Amendment to Special Permit No. 72-137 and Deletion of Condition No. 3 (LUC 222)

Tax Map Key 9-2-85:22 and 23

The Planning Commission at its duly held public hearing on October 14, 1980, considered your request for an amendment to Special Permit No. 72-137 (LUC 222) to allow the conversion of portions of the existing building for a real estate office and a laundromat. Also a request to delete Condition No. 3 of the Special Permit regarding access to the facility. The area involved is the site of the existing Five Loaves and Two Fishes Restaurant, along the mauka side of Hawaii Belt Highway and between Tiki Lane and King Kamehameha Boulevard, Hawaiian Ocean View Estates Subdivision, Kahuku, Ka'u, Hawaii.

The Commission voted to approve the above stated requests, based on the following considerations:

The original condition which closed off direct access to the subject property from the Hawaii Belt Road and allowed access from Tiki Lane only was imposed because of concerns for traffic safety and serviceability along a major highway. The limited access provision was placed as a means of controlling or reducing the possibilities of traffic conflicts at intersections and/or entry-exit points. This is a long-standing engineering and planning principle.

In evaluating the applicant's request, the Commission believe that the question is whether there are peculiar circumstances now which justify deviation or "variance" from this principle. From that perspective, it should be noted that

over the past eight (8) years, the property was used intermittently as a restaurant. While there was a legal prohibition against a direct access from the Highway, the access was nevertheless used. During that period, there were no recorded traffic mishaps resulting from that access.

It should also be pointed out that representations made by the public and applicant indicate that the subject property is being used as a school bus pick-up and drop-off point. As such, vehicles tend to congregate along the roadside waiting to pick up children. There apparently is a general expectation of vehicular interruption in that area, similar to a roadside stand or visitor look out area.

As such, the legal confirmation of a direct access, as well as improvements thereto, would improve the present roadside use of that area by both patrons of the restaurant and students and parents. Off-street parking would be available and it would be away from the main highway.

We also note that at this particular location there is reasonable sight distance from both sides of the Hawaii Belt Road. The property is located along a straight-away section of the Belt Highway and not along or near curves.

In view of the foregoing and while being mindful of the concerns of the Department of Public Works, it is felt that there are bases for deleting the no-access requirement.

It should be noted that the continued allowance of direct access would generate problems and defeat the concept of the Belt Highway. As such, this favorable action should not be interpreted as condoning further direct accesses. As noted above, there are extenuating circumstances in this case.

Further, it is acknowledged that the actual violation contributed to our understanding of the traffic concerns. However, it should be made clear that this position is not designed to legitimize or confirm a violation. We do not wish to suggest at all that one can or should violate first and hope to have this violation legalized later.

The Commission is also approving the request to allow the conversion of a portion of the existing building for a real estate office and laundromat. The recommendation to approve this portion of the request is based on the following findings:

In 1972, the State Land Use Commission voted to grant a Special Permit request to allow a restaurant and bar facility on the subject property. This approval established a commercial use on the subject property within a single structure. The applicant is requesting that he be allowed to convert a portion of the existing building for a real estate office and a laundromat. Therefore, approval of the subject request will not involve a physical expansion of commercial activity on the property.

Allowing the conversion of the existing building for a real estate office and laundromat will not be in conflict with the reasons for the originally approved Special Permit. More specifically that there is a need for such facilities in the area; that the poor soil productivity classification makes it difficult to fulfill the intent of the agricultural designation; and that there would not be an unreasonable burden on public agencies to provide necessary services. Furthermore, by allowing the inclusion of the proposed uses at this particular area, it would concentrate commercial activities in a centralized location rather than dispersing them throughout the subdivision.

Based on the above, it is determined that the granting of the requested amendments to Special Permit 72-137 is reasonable and would not violate the spirit and intent of the State Land Use Law and Regulations.

Approval of the requests is subject to the following conditions:

- That the petitioner or his authorized representative shall submit plans and receive final plan approval within one year of the effective date of approval of this amendment request.
- 2. That the petitioner or authorized representative provide a paved driveway to the highway built to commercial standards. Furthermore, the number of parking stalls, including adequate area for drop-off and pick-up of school students, shall meet with the requirements of the Zoning Code; provided further, that the parking area shall be improved with an oil-treated surface prior to issuance of occupancy permit for the restaurant and any other commercial uses considered by this Special Permit No. 72-137.

- 3. That construction of the required improvements shall commence within one (1) year from the date of receipt of final plan approval and be completed within one (1) year thereafter.
- 4. That all other applicable rules, regulations, and requirements be complied with.

Should any of the foregoing conditions not be met, the Special Permit may be deemed null and void.

A complaint was received by this office regarding the use of a driveway from the Hawaii Belt Highway. An on site inspection was conducted by Dennis Shigeoka of my staff on October 25, 1978, and it was found that the barricade has been removed and the driveway is in use again.

Mr. Embrey along with his attorneys were notified of the illegal driveway and of the violation of Chapter 3 Art. 3, Les 11.10 of the County Code per your letter dated March 17, 1978.

However, since your letter of March 18, 1978, the Hawaii Belt Road has been turned over to the State Department of Transportation, Highways Division. Because of this transfer, the County driveway ordinance is not applicable.

In addition, the letter also mentioned the requirements of the Special Permit 72-137. Condition 3 of the Special Permit stated "that access to the subject area be from Tiki Lane only and that direct access to the Hawaii Belt Road be closed off by incorporation of planting along the property line bordering the Hawaii Belt Road."

Mr. Embrey has been informed previously of this condition and violation. Attached for your information is a chronology of letters or actions relating to the driveway.

We are requesting your help in resolving the violation of the Special Permit. In addition, we are contacting the State Highways Division for assistance in the removal of the illegal driveway.

BACKGROUND: AMENDMENT TO SPECIAL PERMIT 72-137 - HELEN EMBREY

The petitioner, Helen Embrey, has submitted a request to amend Special Permit 72-137 by deleting Condition 3. The property in question is located at the eastern end of the Hawaiian Ocean View Estates subdivision on the mauka side of the Hawaii Belt Road and approximately 600 feet west of Tiki Lane, Kahuku, Ka'u, (TMK: 9-2-85:22 and 23).

More specifically, Special Permit 72-137 was originally granted on November, 1972, to Theron Darling to allow the establishment of a restaurant and cocktail lounge within an Agricultural District. Condition 3 stated "That access to the subject area be from Tiki Lane only and that direct access to the Hawaii Belt Road be closed off by incorporation of planting along the property line bordering the Hawaii Belt Road."

The restaurant use was established in 1972 and has been in use since that year. In November, 1976, the property owner was notified that the existing access from the Belt Highway was in violation of Special Permit 72-137 by the Department of Public Works. In July of 1977 it came to the attention of the Planning Department that access to the restaurant was still being derived directly from the Hawaii Belt Highway and the owner was again notifed of the breach.

In an attempt to rectify the situation, the petitioner and owner,

Helen Embrey, has submitted this request for a deletion of the condition.

In support of her petition, the applicant has stated that:

"In reply to your letter of July 27, 1977, concerning Special Permit Application (72-137) Theron Darling Establishment of Restaurant and Cocktail Lounge TMK: 9-2-85-22-23 Kahuku, Kau. Tiki Lane has not

been accessible since January of this year. Furthermore, Tiki Lane and King Kam Blvd. have always been very dangerous and blind intersections due to the high banks on both sides of these two intersections

When the new highway is completed there will be an even greater obstruction from King Kam intersection onto the highway.

We are submitting a request to the Land Use Commission to have condition number 3 of the special permit deleted from the permit.

From the restaurant entrance there is a full visibility in excess of 500 feet to the East and 800 feet to the West."

When Hawaii Ocean View Estates was granted approval in 1963, a twenty-five (25) foot strip of land between the Hawaii Belt Highway and the subdivision parcels was retained by the developers. The purpose of this strip was to be a buffer and to limit direct access onto the highway. Any access across this strip will require an agreement from the developers.

The Hawaii Belt Highway fronting Hawaiian Ocean View Estates subdivsion is now being improved to a 40 foot wide right-of-way and 24 feet pavement width. The project began in January, 1977, and is expected to be completed by December of this year. It is this project which has temporarily closed access from Tiki Lane.

Upon review of the subject request to delete Condition 3, the Department of Public Works commented as follows:

"When a lot abuts a major road the access should be from interior roads. We strongly suggest that this request be denied."

The State Department of Transportation, Land Transportation Facilities

Division submitted the following comments:

"Where a lot has double frontage on a highway and subdivision road it is our policy to recommend that access to the lot be off the subdivision road rather than off the highway. This recommendation is made in the interest of traffic safety and preserving the serviceability of the highway for the through traffic.

"In the subject instance, we believe that the highway improvements now under construction will provide a safe intersection at King Kam Boulevard, and we, therefore, reiterate our recommedation.

However, since the subject highway is under the jurisdiction of the County, the acceptance or rejection of our recommendation is your prerogative."

All other cooperating agencies had no comments on or objections to the subject petition.

The Department has also received a petition signed by 100 people in support of the request.

Additionally two other letters in support of the request has been received.

Waikoloa Village, Waikoloa, South Kohala, TMK: 6-8-03:3.

Staff presented recommendation to approve with conditions on file.

The Department of Public Works reported that they would be using the Hawaii County Storm Drainage Standards for 100-year storms. The applicant Ray Hamilton informed the Commissioners that the first increment was well above the storm drain area, however there was one area where the Public Works Department said there was a possibility that it would come within flood water areas in 100 years.

It was moved by Commissioner Murakami and seconded by Commissioner Hanley to approve the Planned Development Permit application with the conditions as outlined by the staff. A roll call vote was taken and motion carried with nine ayes.

SPECIAL PERMIT 72-137 HELEN EMBREY KAHUKU, KA'U Although this item was not on the agenda, the Chair read into the record and placed on file two letters from Mr. E. Dale Bartholomeu and Mr. and Mrs. John Davies requesting the

Commission reconsider its recent action denying the request by Helen Embrey to delete Condition No. 3 of the Special Permit No. 72-137. The Planning Director informed the Commissioners that if they wished to consider the letters and previous action, they would have to make a motion to renew its previous decision by any Commissioner who was present at the last meeting.

In discussion, Staff reported that State statute governing accesses are not applicable because the road was under County jurisdiction. The Department of Public Works recommended that there be access only off of the roads rather than direct access from each of the lots. However there are no specific ordinance relating to access of of County roads.

Commissioner Murakami said he felt eventually the State Highways would take over this roadway and retain the 55-mile per hour speed limit, at which time a criteria would be established as to who can make exists to the highway.

The Planning Director reported that the applicants have the right to appeal the decision to the Third Circuit Court. He pointed out that the original applicant (Darlings) in 1972 accepted this condition and although they did use the access from the highway, the Planning Department unfortunately did not police that requirement - nevertheless it was a violation.

Commissioner Hanley pointed out that Planning Commission's hearings are not a popularity contest, that testimony is invited, but the criteria that Commissioners have to decide on has nothing to do with

the headcount of people for or against a request. Commissioner Martin agreed and added that the Commission represents the entire island and whatever action they take could affect the entire island - if they grant one area a certain request, it would set a precedent for the entire island.

Upon the Chairman's request, the Planning Director said he would prepared the appropriate letter in response to Mr. Bartholomeu and Mr. and Mrs. John Davies and enclose a copy of the minutes. Commissioner Martin pointed out that he has spent a lot of time in the Ka'u area and has never found difficulty finding Tiki Lane. He pointed out that twelve years ago when he lived in Ka'u, the road was so bad that if anyone drove 55 mph, they drove with the peril of their lives. He maintained that now that the road is new, people are not going to drive at the same speed they drove before.

In opening the meeting for new business, the Chair reported that the Planning Director took expedious action regarding the Victoria Silva's application and read into the record his letter to the Corporation Counsel (copy attached). Further discussion was had regarding the Planning Director's request for a legal opinion. Commissioner Hanley pointed out that there would be a number of spot zoning requests should the Corporation Counsel rule it should go through the rezoning process.

Commissioner Martin moved to defer the minutes of September 8, 1977, to the end of the calendar. Seconded by Commissioner Asai and carried.

All those testifying were duly sworn in.

The Chair stated she did not have much time to study the recommendation as she was not present at the last meeting, therefore voted no.

It was moved by Commissioner Fujimoto and seconded by Commissioner Sakamoto to approve the request.

Commissioner Hanley questioned if it was a legal requirement that additional reasons be given when recommendation of the staff is not adhered to. The Chair stated reasons would have to be provided in recommending approval.

Commissioner Martin said that he voted against the previous motion as it had not been established in his mind that this variance was different from any other requests. He expressed concern that this would set a precedent. Commissioner Murakami agreed with the statement.

Commissioner Paris stated his reason for voting no also was the fact that he was not present at the last meeting and was unaware of the staff's recommendation.

Planning Director Fuke stated that whether it was the approval or denial of a variance, findings of fact would have to be provided. He further stated that if the reason for approval is to be predicated on the basis that the Commissioners did not have adequate time to review the application, rather than make a hasty judgment, he suggested this item be deferred.

Commissioner Fujimoto withdrew his motion and Commissioner Sakamoto his second.

It was moved by Commissioner Fujimoto and seconded by Commissioner Paris to defer this application. Motion carried with six ayes and two noes.

SPECIAL PERMIT
HELEN EMBREY
KAHUKU, KA'U

Request by Helen Embrey to delete Condition No. 3 of Special Permit 72-137. The Special Permit allowed the establishment of a restaurant and cocktail lounge. Condition

No. 3 stipulated that access to the area shall be from Tiki Lane and not from the Hawaii Belt Road. The subject property is located at the eastern end of the Hawaiian Ocean View Estates Subdivision on the mauka side of the Hawaii Belt Road and approximately 600 feet west of Tiki Lane, Kahuku, Ka'u, TMK: 9-2-85:22 & 23.

Staff presented background information and recommendation on file.

Upon Commissioner Murakami's and Commissioner Asai's questioning, staff reported that the road has a 55-mph speed limit, and the distance between Tiki Lane to the restaurant was about 600 feet. It was pointed out that the Darlings were the original applicants in establishing the restaurant use, but they have since gone out of business.

Commissioner Martin questioned if it was the contractor's responsibility to repair the entrance at the intersection of the Hawaii Belt Road and Tiki Lane. The Public Works Department responded that they did close off Tiki Lane temporarily, but King Kam Boulevard was still open. The contractor built the road according to the plans designed so that at every intersection there would be a good sight distance.

Commissioner Hanley queried if there was an access from Tiki Road now or if the property had been used without the required access from the beginning. Planning Director Fuke responded that when the initial special permit request was made for the establishment of the restaurant back in about 1972, there was a condition of approval that access be secured off of Tiki Lane and not off the main highway. However, he admitted that some of the enforcement functions have been delinquent and so in fact there have been a lot of vehicles coming directly off of the highway onto the restaurant. He pointed out that the applicant wishes to have this restriction removed, however the staff is saying that there is still some basis for the retention of that special permit condition.

The applicant, Karl Embrey, expressed concern that if his request was not approved, people would be parking up and down the road which would create a traffic hazard and that he would not be able to get any tourists to go around and find his back entrance, especially during the evening. He submitted a petition of about 100 signatures in support of his request.

Commissioner Sakamoto questioned the width of the parking area in front. Mr. Embrey responded that he had a third of an acre paved and if need be, he has a total of two acres to pave. At present, he did have a parking area to provide for approximately 30 cars. Mr. Embrey said that he was not really interested in the big grayline buses but mainly the stretchouts, u-drives, and residents in the area. He said those big buses could come in on Tiki, but the buses would have a hard time turning around. Commissioner Sakamoto pointed out that if the request was approved, those buses could come in one way and out the other.

Commissioner Martin requested Mr. Embrey to comment on the staff's report regarding the developers of the subdivision retaining a 20-foot buffer along the highway and that an agreement must be secured from the developers for any access through the buffer strip. Mr. Embrey commented that there was an easement given to the original owners of the property, but he did not have this in his deed; although he thought it was recorded in the Bureau of Conveyances in Honolulu. Staff reported they did not have it in their files and that it would not necessarily have to be there.

Upon Commissioner Murakami's questioning Mr. Embrey stated that at the time he bought the property in 1965 he was not aware of this particular condition. He said that the driveway from Mamalahoa Highway was already in. Commissioner Martin questioned if it made a difference since the driveway was there in 1965 and our Zoning Code took effect after that. The Planning Director pointed out that when the subdivision was initially approved back in the early 1960's, it was done with the understanding that access would be provided from the interior roads and that no direct access would be considered or allowed on to the main highway. The intent behind that was in a large part, consideration for traffic safety.

The Chair questioned if people travelling during the evening towards Hilo could see the restaurant and cocktail lounge. Mr. Embrey said they could and pointed out that it was a model Lindal home.

Commissioner Sakamoto moved to deny the application; seconded by Commissioner Murakami.

Commissioner Martin stated he would support the motion as he has always gone on record as opposing extra egresses or entrances from major highways and that this would set a precedent.

A roll call vote was taken and motion was carried with eight ayesvotes.

VARIANCE FRANK'S FOODS, INC. WAIAKEA, SOUTH HILO Preliminary hearing on the application of Frank's Foods, Inc. for a variance to allow the construction of a shed addition to an existing non-conforming use within the

Frank's Foods, Inc.'s meat plant site. The proposed 10' x 14' shed would be used to house water system equipment. The property involved is located along the south or Puna side of Kawailani Street, across from the Kawailani Place Subdivision, Waiakea Homesteads, Waiakea, South Hilo, TMK: 2-4-03:portion of 16.

Staff presented background information on file.

The applicant stated they may have used the wrong words in their letter and that it should have been "water pressure" instead of "water supply". Mrs. Esther Frenz pointed out that the water has to go through a pressure system, a holding tank, a pump and air compressor. The applicant stated that she foresees no additional improvements needed to be made in the future outside of this addition.

It was moved by Commissioner Murakami and seconded by Commissioner Sakamoto that the application be set up for a public hearing; motion carried.

Preliminary hearing on the application of Kenneth Fujiyama for a variance to allow a 40-foot right-of-way for a proposed subdivision in lieu of the minimum require-

ment of fifty (50) feet and to allow a cul-de-sac to serve 25 lots in lieu of the allowable maximum of 18 lots. The property involved is located on the makai side of Kupulau Street, between the Macadamia Grove Estates and Haihai Heights Subdivisions, Waiakea Homesteads, Waiakea, South Hilo, TMK: 2-4-44:1.

Staff presented background information and recommendation on file.

The applicant's representative, Al Inouye, gave a chronology of events and correspondence between the applicant and the Planning Department with regard to this application. He pointed out that because of all the correspondence, they were under the impression that everything was all right as far as the cul-de-sac plan was concerned. He stated that because there was a physical barrier at the end of the cul-de-sac and a rise in the land, they felt it would be economically and physically unfeasible to provide the access to that area. Mr. Inouye then pointed out several subdivisions which were given approval that did not conform to the maximum 600-foot requirement as well as the maximum number of 18 lots per cul-de-sac. In view of these variances, he requested the Commission to approve their request for a public hearing on their second request for a variance to create a subdivision with 25 lots being served off a cul-de-sac.

PETITION BY AGNES P. SMITH (A72-323) TO RECLASSIFY 1.5 ACRES FROM AGRICULTURAL TO URBAN AT KAINALIU, NORTH KONA, HAWAII

It was the staff's recommendation that the petition be approved on the basis of its evaluation (see copy of memo on file).

Commissioner Wung moved to approve the petition, which was seconded by Commissioner Mark and unanimously passed.

PETITION BY GENTRY HAWAIIANA ASSOCIATES, J. V. (A72-325) TO RECLASSIFY 290 ACRES FROM AGRICULTURAL TO URBAN AT SOUTH HILO, HAWAII

Mr. Fujimoto, Executive Officer, presented the staff memo recommending that a 167-acre portion of the property be approved for reclassification from the Agricultural to the Urban District, and the remaining 123 acres (approximate) be retained within the existing Agricultural designation (see copy of report on file).

SPECIAL PERMIT APPLICATION BY THERON DARLING (SP72-137) TO DEVELOP A MAIL STATION AND RESTAURANT/BAR FACILITY AT KA'U, HAWAII

It was the staff's recommendation that this special permit be approved subject to the conditions imposed by the County. (See copy of memo on file.)

Mr. Glenn Miyao of the Hawaii Planning Department staff offered additional information that the County Water Department will establish a minimum capacity tank, and there had been no adverse reaction from the Health Department.

Mr. Carl Reed, representing the residents of Hawaii Ocean View Estate, supported the application on the basis that there was a great need for the proposed facility in the area and that he knew of no objection to this request. Similarly, Mrs. Dolores McMann, Mrs. McMann, Mrs. Betty Pettengill all testified in support of the special permit.

Commissioner Napier moved to approve the special permit subject to the conditions imposed by the County, which was seconded by Vice Chairman Tangen and unanimously carried.

SPECIAL PERMIT APPLICATION BY RICHARD SMART (SP72-138) TO DEVELOP A SKEET AND TRAP SHOOTING RANGE AT WAIKOLOA, SOUTH KOHALA, HAWAII

The special permit was recommended for approval by the staff, subject to the 4 conditions imposed by the County and also subject to the 4 additional stipulations imposed by the Land Use Commission staff (see copy of report on file).

Vice Chairman Tangen moved that the special permit be approved as recommended by staff.

Mr. Bob Page, Manager of Sports Center Hawaii, requested that condition No. 1 imposed by the Land Use Commission staff stipulating that the range operations be limited to the hours of 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. daily, including weekends, be amended to read from 8:00 a.m. to 11:00 p.m.. He explained that it was not uncommon to operate a shooting range at night, primarily to accommodate the working people who would like to enjoy the sport in the evening. It was also anticipated that some large international shoots would also be hosted here, involving 100 to 150 participants, which could run into overtime in case of shootouts. He concluded that it would not seem unreasonable to allow the activity to continue into the night.

STAFF REPORT

SP72-137 - THERON DARLING (Ka'u, Hawaii)

A special permit to allow the establishment of a restaurant and cocktail lounge complex on approximately 2 acres of land situated within the Agricultural District at Kahuku, Ka'u, Hawaii has been requested by Mr. Theron Darling. The subject property is located at the eastern end of the Hawaiian Ocean View Estates subdivision and fronts the mauka side of the Hawaii Belt Road, approximately 600 feet west of Tiki Lane. The Waiohinu and Naalehu Urban Districts are situated approximately 12 and 14 miles respectively to the east of the subject land. The property is identified as Tax Map Key 9-2-85: 22 and 23.

Mr. Darling plans to convert an existing residence and former Ocean View Estates tract office into the proposed restaurant and cocktail lounge. The petitioner has submitted a sketch of the existing structure and a rough plan for the proposed facilities. The residence-office contains approximately 4,000 square feet of space under roof and a spacious parking area adjacent to the building.

In substantiation of his request, the petitioner states that:

- The facilities will be situated on the main highway with adequate off-street parking.
- 2. Adequate water can be provided by the existing 19,000 gallon catchment tank and a 1,000 gallon tanker for consumption and fire protection.
- 3. The local residents have requested an establishment of this type to be located in the area.
- 4. The existing structure on the property can readily be converted into a restaurant and cocktail lounge.
- 5. A business establishment will help establish needed employment.
- 6. The proposed use will not be contrary to the objectives of the Master Plan and plan of the state or county.

The applicant further informs that the tract office served as a polling place in previous years and that the Lieutenant Governor has again requested that the office be used for this year's elections.

A major portion of the surrounding lands are vacant and characterized by extensive lava fields. Soil classification by the Land Study Bureau indicates that the subject property is comprised of an clinkers with no soil material and is very poorly suited for overall crop use. The mean annual rainfall is approximately 85 inches and the elevation is approximately 1,900 feet above sea level. Electricity and telephone services are

available from the Belt Road. However, water is provided for by catchment since no water system is available.

County Recommendation

At its September 14, 1972 meeting, the Hawaii County

Planning Commission voted to recommend approval of this special

permit based on the following considerations:

- "1. That there is a need for such a facility for that area. Presently, the nearest operating restaurant/bar facility is situated in the village of Naalehu, approximately fourteen (14) miles away. While a special permit for a similar facility was granted to Harry McKee in September, 1962, it is still not in operation. The area, to date, is still unserved by such facility;
- "2. That the subject area has a very poor soil productivity classification, thus making it difficult to fulfill the intent of the agricultural designation; and
- "3. That there would not be an unreasonable burden on public agencies to provide the necessary services. The only utility unavailable at the moment, is a county waterline. It is nevertheless felt that the proposed facility can be adequately served by the roof catchment method."

The recommendation for approval was contingent upon the following conditions:

- "1. That the proposed development comply with all applicable regulations, codes, including 'Plan Approval';
- "2. That the petitioner be responsible for providing his own water catchment system, including compliance with the National Board of Fire Underwriters requirements regarding the fire protection;
- "3. That access to the subject area be from Tiki Lane only and that direct access to the Hawaii Belt Road be closed off by incorporation of planting along the property line bordering the Hawaii Belt Road;

- "4. That the petitioner be responsible for securing a building permit and assuring construction started for the restaurant/bar facility within one (1) year from the date of official approval and that the facility shall be in operation within eighteen (18) months from the date of approval. For clarification, construction is defined as the actual placing of construction materials in their permanent position; and
- "5. That if the proposed use ceases for a period of more than twelve (12) months, the special permit shall be deemed null and void."

The county zoning for the subject property is A-la and the General Plan designates the area for extensive agricultural uses and alternate urban expansion.

At the hearing, it was reported that the subject land had no severe physical constraints which would render the land unusable for the proposed use, and that "no record of flood inundation problems, historic features, or distinct landforms of significant importance are attributed to this property".

The State Highways Division recommended that, should this request be approved, the following conditions be attached:

"Access to said parcels be from Tiki Lane only and that access to the Hawaii Belt Road be closed off by incorporation of a planting easement along the property line bordering the Hawaii Belt Road". The County Research and Development Department noted that "a properly located eating and drinking facility would add to visitor satisfaction of those traveling on the southern route of the Big Island. The number of people presently

residing in the area and visitors taking the southern route, however, are limited".

The Hawaiian Ocean View Estates Subdivision, the community which the petitioner proposes to serve, consists of approximately 10,000 one-acre lots. As of September, 1972, it was estimated that there were about 85 dwellings in this subdivision.

In the past, a number of special permits have been requested for commercial and industrial uses in this area as follows:

- 1. SP(T)62-21 Harry McKee Granted in October, 1962 to construct a restaurant-bar-office and motel/complex.

 The grant was made with no time limitation for initiation of construction. Although the special permit is still active, the proposed uses have not been totally established.
- 2. <u>SP66-32 Ben Hess</u> Granted in October, 1966 to construct a motel-restaurant facility. This special permit expired after several time extensions were granted.
- 3. SP66-33 David E. Erwine Granted in October, 1966 to construct a contractor's yard and warehouse. This permit expired since no construction was initiated within the one-year time limitation.
- 4. <u>SP69-60 Helen Devine</u> Granted in January, 1969 to construct an eight-unit apartment building, restaurant-

bar and shopping facilities. Expired since no construction was started within the one-year stipulation.

September, 1972, to establish a community-commercial center to include a post office, shops, offices, service station, market, warehouse and other convenience facilities. The county has given approval for the construction of the building that will house the post office, grocery store and limited commercial activity, and will incrementally grant approval for the service station and the warehouse uses upon satisfactory completion of earlier approvals. This special permit is within 25 acres of land in the Hawaii Ocean View Ranchos Subdivision. It is situated just over a mile west of the property now under consideration.

As the above indicates, a high rate of failure to perform has been experienced in the past after special permits have been granted by the Land Use Commission.

Upon evaluation of this request, staff finds that:

- 1. The recently granted special permit to the Ocean View Investment Co. does not include the establishment of a restaurant or bar facility in their request.
- 2. Approval of the request under the County's stipulation

would not unreasonably burden public agencies to provide services and facilities.

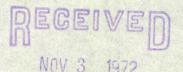
- 3. The proposed use would not adversely affect the nearby properties since the surrounding area is vacant and not used for any agricultural pursuits. The property is classified as poorly suited for agricultural use according to the Land Study Bureau, and the requested use would not remove any lands from agricultural production.
- 4. Presently, there are no restaurant-bar facilities within 14 miles of the subject area which can service residents of the Ocean View Estates subdivision or people travling to and from Hilo and Kona. Although Mr. McKee's special permit duplicates the subject request and is still active, his lack of performance in establishing this convenience facility leaves considerable doubt that his promises will be fulfilled in the near future.

Therefore, based on the above, the staff concurs with the findings and recommendations of the Hawaii County Planning Commission and also recommends approval of this petition, subject to the conditions imposed by the County.

The application is to allow development of a restaurant, cocktail lounge and post office. The land is essentially bare as lava with virtually no soil material. LAND USE COMMISSION BOUNDARY AMENDMENT LILIUOKALANI TRUST & PALANI DEVELOPMENT CO. KEAHUOLU, NORTH KONA

Petition of First Hawaiian Bank, Managing Trustees of Liliuokalani Trust and Palani Development Company for an amendment of land use district boundaries from an agricultural to an urban district involving 100+ acres of land located in Keahuolu, North Kona, Tax

Map Key 7-4-08: portion of 12.

The staff gave the background report as presented at the previous meeting and further pointed out that the Department of Education initially requested some information from the developer and that such information was sent to DOE. The response from DOE had not been received by the last meeting and this was the reason for a deferral recommendation by the staff at the previous meeting. Subsequently, a letter dated August 24, 1972 was received from the State Department of Education and read as follows:

The favorable recommendation was also contingent upon the following conditions: The proposed facility shall be located a minimum of 1000 feet from the southern-most road realignment for the proposed Waimea-Kawaihae Road and also a minimum of 1000 feet makai of the Mamalahoa Highway; That adequate landscaping satisfactory to the Planning Director shall be required; The owner or lessee of the subject area shall be responsible for constructing the facility and operating the facility within one (1) year from the official date of approval by the State Land Use Commission should such be granted; and All applicable rules and regulations shall be complied with, including "Plan Approval." Mr. Kawasaki moved to recommend approval to the Land Use Commission with the conditions attached by the staff. The motion was seconded by Mr. Kai and carried unanimously. LAND USE COMMISSION Special permit to allow the development of SPECIAL PERMIT a restaurant, cocktail lounge, and post THERON DARLING office on approximately 2.15 acres of land located in the Hawaiian Ocean View Estates KAHUKU, KA'U subdivision, fronting the mauka side of the Hawaii Belt Road, approximately six hundred (600) feet west of Tiki Lane, Kahuku, Ka'u, Tax Map Key 9-2-85:22 and 23. The staff gave the background report as presented at the previous meeting. He added that after the public hearing, the department had received a letter from Mr. Chee, Manager of the Honolulu District U. S. Postal Service as follows: "Mr. Raymond Suefuji, Planning Director "We are glad to respond to your telephone inquiry concerning the type of postal service available to residents of Hawaiian Ocean View Estates. "For about a year various residents of that area have complained about the unsatisfactory mail service. Tampering of mail boxes has been reported prevalent, resulting in nondelivery or misdelivered mail. "A recent study made by this office shows that the number of people residing in Hawaiian Ocean View Estates cannot possibly support a post office. However, representations have been made by Mr. Harry McKee and Mrs. Lorraine Darling to provide voluntary service in the receipting and handling of mail, including mailings, without cost to the Postal Service. Their proposal is acceptable, and we have informed them of our willingness to assist them whenever they were ready. This would preclude having to travel to distant post offices at Naalehu or Captain Cook. "We have advised them that the identity of a post office should not be included in this particular program. This type of postal service should be treated like a mail drop and not a post office. The suggested use of the term "mail station" or "mail drop" would relieve it of its identity as a post office. - 9 -

"Since this is a concerted effort by the community on a voluntary basis, the U. S. Postal Service is agreeable to provide this type of service to satisfy the needs of that community. Although we shall furnish them with support equipment, on a loan basis, in the handling of their mail, there are no charges or compensation involved.

"We appreciate your interest and hope we have answered your questions to your satisfaction. If we can be of further assistance, please let us know.

Since there were no questions directed to the staff, the Chairman called for further testimony by the applicant.

Mr. Darling stated that he would like to clear up this post office thing. He mentioned that he had just received a letter from Mr. Chee and it was implied that Mr. McKee has applied for the post office as well. He indicated that Mr. Lee flew in from Honolulu and wanted to know what was going on. He remarked that the people got a petition on his end of the development in the Hawaiian Ocean View Estates and the people on the other side got a petition and they didn't want it down at McKee's. The McKee's got a petition ahead of time, and stopped it after the applicant had applied for originally. He stated that they started a feud over the post office as to where it should be so Mr. Lee had recommended that they have two mail stations and not a post office. The applicant had informed Mr. McKee in the beginning that they could not have a post office and that it will have to be a mail station. They have sent in petitions now to Mr. Chee complaining that they don't want their mailboxes removed from the highway, so it presents a problem now. Mr. McKee didn't want the mail station any more after he had gone through a lot of trouble to get it. The applicant stated that Mr. Chee had written if he would reconsider because there was no sense in having two mail stations. He had been getting mail for seven people but the other end had more people. Now Mr. McKee had thrown up his hands and he found out that he didn't have to even apply to the Planning Commission for a permit because it was a mail station. He stated that they had asked him to sign a petition saying that he didn't want the boxes removed on his end and after he had applied for a mail station for them at their request. So, he had given up on the whole situation until he got a letter from Mr. Chee yesterday. He stated that he intends to write him back saying that they are still willing to put a mail station in if they would stop fighting and personally he did not want to go any farther and come up with any animosity or any feeling of that sort for anybody. He doesn't know what is happening and he doesn't see anybody saying anything about the restaurant or the cocktail lounge and that is the major reason for opening there in the beginning.

Mr. Watt asked whether they can just delete this post office use since it is just a mail drop and it doesn't supposedly affect the Commission. He wondered about the status of a mail drop.

The Planning Director explained that he had talked with Mr. Chee and this is why he had sent the letter. Basically, the problem began because in their enthusiasm many people applied for a post office. He didn't think there was a very clear statement made by the Postal Service of what they were willing to provide for Kahuku area. Prior to the new Kailua Post Office, he thought it was the intent of the Postal Service to consider a post office at Kahuku. Now, with the mail service in Kailua and the reevaluation of their growth for the area, the Postal Service feels that it is uneconomical to provide a post office and they informed him that they are not going to provide a post office but that they will be happy to sanction a mail drop. If all the inquiries made to the Planning Department from the

beginning were on the basis of a mail drop and with the clear indication that there wouldn't be any commercial activity, they would have been informed that they would not need a special permit for this use. As evidenced by the written application, all of the applications were for a post office and a post office is not allowed in the agricultural zone and therefore a hearing was scheduled.

The Director pointed out that as soon as he got word from Mr. Chee that they are just going on a basis of a drop point with no charges and no compensation, the staff had promptly notified Mr. McKee that he may proceed with this mail drop service because he was doing this on a voluntary basis. That was two weeks ago. But on record, this petition for a post office is still before the Commission. In fact requests are for two post offices.

Mr. Darling explained that he did not request for a post office and that in his letter he stated that they were going to install a mail station. He reiterated that there was no request for a post office at all.

The staff clarified that Mr. McKee's request was for a post office and that Mr. Darling's one was a mail station.

The Planning Firector commented that he mentioned two simply because the Commission did consider granting a special permit last month to another development across the street which basically contained a condition that they provide a post office. If the Postal Service is saying they are not ready for a post office there, the developer across the street is hung with a condition he can't perform. So, there are two post offices and he is sure the developer will be running back to the Commission because he can't meet this requirement.

The Assistant Corporation Counsel mentioned that since it is only a mail drop that they should consider this application as a restaurant and cocktail lounge and forget about any reference to the mail drop and that he understood that Mr. Harry McKee is requesting for cancellation of this.

Mr. Watt requested for staff recommendation with the deletion of mail service.

Zone Changes Approved For New Subdivision In North Kona

The path for another subdivision was cleared Wednesday night by planning commissioners who approved zone changes for land in Halekii, North Kona.

Approved with conditions was an application by Kona Scenic Land Inc. for zone changes of 50.8 acres from agriculture to 39 acres of single family residential; 5.5 acres of multiple family residential; 3.5 acres of open; and 10 acres of village commercial.

All the land is in Halekii and will be developed with single family and apartment houses and supporting commercial establishments.

In another matter, commissioners recommended to the Land Use Commission that it approve an amendment of land use district boundaries from an agricultural to an urban district involving 100 acres in Keahuolu, North Kona.

The request was made by managing trustees of Liliuokalani Trust and Palani Development Co.

Commissioners also recommended the Land Use Commission approve a permit to allow development of a skeet and trap shooting range on 12 acres across from the Parker Ranch Racetrack and adjacent to the old abandoned airport in Waikoloa, South Kohala.

In other matters, commissioners:

—Recommended to the Land Use Commission approval of a permit asked by Theron Darling to allow development of a restaurant, cocktail lounge and post office on 2.15 acres in the Hawaiian Ocean View Estates subdivision fronting the mauka side of the Hawaii Belt Road, 600 feet west of Tiki Land, Kahuku, Ka'u.

—Set a public hearing on the application of Tokyu Land Development Hawaii, Inc. for a variance from an ordinance relating to the improvements of an entire 80-foot right of way for a subdivision in Keahialaka and Pohoiki, Puna.

-- Approved an application of K. Que Ltd. for a zone change

from agricultural (A-5a) to an agricultural (A-1a) zoned district for 11.9 acres in Kanaueue, North Kona.

- In unfinished business, planners:

In accordance with Chapter 205, Section 205-6, Hawaii Revised Statutes, we are transmitting the decision and findings of the County Planning Commission on the above application.

The special permit request was to allow the development of a mail station and restaurant/bar facility on approximately 2.15 acres of land located in the Hawaiian Ocean View Estates subdivision, fronting the mauka side of the Hawaii Belt Road, approximately six hundred feet west of Tiki Lane, Kahuku, Ka'u, Hawaii, Tax Map Key 9-2-85:22 and 23.

The Planning Commission at a duly advertised public hearing held on August 24, 1972 at the County Council Room, County Building, Hilo, Hawaii, discussed the subject request. The Commission on September 14, 1972, voted to recommend the approval of the special permit to the Land Use Commission for a restaurant/bar facility only based on the following considerations:

- 1. That there is a need for such a facility for that area. Presently, the nearest operating restaurant/bar facility is situated in the village of Naalehu, approximately fourteen (14) miles away. While a special permit for a similar facility was granted to Harry McKee in September 1962, it is still not in operation. The area, to date, is still unserved by such facility;
- 2. That the subject area has a very poor soil productivity classification, thus making it difficult to fulfill the intent of the agricultural designation; and

3. That there would not be an unreasonable burden on public agencies to provide the necessary services. The only utility unavailable at the moment, is a County waterline. It is nevertheless felt that the proposed facility can be adequately served by the roof catchment method.

- 1. That the proposed development comply with all applicable regulations, codes, including "Plan Approval;"
- 2. That the petitioner be responsible for providing his own water catchment system, including compliance with the National Board of Fire Underwriters requirements regarding the fire protection;
- 3. That access to the subject area be from Tiki Lane only and that direct access to the Hawaii Belt Road be closed off by incorporation of planting along the property line bordering the Hawaii Belt Road;
- 4. That the petitioner be responsible for securing a building permit and assuring construction started for the restaurant/bar facility within one (1) year from the date of official approval and that the facility shall be in operation within eighteen (18) months from the date of approval. For clarification, construction is defined as the actual placing of construction materials in their permanent position; and
- 5. That if the proposed use ceases for a period of more than twelve (12) months, the special permit shall be deemed null and void.

Action on the mail station was not taken inasmuch as it was determined that a special permit was not required for such a facility. A mail station as described in the attached letter from Mr. Chee, U. S. Postal Service, is quite different from a post office.

CHAIRMAN: Item No. 19, public hearing on the application of Theron Darling for a special permit to allow the development of a restaurant, cocktail lounge, and post office on approximately 2.15 acres of land located in the Hawaiian Ocean View Estates Subdivision, fronting the mauka side of the Hawaii Belt Road, approximately six hundred (600) feet west of Tiki Lane, Kahuku, Ka'u, Hawaii.

STAFF PLANNER FUKE: Mr. Chairman and members of the Commission. An application for a special permit has been submitted by Theron Darling for a post office and restaurant/cocktail lounge facility. The proposed building is to be situated in the Hawaiian Ocean View Estates subdivision, Kahuku, Ka'u, Hawaii on approximately two acres of land, described as Tax Map Key 9-2-85:22 and 23. The land fronts the Belt Road, approximately 800 feet west of Tiki Lane and 14 miles west of the village of Naalehu.

The State Land Use classification of the subject area is Agriculture, and thus, the basis for this request. The County zoning is A-la, and the General Plan earmarks the area for extensive agricultural uses and alternate urban expansion.

The subject land has no severe terrain constraints which would render the land unusable for the proposed use. No record of flood inundation

problems, historic features, or distinct landforms of significant importance are attributed to this property.

If the request is approved, the applicant intends to convert a restaurant and cocktail lounge and a post office out of an existing 4,000 square foot residential structure. In behalf of his request, the applicant has maintained that such a facility has been requested for by residents within the area. He added further, that, "there is no facility of this type between Kailua and the Volcano House except for small eating places at Naalehu. There is a need for such a facility at this location to serve not only the residents but the travelers. People that have purchased land in the surrounding area need a place to rest, eat, and obtain information. We get many calls from people who wish to stay near their property while they are developing and building on it. In the near future, we plan to erect facilities on our adjoining acre to help eliminate this problem. Tour drivers and escorts have informed us they need a more convenient place to stop with more parking and better facilities.

"Authorization has been given by Mr. Chee, the Postmaster of Honolulu, to use an adjoining building (14 x 12') facing Highway 11 for a Mail Station for Ocean View. The boxes from the old Post Office in Kailua will be used for this purpose.

"This property has been the polling place (Precinct 1) in previous years and Lieutenant Governor Ariyoshi has requested it again this year for the Primary and General Elections.

"A business in this area will help establish needed employment here.

"The property is on the main highway and the proposed use will not be contrary to the objectives of the Master Plan and Plans of the State and cr County Government."

The applicant intends to open the restaurant for business, if approved, between two to four weeks after notification of approval. He has also consented to devote the parking area for the embarking and disembarking point for the school children within the subdivision.

HELCO, the Police Department, and the Department of Education had no comments to offer. The County Liquor Department has stated that its office has not received any inquiry from the applicant regarding a cocktail lounge. Approval from the Liquor Commission would be needed before such activities may be conducted. The Department of Water Supply commented that as there is no water system in this area, they would recommend that "a water system capable of delivering domestic and fire flow be provided should this request be approved." The State Highways Division recommended that should the request be approved, the following condition be attached: "that access to said parcels be from Tiki Lane only and that access to the Hawaii Belt Road be closed off by incorporation of a planting easement along the property line bordering the Hawaii Belt Road."

The County Research and Development Department noted that "a properly located eating and drinking facility would add to visitor satisfaction of those traveling on the southern route of the Big Island. The number of people presently residing in the area and visitors taking the southern route, however, are limited."

It should also be noted that the McKee's request is located approximately a mile to the west or Kona side of the subject area and approximately .7 mile from the Ocean View Investment Company's special permit request which this Commission had favorably recommended to the Land Use Commission.

CHAIRMAN: Thank you. You've heard the staff presentation. Any comments or questions from the Commissioners? If not, is there a representative here who wish to give further testimony.

THERON DARLING: Mr. Chairman and members of the committee. I am Theron Darling. I would like to clear one point right now that the post office that we applied for when we came up and that the people had requested that there be a post office in that area. So, we wrote to the Postmaster in Honolulu and were given permission to open a mail station, not a post office, but a convenience station for the people so we had signs made up ahead of time because it really didn't need a permit for such a business type operation as Mr. Lee came up last week after there were two applications for permits. He came from Honolulu, flew in, and told me he didn't want to start any bad feelings and I said well I just assume that Mr. McKee have the post office and he can have the signs that we had made up and everything down there. It doesn't make any difference to us. We were trying to help out the people in the area.

As far as the restaurant/cocktail lounge and the situation of water, we have 20,000 gallons on the property. We have a 1,000 gallon water truck that belongs to us. We bring water from South Point and I am also having a purifier attached to the waterline so that we will have enough water, ample water, to take care or serve anybody.

We've had many problems on the highway with people. Even this morning, Slim Holt had a bus breakdown. We had fifty people in the place already this morning and tried to help out and give them assistance. Many other people, since we have been there, the same problems. We hope to establish a place that would be a fine place for people of Naalehu to come and eat as well as the Ocean View Estates and as well as the tourists. I spent three years with Hilton Hawaiian Village as Assistant Day Manager. I know all the problems, I know all the tour drivers and I know everybody around the area. We have been seven years in Hawaii. My son is recently out of and back in Vietnam after three years and this is as well an investment for them and their future. We can be open within two or three weeks from now. We have been doing a lot of work and have already revamped the place in many many ways. So, we hope to have your permission to go ahead and do so.

If there is any question, I would be glad to answer them.

COMMISSIONER VERIATO: Mr. Darling.

DARLING: Yes, Sir.

COMMISSIONER VERIATO: How far is this Hawaiian Ocean View Estates from the Hawaiian Ocean View Investment Company that we have just given them a go ahead signal for a special permit.

DARLING: Oh that, I don't know.

COMMISSIONER VERIATO: I understood it to be about 14 miles from Naalehu.

STAFF PLANNER FUKE: That's right. At the last Planning Commission meeting, this Commission took action on a special permit request from the Hawaiian Ocan View Investment Company. That request also called for a post office facility. The requested area is located approximately .7 miles away from this subject area.

COMMISSIONER WATT: So, that was the service station and a grocery wasn't it?

STAFF PLANNER FUKE: The one that this Commission had recommended approval upon the staff's recommendation was that the first increment would consist of a building which would house the post office facility and the grocery store minimum facility. Provided that they met with those conditions, they could have gone with a service station.

COMMISSIONER VERIATO: It also included a motel complex and office and post office facility, service station and so forth on incremental basis.

STAFF PLANNER FUKE: But to that portion, the motel one, we did not recommend approval. Regarding that application, we just recommended approval on the post office facility and grocery store and provided that they met with that condition, then, warehousing facility and the service station.

COMMISSIONER WATT: The Health Department didn't have anything to say about using tank water as long as there is a purifier.

STAFF PLANNER I'UKE: No.

CHAIRMAN: Any further questions?

STAFF PLANNER FUKE: Excuse me. May I ask the applicant one question?

CHAIRMAN: Yes.

STAFF PLANNER FUKE: At the time of submitting this request, were you aware of Hawaiian Ocean View Investment's special permit request?

DARLING: At the time no. I wasn't aware of it. We were new and I have been coming up here for six months before we purchased the property, but I had understood that they had been turned down. I knew that. I heard that somebody had applied for 51 acres. I believe it was turned down and then I believe the next time I read, there wasn't anything about it in the paper at all after the meeting. After I was informed of such a thing, there was nothing in the paper after the meeting here whether it had been granted or not, so to me, it's still I don't know wether it's approved.

COMMISSIONER VERIATO: It was in the paper.

DARLING: I am sorry but I didn't read it that day. Our facility wouldn't be the same in any way. I don't see how we could bother them at all.

STAFF PLANNER FUKE: The only duplication quite possibly would be the postal services.

DARLING: I've already turned the postal services over to Mr. McKee. He may have them because Mr. Lee said why not have two - make everybody happy; and I said you mean a mile or two miles down the road we have two post office now and we have been wanting post office for all these years. I can't understand having two of them. I mean it just wouldn't make much sense so I'd just assume they have it if they want it. I don't want to start any feud or animosity or anything else. I came up there to try and do business and be a nice guy.

STAFF PLANNER FUKE: So, your request really is for a restaurant primarily?

DARLING: Restaurant and cocktail lounge, and I would like to retract the post office.

COMMISSIONER VERIATO: You are quite aware of the projects that's coming in this Ka'u development regarding hotel complexes restaurant complexes and everything.

DARLING: I am aware of them? Yes, I am aware of everything. It has to be.

COMMISSIONER VERIATO: I was just wondering. It's a short distance from your area to this Naalehu and Punaluu Landing. It's coming up and....

DARLING: This property, I don't know whether you are aware of this property. You probably have seen it. It's a big red drive on the right hand side. It used to be the tract office of Ocean View Estates for a long time and it has a tremendous possibility. If people stop there, it's the best view of South Point that you can get any place from our lanai. There's a tour bus that stops there all the time to let the tourists see South Point from that particular vantage point and it's just a beautiful piece of land. It is actually too large for a home. It's an enormous place and we have the facilities and have already started developing the interior for such a facility. In fact, my son just lost his two fingers sawing the boards, so we got our blood on the walls.

COMMISSIONER WATT: We were thinking he was a Vietnam victim.

DARLING: No. Well, he went through that all right but he was the Admiral's cook for three years in Vietnam so he's a pretty good chef. He was with Spencecliff for three years in Honolulu. So, we think we got a winning combination. I was with Fred Astaire for 16 years and I was a marine for 9 and we had a restaurant in Florida for 7 years. It was a top restaurant, so we hope to establish a very nice place for everybody to enjoy it.

STAFF PLANNER FUKE: Another question. Did you contact the Liquor Commission regarding....

DARLING: No, I haven't for a simple reason that I can't until the permit is granted. I don't know why I would contact the Liquor Commission. I am only going by lack of experience in that department. I know in Florida, we bought the existing place and then transferred the liquor license. We had 5 years there and there's no bad mark against us. It was a number one, Class A place and in fact it was considered the second finest restaurant in Miami proper after a year's time of operation.

CHAIRMAN: Any further questions? If not, thank you.

DARLING: Thank you.

CHAIRMAN: Anyone wishing to give further testimony in favor?

KARL EMBREY: Mr. Chairman and Commissioners, I am Karl Embrey. I was public relations and representative for this subdivision for 8 years. I am also the past owner of this piece of property that is before you. This was my ex-home and I've always thought that the place was too good a place for just a home. It was an ideal place for a restaurant and cocktail lounge.

Mr. Darling has told you that people drop in there. For 4-1/2 years that I was there, there was hardly a day that somebody doesn't come up and drive up in the yard and expects to find a place to eat, and I didn't dare put tiki torches or anything out in the front because I would have nothing but people in. But I don't want to represent myself. I represent thousands of owners in the subdivision who would like to see this go in for a place where they can stop and eat and have something if they can stop and get a drink. I guess that's 5,000 owners in the subdivision. I have personal contacts with all of them.

CHAIRMAN: Thank you.

Anyone here further wishing to give testimony in favor of?

STAFF PLANNER FUKE: Excuse me. Mr. Chairman, could I redirect another question to the applicant?

CHAIRMAN: Yes.

STAFF PLANNER FUKE: Do you already have in mind facilities or equipment for your proposed use?

DARLING: Pardon?

STAFF PLANNER FUKE: Do you already have the facilities or have made arrangements to secure equipment for your restaurant and cocktail lounge business?

DARLING: Have we made arrangements?

STAFF PLANNER FUKE: Yes, to secure either the equipment, chairs, tables and so forth.

DARLING: Oh no. Not exactly, not yet. No, because without permission, how do you go ahead? We only went ahead with the interior and getting ready with the hopes that it would go through, that's all.

STAFF PLANNER FUKE: But then, in two weeks you would be able to secure?

DARLING: Oh sure. We can be in operation in two weeks to start, but not the cocktail lounge - not until we got our license of course. But as far as the restaurant, yes, we can do all that - everything else that we have mentioned.

And, I might say, I would like to add about the school bus - the stopping. I have children - I have nine kids but only four of them lives with us at the present time but that all the others have grown up. I have seven, no eight grandchildren - I can't count any more. I'm not that old either but anyway I do have an enormous amount of children. The school bus, I understand when it stops, there's a blind spot as you come over the hill into the home; and if the bus has been stopping there, any car coming along at a good clip could hit the back of that bus and it would be a tragedy. So, I felt that if they pulled right into the property and the kids could wait on the lanai for the bus stopping in the morning, it would be lot better for them all the way around for everybody because the children do come there to be picked up. Thank you.

CHAIRMAN: Thank you.

Is there anyone here wishing to give testimony opposing the special permit?

If not, what is your pleasure?

COMMISSIONER VERIATO: Mr. Chairman, I move that the public hearing be closed.

COMMISSIONER WATT: Excuse me, should we strike out that post office on this application before we close or can we do that as I understand that the post office should be deleted.

STAFF PLANNER FUKE: The Commission has the prerogative at the time of taking action to delete that.

COMMISSIONER WATT: Okay.

CHAIRMAN: Second to that motion?

COMMISSIONER NAGATA: Second.

CHAIRMAN: It has been moved and seconded that the public hearing be closed. Any discussion?

COMMISSIONER VERIATO: Question.

CHAIRMAN: All those in favor, say aye.

COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

CHAIRMAN: Opposed? Carried.

The public hearing was adjourned at 8:21 p.m.

Dear Mr. Suefuji:

We are glad to respond to your telephone inquiry concerning the type of postal service available to residents of Hawaiian Ocean View Estates.

For about a year various residents of that area have complained about the unsatisfactory mail service. Tampering of mail boxes has been reported prevalent, resulting in non-delivery or misdelivered mail.

A recent study made by this office shows that the number of people residing in Hawaiian Ocean View Estates cannot possibly support a post office. However, representations have been made by Mr. Harry McKee and Mrs. Lorraine Darling to provide voluntary service in the receipting and handling of mail, including mailings, without cost to the Postal Service. Their proposal is acceptable, and we have informed them of our willingness to assist them whenever they were ready. This would preclude having to travel to distant post offices at Naalehu or Captain Cook.

We have advised them that the identity of a post office should not be included in this particular program. This type of postal service should be treated like a mail drop and not a post office. The suggested use of the term "mail station" or "mail drop" would relieve it of its identity as a post office.

Since this is a concerted effort by the community on a voluntary basis, the U.S. Postal Service is agreeable to provide this type of service to satisfy the needs of that community. Although we shall furnish them with support equipment, on a loan basis, in the handling of their mail, there are no charges or compensation involved.

We appreciate your interest and hope we have answered your questions to your satisfaction. If we can be of further assistance, please let us know.
