Kona, Hawaii. The motion for denial of the petition was on the basis that the application was premature. The Commission noted that a Special Permit was approved in August, 1974 (SP74-184, Sim Wenner) which would provide 10 acres for burial sites; and also that it did not have sufficient information to approve the request now under consideration. The Commission further instructed its staff to request the Hawaii County Planning Director to consider the following: 1) that should future Special Permit applications be considered for the establishment of cemetery uses, particularly in the West Hawaii area, that the petitioner be required to show the need for such proposed uses in more depth; that in addition to conformity with General Plan criteria, other supportive data such as population growth rates, death rates, availability of burial facilities and other pertinent information be considered for inclusion in the findings of the Hawaii County Planning Commission; and that a comprehensive study be made to determine the projected needs for additional facilities of this type.

Mr. Gordan Furutani, Planner, read the staff memorandum (see copy on file).

At the request of Commissioner Whitesell, Mr. Furutani gave a brief comparative description of the cemetery proposals by Sim Wenner, Hualalai Memorial Park, Inc. and the subject petition in terms of size, number of plots, type of facility, total acres involved, etc.

The question was raised concerning the need or justification for another cemetery in the Kona area. Chairman Tangen recalled that at the time the Commission approved the Sim Wenner request, it was felt that there was a need for additional plots in the area. Both the earlier Hualalai and present requests were also proposing to take care of needs long into the future and there was a serious question of justification for additional facilities of this type.

SUBJECT: SP 75-222 - Kapehe Land Investment

Mr. Mark M. Onaka, in behalf of Kapehe Land Investment, requests approval of a Special Permit to allow the establishment of a Memorial Park including a mortuary and mausoleum within the State Land Use Agricultural District at Kalaoa 2nd, North Kona, Hawaii. The subject property is described as TMK 7-3-02:9 and consists of approximately 31.18 acres of land. It is located along the mauka side of Mamalahoa Highway directly across from the Kona Wonder View Lots Development. The property is owned in full-by Mrs. Emma Jane Kapehe.

In support of his request, the applicant has submitted a proposed development plan and the following statements:

- 1. "Requested special permit use conforms to Section 13 (B) (20) use and buildings normally considered accessory to the above permitted uses subject to approval of the Director.
- 2. "The desired use will be a long-term development and definitely fit in with the ecology plans for Hawaii. The design will be developed artistically and the perpetual maintenance of the grounds should enhance the value of surrounding property.
- 3. "The desired use will require water, telephone and electricity from available public utility facilities. The burden should be no greater if as much as a similar agricultural planned area with residences. Internal roads and streets will be built and maintained by the developer. Access roads may need to be paved and widened. Police protection in most cases would be limited to funeral escorts.
- 4. "At present West Hawaii has a number of small cemeteries that are not very well maintained, and only very limited space left for burial plots. The normal growth of population in this area may be expected to create a strong demand for County action to provide additional cemetery space. This proposal would relieve the County of this problem to a large extent.

- 5. "The land upon which the proposed use is sought may be considered as a necessary complement to the other uses permitted within the district. The proposed use may be considered just as essential to the public as parks, recreation areas, airfields, private clubs, golf courses, and other amenities.
- 6. "The proposed use will in general conform to the character of the land and should not pose any problems of drainage or other ecological factors. At present the land is not being used for any agricultural activity.
- 7. "A memorial park will fill an urgent need in West Hawaii. When completed it will afford many positions for local residents, including workers on the grounds and offices. This cemetery will be available to all the people of Hawaii regardless of religious beliefs or ethnic group. A full-service mortuary and mausoleum will be included on the grounds with various facilities to accommodate the desires, needs and wants of all the religious and ethnic customs of the Islands."
- In addition, the applicant, in part, has submitted the following information regarding the proposed project:
- 1. "Two acres of land will be set aside for those who must turn to the State of Hawaii or County of Hawaii for their burial space and funeral expenses.
- "The project will start with the development of ten acres into the various areas, with roads, the mortuary and the mausoleum.
- 3. "According to Utility Commission statistics, there are 18,000 people in the Kona area and 10,000 people in the region of Honokaa and the Kohalas. This would indicate a death rate in the area of 250 per year."

Presently, a single-family dwelling and a carport is situated on the subject property. The land is not used for any agricultural activity and the surrounding land area includes a Roman Catholic Church, the Church of Latter-Day Saints, pasture lands, and scattered single-family residences. There are several small cemeteries located within the North Kona District and a proposed new cemetery. The proposed cemetery is situated approximately 4.7 miles south (Kealakekua side) of the subject property. The Land Use Commission approved the Special Permit request to establish this cemetery by Sim Wenner (SP 75-184) on August 10, 1974. The proposal under this Special Permit includes the development of 3,000 plots on approximately ten acres of land.

The soil type of this parcel is Punaluu extremely rocky peat, rock outcrops occupy 40 to 50 percent of the surface and the surface layer is about four inches thick and underlaid with Pahoehoe lava bedrock. The soil is rapidly permeable, runoff is slow, and the erosion hazard is slight. The land capability unit is class VII or soils which have very severe limitations for crop cultivation and limited pasture, woodland and wildlife uses. Rainfall in the area is about 40 to 50 inches annually and the slope is approximately 6 to 20 percent.

The General Plan Land Use Pattern Allocation Guide Map designates the area for extensive agricultural uses and as an alternate urban expansion area. The County's zoning designation is Ag-20 acres. The zoning code of the County allows cemeteries within the Agricultural zone.

The "Public Facilities - Health and Sanitation" subelement of the General Plan document states as a course of action for the Kona District that "New cemetery sites to serve future needs shall be sought."

The Hawaii County Planning Commission staff received the following comments:

# Department of Health

"In response to your letter of June 10, 1975 staff members from our Hawaii office inspected the proposed cemetery site in Kona, Tax Map Key: 7-3-02: 9, and found it to be suitable for such use. Based on their findings we have no objections to your proposal.

However, final approval of the proposed cemetery will be given only upon our favorable review of your application including a complete set of plans, with full description of the grounds, lots, buildings, roads, water supply and sewage disposal. A copy of your proposed rules and regulations governing the control of the place must also be filed with the application. The foregoing requirements are contained in Section 103, Chapter 1 - Sanitation, of the public health regulations."

# Department of Transportation

"We have no objections on the proposed action for the subject application but have the following comments:

- Only one access off the Hawaii Belt Road, Project No. F-10(5) shall be permitted.
- 2. Recommend access be directly opposite existing Kona Wonder View Subdivision access, Loloa Drive.
- 3. Submit construction plans for review and approval."

## Department of Water Supply

"In response to your request, we see no immediate objections to your intended creation of a cemetery on the subject parcel.

From your brief description, we note that the crypts will be constructed and sealed watertight and we do appreciate your environmental concern in this matter."

## Hawaii County Fire Department

"Fire hydrants are located on Hawaii Belt Road. Nearest fire station is Kailua Station.

Other cooperating agencies had no objections or comments on the subject request.

The following letters expressing support of this special permit request were received from the following persons:

- 1. Lee H. Taylor letter dated August 27, 1975
- 2. A. Kealamakia letter dated August 17, 1975
- 3. John and Katherine Cox letter dated August 17, 1975

In addition, the Planning Commission has received a letter dated August 22, 1975 from Jeffery Choi which states that:

"We represent the owners of property located at Kalaoa 2nd, North Kona, tax map key 7-3-02-9 and a portion of 7-3-02-10.

They received notification of an application for special permit to a parcel designated as being at Kalaoa, North Kona, also bearing tax map key 7-3-02-9, i.e., Mark Onaka for Emma Jane Kapehe, et al. While we do not either support or oppose the application for special permit, we do wish to inform the Commission that there is presently outstanding in the Third Circuit Court of Hawaii an action to quiet title to the parcel designated by tax map key 7-3-02-9 and 7-3-02-10.

The dispute is primarily a boundary dispute between the parties and if the special permit is granted it could conceivably affect the property which the court may subsequently say is owned by my clients rather than the applicants for special permit."

Upon further inquiry and examination of this matter, the Planning Commission staff reported that:

This letter refers to a quiet title action suit against Emma Jane Kapehe and according to Mr. Choi, involves approximately five (5) acres of the total 31.1 acres involved. In checking on this matter with the Office of the Corporation Counsel, they have informed the staff that should the dispute not be settled by the time of the action meeting, and if a favorable recommendation is contemplated, then the disputed area should be conditioned from development. In other words, it should be conditioned that development of the disputed area shall not be developed until such time as a favorable verdict is obtained by the applicant. However, if the courts act in favor of Mr. Choi's clients, then the 5-acre area in dispute shall be void."

## County Recommendation

The Hawaii County Planning Commission held a duly advertised public hearing on the subject request on August 28, 1975.

On September 25, 1975 the Planning Commission voted to recommended approval of the special permit as it was found:

l. "That the proposed use will make the highest and best use of the land involved for the welfare of the general public. The proposed use will be implementing the County General Plan's Public Facilities - Health and Sanitation element. Under this element, a course of action for the Kona District is that new cemetery sites to serve future needs shall be sought. The establishment of the proposed cemetery in conjunction with the cemetery for which a Special Permit was recently granted and the proposed cemetery which the County Planning Commission recently recommended for approval will serve and meet the needs of the region for burial facilities long into the future. The establishment of these three proposed cemeteries will assure that the needs of the region are adequately served and that some range of choice is available to the present and future population of the area.

Further, approval of the subject application would provide the Kona region with a complete range of services which are not now available. In addition to providing burial plots, the

applicant's proposed development includes a full service mortuary with modern embalming facilities and a mausoleum with double crypts. The mausoleum would also contain columbarium niches. The proposal also includes cremation facilities, a chapel, wake service areas, a kitchen and eating areas, parking, display areas and private consultation rooms. At the present time there are no mortuary or mausoleum facilities in Kona. Throughout the country, there has been a shift in attitude towards mausoleum burials rather than ground plots in that these utilize space more efficiently. The proposed development would thus provide for such changes in methods of burial.

2. "That the proposed use will not be contrary to the objectives sought to be accomplished by the Land Use Law and Requlations. The intent of the Land Use Law and Regulations is to preserve, protect and encourage the development of lands in the State for those uses to which they are best suited in the interest of the public health and welfare of the people of the State of Hawaii. The area under consideration is classified as agricultural by the State Land Use Commission. The Land Use Regulations state that lands surrounded by or contiguous to agricultural lands and which are not suited to agricultural and ancillary activities by reason of topography, soils and other related characteristics may be included in the agricultural district. According to the Soil Conservation Service's 1973 soil survey of this island, the agricultural capability class for the area under consideration is VII, which is the next to the lowest of the Service's capability class rankings. Although certain agricultural activities can be conducted on the subject property, it is determined that the requested use for the land under consideration will not be contrary to the Land Use Law and Regulations, given the guidelines set forth for determining the agricultural district as well as the area's capability classification for agricultural productivity. Further, the proposed use of the subject area is determined not to have any adverse impact on the overall agricultural activity of the region and the island. It is also acknowledged that the proposed use will still perpetuate a form of open space.

"In addition, the County Zoning Code allows cemeteries within the agricultural zone as conditionally permitted uses, thereby recognizing the need for such facilities in appropriate locations.

3. "That approval of the proposed use will not place an unreasonable burden on public agencies to provide services and facilities. The applicant will not be using public sewers and drainage systems nor any variety of other public services and facilities which other types of land uses demand. In addition, the proposed use is not expected to generate a large volume of traffic, and what traffic is generated will be occasional.

"The favorable recommendation was also subject to the following conditions:

- 1. "That the applicant, Kapehe Land Investment, comply with all the rules and regulations as outlined in Chapter 4, Article 1, relating to cemeteries, of the Hawaii County Code within one (1) year from the official date of approval.
- 2. "That a landscaping plan be submitted to be approved by the Planning Director prior to the clearing of the land.
- 3. "That all grave markers shall be designed to meet the standards of the General Plan's Public Facilities Health and Sanitation element which encourages that use of plaques installed flushed with the ground.
- 4. "That there shall be adequate assurance, as determined by the Corporation Counsel, for maintenance by the developers and/or association of the memorial park by recorded covenant running with the land.
- 5. "That development shall proceed in three (3) increments and conform substantially with the representations made by the applicant. The first increment shall consist of ten (10) acres and shall include the mortuary and the first phase of the mausoleum. Subsequent increments shall consist of 10 acres each. The area presently involved in the quiet title action suit shall not be developed until such time as the suit is settled.
- 6. "That only one access off the Hawaii Belt Highway shall be permitted. Said access shall be directly opposite the existing Kona Wonder View subdivision access which is Loloa Drive and shall be approved by the District Engineer, State Highways Division.
- 7. "That a hydrologic/drainage study shall be submitted to and approved by the Planning Director and the Chief Engineer, Department of Public Works, prior to commencement of the site development.
- 8. "That adequate on-site parking shall be provided.
  The applicant shall submit a parking scheme which shall be approved by the Planning Director prior to development.
- 9. "That all other applicable rules and regulations shall be complied with."

LAND USE COMMISSION SPECIAL PERMIT KAPEHE LAND INVESTMENT KALAOA, NORTH KONA

Special Permit to allow the establishment of a Memorial Park, including a mortuary and a mausoleum, on 31.1 acres of land situated within the State Land Use Agricultural District. Property is located along the east side of the

Hawaii Belt Highway, across from the Kona Wonder View Lots and Kona Highlands subdivision, Kalaoa 2nd, North Kona, TMK: 7-3-02:09.

Staff again presented the background information for the benefit of the new members and recommended that the request be given a favorable recommendation based on the attached findings and conditions.

Mr. Sterling moved to send a favorable recommendation to the State Land Use Commission for the reasons and conditions outlined by the staff; seconded by Mrs. Jitchaku; carried unanimously.

Variance to allow a 450 foot front yard setback for the construction of another piggery in lieu of the minimum requirement of 1,000 feet as stipulated within the Agricultural zoned district. The piggery will be constructed on the

present site of Jay's Hog Farm and Slaughter Plant situated along the west side of the Mamalahoa Highway, approximately 400 feet Kailua side of the Mamalahoa Highway-Napoopoo Road junction, Kaawaloa, South Kona, TMK: 8-1-09:6.

Staff presented attached background information with recommendation for scheduling of a public hearing.

On the question of the overall usage of water, the applicant, Jay Manago, stated that the expansion to build another piggery will not require much more water than is now used because of the new flush toilet system for handling waste and because the slaughter house is used only once a week. In reference to the setback, he mentioned that his nearest neighbors have expressed no objection to his proposal.

In regard to the workman's quarters, the applicant stated that he built it four or five months ago and he hopes to hire someone with a family.

Mr. Sterling moved to set this application up for a public hearing, seconded by Mr. Watt; carried unanimously.

A duly advertised public hearing was held for a special permit to allow the establishment of a vegetable processing plant on a 24.9-acre parcel situated within the State Land Use Agricultural District. The property is located

approximately 1.1 miles west of Mamalahoa Highway and the Parker Ranch Race Track, Lalamilo Farm Lots, Lalamilo, South Kohala, TMK: 6-6-05:13.

The staff presented the attached background information at the hearing. Public hearing closed.

Action was deferred in accordance with the State Land Use Commission's regulation regarding decisions on such petitions no earlier than 15 days after the public hearing.

It is recommended that the Special Permit request to allow the establishment of a memorial park, including a mortuary and a mausoleum, within the State Land Use Agricultural District be given a favoral be recommendation, based on the following considerations:

1. That the proposed use will make the highest and best use of the land involved for the welfare of the general public. The porposed use will be implementing the County General Plan's Public Facilities - Health and Sanitation element. Under this element, a course of action for the Kona District is that new cemetery sites to serve future needs shall be sought. The establishment of the proposed cemetery in conjunction with the cemetery for which a Special Permit was recently granted and the proposed cemetery which the County Planning Commission recently recommended for approval will serve and meet the needs of the region for burial facilities long into the future. The establishment of these three proposed cemeteries will assure that the needs of the region are adequately served and that some range of choice is available to the present and future population of the area.

Further, approval of the subject application would provide the Kona region with a complete range of services which are not now available. In addition to providing burial plots, the applicant's proposed development includes a full service mortuary with modern embalming facilities and a mausoleum with double The mausoleum would also contain columbarium crypts. niches. The proposal also includes cremation facilities, a chapel, wake areas, a kitchen and eating areas, parking, display areas, a floral shop and private consultation rooms. At the present time there are no mortuary or mausoleum facilities in Kona. Throughout the country, there has been a shift in attitude towards mausoleum burials rather than ground plots in that these utilize space more efficiently. The proposed development would thus provide for such changes in methods of burial.

2. That the proposed use will not be contrary to the objectives sought to be accomplished by the Land Use Law and Regulations. The intent of the Land Use Law and Regulations is to preserve, protect and encourage the development of lands in the State for those uses to which they are best suited in the interest of the public health and welfare of the people of the State of Hawaii. The area under consideration is classified as agricul-

tural by the State Land Use Commission. The Land Use Regulations state that lands surrounded by or contiquous to agricultural lands and which are not suited to agricultural and ancillary activities by reason of topography, soils and other related characteristics may be included in the agricultural district. According to the Soil Conservation Service's 1973 soil survey of this island, the agricultural capability class for the area under consideration is VII, which is the next to the lowest of the Service's capability class rankings. Although certain agricultural activities can be conducted on the subject property, it is determined that the requested use for the land under consideration will not be contrary to the Land Use Law and Regulations, given the guidelines set forth for determining the agricultural district as well as the area's capability classification for agricultural productivity. Further, the proposed use of the subject area is determined not to have any adverse impact on the overall agricultural activity of the region and the island. It is also acknowledged that the proposed use will still perpetuate a form of open space.

In addition, the County Zoning Code allows cemeteries

In addition, the proposed use is not expected to generate a large volume of traffic, and what traffic is generated will be occasional.

It is further recommended that the request be subject to the following conditions:

- 1. That the applicant, Kapehe Land Investment, comply with all the rules and regulations as outlined in Chapter 4, Article 1, relating to cemeteries, of the Hawaii County Code within one (1) year from the official date of approval.
- 2. That a landscaping plan be submitted to be approved by

- 5. That development shall proceed in three (3) increments and conform substantially with the representations made by the applicant. The first increment shall consist of ten (10) acres and shall include the mortuary and the first phase of the mausoleum. Subsequent increments shall consist of 10 acres each. The area presently involved in the quiet title action suit shall not be developed until such time as the suit is settled.
- 6. That only one access off the Hawaii Belt Highway shall be permitted. Said access shall be directly opposite the existing Kona Wonder View subdivision access which is Loloa Drive and shall be approved by the District Engineer, State Highways Division.

- 7. That a hydrologic/drainage study shall be submitted to and approved by the Planning Director and the Chief Engineer, Department of Public Works, prior to commencement of the site development.
- 8. That adequate on-site parking shall be provided. The applicant shall submit a parking scheme which shall be approved by the Planning Director prior to development.
- 9. That all other applicable rules and regulations shall be complied with.

Should any of the foregoing conditions not be met, the Special Permit shall be deemed null and void.

## SPECIAL PERMIT: KAPEHE LAND INVESTMENT

The applicant, Kapehe Land Investment, has submitted an application requesting a special permit to allow the establishment of a Memorial Park including a mortuary and mausoleum on 31.18 acres of land within the State Land Use Agricultural District. The area in question is located along the mauka side of Mamalahoa Highway directly across from Kona Wonder View Lots in Kalaoa 2nd, North Kona (TMK: 7-3-02:9).

The General Plan Land Use Pattern Allocation Guide Map designates the area for Extensive Agricultural uses and as an Alternate Urban expansion area. The County's zoning designation is Agriculture 20-acres (A-20a). The Zoning Code of the County allows cemeteries within the Agricultural zone.

The "Public Facilities - Health and Sanitation" subelement of the General Plan document states as a course of action for the Kona district that "New cemetery sites to serve future needs shall be sought." The only public cemetery located in Kona is in Keopu which is 2.9 acres in size and has only (10) available plots.

There are presently two structures situated on the subject land, a single-family dwelling and a carport. The land is not being used for any agricultural activity at this time. Surrounding land uses include the Roman Catholic Church, the Latter Day Saint's Church, cattle grazing lands, and some single-family residences. There are several smaller cemeteries located within the North Kona district with two proposed new cemeteries. The first as the Commissioners will recall, was the special permit submitted by Sim Wenner for the establishment of a cemetery. This proposed cemetery will be located approximately 4.7 miles Kealakekua side of the subject area and would

provide 3,000 plots on approximately ten (10) acres of land. This special permit was brought before the Planning Commission on July 17, 1974 and was recommended for approval. It was subsequently approved by the State Land Use Commission on August 10, 1974. On June 18, 1975, the Hawaii County Council adopted a resolution (Resolution No. 429) allowing the establishment of the cemetery within the County.

The second proposed cemetery, which was submitted by Hualalai Memorial Park, Inc., will be located 5.9 miles Kealakekua side of the subject parcel. A public hearing on this special permit application was held by the Planning Commission on July 31, 1975 in Kona.

In support of the request the applicant has stated the following:

(See attached sheets)

The proposed site has soils which are of the Punaluu extremely rocky peat series with a slope of 6 to 20 percent. Rock outcrops occupy 40 to 50 percent of the surface. In a representative profile the surface layer is about four (4) inches thick and is underlaid with Pahoehoe lava bedrock. This soil is rapidly permeable, runoff is slow, and the erosion hazard is slight. This soil is generally used for pasture and has a capability class of VII. Class VII soils have very severe limitations that make them unsuited to cultivation and that restrict their use largely to pasture or range, woodland, or wildlife. Rainfall in the area is about 40 to 50 inches annually.

The Department of Transportation, Highways Division, had no objections to the request, but recommended the following:

- "]. Only one access off the Hawaii Belt Highway shall be permitted.
  - 2. Access be directly opposite existing Kona Wonder View Subdivision access, Loloa Drive."

The foldowing letter was received from the Dept. of Health:

"In response to your letter of June 10, 1975 staff members

from our Hawaii office inspected the proposed cemetery site

in Kona, Tax Map Key: 7-3-02:9, and found it to be suitable for

such use. Based on their findings we have no objections to your

proposal.

"However, final approval of the proposed cemetery will be given only upon our favorable review of your application including a complete set of plans, with full description of the grounds, lots, buildings, roads, water supply and sewage disposal. A copy of your proposed rules and regulations governing the control of the place must also be filed with the application. The foregoing requirements are contained in Section 103, Chapter 1 - Sanitation, of the public health regulations.

"I hope this will be of assistance in your undertaking."

This letter was signed by George Yuen, Director of Health.

There are no historical features or identifiable landforms

attributed to the property.

All other cooperating agencies, had no comments on or objections to the special permit.

The following letter addressed to the Planning Commission from John and Katherine Cox was received:

The following letter was received from Jeffrey Choi from the law firm of Cook, Choi & Yuda:

#### (READ CHOI'S LETTER)

This letter refers to a quiet title action suit against Emma ion involved. In checking on this matter with the Office of the Corporation Counsel, they have informed the staff that should the dispute not be settled by the time of the action meeting, and if a favorable recommendation is contemplated, then the disputed area should be conditioned from development. In other words, it should be conditioned that development of the disputed area shall not be developed until such time as a favorable verdict is obtained by the applicant. However, if the courts act in favor of Mr. Choi's clients, then the 5-acre area in dispute shall be void.

## REASONS FOR REQUESTING SPECIAL FERMIT

Reference Ordinance No. 63, as amended, of the County of Hawaii, State of Hawaii, establishing procedures for the division of the County into use districts.

- Requested special permit use conforms to Section 13 (B) (20) use and buildings normally considered accessory to the above permitted uses subject to approval of the Director.
- The desired use will be a long-term development and definitely fit in with the ecology plans for Hawaii. The design will be developed artistically and the perpetual maintenance of the grounds should enhance the value of surrounding property.
- The desired use will require water, telephone and electricity from available public utility facilities. The burden should be no greater if as much as a similar agricultural planned area with residences. Internal roads and streets will be built and maintained by the developer. Access roads may need to be paved and widened. Police protection in most cases would be limited to funeral escorts.
- (d) At present West Hawaii has a number of small cemeteries that are not very well maintained, and only very limited space left for burial plots. The normal growth of population in this area may be expected to create a strong demand for County action to provide additional cemetery space. This proposal would relieve the County of this problem to a large extent.
- (c) The land upon which the proposed use is sought may be considered as a necessary complement to the other uses permitted within the district. The proposed use may be considered just as essential to the public as parks, recreation areas, airfields, private clubs, golf courses, and other amenities.
- The proposed use will in general conform to the character of the land and should not pose any problems of drainage or other ecological factors. At present the land is not being used for any agricultural activity.
- (g) A memorial park will fill an urgent need in West Hawaii. When completed it will afford many positions for local residents, including workers on the grounds, flower shop and offices. This cemetery will be available to all the people of Hawaii regardless of religious beliefs or ethnic group. A full-service mortuary and mausoleum will be included on the grounds with various facilities to accommodate the desires, needs and wants of all the religious and ethnic customs of the Islands.

## KAMEHAMEHA MEMORIAL GARDENS

It is the intention of the petitioners to the County of Hawaii Council, and the Planning Commission as well as the State of Hawaii Cemetery

Board to develop a perpetual care cemetery, a full service mortuary, a double crypt mausoleum, and other ancilliary facilities in the Kona area of the County of Hawaii.

The facility is being developed with particular emphasis on the multiple religious and ethnic constituancy of the area. With this in mind the project will be named for the founder of the Kingdom of Hawaii, King Kamehameha I - Kamehameha Memorial Gardens. A section of the cemetery will be set aside as the Hawaiian Gardens, which will feature a cenotaph honoring King Kamehameha I and will relate to the Hawaiian culture and background.

Memorial Gardens will also develop special areas for all the varied religious faiths. There will be gardens set aside for any who wish this type of area, for example Roman Catholic, Buddist, etc. In the surrounding areas there will be lots available for families, in various dimensions, so a family can have their own section with a bronze memorial.

Since there are those in the area who will not be able to purchase grave space as mentioned above, companion lots or single lots will be provided.

Also two acres of land will be set aside for those who must turn to the State of Hawaii or County of Hawaii for their burial space and funeral expenses. This area will have the same general appearance as the other areas and will never be referred to as the indigent cemetery or the potter's field, but will be maintained as to reflect the pride and demeanor of the whole community.

#### KA. HAMEHA MEMORIAL GARDENS 1 e -2-

From time to time there are bones of deceased Hawaiians and others uncovered in construction projects. We will provide a special private area for these, without undo expense or, if necessary, these will be handled quietly on our own.

Also it is possible many local families will want to move the remains of deceased family members now in the present cemeteries, and place them in the new park, and this will be easily facilitated through a program of disinterrment and reburial.

The mortuary will be erected on the property with modern embalming facilities, a chapel, wake areas, a kitchen and eating areas, a large parking area. Also display areas, a floral shop and private consultation rooms will be provided.

A mausoleum with double crypts will be erected and will contain calabariaus niches. Cremation facilities will be available as well as all types of equipment and supplies for shipment of remains to the mainland or any other disignation or for receiving the shipments to this area.

## THE PROJECT

The site selected for the project is 31 acres of gently sloping land mauka of the Mamalahoa Highway in the Kalaoa division of North Kona, known as the Kapehe Property. The project will start with the development of ten acres into the various areas, with roads, the mortuary, and the mausoleum. In the cemetery area, modern methods with emphasis on the care and maintenance of a beautiful park will be utilized. The areas of the gardens, in the process of clearing and leveling the land will be excavated to the area of eight feet, and double lawn crypts will be installed.

These will be built from cement block in sizes of six feet deep, three feet wide and seven feet long, with scaling shelves in what will be between the two burials, then a cover on the top with a concrete cap. The crypt will be water tight and will be set with the top about fifteen inches below the ground level, then the area will be back filled and sodded. When a burial is required the sod will be removed, the soil scraped off the top of the crypt and it is opened. When closed it will again be sealed. This provides a quick, easy and certainly inexpensive opening procedure and the top soil is replaced as is the sod to maintain the neat and beautiful appearance of the park. Bronze matkers may be installed at these graves and they will all be similar in appearance to give continuity to the garden, as well as

facilitate mowing and eliminating trimming.

# W. T ARE THE CONDITIONS TODA

In order to fully understand the need for this type of project, it is necessary to comprehend the needs, wants and desires of the multi-ethnic peoples of the West Hawaii area.

There are no public perpetual care cemeteries or full service mortuary facility within a reasonable distance. Except for the vast uninhabited areas of Alaska and some desert regions of the South West, this area of the County of Hawaii is the only area of the United States without adequate facilities in the memorial field. According to Utility Commission statistics, there are 18,000 people in the Kona area and 10,000 people in the regions of Honokaa and the Kohalas. This would indicate a death rate in the area of 250 per year.

The rock cemeteries in Kona are a result of the necessity for blasting.

These cemeteries reflect a lock of care - but not a lack of love as

evidenced by flowers on new and old graves.

We represent the owners of property located at Kalaoa 2nd, North Kona, tax map key 7-3-02-9 and a portion of 7-3-02-10.

They received notification of an application for special permit to a parcel designated as being at Kalaoa, North Kona, also bearing tax map key 7-3-02-9, i.e., Mark Onaka for Emma Jane Kapehe, et al. - 6. That only one access off the Hawaii Belt Highway shall be permitted. Said access shall be directly opposite the existing Kona Wonder View subdivision access which is Loloa Drive and shall be approved by the District Engineer, State Highways Division.

- 7. That a hydrologic/drainage study shall be submitted to and approved by the Planning Director and the Chief Engineer, Department of Public Works, prior to commencement of the site development.
- 8. That adequate on-site parking shall be provided. The applicant shall submit a parking scheme which shall be approved by the Planning Director prior to development.
- 9. That all other applicable rules and regulations shall be complied with.

Should any of the foregoing conditions not be met, the Special Permit shall be deemed null and void.

CHAIRMAN: Tonight we have just one public hearing which is an application of the Kapehe Land Investment for a special permit to allow the establishment of a memorial park, including a mortuary and a mausoleum on 31.1 acres of land situated within the State Land Use Agricultural District. Property is located along the east side of the Hawaii Belt Highway, across from the Kona Wonder View Lots and Kona Highlands Subdivisions, Kalaoa 2nd, North Kona, TMK: 7-3-02:09. Staff?

PIIANAIA: (gave background information and recommended favorable consideration with certain conditions for approval)

CHAIRMAN: Any questions you would like to ask the staff. Commissioner Watt. Would you speak into the mike in the absence of our secretary?

WATT: Would you point out on the map the five acres that is in question?

HAYASHI: As far as the five acres is concerned, we cannot determine at this time where it is. This letter was just received yesterday from Mr. Choi, and according to this, he himself doesn't know where it is.

CHAIRMAN: Any further questions? Commissioner Sterling.

STERLING: ... first period or what ... but in deference to Arthur Martin, I didn't want to ... but it's the first time I heard a Protestant refer to et cetera ... Roman Catholic ... (inaudible)

CHAIRMAN: Any further questions? (pause) Is the applicant present or a representative of the applicant? Maybe here, would you enlighten us a little bit on this disputed five acres? Would you use the microphone. Please give us your name first.

FINEFROCK: The five acres on this boundary here, right around this boundary, they are not in the present plans, in the first development of our present plans because we were aware of this, and as a matter of fact, this area over here is ... (inaudible)

CHAIRMAN: Is it included in the left area which is outlined in red?

FINEFROCK: I don't know.

CHAIRMAN: Is this, I think it must be if you used the ... (inaudible)

PIIANAIA: This is under a court action. This red outlines parcel 9, according to the tax map keys.

CHAIRMAN: So the dispute is the line between the two parcels.

FINEFROCK: It goes from the highway to upper part.

CHAIRMAN: So the map ... the five acres is not included in there at all. Thank you.

FINEFROCK: It's not a very wide area because of the fact the five acres stretches throughout the length of the property.

CHAIRMAN: Does that answer your question, Mr. Watt?

WATT: Yes.

CHAIRMAN: Would you like to give us any further comments on this?

FINEFROCK: I think she put it very well. She's given you everything we've got.

CHAIRMAN: Any further questions? Commissioner Sterling.

STERLING: Mr. Finefrock. The staff read quite a few letter into the record as recommending you very highly and endorsing your position with this project. Are you actually participating in the area project or are you acting as a consultant?

FINEFROCK: I am very active in the project.

STERLING: I think this is a good situation because just acting as a consultant might have an effect on some of those matters.

FINEFROCK: There's one problem which I'd like to state, to be fair. I cannot be licensed as a mortician in the State of Hawaii because ...

There are two licensed men involved in this who are experienced ... There are two mortuaries in Ohio which are ... (inaudible) ...

STERLING: I recall in one of the statements you made that you did run the Army mortuary here in Hawaii, in Honolulu.

FINEFROCK: Yes, sir.

STERLING: Thank you.

JITCHAKU: I would like to ask a question of staff. Was there any special or any amount of parking stalls that were required? It seems like, according to that map, there's not that many. What was the minimum?

PIIANAIA: There are no specified parking requirement at this time. This matter will be determined at the time of plan approval.

JITCHAKU: Thank you.

CHAIRMAN: Is there anyone present who'd like to give any testimony on this application, either in favor or opposed? Just come up to the microphone, give us your name and present any statement you want to give. Anyone present.

JITCHAKU: I'd like to ask a question.

CHAIRMAN: Commissioner Jitchaku.

JITCHAKU: I'm not even going to try to pronounce his name. Sir, I'm just curious. Is there a mortuary here in Kona?

FINEFROCK: There is no full-service mortuary here in Kona. There's only a mortuary house.

JITCHAKU: Oh, I see, and it's probably one out of the Hilo office.

FINEFROCK: Yes, and that means they have to drive 102 miles to come over here to service Kona.

JITCHAKU: I see.

CHAIRMAN: Now, the Chair will entertain anyone who would like to give any testimony on this application? Please come forward. Commissioner Asai.

ASAI: I have a question I want to ask the applicant. Sir, what would be the size of your cemetery plot?

FINEFROCK: You mean individual plots?

ASAI: Yes.

FINEFROCK: It's seven by three. Seven feet by three feet.

ASAI: Thank you.

CHAIRMAN: Any further questions of the applicant? Did you wish to give any testimony? Will you come up to the microphone?

MOORE: My name is Sam Moore, S. A. Moore. I live in Kailua Kona. I'm merely ... here, testifying here in support of the applicant. It's about time Kona got modernized. Thank you very much.

CHAIRMAN: Thank you very much, Mr. Moore. Anyone else would like to come up? We don't want anyone to feel bashful. I'm just curious as to your mausoleum. How large a building or how many, well, -- what does it take? Is it a place for ashes?

FINEFROCK: It's a place where you place caskets ... crypt ... On the outside, it's small ... You use either end of the building to put the caskets into the mausoleum. The sides are blank vaults; so what they do is ... them this far and make ... niches at the sides. That's called a columbarium and those ... (inaudible in spots) Right along here, for those of you who know what I am talking about, would be a "haka" line. That is a monument about this high. Usually, ... black marble ... who are previous ... who are ashes, and then they have ceremonials on the anniversary of the deceased.

JITCHAKU: And they're further up from your mausoleum?

FINEFROCK: Yes and they will be here because they are very heavily attended affairs, at least it was in Honolulu. So you put them where they can park and then go down into the vault to the area.

JITCHAKU: Now you could (inaudible) the mausoleum. How many do you plan to have there?

FINEFROCK: We will have one building, but this shows, as it shows here, these buildings can be built one more after another as we need them. There will be around forty in the first building.

JITCHAKU: Do you stack them up like this or --

FINEFROCK: Yes, they go into the building sideways. You see these little, they go in in there like that, and then this building is built and this building is built and no building is built. That's the way they do it. They don't build the whole thing at once.

JITCHAKU: You find a lot of people do their burials like this?

FINEFROCK: Oh yes, especially in Hawaii.

JITCHAKU: Thank you.

CHAIRMAN: You were pointing out just now, there are two buildings, and may be some more in the back.

FINEFROCK: These, yes. These were (inaudible) primarily built.

CHAIRMAN: How close ... (inaudible) ...

FINEFROCK: Those should be settled by the time we're ready for construction.

CHAIRMAN: Would there be side setback on these?

FINEFROCK: If this is off this road then this will set, this whole thing will set over and there would be plenty of room.

JITCHAKU: According to the traffic pattern that staff made recommendation on, you should have one egress and ingress?

FINEFROCK: Yes,

JITCHAKU: But you have two there.

FINEFROCK: We will revise the plan to have one access to meet recommendation.

JITCHAKU: Okay, and according to that recommendation also, it would be aligned with the road in the Wonder View Subdivision, so you would have to do something about it.

FINEFROCK: Yes, it would have to be adjusted.

PIIANAIA: How many plots will be in the first increment?

FINEFROCK: It would be 200 in the gardens, 15 each garden. Then, we would develop only those family gardens which would be along the sides of these other gardens. And then we would develop several acres in this open area. If the land isn't developed, it will be cleared and it will be sown in ground cover of some kind until it's started to be used as a cemetery.

PIIANAIA: Then it will be 200 plots in the first increment?

FINEFROCK: Yes.

CHAIRMAN: Commissioner Sterling?

STERLING: I know about the Buddhist monuments, but I still want to know the reason for putting the et ceteras, the Protestants.

FINEFROCK: There are several gardens and one is a Protestant garden.

CHAIRMAN: Any further questions? We're having trouble with the electronic equipment. And ... (inaudible) ... to take part in this public hearing but the questions keep coming back to the applicant, but I will again throw it open to anyone who would like to give any testimony on this application. Yes sir.

COULTER: Mr. Chairman, my name is Bruce Coulter. I have known Mr. and Mrs. Finefrock ever since they arrived in Kona. And we've been associated, not in business but social affairs, and I would recommend, if my recommendations mean anything, a favorable action by the Commissioners. Thank you.

CHAIRMAN: Your feelings are just as important as anyone else's. Anyone else?

JITCHAKU: I have another question. You don't have to get up, Mr. Finefrock. I would take it that the blue area on the map there would be a pond or something?

FINEFROCK: Yes.

CHAIRMAN: In case that did not get on the tape, I will try to interpret it that the blue coloring on the drawing was just for the artist to make it look prettier. I think I see another -- will you please come up?

STALLINGS: My name is David Stallings. I 'm a licensed mortician also. I did work for John back in Ohio several years ago. He's very straight and honest individual and I do think that anything he starts, he will finish. And that's all I have to say, except he's very, very honest.

CHAIRMAN: Anyone else would like to come up?

WATT: I move to close the public hearing.

JITCHAKU: Second.

#### REAS 3 FOR REQUESTING SPECIAL RMIT

Reference Ordinance No. 63, as amended, of the County of Hawaii, State of Hawaii, establishing procedures for the division of the County into use districts.

- (a) Requested special permit use conforms to Section 13 (B) (20) use and buildings normally considered accessory to the above permitted uses subject to approval of the Director.
- (b) The desired use will be a long-term development and definitely fit in with the ecology plans for Hawaii. The design will be developed artistically and the perpetual maintenance of the grounds should enhance the value of surrounding property.
- (c) The desired use will require water, telephone and electricity from available public utility facilities. The burden should be no greater if as much as a similar agricultural planned area with residences. Internal roads and streets will be built and maintained by the developer. Access roads may need to be paved and widened. Police protection in most cases would be limited to funeral escorts.
- (d) At present West Hawaii has a number of small cemeteries that are not very well maintained, and only very limited space left for burial plots. The normal growth of population in this area may be expected to create a strong demand for County action to provide additional cemetery space. This proposal would relieve the County of this problem to a large extent.
- (e) The land upon which the proposed use is sought may be considered as a necessary complement to the other uses permitted within the district. The proposed use may be considered just as essential to the public as parks, recreation areas, airfields, private clubs, golf courses, and other amenities.
- (f) The proposed use will in general conform to the character of the land and should not pose any problems of drainage or other ecological factors. At present the land is not being used for any agricultural activity.
- (g) A memorial park will fill an urgent need in West Hawaii. When completed it will afford many positions for local residents, including workers on the grounds, flower shop and offices. This cemetery will be available to all the people of Hawaii regardless of religious beliefs or ethnic group. A full-service mortuary and mausoleum will be included on the grounds with various facilities to accommodate the desires, needs and wants of all the religious and ethnic customs of the Islands.

#### AMEHAMEHA MEMORIAL GARDEN.

It is the intention of the petitioners to the County of Hawaii Council, and the Planning Commission as well as the State of Hawaii Cemetery Board to develop a perpetual care cemetery, a full service mortuary, a double crypt mausoleum, and other ancilliary facilities in the Kona area of the County of Hawaii.

The facility is being developed with particular emphasis on the multiple religious and ethnic constituancy of the area. With this in mind the project will be named for the founder of the Kingdom of Hawaii, King Kamehameha I - Kamehameha Memorial Gardens. A section of the cemetery will be set aside as the Hawaiian Gardens, which will feature a cenotaph honoring King Kamehameha I and will relate to the Hawaiian culture and background.

Memorial Gardens will also develop special areas for all the varied religious faiths. There will be gardens set aside for any who wish this type of area, for example Roman Catholic, Buddist, etc. In the surrounding areas there will be lots available for families, in various dimensions, so a family can have their own section with a bronze memorial.

Since there are those in the area who will not be able to purchase grave space as mentioned above, companion lots or single lots will be provided.

Also two acres of land will be set aside for those who must turn to the State of Hawaii or County of Hawaii for their burial space and funeral expenses. This area will have the same general appearance as the other areas and will never be referred to as the indigent cemetery or the potter's field, but will be maintained as to reflect the pride and demeanor of the whole community.

From time to time there are bones of deceased Hawaiians and others uncovered in construction projects. We will provide a special private area for these, without undo expense or, if necessary, these will be handled quietly on our own.

Also it is possible many local families will want to move the remains of deceased family members now in the present cemeteries, and place them in the new park, and this will be easily facilitated through a program of disinterrment and reburial.

The mortuary will be erected on the property with modern embalming facilities, a chapel, wake areas, a kitchen and eating areas, a large parking area. Also display areas, a floral shop and private consultation rooms will be provided.

A mausoleum with double crypts will be erected and will contain calabariate niches. Cremation facilities will be available as well as all types of equipment and supplies for shipment of remains to the mainland or any other disignation or for receiving the shipments to this area.

#### THE PROJECT

The site selected for the project is 31 acres of gently sloping land mauka of the Mamalahoa Highway in the Kalaoa division of North Kona, known as the Kapehe Property. The project will start with the development of ten acres into the various areas, with roads, the mortuary, and the mausoleum. In the cemetery area, modern methods with emphasis on the care and maintenance of a beautiful park will be utilized. The areas of the gardens, in the process of clearing and leveling the land will be excavated to the area of eight feet, and double lawn crypts will be installed.

These will be built from cement block in sizes of six feet deep, three feet wide and seven feet long, with sealing shelves in what will be between the two burials, then a cover on the top with a concrete cap. The crypt will be water tight and will be set with the top about fifteen inches below the ground level, then the area will be back filled and sodded. When a burial is required the sod will be removed, the soil scraped off the top of the crypt and it is opened. When closed it will again be sealed. This provides a quick, easy and certainly inexpensive opening procedure and the top soil is replaced, as is the sod to maintain the neat and beautiful appearance of the park. Bronze markers may be installed at these graves and they will all be similar in appearance to give continuity to the garden, as well as facilitate mowing and eliminating trimming.

#### W T ARE THE CONDITIONS TODA

In order to fully understand the need for this type of project, it is necessary to comprehend the needs, wants and desires of the multi-ethnic peoples of the West Hawaii area.

There are no public perpetual care cemeteries or full service mortuary facility within a reasonable distance. Except for the vast uninhabited areas of Alaska and some desert regions of the South West, this area of the County of Hawaii is the only area of the United States without adequate facilities in the memorial field. According to Utility Commission statistics, there are 18,000 people in the Kona area and 10,000 people in the regions of Honokaa and the Kohalas. This would indicate a death rate in the area of 250 per year.

The rock cemeteries in Kona are a result of the necessity for blasting.

These cemeteries reflect a lock of care - but not a lack of love as

evidenced by flowers on new and old graves.

#### PUBLIC AWARENESS

As important as any other phase of this project is the program of acquainting and offering these facilities to the public. There are many different opinions on the best way, we however will be slow and deliberate in the familiarizing of all segments of the Kona Coast area with what is available and the cost.

The salespeople will be local residents selected from the various religious and ethnic groups and trained as consultants based on the philosophy of complying with the desires and customs of the people they contact in individual determinations of their requirements.

There will be no door-to-door, hard-sell professionals which confuse and overwhelm people. General information will be diseminated throughout the area in various media so that everyone will be aware of the project and just what it offers. They may then act in their own good time. We expect to be in a position to serve for a long time.

This enterprise has been initiated and developed by John H. Finefrock, a funeral director and embalmer, licensed in Ohio, but not in the State of Hawaii. He has had 40 years in the field, the latest as President and Treasurer of J. H. Finefrock and Sons, an Ohio corporation which operates funeral homes in Mansfield, and Shelby, Ohio.

Mr. Finefrock holds a Bachelor of Science Degree in Business Administration from Western Reserve University and a degree in Mortuary Science from the Cincinnati College of Mortuary Science. During World War II, he served for over three years as an administration officer in the United States Army Medical Corps, with the last year serving as Commanding Officer of the U. S. Army Mortuary in Honolulu.

While serving as Commanding Officer of the U. S. Army Mortuary, he also served as Commanding Officer of the 604th Graves Registration Co., the training unit which helped affect the repatriation of thousands of our military dead in the Pacific area to the place of permanent burial.

During the planning stage of this mission, Mr. Finefrock assumed the additional duty as S4 to mission commander of the total project. It was Finefrock's responsibility to provide trained leadership and manpower as well as necessary technical equipment and supplies for the mission. It was this command that also initiated the basic planning and technical studies which resulted in the National Cemetery of the Pacific being developed in the Punchbowl in Honolulu. Also during his tenure with the U. S. Army Mortuary, he developed the standard operating procedures for Military Funerals in the command.

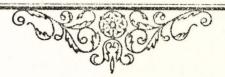
Mr. Finefrock has been recognized as a leader in the memorial field nationally, as an active member of the National Selected Morticians, a prestigious funeral services organization which selects one funeral service firm from each community.

Also he was the Chairman of the Research Committee of the National Foundation of Funeral Services in Evanston, Illinois. This foundation, with representation from all areas of the memorial field, operates research programs, consultations on problems in specific areas, general and specialized schools. Mr. Finefrock served, in addition to his chairmanship, as a teacher and consultant in the area of funeral management, especially in the merchandizing area. Many of the present procedures and products in the mortuary field were instigated by him and his committee.

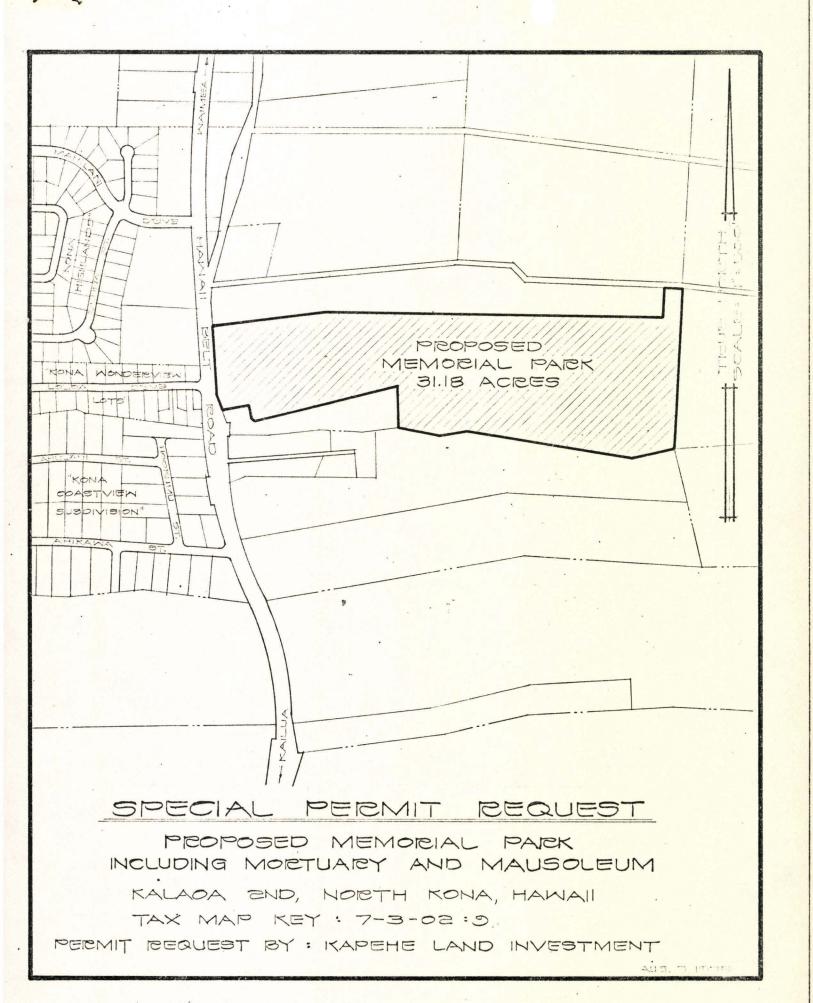

# REASONS FOR REQUESTING SPECIAL PERMIT

Reference Ordinance No. 63, as amended, of the County of Hawaii, State of Hawaii, establishing procedures for the division of the County into use districts.

- (a) Requested special permit use conforms to Section 13 (B) (20) use and buildings normally considered accessory to the above permitted uses subject to approval of the Director.
- (b) The desired use will be a long-term development and definitely fit in with the ecology plans for Hawaii. The design will be developed artistically and the perpetual maintenance of the grounds should enhance the value of surrounding property.
- (c) The desired use will require water, telephone and electricity from available public utility facilities. The burden should be no greater if as much as a similar agricultural planned area with residences. Internal roads and streets will be built and maintained by the developer. Access roads may need to be paved and widened. Police protection in most cases would be limited to funeral escorts.
- (d) At present West Hawaii has a number of small cemeteries that are not very well maintained, and only very limited space left for burial plots. The normal growth of population in this area may be expected to create a strong demand for County action to provide additional cemetery space. This proposal would relieve the County of this problem to a large extent.
- (e) The land upon which the proposed use is sought may be considered as a necessary complement to the other uses permitted within the district. The proposed use may be considered just as essential to the public as parks, recreation areas, airfields, private clubs, golf courses, and other amenities.
- (f) The proposed use will in general conform to the character of the land and should not pose any problems of drainage or other ecological factors. At present the land is not being used for any agricultural activity.
- (g) A memorial park will fill an urgent need in West Hawaii. When completed it will afford many positions for local residents, including workers on the grounds, flower shop and offices. This cemetery will be available to all the people of Hawaii regardless of religious beliefs or ethnic group. A full-service mortuary and mausoleum will be included on the grounds with various facilities to accommodate the desires, needs and wants of all the religious and ethnic customs of the Islands.

# KAMEHAMEHA MEMORIAL GARDENS

It is the intention of the petitioners to the County of Hawaii Council, and the Planning Commission as well as the State of Hawaii Cemetery Board to develop a perpetual care cemetery, a full service mortuary, a double crypt mausoleum, and other ancilliary facilities in the Kona area of the County of Hawaii.

The facility is being developed with particular emphasis on the multiple religious and ethnic constituancy of the area. With this in mind the project will be named for the founder of the Kingdom of Hawaii, King Kamehameha I - Kamehameha Memorial Gardens. A section of the cemetery will be set aside as the Hawaiian Gardens, which will feature a cenotaph honoring King Kamehameha I and will relate to the Hawaiian culture and background.

Memorial Gardens will also develop special areas for all the varied religious faiths. There will be gardens set aside for any who wish this type of area, for example Roman Catholic, Buddist, etc. In the surrounding areas there will be lots available for families, in various dimensions, so a family can have their own section with a bronze memorial.

Since there are those in the area who will not be able to purchase grave space as mentioned above, companion lots or single lots will be provided.

Also two acres of land will be set aside for those who must turn to the State of Hawaii or County of Hawaii for their burial space and funeral expenses. This area will have the same general appearance as the other areas and will never be referred to as the indigent cemetery or the potter's field, but will be maintained as to reflect the pride and demeanor of the whole community.

From time to time there are bones of deceased Hawaiians and others uncovered in construction projects. We will provide a special private area for these, without undo expense or, if necessary, these will be handled quietly on our own.

Also it is possible many local families will want to move the remains of deceased family members now in the present cemeteries, and place them in the new park, and this will be easily facilitated through a program of disinterrment and reburial.

The mortuary will be erected on the property with modern embalming facilities, a chapel, wake areas, a kitchen and eating areas, a large parking area. Also display areas, a floral shop and private consultation rooms will be provided.

A mausoleum with double crypts will be erected and will contain calabariaum niches. Cremation facilities will be available as well as all types of equipment and supplies for shipment of remains to the mainland or any other disignation or for receiving the shipments to this area.

# THE PROJECT

The site selected for the project is 31 acres of gently sloping land mauka of the Mamalahoa Highway in the Kalaoa division of North Kona, known as the Kapehe Property. The project will start with the development of ten acres into the various areas, with roads, the mortuary, and the mausoleum. In the cemetery area, modern methods with emphasis on the care and maintenance of a beautiful park will be utilized. The areas of the gardens, in the process of clearing and leveling the land will be excavated to the area of eight feet, and double lawn crypts will be installed.

These will be built from cement block in sizes of six feet deep, three feet wide and seven feet long, with sealing shelves in what will be between the two burials, then a cover on the top with a concrete cap. The crypt will be water tight and will be set with the top about fifteen inches below the ground level, then the area will be back filled and sodded. When a burial is required the sod will be removed, the soil scraped off the top of the crypt and it is opened. When closed it will again be sealed. This provides a quick, easy and certainly inexpensive opening procedure and the top soil is replaced, as is the sod to maintain the neat and beautiful appearance of the park. Bronze markers may be installed at these graves and they will all be similar in appearance to give continuity to the garden, as well as facilitate mowing and eliminating trimming.

#### WHAT ARE THE CONDITIONS TODAY

In order to fully understand the need for this type of project, it is necessary to comprehend the needs, wants and desires of the multi-ethnic peoples of the West Hawaii area.

There are no public perpetual care cemeteries or full service mortuary facility within a reasonable distance. Except for the vast uninhabited areas of Alaska and some desert regions of the South West, this area of the County of Hawaii is the only area of the United States without adequate facilities in the memorial field. According to Utility Commission statistics, there are 18,000 people in the Kona area and 10,000 people in the regions of Honokaa and the Kohalas. This would indicate a death rate in the area of 250 per year.

The rock cemeteries in Kona are a result of the necessity for blasting.

These cemeteries reflect a lock of care - but not a lack of love as

evidenced by flowers on new and old graves.

#### PUBLIC AWARENESS

As important as any other phase of this project is the program of acquainting and offering these facilities to the public. There are many different opinions on the best way, we however will be slow and deliberate in the familiarizing of all segments of the Kona Coast area with what is available and the cost.

The salespeople will be local residents selected from the various religious and ethnic groups and trained as consultants based on the philosophy of complying with the desires and customs of the people they contact in individual determinations of their requirements.

There will be no door-to-door, hard-sell professionals which confuse and overwhelm people. General information will be diseminated throughout the area in various media so that everyone will be aware of the project and just what it offers. They may then act in their own good time. We expect to be in a position to serve for a long time.

This enterprise has been initiated and developed by John H. Finefrock, a funeral director and embalmer, licensed in Ohio, but not in the State of Hawaii. He has had 40 years in the field, the latest as President and Treasurer of J. H. Finefrock and Sons, an Ohio corporation which operates funeral homes in Mansfield, and Shelby, Ohio.

Mr. Finefrock holds a Bachelor of Science Degree in Business Administration from Western Reserve University and a degree in Mortuary Science from the Cincinnati College of Mortuary Science. During World War II, he served for over three years as an administration officer in the United States Army Medical Corps, with the last year serving as Commanding Officer of the U. S. Army Mortuary in Honolulu.

While serving as Commanding Officer of the U. S. Army Mortuary, he also

served as Commanding Officer of the 604th Graves Registration Co., the training unit which helped affect the repatriation of thousands of our military dead in the Pacific area to the place of permanent burial.

During the planning stage of this mission, Mr. Finefrock assumed the additional duty as S4 to mission commander of the total project. It was Finefrock's responsibility to provide trained leadership and manpower as well as necessary technical equipment and supplies for the mission. It was this command that also initiated the basic planning and technical studies which resulted in the National Cemetery of the Pacific being developed in the Punchbowl in Honolulu. Also during his tenure with the U. S. Army Mortuary, he developed the standard operating procedures for Military Funerals in the command.

Mr. Finefrock has been recognized as a leader in the memorial field nationally, as an active member of the National Selected Morticians, a prestigious funeral services organization which selects one funeral service firm from each community.

Also he was the Chairman of the Research Committee of the National Foundation of Funeral Services in Evanston, Illinois. This foundation, with representation from all areas of the memorial field, operates research programs, consultations on problems in specific areas, general and specialized schools. Mr. Finefrock served, in addition to his chairmanship, as a teacher and consultant in the area of funeral management, especially in the merchandizing area. Many of the present procedures and products in the mortuary field were instigated by him and his committee.
