Chain of Craters Road, approximately .9 mile west of the Kalapana Vacation Lots Subdivision, Kaunaloa, Puna, TMK: 1-2-02:portion of 3.

As the background information was presented at a public hearing held on June 16, 1977, the staff presented their recommendation in favor of the request.

This was an action meeting and no public testimony was allowed.

Clarification of Item 4.4 of the staff's conditions relating to landscaping was requested. This condition was requested by the Department of Transportation, Highways Division, to screen out the visual effect between the roadway and the quarry site.

The petitioner's statement regarding justification of this special permit was clarified to mean that if the petitioner is not successful in getting the bids for the Chain of Crater Road or the Kalapana By-Pass Road projects, there will be no need for this special permit.

It was asked whether the petitioner would be required to put back the humous and organic material after the quarry operation is over; the reply was that it is in the grading ordinance and therefore required.

The reply to the question of why the noise problem was not listed as one of the conditions of the staff was that Hawaii County presently does not have a requirement regarding control of noise pollution. However, it was pointed out that a permit will be required from the State Department of Health prior to commencement of operations so these concerns relating to air and noise pollution may be handled by that Department.

Mr. Sakamoto moved to forward a favorable recommendation to the Land Use Commission with the conditions and recommendation of the staff; seconded by Mr. Murakami; motion carried with six ayes.

EXTENSION OF TIME TOMMY ISHIMARU KAHILIPALI IKI, KA'U Request by Tommy Ishimaru for an extension of time for the operation of a quarry within the State Land Use Agricultural District which was granted by the State Land Use Commission

on June 2, 1972. The area involved, consisting of 25[±] acres, is situated about 4,000 feet makai of the Hawaii Belt Highway between Waiohinu and Naalehu, approximately one-half mile from Naalehu Village, Kahilipali iki, Ka'u, TMK: 9-5-07:portion of 29.

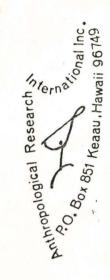

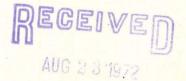

On June 6, 1972 with the help of one assistant the field research for this report was accomplished through a thorough investigation of the property under the ownership of Tomekichi Ishimaru and Shizuko Ishimaru. This property is listed as Tax Key 9-50729 and is found in the Kahilipali iki land boundary between Naalehu and Waiohinu, Kau, Hawaii. A map is enclosed showing the general boundaries of that property and some photographs are also attached showing general vegetation cover and a view of the land.

The property includes an area of over a hundred and sixty-six acres mostly covered with scrub brush and with a heavy cover of christmas berry trees and some lantana.

We drove with a four-wheel drive vehicle to and on the property and walked to the eastern boundary, criss-crossing as we best could because of the difficulty of movement through the underbrush. Throughout the area investigated no archaeological sites were found. I have no doubt that this property lacks archaeological material and/or archaeological sites that might be worth further checking or preservation.

As a result I would recommend that no further archaeological investigation be required and that the owner can proceed with whatever development he is able under State and local laws.

If there are further questions or information needed I will be available for questioning and clarification of the above statement.

In accordance with Chapter 205, Section 205-6, Hawaii Revised Statutes, transmitted herewith are the decision and findings of the County Planning Commission on the referenced application.

The special permit request was to allow a quarry operation on approximately 25 acres of a 166.478 parcel situated within the State Land Use Agricultural District in Kahilipali-Tki, Naalehu, Ka'u, Hawaii, TMK: 9-5-7:29.

The Planning Commission at a duly advertised public hearing held on February 25, 1972 in Kealakekua, Kona, discussed the subject request. The Commission, on April 13, 1972, voted to recommend the approval of the subject request on the basis of the following findings:

- that the proposed use would not unreasonably burden public agencies to provide roads and streets, sewers, water and drainage improvements. The applicant will provide his own access to and from the proposed quarry site, and no public improvements will be necessary;

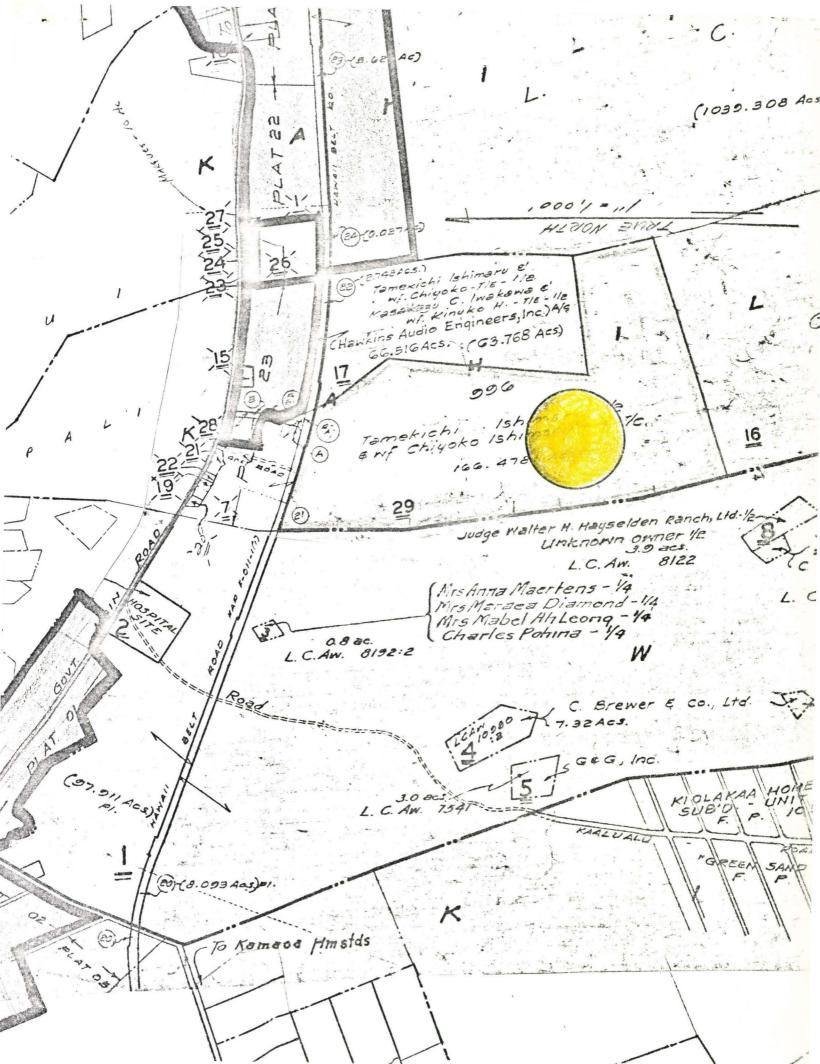

STAFF REPORT

SP72-128 - TOMMY ISHIMARU

A special permit to allow the operation of a quarry including allied uses such as crushing plant, a concrete batch plant, and an asphalt concrete plant on 25 acres of land located at Naalehu, Ka'u, Hawaii, has been requested by Mr. Tommy Ishimaru. The land is located within the Agricultural District and identified as TMK 9-5-7: portion of parcel 29. Parcel 29 is owned by Mr. Ishimaru and consists of a total of 166.5 acres.

The proposed quarry site is situated between the Naalehu and Waiohinu Urban Districts, approximately one-half mile east of the Naalehu Police Station and about 4,000 feet makai of Mamalahoa Highway.

Mr. Ishimaru is requesting this special permit to establish a quarry operation to supply quarry material for the construction of a variety of proposed developments in the Ka'u area. It was indicated that there is no quarry operation in this district at the present time. The petitioner identified C. Brewer & Co., Ltd., Hawaiian Ranchos, Hawaiian Ocean View Estates, Discovery Harbor and Green Sands,

Hutchinson Sugar Company, Hawaiian Agricultural Company, the County, and the State as possible developers that will be needing quarry material for a number of proposed construction projects in the Ka'u district. Mr. Ishimaru further stated that, "at the present time, material has to be brought in from Hilo or Kona which involves a 128 mile round trip and takes from 5 to 6 hours."

The petitioner also indicated that the excavated area can be made available for dumping debris from the Naalehu Flood Control basin since the present site is nearing capacity.

The subject area is vacant, covered with shrubbery, and accessible only by a very poor unimproved road. The surrounding areas to the south, east, and west are predominantly pasture and open land. The closest residence to the subject site is situated approximately one-half mile north of the proposed quarry site and along Mamalahoa Highway.

The Land Study Bureau classification shows that the soil productivity rating for the area in question is "D" or poor. The quarry site consists of well-drained, shallow volcanic ash and pahoehoe, and gently sloping terrain with slopes generally under 20 percent and a mean annual rainfall range between 40 to 60 inches. The elevation is at the 800 foot level. The prevailing wind pattern is generally northeast to

areas. The Kona wind which blows from southwest to northeast occurs primarily between December and March, on an average of no more than 3 to 5 days a month.

At its April 13, 1972 meeting, the Hawaii County Planning Commission voted to recommend approval of this special permit based on the following findings:

- "1. that the proposed use would not unreasonably burden public agencies to provide roads and streets, sewers, water and drainage improvements. The applicant will provide his own access to and from the proposed quarry site, and no public improvements will be necessary;
- "2. that there are no operating quarries in the Ka'u district now, the largest district on the Big Island. The need for a quarry in the district is surely warranted to sustain the existing and anticipated public and private developments."

The recommendation for approval was subject to the following conditions:

- "1. that all State and County standards and appropriate safety measures be exercised by the applicant to assure optimum vehicular traffic safeguards during the entire period of the operation;
- "2. that the applicant obtain an authority to construct from the Department of Health prior to construction of the facilities;
- "3. that the applicant obtain a permit to operate from the Department of Health prior to operation and for continued operation of the facilities;

"4. that every precaution be taken by the applicant to avert any inconvenience such as traffic, noise and dust problems, to surrounding properties;

- "5. that excavation shall not commence until a complete historical survey of the area is conducted and reviewed by appropriate agencies. All historical sites shall be preserved;
- "6. that the operation be confined to approximately twenty-five (25) acres and within the area indicated on the map submitted;
- "7. that the quarrying operation and its allied uses be terminated five (5) years after the date of approval of the special permit or upon written request of the adjoining properties which prove that the operation is causing them excessive inconvenience;
- "8. that upon expiration of the permit, the applicant shall remove all temporary support facilities and equipment from the area. The land shall then be graded to blend with the surrounding area. Prior to the grading, however, the applicant shall prepare a grading plan, subject to the approval of the County Planning and Public Works Departments;
- "9. that the Planning Department shall make periodic inspection of the site to see that no adverse effects are being created by the quarry operation such as dust, noise and indiscriminate excavation which will substantially alter the land. If it is determined that adverse effects are created, the Planning Commission shall have the authority to require the applicant to cease and desist the quarry operation.
- "10. that operation be limited to only during regular working hours."

The subject site is zoned Ag-20 acres and general planned for extensive agricultural use.

At the hearing, it was reported that the Department of Public Works and the Department of Water Supply have no objections to the proposed quarry site.

In a letter dated March 28, 1972 to the Hawaii County
Planning Department, Mr. James M. Nakahara, Chief Sanitarian,
Hawaii District, Department of Health, stated in part that:

"The proposed equipment to be located on the site for the quarrying and batching operations are classified as new sources and thus are required to obtain an Authority to Construct and a Permit to Operate from the Department of Health under the provision of the recently adopted Air Pollution Regulations which became effective on March 21, 1972."

Mr. Nakahara further suggested that the special permit be approved under two conditions. These conditions have been incorporated in conditions #2 and #3 of the County's conditions.

The County planning staff further informed that there are no historical sites or listings of any historical sites on the subject parcel.

The County Planning Commission has received seven letters requesting favorable action on the petition and one letter opposing the proposed operation as follows:

In support of the petition

In his letter dated February 15, 1972, Mr. J. Hewetson,
 Manager of Hutchinson Sugar Company, Ltd., stated

that the quarry operation would benefit the community and urged approval. He added that the hauling charge for a ton of crushed rock alone can be as high as \$6 and that this was a major factor in the high construction costs on the Ka'u coast.

- 2. In his letter dated February 17, 1972, Mr. James K. Kuwaye, President of Kuwaye Brothers, Inc., strongly recommended approval for the reasons that there is an economic need for a source of supply of quarry material in the Ka'u district; a source of quarry material in this area will greatly reduce building material and construction costs; the quarry operation will eliminate hauling material from Hilo and thereby reduce traffic; and the quarry operation will provide jobs and income.
- 3. In his letter dated February 17, 1972, Mr. R. E.

 Hopkins of Morrison-Knudsen Company, Inc. strongly
 supported this special permit request. He
 informed that his company was the low bidder
 for the Hawaiian Discovery Harbor project and
 that if Mr. Ishimaru's proposed quarry site

- becomes operational, they would avail themselves of this source.
- 4. In his letter dated February 17, 1972, Mr. Charles

 Menning, President of Shield-Pacific Ltd., requested

 that this quarry operation be approved since there

 are no commercial concrete aggregate or ready mix

 concrete facilities in Ka'u. The nearest facilities

 are located in Hilo, 60 miles away, and hauling

 concrete for a long period reduces its strength.

 Savings of approximately \$5,000 to \$10,000 to

 taxpayers for the Waiohinu flood control project

 alone could be realized if the project is approved.
- 5. In his letter dated February 17, 1972, Mr. Ernest A. Smith, Manager of Hawaiian Agricultural Company, requested favorable action on this request since there is a need for a source of quarry material in the Ka'u area and that this service would reduce the high hauling cost from Hilo.
- 6. In his letter dated February 23, 1972, Mr. Edward
 E. Crook, Vice President of Administration, Inc.,
 stated that on behalf of his company and Swinerton
 Hawaii Venture, they endorse the project. He
 believes that the proposed location will have no

adverse effect upon the lives or businesses of others.

7. In a letter dated February 23, 1972, Mr. George A. Arthur, Project Manager of Cal-Pacific Resources of Hawaii, Ltd., recommended favorable action.

He informed that his company was developing the Discovery Harbor project and that the availability of a quarry facility in the Ka'u area will contribute to the economy.

In opposition

1. In a letter dated February 11, 1972, Mr. Larry 0. Hawkins, Vice-President and Manager of Hawkins Audio Engineers, Inc., advised that he was a partial owner of the 67 acre parcel adjoining the proposed quarry site and that he was opposed to the quarry operation at the proposed site because the geographic location and pleasant and mild climate were more conducive to resort development, residential subdivision, or a shopping center and business development. He added that the proposed quarry site is approximately a mile from the center of an existing town and that to allow this type of industrial development would

lower property values, increase pollution, and the noise levels would be unbearable. The Halawa quarry on Oahu was cited as an example of the ill effects that may arise from a quarry operation.

In addition, Mr. Hawkins stated that if the proposed quarry operation was allowed, it would drastically hamper expansion of Naalehu.

Upon evaluation of this request, staff finds that:

- The comprehensive conditions stipulated by the County will adequately protect the surrounding areas, alleviate and minimize pollution, health, and safety hazards, and insure the restoration of the area.
- 2. The proposed quarrying operation would not unreasonably burden public agencies to provide additional services, nor would it be contrary to the objectives of the Land Use Law.
- 3. The proposed quarry site would be a convenient and much needed source of quarry material for the construction of both private and public work projects in the Ka'u district since there are no operating quarries located in the area.

4. A quarry source in the Ka'u area would eliminate hauling of material from Hilo and thereby reduce heavy equipment traffic on the highways.

Based on the above findings, the staff recommends approval of this request, subject to the County's conditions.

Application for a special permit to allow a quarry operation at Kahilipali-Iki, Naalehu, Ka'u, Tax Map Key 9-5-7:29.

The Chairman stated that a public hearing was held on this in Kona and deferred pending information from the Department of Health.

The Staff introduced a letter, dated March 28, 1972, received from the Department of Health:

"Re: Application for Special Permit For a Quarry, Concrete Batching Plant and Asphaltic Concrete Plant at Kahilipali-Iki, Naalehu, Hawaii
Tax Map Key 9-5-07:29

"The proposed equipment to be located on the site for the quarrying and batching operations are classified as new sources and thus are required to obtain an Authority to Construct and a Permit to Operate from the Department of Health under the provision of the recently adopted Air Pollution Regulations which became effective on March 21, 1972.

"The data submitted in support of the proposed equipment is insufficient for us to determine whether the provisions of the regulations can be met. Data must be furnished on forms supplied by the Department of Health before the proper evaluation for the permits can be performed. These forms are now in the process of being printed.

"Rather then hold up the Special Permit application until after an Authority to Construct is issued, we suggest that the Special Permit be approved on the condition that:

- a. The applicant obtain an Authority to Construct from the Department prior to construction of the facilities, and
- b. The applicant obtain a Permit to Operate from the Department prior to operation and for continued operation of the facilities."

Mrs. Kahumoku wondered whether a historical study has been conducted in the area.

The Staff pointed out that the archaelogical and historical survey done for the area reflects no known historical areas in the area.

Mrs. Kahumoku remarked that if there were some features discovered, the quarry should then be moved.

Mr. Veriato called for recommendation of the staff.

The Staff recommended that the special permit request be approved based on the following considerations:

1. that the proposed use would not unreasonably burden public agencies to provide roads and streets, sewers, water and drainage improvements. The applicant will provide his own access to and from the proposed quarry site, and no public improvements will be necessary.

that there are no operating quarries in the Ka'u District now, the largest district on the Big Island. The need for a quarry in the district is surely warranted to sustain the existing and anticipated public and private developments. The Staff also recommends that the request be approved with the following conditions: that all State and County standards and appropriate safety 1. measures be exercised by the applicant to assure optimum vehicular traffic safeguards during the entire period of the operation; that the applicant obtain an authority to construct from the Department of Health prior to construction of the facilities; that the applicant obtain a permit to operate from the Department prior to operation and for continued operation of the facilities; that every precaution be taken by the applicant to avert any inconvenience such as traffic, noise, and dust problems, to surrounding properties; that excavation shall not commence until a complete historical 5. survey of the area is conducted and reviewed by appropriate agencies. All historical sites shall be preserved. that the operation be confined to approximately twenty-five (25) 6. acres and within the area indicated on the map submitted; that the quarrying operation and its allied uses be terminated 7. five (5) years after the date of approval of the special permit or upon written request of the adjoining properties which prove that the operation is causing them excessive inconvenience. that upon expiration of the permit, the applicant shall remove all 8. temporary support facilities and equipment from the area. The land shall then be graded to blend with the surrounding area. Prior to the grading, however, the applicant shall prepare a grading plan, subject to the approval of the County Planning and Public Works Departments; that the Planning Department shall make periodic inspection of the site to see that no adverse effects are being created by the quarry operation such as dust, noise, and indiscriminate excavation which will substantially alter the land. If it is determined that adverse effects are created, the Planning Commission shall have the authority to require the applicant to cease and desist the quarry operation. 10. that operation be limited to only during regular working hours. It was moved by Mr. Watt, seconded by Mr. Valera and adopted unanimously that this application be recommended for approval with the restrictions outlined by the Staff. -3-

CHAIRMAN: For those of you who have just come in, we are one-half hour behind schedule, so at this time we are taking up a public hearing scheduled at 3:15 p.m. (The Chairman read the public hearing notice in its entirety.) Will the staff give us background on this please. STAFF PLANNER FUKE: Thank you Mr. Chairman. The applicant has requested a special permit to allow a quarry operation, which would include crushing operation, a concrete batch plant, and an asphaltic concrete plant, on approxi mately 25 acres of land situated within the Agricultural District at Naalehu, The subject property, which consists of 166.478 acres, is Ka'u, Hawaii. described as Tax Map Key: 9-5-7 Parcel 29. The applicant maintains that material has to be brought in from Hilo or Kona to support developments around the Ka'u area. This, according to the applicant, involves approximately 128 miles and 5 to 6 hours. He also notes that there are several private and public developments which needs or will need material provided by a quarry. The applicant further indicates that if the permit were granted, he would use the resultant excavated portion as a sanitary landfill. The property under consideration is situated on the makai side of the Belt road between Waiohinu and Naalehu, approximately 1/2 mile from the Naalehu police station. The site of the quarry, however, is located towards the rear or makai side of the lot, approximately 4,000 feet from the main road or Mamalahoa Highway. The area is presently covered with shrubberies and is basically pasturable in character. The prevailing wind pattern is generally northeast to southwest and away from the Naalehu and Waiohinu residential areas. The Kona wind which blows from southwest to northeast, occurs primarily between December and March; and according to the U.S. Weather Bureau, on an average of no more than 3 to 5 days a month. The Land Study Bureau's productivity rating for the subject area is "D" or poor. The soil is very shallow with a moderately fine texture. Its parent material is volcanic ash and pahoehoe; is well drained with a slope range of 0 to 35 percent, generally under 15 per cent; has a mean annual rainfall of (750) to (2,250) inches and is very poorly suited for machine tillability. The Department of Public Works noted that "if noise and dust will not be a nuisance in the area, they would not object to the permit." The Department of Health commented that "additional information is requested in order to determine whether the proposed operation will not be materially detrimental to public health and safety." The questions and the information they were seeking were the following: Duration of the special permit. Location map showing the nearest residence and the surrounding residential communities. "3. Plot plan showing the location of each proposed structure. Schematic drawing of the step by step operation together with dust control devices. "5. Description of the proposed method of dust control operation. Specifications and performance data of the equipment if packaged-"6. type (factory-built) of equipment is to be used." Upon receipt of the Department of Health's letter, we wrote to the applicant to provide us with such information but as yet has not received a formal reply. - 2 -

To date, we have received seven letters pertaining to the application. Six were for it and one was against it and I will read each individual letter:

First one is dated February 11, 1972:

"Dear Mr. Suefuji:

"As owners of 67 acres adjoining this proposed quarry, we want to be very emphatic in our opposition to this request. Because of the geographic location and the very pleasant, mild climate, we feel that this area is more conducive to resort development, subdivisions for housing, or shopping center and business development. We are speaking of one mile from the center of an existing town or shopping center and of close proximity to a dedicated park. To allow this type of industrial development would lower property values, increase pollution, and noise levels would be unbearable.

"I would like to make reference to the Halawa Quarry on Oahu, where residents have made a major complaint which was justified because of noise pollution and heavy dust over residential areas, three miles from the quarry. A development of this type should not be allowed within 10 miles of any existing shopping center or city, and I base this on present growth of cities. I would also like to make reference to present quarry areas, or similar industries, on Oahu. Note that, with the exception of the Halawa Quarry, they are in no way in close proximity of intensely populated residential areas.

"With the present growth of cities and residential areas, in the very near future this would probably put the quarry directly in line with the expansion and development of the area, and if allowed to pass would drastically hamper expansion of Naalehu.

"Gentlemen:

"For the following reasons, we strongly recommend that a Special Permit be granted to Tommy Ishimaru for the operation of a quarry:

- "1. There is an economic need for a source of supply of aggregates and allied products in the Kau District. The closest suppliers are in Hilo, which is approximately 65 miles away.
- "2. An established quarry in this area will greatly reduce building material and construction costs, which will benefit the people of this district.
- "3. It will eliminate the necessity of hauling from Hilo, thereby freeing heavier hauling units from the already heavy traffic load.
- "4. A quarry operation will create jobs for people of this area, and will provide additional income to the district.

"We believe a properly controlled quarry will not contribute to any potential health hazard. Dust can be controlled by sprinkling system.

Another letter dated February 15, 1972:

"Dear Mr. Suefuji:

"I understand that Mr. T. Ishimaru has applied for permission to set up a quarry and rock crushing operation here in Naalehu. I want you to know that in my judgment this would be a real benefit to this community.

"At the present time the hauling charge alone for a ton of crushed rock can be as much as \$6.00. This makes all construction and road work on the Ka'u coast extremely expensive.

"Mr. Ishimaru recognizes that the location of such an operation is important so that it does not interfere with the local residents. There should be no problems in this respect.

"Please give this application your serious consideration.

"Gentlemen:

"A source for material in this area will greatly reduce construction costs. It will also eliminate the necessity of hauling from Hilo, thereby reducing traffic load on the highway.

"As to the control of dust, we believe proper methods can be applied to minimize any potential health hazard.

"For reasons stated, we strongly recommend that Mr. Ishimaru be granted a Special Permit to operate a quarry.

"Hauling concrete for 1 1/2 to 2 hours tends to reduce its strength. In fact, some specifications prohibit this practice. The hauling of aggregate from Hilo results in an unrealistically high price. We estimate that the saving to the taxpayers would be \$5000 - \$10,000 on the upcoming Waiohinu flood control project alone, if concrete aggregate and ready mix concrete were available in or near Naalehu.

"The presence of these facilities at Naalehu will mean higher quality concrete at lower prices for all Federal, State, and County work in the Ka'u District. In addition, the people of Ka'u will benefit from these factors. For these reasons, we respectfully request your approval of the petition.

CHAIRMAN: At this time I would read one other letter that was not read which was received today.

"Dear Mr. Suefuji:

"We have been advised that Mr. Tommy Ishimaru has applied to the County of Hawaii for a permit for a quarry site in Ka'u. We understand that the site is located approximately 3/4 mile northwest of the community of Naalehu.

"As you are aware, construction of public facilities and initial housing will begin shortly at our Discovery Harbour project.

"We feel that the availability of a quarry facility in the Ka'u area will contribute materially to the economy and recommend that the requested permit be granted.

All right, do the Commissioners have any questions of the staff on this application?

COMMISSIONER WATT: I have one question. Where does the person that was against this quarry bit in relation to this quarry? You have any idea?

STAFF PLANNER FUKE: All they said is that they own the property adjacent to the proposed quarry site but they don't live in that area.

COMMISSIONER WATT: They don't?

STAFF PLANNER FUKE: No.

COMMISSIONER KAHUMOKU: How close is the closest home?

STAFF PLANNER FUKE: The closest home would be right up fronting Mamalahoa Highway but as we mentioned earlier, the prevailing wind pattern generally is from east to west or east to southwest.

COMMISSIONER WATT: What's down below on terrain?

. STAFF PLANNER FUKE: It's basically pasture land and open land.

COMMISSIONER WATT: That's owned by whom? You don't have any idea?

STAFF PLANNER FUKE: No, not on those lands.

CHAIRMAN: All right, you have any further question to the staff?

If not, is the applicant or representative here to give testimony?

TOMMY ISHIMARU: Mr. Chairman and members of the Planning Commission. I am Tommy Ishimaru. I think no need for me to explain anything more because some of my competitors and my clients have explained.

In answering some of the question that Mr. Watt gave, this property (indicated on the map) is owned by Hawkins and adjacent to our property; but at present, he doesn't have an easement to his property until this proposed Belt road (pointed to the map) goes in; and the proposed Belt road, in my figuring, won't be in for the next 10 years, and I am asking for 10 years' temporary permit. And the land below here is pasture land owned by Hutchinson Sugar Company; and on this side (showed on the map) on the west side is owned by State; and so definitely, there wouldn't be any development going on this side.

So, another thing, just to give you brief idea, the cost is rising so high in Ka'u area - take the hospital built in Ka'u, 20 room hospital built for two million dollars! Just imagine \$100,000 for a room! Some of that includes some of the equipment in there; but just imagine building a room for \$100,000 is too costly. They used lots of concrete for that building.

So, having a quarry in Ka'u will eliminate cost and will save taxpayers much money I think.

COMMISSIONER WATT: Mr. Ishimaru, my question about dust control, will you install dust control?

ISHIMARU: Yes, we are working together with the Health Department on this dust control thing and we'll come in with an equipment for the crusher-batching plant. We will go on their regulations.

COMMISSIONER WATT: Would you be more specific and say you would end the quarry operation when the Belt road is completed in less than 10 years?

ISHIMARU: What was that now?

COMMISSIONER WATT: You would end the quarry operation when the Belt road is pau than make a guess in 10 years?

ISHIMARU: I think the public will decide that. If they complain, I would just have to close them up and only balance of that 166 acres, I would like to develop into a resort or whatever suitable.

COMMISSIONER WATT: You didn't really answer my question. Would you....

ISHIMARU: Oh yes. It is just to say I will - right.

COMMISSIONER KAHUMOKU: I have another question. Being that Ka'u is full of historical sites, on this area, was this cleared or have you had it surveyed or....

ISHIMARU: Not from historical people - the 166 acres, no. The rest of the area south of it is being studied.

COMMISSIONER KAHUMOKU: And the area of the quarry, has it been studied?

ISHIMARU: No, not yet. Not that I know of. If the previous owner had already made a study, that I don't know.

COMMISSIONER WATT: You would be willing to have somebody like this Bishop Museum people take a look at it before opening up the quarry?

ISHIMARU: They are welcomed to do so.

COMMISSIONER WATT: And if necessary move one way or the other a little?

ISHIMARU: Right. I can move further down if I wanted. Actually, I have about another thousand feet to the boundary so I can move another thousand feet down.

COMMISSIONER WATT: After you are through excavating, how are you going to end it up? Are you going to landscape it or....

ISHIMARU: Right now, the County is having a problem with the debris catchment flood control in Naalehu. They have no place to dispose of this debris and right at present, they are dumping into the County rubbish dump and that will fill up in no time. The plantation doesn't want the debris on their property. Of course, actually it is coming down from their property. The ranch people don't want them in their pasture. So, I can make this land available for this debris. And, now, Waiohinu is coming up with the flood control too. They may have to build catchment and they may have problems with debris with the dumping and I think this would be a real good site to dump.

CHAIRMAN: Anyone has any further questions.

STAFF PLANNER FUKE: Excuse me Mr. Chairman. Regarding the question on historical sites, based on all available historical surveys done for the island, we just checked in the General Plan. There are no historical sites on that subject parcel. No listing or no historical site.

CHAIRMAN: Okay, thanks for the information.

COMMISSIONER KAHUMOKU: The reason I commented was because Ka'u is famous of uncovering new historical sites, so I still think that we should have a survey done because we already have uncovered new sites.

CHAIRMAN: Okay. You have any further questions? Thank you then.

Anyone else here wishing to give testimony in favor of this application? Yes Sir.

CLAUDE MOORE: I am Claude Moore, Civil Engineer for Ka'u Development Company and we have been involved in the construction of low-cost housing. For the past 13 years that I have been involved with Brewer, it cost us about \$20 a yard for material in Ka'u and maybe \$8 or \$10 out in Hilo and consequently that in an area where there is less demand for housing, the prices were higher and a quarry like this would be a great benefit to us in our development that we planned in the very near future to start more housing in Ka'u in order to provide some more housing for the Punaluu hotels

and I think we will be one of the nearest neighbors to this quarry that I know.

I think the question of the prevailing wind and that the benefits would far overrule the objections. We're planning it now in the very near future to go into this area and we have an urban zoning by Land Use below this area. The wind blows in this direction in that distance. I would much rather have the savings on the housing and worry about the dust later. Thank you.

CHAIRMAN: All right, thank you Mr. Moore.

Any other person wishing to give testimony in favor of this application?

If not then, is there anyone here wishing to give testimony in opposition to this application? Mr. Tyler.

ALAN TYLER: This is not in opposition actually. There's some question that I would like to pose for consideration while we have these people here.

First question I would/to ask the Planning Commission themselves and that is I understand from Director Suefuji that some of its staff goes out and makes an on-site inspection of the area. Has this been done in this particular case?

STAFF PLANNER FUKE: Yes, there has been.

TYLER: Who is the person that made this inspection?

STAFF PLANNER FUKE: Both of us did.

TYLER: Two of you did. All right, so then my questions would be all directed to you two then, right?

STAFF PLANNER FUKE: Yes.

TYLER: Let's look at it from the ground I am concerned now. When you went into the area, you said that the prevailing wind was sweeping down from north.

STAFF PLANNER FUKE: Generally in that direction.

TYLER: And where did you get this information? From the charts or you directly tested it yourself?

STAFF PLANNER FUKE: We tested it down there and we also checked out the charts. We asked the Weather Bureau for information.

TYLER: So you double checked when you went there - good. The next question now. With the town only 3/4's of a mile away, what is the frequency of the prevailing winds and when is the frequency of time that they sweep back into town? Did you talk with the local residents as to how often you get the winds going the other way - sweep in the dust into?

STAFF PLANNER FUKE: We don't have information to that but perhaps you could redirect that question to Mr. Ishimaru as he lives in that area.

TYLER: Mr. Ishimaru, do you happen to know Sir? Do the winds sweep back once a week or once a month or what do you have?

ISHIMARU: Usually, we call it the Kona wind that comes in about once or twice a year - very seldom.

TYLER: Not all the time.

ISHIMARU: Most of the time, they come in as tradewind.

TYLER: The next question has to do with incline. Now you gentlemen over there, what was the degree of slope in that particular area?

STAFF PLANNER FUKE: We don't have the specific percentage of slope but it was generally a gentle slope.

TYLER: You grade it gentle slope?

STAFF PLANNER FUKE: Right.

TYLER: It should be roughly what?

STAFF PLANNER FUKE: Less than 30 to 20. I would say no more than 30 per cent degree.

TYLER: Are there any evidences of any type of flood in the area when they do have heavy rains.

STAFF PLANNER FUKE: According to our flood plain maps, none were designated for the area.

TYLER: And that did you check with any of the local residents living near there as to flood patterns when they do have heavy rains.

STAFF PLANNER FUKE: That we did not.

TYLER: Next question. As far as aesthetics go, did you notice any landmarks in the area nearby? For example were there any cinder cones or anything else that might later serve as tourist attractions or something scenic for the residents?

STAFF PLANNER FUKE: None. But then, you will have to understand that these are all purely subjective as far as designating areas as natural areas or natural beauties.

TYLER: But you didn't observe anything that you thought was natural beauty?

STAFF PLANNER FUKE: As I mentioned earlier, it is purely subjective evaluation and it is just our impression of it. Another person may go and get another impression of that area.

TYLER: Very good I think. The next questionhas to do with noise levels. Have you gotten some tables of noise levels and tested it or compared it with comparable quarries that are in existence elsewhere to find out what the noise level is so that you will be able to predict. Those people are living 3/4's of a mile away and what will be the noise level at that time when that quarry is in operation? What will be the effect then?

STAFF PLANNER FUKE: With regard to that question, basically, we were awaiting the applicant's reply to the Department of Health's letter and we have written to the applicant to provide us with that information containing in the Department of Health's letter. So, we would like to request of the applicant that he formally write to this Department and to the Planning Commission all of the queries raised by the Department of Health. Based

upon their response then, we would have better basis for evaluation.

CHAIRMAN: Excuse me, Mr. Tyler. I believe these questions, since there is a period of 15 days that opposition can be expressed that maybe you could get these questions from the staff and maybe we could give priority to people who are here prepared to testify against the application.

DIRECTOR: I have a question for Mr. Tyler. Mr. Tyler, what were your findings of all the things you asked the staff - your own findings?

TYLER: As I said Mr. Suefuji, I am here at this moment not protesting this quarry. I am just here asking your staff if they have looked into these various elements which I consider important on any staff assigned concerning and of course on the quarry and what was said, that's all I have to say for now. Thank you.

CHAIRMAN: Thank you Sir.

All right, Mrs. Thompson.

RUTH THOMPSON: As resident of that area, I know we do need a quarry. We need it very desperately. And I would say too that if Mr. Ishimaru applies for a permit now, we're going to have it known. If someone else certainly don't want to live near a quarry, they at least have a choice. It is better than trying to put in something in an area that is already overpopulated. We all say three cheers for Mr. Ishimaru if he brings it in to our area.

CHAIRMAN: Thank you. All right, I take it then that you're for the development.

THOMPSON: Yes.

CHAIRMAN: So, anyone else wishing to give testimony in opposition to this? Yes Sir.

CHARLES MENNING: I am not in opposition but I want to clarify something as a result of some of these questions. There's a probable operating time of the facility here. Excuse me, I am Chuck Menning of Shield-Pacific. We will be operating hopefully here a concrete batching facility in the area. Based on the studies that we have made at periods of peak activity; for example during the construction of Waiohinu flood control district or the channel down there, we will be operating as much as 4 or 5 hours, 3 or 4 days a week, but that will only be during period of the construction of that channel. The normal work load in the area would indicate that we wouldn't be operating that plant very much more than 4 hours a week or about half a day once a week. Now, that work load obviously is going to grow and I think the availability of materials in that area is probably going to increase the rate of growth. As far as quarrying operation is concerned, I think that I would guess for Jimmy Kuwaye that based on what we see as the need for quarry products there, we would expect that Jimmy would be actively quarrying probably not more than two or three months out of the year. Now I am merely guessing for Jimmy, but our figures indicate that that's about what the total demand is. Jimmy can't afford to go in and operate 4 hours a day or 3 hours a day everyday all year long. He has got to go in and work in an hour shift and do his work and move his equipment. So, that's about the way we see the activity in that area. It's not continuous.

CHAIRMAN: Thank you for your information. We're still accepting testimony now in opposition to this request. Is there anyone else wishing to speak in opposition?

STAFF PLANNER FUKE: Excuse me Mr. Chairman. Could I redirect some questions to the applicant?

Mr. Ishimaru, right now, on our field trip, we noted that the access from Mamalahoa to your property is rather poor. What kind of plans do you have for improving the access?

ISHIMARU: We are planning to put in what you call a hot-mix if possible.

STAFF PLANNER FUKE: This would be on a public right-of-way then.

ISHIMARU: This would be private. We also own that property right out there on the yellow portion there (pointed to the map). So, we have access through.

STAFF PLANNER FUKE: So, access would be through this private property and not on the public right-of-way?

ISHIMARU: You mean we're going across the proposed highway?

STAFF PLANNER FUKE: Yes.

ISHIMARU: But, so far it's still our property.

STAFF PLANNER FUKE: And another question. Would you be agreeable to a 5-year period; and upon termination of this permit, then reapply after the first 5 years should the need warrant it?

ISHIMARU: I guess - no choice. I would rather join than fight.

STAFF PLANNER FUKE: Another thing. Could we also have in writing the letter that we had written to you regarding Department of Health's concern before the Commission takes action on this?

ISHIMARU: Yes.

STAFF PLANNER FUKE: Thank you.

CHAIRMAN: I would entertain a motion that the public hearing be closed.

COMMISSIONER KAWASAKI: So move.

COMMISSIONER NAGATA: Second.

CHAIRMAN: Okay, motion made and seconded that public hearing be closed. All those in favor, would you signify by saying aye.

COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

CHAIRMAN: Any opposed, no. Motion is carried.

As mentioned before, the Commission cannot act until 15 days have passed and written testimony maybe submitted within that 15 days.

The public hearing was adjourned at 4:11 p.m.

As owners of 67 acres adjoining this proposed quarry, we want to be very emphatic in our opposition to this request. Because of the geographic location and the very pleasant, mild climate, we feel that this area is more conducive to resort development, subdivisions for housing, or shopping center and business development. We are speaking of one mile from the center of an existing town or shopping center and of close proximity to a dedicated park. To allow this type of industrial development would lower property values, increase pollution, and noise levels would be unbearable.

I would like to make reference to the Halawa Quarry on Oahu, where residents have made a major complaint which was justified because of noise pollution and heavy dust over residential areas, three miles from the quarry. A development of this type should not be allowed within 10 miles of any existing shopping center or city, and I base this on present growth of cities. I would also like to make reference to present quarry areas, or similar industries, on Oahu. Note that, with the exception of the Halawa Quarry, they are in no way in close proximity of intensely populated residential areas.

With the present growth of cities and residential areas, in the very near future this would probably put the quarry directly in line with the expansion and development of the area, and if allowed to pass would drastically hamper expansion of Naalehu.

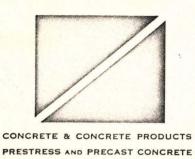

With Mr. Tommy Ishimaru, we are requesting your approval of a quarry site and concrete batching on Mr. Ishimaru's property at Naalehu.

At the present time there are no commercial concrete aggregate or ready mix concrete facilities in the area. The nearest are in Hilo, some 60 miles away.

Hauling concrete for 1 1/2 to 2 hours tends to reduce it's strength. In fact, some specifications prohibit this practice. The hauling of aggregate from Hilo results in an unrealistically high price. We estimate that the saving to the taxpayers would be \$5000 - \$10,000. on the upcoming Waiohinu flood control project alone, if concrete aggregate and ready mix concrete were available in or near Naalehu.

Thank you for your inquiry regarding dust control for your proposed quarry operation.

There has been considerable work done here relative to guarry dust control in crushing plants. We have had excellent success by using fine sprays injected at the crushers, screens and conveyor transfer points. We have attached a drawing showing the typical guarry flow set up and the locations which we recommend mounting spray nozzles. It is probable that not all of these would be required and all of the points we have suggested would be required only under extremely dusty conditions. A person can more sensibly locate these with experimenting a bit after starting operation. It any rate, the addition of water at all of these locations would certainly eleminate any dust whatsoever in your operations.

In extremely adverse conditions; an addition of a chemcial with the water sometimes is used and is very effective. We are enclosing literature describing this chemical.

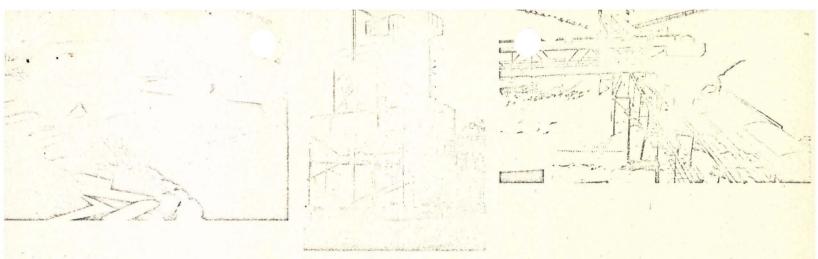

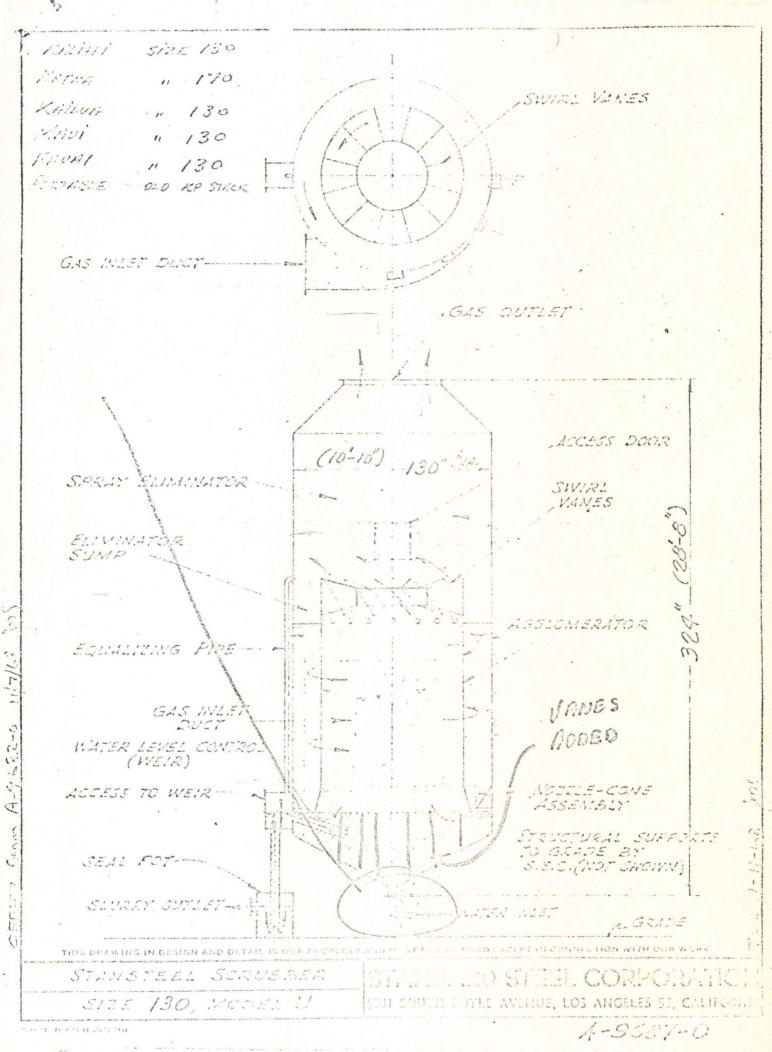
