SUBJECT: SP75-229 - The Local Spiritual Assembly of the Baha'is of Puna, Inc.

A Special Permit to allow the establishment of a Community Center on a one-acre parcel of land within the State Land Use Agricultural District at Keaau, Puna, Hawaii has been requested by the Local Spiritual Assembly of the Baha'is of Puna, Inc. The subject property is situated within the Orchid Land Estates Subdivision and is identified as Tax Map Key 1-6-09:347.

The applicant proposes to construct a 1,050 sq. ft., onestory, multi-purpose building that will include meeting rooms, a kitchen and restrooms.

In support of the request, the applicant states that:

"The Baha'is of Puna have no meeting place and wish to build a one-story simple structure of one large meeting room, one small meeting room, kitchen, and two restrooms. Owners will provide own utilities of catchment water and cesspool."

"The Local Spiritual Assembly of Puna humbly requests the Commission to grant a Special Permit to construct a Bahai Center on our property in Orchid Land, District of Puna. In accordance with the guidelines:

- a) Use of the land shall not be contrary to the objectives sought by the Land Use Law and Regulations
- b) Intended use of the building and property will complement the surrounding neighborhood
- c) The Bahai faith stresses cooperation with all units of government and will not burden them unnecessarily
- d) No unusual condition

e) We feel that the Center will blend in with the surrounding residential uses

- f) Building, play area and parking lot will not alter or change the essential character of the land and its present use
- g) The Bahai principles of good citizenship, equality of all men, high moral teachings and concern for our fellow men will tend to enhance the use of the land for the highest public good."

The subject property is vacant and the surrounding land uses include scattered single-family dwelling and vacant lands. The Soil Conservation Service rates the land capability unit for the subject property as subclass VIII. This class of soil has severe limitations that preclude its use for agricultural purposes. The dominant soil type is Pahoehoe lava. The slope of the land is relatively level and the annual rainfall ranges from 90 to over 140 inches per year.

Access to the subject parcel is through the Orchid Land Estates Subdivision roads which are privately owned. The property fronts 34th Avenue which has a forty feet right-of-way. The improved portion of this road is eight feet of packed cinder. Aulii Drive which provides access from Pahoa Road has 10 feet of improved roadway and a 50 feet right-of-way. Presently, there are no utilities available to the subject property.

The following comments regarding this Special Permit request were received by the Planning Commission staff:

1. State Department of Transportation:

"We have no objections on the proposed action but have the following comments: 1. Landscaping should be provided for noise abatement; 2. Water should be evaluated."

2. Department of Water Supply:

"...there is no public water system near the applicant parcel."

3. Hilo Police Department:

"The only problem I can foresee would be parking. At the present time there is hardly any traffic but when more people build and move into the area, we will have a traffic problem. The roadway at the present time is narrow and not paved. If the people put in ample parking area in their property, this will help. The only problem I can foresee in the distant future is parking. Other than parking, I see no problem if the people comply with the Land Use Laws and Regulation."

4. Department of Agriculture:

"There is no apparent agriculture impact."

5. County Fire Department:

"No fire protection and no water available other than tanks. Nearest fire station located at Pahoa. This station is in service only during the day."

Other cooperating agencies had no comments or objections. In addition to agency comments, the Planning Commission staff received a letter from Mrs. M. Bailey Jacobs dated October 9, 1975, which states that: "Because I feel the Spiritual Assembly Center plan is probably in the nature of a church, on which no property taxes will be assessed (which I believe is the case in Hawaii), this could mean higher taxes for the other land holders in Orchid Land Estates. Therefore I am not in favor of this request to construct such a center." Mrs. Jacobs is a landowner in the Orchid Land Estates Subdivision but does not reside there.

The Hawaii Planning Commission held a duly advertised public hearing on the subject request on October 16, 1975. On November 6, 1975, the Planning Commission voted to recommend approval of the Special Permit to the Land Use Commission as it was found:

"1. That the proposed use will not be contrary to the objectives sought to be accomplished by the Land Use Law and Regulations. The purpose of the Land Use Law and Regulations is to protect, preserve, and encourage the development of lands in the State for the public health and welfare of the people of the State of Hawaii. The area under consideration is classified as Agricultural by the State Land Use Commission. The Agricultural District includes lands surrounded by or contiguous to agricultural lands but which are not suited to agricultural and ancillary uses by reason of topography, soils, and other related characteristics. The subject property's dominant soil type is pahoehoe lava, which is in the Soil Conservation Service's Capability Class VIII.

Class VIII soils have severe limitations that preclude their use for commercial plants. This class is the lowest in the Soil Conservation Service's ranking system for agricultural productivity. Although it is possible that some agricultural activities can be conducted on the subject property, it is determined that approval of the subject request would not be contrary to the objectives of the Land Use Law and Regulations, given the capability class rating of the subject property for agricultural productivity and the above-cited criterion for determining the Agricultural District.

Further, the use of the subject property for nonagricultural purposes is not expected to have any adverse effect on the overall agricultural potential of the region or of the island. In addition, institutions of a religious nature are allowed as "conditionally permitted uses" within the agricultural zone under the County Zoning Code.

- "2. That although the proposed use will alter the essential character of the land, such change will make the highest and best use of the land involved for the public welfare. At the present time, the subject property is vacant and is not used for agriculture. The proposed use will undeniably alter the existing character of the property; however, it is determined that the provision of a meeting hall/community center on the subject land would be beneficial and well-suited to accommodate the welfare of the public; in this particular case, the members of this faith. There exists no facility serving this faith available to the residents of the Puna District. Therefore, the establishment of the proposed use would meet the needs of the residents of the area.
- "3. That the proposed use will not adversely affect surrounding property. Surrounding land uses include scattered single-family residential and vacant lands. The area is rural-residential in character. County zoning of the area is Agricultural 3-acre (A-3a). Lots in the subdivision range in area from one to three acres, with the smaller lots being closer to the Keaau-Pahoa Highway. Due to the overall character of the area and the physical attributes of land, it is acknowledged that the smaller lots are and will be basically used as houselots. The establishment of the proposed use is determined to be compatible with the area and not in conflict with the surrounding uses.

Neither the applicant nor a representative was present. On Commissioner Murakami's motion, seconded by Commissioner Jitchaku, it was decided to forward a favorable recommendation to the State Land Use Commission with the conditions for approval as outlined by staff.

It was brought out that there was a similar request from adjacent property owner Maude Chang, but it was confirmed that this is not contiguous to any similar businesses. Dairy Queen is one of several losing its lease in this area at end of the year; however, Baker desires to continue operation with quick meals.

Commissioner Jitchaku moved to set this application up for a public hearing. Seconded by Commissioner Murakami, motion carried.

PRELIMINARY HEARING CHANGE OF ZONE DANIEL HATA KURTISTOWN, PUNA Change of zone request in accordance with Chapter 8 (Zoning Code) Articlel, Section 6, Hawaii County Code, as amended, for 1.3 acres of land from an Agricultural 10-acre (A-10a) to a Single Family Resi-

dential - 10,000 sq ft (RS-10) zoned district. Property is located along the east side of Volcano Highway, about 1,700 feet Hilo side of the Kurtistown Post Office and the Sako Store, Olaa Homestead Reservation Lots, Kurtistown, Puna, TMK: 1-7-01:Portion of 21.

Staff presented background report and stated applicant was unable to be present. Staff clarified that owner will be intensifying front portion by creating four additional lots.

Commissioner Jitchaku moved and Commissioner Asai seconded to set application up for a public hearing. Carried.

PRELIMINARY HEARING CHANGE OF ZONE FOREMOST HOMES HAWAII, LTD KAUMANA, SOUTH HILO Change of zone request in accordance with Chapter 8 (Zoning Code) Articlel, Section 6, Hawaii County Code, as amended, for 137 acres of land from Multiple Residential - 4,000 sq ft (RM-4), Single

Family Residential - 10,000 sq ft (RS-10) and Agricultural 20-acre (A-20a) zoned districts to Single Family Residential - 7,500 sq ft and Multiple Residential - 4,000 sq ft (RM-4) zoned districts. The area involved, referred to as Park Hokulani, is located adjacent to the 100-lot Hilo Country Club Estates Subdivision, about half a mile from Kaumana Drive, Kukuau 2nd, Kaumana, South Hilo, TMK: 2-5-46:Portions of 01 and 03.

Staff presented background report and several petitions from residents in and around subject area. Park Hokulani was originally referred to as Gentry Hawaiiana and, according to Harvey Gerwig, other than the change in name no other detail has been altered. Change was made last January and every agency on all islands was so notified.

Replying to the petitions, Gerwig asserted that swimming pools, etc., were understood from the start to be under the homeowners association. Although understood to come under the "umbrella of the Hilo Country Club, no such promises were made," he said, adding, "nor any advertising."

Gerwig stated this project has always been proposed as incremental low-cost housing but should not be construed as substandard homes. Under the Hawaiian Housing Authority plan, sale will be in the "very low \$40,000 but comparable housing under regular construction to about \$45,000."

With regard to comments about the passive park area being in the flood inundation area, Gerwig said there is only a two-foot slope and land is very flat with a stream going through it, minimizing the hazards.

In direct reply to a staff query, Gerwig declared "to the best of my knowledge," the Association will assist in developing the interim park area. He also said the five-acre natural park area will not cross the Saddle Road at any point. He observed that with the change of zone, the number of lots will not exceed 953; total allowable is 994. It was pointed out that the water supply is limited to 953 units.

Commissioner Sterling moved to set this up for a public hearing. Seconded by Commissioner Sakamoto, carried.

PRELIMINARY HEARING CHANGE OF ZONE DWIGHT MITSUNAGA KAUMANA, SOUTH HILO Change of zone request in accordance with Chapter 8 (Zoning Code), Article 1, Section 6, Hawaii County Code as amended, for 2.75 acres of land from a Single Family Residential - 15,000 sq ft (RS-15)

to a Single Family Residential - 10,000 sq ft (RS-10) zoned district. The property is located on the Puna side of Kaumana Drive, approximately 1,500 feet mauka of the Chong Road and Kaumana Drive junction, Ponahawai, Kaumana, South Hilo, TMK: 2-5-27:01.

Staff presented background report. It was clarified that all dwellings will be single-family, detached structures with three bedrooms, two full baths and two-car carports. Because of the proposal for twelve units, it was pointed out that a variance will be required also to cover the 210-foot shortage at one of the end lots.

Commissioner Jitchaku moved to set up for a public hearing and Commissioner Asai seconded. Motion carried.

PRELIMINARY HEARING CHANGE OF ZONE THE KONA COAST COMPANY KALOKO, NORTH KONA Change of zone request in accordance with Chapter 8 (Zoning Code) Article 1, Section 6, Hawaii County Code as amended, for 33.8 acres of land from an Agricultural 20-acre (A-20a) to an Agricultural

3-acre (A-3a) zoned district. Property is located about one mile mauka of the Mamalahoa Highway in the Kaloko Mauka Subdivision, Kaloko, North Kona, TMK: 7-3-24:13.

Staff presented background report.

Appearing as agent for the company, Dennis Haserot, disagreed with the Department of Agriculture comment that the lot sizes would mean agricultural use may be considered nothing more than a "hobby," contributing little or nothing to the overall production goals of the State. He said none of the lots have been sold to people with agricultural purposes, but with intentions to put them to orchards which depend on rainfull instead of any water system. Water Supply staff pointed out that, due to the Kona situation, if any subdivision is proposed for the area it will have to be held up until the Kahaluu shaft is completed in 1977.

Commissioner Sterling moved and Commissioner Jitchaku seconded to set this up for a public hearing. Motion carried.

SPECIAL PERMIT: THE LOCAL SPIRITUAL ASSEMBLY OF THE BAHAI'S OF PUNA, INC.

BACKGROUND

The applicant, The Local Spiritual Assembly of the Bahai's of Puna, is requesting a special permit to allow the establishment of a Bahai Community Center on a one-acre parcel situated within the State Land Use Agricultural District. The property is located between 34th Avenue and Pahoa Government Road, just off Aulii Drive, in the Orchid Land Estates Subdivision, approximately 1,600 feet southeast of the Pahoa Government Road, Keaau, Puna (TMK: 1-6-09-347).

The applicant intends to construct a one-story multi-purpose building of approximately 1,050 square feet that will include meeting rooms, kitchen, and restrooms.

The General Plan land use pattern allocation guide map designates the area for orchard uses which are those agricultural lands though rocky in character and content can support productive macadamia nuts, papaya, citrus and other similar agricultural products. The County zoning designation is Agricultural 3-acre (A-3a). Institutions of a religious nature are "conditionally permitted uses" within this zoned district.

The subject parcel is vacant of any structure or use. Surrounding land uses include scattered single-family dwellings and vacant land.

The Soil Conservation's land capability unit is subclass VIII. This class of soil has severe limitations that preclude

their use for commercial purposes and restrict their use to recreation, wildlife, or water supply or aesthetic purposes.

The dominant soil type is Pahoehoe lava. The land is relatively level. Annual rainfall ranges from ninety (90) to over one hundred and forty (140) inches per year.

Access to the subject parcel is through the Orchid Land Estates Subdivision roads, a system of privately owned roads. The property fronts 34th Avenue which has a forty (40) feet right-of-way. The improved portion of this road is eight (8) feet of packed cinder. Aulii Drive which provides access from the Pahoa Road has a 50-foot right-of-way with an improved portion of ten (10) feet of packed cinder. The distance from the property to the Pahoa Road is approximately 1,600 feet.

There are no utilities available to the subject site.

The applicant stated that catchment tanks will be provided to satisfy the water needs. Electricity will be provided by means of a generator.

There are no identifiable historical sites or unusual landforms on the subject area.

In support of the request, the applicant stated:

"The Bahai's of Puna have no meeting place and wish to build a one-story simple structure of one large meeting room, one small meeting room, kitchen, and two restrooms.

Owners will provide own utilities of catchment water and cesspool."

The applicant further stated:

"The Local Spiritual Assembly of Puna humbly request the Planning Commission to grant a special permit to construct a Bahai Center on our property in Orchid Lands, District of Puna. In accordance with the guidelines:

- a) Use of the land shall not be contrary to the objectives sought by the Land Use Law and Regulations;
- b) Intended use of the building and property will complement the surrounding neighborhood; c) The Bahai faith stresses cooperation with all units of government and will not burden them unnecessarily; d) No unusual condition; e) We feel that the Center will blend in with the surrounding residential uses;
 - f) Building, play area and parking lot will not alter or change the essential character of the land and its present use; g) The Bahai principles of good citizenship, equality of all men, high moral teachings and concern for our fellow men will tend to enhance the use of the land for the highest public good."

Upon review of this application, the Fire Inspector stated, "No fire and no water available other than tanks. Nearest fire station located in Pahoa. This station is in service only during the day."

The State Department of Transportation commented that, "We have no objections on the proposed action but have the following comments: 1. Landscaping should be provided for noise abatement; 2. Water should be evaluated."

The Department of Water Supply further reiterated the fact that there is no public water system near the applicant's parcel. The Police Department had no objections to the request but raised a concern regarding parking. After a check of the subject area, the Police Department stated that, "The only problem foreseen would be parking. At the present time there is hardly any traffic but when more people build and move into the area, we will have a traffic problem. The roadway at the present time is narrow and not paved."

All other cooperating agencies had no comments on or objections to the special permit request.

The bollowing is a letter from a Mrs. M. Bailey Jacobs:

(Remo Jacobs' letter)

It is recommended that the request for a special permit to allow the establishment of a Baha'i Community Center within the State Land

Use Agricultural District be given a favorable recommendation, based on the following considerations:

That the proposed use will not be contrary to the objectives sought to be accomplished by the Land Use Law and Regulations. The purpose of the Land Use Law and Regulations is to protect, preserve, and encourage the development of lands in the State for those uses to which they are best suited in the interest of the public health and welfare of the people of the State of Hawaii. The area under consideration is classified as agricultural by the State Land Use Commission. The Agricultural District includes lands surrounded by or contiguous to agricultural lands but which are not suited to agricultural and ancillary uses by reason of topography, soils and other related characteristics. The subject property's dominant soil type is pahoehoe lava which is in the Soil Conservation Service's Capability Class VIII. Class VIII soils have severe limitations that preclude their use for commercial plants. This class is the lowest in the Soil Conservation Service's ranking system for agricultural productivity. Although it is possible that some agricultural activities can be conducted on the subject property, it is determined that approval of the subject request would not be contrary to the objectives of the Land Use Law and Regulations, given the capability class rating of the subject property for agricultural productivity and the above cited criterion for determining the Agricultural District.

Further the use of the subject property for non-agricultural purposes is expected to not have an adverse effect on the overall agricultural potential of the region or the island.

In addition, institutions of a religious nature are allowed as "conditionally permitted uses" within the agricultural zone under the County Zoning Code.

- 2. That although the proposed use will alter or change the essential character of the land, such a change will make the highest and best use of the land involved for the public welfare. At the present time, the subject property is vacant and is not used for agriculture. The proposed use will undeniably alter the existing character of the property. However, it is determined that the provision of a meeting hall/community center on the subject land would be beneficial and well suited to accommodate the welfare of the public; in this particular case, the members of this faith. There exists no facility serving this faith available to the residents of the Puna district. Therefore, the establishment of the proposed use would meet the needs of the residents of the area.
- 3. That the proposed use will not adversely affect surrounding property. Surrounding land uses include scattered single-family residential and vacant lands. The area is rural-residential in character. County zoning of the area is Agricultural 3-acre (A-3a). Lots in the subdivision range in area from one to three acres, with the smaller lots being closer to the Keaau-Pahoa Highway. Due to the overall character of

the area and the physical attributes of land, it is acknowledged that the smaller lots are and will be basically used as houselots. The establishment of the proposed use is determined to be compatible with the area and not in conflict with the surrounding uses.

It is further recommended that the Special Permit be approved subject to the following conditions:

- 1. That the applicant, The Local Spiritual Assembly of the Baha'is of Puna, Inc., commence construction of the community center within one (1) year from the date of approval of the Special Permit and that the structure be completed within two (2) years thereafter;
- 2. That the applicant improve 34th Avenue from Aulii Drive to the boundary line of subject property, a distance of approximately 600 feet, with a minimum 160 feet wide oil-treated surface, subject to the approval of the Planning Director and the Chief Engineer, Department of Public Works;
- 3. That a landscape buffer be established along the side and rear property lines for the purpose of screening the proposed use from surrounding properties. This buffer shall be incorporated into plans submitted for Plan Approval and shall be approved by the Planning Director;
- 4. That all other applicable rules and regulations be complied with, including the Plan Approval process.

Should any of the foregoing conditions not be met, the Special Permit shall be deemed null and void.

Speaking as an officer of the Corporation, Guido Giacometti stated that this proposal is one that is being envisioned as a promotional program, and sure to be beneficial not only to the company but also for the whole State of Hawaii He confirmed that every precaution will be taken to safeguard the two petroglyph sites, from the time of construction to the limited public viewing that will be permitted.

Commissioner Sterling moved to set this up for a public hearing. Seconded by Commissioner Jitchaku, motion carried unanimously.

A regularly advertised public hearing on the application of the Spiritual Assembly of Puna, Inc., was called to order at 8:00 p.m, at the Council Room of the Hawaii County Building in South Hilo by Chairman Martin.

and about 20 people in attendance.

CHAIRMAN: The second and last item on our agenda tonight is a special permit request by the Local Spiritual Assembly of the Bahai's of Puna, Inc., to allow the establishment of a Baha'i Community Center within the State Land Use Agricultural District. The property is situated along 34th Avenue, approximately 500 feet from the Aulii Drive and the 34th Avenue intersection and 1,600 feet southeast of the Pahoa Government Road, within the Orchid Land Estates Subdivision, Keaau, Puna, TMK: 1-6-09:347. Staff?

HAYASHI: (Presented background data and also read into the records a letter dated October 9, 1975 from Mrs. M. Bailey Jacobs, expressing opposition because it "could mean higher taxes for the other land holders in Orchid Land Estates")

CHAIRMAN: Thank you. Any questions you have for staff?

WATT: Is that logical, more or less true, about taxes going up? It doesn't seem quite logical to me.

HAYASHI: No, it won't affect the surrounding property owners.

CHAIRMAN: As I understand the thrust of that letter, it sounded like the writer seems to think it would affect only those properties around, but we in the whole County would be affected together rather than just one subdivision.

HAYASHI: Mr. Chairman, for the Commissioner's information, churches are exempt.

WATT: But that doesn't necessarily drive others up.

HAYASHI: No sir, it does not.

ASAI: Where are the nearest residences?

HAYASHI: Commissioner Asai, at this time, I cannot answer as to where the nearest residences are.

CHAIRMAN: The Chair recognizes that there are lots of residences along Paradise Park as you drive along but as to how many residences there are in this particular subdivision, I don't know.

STERLING: In that letter that you just read into the record, the lady who is objecting to this project, where is her property in complement to this?

HAYASHI: Again, I am unable to locate Mrs. Jacob's property. I do know that she should be within 300 feet of the site.

STERLING: Does she live on it now?

HAYASHI: No, Commissioner Sterling.

STERLING: Well, if you give the technical interpretation of agriculture, she has to show income from agricultural land to keep it at agricultural land, doesn't she?

HAYASHI: That is correct.

JITCHAKU: On the blue-shaded area, is that Orchid Land Estates subdivision?

HAYASHI: That is correct, and further in the back is the Hawaiian Acres subdivision.

WATT: Would you go back one more time. If she does not have farm income, she can dedicate it to agricultural, can't she?

HAYASHI: I would like to refer that question to the Deputy Director.

FUKE: What was basically your question?

WATT: If she does not have farm income, she can't be taxed as an agricultural land but if she dedicates it to agriculture for a period of years, she can be taxed as agriculture.

FUKE: It is our understanding that the way land is assessed in that area, it is based on not only its zoning but also on how that land is actually being used and obviously, if the land is dedicated for agricultural purposes and subsequently accepted for dedication by the Department of Taxation, then of course there would be a reduced assessment.

WATT: But if it is dedicated to agricultural, it does not actually have to be farmed, does it?

FUKE: It is our understanding also that the criteria for dedication and prior to acceptance of the dedication, there has to be active agricultural use of the property.

WATT: But that would sure affect a lot of the land around Pahoa where Amfac has land not being used for agricultural purposes.

FUKE: Again, it is our understanding that if you do dedicate it, the land has to be used in some form of agricultural activity.

CHAIRMAN: For those of you present, I don't think this probably has anything to do with the present application.

STERLING: I just brought that up because of her comment that it would raise the taxes. But in the communication recently circulated to the Commissioners and signed by Mr. Farias, regarding the Kealakekua Ranch development, and he quoted the Ag law that there is one section within the Ag law that says if you dedicate to Ag, as I recall it, I thought I had it here, that house is located on that piece of property had to show as Ag income. I just brought it up because I thought it was rather a facetious letter. She is not even living on it and why should she be worried.

CHAIRMAN: Any further questions? If not, is the applicant or a representative of the applicant present?

SADILEK: I'm James Sadilek. I'm treasurer of the Spiritual Assembly of Puna. I did have something here that I was going to read but your staff man over here read it so I will just make myself available to answer any questions you might have.

CHAIRMAN: Do you have any comments on the staff presentation?

SADILEK: I could say that the nearest residence is -- can I go up to the map? I think it is up here, maybe one down here. Several hundred feet.

MURAKAMI: What is your total membership? Because I understand from the staff report, in time to come there might be traffic problems because the street is narrow.

SADILEK: Our total membership is in the neighborhood of forty, but the people that come to meetings, there are not that many, seldom over ten cars.

CHAIRMAN: It looks like there are more than ten people here tonight.

SADILEK: We had a little help from Hilo.

CHAIRMAN: What do you call this?

SADILEK: Spiritual Assembly, each judicial district on the island has an assembly.

FUKE: Do you have any plans right now for expansion? I would imagine that you intend to increase your membership. You ought to be aware that if you do expand the area, you will have to come before this Commission for an expansion of the use.

SADILEK: You are right, we do expect to expand but if we expand to where we outgrow this building, we will in all likelihood have the funds to purchase a piece of land in a different area that may be more suited to our purposes.

FUKE: So that in a sense you are thinking of this location as being somewhat temporary.

SADILEK: Hopefully, yes.

FUKE: How many members can your building accommodate right now comfortably?

SADILEK: We designed for 75 people.

CHAIRMAN: Any further questions?

HAYASHI: Yes, I'd like to ask Mr. Sadilek: Would the building be used for other community purposes, would other community organizations be allowed to use the building or is it solely for the Baha'i community?

SADILEK: At present, it is solely intended for the Baha'i community.

DOMINGO: You don't know if there are any public buildings around in this subdivision, do you?

SADILEK: To my knowledge, there isn't, no.

DOMINGO: It is mentioned that the building will consist of 1,015 square feet. Is this strictly for worship only?

SADILEK: No, it will be used for various types of meetings like school meetings, teaching, study meetings.

FUKE: Some of the questions we are asking is that if the Planning Commission recommends favorable action to the State Land Use Commission and subsequently they approve it, what we are thinking is perhaps if you are anticipating growth of the membership, it would be wise to plan for it and to make the request right now and obviate the need to come before this Commission and the State Land Use Commission again.

SADILEK: We just hadn't considered that. That would then require putting off this particular variance and reapplying, wouldn't it?

FUKE: No, not necessarily, except that if you have semidefinitive plans for expansion, it could legitimately be considered part and parcel of this particular application. So what's being considered right now is a building not exceeding 1,100 square feet in size and conceivably after one or two years after the building is up, you may elect to expand it because of increased membership or change in functions of the building.

SADILEK: In view of our past growth, that would not be within one or two years. I hope it does.

CHAIRMAN: (seeing another Assembly member approach Sadilek) We will give you a chance to confer there.

SADILEK: Okay, if we can change now to say that we would like to be able to expand to, say, 3,000 square feet at some future date. As you can see from the map there is ample parking area in the back to take care of that.

FUKE: You are definitely thinking of only one building? Perhaps you might want to have one main building and attempt to construct separate restroom facility. For your purpose, you feel that just one building would be sufficient regardless of what the dimensions are? Some churches have one place for worship and other buildings for classes, community meetings and such.

SADILEK: I don't know, I think for our purposes just one building is suffficient.

CHAIRMAN: I think the Chair is now wondering where we are. Where does the application stand now?

FUKE: The application before you is basically for the construction of a worship facility or a church facility on the property. So in our recommendation to the Commission at this time, we would be disposed towards a favorable recommendation. We are not thinking of any building size limitation except we are thinking of just one structure.

CHAIRMAN: A structure for room for addition in the future?

FUKE: Assuming that the request goes through, we will probably recommend for one building and when they come in for building permit, obviously the building will be designed to their specification, 1100 square feet, and that would be the one building. And whatever is constructed that would be in a sense what the special permit was granted for. But in the event the church decides to expand it further, of course, you will be needing a special permit again. So it becomes critical when you submit your building permit that you have of such size and dimensions so as to minimize having to come before this Commission again.

CHAIRMAN: So now we are talking about a building but without dimensions or size.

FUKE: That's right.

MURAKAMI: I would like to ask Deputy, is restroom combined with this building?

FUKE: I would assume that the building would be completely selfcontained with the restroom facilities and kitchen facilities as well.

MURAKAMI: You mentioned only one building so I was just wondering.

CHAIRMAN: You mentioned meeting room, restroom, and kitchen?

SADILEK: Two restrooms.

JITCHAKU: Sidney, is it true in your statement that also maybe in a year or so, if they do want to expand couple hundred feet or so, they still have to come before us again?

FUKE: As the law is written, yes.

JITCHAKU: Even for an addition or expansion?

FUKE: That would constitute an expansion of a use not normally allowed in this zone. This is by virtue of the State Land Use Commission law, not necessarily the County zoning law.

CHAIRMAN: Any further questions? Thank you, Mr. Sadelik. Anyone present would like to give testimony on this application? Yes, ma'am.

MUSACCHIA: Mr. Chairman, may I have permission to distribute my testimony?

CHAIRMAN: You may.

MUSACCHIA: And also this basic fact sheet.

CHAIRMAN: You may.

MUSACCHIA: (Reads from written testimony)

CHAIRMAN: Thank you for the information which I find very interesting. Anyone else would like to come up to say something in favor or opposed? I think nobody is going to get up to say anything in opposition because you are all members and here to show support.

STERLING: I move to close the public hearing.

WATT: Second.

CHAIRMAN: It has been moved and seconded to close this public hearing on the Spiritual Assembly of Puna application. All those in favor, say aye.

COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

CHAIRMAN: Opposed. Motion carried.

BAHÁ'Í FAITH

Fact Sheet

I. The Bahá'í Faith--An Independent World Religion

The Bahá'í Faith is an independent world religion with followers in almost every country. It is not eclectic, syncretic, an offshoot of Islám, or a sect of any other religion; and it does not claim to derive its inspiration from the sacred books of other religions. Its Founder, Bahá'u'lláh, asserts that His Message is a revelation direct from God, at the same time making it clear that He, the human vehicle of such a revelation, is "never to be identified with . . . the Essence of Divinity itself." He claims that all true religions come from the same Divine Source, that all the Prophets of God proclaim the Word of God, and that religious truth is continuous and relative, not final and absolute.

The Bahá'í Faith has its own sacred Scriptures, its own laws, its own administrative institutions, its own holy places -- the most sacred of which are situated in the Holy Land on and near Mount Carmel.

A Bahá'í is a follower of Bahá'u'lláh, Whose name when translated from the Arabic means the 'Glory of God.' The term Bahá'í (pronounced Ba-há-ee) is used to denote either the Faith itself or a person who is a member of the Faith. The terms 'Bahá'ist' or 'Bahá'ism' are incorrect. Plural of Bahá'í is Bahá'ís.

II. Teachings of the Bahá'í Faith

- A. The oneness of God, the oneness of religion, and the oneness of mankind constitute the three basic principles of the Bahá'í Faith.
- B. God, in essence, is unknowable. However, His Word is made known through His Chosen Messengers.
- C. God is one, even though men have called Him by different names.
- D. God has revealed His Word in each period of history through a chosen individual, called variously a Prophet or Messenger, but whom Bahá'ís call the "Manifestation of God." Abraham, Moses, Buddha, Zoroaster, Christ, Muḥammad, among others, were Manifestations of God.
- E. Bahá'u'lláh is the Manifestation of God for this Age; some of His spiritual and social Teachings include the following principles:
 - 1. The independent search after truth, unfettered by superstition or tradition
 - 2. The oneness of the entire human race, the pivotal principle and fundamental doctrine of the Faith
 - 3. The basic unity of all religions

- The condemnation of all forms of prejudice, whether religious, racial, class, or national 5. The harmony which must exist between religion and science The equality of men and women, the two wings on which the bird of humankind is able to soar 7. The introduction of compulsory education

 - The adoption of a universal auxiliary language
 - The abolition of the extremes of wealth and poverty
 - 10. The institution of a world tribunal for the adjudication of disputes between nations
 - 11. The exaltation of work performed in the spirit of service to the rank of worship
 - The glorification of justice as the ruling principle in human society and of religion as the bulwark for the protection of all peoples and nations
 - 13. The establishment of a permanent and universal peace as the supreme goal of all mankind

F. Immortality

- The reality of man is his soul, which is eternal; its progress is continuous.
- The life a man chooses to lead makes a difference in his immortal life.
- 3. Heaven and hell are not places but conditions of the soul. Heaven is nearness to God and obedience to Him through love; hell is remoteness from God, disobedience to His Word, and the awareness of deprivation brought about by wrong choice.

Ethical and Moral Behavior

- The highest ethical and moral behavior is enjoined on Bahá'ís through the development of such attributes as truthfulness and honesty, purity and cleanliness in mind and body, courtesy, humility, trustworthiness, justice, compassion, mercy and forgiveness, chastity and fidelity. These attributes must govern the daily life of Bahá'ís.
- 2. Service to humanity is regarded as a form of worship.
- 3. Backbiting, gossip, and slander are strictly forbidden.
- 4. Loyalty and obedience to government are obligatory.
- 5. Promoting the welfare of humanity is the active concern of Bahá'ís, but they do not involve themselves in partisan politics.

Other Laws and Ordinances Governing Bahá'í Life:

- 1. Daily prayer
- 2. Annual fasting period
- 3. Monogamy
- 4. Consent of all living parents for marriage
- 5. Discouragement of divorce, though it is permitted after waiting period of one year
- 6. Prohibition of slavery, asceticism, mendicancy, monasticism and penance
- 7. Non-use of alcohol and narcotics other than for medicinal purposes
- Non-participation in gambling
- 9. Work at a craft, trade, or profession (idleness is condemned)
- 10. Prohibition of cremation, if the law permits
- 11. Obligation to educate all children

III. Major Figures of the Bahá'í Faith

- A. Bahá'u'lláh, Prophet-Founder of the Bahá'í Faith (1817-1892)
 - The name Bahá'u'lláh is Arabic and means the "Glory of God." Bahá'u'lláh was born in Tihrán, Írán, November 12, 1817. He was the son of a government minister.

2. Upon hearing of the claim of the Bab to be a Prophet of God, Baha'u'llah embraced the Bábí Faith and became one of its staunchest adherents. In 1852, in a wave of severe Bábí persecutions, Bahá'u'lláh was imprisoned in an underground dungeon in Tihran. There He received the first intimation that He was the Great Messenger of God foretold by the Bab. (The Founders of all other great world religions also promised the coming of such a Great Messenger). Upon His release from prison, a period of life-long exile and banishment began. While in exile in Baghdad in 1863 He announced His Prophetic Mission to His followers. After further exile to Constantinople and Adrianople, He was incarcerated in the Turkish penal colony of 'Akka'. Although He remained nominally a prisoner until His death in 1892, Bahá'u'lláh was persuaded to move outside the gates of the prison-city after a nine-year confinement within prison walls. At Bahjí, where Bahá'u'lláh spent the last years of His life, many notables and government officials sought His presence. B. Báb, Prophet-Herald of the Bahá'í Faith (1819-1850) The name Báb is Arabic and means "Gate." He was born in Shíráz, Írán, October 20, 1819. In 1844 He proclaimed Himself a Prophet of God and Herald of One greater than Himself, Whose coming would fulfill the prophecies of all the great religions and usher in a new Age. Because of His Teachings He and His followers were persecuted by the Muslim clergy. These persecutions persisted during His imprisonment and banishment and culminated in His public martyrdom in 1850 at Tabríz, Írán (then Persia). Some 20,000 of His followers were also martyred during the early history of the Faith. C. 'Abdu'l-Bahá, Eldest Son of Bahá'u'lláh (1844-1921) The name 'Abdu'l-Bahá is Arabic and means 'Servant of the Glory." He shared persecution, exile, and imprisonment with His Prophet-Father and remained a prisoner until 1908. He was appointed by Bahá'u'lláh in His written Will and Testament as the Center of His Covenant, to Whom all Bahá'ís must turn for instruction and guidance. After release from prison, 'Abdu'l-Bahá undertook extensive teaching tours in Egypt and Europe and spent eight months in the United States in 1912, where He spoke in churches, synagogues, universities, peace, philosophic, and scientific societies. His visits were given wide acclaim, and He was honored by government officials and community leaders throughout the country. He spoke in many major cities from coast to coast. 'Abdu'l-Bahá is regarded as the Perfect Exemplar of Bahá'u'lláh's Teachings but not as a divinely inspired Prophet. D. Shoghi Effendi, Guardian of the Bahá'í Faith (1896-1957) Eldest grandson of 'Abdu'l-Bahá, Shoghi Effendi was appointed by Him in His written Will and Testament as the Guardian of the Bahá'í Faith. In 1921 he became, after 'Abdu'l-Bahá, the sole interpreter of the Bahá'í Teachings. Under his guidance the present Administrative Order was developed and the groundwork laid for the eventual election of the Universal House of Justice. After the death of Shoghi Effendi on November 4, 1957, the worldwide leadership of the Faith was assumed by the supreme administrative body ordained by Bahá'u'lláh--the Universal House of Justice. It was first elected in 1963. -3-

IV. Sacred Scriptures and Literature of the Bahá'í Faith

- A. Sacred Scriptures consist of the Writings of Bahá'u'lláh, the Báb, and 'Abdu'l-Bahá. There are also numerous commentaries and explanations written by Shoghi Effendi, which, although not considered as sacred Scriptures, are regarded as equally valid.
 - 1. Bahá'u'lláh wrote more than 100 volumes and Tablets including: the Kitáb-i-Aqdas (The Most Holy Book) which contains most of the laws and ordinances of the Faith; the Kitáb-i-Íqán (Book of Certitude) which explains the unity and continuity of religion; The Hidden Words, which presents the essence of all the revealed truth of all religion; and numerous other Writings which are included in such compilations as: Gleanings from the Writings of Bahá'u'lláh, excerpts on religion, man, and society; and Prayers and Meditations, which reveal God's purpose for man.
 - 2. The <u>Báb</u>'s Writings consist mainly of the Persian Bayán, which tells of the coming of Bahá'u'lláh, and His commentary on the Súrih of Joseph (Qayyúmu'l-Asmá').

 Many of the Báb's Writings have been lost or corrupted.
 - 3. Writings of 'Abdu'l-Bahá include: His Will and Testament in which He appoints Shoghi Effendi the Guardian of the Bahá'í Faith; and The Secret of Divine Civilization. Compilations of His letters to individuals and groups and many of His talks in Europe and America are published in such books as Paris Talks, Foundations of World Unity, Some Answered Questions, The Reality of Man, The Divine Art of Living, and the Tablets of the Divine Plan.
 - 4. Shoghi Effendi made many penetrating analyses of world events and provided guidance to the Bahá'ís throughout the world in the following works: God Passes By (a history of the Faith); The World Order of Bahá'u'lláh; The Advent of Divine Justice; The Promised Day Is Come: He also wrote numerous letters to Bahá'ís throughout the world, many of which have been compiled in a series of volumes.
 - 5. A cumulative history of the Faith is recorded in The Bahá'í World, which is published periodically.
 - 6. Other Bahá'í books include Bahá'u'lláh and the New Era, by J. E. Esslemont (an introductory text); All Things Made New, by John Ferraby; The Promise of All Ages, by George Townshend, Former Canon of St. Patrick's Cathedral, Dublin, Ireland, and Archdeacon of Clonfert. The many other books about various aspects of the Bahá'í Faith also include books for children.

V. Organization

- A. There is no clergy in the Bahá'í Faith.
- B. Administration is through elected bodies at the local, national, and international levels. Elections are democratic in form, though campaigning or nominating are not permitted. Bahá'í administrative institutions use a spiritual approach to group consultation to serve the needs of the Faith. The Administrative Order, ordained by Bahá'u'lláh and elaborated by 'Abdu'l-Bahá, has been so designed that it will "expand and adapt itself to the needs and requirements of an ever-changing society." Each of the administrative bodies appoints committees to assist in its work.
- C. Local Spiritual Assembly--A nine-member administrative body, elected annually on April 21, in every city, town, or judicial district where nine or more adult Bahá'ís reside
- D. <u>National Spiritual Assembly</u>—A nine-member body elected annually by delegates at the National Bahá'í Convention. The delegates are elected according to proportionate

- representation at annual state or similar conventions.
- E. <u>Universal House of Justice</u>—A nine-member body elected by the members of National Spiritual Assemblies throughout the world. Members presently serve for a five-year term. This is the highest unit in the Administrative Order, and it has legislative powers on matters not expressly revealed in the Bahá'í Scriptures.
- F. Hands of the Cause of God--Persons who were appointed by Bahá'u'lláh, 'Abdu'l-Bahá, and Shoghi Effendi especially to protect the Faith and assist with expansion. This group is assisted by the Continental Board of Counsellors.
- G. Continental Board of Counsellors -- Persons appointed by the Universal House of Justice to assist the Hands of the Cause of God in carrying out their functions on each of the continents. This group is assisted by Auxiliary Boards, whose members are appointed by the Counsellors in consultation with the Hands of the Cause of God.
- H. Financial contributions for support of all Bahá'í activities are accepted from Bahá'ís only and are wholly voluntary; personal solicitation is forbidden.

VI. Bahá'í Calendar and Holy Days

- A. The Bahá'í calendar, based on the solar year, consists of 19 months, each with 19 days; the New Year falls on the vernal equinox (March 21). The solar year is equalized by four (five in Leap Year) intercalary days preceding the last Bahá'í month. The Bahá'í day begins and ends at sunset. The years, months, and days are named after the attributes of God, i.e., Splendor, Beauty, Sovereignty, etc.
- B. On the first day of each Bahá'í month, Bahá'ís meet for the Nineteen Day Feast. Its purpose is devotion, community consultation, and fellowship.
- C. Special anniversaries observed as Holy Days are:
 - 1. Feast of Naw-Rúz (New Year) March 21. According to the Bahá'í calendar this is the first day of the year and falls on the vernal equinox.
 - 2. Feast of Ridván, April 21 May 2 (1863). Ridván is the period during which Bahá'u'lláh announced to His followers that He was the Promised One foretold by the Báb. April 21, April 29, and May 2 are observed as Holy Days during this period.
 - 3. Declaration of the Báb, May 23 (1844). The day on which He announced His Mission to His first disciple.
 - 4. Ascension of Bahá'u'lláh, May 29 (1892). The day on which Bahá'u'lláh died at Bahjí in the Holy Land.
 - 5. Martyrdom of the Báb, July 9 (1850). The day on which the Báb was publicly executed in the square of Tabríz, Írán.
 - 6. Birth of the Báb, October 20 (1819). The Báb was born in Shíráz, Írán.
 - 7. Birth of Bahá'u'lláh, November 12 (1817). Bahá'u'lláh was born in Ţihrán, ſrán.
 - 8. Ascension of 'Abdu'l-Bahá, November 28 (1921). 'Abdu'l-Bahá died in Haifa, Israel.

VII. Houses of Worship

- A. At present there are five Bahá'í Houses of Worship. They are located at or near the following cities: Frankfurt, Germany; Sydney, Australia; Kampala, Uganda, Africa; Wilmette, Illinois, U.S.A.; and Panama City, Panama. Other Houses of Worship will be built in the future.
- B. The only architectural requirement is that all Bahá'í Houses of Worship be nine-sided and surmounted by a dome.

- C. Institutions accessory to the House of Worship, such as a school, a hospital, and a home for the aged, are to be dedicated to the service of mankind and will eventually be established in the vicinity of each House of Worship. The first such institution, a home for the aged, has been established near the Bahá'í House of Worship in Wilmette, Illinois.
- D. Bahá'í Houses of Worship are places for prayer and meditation and are open to all people, regardless of race, religion, or class. Services are simple, without ritual, and consist of selected readings, prayers, and meditations from the Sacred Writings of the Bahá'í Faith and other religions of the world. Music is provided by vocal soloists and an a cappella choir.

VIII. World Center of the Bahá'í Faith

The Bahá'í World Center is situated in the Holy Land on the slopes of Mount Carmel overlooking the seaport of Haifa and the twin city of 'Akká, where Bahá'u'lláh was imprisoned, and in properties near 'Akká. The international administrative body of the Bahá'í Faith is located at the World Center on Mount Carmel, as are the International Archives Building, repository of original Bahá'í Scriptures and historical items; the golden-domed Shrine of the Báb, tomb of the Báb and burial place of 'Abdu'l-Bahá; and various administrative offices. Another extensive area on Mount Carmel, owned by Bahá'ís, is the planned site for additional buildings. Other Shrines and Holy Places located at the World Center are a few miles from Haifa. The Mansion at Bahjí, where Bahá'u'lláh spent the last years of His life, is now a Bahá'í museum; His burial place near Bahjí is a Shrine surrounded by beautiful gardens.

IX. The Bahá'í Faith in the United States

A. General History

- 1. Bahá'u'lláh was first mentioned in the United States in 1893 at the World Congress of Religions at the Columbia Exposition in Chicago.
- 2. First Bahá'í group in America was formed in Chicago in 1894 and the first U.S. Bahá'í Convention was convened in 1907.
- 3. April 11 through December 5, 1912, was the period of 'Abdu'l-Bahá's visit to America.
- 4. On May 1, 1912, 'Abdu'l-Bahá laid the cornerstone for the Bahá'í House of Worship in Wilmette, Illinois. Work on the Temple began in December 1920. The exterior was completed in 1943, the interior was completed in 1952, and the edifice was formally dedicated May 2, 1953.
- 5. The first National Spiritual Assembly of the Bahá'ís of the United States and Canada was formed in 1925. In 1948 the United States and Canada formed separate National Spiritual Assemblies.
- B. Bahá'í House of Worship is located at the corner of Sheridan Road and Linden Avenue in Wilmette, Illinois, on the shore of Lake Michigan north of Chicago. This structure rises 191 feet from the basement floor to the pinnacle. The unique design of the House of Worship and its concrete and quartz lace-like ornamentation have made it world famous. There have been almost 3 million visitors to the House of Worship. It is surrounded by nine gardens and fountains. The House of Worship and landscaping cost nearly \$3 million, all of which was contributed voluntarily by Bahá'ís around the world.

- C. The National Baha. Headquarters is adjacent to the Bana i House of Worship at 112 Linden Avenue, Wilmette, Illinois. The Bahá'í Publishing Trust is located nearby at 415 Linden Avenue, Wilmette, Illinois. The Bahá'í Home for the Aged, located at 401 Greenleaf Avenue, Wilmette, Illinois, is an accessory to the Bahá'í House of Worship and exemplifies the principle that devotion to God must be fulfilled in service to one's fellow men without discrimination of race, class, or creed. The Home is open to all persons over 65. Its construction and part of the operating costs are met by voluntary contributions from Bahá'ís. Bahá'í Summer Schools, also open to all people regardless of race, class, or creed, are held throughout the U.S. to provide facilities for studying the Bahá'í Faith and are regarded as the forerunners of Bahá'í universities. Bahá'í-owned schools are located at Eliot, Maine; Geyserville, California; Davison, Michigan; Hemingway, South Carolina. Other schools are operated at camps or on college campuses across the United States. The annual National Convention of the Faith is held during the latter part of April at the National Center in Wilmette, Illinois. Delegates from the 48 continental states and to consult on the progress of the Faith nationally and worldwide. Alaska and Hawaii each has its own National Spiritual Assembly. The National Spiritual Assembly of the Bahá'ís of the U.S. sponsors several nationwide special events each year. At present these events include:
 - gather to elect the nine-member administrative body--the National Spiritual Assembly--

World Religion Day - Third Sunday in January

Race Unity Day - Second Sunday in June

World Peace Day - Third Sunday in September

Birth of Bahá'u'lláh - November 12

In addition, special emphasis is given by Bahá'ís each year to United Nations Day, October 24, and United Nations Human Rights Day, December 10.

- The Bahá'í Publishing Trust, 415 Linden Avenue, Wilmette, Illinois, publishes and handles the sale of authorized Bahá'í literature, pamphlets, study courses, posters, audio-visual materials, etc. Literature and Special Materials catalogs are issued periodically by the Publishing Trust.
- Bahá'í Service for the Blind--Braille editions and tape recordings of most Bahá'í books have been issued. These are sold to Bahá'ís by the Bahá'í Service for the Blind, which also maintains a lending library. Recorded subscriptions to Bahá'í News, National Bahá'í Review, The American Bahá'í, and World Order are available to Bahá'ís who are blind.
- North American Bahá'í Office for Human Rights (NABOHR) was established in 1968 by the National Spiritual Assembly of the Bahá'ís of the United States to further the achievement of human rights. The office received the Silver Anvil Award of the Public Relations Society of America in 1968 for its activities on behalf of International Human Rights Year. The office has sponsored numerous regional and national conferences on human rights and education. National office is located at 112 Linden Avenue, Wilmette, Illinois.
- News Organs
 - Bahá'í News, National Bahá'í Review, and The American Bahá'í are monthly publications for Bahá'ís.
 - World Order is a quarterly journal intended to stimulate, inspire, and serve 2. thinking people in their search to find relationships between contemporary life and contemporary religious teachings and philosophy. It features articles by Bahá'í and non-Bahá'í authors.
 - Child's Way is a bimonthly magazine for children featuring Bahá'í prayers and Writings, stories, songs, poems, games, and scientific projects.

- L. Films--The following 16 mm color, sound films on the Bahá'í Faith are available.
 - 1. And His Name Shall Be One. Produced by CBS Television for the television series "Lamp Unto My Feet." (30 minutes).
 - 2. A New Wind. Produced by George Stoney. The film focuses on the Bahá'í World Center and three widely separated Bahá'í communities around the world. It depicts how the Faith effects changes in the lives of its followers. (30 minutes).
 - 3. It's Just the Beginning. Produced by Kiva Films. The film is about Bahá'í youth. They tell why they are Bahá'ís, what the Bahá'í Faith teaches, and how it can solve the problems facing modern man.
 - 4. Have You Heard the News, My Friend? Produced by Kiva Films. The film shows the spread of the Bahá'í Faith in the southern United States and in Jamaica and discusses its Teachings. (24 minutes).
 - 5. Give Me That New Time Religion. Produced by Kiva Films. The film shows a Bahá'í music festival featuring Dizzie Gillespie, Seals and Crofts, Geraldine Jones, and Linda Marshall, who discuss the Bahá'í Faith and sing songs related to it. (21 minutes).
- M. The Bahá'í Faith, as a non-governmental agency, is represented at the United Nations. The Bahá'í International Community has consultative status with the Economic and Social Council. The U.S. Bahá'í Community has a Non-Governmental Organization observer accredited to the United Nations Public Information Office.

X. Teaching the Bahá'í Faith

A. Conditions of Membership

- 1. Membership is open to all who accept the tenets of the Bahá'í Faith, recognize the station of the principal Figures, and accept the Bahá'í Writings and Administrative Order.
- 2. Normally, application for membership is made to the Local Spiritual Assembly.
- 3. While they are not eligible to vote in Bahá'í elections until 21 years of age, youth may participate on committees appointed by local, national, or international administrative bodies.

B. Expansion of the Baha'í Faith

- 1. Since there is no clergy in the Faith, the responsibility for teaching and spreading the Faith rests with the individual Bahá'í. Public meetings are sponsored by local administrative bodies, and individual Bahá'ís hold fireside discussions.
- 2. Volunteer teachers, known as pioneers, relocate in areas where the Bahá'í Faith is not yet known, both within their country and in other areas of the world. Hundreds have assisted and are assisting in establishing the Faith in Europe, Asia, Africa, Latin America, the Pacific, and the Arctic. Much of the pioneering entails great sacrifice on the part of the individual believers, who without hesitation leave homes, jobs, and comforts for privations and who often brave dangers in their efforts to spread the Faith.

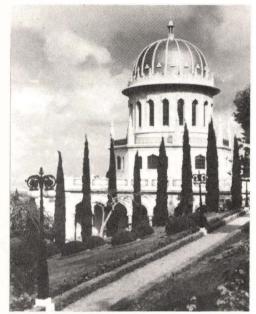

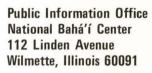

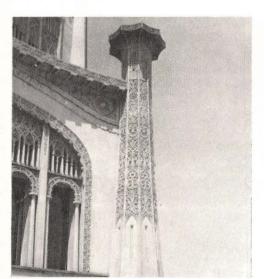

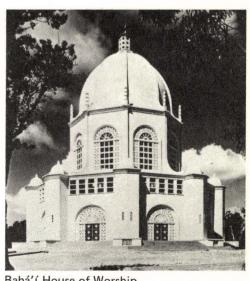

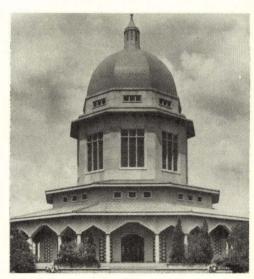

Members of the Planning Commission:

My name is Evelyn Musacchia and I am one of the secretaries of the National Spiritual Assembly of the Baha'is of the Hawaiian Islands. As a member of the National Assembly, I am speaking on behalf of the twenty-eight Baha'i communities in Hawaii in favor of the special permit.

These communities are governed by local Assemblies, twenty-one of which are incorporated. Our World Center is located on Mount Carmel in Haifa, Israel, and we have more than 119 National Assemblies all over the world, thousands of local Assemblies and membership in the Faith running into millions.

Since we do not have the usual church or synagogue, it is each community's goal to have a meeting place where the members may gather for various activities of a religious and social nature, and to discuss the business affairs of the Faith.

The Baha'i communities, in coming together in the meeting places, find they develop a wider and deeper understanding of the purpose and value of human life. They develop a sense of worth, assurance, and courage, as well as a sense of direction which are dependent upon the attainment of spiritual as well as material goals. We feel that if human beings are to realize fully their potentialities and be willing to contribute their talents and skills to aid others in attaining happiness, they become better citizens, and the word 'progress' has a broader and deeper meaning.

The land in Puna has been purchased with this in mind, to fulfill the goal of the Puna Baha'i Community. In all areas around the world where local Centers exist they have proven to be welcome additions to the neighborhood, with properies being kept up and Baha'is being good neighbors in every sense of the word.
