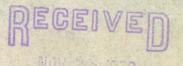

Reference is made to the above special permit which was granted on September 20, 1972. One of the conditions attached to the special permit stated that "the petitioner be responsible for securing a building permit and assuring construction started for the proposed facilities within one year from the date of official approval. Construction is defined as the actual placing of construction materials in their permanent position and fastened in a permanent manner. Should this condition not be met, the special permit shall be deemed null and void."

To date, we have not received any plans for "plan approval" review which precedes the filing of a building permit application. As the special permit expires on September 20, 1973, may we hear from you regarding the status of the proposed facility before September 14, 1973.

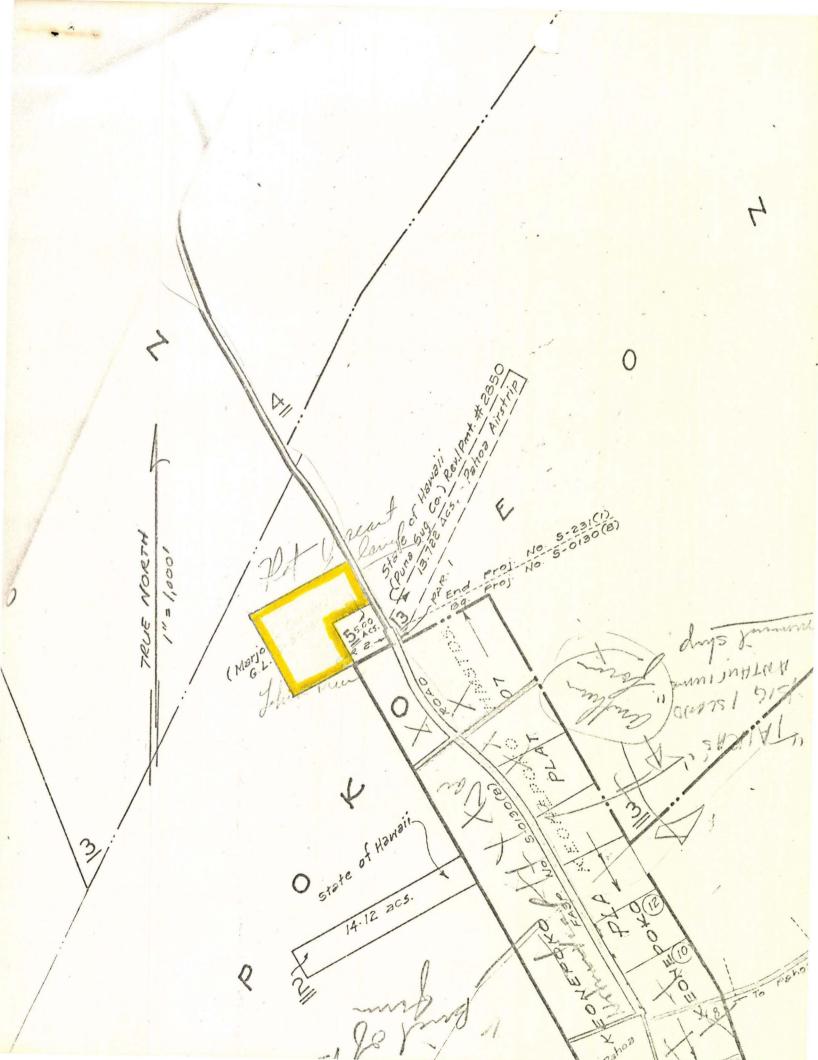

Persons testifying before today's proceedings were duly sworn in by Chairman Inaba.

ACTION

APPLICATION BY OCEAN VIEW INVESTMENT CO. (SP72-132) TO ESTABLISH COMMERCIAL USES ON 25 ACRES AT KA'U, HAWAII

The Executive Officer, Mr. Fujimoto, presented the staff report recommending approval of the special permit request in concurrence with the findings and recommendations of the Hawaii County Planning Commission and the eight conditions imposed by the County.

Commissioner Kido suggested the feasibility of an incremental approach, rather than seeking approval of the total 25 acres, inasmuch there was such a well-defined time schedule. Mr. Earl Younker, Treasurer of Ocean View Investment Co. stated that it would be advantageous for the developer, as well as the total project, to obtain approval for the total area. Moreover, under the conditions imposed by the County, the petitioner's performance would be strictly regulated.

Mr. Glenn Miyao, staff member of the Hawaii Planning Department, elaborated that upon checking with the Water Department, it was felt

that two 20,000 gallon storage water tanks will be sufficient for the area and, therefore, this had been stipulated in their approval of the special permit.

Commissioner Kido moved that the special permit be approved, subject to the eight (8) conditions imposed by the County. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Sakahashi and unanimously carried.

APPLICATION BY MARJORIE CORLEY (SP72-133) TO ALLOW A MEAT PROCESSING OPERATION ON 20 ACRES AT PUNA, HAWAII

In the staff memo presented by Mr. Gordan Furutani, staff planner, it was recommended that the special permit be approved subject to the conditions imposed by the Hawaii County Planning Commission.

Commissioner Mark moved that the special permit be approved subject to the conditions set forth by the County, seconded by Commissioner Kido, and it was unanimously passed.

APPLICATION BY SAMPSON-MILLER ASSOCIATED CO., INC. (SP72-134) TO ALLOW TEMPORARY SALES OFFICE ON 8 ACRES AT NORTH KOHALA, HAWAII

It was the staff's recommendation that the special permit be approved subject to the five (5) conditions established by the County (see copy of memo on file).

For the purpose of consistency, Vice Chairman Tangen recommended that it be additionally stipulated, under the County's condition #5, that the sales office be removed within 30 days upon completion of the lot sales or at the end of 2 years, whichever occurs first.

Commissioner Wung moved to approve the special permit as recommended by staff, with the additional condition recommended by Vice Chairman Tangen. The motion was seconded by Vice Chairman Tangen and unanimously passed.

APPLICATION BY SAMUEL K. SHIMIZU (SP72-135) TO ALLOW EXPANSION OF EXISTING COMMERCIAL FACILITY AT SOUTH KONA, HAWAII

Mr. Leong, staff planner, presented the staff memorandum recommending approval of the special permit subject to the County's condition, with the added condition that no further urban type uses be allowed on the property under consideration, nor shall any existing use be further expanded or enlarged.

Rezoning Issue

KAILUA-Kona—Land Use Commissioners meeting here Thursday held public hearings on a controversial 100 acre expansion for Queen Liliuokalani Village on Palani Road, and considered an 86-lot Kahei houselots subdivision in North Kohala.

The Commission approved a motion by Eddie Tangen to reopen the hotly protested Waiawa Ridge petition from Bishop Estate on Oahu to new public hearings.

Kenny Young represented Palani Development at the hearing on a 216-unit addition to Liliuokalani Village. The Department of Education has objected to the impact of rapid housing development upon the already crowded Kealakehe School.

But County population projections show an estimated 12,400 residents in North Kona by 1975, the staff reported. This figure would almost triple the 1970 census.

"In order to accommodate the estimated increase of population for North Kona, the study states that 1,865 new dwellings must be constructed," said a land board staff member.

Young testified that in the first increment, 50 out of 60 units were low-cost housing, but that the Federal government wants a higher ratio of integration of low and medium cost units.

He said he would try for a 50-50 ratio in the 122 unit Phase II due to be finished in July, 1973. Young said that under his contract to Liliuokalani Estate, he must build at least 50 per year.

Kona Complex manager Kenneth Asato told the Commission that the DOE doesn't want to be the agency to stop the proposed development increment, because the need for additional housing is recognized. But District Superintendant Harry C. Chuck has urged that the developer pay for portable classrooms if Kealakehe School needs them.

In an action meeting, the Commission approved the incremental shopping center-post office complex requested by Ocean View Investment Company on a 25-acre site in it's Ka'u subdivision.

Earl Younker, Ocean View treasurer, testified that the investment group is financially sound and that development could proceed.

A grocery story, variety store, office space and a post office will be started immediately and finished within a year. Petitioners will lose their special permit unless County Planners' special conditions are followed, and if the construction timetable is not met.

During the second year construction will start on a service station, and warehouse; recreation facilities and light manufacturing structures will start the third year, a lumber yard and additional stores the fourth, and a motel complex before the end of the fifth year.

The 40-acre Kahei houselots subdivision in North Kohala would provide 80 lots of 15,000 square feet, in an area about one mile east of Kohala Schools.

It will provide home sites for some now living in plantation

camps which will be closed when Kohala Corporation ends sugar production in 1974.

"The Governor's Task Force, the Mayor's Task Force, Castle & Cook's Kohala Corporation, the ILWU, the Agricultural Extension Service and the people of Kohala have been working on developing new industries that would provide new jobs, broaden the agricultural base and improve the economic and social conditions of North Kohala," according to the staff.

The commission will take action on the special permit request in 45 to 90 days.

Marjorie Corley received a special permit to permit meat processing, packing, shipping and sales on a 20-acre parcel in Puna. Her plant will be located 300 feet mauka of the Keaau-Pahoa road, about one and one-half miles north of the Pahoa urban district.

About 80 per cent of her produce will be from pigs raised on the premeses, but no slaughtering will be done there.

Samuel K. Shimizu received a special permit to increase the size of Stan's Fishery in Honaunau.

Kona Realtor Ron Burla received another for Sampson-Miller Associated Company's Kohala Estates, to locate a temporary sales office about two and one-half miles north of Kawaihae. He said the portable building would be removed as soon as 43 lots are sold in the first increment, or within two years, which ever occurs first.

The attorney for the Estate of Hannah H. Fukushima testified during a public hearing on land use boundaries for a 3.28-acre parcel three miles east of Waimea. Under the terms of the will dated October 3, 1967, the land is to be subdivided and sold, with the proceeds going to persons named in the will.

The staff report maintains that the reclassification would create a "scattered and sprawl type of urban growth." Attorney Bill Chillingworth told the Commission that under an alternative provision of the will, the property can be divided in two lots with, one going to one heir and the proceeds from the sale of the other going to the remaining nine inheritors.

The commission will take action upon the request within 45 to 90 days following a 15-day waiting period for the receipt of written testimony.

STAFF REPORT

SP72-133 - MARJORIE CORLEY

Mrs. Marjorie Corley requests approval of a special permit to establish a meat processing operation on approximately 20 acres of land situated within the Agricultural District at Keonepoko-Nui, Puna, Hawaii.

The property is owned by the State of Hawaii and is described as TMK 1-5-08: portion of 1. By letter dated May 2, 1972, the Department of Land & Natural Resources notified Mrs. Corley that the Board of Land & Natural Resources approved the sale of a 55-year lease for the 20-acre parcel at a public auction and that subdivision processing is in progress.

The land under consideration fronts the mauka side of the Keaau-Pahoa Road approximately 1.5 miles north of the Pahoa Urban District. It abuts a State owned 5-acre parcel which is presently under lease to the petitioner. Nearby land uses include Taira's anthurium shop, Miyose piggery, and the Keonepoko Homestead area consisting of lots ranging from 1 acre to over 10 acres in size. The access road to the Hawaiian Beaches, Parks, and Shores subdivisions is located

approximately 1 mile to the south. Land Study Bureau classification indicates that the soil productivity rating is "E" or very poor and consists of almost bare pahoehoe. The rainfall is approximately 150 inches annually, but there is no record of flooding problems on the property.

Mrs. Corley indicates that the operation will be a small family type operation with approximately 6 persons. It will involve the processing of pork and meat products such as sausages, European specialties, and cold cuts and will include the storage, packing, and sale of these products on the premises. The proposed facility will be approximately 2,444 square feet in area and will be set back 300 feet from the highway. It will be designed to look like a residence and will be landscaped. Mrs. Corley intends to raise most of the pork needed for her product (about 80 percent) on the premises and intends to purchase the beef elsewhere (remaining 20 percent). She notes that the UH Extension Service encourages this type of operation, since it will be utilizing local raw materials. The operation will not be offensive in any way since slaughtering will not be done on the premises. She intends to comply with all health and safety regulations and emphasizes that the operation will benefit the community and the economy.

County zoning is A-20a and the Hawaii General Plan designates the area for "orchard" use. Electricity, telephone, and a 6-inch waterline are available along the Pahoa Road.

Dr. Roy S. Nagakura, Supervisor of the Meat Inspection
Branch of the Department of Agriculture, indicated that they
will cooperate fully with Mrs. Corley in establishing the
processing plant provided that she complies with their
regulations.

Chief Sanitarian, James Nakahara, of the State Health
Department, Hawaii District, advised that:

"The applicant, Mrs. Marjorie M. Corley, has presented her proposal for a private sewage disposal system which will be able to meet the Department of Health's regulations. For a family type operation cesspool for the meat processing plant and a waste stabilization pond for the piggery will be permissible."

The Board of Land & Natural Resources has indicated that it has no objections to the establishment of the food processing plant on the subject property provided zoning requirements are satisfied.

In a letter to James Detor of the Department of Land & Natural Resources, County Extension Agent, Tom Yamamoto, noted that Mrs. Corley will be in partnership with people who have been in this business in Europe and Brazil for a number of years and therefore would possess the experience and knowledge for a successful venture. He indicated his support

of the petition since it would be beneficial to the livestock industry, the economy and the people of Hawaii.

Support of the venture was also voiced by Mr. John Farias, Jr., Director of the Department of Research and Development, Hawaii County.

County Recommendation

At its August 3, 1972 meeting, the Hawaii County Planning Commission voted to recommend approval of the request based on the following findings:

- "1. that the use would not be contrary to the objectives of the Land Use Law regarding agriculturally-classified lands. The petitioner intends to process the majority of the pork raised on the premises, while bringing the beef in from elsewhere. Animal husbandry and the resultant processing activity are regarded as a bona fide agricultural activity;
- "2. that the proposed use would not adversely affect the surrounding area. The petitioner does not intend to slaughter any of the animals within the subject area. All other applicable regulations including structural setback and sanitary facilities will be met by the applicant. The nature of the processing activity as well as the health requirement should avert any substantial adverse effect on the surrounding property; and
- "3. that the proposed use would further the agricultural policies of the County."

Approval was contingent upon the following conditions:

"1. that the petitioner be responsible for securing a building permit and assuring construction started for the proposed facilities within one year from the date of official approval. Construction is

defined as the actual placing of construction materials in their permanent position and fastened in a permanent manner. Should this condition not be met, the special permit shall be deemed null and void;

- "2. that the development conform substantially to that plan which was presented by the applicant to the Commission; and
- "3. that the development comply with all other applicable laws, regulations and codes, including 'Plan Approval.'"

Review and evaluation of Mrs. Corley's petition by the staff finds that the establishment of the proposed facility will be of direct benefit to Hawaii's economy and may encourage and stimulate the establishment of other similar operations to strengthen the State's agricultural and livestock industry by utilizing locally grown products. Under the conditions stipulated by the County, the operation will not adversely affect surrounding properties nor will it unduly burden public agencies to provide services and facilities.

Moreover, the processing plant will lead to the utilization for agricultural purposes lands which are zoned agriculture but presently vacant and unused.

It is therefore recommended that the special permit be approved subject to the conditions imposed by the Hawaii County Planning Commission.

The following comments are in response to your notification of boundary change applications A72-327, A72-329, A72-331 and special permit applications SP72-132, SP72-133, SP72-134, SP72-135:

A72-327 First Hawaiian Bank, Managing Trustee for Liliuokalani Trust and Palani Development Company Keahuolu, North Kona, Hawaii

Lands in this area are rated as Class E as they are either pahoehoe or aa lava flows, very poorly suited for agricultural uses. Rockiness of these lands combined with the uneven distribution of annual rainfall during the year make these lands unsuited for cropland uses.

The use of these lands for urban pursuits does not appear to entail any loss of productive agricultural lands.

A72-329 Estate of Hannah H. Fukushima South Kohala, Hawaii

This is predominantly in grazing and classified as Class c in that use. It is also rated as Class c for orchards. Soils are deep, well drained and nonstony with slopes less than 10 percent.

As this is in an Agricultural Zone, it might be a wise move to convass the area for undeveloped urban zoned lands before zoning more lands urban.

A72-331 Dept. of Land & Natural Resources North Kohala, Hawaii

The lands in the two parcels being considered for change of zoning from Agricultural to Urban Districts include the best agricultural lands found in the area. The lands are rated as Class B lands when irrigated. Soils are deep, nonstony, well drained on slopes less than 10 percent. All the lands in both parcels is suitable for cultivation.

Conversely, the soil and slope conditions make the area highly suitable for urban development provided there are adequate supporting facilities such as water, electricity and roads.

SP72-132 Ocean View Investment Company Ka'u, Hawaii

Lands are aa lava flows and not suitable for any agricultural uses. It would appear that this special permit application could be granted if the area is adequately serviced by all utilities and meets the zoning requirements of the County and State.

SP72-133 Marjorie Corley Puna, Hawaii

The lands are pahoehoe lava and are rated as Class E, very poorly suited for agricultural uses. The requested use appears acceptable as long as it conforms to the zoning requirements of the State & County.

SP72-134 Sampson-Miller Associated Co., Inc. North Kohala, Hawaii

The area is in grazing. It can be assumed that a temporary sales office would not be objectionable. However, a date should be included in the permit for the closing and removal of this office.

SP72-135 Samuel K. Shimizu South Kohala, Hawaii

The area is essentially pahoehoe lava. If the expansion of the facilities does not create a nuisance to existing structures, the expansion would appear to be allowable.

Land Use Commission Slates Meeting In Kona

KAILUA-Kona — State Land Use commissioners will meet here at the Kona Hilton at 1 p.m. Sept. 20 to take action on four special permit requests and to hold public hearings on three zone changes.

On the action agenda is a special permit request by View Investment Ocean Company for a 25-acre shopping complex at its Ka'u subdivision, where people living in about 85 dwellings have to drive 14 to 32 miles for shopping, according to

testimony received during the County Planning Commission hearing Aug. 3.

Proposed is a five-year development plan which would provide a post office and grocery within a year, a service station and warehouse facility within two years, a playground and light manufacturing area in three, office space and an lumber vard in four and finally a motel and various shops.

County Planners have approved the proposal in incremental stages Marjorie Corley of Puna has also asked for a permit to build a pork and meat processing operation including storage, packing, shipping and sales at Keonepoliniu.

The applicant told the Planning Commission recently that the processing plant would be a family operation with about six employees, that no slaughtering would be done at the site and that the processing plant would be 300 feet from the roadway.

Sampson-Miller Associated Company has also filed an application for a temporary sales office at its 4,155-acre Kohala Estates subdivision two and one-half miles north of Kawaihae Harbor.

Kona realtor Ron Burla is sales agent and Planning Commissioners were told the office would be needed for only two years. Out of an eventual offering of 210 lots from five to 25 acres in size, 43 are now ready for sale.

Samuel K. (Stan) Shimizu has received the County Planning Commission's support for a 12foot by 28-foot addition to Stan's Fishery in Honaunau.

His business is located oon the makai side of Mamalahoa Highway on approximately 10,000 square feet of land within Keei agricultural district. County Planners okayed the request Aug. 24.

Land Board members will hold public hearings on:

Urban zoning for 100 acres at Keahuolu, North Kona, for Phase III of the Queen Liliuokalani Village. Applicants told County Planners that they will try to build 150 units per year in the F.H.A.-insured, Act 108 development. Sixty units have been built.

Phase II proposes 122 more by July of 1973 and the area under consideration is planned for 216 more houses.

Developer Kenny Young told County Planning commissioners that 12 additional classrooms would be completed at Kealakehe School by 1975 to absorb the impact of the new housing.

Department of Land and Natural Resources (DLNR) has applied for a boundary change 40.16 acres from for agricultural to urban at Kahei in North Kohala for a residential subdivision. By March about 70 persons had signed up expressing interest in the 15,000 square foot lots. Bill Thompson of DLNR said at the time that the upset price for the 70 to 80 lots would probably be about \$7,000 depending upon how much improvement is required.

Hannah H. Fukushima of Waimea has applied also for urban zoning for 3.03 acres for a residential subdivision.

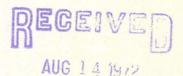

In accordance with Chapter 205, Section 205-6, Hawaii Revised Statutes transmitted herewith are the decision and findings of the County Planning Commission on the referenced application.

The Special Permit request was to allow a pork and meat processing operation including the storage, packing, shipping and sale of the products in Keonepoko-Nui, Puna, Hawaii, TMK: 1-5-08:portion 1.

The Planning Commission at a duly advertised public hearing held on July 13, 1972 in the County Council Room, County Building, Hilo, Hawaii, discussed the subject request. The Commission, on August 3, 1972, voted to recommend the approval of the subject request based on the following findings:

- 1. that the use would not be contrary to the objectives of the Land Use law regarding agriculturally-dalssified lands. The petitioner intends to process the majority of the pork raised on the premises, while bringing the beef in from elsewhere. Animal husbandry and the resultant processing activity are regarded as a bona fide agricultural activity;
- 2. that the proposed use would not adversely affect the surrounding area. The petitioner does not intend to slaughter any of the animals within the subject area. All other applicable regulations including structural setback and sanitary facilities will be met by the applicant. The nature of the processing activity as well as the health requirement should avert any substantial adverse affect on the surrounding property; and
- 3. that the proposed use would further the agricultural policies of the County.

The favorable recommendation, however, was contingent upon the following conditions:

- that the petitioner be responsible for securing a building permit and assuring construction started for the proposed facilities within one year from the date of official approval. Construction is defined as the actual placing of construction materials in their permanent position and fastened in a permanent manner. Should this condition not be met, the special permit shall be deemed null and void;
- 2. that the development conform substantially to that plan which was presented by the applicant to the Commission; and
- 3. that the development comply with all other applicable laws, regulations and codes, including "Plan Approval."

MINUTES

The minutes of the meeting of July 13, 1972 were approved as circulated.

SPECIAL PERMIT DEPT. OF TRANSPORTATION KEAUHOU 1st, NORTH KONA

Application of the Highways Division, State Department of Transportation for a special permit to allow the construction of a maintenance baseyard makai of the old Keauhou

School, Keauhou 1st, North Kona, TMK: 7-8-07:61.

The Chairman reported that this item has been pending for several months. Staff was requested to give the background again for the Commissioner's information.

Staff reported that the Department of Transportation, State of Hawaii, is requesting a special permit to allow the construction of a maintenance baseyard consisting of a 4,800 square foot warehouse and a service station facility within a rural district.

The property in which the maintenance facilities are proposed to be located is a 0.973-acre parcel located fronting Kuakini Highway, makai of the old Keauhou School, in Keauhou 1st, North Kona, TMK: 7-8-7: 61.

The subject parcel is zoned for residential-agricultural use (RA-.5a) and designated for low density urban use on the land use pattern allocation map. This land use designation permits residential and ancillary community and public uses.

The parcel is presently vacant and surrounding land uses include the Kona Coast Kennels makai of Kuakini Highway, the Old Keauhou School property, the J. M. Tanaka quarry approximately one-fourth (1/4) mile north fronting the Mamalahoa Highway, the Baptist Church to the south at the entrance to Puuloa Subdivision and surrounding residential uses.

In support of the special permit request, the applicant has submitted the following:

- 2. that the use would not adversely affect the surrounding area.

 Again, the use is of a temporary nature, and there are no residential units nearby.
- 3. that there would not be an unreasonable burden on public agencies to provide the necessary services. There will be no water or other facility requirement associated with the proposed use; and
- 4. that the subdivision for which the proposed structure is designed for is situated in a somewhat remote area and not in reasonable proximity to urban areas where real estate activities can occur..

The staff is also recommending that the request be approved subject to the following conditions:

- that the sales office be permitted for a period of no more than two years from the official date of approval of this request or upon completion of the initial sale of the 43 lots whichever is sooner;
- 2. that the sales operation be confined to only the selling of the forty-three (43) lots within that subdivision and not be used in any way for residential or quartering purposes;
- 3. that no other structure be erected to complement the temporary sales office operation;
- 4. that access to the temporary sales office be provided from the subdivision road and not off of the Mahukona-Kawaihae Road; and
- 5. that the temporary sales office be removed within 30 days upon completion of the lot sales.

It was moved by Mr. Nagata that the special permit be recommended for approval with the conditions stipulated by the staff. Motion was seconded by Mr. Veriato and adopted unanimously.

Application of Marjorie Corley for a special permit to allow a pork and meat processing operation including the storage, packing, shipping and sale of the products.

The facilities are proposed to be located on approximately twenty (20) acres of land fronting the Keaau-Pahoa Road, Keonepoko-Nui, Puna, approximately one mile Keaau side of Kahakai Road, TMK: 1-5-08:portion 1.

Staff reported that an application has been submitted by Marjorie Corley requesting a special permit to allow the processing of pork and meat products; specifically sausages and European specialities and cold cuts, and the storage, packing, shipping, and sale of these products.

The applicant has stated that this will be a small family type operation employing approximately six (6) persons. The operation will be on a small scale in the beginning with the remainder of the land to be used for diversified agriculture.

The applicant proposes to raise the majority of the pork on the premises and will purchase the beef elsewhere. No slaughtering will take place on the premises. Their operation will consist of approximately 80% pork and 20% beef products.

The area under consideration is a twenty (20) acre area owned by the State and which is located adjacent to a five (5) acre parcel leased to the applicant. The Department of Land and Natural Resources has approved the sale of a lease contingent upon approval of the special permit. The lease would be a 55-year lease for general agriculture-residence purposes.

The subject property is located on the mauka side of the Keaau-Pahoa Road approximately two (2) miles Keaau side of Pahoa Village. More specifically, it is located adjacent to the Keonepoko Homesteads area, approximately one (1) mile from Kahakai Road which leads down to the Hawaiian Parks, Beaches, and Shores subdivisions. The Miyose piggery and the Taira Flower Shop are located to the southeast on the makai side of the highway. The property is zoned as an agriculture (A-20a) zoned district by the

County and general planned for "orchard" uses.

The County's agriculture district permits piggeries and pen feeding of livestock on sites approved by the Department of Health and the Director and when not closer than 1,000 feet from any major public road. Also permitted is the processing, storage, packing, shipping, and sale of products produced on the premises provided the site or building used for such activity is at least 100 feet from any property line.

The land has no adverse terrain features and has no record of inundation problems, historic features, or distinct landforms of importance. Average annual rainfall in this area is 150 inches.

Utilities available to the property include power and communication lines and a 6-inch water line approximately 300 feet away along the Keaau-Pahoa Road.

The question of waste disposal was raised by the Department of Health. The applicant was requested to contact the Department of Agriculture, Meat Inspection Branch to work out the details for waste disposal for the proposed meat processing plant and the piggery. The Department of Agriculture had no objections to the request.

The Departments of Education, Public Works, Police and Fire had either no objection or no comment on the request. The Department of Research and Development, the County Extension Agent and the Department of Land and Natural Resources gave their endorsement of the proposed project.

According to the plans submitted by the applicant, the proposed facilities would be approximately 2,444 square feet in size and would be designed to look like a residence and would be landscaped and set back approximately 300 feet from the highway.

Mr. Veriato inquired about the report from the Department of Health.

Staff read the letter from the Department of Health as follows:

"The applicant, Mrs. Marjorie M. Corley, has presented her proposal for a private sewage disposal system which will be able to meet the Department of Health's regulations. For a family type operation cess-pool for the meat processing plant and a waste stabilization pond for the piggery will be permissible.

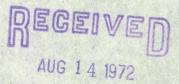

CHAIRMAN: You heard the background material presented by staff. Commissioners have any questions you want to direct to the staff?

COMMISSIONER KAWASAKI: I have a question just for information sake. Why do they have to apply for a special permit?

STAFF PLANNER MIYAO: Although we mentioned that the County Agricultural District allow these uses, in turn, the State Land Use District does not; therefore, the requirement for a special permit.

CHAIRMAN: Any further questions?

If not, is the applicant or a representative here who would give testimony.

MARJORIE CORLEY: Thank you. My name is Marjorie Corley. I am glad that Mr. Yamamoto at least brought up that I am not alone in this. I have

approximately six or seven others of us together, but most of it is family, so it will be a family operation. And, we will in the beginning probably only employ maybe three women from the community to help in the deboning or whatever has to be done. Later of course we hope to, when our products become known and our sales become greater that we will be able to expand, and that's one of the reasons we would be happy in this location because there is room for expansion certainly.

And, another reason we would like to be there in the nice, clean, fresh air is just that; because in the operation of meat products, it is very important that you do have clean, fresh air and none of the things that you get in the industrial area. Because the products are of the highest quality and to be kept in that same manner, it is better that our surroundings and tnings conform with this.

And, one of the other reasons that we need a special permit for instance is that even though later we would like to go and maybe raise at least a percentage of our own hogs, that the twenty acres that has been approved by the Department of Land Management; but to be able to have the processing plant, we will have to grow every single piece of pork that we use on this premises and that would have to be an enormous piggery. And, as you know or maybe you don't know, but I found out that piggeries now, to conform to what the State and Federal government wants us to, they figure like a thousand dollars a sow; so if you have say 200 sows, there's \$200,000 outlay of money right there and we would much prefer it at this time/put any amount/available cash that we have into our processing plant. That is the main purpose right now and we can also in this way use the raw products from the other pig growers here on the island which will be very good. But it also enables us that in case, we can't get enough of the local meats that we can also bring in from the Mainland, and I think most of the meat processing plants here. Mike and the others, bring nearly all of there's from the Mainland instead of using here, which is too bad. We should use our local products too, so this will encourage the hog raisers to maybe raise more and do it in the way we would like to have them - the finest types of produce to use naturally.

Now, if there is anything else - any other questions?

And, we do want to have it look as nice as possible. The reason as he said for the 20 acres we have in case and at the time when the possibility of a piggery would be, it has to be a thousand feet away from any public road and this of course, as far as the Board of Health, we would concur and go along with anything. We would like to keep our standards up to all the Federal; the way way they put it so that when everything is built, it will meet the standard - Federal Meat Act and the Revised Wholesome Meat Act approved in December 15, 1967 which you are all going by this now and all the operating equipment accepted by Service Division, Consumer and Marketing Service, U. S. Department of Agriculture. So, we will try. In fact, we have the equipment - it's here. Most of it is in my garage, so the sooner we can get started that the better it would be, and I think it would be a great asset to the little community of Pahoa. And, it won't be just a factory looking type of thing, an old ugly building, it would be something nice, and no offensive or obnoxious odors. In fact, it would be delicious. So, if there is any question...

CHAIRMAN: Do the Commissioners have any questions? If not, thank you very much for your testimony.

Is there anyone else who wishes to give testimony in favor of this application? If not, is there anyone here who wishes to give testimony in

opposition to this application? Anyone here who wishes to testify against this application?

If there is no further testimony, unless the Commissioners have questions or discussion on it, I would entertain a motion that the public hearing be closed.

COMMISSIONER VALERA: So move.

CHAIRMAN: Is there a second?

COMMISSIONER KAI: Second.

CHAIRMAN: Okay, there is a motion and seconded that the public hearing be closed. All those in favor, would you signify by saying aye.

COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

CHAIRMAN: Any opposed - no? Motion is carried and the public hearing is closed.

The public hearing was adjourned at 5:32 p.m.

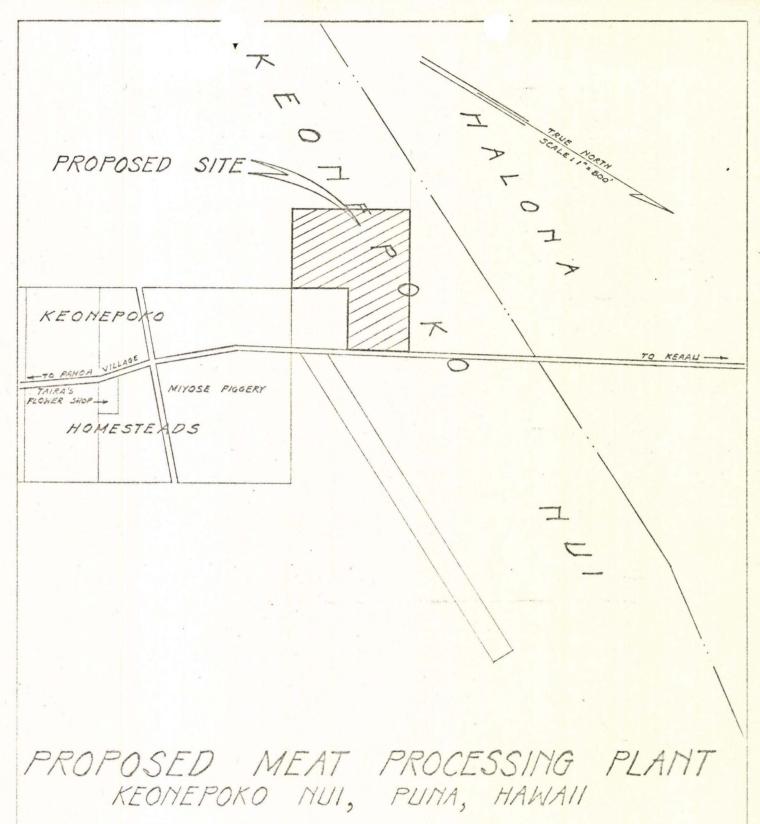
