DECISION AND ORDER

OF THE STATE OF HAWAII

In the Matter of the Petition for Special Permit of Powers Apiaries, Inc.

SP78-295 POWERS APIARIES

The Land Use Commission of the State of Hawaii
having duly considered the entire record in this matter,
makes the following findings of fact and conclusions of law:

FINDINGS OF FACT

- 1. The Petition for Special Permit was filed by
 Powers Apiaries, Inc., to allow the operation of a honey
 storage and processing facility and queenery on approximately
 5.6 acres of land situated within the State Land Use
 Agricultural District at Kahauloa Iki, South Kona, Hawaii,
 Tax Map Key 8-2-8: portions of parcels 22 and 55.
- 2. The subject property is located along the Napoopoo Road adjacent to the Kona Farmer's Coffee Mill.
- 3. The County of Hawaii's General Plan Land Use Pattern Allocation Guide Map designates the area as Orchard. The property is presently zoned Unplanned (U).
- 4. The Land Study Bureau's Overall Master
 Productivity Soil Rating for Agricultural use is Class "E"
 or Very Poor for the subject property. The subject land is
 also classified as "Other Important Agricultural Land,"
 under the classification system recently adopted by the
 State Board of Agriculture.

The uses of land surrounding the subject property include scattered single family dwellings, coffee farms, and other agricultural uses. Much of the surrounding land area is unused. The subject property is situated within the Kealakekua Bay Archaeological and Historic District which is on the Hawaii Register of Historic Places. An archaeological reconnaissance survey conducted on the property revealed the presence of irregular stone walls, three to four feet high lacking internal division walls. No other archaeological features were observed, and the survey indicated that no further study of the findings was warranted. 7. The Kahauloa flood channel crosses the southwestern corner of the subject property and a berm has been raised along the channel to protect nearby homes and the neighboring coffee mill. 8. The Petitioner anticipates that his proposed development can be the processing site for approximately 4,000 honey producing hives on the Island of Hawaii. The Petitioner also states that there is no known negative impact on surrounding vegetation due to the presence of bee hives. The hives should have a very beneficial impact on production due to increased pollenization. The Petitioner has stated that honey bee operations cannot be expanded any further without the proposed facilities and a separate processing, storage, and queenery operation cannot be maintained economically. Since the subject property lies within the County of Hawaii's Special Management Area (SMA), the Petitioner requested and was granted an SMA Use Permit for the proposed facilities on November 16, 1977. -2-

- 10. The State Department of Agriculture has stated that the growth potential of the bee industry should be encouraged because of the increasing demand for Hawaiian queen bees and because of the possibility of year-round production in Hawaii.
- ll. The Hawaii County Department of Public Works has stated that the proposed Coffee Mill Floodwater diversion may affect the subject parcel.
- 12. The Department of Water Supply has stated that "there is only a limited amount of water presently available until such time as the Kahalu'u Shaft Projects are completed."
- 13. The Hawaii Electric Light Company, Inc., the County Police Department, Department of Research and Development, and Department of Health had no objections to the proposed use.

CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

- 1. "Unusual and reasonable" uses other than those which are permitted in an agricultural district may be permitted by special permit pursuant to HRS Chapter 205-6, and the State Land Use Commission District Regulation, Part V.
- 2. The approval of the subject request would be consistent with the State Land Use Law and Regulations. The intent of these statutory provisions is to preserve, protect and encourage the development of lands in the State for those uses to which they are best suited in the interest of the public health and welfare of the people of Hawaii. The purpose of the subject request is to allow the establishment of facilities for the processing of honey. Also requested is the establishment of a queenery, which is for the breeding

of queen bees. Without the availability of processing and storage facilities, an essential link in the distribution of these products would be lacking. In addition, the breeding of queen bees is one aspect of bee-raising which is supportive of the overall activity. The proposed uses would thus be directly consistent with the purposes of the State Land Use Agricultural District. The proposed use would also support other agricultural activities because the growth of beekeeping would be beneficial to crops requiring pollenization.

Furthermore, the area under consideration has soils with low productivity ratings for conventional agriculture. The area, however, is optimal for the proposed use in terms of wind conditions. By establishing the use on the subject property, lands with higher productivity ratings can be reserved for agricultural activities requiring certain soil-related conditions.

- the County's policies of encouraging and supporting agricultural activities, inasmuch as support facilities for a growing agricultural use will be provided. Approval of the subject request will also directly implement the Hawaii County General Plan. The General Plan Economic Element explicitly states that Hawaii County shall assist the expansion of the agricultural industry, especially diversified agriculture. The General Plan Economic Element also calls for the diversification of Hawaii County's economy. The establishment of the proposed facilities and its use as a growing diversified agricultural endeavor is in keeping with these General Plan policies.
- 4. Although there will be some alteration in the existing character of the land, such alteration will

not have substantially adverse effects on surrounding properties or the general character of the area. The proposed use will not entail the construction of large-scale facilities. A large portion of the subject property will remain open in character. In addition, the general area is either vacant or in agricultural use, with scattered single-family dwellings. The proposed use is not expected to generate excessive traffic, noise, or other effects of a noxious nature.

- 5. The proposed use will not unreasonably burden public agencies to provide additional services and facilities. All essential services and facilities are or can be made available to the subject site. Although a limited quantity of water is currently available for the Kona region, this will be eventually rectified with the completion of the Kahalu'u Shaft project.
- 6. The use described in the petition is an unusual and reasonable use pursuant to HRS Chapter 205-6 and State Land Use Commission District Regulation, Part V.

DECISION AND ORDER

IT IS HEREBY ORDERED:

That Special Permit Number 78-295, for the operation of a honey storage and processing facility on approximately 5.6 acres of land situated within the State Land Use Agricultural District at Kahauloa Iki, South Kona, Hawaii, Tax Map Key 8-2-8: portions of parcels 22 and 55, be approved subject to the following conditions:

1. That construction of the proposed structures shall commence within one (1) year of the effective date of approval of the Special Permit and shall be completed within two (2) years thereafter. The petitioner or its

authorized representative shall receive final plan approval prior to establishment of the proposed use.

- 2. That the conditions of approval of Special Management Area (SMA) Use Permit No. 44 shall be complied with.
- 3. That all other applicable rules and regulations, including the requirements of the Departments of Water Supply, Public Works and Health, shall be complied with.
- 4. That should any of the foregoing conditions not be met, the Special Permit may be deemed null and void.

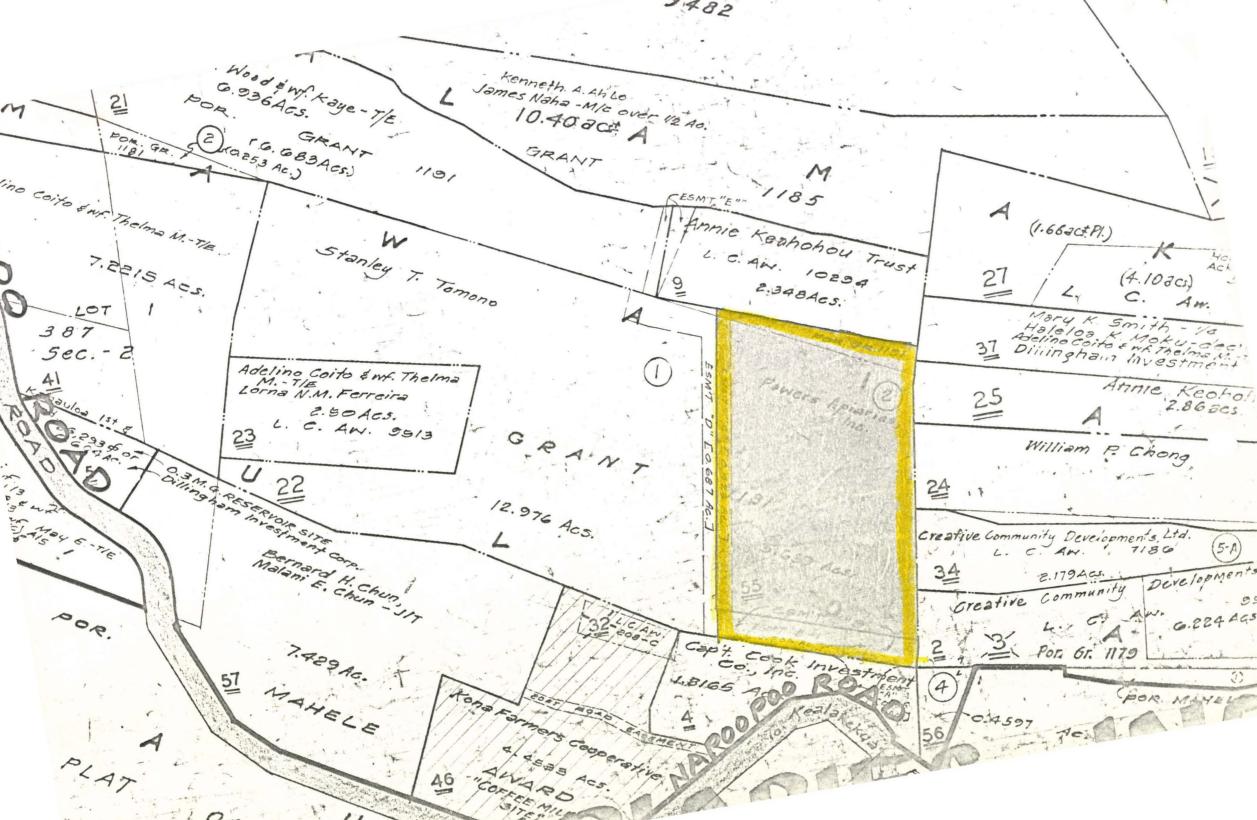

SP78-293 - MR. & MRS. BENJAMIN ARANIO SPECIAL PERMIT TO ALLOW THE ESTABLISHMENT OF A CARE HOME AT OMAO, KOLOA, KAUAI

Mr. Daniel Yasui, staff planner, pointed out the location of the subject parcel on the maps and oriented it with various surrounding landmarks. A resume of the staff report, including the conditions imposed by the Kauai Planning Commission, was also presented.

Concern was expressed regarding the conflicting comments from the County Water Department which stated that existing water storage and sources were adequate; yet recommended that the applicant be informed of the sub-standard fire flow condition in this area. However, it was noted that the Fire Department did state that the existing minor discrepancies will be corrected prior to issuance of an occupancy permit. It was also brought out that the building had already been built within the time limitation imposed by the loan, and the building had fulfilled all the safety and health requirements.

Commissioner Nakagawa moved that the Special Permit be approved, subject to the conditions imposed by the Kauai County Planning Commission. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Oura and unanimously carried.

SP78-294 - REV. LINDSAY HOWAN/DORIS TODD MEMORIAL SCHOOL SPECIAL PERMIT TO ALLOW THE EXPANSION OF THE EXISTING SCHOOL AT PAIA, MAUI

Mr. Yasui gave a brief description of the property and the proposed use being requested by the petitioner.

Chairman Duke suggested adding a condition that the Special Permit will be automatically revoked upon termination of the lease agreement.

Commissioner Nakagawa moved to approve the Special Permit, subject to the conditions imposed by the Maui County Planning Commission and the additional condition imposed by the Land Use Commission. Commissioner Miyasato seconded the motion and it was unanimously passed.

SP78-295 - POWERS APIARIES, INC.
SPECIAL PERMIT TO ALLOW THE OPERATION OF A HONEY STORAGE AND PROCESSING FACILITY AT KAHAULOA IKI, SOUTH KONA, HAWAII

The Executive Officer pointed out the location of the subject property on the maps and reviewed the pertinent facts contained in the staff report.

In response to questions posed by the Commissioners, Mr. Allen Luce, representing the petitioner, offered information regarding the effect the proposed Coffee Mill Floodwater diversion may have on the subject property; the present ingress and egress into the property. He also reported on the relatively harmless nature of the bees, the propagation process and the general habits of the bees.

Commissioner Oura moved to approve the Special Permit, subject to the conditions imposed by the Hawaii County Planning Commission, which was seconded by Commissioner Whitesell.

Chairman Duke felt that the County's condition No. 1 stating that "construction of the proposed structures shall commence within one year of the effective date of approval of Special Permit" be modified inasmuch as some of the structures have already been completed.

Commissioner Whitesell suggested that since no one really objected to the proposed use, perhaps this could be handled by requesting that, in the future, the County's conditions more accurately reflect the actual situation.

The Chairman called on the Executive Officer to poll the Commissioners and the motion was unanimously carried.

SP78-296 - CHRISTIAN BROADCASTING ASSOCIATION
SPECIAL PERMIT TO ALLOW THE CONSTRUCTION AND OPERATION OF A
RADIO TRANSMISSION FACILITY AT KALUAKOI, MOLOKAI

Mr. Yasui apprised the Commission of the pertinent data relative to the proposed use.

Mr. H. W. Wong, President of the Christian Broadcasting Association, responded to questions raised by the Commissioners regarding the need for the 30 acres for the proposed facility; the underground wiring; the height of the towers, etc.

Commissioner Carras felt strongly that a condition should be added to ensure that the balance of the area not needed for the construction of the radio transmission facility will remain in agriculture. He was concerned that the area could conceivably turn into an industrial park.

It was pointed out that the County's condition No. 1 stating "that the Special Permit be valid for a radio transmission facility and related improvements only" would automatically preclude any other use.

The Commission discussed the advisability of amending the County's condition No. 1 to clarify the time period. Mr. Kawada, Deputy Attorney General, suggested that it be amended as follows: "That the Special Permit be valid for construction and operation for a radio transmission facility and related improvements only, and be granted for a period of three (3) years commencing upon approval of the Special Permit by the Land Use Commission; and subject to extension upon favorable review by the Planning Commission and State Land Use Commission."

Commissioner Carras moved that the Special Permit be approved, subject to the conditions imposed by the Maui Planning Commission, and as amended by the Land Use Commission. Commissioner Oura seconded the motion and it was inanimously carried.

The Commission recessed at 12:04 p.m. and reconvened at 1:30 p.m.

SUBJECT: SP78-295 - Powers Apiaries, Inc.

The petitioner, Powers Apiaries, Inc., is requesting a Special Permit to allow the operation of a honey storage and processing facility and a queenery on approximately 5.6 acres of land situated within the State Land Use Agricultural District at Kahauloa Iki, South Kona, Hawaii, Tax Map Key 8-2-8: portions of parcels 22 and 55. The subject property is located along the Napoopoo Road adjacent to the Kona Farmer's coffee mill (see attached County Exhibit L-1).

A Special Permit is required for the proposed honey processing facility since honey from off of the subject property will be processed at the site.

In support of the request, the petitioner has in part stated the following:

"POWERS APIARIES...proposes to construct a honey storage and processing facility and operate a queenery on the subject property. The proposed use would require the construction of two buildings, one approximately 80' X 120' for the processing, extraction and storage of honey and a second building approximately 60' X 50' to be used as a workshop and garage. The location of the workshop will be determined at a latter date. In addition to the buildings, a queen breeder yard will be placed on the property where they can be closely supervised.

"The parcel is described as vacant land...located adacent to the Kona Coffee Mill at Napoopoo at approximately the 425' elevation.

"There are five older residences on the adjacent parcel.. and the Kona Coffee Mill buildings are approximately 400' distant to the South. The land is dry, rocky, brush land which has been used in the past for coffee and for cattle graising (sic). The land has been unused

during the last several years.

"The existing undergrowth will be cleared away in preparation for the construction of buildings and for ease of placing hives on the property. Some grading will be necessary to prepare the site for the construction of buildings and for driveways within the property...

"The proposed action will create twelve jobs on the site as well as other jobs offsite as the honey business is expanded in North and South Kona.

"A major reason for choosing the subject site is its suitability for use as a queenery. Queen bees are to be raised on site and exported to the Mainland. It is estimated that income from the sale of queen bees alone will exceed \$300,000 per year in three years.

"The proposed development will be the processing site for approximately 4000 honey producing hives on the Island of Hawaii. These hives, when placed in the proximity of orchards, can be expected to have a very beneficial impact on production due to increased pollenization. Crops which require pollenization and which will benefit from the hives are macadamia, guava, avocado, citrus, coffee, passion fruit, lychee, coconut, cucumbers and melons. There is no known negative impact on vegetation due to the placement of bee hives. A breeding program has been initiated to select only breeders whose progeny are not only productive but must be gentle as well.

"Powers Apiaries has spent approximately the last two years looking for a suitable site to combine processing facilities along with a queenery. Processing facilities are required in a location geographically central to the location of the majority of their hives. Great emphasis was placed on the search for a location which had negligible winds year round so that as few as possible of the queen bees would be lost during mating.

"The subject property was the only property which fit the two aforementioned criteria and which was available at an economically feasible price.

"The applicant cannot expand honey operations any further without the proposed facilities, and cannot justify, on an economical basis, the maintaining of a separate processing storage and queenery operation. The applicant has been in the process of expanding its honey producing and processing business for the past five years on this

island. A large portion of the hives now in use are in the South Kona area and it is most important to have storage and processing facilities nearby.

"More important to the applicant is a location for a queenery where winds are negligible on a year round basis. Queen bees must mate in the air and return to their hives and are often lost in windy conditions. The central Kona area is known for its lack of winds due to the steep terrain and the protection afforded by all three of Hawaii's mountains, and the site is well situated for servicing the many honeyproducing hives now in the Kona area."

The County of Hawaii's General Plan Land Use Pattern Allocation Guide Map designates the area as Orchard. The property is presently zoned Unplanned (U).

The Land Study Bureau's overall master productivity soil rating for agricultural use is Class "E" or Very Poor for the subject property. The subject site is also classified as "Other Important Agricultural Land" under the classification system recently adopted by the State Board of Agriculture. Lands in this classification are important to agriculture in Hawaii yet they exhibit characteristics, such as seasonal wetness, erodability, slope flooding, or drought that exclude them from the prime or unique agricultural land classifications.

Surrounding land uses include scattered single family dwellings, coffee farms, and other agricultural uses. Much of the surrounding land area is unused.

The subject area is situated within the Kealakekua Bay Archaeological and Historic District which is on the Hawaii Register of Historic Places. An archaeological reconnaissance survey of the property has been conducted. The survey report stated, in part, the following:

"Virtually the entire area of this 5.6-acre parcel is rough, old a'a lava, almost completely lacking in soil or areas suitable for cultivation. It is now thickly overgrown with koa haole. The Kahauloa flood channel crosses the southwestern corner of the lot, but the soil brought down by it has been deposited mostly on the adjoining parcels to the south and west. A berm four to five feet high has been raised along the south side of the channel to keep water from nearby houses and the coffee mill...

"Irregular stone walls, three to four feet high, coincide roughly with the north and south boundaries, and follow closely the eastern boundary. There are no

internal division walls. Several Land Commission Awards adjoin the parcel, indicating a history of cultivation in the area.

"No other archaeological features were observed... and features recorded herein do not, in my opinion, warrant further study."

Since the subject property lies within the County of Hawaii's Special Management Area (SMA), the petitioner requested, and was granted a SMA Use Permit for the proposed facilities on November 16, 1977. For the Commission's information, the SMA Use Permit has been attached.

Pertinent comments from governmental agencies:

1. Department of Public Works

The County Department of Public Works noted that:

"The proposed Coffee Mill Floodwater diversion may affect this parcel."

2. Department of Agriculture

"The Department of Agriculture has no comments to offer except to note that the growth potential for the beekeeping industry, particularly rearing of queens for export, is promising and should be encouraged. There is an increasing demand for Hawaiian queens for early start of new colonies on the mainland. Hawaii has a distinct advantage in year-round queen bee production, and in addition, it appears that Hawaiian bees are resistant to foulbrood diseases."

3. Department of Health

The State Department of Health noted the following:

"Reference public health regulation for the food establishment requirements is Chapter 1-A, Food Service and Food Establishment Sanitation Code. If mechanical ventillation is to be utilized, please refer to Chapter 28, Air Conditioning and Ventillation."

4. Department of Water Supply

The Department of Water Supply noted that:

"...there is only a limited amount of water presently available until such time that our Kahaluu Shaft

Projects are completed".

Other cooperating agencies, including the Hawaii Electric Light Company, Inc., Police Department, and Department of Research and Development had no objections to the subject permit request.

At the public hearing held by the Hawaii County Planning Commission on January 31, 1978, a representative of the petitioner spoke in support of the request. No other persons testified in support or in opposition to the Special Permit. For the Commission's information, the January 31, 1978, hearing transcript has been attached (County Exhibit P).

On February 23, 1978, the Planning Commission voted to recommend approval of the Special Permit to the Land Use Commission based upon the following findings:

"1. That approval of the subject request would be consistent with the State Land Use Law and Regulations. The intent of these statutory provisions is to preserve, protect and encourage the development of lands in the State for those uses to which they are best suited in the interest of the public health and welfare of the people of Hawaii. The purpose of the subject request is to allow the establishment of facilities for the processing of honey. Also requested is the related establishment of a queenery, which is for the breeding of queen The keeping of bees and the collecting of honey is a growing agricultural activity on the island of Hawaii. The proposed activities and facilities are integral components of these endeavors. Without processing and storage facilities, an essential link in the distribution of products would be lacking. In addition, the breeding of queens is one aspect of bee-raising which is supportive of the overall activity. The proposed uses would thus be directly consistent with the purpose of the State Land Use Agricultural District. The proposed use would also support other agricultural activities in that the growth of beekeeping would be beneficial to crops requiring pollenization.

It should also be pointed out that the area under consideration has soils with low productivity ratings for traditional agriculture. The area, however, is optimal for the proposed use in terms of wind conditions. By establishing the use on

the subject property, lands with higher productivity ratings can be reserved for agricultural activities requiring certain soil-related conditions.

- "2. That the proposed uses will further the State and the County's policies of encouraging and supporting agricultural activities, inasmuch as support facilities for a growing agricultural use will be provided. Approval of the subject request will also directly implement the County General Plan. General Plan Economic Element explicitly states that the County shall assist the expansion of the agricultural industry, especially diversified agriculture. The Economic Element also calls for the diversification of the County's economy. The establishment of the proposed facilities and use for a growing diversified agricultural endeavor is in keeping with these General Plan policies.
- "3. That although there will be some alteration in the existing character of the land, such alteration will not have substantially adverse effects on surrounding properties or the general character of the area. The proposed use will not entail the construction of large-scale facilities. A large portion of the subject property will remain open in character. In addition, the general area is either vacant or in agricultural use, with scattered single-family dwellings. The proposed use is not expected to generate excessive traffic, noise, or other effects of a noxious nature.
- "4. That the proposed use will not unreasonably burden public agencies to provide additional services and facilities. All essential services and facilities are or can be made available to the subject site. Although a limited quantity of water is currently available for the Kona region, this will be eventually rectified with the completion of the Kahalu'u Shaft project."

For the Commission's information, the minutes of February 23, 1978 have been attached (County Exhibit W).

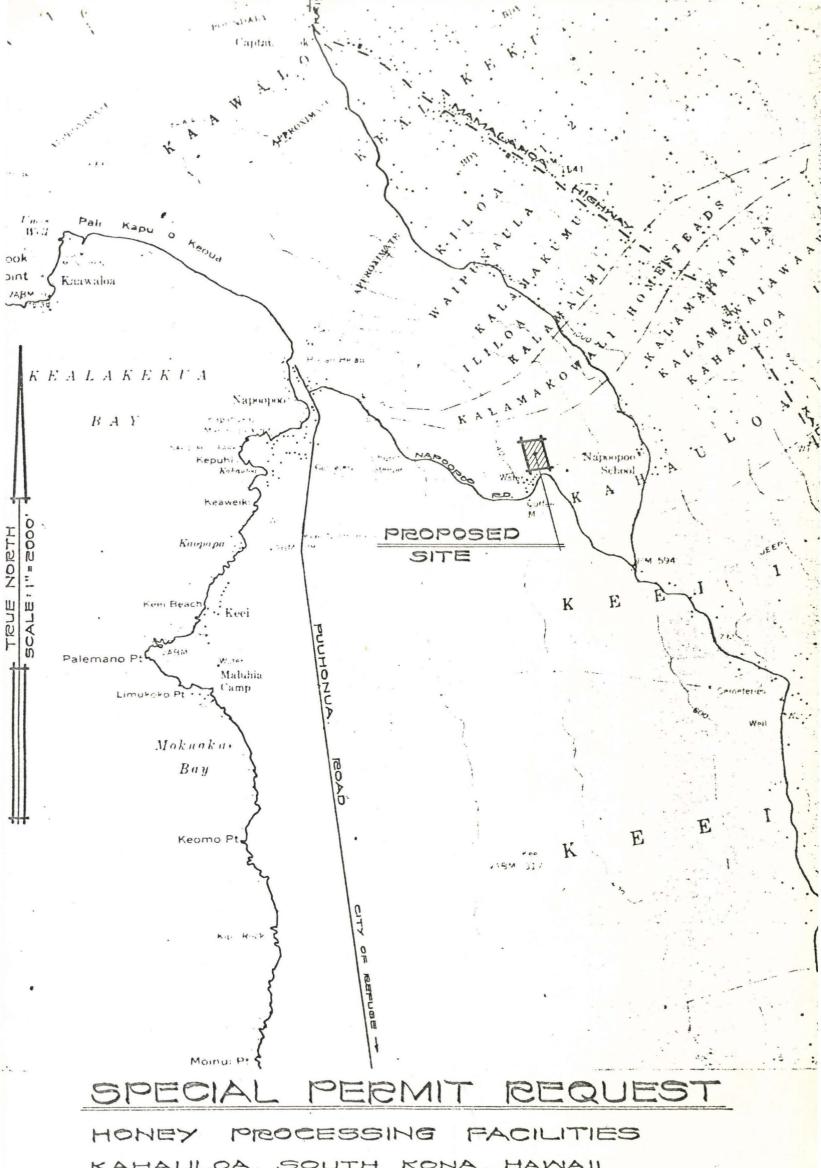

The Commission has found:

That the approval of the proposed agricultural development will not be in conflict with the purpose and intent of Act 176, S.L.H. 1975, and Rule 9 of the County Planning Commission. The construction of the proposed structures including site preparation should not have any significantly adverse effects on the Special Management Area. The proposal will not reduce nor impose restrictions upon public access to beaches, recreational areas, or natural reserves, nor will it reduce the size of any such area as the subject parcel is not adjacent to these resources.

Although grubbing activities will remove the existing natural vegetation, it will not result in the loss of any unique native or endemic species or in the destruction of valuable habitats. Likewise, grading may significantly alter the existing topography and may adversely impact on erosion and drainage patterns with respect to abutting properties. However, strict adherence to approved grading plans should avert these consequences.

Any potentially damaging effects on air and water quality from the processing operation may be mitigated by applicable Department of Health regulations which must be complied with.

Further, that although there may be some concern for archaeological resources, this may be minimized by conditions of approval.

- 1. That construction of the proposed structures shall commence within one (1) year of the effective date of a Special Permit if such a permit is issued and shall be completed within two (2) years thereafter.
- 2. That the petitioner shall consult with the Chief Engineer, County Department of Public Works regarding effects of the "Coffee Mill Flood Control Project" upon the proposal; then shall submit appropriate drainage plans for the review and approval of the Chief Engineer and Planning Director.
- 3. That the petitioner shall provide the Department of Water Supply with projected water needs, and further shall abide by water allocation limits, if any, as prescribed by that Department.
- 4. That the petitioner shall comply fully with the requirements of the County (Grading) Ordinance No. 168.
- 5. That an archaeological reconnaissance survey of the property shall be conducted and a copy of the report be submitted to the Planning Director prior to grading.

Should these conditions not be met, the Special Management Area Use Permit shall be deemed null and void.

The effective date of this permit shall be November 16, 1977.

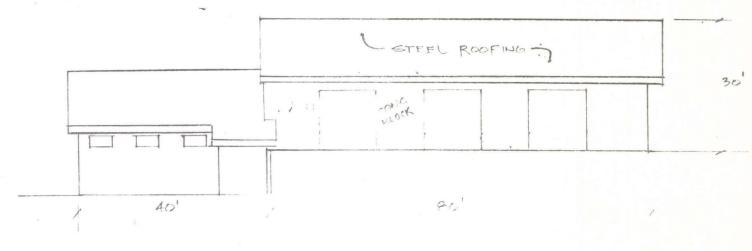

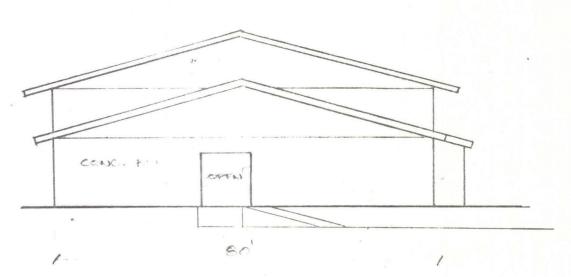

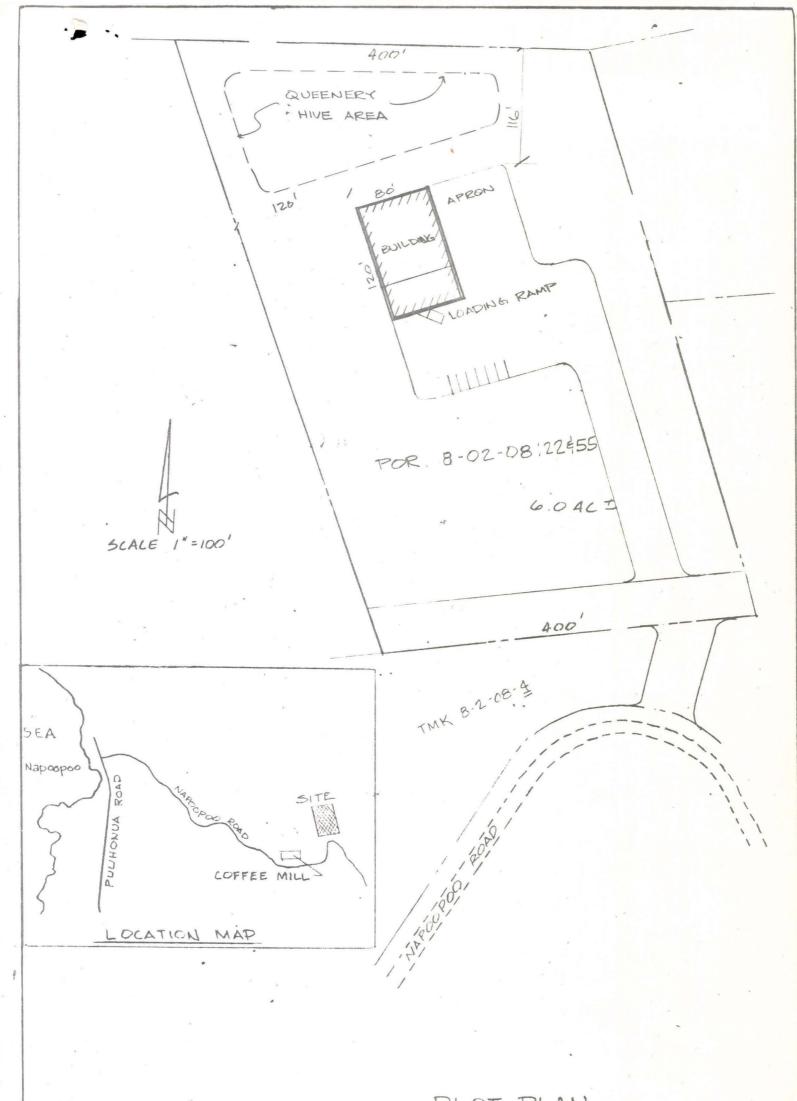




SOUTH ELEVATION

POWERS APIARIES, Purchaser of the subject property, proposes to construct a honey storage and processing facility and operate a queenery on the subject property. The proposed use would require the construction of two buildings, one approximately 80° X 120° for the processing, extraction and storage of honey and a second building approximately 60° X 50° to be used as a workshop and garage. The location of the workshop will be determined at a latter date. In addition to the buildings a queen breeder yard will be placed on the property where they can be closely supervised.

The parcel is described as vacant land, being a portion of tax map keys 8-02-08-parcels 22 and 55-lot 2, located adjacent to the Kona Coffee Mill at Napoopoo at approximately the 425° elevation.

There are five older residences on the adjacent parcel number 4 and the Kona Coffee Mill buildings are approximately 400° distant to the South. The land is dry, rocky, brush land which has been used in the past for coffee and for cattle graising. the land has been unused during the last several years.

The existing undergrowth will be cleared away in preparation for the construction of buildings and for ease of placing hives on the property. Some grading will be necessary to prepare the site for the buildings and for driveways within the property. The buildings themselves will be visible from

the Government road; however, will not be visible from the Captain Cook Monument or the Napoopoo beach area.

The proposed action will create twelve jobs on the site as well as other jobs offsite as the honey business is expanded in North and South Kona.

A major reason for choosing the subject site as its suitability for use as a queenery. Queen bees are to be raised on site and exported to the Mainland. It is estimated that income from the sale of queen bees alone will exceed \$300,000 per year in three years.

The proposed development will be the processing site for approximately 4000 honey producing hives on the Island of Hawaii. These hives, when placed in the proximity of orchards, can be expected to have a very beneficial impact on production due to increased pollenization. Crops which require pollenization and which will benefit from the hives are macadamia, guava, avocado, citrus, coffee, passion fruit, lychee, coconut, cucumbers and melons. There is no known negative impact on vegetation due to the placement of bee hives. A breeding program has been iniated to select only breeders whose progeny are not only productive but must be gentle as well.

Powers Apiaries has spent approximately the last two years looking for a suitable site to combine processing facilities along with a queenery. Processing facilities are

required in a location geographically central to the location of the majority of their hives. Great emphasis was placed on the search for a location which had negligible winds year round so that as few as possible of the queen bees would be lost during mating.

• = . •

The subject property was the only porperty which fit the two aforementioned criteria and which was available at an economically feasible price.

The applicant cannot expand honey operations any further without the proposed facilities, and cannot justify, on an economical basis, the maintaining of a separate processing storage and queenery operation. The applicant has been in the process of expanding its honey producing and processing business for the past five years on this island. A large proportion of the hives now in use are in the South Kona area and it is most important to have storage and processing facilities nearby.

More important to the applicant is a location for a queenery where winds are negligible on a year round basis. Queen bees must mate in the air and return to their hives and are often lost in windy conditions. The central Kona area is known for its lack of winds due to the steep terrain and the protection afforded by all three of Hawaii's mountains, and the site is well situated for servicing the many honey producing hives now in the Kona area.

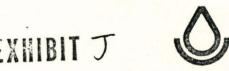

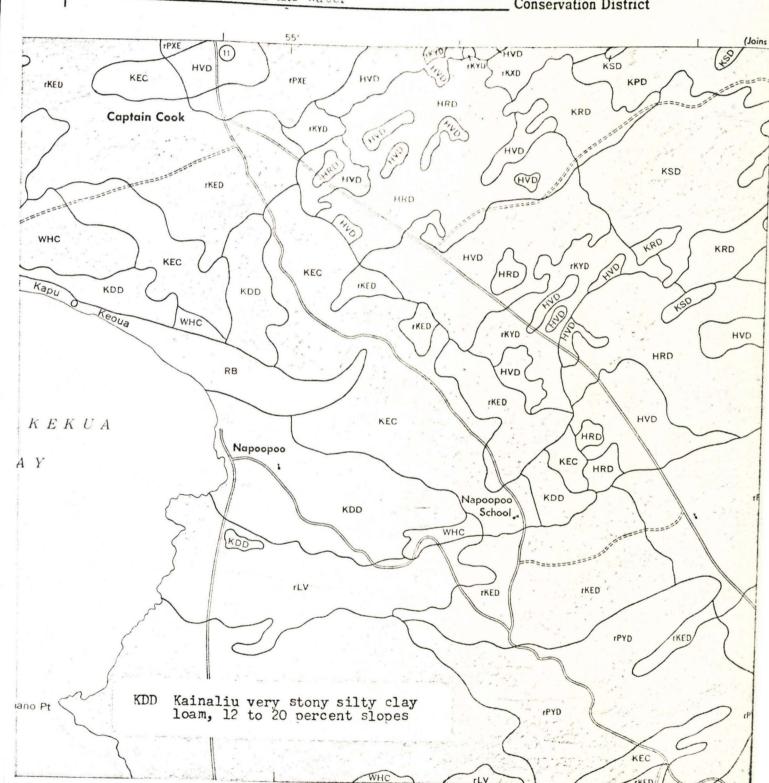

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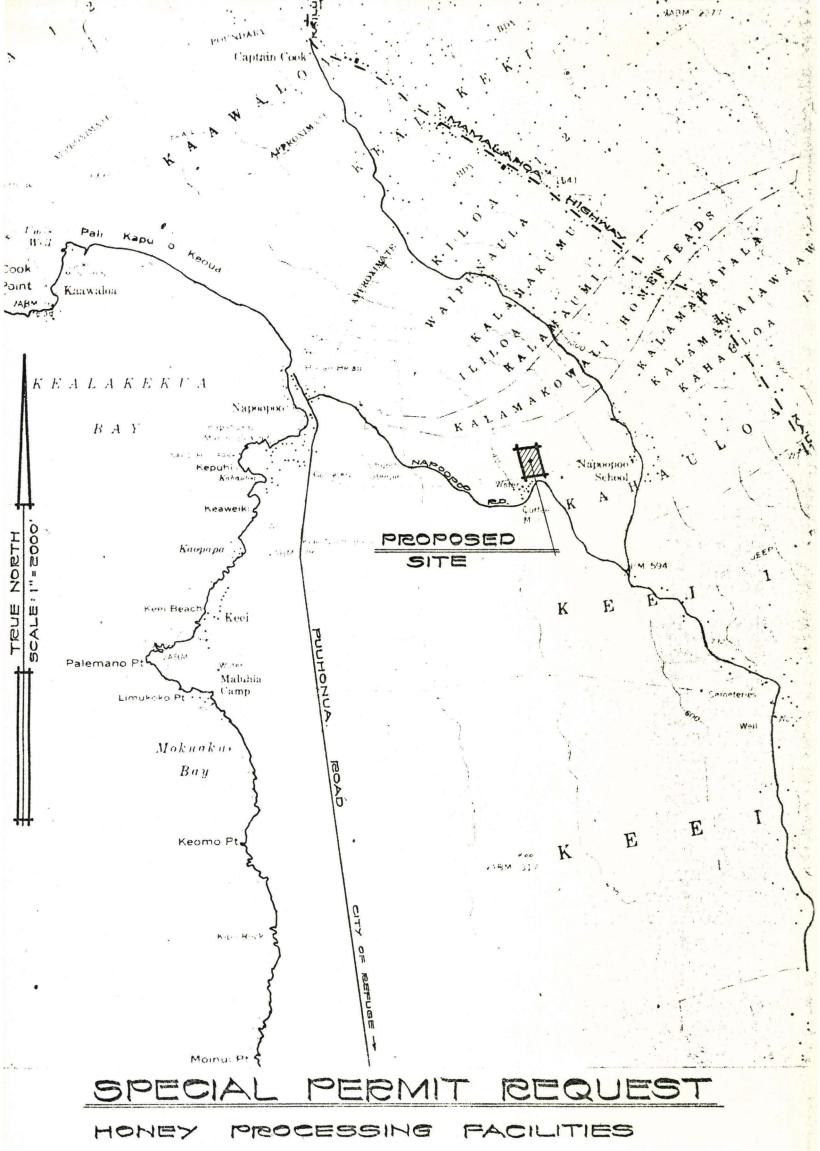

D. MURAKAMI: As far as the lands for the project that we have in that vicinity, the Soil Conservation Service is designing it and they don't have the completed plans yet. So we're not sure exactly where it's going to go, but it's going to be in the vicinity of that bend over there. So it may or may not affect Powers Apiaries, Incorporated.

H. MURAKAMI: Thank you.

CHAIRMAN: Thank you, David. If there are no further questions of the Commission or the staff, I'd like to ask the applicant or a representative of the applicant to come forward please. Dennis, we'll have to swear you in again. Do you swear to tell the truth and nothing but the truth on this application now before the Hawaii County Planning Commission?

HASEROT: I do.

CHAIRMAN: Would you state your name into the microphone please.

HASEROT: I'm Dennis Haserot. I'm here, Mr.Chairman, Mr. Powers, the applicant, is on the mainland and will not be back until this evening. In fact, he did not get receipt of the hearing notice in time to change his plans. I'm hoping that the Commissioners ask most of the questions that they might have during the SMA application. If not, I'll answer those that I can.

CHAIRMAN: Thank you. Commissioners, do you have any questions of Mr. Haserot? I think we did have a pretty good briefing on this application, Dennis. Thank you. If you'll be seated, there may be some things that come up, we might want to ask you to come back again.

Ladies and gentlemen, this is a public hearing. We'd like to invite any member of the public who's here this afternoon who wish to testify on behalf of this application to please indicate so by raising you hand? If there is no public testimony to come before the Commission, the Chair will entertain a motion to close the public hearing,

JITCHAKU: So move, Mr. Chairman.

CHAIRMAN: Is there a second to the motion?

FUJIMOTO: Second the motion.

CHAIRMAN: It has been moved by Commissioner Jitchaku, seconded by Commissioner Fujimoto that the public hearing concerning the

application of Powers Apiaries, Inc. for a special permit be closed. All those in favor signify by saying aye?

COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

CHAIRMAN: Oppose, same sign? Dennis, the public hearing has been closed. Special permit applications, as you know, require a 15-day waiting period before the Commission can act on them and you will be advised accordingly.

Public hearing adjourned at 5:35 p.m.

SPECIAL PERMIT: POWERS APIARIES, INC.

An application has been submitted by Powers Apiaries, Inc. for a Special Permit to allow the establishment of a honey processing and storage facility and a queenery on approximately six acres of land situated within the State Land Use Agricultural District. The area under consideration is located north of the Napo'opo'o Road, adjacent and to the northeast of the Kona Farmer's Cooperative Complex, Kahauloa Iki, South Kona (TMK: 8-2-08:55 and portion of 22).

The Commission will recall that a Special Management Area (SMA)

Use Permit for the proposed facilities on the subject property was granted to the petitioner on November 16, 1977. Inasmuch as honey from off the property will be processed, a Special Permit is being requested. Subsequent to granting the SMA-Use Permit, approval was given to the petitioner to construct processing facilities for honey produced on the premises.

In support of the subject request, the petitioner has, in part, stated the following:

"POWERS APIARIES. . . proposes to construct a honey storage and processing facility and operate a queenery on the subject property. The proposed use would require the construction of two buildings, one approximately 80' X 120' for the processing, extraction and storage of honey and a second building approximately 60' X 50' to be used as a

workshop and garage. The location of the workshop will be determined at a latter date. In addition to the buildings, a queen breeder yard will be placed on the property where they can be closely supervised.

"The parcel is described as vacant land...located ajacent to the Kona Coffee Mill at Napoopoo at approximately the 425' elevation.

"There are five older residences on the adjacent parcel...
and the Kona Coffee Mill buildings are approximately 400' distant
to the South. The land is dry, rocky, brush land which has
been used in the past for coffee and for cattle graising (sic).
The land has been unused during the last several years.

"The existing undergrowth will be cleared away in preparation for the construction of buildings and for ease of placing hives on the property. Some grading will be necessary to prepare the site for the construction of buildings and for driveways within the property....

"The proposed action will create twelve jobs on the site as well as other jobs offsite as the honey business is expanded in North and South Kona.

"A major reason for choosing the subject site (is) its suitability for use as a queenery. Queen bees are to be raised on site and exported to the Mainland. It is estimated that income from the sale of queen bees alone will exceed \$300,000 per year in three years.

"The proposed development will be the processing site for approximately 4000 honey producing hives on the Island of Hawaii. These hives, when placed in the proximity of orchards, can be expected to have a very beneficial impact on production due to increased pollenization. Crops which require pollenization and which will benefit from the hives are macadamia, guava, avocado, citrus, coffee, passion fruit, lychee, coconut, cucumbers and melons. There is no known negative impact on vegetation due to the placement of bee hives. A breeding program has been ini/ti/ated to select only breeders whose progreny are not only productive but must be gentle as well.

"Powers Apiaries has spent approximately the last two years looking for a suitable site to combine processing facilities along with a queenery. Processing facilities are required in a location geographically central to the location of the majority of their hives. Great emphasis was placed on the search for a location which had negligible winds year round so that as few as possible of the queen bees would be lost during mating.

"The subject property was the only property which fit the two aforementioned criteria and which was available at an economically feasible price.

"The applicant cannot expand honey operations any further without the proposed facilities, and cannot justify, on an

economical basis, the maintaining of a separate processing storage and queenery operation. The applicant has been in the process of expanding its honey producing and processing business for the past five years on this island. A large portion of the hives now in use are in the South Kona area and it is most important to have storage and processing facilities nearby.

"More important to the applicant is a location for a queenery where winds are negligible on a year round basis. Queen bees must mate in the air and return to their hives and are often lost in windy conditions. The central Kona area is known for its lack of winds due to the steep terrain and the protection afforded by all three of Hawaii's mountains, and the site is well situated for servicing the many honeyproducing hives now in the Kona area."

The subject property is zoned "Unplanned" while the General Plan Land Use Pattern Allocation Guide Map designation is orchards.

As stated previously, surrounding land uses are the coffee mill complex and scattered residences. Much of the area is unused.

The subject area is situated within the Kealakekua Bay
Archaeological and Historic District which is on the Hawaii
Register of Historic Places. An archaeological reconnaissance
survey of the property has been conducted. The survey report
stated, in part, the following:

"Virtually the entire area of this 5.6-acre parcel is rough, old a'a lava, almost completely lacking in soil or areas suitable for cultivation. It is now thickly overgrown with koa haole. The Kahauloa flood channel crosses the southwestern corner of the lot, but the soil brought down by it has been deposited mostly on the adjoining parcels to the south and west. A berm four to five feet high has been raised along the south side of the channel to keep water from nearby houses and the coffee mill....

"Irregular stone walls, three to four feet high, coincide roughly with the north and south boundaries, and follow closely the eastern boundary. There are no internal division walls. Several Land Commission Awards adjoin the parcel, indicating a history of cultivation in the area.

"No other archaeological features were observed...and features recorded herein do not, in my opinion, warrant further study."

Access to the parcel is via a 20-foot wide private road off of the Napo'opo'o government road. All essential utilities and services are available.

As noted in the archaeological report, the property lies within a floodway and may be affected by the County Department of Public Works' "Coffee Mill Flood Water Diversion Project" which is currently being planned.

In reviewing the subject request, the U.S.D.A. Soil Conservation Service reported that the area under consideration has Kainaliu very stony silty clay loam soils. This series formed in volcanic ash and are moderately deep and well drained. According to the Soil Conservation Service report,

"In a typical profile, the surface layer is very dark brown silty clay loam about 10 inches thick and contains by volume about 10 to 15 percent gravel to stone size Aa fragments. The subsoil, which generally extends to a depth of 20 to 40 inches, is dark brown silty clay loam and contains by volume about 20 to 60 percent gravel to stone size Aa lava fragments. The substratum is fragmental Aa lava. The Kainaliu soils are medium in fertility. They have high moisture-holding capacity. Annual rainfall ranges from 40 to 60 inches, most of which falls during the summer months. Permeability is rapid...in the surface and subsoil and very rapid...in the substratum.... Erosion hazard is moderate."

The Soil Conservation Service also noted that "Lands adjacent to this parcel are listed as a flood hazard area in the South Kona Flood Hazard Analyses. This flooding problem should be resolved with the construction of the Sunset Coffee Mill Floodwater Diversion."

The Land Study Bureau master productivity rating for the area under consideration is 'E' or very poor.

The area is also classified as "Other Important Agricultural Land" under the classification system recently adopted by the Board of

Agriculture. Lands in this classification are important to agriculture in Hawaii yet they exhibit properties, such as seasonal wetness, erodability, limited rooting zone, slope flooding, or droughtiness, that exclude them from the prime or unique agricultural land classifications.

Upon reviewing the subject request, the Department of Agriculture submitted the following:

"The Department of Agriculture has no comments to offer except to note that the growth potential for the beekeeping industry, particularly rearing of queens for export, is promising and should be encouraged. There is an increasing demand for Hawaiian queens for early start of new colonies on the mainland. Hawaii has a distinct advantage in year-round queen bee production, and in addition, it appears that Hawaiian bees are resistant to foulbrood diseases."

The Department of Water Supply noted that "...there is only a limited amount of water presently available until such time that our Kahaluu Shaft Projects are completed."

The Department of Health noted that the petitioner must comply with the Food Service and Food Establishment Sanitation Code and possibly with Chapter 28 of the public health regulations concerning air conditioning and ventilation.

None of the other cooperating agencies had any corments on or objections to the subject request.

RECOMMENDATION: POWERS APIARIES, INC.

Upon review of the subject request for a Special Permit to allow the operation of a honey storage and processing facility and a queenery within the State Land Use Agricultural District, the staff recommends that it be given a favorable recommendation, based on the following considerations:

1. That approval of the subject request would be consistent with the State Land Use Law and Regulations. The intent of these statutory provisions is to preserve, protect and encourage the development of lands in the State for those uses to which they are best suited in the interest of the public health and welfare of the people of Hawaii. The purpose of the subject request is to allow the establishment of facilities for the processing of honey. Also requested is the related establishment of a queenery, which is for the breeding of queen bees. The keeping of bees and the collecting of honey is a growing agricultural activity on the island of Hawaii. The proposed activities and facilities are integral components of these endeavors. Without processing and storage facilities, an essential link in the distribution of products would be lacking. In addition, the breeding of queens is one aspect of bee-raising which is supportive of the overall activity. The proposed uses would thus

be directly consistent with the purpose of the State

Land Use Agricultural District. The proposed use would

also support other agricultural activities in that the

growth of beekeeping would be beneficial to crops

requiring pollenization.

It should also be pointed out that the area under consideration has soils with low productivity ratings for traditional agriculture. The area, however, is optimal for the proposed use in terms of wind conditions. By establishing the use on the subject property, lands with higher productivity ratings can be reserved for agricultural activities requiring certain soil-related conditions.

2. That the proposed uses will further the State and the County's policies of encouraging and supporting agricultural activities, inasmuch as support facilities for a growing agricultural use will be provided. Approval of the subject request will also directly implement the County General Plan. The General Plan Economic Element explicitly states that the County shall assist the expansion of the agricultural industry, especially diversified agriculture. The Economic Element also calls for the diversification of the County's economy. The establishment of the proposed facilities and use for a growing diversified agricultural endeavor is in keeping with these General Plan policies.

- 3. That although there will be some alteration in the existing character of the land, such alteration will not have substantially adverse effects on surrounding properties or the general character of the area. The proposed use will not entail the construction of large-scale facilities. A large portion of the subject property will remain open in character. In addition, the general area is either vacant or in agricultural use, with scattered single-family dwellings. The proposed use is not expected to generate excessive traffic, noise, or other effects of a noxious nature.
- 4. That the proposed use will not unreasonably burden public agencies to provide additional services and facilities.

 All essential services and facilities are or can be made available to the subject site. Although a limited quantity of water is currently available for the Kona region, this will be eventually rectified with the completion of the Kahalu'u Shaft project.

It is further recommended that the request be approved subject to the following conditions:

1. That construction of the proposed structure shall commence within one (1) year of the effective date of approval of the Special Permit and shall be completed within two (2) years thereafter. The petitioner or its authorized representative shall receive final plan approval prior to establishment of the proposed use.

- 2. That the conditions of approval of Special Management Area (SMA) Use Permit No. 44 shall be complied with.
- That all other applicable rules and regulations, including the requirements of the Departments of Water Supply, and Health.

 Public Works, shall be complied with.

Should any of the foregoing conditions not be met, the Special Permit may be deemed null and void.

The County Planning Commission at a duly held public hearing on November 16, 1977, considered the application of POWERS APIARIES, INC. for a Special Management Area Use Permit in accordance with Rule No. 9, Rules and Regulations Relating to Environmental Shoreline Protection, to allow the operation of a queenery, the construction of a honey storage and processing facility, and related improvements in Kahauloa Iki, South Kona, Hawaii, Tax Map Key 8-2-08:55 and portion of 22.

The Commission has found:

That the approval of the proposed agricultural development will not be in conflict with the purpose and intent of Act 176, S.L.H. 1975, and Rule 9 of the County Planning Commission. The construction of the proposed structures including site preparation should not have any significantly adverse effects on the Special Management Area. The proposal will not reduce nor impose restrictions upon public access to beaches, recreational areas, or natural reserves, nor will it reduce the size of any such area as the subject parcel is not adjacent to these resources.

Although grubbing activities will remove the existing natural vegetation, it will not result in the loss of any unique native or endemic species or in the destruction of valuable habitats. Likewise, grading may significantly alter the existing topography and may adversely impact on erosion and drainage patterns with respect to abutting properties. However, strict adherence to approved grading plans should avert these consequences.

Any potentially damaging effects on air and water quality from the processing operation may be mitigated by applicable Department of Health regulations which must be complied with.

Further, that although there may be some concern for archaeological resources, this may be minimized by conditions of approval.

Based on the above, it is determined that the proposal is not in conflict with the purpose, policies and guidelines of the Environmental Shoreline Protection Act or Rule 9 nor is it contrary to the County General Plan or the State and County long-term environmental goals and policies.

Therefore, the Commission hereby grants to the petitioner a Special Management Area Use Permit to allow the operation of a queenery, the construction of a honey storage and processing facility, and related improvements in Kahauloa Iki, South Kona, Hawaii, pursuant to the authority vested in it by Rule No. 9, Rules and Regulations Relating to Environmental Shoreline Protection, subject to the following conditions:

- 1. That construction of the proposed structures shall commence within one (1) year of the effective date of a Special Permit if such a permit is issued and shall be completed within two (2) years thereafter.
- 2. That the petitioner shall consult with the Chief Engineer, County Department of Public Works regarding effects of the "Coffee Mill Flood Control Project" upon the proposal; then shall submit appropriate drainage plans for the review and approval of the Chief Engineer and Planning Director.
- 3. That the petitioner shall provide the Department of Water Supply with projected water needs, and further shall abide by water allocation limits, if any, as prescribed by that Department.
- 4. That the petitioner shall comply fully with the requirements of the County (Grading) Ordinance No. 168.
- 5. That an archaeological reconnaissance survey of the property shall be conducted and a copy of the report be submitted to the Planning Director prior to grading.

Should these conditions not be met, the Special Management Area Use Permit shall be deemed null and void.

The effective date of this permit shall be November 16, 1977.
