A special permit request to allow the establishment of the Ka'u Arts, Crafts and Vocational Center and Gift Shop within the Agricultural District at Honuapo, Ka'u, Hawaii has been submitted by the University of Hawaii at Hilo, Department of Continuing Education and Continuing Services. The facility will occupy 3 existing structures at the former Hutchinson Sugar Mill complex situated on a portion of a 10 acre parcel described as Tax Map Key 9-5-14: 46.

The structures are located on the mauka side of the Hawaii Belt Road approximately 3 miles northeast of the Naalehu Urban District. It is proposed that the existing mill office will be converted to house the craft shop; the oil storage building will house the gift shop; and the existing machine shop will be converted to house the industrial arts center. Lands surrounding the mill complex are vacant or pasture lands which are rated fair or poor for overall crop use. On the makai side are the Whittington Beach Park and one single family dwelling.

This request was initiated as a result of the finding by the petitioner that the Ka'u community is in need of courses in art and culture; occupational improvement; vocational training; hobbies and academic courses. The Naalehu Catholic Mission conducts an arts and crafts program but lacks expansion space as well as space to display and sell the finished products. The proposed facility will offer the community a place to learn skills as well as the opportunity to develop a greater sense of community and individual self worth.

At the public hearing held by the County on August 22, 1974, it was indicated that:

1. The landowner, Ka'u Sugar Company, will lease the building to the petitioner at \$1.00 a year and that the use of the land for parking and other purposes will be permitted.

2. The existing water system owned by Ka'u Sugar Company will be utilized. The existing arts and crafts program operated by the Naalehu Catholic Mission would be relocated to the proposed facilities and the program expanded to accommodate more people in the community as well as the scope of the program. The mill proper containing the heavy machinery has been fenced off and will not be accessible to anyone in the crafts area. 4. Because of the unique philosophy and community spirity of the Ka'u community, the people are volunteering their services and therefore, fees are presently for materials only. COUNTY RECOMMENDATION On September 13, 1974 the Hawaii County Planning Commission voted to recommend approval of the special permit based on the following reasons which the staff has summarized: 1. The proposed use would be in conformity with policies expressed in the Hawaii General Plan respecting public facilities and economic development. The project will inject a social and learning stimulus into this rural district and afford an opportunity for the sale of the products as well as the opportunity for community betterment. Since the mill operation has been terminated and is now being conducted at Pahala, the proposed use is not in conflict with existing uses in the area. 3. Since existing structures will be used for the proposed facility, the essential character of the land will not be altered. Since the establishment of the Agricultural classification, the mill operation has ceased and the need for a facility to accommodate the social and educational needs of the people of Ka'u is evident. 5. Public agencies would not be unreasonably burdened as all essential services and utilities are presently available. The favorable recommendation was subject to the following conditions: -2-

- "1. That the grounds surrounding the subject dwellings be properly maintained in terms of landscaping, waste disposal, etc.
- "2. That on-site parking as required be provided for.
- "3. That the special permit be allowed to continue upon the renewal of the 3-year lease, and future lease renewals.
- "4. That in the event the lease is terminated or the operation is stopped because of the lack of funds or any other reason, the special permit will be declared null and void.
- "5. That if signs are to be erected, they will be required to conform to the Sign Ordinance.
- "6. That site inspection by the Planning Department will be permitted to ensure the compliance of the above stated conditions.
- "7. That all applicable rules and regulations including the 'Plan Approval' process be complied with."

It is the staff's finding that the request substantially meets the standards for determining "unusual and reasonable" uses in the Agricultural District. Enthusiastic and overwhelming support was expressed by the people of Ka'u at the hearing held by the Hawaii County Planning Commission. It is obvious that the project has the potential of greatly benefiting and enriching the lives of the people residing in the Ka'u District from a cultural, education and community spirit standpoint.

Approval of the special permit is recommended subject to the conditions imposed by the Hawaii County Planning Commission.

In accordance with Chapter 205, Section 205-6, Hawaii Revised Statutes, we are transmitting the decision and findings of the County Planning Commission on the above application.

The special permit request was to allow the establishment of an Arts, Crafts and Vocational Center and Gift Shop utilizing three (3) existing structures at the former Hutchinson Sugar Mill Complex in Honuapo, Ka'u, Hawaii, Tax Map Key 9-5-14:portion of 46.

The Planning Commission at a duly advertised public hearing held on August 22, 1974 in the County Councilroom, County Building, South Hilo, Hawaii, discussed the subject request. The Commission on September 13, 1974, voted to recommend the approval of the special permit to the Land Use Commission as it was found:

1. That the proposed use will make the highest and best use of the land involved for the public welfare. The proposed use is accommodating the General Plan policy for public facilities which states the following: "In order to provide the necessary facilities to effectively serve community needs, the County shall continue to seek ways of improving public service through coordination of service and by maximizing the use of personnel and facilities." In addition, the General Plan economic element policy states that, "the expansion of higher and continuing educational services and institutions shall be supported by the County." The proposed use intends to meet those needs by creating a facility which affords an opportunity for community energies to be channeled into productive and creative

> The proposed project will inject a social and learning stimulus into this rural district, by providing new avenues for learning cultural skills, arts and crafts - skills as well as vocational opportunities to the people and community of the Ka'u district. Furthermore, the economic base will be somewhat strengthened by the commercialization of the products made and sold at this facility, in that products would be sold to touring visitors as well as to the residents of the County. The applicant is proposing to utilize three existing structures within the existing complex. The only substantial changes to be made will be to the interior of the proposed structures to be used, however some minor exterior improvements will also be required. The essential character of the area will not be changed as landscaping is to be done in such a manner as to utilize existing vegetation in the area in addition to the introduction of other types of flora. And though the use of the land is changing, the essential character of the land would not be substantially changed because the proposed uses will be using the existing structures and existing accesses.

He added that the wire fence in the area was put up by C. Brewer to protect the people who come over there because the heavy equipment and machinery used to come around from the mill.

Mrs. Jitchaku moved to forward a favorable recommendation to the Land Use Commission according to the staff's recommendation with the conditions as stipulated; seconded by Mr. Nagata and carried.

A duly advertised public hearing was held on the application of the University of Hawaii at Hilo Department of Continuing Education and Community. Services for a special permit to allow the establishment of an Arts, Crafts and Vocational Center and Gift Shop

utilizing three (3) existing structures at the former Hutchinson Sugar Mill complex in Honuapo, Ka'u, TMK: 9-5-14: Portion of 46.

Councilman Dante Carpenter was invited to sit with the Commissioners.

The staff presented the attached background information.

It was noted that about 75 people from the communities of Ocean View, Waiohinu, Honuapo, Naalehu, and Pahala representing all age groups, senior citizens to the young people, rented a bus and came in to the hearing to give support to the application.

Sterling asked about the status of the land. Staff replied that they were informed by Ka'u Sugar Conpany that the land and buildings have been vacated and the buildings eventually will be torn down. The material within the buildings will be removed.

The staff stated that the agreement between the State and the Ka'u Sugar Company is that the three buildings will be leased to the applicant without any rent; however, the use of the land will be permitted for parking and other purposes. The utilities and real property and personal property taxes will have to be paid by the applicant.

Mrs. Matayoshi said that according to the terms of the lease with C. Brewer and Company, the rental agreement is for \$1.00 a year and for a term of 3 years until June 30, 1977, and if the program is successful they have indicated that they will consider extending the lease. The document has been approved by the C. Brewer officials and is now in the hands of the Contract Officer of the University of Hawaii.

CHAIRMAN: Item No. 8. Public hearing on the application of the University of Hawaii at Hilo, Department of Continuing Education and Community Services for a special permit to allow the establishment of an Arts, Crafts and Vocational Center and Gift Shop utilizing three (3) existing structures at the former Hutchinson Sugar Mill complex in Honuapo, Ka'u, TMK: 9-5-14: Portion of 46.

Staff?

STERLING: Before we proceed any further, we should invite Councilman Dante Carpenter to come up and sit with us.

CHAIRMAN: We do have an empty chair.

(Dante Carpenter took a seat with the Commissioners)

YAMASATO: Mr. Chairman and Commissioners. The applicant, the Department of Continuing Education and Community Services of the University of Hawaii at Hilo, is requesting a Special Permit to allow the establishment of an Arts, Crafts and Vocational Center and Gift Shop utilizing three (3) existing structures located within the vacated Hutchinson Sugar Mill complex in Honuapo, Ka'u, Hawaii, TMK: 9-5-14:Portion of 46.

The buildings are located on the mauka side of the Hawaii Belt Road directly across the entrance to Whittington Beach Park, approximately 2.6 miles Volcano side of Naalehu School.

The applicant intends to convert the existing mill office into a craft shop, the existing oil storage building into a gift shop, and the existing machine shop building into an industrial arts center, respectively. The gift shop will serve as the outlet for the products made at the art center, as well as for the products made in individual homes.

The subject area is situated within the State Land Use "Agriculturral" district and the County's Agricultural - 20-acre (A-20a) zoned district. The County General Plan designates the area for "Industrial" uses, which accommodates the following types of land uses: "manufacturing and processing; wholesaling; large storage and transportation facilities; power plants, and government baseyards."

The property is also within the General Plan's potential Tsunami Inundation and Fault Zone designation. The General Plan defines the tsunami inundation areas as "areas subject to high seas damage and vulnerable to damage due to the impact of wave action. It may not necessarily imply great tsunami force, depth or damage, but also identify areas susceptible to flooding or overflowing. The following passage is stated within the General Plan: "The entire coastline of the district is subject to tsunami and high seas activity, with the Punaluu and Honuapo Bay areas having been severely damaged from past tsunami activity."

The Soil Conservation Services soil classification rating for the area is VIIs. This rating is defined as soils with severe limitations that make them unsuited to cultivation, and restrict their use largely to pasture or range, woodland, or wildlife. The soil is limited mainly because it is shallow, droughty, or stony. The mean annual rainfall is between 40-50 inches, with the dominant slope of the land between 10 to 15 per cent. However, the land upon which the existing complex stands is relatively flat in character.

The surrounding lands on the mauka side of the highway are vacant and pasture lands, while makai lands contain the County's Whittington Beach Park, one single-family dwelling and additional vacant and pasture lands.

In support of the request, the following was submitted: "Through a series of dialogues, initiated by the Continuing Education and Community Services division of the University of Hawaii at Hilo, Project Learn, a number of needs and concerns were expressed by the people of the Ka'u community. Included among the needs and concerns mentioned most frequently were the following: There is a need for Art and Cultural courses; occupational improvement courses; vocational training courses, particularly in the area of hotel and restaurant training; hobby and "How-to" courses; academic courses, etc.

"Many adults, as well as young people need training.

"There are many residents of Ka'u who have skills and talents which they are willing to share with the community.

"The community needs a place where the various activities can take place.

"Evidence of the interest in and need for the Arts and Crafts can be aptly demonstrated by what is presently happening at the Naalehu Catholic Mission. Here, under the direction of Zachary DeBernadi, eighty persons per week are involved in the following: Woodworking, leatherwork, silk screening, jewelry, welding, sculpture, stone carving, baking, knitting, crocheting, and basketry.

"What is going on is good, however, the program is limited because of lack of space for working as well as lack of space for display. In addition, a suitable area for the sale of the finished articles is needed."

The objectives of the program strive basically toward providing the community with the opportunity to "learn and practice arts and crafts skills," as well as to encourage Ka'u residents to develop a greater sense of community and individual self-worth by working and sharing together in an organized venture.

The following governmental agencies had the following comments:

The Department of Public Works commented that "Driveway approaches from the Hawaii Belt Road to proposed parking areas should be coordinated with the State Highways Division and that permits will be required for improvements to existing structures." Concurrently, the State Highways Division commented that "sufficient parking spaces shall be provided on site to eliminate the need for pedestrians to cross the highway."

The Department of Water Supply comments that the nearest water system servicing this area and that the nearest public water system is located at the Waiohinu Well approximately 5 miles above the subject area. However a private water system does serve the Mill complex. All other cooperating agencies had no comments or objections to the request.

On August 12, 1974, a petition supporting the Special Permit request was submitted to the Planning Department. The petition, which contained 711 signatures were all represented as being residents of the Ka'u district. For the Commissioners' information, the population of Ka'u as of July 1, 1973, is 3,478, of which 1,014 live in Naalehu, and 1,057 live in Pahala.

Thank you.

CHAIRMAN: Any of the Commissioners have any questions they wish to ask the staff?

STERLING: What is the status of the land now, who owns it?

YAMASATO: According to a letter from the Ka'u Sugar Company, the land has been vacated and the present status of the buildings is that they have been vacated and the materials within the buildings will be removed and eventually torn down.

STERLING: The land itself, is the Sugar Company going to lease it to the State or is the State going to purchase it?

YAMASATO: The agreement between the University of Hawaii - CECS and the Ka'u Sugar Company is that the buildings will be leased to the applicant without any rent, just the buildings alone. However, the use of the land will be permitted for parking and other purposes. As far as the lease is concerned, it will cover only the three buildings.

STERLING: Will the Sugar Company, if the private organization use this, will they be willing to furnish this complex with water?

YAMASATO: The private water system of the existing complex will be utilized by the applicant.

STERLING: How about electric power, is this the same way?

YAMASATO: Electric bills will have to be paid by the applicant.

STERLING: But they will be coming from private sources? The Sugar Company supply most of the electric services in the area?

YAMASATO: Public sources are available.

CHAIRMAN: Commissioner Sterling, Ka'u is up to date, they do have power and electric light.

STERLING: I just wanted to make sure so that we wouldn't get into any situation which might be costly.

CHAIRMAN: Any more questions? If not, I will call on the representative of the applicant. Mrs. Matayoshi, will you come forward.

MARY MATAYOSHI: My name is Mary Matayoshi and I am Director of Continuing Education and Community Service of the University of Hawaii at Hilo. Although I am a representative of the University, I would prefer to be considered a representative of the people of Ka'u because in our work, the University work in the Ka'u area, we have found that we certainly, at the University, cannot be effective unless we have the cooperation of the community, and I would like to say here tonight there are people from Ocean View, Waiohinu, Honuapo, Naalehu and Pahala represented here, and they represent all age groups, as you can see, senior citizens, some who can hardly speak English, and all the way down to the young people. These are the people we are servicing in the area.

We have had the very great cooperation from C. Brewer & Company and we have had great cooperation from the ILWU, the senior citizens; we crossed all ethnic lines and I think it is a marvelous project and we are very happy to be associated with the people of Ka'u. And I think that they are very fortunate that Dante Carpenter, Councilman, has represented them so well and supported this program. And I would just like to say that this is just a part of the larger community project that the University is involved in in the Ka'u area.

I do have some newspaper that explain the larger project which, maybe, I can distribute to the Commissioners here this evening. But at this point I would like to turn it over to the people who really had done the work to establish this Center. I turn it over to Bill Merrill here on my right, and Brother Zachary on my left. They, in turn, I am sure, would like to have you Commissioners meet some of the people who are involved in this project.

BROTHER ZACHARY: Commissioners, I just want to say that a project like this is much easier....I arrived in Naalehu just a year ago at the request of the pastor of the Catholic Church and in the Parish Hall we opened the doors and just began our arts and crafts program because it seemed to be needed and that's why he asked me to come to Hawaii. It has proven so that it seems to have been needed because from the first week we've had people there from morning till night, from all ages and all groups, up to 80 a week, and some more than one time; but I counted just once, 80 a week, and more wanting to come and we don't have space for them, no room for them for all the activities.

So, the mill was closed down just a year ago, about the same time that I arrived, and it has been sitting vacant ever since. The idea came up that perhaps we could use those existing buildings and move the Center down there, expand, we intend to work with the schools; and there is good relation between us now with County organizations that are doing things and whatever is needed in Ka'u and whatever the people want that they can't find any place else, we intend and hope and have been trying to promote.

We do concentrate somewhat, it's part of our objective to concentrate on local arts and crafts that had been in existence on Hawaiiana and that sort of thing along with teaching more alien or modern techniques of other things, and perhaps eventually working around to bringing some new techniques to the old crafts and seeing how they might have advanced if it had continued.

This is part of our program, also teaching modern crafts and modern industrial arts and the mill seemed to be a suited place; it's between the communities, it has easy access and the buildings are in sufficient repairs that they can be used with the minimum amount of painting and really no renovation as far as tearing down and putting up; just cleaning and painting and little landscaping the place in the last year has somewhat grown up, the bouganvillia took over and things like that. So, besides being useful to the community itself, the buildings and the landscape improved, and I think the whole area will become quite attractive and will really be a boom for Ka'u.

The existing plan we will use and we are most concerned about the land. We have no intention to do anything to the land than to keeping it up. It is agricultural, and we are all in favor of that, it is zoned agricultural now. We will keep that as it is and there will be no bull-dozing or anything like that. We will cut the grass, which we haven't done recently. The buildings will be kept in repair. We do not really need any improvements other than the cleaning and the painting. C. Brewer has been most cooperative with the buildings. They have fenced in the area, on the map the yellow building in the back, there is a fence going right around that building, all around it, running straight out where those two lines are, straight down to the road, and also on the other side. So, there is no danger of anyone straying out into the larger mill section with all the machinery and equipment that is left up there. That's completely closed off although it can be seen by tourists and what not but it is not accessible to any one in the vocational and craft area.

The parking will be in front, there seems to be ample space all along in there. There will be no visitors running through the back part as such. Tourists and what nots will be restricted to the front building, other than perhaps we can have at certain times a guided tour if that seems feasible, but there will not be tourists and ordinary people will not be running through where the work is being done so that shouldn't be a problem and that it won't be dangerous for the people back there. Only people who are working and learning and studying will be back in that area.

CHAIRMAN: You won't be using the proposed buildings; you will be using any of the other buildings?

BROTHER ZACHARY: The three yellow buildings and access to them across the land, all enclosed in the fence there. I think that pretty well presents the picture.

CHAIRMAN: Mr. Merrill?

BILL MERRILL: I just would like to give you a rundown on some of the activities currently going on at Brother Zachary's shop at the Catholic Mission at Naalehu. He has ceramics going on, throwing on the wheel, both casting and greenware and handbuilding, also upholstery, weaving and spinning and furniture refinishing, jewelry making, shell craft, kukui nuts, semi-precious stones, silver and some other metals. Also copper enamels, batiks, silk screen, tie dying, class bottle cutting. Also, we are going to have some print shop equipment. It hasn't come in yet but it has been identified and is coming in from Honolulu. Also, there will be woodworking equipment and we will have a plants repair shop. Those are some of the activities that are going on presently and some others that we contemplate in the near future. I guess that is all that I can add at the moment. I will be most happy to respond to questions that you may have.

CHAIRMAN: The chair would like to mention for the benefit of the Commissioners that Mr. Merrill is a former State Superintendent of Schools for one of the New England States...New Hampshire.

MERRILL: I might add that like Brother Zachary I have been here only a year; a year in August, we both came a year ago.

MATAYOSHI: They are kamaainas in spirit.

CHAIRMAN: I think that the background which they give to the program really speaks good for it as a start.

MATAYOSHI: I might say that the Vocational Rehab people are very interested in having some of their training done at the Center, and it is very fortunate that Bill has the background because usually it is very difficult to find someone of this background to head a program like this when they want to move into a community to help the handicapped.

We have also talked with other groups that are interested in helping us help them, and we expect this Center to begin training according to the needs that are expressed by the people. I would like to say that we are by the seat of our pants operation, not like the \$6 million operation that you have heard previous to ours, but we are very proud of it. I think you would be very pleased if you had seen how messy that mill was and by people going out there with their sickles and cleaning that area and putting in new plants, I think this is the kind of community involvement and spirit that the people of Ka'u have.

CHAIRMAN: That's why the people behind you look kinda worn out.

MATAYOSHI: By the way, they rented a bus and they all came out here and sang all the way with lot of spirit and I think it is time that you met some of these people.

STERLING: Mrs. Matayoshi, is there a bus service available for senior citizens?

MATAYOSHI: They do have a very limited bussing for the senior citizens service there but it is very limited, and I know the people are very happy that Dante Carpenter now serves on the Transportation Committee of the Council, and I might add here, as a side line, Dante, there came across my desk, I sent for it from Washington, some information about funds that can be used for the study of transportation in counties, but it must have University input. I would like to discuss with Dante at some later time...the involvement of the University in a complete study of transportation for the County of Hawaii and especially for Ka'u.

CHAIRMAN: The members of this Commission are very interested in that, too.

STERLING: What kind of fees are they charging, Mrs. Matayoshi?

MATAYOSHI: This is a very interesting operation, because we hardly charge any fees because Brother Zachary has this philosophy. For example, I know that Mary Cachola is here, for instance, we tried to buy some of her crafts the other day at the crafts workshop and she said, "Oh, no, I'm not selling these because I want to show the people how to make; I want to teach for the area for the project." And she is going to volunteer her services and by the people themselves volunteering their services, this is how we intend to do the major part of their work.

Through the University's Continuing Education Division, of which I am Director, we do send resource people now and again I think I am very gratified that the people are not...they just give of themselves so it is very easy thing to work with them, and I hope they'll never be spoiled that way in this kind of a feeling. So we do things on cost basis so the materials are the only charges that we have there; whereas, in Hilo sometimes it does cost more.

STERLING: It sounds very commendable.

MATAYOSHI: Thank you.

CHAIRMAN: Since the Ka'u Councilman's name was brought up, Dante Carpenter, he wishes to make a statement, too, so I will turn the microphone over to him.

CARPENTER: Thank you very much, Mr. Chairman. I just came from a crash course in how to make a public statement yesterday which we had with the reporters of various news media. I appreciate the opportunity to sit with the Planning Commission this evening and I would like to leave a statement for the record here.

My name is Dante Carpenter. I am a member of the County Council with a residency requirement in the district of Ka'u.

I am testifying tonight in support of the University of Hawaii's Continuing Education and Community Services request for a special permit to establish an arts, crafts and vocational center and gift shop which will utilize the three existing structures at the former Hutchinson Sugar Factory complex at Honuapo, Ka'u.

For as long as I have been a resident of Ka'u, there has always been an expressed concern by numerous individuals from all walks of life for the establishment of such an institute as this. As an exmple, numerous educators have expressed great disappointment at the general lack of cultural pursuits available to residents of the Ka'u communities. I believe that this, in part, has tended to reduce the continuity of teaching staff at our elementary and high schools.

The inspirations of Artisan Brother Zachary and the University of Hawaii Continuing Education and Community Services personnel has indeed "caught on" and presently involves many individuals within the community, only some of whom are present tonight.

As a former employee at Honuapo Factory I know that the site provides safe and ample facilities for the conduct of a center's anticipated activities.

I hope you will agree that approval of the application can only serve to improve the cultural, educational, and possibly economical conditions for the people of the Ka'u communities and will afford them the added opportunity to exercise their individualities.

Thank you very much.

STERLING: I give you A on that.

CARPENTER: After all the bouquets that have been thrown around, it would be pretty difficult to speak against it. But I also happen to be quite familiar with the water system which I helped to install. The system comes off a public system which emanates at mountain house at about a 3500 foot elevation. The system has a capability of something like a hundred thousand gallons of water deliverable per day and the conditions of the pipe line system that were from the main pipe line is from new to very good. It also serves Whittington Park across the street and in 1968, the Company, the Hutchinson Sugar Company at that time, installed a clorination station which is located just above the factory so that the water would be indeed potably of good quality. It does serve also the private homes across the street from Whittington Park and, I guess, about 3,000 head of cattle. We have very good teeth. And I do know that the principals of Hawaiian Sugar and Ka'u Sugar Company are certainly in total agreement with the concept applied here and the use and vision for the communities.

CHAIRMAN: Thank you, Councilman Carpenter. Before I open up for any other statements, Mrs. Matayoshi is there anything else you want to say?

MATAYOSHI: I might just say that there is a need, Mr. Sterling, for transportation in the Ka'u area and the people have formed a committee to investigate perhaps ways that they can cooperate to provide local transportation. The need doesn't seem to be too much between the Ka'u area and Hilo as much as getting within that area and certainly if a shuttle system could be provided between all of these towns within the Ka'u area, I think it would be great.

CARPENTER: Mrs. Matayoshi, your point is very well taken, and, coincidentally, this afternoon I was talking with Mr. Walton Wood, who is the Transportation Coordinator for the County of Hawaii. He has promised that he will sit down and try and ascertain what our transportation facilities are currently operating in the Ka'u area, with just such a purpose as this in mind. And he has also indicated that he will be just too happy to sit down with the Project Learn people to rap on the idea. This, by the way, was advanced to me by Mrs. Markey Hendricks last night and knowing the kind of person Markey is, I thought I'd better get on it right away.

STERLING: With the variables that are offered, isn't there a possibility of federal funding like some of the busses we have in Kona, the OEO busses, particularly for the senior citizens where they will be able to attend some of these classes and will certainly help.

CARPENTER: I think there is already a certain amount of funding allowed by the County of Hawaii for the purpose of senior citizens' use. Then, too, there is a system of availability on, I am not sure how many hours a week or a month basis for the OEO, which is federally funded. I think what we would like to do is to put it all together and to see how we can best serve the bulk of all of the age categories and different ethnic groups and the locale and locations and logistics of the whole thing to best serve the entire community.

STERLING: Certainly the opportunities afforded here are well taken and I would like to see as many people as possible be able to participate and some of those don't have the means. This is what concerns me in getting the bussing. Thank you very much.

CHAIRMAN: What is the rental agreement?

HAYASHI: Mr. Chairman, according to the terms of the lease with C. Brewer, the rental agreement is for a term of 3 years until June 30, 1977. Should they find that the program is successful in 1977....

CHAIRMAN: Have you received any kind of indication from C. Brewer as to whether they will renew or extend the lease?

MATAYOSHI: Yes, at first they talked about a five-year lease, and I think, I don't know for what reason, but they brought it down to three years. But, I think, they have indicated that if it is successful they will consider extending the lease, but it depends on what they have planned for that area. But, knowing the people of Ka'u, I am sure they will dig up another mill in that area should the need arise, but we do need a facility like this. And if the lease is not renewed, I guess we'll just have to search for other quarters. It's too bad.

STERLING: Mrs. Matayoshi, in negotiating this lease between the University of Hawaii and the Sugar Company, are you familiar with this or is this another body within the University setup to negotiate this?

MATAYOSHI: No, it's going to be negotiated with the University of Hawaii at Hilo and the C. Brewer, and it's actually a \$1.00 a year lease and the contract has been drawn up and it has been approved by the C. Brewer officials, the Board of Directors, and it is now in the hands of the Contracts Officer at the University to approve the wording of it. And then it will be signed and sealed and delivered, hopefully within the next few days.

STERLING: From what Mr. Hayashi says, there is no option for renewal.

MATAYOSHI: They have indicated that....

STERLING: Verbally with you folks?

MATAYOSHI: Yes, verbally.

CARPENTER: Perhaps I can add something to that. As an employee of C. Brewer and Company, I have been working on the other side of the fence also, in terms of the main factory operating unit, the heart, which is the boiler unit there. And we have been looking at several different alternatives for the total sugar operations in the area. There is a possibility that that unit may be relocated to Pahala which will then obviously obviate the need for any factory operations continuations at this point. I would say, off hand, that continuation of the sugar factory operations at Honuapo after three years will be very, very small indeed. More than likely, the bulk of the large equipment presently located there will be stripped and removed to other areas.

STERLING: We have the tax key. Does the tax key take in that exact area, Mr. Hayashi, 9-5-14:46?

HAYASHI: That is correct, Commissioner Sterling.

STERLING: For the complex we are talking about, would it be possible, Dante, under this deal, to more or less be binding on the sugar Company? I am exploring this now. On this lease, for instance, they would have to pay the taxes on it?

MATAYOSHI: I think the University is to pay the taxes now, according to the contract that I have seen. And then, because we are an educational unit, we would be free of that obligation then. But also we are going to purchase insurance, liability insurance in the event of accidents and things like that. That is part of the contract.

STERLING: Yes, that was what initiated the question. From what you have offered here, you are going to have various people offering services and in order to protect them, and from what Dante said, and I am assuming that there is no possibility of cut off of the water within the near future, although you said that it does emanate from a public source but it is privately owned up to this point.

CARPENTER: The only cut off might come from the County of Hawaii and I doubt it very much if they will consider that.

<u>HAYASHI</u>: Mr. Chairman, in response to Commissioner Sterling's question on real property tax, according to a letter from C. Brewer, it is stated that the tenant shall pay the real property taxes and personal property taxes, if any, and all utility charges.

STERLING: Thank you.

CHAIRMAN: Mrs. Matayoshi, the buildings that are going to be built, the three yellow ones, are they there now?

MATAYOSHI: Yes, they are there now.

CHAIRMAN: They are there now? I misunderstood. I thought they had to be built.

MATAYOSHI: They need a coat of paint. Other than that, they are standing there.

ASAI: Mrs. Matayoshi, what is the size of that large building in the square foot?

MERRILL: I can give it to you roughly, it is approximately 100 feet by 60.

CHAIRMAN: Any other questions? The Chair would like to open it up to anyone else who would like to say anything, especially, I appreciate so many of you people from Ka'u coming out here, and I hope that Mrs. Matayoshi's faith is well founded that they all came in support of it. We will open it up to anyone who wish to give testimony infavor of the application. I would like to encourage all of you to say something. Don't be bashful; we will try to be informal even though we are sitting up here and you are down there. It is not required, but if you have anything written out, give it to our secretary, if possible, but please give us your name and you are welcome to say anything that you wish, and if you will raise your hand if you would like to make a statement.

JITCHAKU: Mr. Chairman, can I add something.

CHAIRMAN: Yes, Commissioner Jitchaku.

JITCHAKU: I just want to, maybe be one of the first to commend the University of Hawaii. I think the starting of a program up in Ka'u shows a very favorable, especially the idea of the University and if that continues on, I think, maybe you'll decide to go Kohala way.

MATAYOSHI: As a matter of fact, we have considered, we were thinking in terms of moving into the Puna area next.

CHAIRMAN: Thank you, thank you.

MATAYOSHI: And Takashi (Domingo) knows that we are working with him in another project.

CHAIRMAN: Any help I can give you in Puna, I'll be happy to. Anyone wish to give testimony?

ROBERT BROOKS: My name is Robert Brooks; I am a resident of Kiolakaha Homesteads in Ka'u, one of the small areas that Commissioner Sterling was concerned that we are not going to have electricity. I would like to speak in favor of the project at Honuapo Mill. My own interest being in the appliance repair shop, which I hope in the near future to be able to be an instructor.

My experience is primarily in electronics, some 18 or 20 years worth, and I do have some instructional background both in the military and civilian life. I feel that I am well qualified to instruct in basic electricity and appliance repair for young people in the high school area who are thinking perhaps of dropping out of school because it is not too interesting to them. And I think I can perhaps introduce some of our friends here in the community also to speak out in favor of the proposed project since we all sang together on the bus coming in.

STERLING: How familiar are you in building windmills? I'll go along with you.

BROOKS: This is one of the proposed projects at the mill, to look into wind generated power. There is plenty of wind in Ka'u, and I think we will be getting into this area of wind generated plants there at Honuspo eventually

CHAIRMAN: Thank you, Mr. Brooks. I heard that there was a lot of singing on the bus; maybe we could be entertained. Some one else wish to offer testimony?

MARY GALI: Mr. Chairman and Commissioners, I am Mary Gali. I am not a superintendent of schools, neither am I a teacher of any kind. I am just a resident of Naalehu. Well, the Hutchinson Sugar Company complex mill has been abandoned due to the merging of Hutchison and Hawaiian Ag Sugar Company into one, renamed Ka'u Sugar Company. We, the residents of Ka'u area wish to express our sincere and dire need for an arts and crafts center for all interested Ka'u surrounding area. We thank the University of Hawaii Continuing Education and if you see it our way, we also thank you all. And please, we are counting on it. Thank you. We are working very hard to have this arts and crafts complex going for us and we really need it. So again, I am asking that all of you will see fit in granting us our wish. That is all I have to say.

CHAIRMAN: Thank you very much, Mrs. Gali. Someone else would like to offer a statement? Please don't be bashful. I know for many of you this is the first time you've been to a hearing like this and I would like to encourage you.

HELEN TAYAMIN: My name is Helen Tayamin. We need the mill very badly because as I went into Brother Zachary's little shop one day, I don't think they will expect me in there more because of my size, so I think this way all of us here prove it that we need something bigger and stronger and something solid that we can stand on.

CHAIRMAN: Thank you. Anyone else?

LILLIAN BIGGLE: I am Lillian Biggle and I didn't mean to speak at all, but everybody shoved this at me. But I have been covering all of the meetings for West Hawaii Today and for our little messenger newspaper, and the enthusiasm of this group is something that you just don't see. In most meetings, the people are usually lackadaisical, they'll propose something, and then it dies off and you never hear anything more about it. But the group that has been working involves a very enthusiastic young group and people of all ages and all talents or lack of talents, and I think this is an unusual and unique group. If Kona can get their coffee mill, Ka'u needs their sugar mill. Thank you.

STERLING: Thank you very much, Mrs. Biggle. It is also a welcome to have so much support for something. Usually a group comes and they are against it.

WATT: I would like to make a comment here. You people seem to be such a friendly group as compared with people from Mr. Sterling's area. I wonder if it is the water.

CHAIRMAN: Anyone else?

BETTY SCHUSTER: I am Betty Schuster and, of course, I am speaking in favor of this proposition. In observing what's been happening in these meetings, one of the things that appears to me that will be of benefit to the whole district is the growing unity between Pahala and Naalehu. When we first moved there a little over two years ago, there was very little communication between the two towns and a lot of antagonism. I have seen people from both towns sitting at meetings and truly getting to know each other and we've got to know people from Ocean View, and it's really unifying our community. The other benefit that I can see very strongly coming from this is encouraging the cream of the crop of the young people in Ka'u to stay in Ka'u and not to go off to Hilo and Honolulu with their talents.

CHAIRMAN: Thank you very much, Mrs. Schuster. Your comments are very gratifying and I am very happy to hear what's going on.

LILY HEKEKIA: I am Lily Hekekia from Pahala. All these years I have been in Honolulu and so I retired here and I have been here a little over a year and a half and I find that the village of Pahala and the district of Ka'u really need a center like this. And we are very fortunate to have distinguished workers like Brother Zachary and Mr. Merrill and all his helpers. And I am glad that this thing is going through.

CHAIRMAN: Thank you very much.

MRS. LUCAS: I am Mrs. Lucas from Naalehu. I am a housewife and I like to thank Mrs. Matayoshi, Brother Zachary and Bill Merrill and the rest of our members here. We are all happy to get the place in Honuapo because I used to live there before. I used to have a bar across the mill and I know people like that place and nice place to work and I guess Dante did help us too, so, thank you very much.

CHAIRMAN: Thank you, Mrs. Lucas.

MR. HEKEKIA: Mr. Chairman, my name is Hekekia and I am a member of the Pahala Senior Citizens and I am not too old to learn. There are some young people here who are not too young to learn. And I love to woodcraft and that's the place for me to go. Mahalo Nui Loa. I hope everybody will get up and say something.

CHAIRMAN: Thank you very much.

MATAYOSHI: I think Sharon Lui might want to say about what the young people have to say.

CHAIRMAN: Sharon had to face me in school and now she is facing me again.

SHARON LUI: About a year ago we started a Youth Committee and with the help of Mrs. Matayoshi we've done all kinds of things, and our last project was a survey of the Senior Citizens in Ka'u and we are trying to help them come out of their shells if they are not already active and with the result try to help them start with new programs. And also with a lot of help from CECS, we are planning on a trip to Honolulu in September and about 20 of us are going for college orientation and we will stay there a week. And if it hadn't been for them, we wouldn't be really working that hard. Thank you.

MATAYOSHI: They are earning their own money.

CHAIRMAN: Thank you, Sharon. I would like to say for the benefit of the Commissioners that Sharon is one of the top young people in Ka'u.

STERLING: Mrs. Matayoshi, what is the cost of the bus ride? I want to know because if it is cheap enough, I want all you folks to come to Kona.

MATAYOSHI: We have the Saplan bus in Ka'u and they helped us.

STERLING: It is very gratifying to see the older people, ethnic groups, and young people all gathered together in one common cause and to see that you are doing wonderful things out there, and God will continue to bless you to continue to progress with that.

CHAIRMAN: Anyone else would like to make a statement? Following the procedure of public hearing, I would like to ask the following question. Anyone here who would like to make a statement to oppose the application? I don't think anyone dares.

Mr. Chairman, if there is no one to speak in opposition, I move to close the public hearing.

JITCHAKU: I second the motion.

CHAIRMAN: It has been moved by Commissioner Sterling, seconded by Commissioner Jitchaku, that we close the public hearing. Any discussion? All those in favor say "aye."

COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

CHAIRMAN: Opposed? Motion is carried. I have a couple of statements to make. One, I hope, will be very good, and I know you will be disappointed in the other one. First of all, we are gratified that so many of you came from Ka'u. Also, we are gratified that for once we had a public hearing that was fun; usually they are not. I think I speak for all the Commissioners that I am very happy for all the work you are doing and I would like to second the comments that were made before, as far as your getting together.

Sorry to say the next statement, but this is a Special Permit, and, according to the law, we cannot take a vote tonight. We have to wait 15 days. That is the rule around a Special Permit. We cannot vote for 15 days. Our next meeting will be in Kona on September 13. Then, if the Commission denies the application, it is dead. If the Commission approves the application, it still must go to the State Land Use Commission. They may or may not hold a public hearing. They will have to vote on it. That is the rule around a Special Permit, which is not a change of zone or variance but a Special Permit to use land already zoned for something else, to use it for a special project. I am sorry that that's the way the rules You came here and you cannot see us vote. Come to Kona, it might show the Kona people there.

If the Commissioners don't mind, there are some Commissioners you never met before. Far right is Commissioner Domingo who represents the Hamakua district. He is with Honokaa Sugar Company. Commissioner Sterling represents Kona. He spends quite a bit of time with a couple of churches there. On my far left is Commissioner Watt who represents Hilo. He has a farm up in Panaewa Forest. And Commissioner Asai, who represents the Kohala district. Commissioner Jitchaku is from Hilo. She is manager of Orchid Isle Hotel. And most of you know me. I represent Puna, and sometimes I think I represent Ka'u, too.

MATAYOSHI: I think the people have really expressed it.

CARPENTER: I recall many evenings after pau hana I've seen them diligently watering the poor bouganvillias because it is very dry area. We planted a bunch of bouganvillias, a bunch of hibiscus, and periodically we castrated the coconut trees to make it a really nice place to work, so we could sit under the trees and enjoy the sunlight and it is close to our working place, and I know that they have just now done a tremendous amount of work in clearing the area and in about six weeks it is going to be just beautiful. I hope the 15-day period will allow it to become more beautiful. Thank you very much.

CHAIRMAN: I should say that during the 15 days before we vote, the Commission will accept any written testimony anyone will give to the Commission. They will be read at the next meeting.

The public hearing was adjourned at 8:15 P.M.






Proposed Gift Shop IT Concrete Block Walls E Corrugated Iron Roof E.

Located on the southeast flank of Mauna Loa, the single largest land mass on earth, it is the southermost portion of the United States.

Blessed with fertile soil, benign climate, and adequate rainfall, Agriculture is the main source of livelihood for its peoples. Major Agricultural enterprises include sugar, ranching, and macadamia nuts.

While Ka'u is large in land area, its population density is low; however, because of new subdivision developments, as well as proposed resort development, population is projected to increase rapidly in the next ten years. The actual population in 1972 was 3398 with the projected population for 1980, 5100.*

South Point, the southernmost point as the name indicates, is believed to be the first landing place of the ancient Hawaiians.

For this reason, it is an important area for archeological research.

One can drive from border to border of this district, admiring the volcanoes, the views of Puu Enuhe and Puu Makanau, the Black Sand Beach at Punalu'u, the sugar towns of Pahala and Naalehu, the valley of Waiohinu, the southern tip, and the new development at Hawaiian Ocean View Estates, without leaving his car.

The main population centers at the present time are: Pahala, site of the Ka'u sugar mill and Ka'u high school, which serves students in grades 9-12 from Kapapala to Ocean View, a distance of approximately thirty-five miles. Naalehu, the southernmost community in the United States, where many of the plantation workers reside. Waiohinu, located in a beautiful valley and having quantities of clear fresh water from the Ha'ao Springs, was, in earlier times, the home of the Alii. Today it is a small village with great potential for residential growth, evidenced by two recently approved subdivisions

within its boundaries. <u>Hawaiian Ocean View Estates</u>, located close to the South Kona line, is a newly established community populated largely by Caucasians from many different sections of the Mainland. This community is dependent upon Naalehu for shopping, Post Office, and other governmental services.

BACKGROUND - THE NEED

Through a series of dialogues, initiated by the Continuing Education and Community Services division of the University of Hawaii at Hilo, Project LEARN, a number of needs and concerns were expressed by the people of the Ka'u community. Among the needs and concerns mentioned most frequently were the following:

Bright young people are leaving Ka'u after high school.

Unemployment and underemployment are high among Ka'u residents.

There is need for Art and Cultural courses; Occupational Improvement courses; Vocational Training courses, particularly in the area of Hotel and Restaurant training; Hobby and "How-To" courses; Academic courses, etc.

Many adults, as well as young people need training.

There are many residents of Ka'u who have skills and talents which they are willing to share with the community.

The community needs a place (adequate housing) where the various activities can take place.

Evidence of the interest in and need for the Arts and Crafts can be aptly demonstrated by what is presently happening at the Naalehu Catholic Mission. Here, under the direction of Zachary DeBernardi, eighty persons per week are involved in the following: Woodworking, woodcarving, weaving, upholstery, ceramics, papiermache, batik, spinning, leatherwork, silk screen, jewelry, welding, sculpture, stone carving, baking, knitting, crocheting, and basketry.

What is going on is good, however, the program is limited because of lack of space for working as well as lack of space for

display. In addition, a suitable area for the sale of the finished articles is needed.

Ka'u High School has the dubious distinction of having one of the lowest achievement test records in the state. Reasons which contribute to this low standing, as given by the high school administration are: 1. Low ability levels of many of the students, 2. Family attitudes about learning and education, 3. Poor attendance of many students, 4. Lack of effort by some students, other activity being more important to them than studying.

One may question the "real" reasons for low achievement - curriculum not meeting the needs - cultural attitudes - motivations - inadequate testing - whatever the reasons may be, the fact remains that the low profile exists.

A follow up study, conducted by the administration at Ka'u High, of graduates over the past five years indicates that the students who did well are leaving the area. In other words, the cream is being skimmed off leaving behind those who, by and large, are lacking in marketable skills for employment.

There is a need for skilled tradespeople in Ka'u, evidenced by the fact that it is virtually impossible to get appliances repaired, electrical or plumbing problems serviced or radio and television sets repaired without transporting them to Hilo sixty miles away. PHASE I ART CENTER AND GIFT CHOF

- 1. To obtain a place (housing) where Ka'u residents can learn, teach and practice Arts and Crafts skills. (Art Center)
- 2. To provide an outlet (Gift Shop) for items produced at the Center or in the residents' homes. (Cottage Crafts)
- 3. To encourage the preservation of native Hawaiian Arts and Crafts as well as the Arts and Crafts of other ethnic groups.
- 4. To support and encourage Ka'u residents who want to start independent projects in their homes. (Cottage Crafts)
- 5. Through the process of creating, learning and teaching, to develop and enhance a feeling of self-awareness and self-worth on the part of the Ka'u residents.
- 6. To develop a spirit of unity among the various communities of the Ka'u District by sharing, learning and working together.
- 7. To create an atmosphere of mutual respect and trust at the Center where people will feel comfortable about learning, teaching and working.
- 8. To provide training for Ka'u residents in Purchasing and Sales. (Gift Shop)
- 9. To develop an appreciation for and preservation of the natural resources of the area.

PHASE I ART CENTER GIFT SHOP

Housing must be located which has adequate space for many kinds of Arts and Crafts projects to go on at the same time. At the Center students and teachers (for the most part local resource people identified by the community) will be brought together at a time and date mutually convenient.

The Education Committee of Project LEARN voted unanimously in favor of this project and has designated two of its members to pursue locating housing. One site, in particular, was identified as highly desirable by the Committee. The site is the recently closed Ka'u sugar mill located at Honuapo. The Honuapo site is desirable for several reasons, namely:

- 1. It has adequate space for Phase I (Art Center-Gift Shop) as well as for Phase II (Vocational Training) with additional future possibilities.
 - 2. It has ample customer parking space.
- 3. The Honuapo location is between the two largest population centers of Pahala and Naalehu.

In addition to locating housing, the Education Committee is conducting a survey, in each community, to identify residents who have skills to share.

Equally important will be the Gift Shop part of Phase I. This will serve as the outlet for the products made at the Center as well as for the products made in individual homes, commonly referred to as Cottage Crafts. Products in each case will be placed in the Gift Shop for sale by students who are seeking training in Purchasing, Sales and Display.

PHASE II VOCATIONAL TRAINING CENTER

Objectives:

1. To establish courses in the following areas:

A. Tailoring

F. Agriculture

K. Landscaping

B. Upholstery

G. Horticulture

L. Welding

M. Appliance Repair

D. Furniture Making

O. Silk Screen

- 2. To cooperate with Ka'u High School to allow the use of the Center facilities as an alternative additional vocational training center.
- 3. To establish additional courses when there is evidence of a need.
- 4. To promote an "Ecological Awareness" by giving consideration and emphasis to the natural resources of Katu.
- 5. To establish courses based on the needs of the agricultural interests in Ka'u.
- 6. To promote individualized and indepth instruction by keeping class size small.

PROPOSAL PHASE II VOCATIONAL TRAINING CENTER

Vocational courses will be open to high school age students as well as adults. Courses will be taught by local resource people and/or instructors from the University of Hawaii at Hilo. Classes will be scheduled for the mutual convenience of both students and instructors.

Since the Center will be cooperating with all existing educational agencies, it will be viewed as providing additional and in depth training for those seeking it in particular areas.

The Center will be staffed on a full time basis by a person who has had experience teaching most of the areas enumerated as well as by a professional management person. In addition, secretarial support will be provided as needed.

GOVERNANCE:

The proposed programs, based on needs expressed by the Ka'u community, will be governed by representatives of the community.

EVALUATION:

Evaluation will be based on meeting the stated objectives. Techniques employed will include the following:

- 1. Photographs before and after (site)
- 2. Record of citizen participation.
- 3. Questionnaire on participants' response to Center.
- 4. Statements from participants regarding the learning/teaching situation.
- 5. Statements from participants regarding their progress.
- 6. Record of Cottage Craft placement in the Gift Shop.
- 7. Record of new persons starting Cottage Crafts businesses.
- 8. Record of various types of courses going on.
- 9. Statement from resource people on the achievement of students.
- 10. Analysis of financial condition of Center.

This letter is in reply to your questions re: Special Permit Application TMK: 9-5-14: Por. of 46

Question 1: What type of water system is to be used to service the project?

Domestic water is supplied to the Office, Lab., and drinking fountains in the portion of the Mill which the Project will use. This same water is supplied to the homes in the Honuapo area. It is chlorinated and maintained by Mr. Tsure Sumida of Pahala who works for the Board of Water Supply.

Question 2: Is parking to be allowed also within the project area in addition to the proposed area adjacent to the highway?

Parking will not be permitted within the Project area. Artisans, students and Project staff will park in the parking lot across Route 11 from the Project Site. Visitors and customers will park in the proposed area adjacent to the highway.

Question 3: Will the existing fence fronting the subject area be taken down?

The existing fence fronting the Project area will not be taken down. It is desirable to leave it intact for security and safety reasons.

Question 4: Who is to be responsible for clearing the area and renovating the buildings for the proposed users?

Ka'u Sugar Company is presently clearing their equipment from the Project area. The Project staff will clean the buildings, clean and trim the grounds, and paint the buildings. We do not see the need for major renovations in the immediate future. If and when renovations are needed, the Project will be responsible for them, with the approval of Ka'u Sugar Company.

Question 5: How is the project being funded?

The University of Hawaii at Hilo - Continuing Education and Community Service Center has been granted Title I funds for a community development project under the Higher Education Act. UHH-CECSC will provide continuing support in terms of professional resources and workshops.

In addition, funds for permanent personnel and equipment will be sought through State and Federal funds as well as through private foundations. The project is working towards a self-supported community center.

If and when the project is incorporated and self-supporting, the University will turn the governing of the Project over to the corporation.

The University of Hawaii at Hilo-CECS request for special permit application concerning TMK 9-5-14:Portion 46 was submitted through the USDA Soil Conservation Service for our informal review. Soils and related information that may be considered are listed below.

Soils

rRO Rock land. This miscellaneous land type consists of pahoehoe lava covered in places with a very shallow soil. Pahoehoe rock outcrops occupy 50 to 90 percent of the surface area. The soil material occurring between the rock outcrops average 6 to 8 inches. In some areas, the soil extend deeper into the cracks and crevices of the lava. Vegetation is confined mainly to the soil covered areas and in fractures and crevices of the pahoehoe lava. Plants suffer from drought during dry spells. Vegetation varies according to rainfall and climate. Elevation ranges from 10 to over 150 inches. Water erosion hazard is slight.

Other Factors

The Ka'u Community Arts, Crafts and Vocational Center and Gift Shop will satisfy a need of the Ka'u District. We hope this project will succeed for the betterment of the community and individuals.


