# FINDINGS OF FACT, CONCLUSIONS OF LAW, DECISION AND ORDER

The Land Use Commission of the State of Hawaii, having duly considered the entire record in the above-entitled matter matter on February 2, 1982 at Kahului, Maui, makes the following findings of fact and conclusions of law.

#### FINDINGS OF FACT

- 1. The Petition for Special Permit was filed by the County of Hawaii Department of Parks and Recreation to allow the development and use of a motorcycle training and competition facility on 90 acres of land situated within the State Land Use Agricultural Distrct at Waiakea, South Hilo, Island of Hawaii, Tax Map Key 2-1-13: portion of 02.
- 2. The subject property abuts the South Hilo-Puna
  District boundary approximately two miles east of Kanoelehua
  Avenue, and adjoins the eastern boundary of the existing Panaewa
  Drag Strip complex.
- 3. The proposed improvements include the clearing, grubbing and contour grading of the site, extension of a water-line from the drag racing complex, grading an area for parking and construction of a pit area, motorcycle track and course, spectator and concession facilities and comfort station.
- 4. The subject property is zoned Agricultural-20 acres, and designated "Orchards" on the Land Use Pattern
  Allocation Guide (LUPAG) Map of the County of Hawaii General Plan.

- 5. The Land Study Bureau's overall master productivity soil rating for agricultural use is "E" or very poor for soils of the subject site. Rainfall in the vicinity averages about 144 inches per year.
- 6. Land uses surrounding the subject site include the drag strip, macadamia nut orchards and vacant lands. The nearest residential subdivision is situated approximately 6,000 feet west of the subject property.
- 7. Access to the subject area would be through the same temporary road that provides entry to the drag strip.
- 8. On October 13, 1978, the State Board of Land and Natural Resources voted to recommend that an executive order be issued setting aside the subject area for a motorcycle training and competition facility to the Governor. This recommendation was made subject to a condition that the County Department of Parks and Recreation obtain a special permit or district boundary amendment prior to the issuance of the executive order.
- 9. The application for subject special permit was filed with the County Planning Commission on November 4, 1981.

  On December 17, 1981, the Hawaii County Planning Commission held a public hearing on the special permit request. Based on the reasons presented by the Petitioner and the findings and recommendations of the County Planning Department, the Planning Commission voted unanimously to forward a recommendation for approval to the State Land Use Commission subject to conditions recommended by the planning department staff.
- 10. The findings of the County Planning Commission and the entire record of the proceedings was received by the Land Use Commission on December 13, 1981.

#### CONCLUSION OF LAW

1. "Unusual and reasonable" uses other than those which are permitted in an Agricultural District may be permitted

by special permit pursuant to Chapter 205-6, Hawaii Revised Statutes, State Land Use Commission's District Regulations, Part V.

- 2. The determination of "unusual and reasonable" uses is accomplished by applying the following five guidelines set forth in Section 5-2 of the State Land Use Commission's District Regulations.
  - (1) Such use shall not be contrary to the objectives sought to be accomplished by the Land Use Law and Regulations.
  - (2) That the desired use would not adversely affect surrounding property.
  - (3) Such use would not unreasonably burden public agencies to provide roads and streets, sewers, water, drainage and school improvements, and police and fire protection.
  - (4) Unusual conditions, trends and needs have arisen since the district boundaries and regulations were established.
  - (5) That the land upon which the proposed use is sought is unsuited for the uses permitted within the District.

The evidence and findings in the record forwarded by the Hawaii County Planning Commission do not clearly and adequately show that each of the five tests for granting a special permit have been met.

3. The record does not indicate the Hawaii County
Planning Commission considered sufficient evidence to
establish findings that the use is not contrary to the
objectives of the land use law; that unusual conditions,
trends and needs have arisen since the district boundaries and
regulations were established and that the proposed use would not
unreasonably burden public agencies to provide public services and
facilities.

#### DECISION AND ORDER

IT IS HEREBY ORDERED that Special Permit Petition No. 82-352 for development of a motorcycle training and competition facility on ninety (90) acres of land situated within the State Land Use Agricultural District at Waiakea, South Hilo, Island of Hawaii, Tax Map Key 2-1-13: portion of 02, be and is hereby denied for the reasons stated in the foregoing conclusions of law.

Subsequent to the preparation and transmittal of the staff report on SP82-352 County of Hawaii Department of Parks and Recreation to you, we have received a copy of the Supreme Court ruling on an appeal from the First Circuit Court regarding the granting of a special permit to Oahu Corporation for the construction of a major amusement park on 103 acres of land situated in the Agricultural District at Kahe Point, Oahu.

After reviewing this decision, staff believes that the Supreme Court ruling is applicable to the subject special permit. Staff therefore recommends that the following questions and any other questions the Commission may have regarding the relationship of the Supreme Court's decision and the subject permit be discussed and answered before action on this item is rendered:

- 1. Based on Supreme Court Decision No. 7112, can the proposed motorcycle training and competition facility be established through the special permit procedure?
- 2. Does the record contain sufficient information and findings to determine whether the proposed use under the subject special permit is "unusual and reasonable?"

Whether a particular use is "unusual and reasonable" is determined by applying the five guidelines set forth in the Land Use District Regulation Section 5-2 to the proposed project. Section 5-2 requires the following:

- (1) Such use shall not be contrary to the objectives sought to be accomplished by the Land Use Law and Regulations.
- (2) That the desired use would not adversely affect surrounding property.
- (3) Such use would not unreasonably burden public agencies to provide roads and streets, sewers, water,

- drainage and school improvements, and police and fire protection.
- (4) Unusual conditions, trends and needs have arisen since the district boundaries and regulations were established.
- (5) That the land upon which the proposed use is sought is unsuited for the uses permitted within the District.

The Department of Parks and Recreation of the County of Hawaii is requesting approval of this Special Permit to allow the development and use of a motorcycle training and competition facility on 90 acres of land situated within the State Land Use Agricultural District at Waiakea in South Hilo. The subject property is a portion of Tax Map Key 2-1-13: 2 which totals more than 3,2000 acres and is owned by the State of Hawaii. It abuts the South Hilo-Puna District boundary approximately 2 miles east of Kanoelehua Avenue, and adjoins the eastern boundary of the Panaewa Drag Strip Complex which was approved by the Land Use Commission on September 22, 1975 under Special Permit No. 75-212.

Access to the proposed facility would be by way of the same temporary road that provides entry to the drag strip. Adjacent land uses include the drag strip, macadamia nut orchards, and vacant lands. The nearest house is located approximately 6,000 feet toward the west, within the Hawaiian Homes agricultural subdivision. (See attached Location Map "A.")

On October 13, 1978, the State Board of Land and Natural Resources voted to recommend to the Governor that an executive order be issued setting aside the subject area for a motorcycle training and competition facility under the management and control of the County of Hawaii, Department of Parks and Recreation, subject to the following terms and conditions:

- 1. That the County obtain a Special Permit or District Boundary Amendment prior to the issuance of the executive order;
- That the County shall be responsible for the subdivision of the parcel; and
- 3. That prior to the subdivision of said parcel the County shall submit, for review and acceptance of the Board Chairman, a metes and bounds description and a survey map of the designated area.

At the same meeting, the Board granted a right-of-entry for planning and surveying purposes.

The application for subject Special Permit was received by the County Planning Commission on November 4, 1981.

The proposal to develop a motorcycle training and competition facility on the subject state-owned lands is made by Petitioner, at the request of the Big Island Motorcycle Association (BIMA). The BIMA has been utilizing a privately-owned ranch in Waimea for their activities, but development of surrounding areas

to residential use has prompted the association to seek an alternative site. According to the Association, they have been trying to relocate for about ten years, and 80 percent of its membership reside in Hilo and surrounding areas.

The Petition proposes the following improvements on the subject property:

- 1. clearing, grubbing, and contour grading of the site;
- extension of a waterline from the drag racing complex;
- 3. grading an area for parking and constructing a pit area and motorcycle track and course; and
- 4. constructing accessory structures, e.g., spectator and concession facilities, comfort stations, etc.

For the Commission's information, the preliminary site layout plan is shown as Attachment "B."

In support of the request the petitioner stated, in part, the following:

"The proposed facility is intended to satisfy recreational motorcycling needs, as expressed by the Big Island Motorcycle Association.

"The proposed site adjoins the County's drag racing complex for which a special permit was previously approved. Centralizing these similar type activities would result in maximizing use of existing public services and utilities."

On the Land Use Pattern Allocation Guide (LUPAG) Map of the County General Plan the subject property is designated as "Orchards," and is currently zoned Agricultural-20 acre minimum lot size (A-20a).

According to the Soil Survey Report (December 1973) published by the U.S. Soil Conservation Service, the soil on the site is of the Papai series which is described as a surface layer of dark brown extremely stony muck about 8 inches thick underlain by fragmented A'a lava. Permeability is rapid, runoff is slow, and the erosion hazard is slight. The Land Study Bureau's master productivity rating for agricultural use is Class "E" or Very Poor. Rainfall in the vicinity averages about 144 inches per year.

For the commissioners' information, an environmental assessment and negative declaration for the project was published in the November 23, 1981, Environmental Quality Commission Bulletin, and is attached as item "C" of this staff report.

#### Pertinent comments from governmental agencies:

#### 1. Department of Water Supply

The County Water Department commented:

"We have no objections to the request for development of a Motorcycle Training and Competition Facility. For your information, there is an 8-inch waterline to the existing Drag Racing Facility."

#### 2. Department of Health

The State Department of Health commented that "Sanitary facilities should be provided for participating public."

#### 3. Soil Conservation Service

The Soil Conservation Service, U. S. Department of Agriculture, stated:

"We do not anticipate any major flooding in this parcel."

#### 4. Department of Agriculture, State of Hawaii

In its letter of December 11, 1981, the State Department of Agriculture stated the following:

"The Department of Agriculture has reviewed the subject application and although we do not specifically object to the project at this time, we are enclosing for your information, a copy of our comments to the Board of Land and Natural Resources concerning the request for a State Land Disposition for the Motorcycle Facility at Panaewa."

For the Commission's information, a reproduction of the Department of Agriculture memorandum referred to above is attached to this staff report as Attachment "E-1."

The following cooperating agencies had no comments or objections to the subject request: Hawaii Electric Light Company, Inc; County of Hawaii Fire Department, Police Department, Department of Public Works, and Department of Research and Development.

The Hawaii Planning Commission held a public hearing on the subject petition on December 17, 1981. Three letters were introduced into the record at that time. One of the letters, signed by Edward L. Kanahele and Eugene Kalanui on behalf of farmers in the area, expressed opposition to the motorcycle facility due to potential noise and other environmental problems. During the hearing, four persons testified in favor of the petition. For the Commission's information, the hearing transcript of December 17, 1981 is attached as "D" and the three letters as "E," "F," and "G."

On December 17, 1981, all six Planning Commission members present at the hearing voted to recommend approval of the Special Permit request based on the following considerations:

"The desired use would not adversely affect surrounding property. The proposed site for the requested use is located in an area which is relatively isolated from residential development. It is within the Panaewa forest and the nearest residential uses are approximately 6,000 feet to the west. Other surrounding uses within less than one mile from the proposed site are basically of a public or large-scale agricultural nature. The lands immediately surrounding the site include the drag strip, macadamia orchards and forest.

"In essence, the forest within which the proposed facility is to be located covers a vast area. The entire motor-cycle facility site consists of 90 acres in a State-owned parcel of 3200 acres. Not all of the 90 acres will be cleared, as two hundred (200)-foot wide buffers will be provided. The remoteness from areas of residence and other areas where continuous activities

occur effectively mitigates adverse impacts which may otherwise occur.

"The land upon which the proposed use sought is generally unsuited for the uses permitted within the district. The State Land Use Commission's Agricultural designation includes lands which are not suited to agricultural and ancillary activities by reason of topography, soil and other related characteristics. The subject site has a slight soil overlaying a'a lava. Its productivity class, based on the Land Study Bureau Soil Survey, is class E or very poor. Such soils have very severe limitations which make them generally unsuited to cultivation.

"At the present time, the proposed site is essentially vacant and unused. The 90-acre area would be partially converted from a forest to a public recreational use. Implementing the motorcycle facility proposal will not result in the loss of presently productive land or of a valuable natural area. The land would instead be used for a needed public recreational facility.

"The proposed use will make the highest and best use of the land involved for the public welfare. Motorcycle competition is a recreational activity currently being pursued by a portion of the public and thus by providing a site for such use would help to meet their recreational needs. The location of such a facility must also be in proximity to a majority of its users but still far enough away from population centers so as to not create a nuisance. The subject site meets these criteria."


The County Planning Commission further recommended to the Land Use Commission, that approval of the Special Permit request be subject to the following conditions:

- "1. That the petitioner, the County Department of Parks and Recreation, shall be responsible for complying with all stated conditions of approval.
- "2. That tentative subdivision approval be secured by the applicant within one (1) year from the date of approval of the special permit. Final subdivision approval shall be secured within one (1) year thereafter.
- "3. That plans shall be submitted and Final Plan
  Approval secured in accordance with Chapter 8
  (Zoning Code), Hawaii County Code, be secured
  within one (1) year from the effective date of the
  Permit.
- "4. That construction of the proposed facility commence within one (1) year from the date of receipt of Final Plan Approval and be completed within three (3) years thereafter.
- "5. That two buffer zones with a minimum width of 200 feet each be provided on the south and west sides of the facility.
- "6. That the Department of Parks and Recreation develop and adopt use regulations for the subject facility prior to its occupancy.
- "7. That the temporary drag strip access road to the facility may be used until the permanent drag


strip access is completed. Upon completion of this permanent access, use of the temporary access by the motorcycle facility shall terminate.

"8. That all other applicable rules, regulations and requirements, including noise and air quality standards, be complied with.

"Should any of the foregoing conditions not be met, this Special Permit shall be automatically void."

#### ENVIRONMENT ASSESSMENT for MOTORCYCLE RACING FACILITY WAIAKEA, SOUTH HILO, HAWAII

The County of Hawaii, at the request of the Big Island Motorcycle Association, is proposing to develop a motorcycle training and competition facility on State-owned lands located in Waiakea, South Hilo, Hawaii, TMK: 2-1-13:2(por.). The proposed site, ninety acres in size, abuts the northeast boundary of the Panaewa Drag Racing complex, which was developed and is operated by the County of Hawaii.

On October 13, 1978, the Board of Land and Natural Resources, State of Hawaii, approved and recommended the issuance of an executive order setting aside the subject area for a motorcycle training and competition facility under the management and control of the County of Hawaii, subject to the following conditions:

- that the County obtain a Special Use Permit or District Boundary Amendment prior to issuance of the executive order;
- 2. that the County be responsible for the subdivision of said parcel; and
- 3. that prior to the subdivision of said parcel, the County shall submit for review and acceptance by the Chairman, a metes and bounds description and survey map of the designated area.

The Board also granted a right-of-entry for planning and surveying purposes. A subdivision application has subsequently been filed, with the approval of the Chairman, and is being reviewed by the County Planning Department.

As mentioned earlier, the project is being spearheaded by the Big Island Motorcycle Association (BIMA), and the following improvements have been proposed:

- 1. clearing, grubbing, and contour grading of the site;
- extension of a waterline from the drag racing complex;
- grading an area for parking and constructing a pit area and motorcycle track and course; and

 constructing accessory structures, e.g., spectator and concession facilities, comfort stations, etc.

According to the BIMA, 80% of its membership reside in Hilo and surrounding areas. For this reason, selection of a site has been concentrated in the South Hilo district. The BIMA has been utilizing a privately-owned ranch in Waimea for their activities, however, development of surrounding residential areas have prompted the association to seek an alternative site.

The site selected for the motorcycle facility is undeveloped and abuts the northeast boundary of the drag racing complex from which vehicular access and water are available. Surrounding land uses include the following (distances measured from center of proposed site):

County skeet range - 7500 ft. NNW

County quarry - 7500 ft. NW distance believe 3000

National Guard facilities - 2½-3 mi. NW

County landfill - 21 mi. NW 13/4 mi between project + bulfill

Macadamia orchards - 4000 ft. E and 2000 ft. SSE

Sugar cane - 3000 ft. S

Hawaiian Homes farmlots - 1½ mi. W

Panaewa farmlots - 1½-2 mi. W

Hawaiian Homes Panaewa residences - 2½ mi. WNW

The State land use designation for the proposed site is agriculture, thus necessitating approval of a special permit from the State Land Use Commission.

The County has zoned the area for agricultural uses (A-20a) and the General Plan land use allocation guide map designates the site for orchard type uses.

Vegetation within the site consists of 'ohia, lama, false staghorn, guava, hala, kukui, and tree ferns. Other introduced plants include trumpet trees, melastoma,

melochia, and lantana. There are no known endangered flora or fauna or recorded historical or archaeological sites within the general area.

The proposed site has a thin layer of soil overlaying a pahoehoe and a'a base. Slopes throughout the site are less than 5% and elevation is about two hundred feet. Rainfall averages 144 inches annually, and porosity of the ground provides good drainage conditions. The site is approximately two miles below the Panaewa wells and is of sufficient distance to protect the water table. During the day, prevailing winds are from the northeast and at night, the wind direction reverses. Temperatures frange from 63°F to 82°F throughout the year with the mean annual termperature being 73°.

Foreseeable impacts, should this project proceed, include the conversion of a forest environment to a recreational motorcycle complex with support facilities, with parts of the forest remaining as buffer zones. Since the land is not presently being used for agriculture or any other use, no loss of productivity would result.

The location of the facility in a relatively remote area, retention of the natural forest on the perimeters of the facility, and the requirement that mufflers be installed on all motorcycles should minimize and/or eliminate all potential sources of noise pollution. The adjacent drag racing complex poses no significant noise problems and none are expected with the addition of the proposed motorcycle facility.

The County has developed a master plan for a major sports complex in the general area. Potential impacts to this complex cannot, however, be determined at this time since no commitment of land or funds have been made for the sports complex. If the complex does become a reality, potential conflicts can be resolved during the subsequent planning and design phases.

Some air pollution problems may be expected during the construction phase of the project, however, adherence to applicable public health and construction regulations should minimize this impact. All solid wastes from the site preparation and construction phases will be properly disposed of at approved disposal sites. Sewage effluent from future comfort stations will be disposed of directly into the ground and no potential health problems are foreseen.

Based on an analysis of the project's impact to the environment and the conclusion that no significant adverse impacts are anticipated, a <u>negative</u> <u>declaration</u>, pursuant to Chapter 343, HRS, EIS Regulations, is being declared for the project.

HEARING TRANSCRIPT December 17, 1981

A regularly advertised public hearing on the application of the County of Hawaii Department of Parks and Recreation was called to order at 1:40 p.m. in the Councilroom, County Building, South Hilo, Hawaii, with Chairman Bert H. Nakano presiding.

CHAIRMAN: Next on the agenda is a public hearing on the application of the County of Hawaii, Department of Parks and Recreation for a Special Permit to allow the development of a motorcycle training and competition facility on 90 acres of land situated within the State Land Use Agricultural District. The area involved abuts the northeast boundary of the Panaewa Drag Strip Complex, Waiakea, South Hilo, TMK: 2-1-13:Portion of 2. Staff?

KATO: (Presented background, and letters dated December 11th from Jack K. Suwa, December 16th from Edward L. Kanahele and Eugene Kalanui, and December 17th from Howard Wagoner, on file.)

Mr. Chairman and Commissioners, maybe, before going into the recommendation, I can just indicate where these parcels are that are being referred to in the letters. This is, as you can see on the map, Railroad Avenue. This is the Puna-South Hilo District Boundary. And this is the proposed motorcycle facility site. Now the Hawaiian Homes Lots that are being referred to are in this area here. The property, in this case, all shaded in sort of blue-green is owned by the Hawaiian Homes, Department of Hawaiian Homes, and has, some of it, if not all of it, has been leased to farmers or potential farmers. The Puna Papaya, we've just determined by looking at the latest tax map, are in this area over here and on the makai side of the proposed drag strip, I mean, proposed motorcycle complex. According to our records, these properties have not yet been legally subdivided, which may account for their legal access problem.

(Presented recommendation for approval, with conditions, on file.)

CHAIRMAN: Commissioners, do you have any questions you'd like to ask of the staff?

IMADA: Mr. Chairman?

CHAIRMAN: Commissioner Kagawa.

KAGAWA: Keith, Condition No. 4, that the construction of the proposed facility commence within one (1) year, etc. Does that include a commitment by the BIMA in the four areas that they would improve about grubbing, clearing, putting in comfort stations, etc., grading for parking?

KATO: At this point, the permit is being issued to the Department of Parks and Recreation, okay. And so depending on what they come in with at the time that they submit for plan approval, that would be what is going to be required to be completed within that time period.

KAGAWA: But the Department of Health recommended some kind of a sanitary facility.

KATO: That's correct. We'd like to, just for your information, this map here shows the existing drag strip and there's a public, there's a toilet located in the vicinity of this parking area over here. It's not directly in the proposed site, but it's felt that it can, at least on a temporary basis, serve those needs.

KAGAWA: Okay, as far as Condition No. 7 about this temporary access road, where is this access road?

KATO: This access road starts at the rubbish dump; and I'm not sure of the exact alignment. It does come down this way, makes a turn up and then back down to the proposed facility.

KAGAWA: Is there a proposed permanent access?

KATO: Yeah. Under the permit that was granted for the drag strip, there's suppose to be a permanent access taken when the Puainako Street extension is completed; and there's suppose to be a takeoff from there toward the drag strip.

KAGAWA: There's no timetable for that?

KATO: No.

CHAIRMAN: Any other questions, Commissioners? None? Is the applicant or representative present? I'd like to swear you in first. Do you swear to tell the truth on the testimony you're about to give on the subject matter now before the Hawaii County Planning Commission?

OKAMURA: I do.

CHAIRMAN: Will you state your name for the record, please.

OKAMURA: My name is Ronald Okamura. I'm with the Parks and Recreation Department.

CHAIRMAN: Mr. Okamura, you have heard the background report and also the recommendation. Do you have anything that you'd like to add?

OKAMURA: Only one thing, that as far as the letters that were handed in stating concerns about noise pollution, I would like to state that all of the activities proposed at the new motorcycle facility would be confined to daytime use thereby the noise factor would be minimized as compared to something of that nature being done at night when sound carries, you know, even further. And I've done, in the past prior to the construction of the drag strip, we've had tests done as far as decibel readings on drag vehicles from the Panaewa Hawaiian Homes area and found it to be almost minimal as far as decibel reading is concerned. This was done with the help of the Police Department. And as far as the motorcycle, without maybe any modifications on their mufflers, the highest decibel reading would be around 90 or 92 and from about 6,000 feet away, very inaudible.

CHAIRMAN: Commissioners, do you have any questions that you'd like to ask Mr. Okamura?

ORITA: Mr. Chairman?

CHAIRMAN: Commissioner Orita.

ORITA: Mr. Okamura, what you're proposing is a motorcycle training and competition facility, am I correct?

OKAMURA: Right.

ORITA: Have you considered possibly using the present drag strip?

OKAMURA: These are, when we talk about motorcycles, these are not street bikes we're talking about.

ORITA: I see.

OKAMURA: These are dirt bikes and -.

ORITA: But is there any possibility that such a thing can be held at the drag strip?

OKAMURA: I think right now as far as how the drag strip is already built, there would be space limitations. We still would have to encroach into surrounding areas to complete the project.

ORITA: All right, I could be off the subject, sir, but presently how often is the drag strip used?

OKAMURA: Drag strip, as far as regular schedules, drag events, I understand there's about ten of them per year.

ORITA: Ten per year?

OKAMURA: Right.

ORITA: And is the drag strip used seven days a week?

OKAMURA: No.

ORITA: No. So there is a possibility that such a training could be held at the drag strip if it is not being used for any other thing, am I correct?

OKAMURA: I don't think, all activities of this nature, both drag racing and motorcycling, would be confined to weekends; and there would be too much conflict of use if we do have -.

ORITA: Mr. Okamura, I think the public, the letter that staff had read, some of the objections, some of the people objected to the fact that, one was noise. And I think in the background report it states that, "and the requirement that mufflers be installed on all motorcycles should minimize and/or eliminate all potential sources of noise pollution." Can you people guarantee that they will use a muffler up to that strip or will the muffler be put on after they get to the strip, sir?

OKAMURA: I think these bikes are not ridden, you know, they don't ride those bikes on the public highways to the strip. They are carted on trucks.

ORITA: Any particular reason for putting the mufflers, sir?

OKAMURA: I think there are some people from the Motorcycle Association here; and as far as the technical aspects of the use of the bikes, I think they can answer that more than I can.

ORITA: Thank you.

KAGAWA: Mr. Chairman?

CHAIRMAN: Commissioner Kagawa.

KAGAWA: Reggie, this drag strip, isn't that a straight-away, 400-yard type of straight-away and a motorcycle would be somewhere like an oval type?

OKAMURA: Yeah, as far as motorcross, it's not a fixed track, you know. I mean, as far as clearing and grubbing and stuff, we'd be selective where the choice trees and shrubbery would be left in there. As long as there is, I guess, a major course; but it can be a meandering type. It's not fixed like a drag strip.

KAGAWA: Yeah.

CHAIRMAN: Any other questions, Commissioners?

ORITA: Mr. Chairman, just one more question.

CHAIRMAN: Mr. Okamura, who's going to construct the training -?

OKAMURA: The Big Island Motorcycle Association will initially do most of it because I have to confess that the project right now, as far as the funding for any kind of construction, there's no appropriation set aside for it right now.

ORITA: Thank you.

CHAIRMAN: Any other questions? If not, thank you, Mr. Okamura. You may be called back for some questions later on, I think.

PUBLIC: I'd like to ask a question.

CHAIRMAN: Just a minute. I'm getting to you now. Just a minute. This is a public hearing. Is there anyone in the audience who would like to speak for or against this application? I'd like to have a show of hands. Will you all rise so that I can swear you in one time and you can come up and testify. I want to swear you in first. Do you swear to tell the truth on the testimony you're about to give on the subject matter now before the Hawaii County Planning Commission?

TESTIFIERS: I do.

CHAIRMAN: You can sit down; and as you come up, will you state your name for the record, please. We'll start off with you.

DAWRS: I'm Herbert Dawrs with the Big Island Motorcycle We've been working, I guess, about ten years now to Association. find a motorcycle recreation area for off-road motorcycling. And some of the questions that have been asked, I think we've got pretty good answers for. We represent not just bike riders but the families; and we hope to make this a family type recreation area. The Big Island Motorcycle Association is a non-profit corporation that has rules and regulations pertaining to equipment. Specifically, some of the questions that Mr. Orita asked, how the land will be set up, noise problems, well, this is not a unique request. Its been done in Honolulu and all over the mainland there have been sites; and the problems that have been talked about today are common questions that have come up and I think they can all be answered. I'll welcome questions now or later or whenever, at your convenience.

CHAIRMAN: Commissioners, do you have any questions that you'd like to ask of the witness?

DAWRS: I can answer a couple of your specific questions if you'd like. The drag strip as such wouldn't be suitable because the bikes are totally different. They're not street machines. They're off-road bikes. They'd be trailered in or brought in the back of trucks.

The noise limits, generally acceptable limits are 90 decibels or close there to; and that can be accurately controlled by decibel meters if you'd like.

The bikes don't run well without silencers on them. They're loud but they don't run well. And the competition bikes all have silencers.

CHAIRMAN: Any other questions? If not, I get one question here. Your motorcyle, you know, the land and what not, is that going to be flat, levelled, or is that going to be something that I see in the TV, you know, up the hill and down and so forth?

DAWRS: It will be like that, but probably not at that professional level. You know, we'd like to think that we have riders that are that good, but initially our plan is to cut just the width of an area that we need for a particular type of track; and there are different types. There would be motorcross like you're talking about, they're on uneven terrain and there'd be

just purely trailing riding where it's skill, slow. There could be, there's a swamp area in there that we might want to use for laying out mud rides, and just, all different types of terrains. But, specifically, we don't want to knock the area down because that's part of the pleasure of a motorcycle course. You leave everything up where you can except where you specifically have to ride or park or that type.

CHAIRMAN: Any other questions?

PONTE: Yeah, I have a question.

CHAIRMAN: Go ahead, Commissioner Ponte.

PONTE: Will it be used seven days of the week or weekends?

DAWRS: Weekends only because we plan to pretty much control through the organization, through the Big Island Motorcycle Association and the clubs that belong to the Association. That means its gotta be on the weeks because most of us have to work.

ORITA: Mr. Chairman, one more question.

CHAIRMAN: Commissioner Orita.

ORITA: Will funds be made available if such a permit is granted, sir, to your knowledge?

DAWRS: If you mean are we going to ask for monies, no.

ORITA: No?

DAWRS: We'd love to have it but we don't plan to, we planned all along to provide all the equipment that we need to do the grading; and if we come up with slush funds, we'd love to have them; but we're not asking for them.

ORITA: Thank you.

CHAIRMAN: Any other questions? If not, thank you.

WEBSTER: My name is David Webster. I've been a resident of this island for seven years and a resident of the state for about thirty. I'd like to go on record in favor of this facility. I have been a motorcyclist for about 15 years now.

I'd like to address some of the specific questions and objections that were brought up. The drag strip, for instance, is used less than once a month. And the facility of the races there, provided the facilities goes in, the frequency of the races would probably be only once a month. There would be other activities but the activities that generate the most noise which would be the races would still be limited for economic reasons of the members. You just can't afford to race much oftener than that to once a month. And so the people that are concerned about the noise, they're talking about, at the most, once every two weeks.

I'd also like to point out that in the report, the nearest house was over a mile away, there's going to be a buffer zone of trees between the facility and the nearest existing house. I have been

out on the road in front of the Panaewa Farms there when they have been holding drag races; and from that road, you cannot hear the dragsters, which must be, I'd estimate, 20 times as loud as any of the motorcycles. Any of these racing bikes currently come from the factory with mufflers installed, to answer your question; and, in fact, if you remove the mufflers, you suffer a loss in power. They're designed at the factory to operate with those mufflers in place. And as Herb stated, these bikes will all be trucked in there, any of the racing machines will be trucked in there. They're not street, legal, they're not designed to run on the streets; and I don't know anybody that tries to run one on the street.

There was a question raised on the sanitary facility. There are currently at the drag strip two large cement-blocked bathhouses that have any number of urinals and toilets in them; and in the interim period, these could be utilized by the motorcycle facility. There would be a walk of, from your map here, I would guess maybe 200 or 300 feet from the proposed motorcycle facility to the existing sanitary facilities at the drag strip; and I don't see any problem in both facilities using those until the motorcycle facility is able to construct some of their own if they wanted to.

The question that Mr. Orita asked about our training program, there is a licensed training program that is licensed by the State of Hawaii; and that would probably be the course that was taught over here. And, currently, a gentleman by the name of Lindfield Murphy is scheduled to go over to Honolulu at his own expense in the next couple of weeks and take the State Instructor's Course. So we will have an instructor on the island that will be able to take care of the instruction type courses where they take a new motorcyclist out and teach him how to ride safely and how to use his brakes and how to turn. And this type of training probably would be done on the drag strip, obviously, at times when they are not utilizing the drag strip for racing. But as far as the facility they're planning here, that's an entirely different type of motorcycle. And it is, like you say, the type that you see on TV where they're running over rough natural terrain and you could not use the drag strip for that type racing, to answer your question. If there are any more questions I'll be happy to answer them if I can.

CHAIRMAN: Do you have any questions, Commissioners? If not, thank you, Mr. Webster.

WEBSTER: Okay.

CHAIRMAN: Next.

WILSON: My name is Richard Wilson and I've been on this island for about 22 years now and been riding motorcycles for about 12 years. And I'm in favor of approving the application for the motorcycle track. And, basically, I wanted just to say that people that have been riding have been the younger kids, high school kids, etc., and older ones also that are, how do I want to put this now, let's see, they've been riding in a lot of these areas like in the Panaewa House Lots area, Farm Lots area, illegally. They have been doing it now and for the past 10 years, in the cane fields they've been riding and all over; and there have been some complaints that they tried to get these kids

not to do that. And this is one of the reasons, one of the main reasons we've been going after trying to get a park, an area for them to ride in so they won't be in these other areas. That's all.

CHAIRMAN: Any questions, Commissioners? None. Thank you. Next.

VIERRA: Hello, my name is Dennis Vierra; and I'm the current secretary of the Big Island Motorcycle Association. And I basically just have two things to say. First of all, we've worked for ten years on this, patiently, and with the cooperation of the different agencies in accordance with their laws and regulations. And, secondly, this proposed area was proposed by these agencies, not by us; and I felt that they had given it very good scrutiny as to it being a perfect area for us. Thank you.

CHAIRMAN: Thank you. Next.

C. DAWRS: Good afternoon. My name is Charles Dawrs. I'm a resident of this island. I would like to recommend in favor of this motorcycle facility because I myself compete in events. it stands now, there's absolutely nowhere on this island where I can take my bike and practice. And when I go to an outer island, I generally represent this island and the rest of the motorcyclists over here. And when we go over there, we're riding, just basically, we have nowhere that we can go and practice. If we go ride on Mauna Kea, we can go up there, and people tolerate it; but we can get in trouble. They can confiscate your motorcyle. All your investments in the sport can go up like that because you have no place to do it. And I'd just like to recommend that after ten years we've tried, we've waited, nowhere, and I think it's about time you get someplace to ride and give everyone a chance over here to go out and see the sport and see what it's about. People just had never given it a chance. They've always pushed it aside for other sports, other interests. I'd just like to say that it's time that we get our fair shake. Thank you.

CHAIRMAN: Thank you. No questions? Thank you. Next.

WILLIAMS: Good afternoon. I'm Doctor Richard Williams. I've been a resident of Hilo for the last three years and a resident here in the state for the last six years. I'd like to go on record in favor of the proposed park. I think we've had a number of the questions answered very well as far as what the motorcycle members have represented so far.

One of the things that hasn't been stated, when Dick Wilson was up here he mentioned that people have been riding illegally in the house lots area and there have been various measures that have been taken by private individuals to restrict riding in this area, and it has created considerable hazards, illegally chaining roads without signs and markers. And it has resulted in at least one death and it has resulted in one very serious injury that required considerable hospitalization, plastic surgery and prolong period of convalescence. If we have a legal controlled area where people can ride, that would be much less of a problem. And, again, if there are any questions anyone would like to ask, I'd be certainly glad to answer any of them if I may.

CHAIRMAN: You got any questions that you'd like to ask, Commissioners? None. Thank you.

WILLIAMS: Thank you.

CHAIRMAN: Anybody else that wants to testify? Okay, Commissioners, what is your pleasure? Continue the hearing or you can close the public hearing.

ORITA: Mr. Chairman, I have a question.

CHAIRMAN: Go ahead.

ORITA: Staff, in the background report, page 3, "The County has developed a master plan for a major sports complex in the general area." This proposed development, is it part of that area?

KATO: Commissioner Orita, with your permissions, I'd like to defer that to the Department of Parks and Recreation.

CHAIRMAN: Mr. Okamura, you have heard Commissioner Orita's question.

OKAMURA: Yes, I have. As far as the proposed major recreation are, it is in this general vicinity.

ORITA: In the general vicinity?

OKAMURA: Yeah.

ORITA: Thank you.

CHAIRMAN: Thank you, Mr. Okamura. Okay, Commissioners, what is your pleasure?

KAGAWA: Mr. Chairman?

CHAIRMAN: Commissioner Kagawa.

KAGAWA: I move that this hearing be closed.

CHAIRMAN: Do I hear any second to the motion?

PONTE: Second the motion, Mr. Chairman.

CHAIRMAN: It has been moved by Commissioner Kagawa, seconded by Commissioner Ponte to close the public hearing. All those in favor of the motion say aye?

COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

CHAIRMAN: Motion is carried. The public hearing is closed.

It was moved by Commissioner Kagawa and seconded by Commissioner Ponte to send a favorable recommendation to the State Land Use Commission for the reasons and with the conditions as outlined by the staff. A roll call vote was taken and motion carried with six ayes.

KAGAWA: Okay, as far as Condition No. 7 about this temporary access road, where is this access road?

KATO: This access road starts at the rubbish dump; and I'm not sure of the exact alignment. It does come down this way, makes a turn up and then back down to the proposed facility.

KAGAWA: Is there a proposed permanent access?

KATO: Yeah. Under the permit that was granted for the drag strip, there's suppose to be a permanent access taken when the Puainako Street extension is completed; and there's suppose to be a takeoff from there toward the drag strip.

KAGAWA: There's no timetable for that?



The Parks and Recreation Department is requesting the Planning Commission to approve of a planned motorcycle recreation area just makai of the present County Drag Strip. The Tax Map Key is 2-1-13:Portion of Parcel 2.

We, the undersigned residents, land owners, voters, and citizens of this County are opposed to the construction or establishment of any motorcycle track. We, the undersigned, live and work on our farms in the Panaewa Farm Lots on Department of Hawaiian Home Lands (DHHL) lands which is that area directly mauka of the Drag Strip and the proposed motorcycle track.

We oppose the motorcycle track for the following reasons, and we request the Planning Commission disapprove and stop the construction of the motorcycle track:

- The noise pollution from the motorcycle track will be unbearable. The farmers in this area are already subjected to noise from the drag strip, the National Guard firing range, the base leg of the flight path to runway three, and now, the proposed motorcycle track. We moved away from noisy DHHL property in Keaukaha to have some quiet, but the addition of a motorcycle track as a neighbor will further erode our tranquil farm area.
- 2. In an era which preaches and legislates energy conservation, isn't it an anomaly for the Planning Commission to approve of an activity which is energy wasteful? Gasoline vehicle racing of any type promote the use of engines which are energy inefficient. Granted that motorcycles have somewhat smaller engines than cars and some motorcycles do have good gas mileages, yet some motorcycles have less m.p.g. than a. Volkswagen Rabbit.

The point we believe is that the County must anticipate future problems, and 100 DHHL farmers living in the Panaewa area near a motorcycle track will, indeed, be a future problem, a source of complaints about the noise and other environmental impacts. The farmers would like to believe that the County of Hawaii was not informed that farmers are living in the area, and are also planning and they will build primary residences in Panaewa, and because of this misinformation, proceeded to endorse a motorcycle track.

The DHHL farmers, many of whom are former Keaukaha residences. would also like to believe that the County will not ride rough shod over our request and that the County be informed that although we were only notified on December 15, 1981, about SP 81-21, we can and will galvanize our forces to fight any more noise pollutions in our area. We believe that we are reasonable and conservative people and we believe that we are submitting a reasonable request in asking censure for SP 81-21 by the Planning Commission.

- That the County obtain a Special Use Permit or District Boundary Amendment prior to the issuance of the executive order.
- The County shall be responsible for the subdivision of said parcel.
- 3. That prior to the subdivision of said parcel, the County shall submit for review and acceptance by the Chairman, metes and bounds description and survey map of the designated area.

#### ENVIRONMENT ASSESSMENT for MOTORCYCLE RACING FACILITY WAIAKEA, SOUTH HILO, HAWAII

The County of Hawaii, at the request of the Big Island Motorcycle Association, is proposing to develop a motorcycle training and competition facility on State-owned lands located in Waiakea, South Hilo, Hawaii, TMK: 2-1-13:2(por.). The proposed site, ninety acres in size, abuts the northeast boundary of the Panaewa Drag Racing complex, which was developed and is operated by the County of Hawaii.

On October 13, 1978, the Board of Land and Natural Resources, State of Hawaii, approved and recommended the issuance of an executive order setting aside the subject area for a motorcycle training and competition facility under the management and control of the County of Hawaii, subject to the following conditions:

- that the County obtain a Special Use Permit or District Boundary
   Amendment prior to issuance of the executive order;
- 2. that the County be responsible for the subdivision of said parcel; and
- 3. that prior to the subdivision of said parcel, the County shall submit for review and acceptance by the Chairman, a metes and bounds description and survey map of the designated area.

The Board also granted a right-of-entry for planning and surveying purposes. A subdivision application has subsequently been filed, with the approval of the Chairman, and is being reviewed by the County Planning Department.

As mentioned earlier, the project is being spearheaded by the Big Island Motorcycle Association (BIMA), and the following improvements have been proposed:

- 1. clearing, grubbing, and contour grading of the site;
- 2. extension of a waterline from the drag racing complex;
- grading an area for parking and constructing a pit area and motorcycle track and course; and

constructing accessory structures, e.g., spectator and concession
 facilities, comfort stations, etc.

According to the BIMA, 80% of its membership reside in Hilo and surrounding areas. For this reason, selection of a site has been concentrated in the South Hilo district. The BIMA has been utilizing a privately-owned ranch in Waimea for their activities, however, development of surrounding residential areas have prompted the association to seek an alternative site.

The site selected for the motorcycle facility is undeveloped and abuts the northeast boundary of the drag racing complex from which vehicular access and water are available. Surrounding land uses include the following (distances measured from center of proposed site):

County skeet range - 7500 ft. NNW

County quarry - 7500 ft. NW

National Guard facilities - 2½-3 mi. NW

County landfill - 2½ mi. NW

Macadamia orchards - 4000 ft. E and 2000 ft. SSE

Sugar cane - 3000 ft. S

Hawaiian Homes farmlots - 1½ mi. W

Panaewa farmlots - 1½-2 mi. W

Hawaiian Homes Panaewa residences - 2½ mi. WNW

The State land use designation for the proposed site is agriculture, thus necessitating approval of a special permit from the State Land Use Commission.

The County has zoned the area for agricultural uses (A-20a) and the General Plan land use allocation guide map designates the site for orchard type uses.

Vegetation within the site consists of 'ohia, lama, false staghorn, guava, hala, kukui, and tree ferns. Other introduced plants include trumpet trees, melastoma,

melochia, and lantana. There are no known endangered flora or fauna or recorded historical or archaeological sites within the general area.

The proposed site has a thin layer of soil overlaying a pahoehoe and a'a base. Slopes throughout the site are less than 5% and elevation is about two hundred feet. Rainfall averages 144 inches annually, and porosity of the ground provides good drainage conditions. The site is approximately two miles below the Panaewa wells and is of sufficient distance to protect the water table. During the day, prevailing winds are from the northeast and at night, the wind direction reverses. Temperatures frange from 63°F to 82°F throughout the year with the mean annual termperature being 73°.

Foreseeable impacts, should this project proceed, include the conversion of a forest environment to a recreational motorcycle complex with support facilities, with parts of the forest remaining as buffer zones. Since the land is not presently being used for agriculture or any other use, no loss of productivity would result.

The location of the facility in a relatively remote area, retention of the natural forest on the perimeters of the facility, and the requirement that mufflers be installed on all motorcycles should minimize and/or eliminate all potential sources of noise pollution. The adjacent drag racing complex poses no significant noise problems and none are expected with the addition of the proposed motorcycle facility.

The County has developed a master plan for a major sports complex in the general area. Potential impacts to this complex cannot, however, be determined at this time since no commitment of land or funds have been made for the sports complex. If the complex does become a reality, potential conflicts can be resolved during the subsequent planning and design phases.

Some air pollution problems may be expected during the construction phase of the project, however, adherence to applicable public health and construction regulations should minimize this impact. All solid wastes from the site preparation and construction phases will be properly disposed of at approved disposal sites. Sewage effluent from future comfort stations will be disposed of directly into the ground and no potential health problems are foreseen.



The Parks and Recreation Department is requesting the Planning Commission to approve of a planned motorcycle recreation area just makai of the present County Drag Strip. The Tax Map Key is 2-1-13:Portion of Parcel 2.

We, the undersigned residents, land owners, voters, and citizens of this County are opposed to the construction or establishment of any motorcycle track. We, the undersigned, live and work on our farms in the Panaewa Farm Lots on Department of Hawaiian Home Lands (DHHL) lands which is that area directly mauka of the Drag Strip and the proposed motorcycle track.

We oppose the motorcycle track for the following reasons, and we request the Planning Commission disapprove and stop the construction of the motorcycle track:

- 1. The noise pollution from the motorcycle track will be unbearable. The farmers in this area are already subjected to noise from the drag strip, the National Guard firing range, the base leg of the flight path to runway three, and now, the proposed motorcycle track. We moved away from noisy DHHL property in Keaukaha to have some quiet, but the addition of a motorcycle track as a neighbor will further erode our tranquil farm area.
- 2. In an era which preaches and legislates energy conservation, isn't it an anomaly for the Planning Commission to approve of an activity which is energy wasteful? Gasoline vehicle racing of any type promote the use of engines which are energy inefficient. Granted that motorcycles have somewhat smaller engines than cars and some motorcycles do have good gas mileages, yet some motorcycles have less m.p.g. than a Volkswagen Rabbit.

The point we believe is that the County must anticipate future problems, and 100 DHHL farmers living in the Panaewa area near a motorcycle track will, indeed, be a future problem, a source of complaints about the noise and other environmental impacts. The farmers would like to believe that the County of Hawaii was not informed that farmers are living in the area, and are also planning and they will build primary residences in Panaewa, and because of this misinformation, proceeded to endorse a motorcycle track.

The DHHL farmers, many of whom are former Keaukaha residences, would also like to believe that the County will not ride rough shod over our request and that the County be informed that although we were only notified on December 15, 1981, about SP 81-21, we can and will galvanize our forces to fight any more noise pollutions in our area. We believe that we are reasonable and conservative people and we believe that we are submitting a reasonable request in asking censure for SP 81-21 by the Planning Commission.

Puna Papaya, holder of Revocable Permit No. S-5642, covering Tax Kay parcels 2-1-13:154 and 155 at Waiakea, South Hilo from the State of Hawaii has no objections to the proposed motocycle facility.

It should be noted, however, that Puna Papaya's request for a lease covering the aforementioned tax parcels is being held in abeyance until a determination is made of legal access to the parcels.

It appears that this same determination confronts the proposed motorcycle facility as well as the existing drag strip.

The petitioner, the County of Hawaii Department of Parks and Recreation, is requesting a Special Permit to allow the development of a motorcycle training and competition facility on 90 acres of land situated within the State Land Use Agricultural District. The area involved abuts the northeast boundary of the Panaewa Drag Strip Complex, Waiakea, South Hilo, TMK: 2-1-13:portion of 2.

The property under consideration is a portion of a 3,200+-acre parcel owned by the State of Hawaii. On October 13, 1978, the Board of Land and Natural Resources approved of and voted to recommend to the Governor the issuance of an executive order setting aside the subject area under the management and control of the County of Hawaii, Department of Parks & Recreation, subject to the following terms and conditions:

- 1. That the County obtain a Special Permit or District Boundary Amendment prior to the issuance of the executive order;
- That the County shall be responsible for the subdivision of the parcel; and
- 3. That prior to the subdivision of said parcel the County shall submit, for review and acceptance of the Board Chairman, a metes and bounds description and a survey map of the designated area.

At the same meeting, the Board granted a right-of-entry for planning and surveying purposes.

For the commissioners' information, an environmental assessment and negative declaration for the project was published in the November 23, 1981, Environmental Quality Commission Bulletin.

The property under consideration is designated as Orchards by the General Plan Land Use Pattern Allocation Guide Map and zoned Agricultural-20 acre (A-20a).

According to the Soil Conservation Service Soil Survey Report dated December 1973, the soil on the subject property is "Papai extremely stony muck." In representative profile this soil has a surface layer of dark brown extremely stony muck about 8 inches thick underlain by fragmental A'a lava. Permeability is rapid, runoff is slow and the erosion hazard is slight. The Soil Study Bureau classification of this soil is class E or very poor.

Rainfall in the vicinity averages about 144 inches per year.

The environmental assessment states, in part, the following:

"Vegetation within the site consists of 'ohia, lama, false staghorn, guava, hala, kukui, and tree ferns. Other introduced plants include trumpet trees, melastoma, melochia, and lantana. There are no known endangered flora or fauna or recorded historical or archaeological sites within the general area.

"The project is being spearheaded by the Big Island Motorcycle Association (BIMA), and the following improvements have been proposed:

- 1. clearing, grubbing, and contour grading of the site;
- 2. extension of a waterline from the drag racing complex;
- 3. grading an area for parking and constructing a pit area and motorcycle track and course; and
- constructing accessory structures, e.g., spectator and concession facilities, comfort stations, etc.

"Foreseeable impacts, should this project proceed, include the conversion of a forest environment to a recreational motorcycle complex with support facilities, with parts of the forest remaining as buffer zones. Since the land is not presently being used for agriculture or any other use, no loss of productivity would result.

"The location of the facility in a relatively remote area, retention of the natural forest on the perimeters of the facility, and the requirement that mufflers be installed on all motorcycles should minimize and/or eliminate all potential sources of noise pollution. The adjacent drag racing complex poses no significant noise problems and none are expected with the addition of the proposed motorcycle facility.

"The County has developed a master plan for a major sports complex in the general area. Potential impacts to this complex cannot, however, be determined at this time since no commitment of land or funds have been made for the sports complex. If the complex does become a reality, potential conflicts can be resolved during the subsequent planning and design phases."

Access to the proposed facility would be via the drag strip's temporary access road.

Surrounding land uses include the drag strip, macadamia nut orchards, and vacant lands. The nearest house is located within the Hawaiian Homes agricultural subdivision approximately 6,000 feet from the proposed motorcycle facility.

In support of the request the petitioner stated, in part, the following:

"The proposed facility is intended to satisfy recreational motorcycling needs, as expressed by the Big Island Motorcycle Association.

"The proposed site adjoins the County's drag racing complex for which a special permit was previously approved.

Centralizing these similar type activities would result in maximizing use of existing public services and utilities."

Upon review of the subject request the Soil Conservation Service stated, "We do not anticipate any major flooding in this parcel."

The Water Department stated, "We have no objections to the request for development of a Motorcycle Training and Competition Facility. For your information, there is an 8-inch waterline to the existing Drag Racing Facility."

The State Department of Health commented that "Sanitary facilities should be provided for participating public."

READ DIA Commente

None of the other cooperating agencies had any comments on or objections to the subject request.

## RECOMMENDATION: PARKS AND RECREATION

Upon review of the subject request, the staff recommends that the request to allow the establishment of a motorcycle training and competition facility in the State Land Use Agricultural District be given favorable consideration based on the following findings:

The desired use would not adversely affect surrounding property. The proposed site for the requested use is located in an area which is relatively isolated from residential development. It is within the Panaewa forest and the nearest residential uses are approximately 6,000 feet to the west. Other surrounding uses within less than one mile from the proposed site are basically of a public or large-scale agricultural nature. The lands immediately surrounding the site include the drag strip, macadamia orchards and forest.

In essence, the forest within which the proposed facility is to be located covers a vast area. The entire motorcycle facility site consists of 90 acres in a State-owned parcel of 3200+ acres. Not all of the 90 acres will be cleared, as two hundred (200)-foot wide buffers will be provided. The remoteness from areas of residence and other areas where continuous activities occur effectively mitigates adverse impacts which may otherwise occur.

The land upon which the proposed use is sought is generally unsuited for the uses permitted within the district. The State

Land Use Commission's Agricultural designation includes lands which are not suited to agricultural and ancillary activities by reason of topography, soil and other related characteristics.

The subject site has a slight soil overlaying a'a lava. Its productivity class, based on the Land Study Bureau Soil Survey is class E or very poor. Such soils have very severe limitations which make them generally unsuited to cultivation.

At the present time, the proposed site is essentially vacant and unused. The 90-acre area would be partially converted from a forest to a public recreational use. Implementing the motorcycle facility proposal will not result in the loss of presently productive land or of a valuable natural area. The land would instead be used for a needed public recreational facility.

The proposed use will make the highest and best use of the land involved for the public welfare. Motorcycle competition is a recreational activity currently being pursued by a portion of the public and thus by providing a site for such use would help to meet their recreational needs. The location of such a facility must also be in proximity to a majority of its users but still far enough away from population centers so as to not create a nuisance. The subject site meets these criteria.

It is further recommended that approval of the special permit request be subject to the following conditions:

- 1. That the petitioner, the County Department of Parks and Recreation, shall be responsible for complying with all stated conditions of approval.
- 2. That tentative subdivision approval be secured by the applicant within one (1) year from the date of approval of the special permit. Final subdivision approval shall be secured within one (1) year thereafter.
- 3. That plans shall be submitted and Final Plan Approval in accordance with Chapter 8 (Zoning Code), Hawaii County Code, be secured within one (1) year from the effective date of the Permit.
- 4. That construction of the proposed facility commence within one (1) year from the date of receipt of Final Plan

  Approval and be completed within three (3) years thereafter.
- 5. That two buffer zones with a minimum width of 200 feet each be provided on the south and west sides of the facility.
- 6. That the Department of Parks and Recreation develop and adopt use regulations for the subject facility prior to its occupancy.
- 7. That the temporary drag strip access road to the facility may be used until the permanent drag strip access is completed. Upon completion of this permanent access, use

of the temporary access by the motorcycle facility shall terminate.

8. That all other applicable rules, regulations and requirements, including noise and air quality standards, be complied with.

Should any of the foregoing conditions not be met, this special permit shall be automatically void.







APPEAL -Continuation of a public hearing on the petition VARIANCE NO. 521 for an appeal filed by Christopher Hoy from the CHRISTOPHER HOY Planning Director's denial action on a request AHUALOA HOMESTEADS, for an amendment to Variance Permit No. 521 to 3RD SERIES, allow a gravel surface roadway in lieu of an HAMAKUA oil-treated surface and the deletion of Condition No. 3. The area involved is located along the south side of a 50-foot wide Homestead Road, approximately 2.3 miles mauka of Honokaa Village, Ahualoa Homesteads, 3rd Series, Hamakua, 4-5-11:12. The petitioner, Christopher Hoy, and his representative, Robert Sommers, were in attendance. Mr. Sommers requested the public hearing be continued to allow him an opportunity to review the matter as he has just been retained as legal counsel by the petitioner. Director Fuke noted that the staff's understood Mr. Sommer's request; however, he suggested that if the hearing is continued this be the last of it as it would be unfair to have it continued any further.

It was moved by Commissioner Imada and seconded by Commissioner Kagawa that the public hearing be continued to the next Hilo meeting. Motion was carried.

SPECIAL PERMIT COUNTY OF HAWAII AND RECREATION WAIAKEA, SOUTH HILO

Public hearing on the application of the County of Hawaii Department of Parks and Recreation for DEPARTMENT OF PARKS a Special Permit to allow the development of a motorcycle training and competition facility on 90 acres of land situated within the State Land Use Agricultural District. The area involved abuts the northeast boundary of the Panaewa Drag Strip Complex, Waiakea, South Hilo, TMK: 2-1-13:Portion of 2.

Staff presented background and letters dated December 11th from Jack K. Suwa, December 16th from Edward L. Kanahele and Eugene Kalanui, and December 17th from Howard Wagoner, on file.

Staff then indicated on the presentation map the subject and surrounding properties and presented recommendation for approval with conditions, on file.

For the Commission's information, staff pointed out on the presentation map the location of the existing toilet facility in the drag strip area that they will utilize and also the proposed permanent access road.

In response to the noise concerns expressed, the petitioner's representative, Ronald Okamura, noted that all activities will be limited to daytime use and decibel readings will be taken so that the noise would be held to a minimum; as the motorcycle courses are different from that of a drag racing facility and both activities will be held during the weekends, they will be unable to use the drag strip facility; the bikes are not ridden on the highway as they are carted to the site by vehicles; and that the Motorcycle Association will initially do most of the construction because of the County's limited funding.

The following is a recapitulation of those testifying on the application:

Herbert Dawrs, Member of the Big Island Motorcycle Association, said that they hope to make this a family type of recreation area; the drag strip would not be suitable for their purposes as the track is different; the bikes are off-road bikes which will be trailered in or brought in the back of trucks; the noise limits can be controlled by decibel meters; all competition bikes have mufflers on; that they will just clear the area for the various types of courses or tracks and leave everything else as is as that is part of the pleasure of a motorcyclist; and also that the activities will be limited to weekend usage. He added that their Association plans to provide the equipment needed to do the grading, etc. and do not plan to ask for funding.

David Webster spoke in favor of the facility and addressed some of the specific questions and objections that were brought up. As far as the noise consideration, he noted the noise that would generate the most noise from their activity would be when the races are held, which would be held at the most once every two weeks; there is a buffer zone between the proposed facility and the nearest house; and all their bikes from the factory come with mufflers installed and if removed there is a loss of power in the bikes. As far as the sanitary facility, he said in the interim they will utilize the facility located in the drag strip area. He added that they will have a licensed instructor who will take care of their training program, possibly to be held at the drag strip; however, as far as racing the motorcycles, they will be unable to use the drag strip as the motorcycle tracks are of a different type.

Richard Wilson spoke in favor of the application as motorcycle riders have been the source of complaints for illegally riding their bikes.

Dennis Vierra, secretary to the big Island Motorcycle Association, noted that they have worked patiently for this facility for ten years with various agencies in accordance with the laws and regulations and that the site was selected by these various agencies and not the Motorcycle Association.

Charles Dawrs, a motorcyclist who competes in such events on the outer islands, spoke in favor of the application as presently there is no place for them to practice on this island. He said he felt it was about time they had a place to ride and everyone be given an opportunity to see the sport.

Doctor Richard Williams spoke in favor of the application as measures have been taken to restrict motorcyclists from riding in areas which have created considerable hazards, such as illegally chaining the roads without signs or markers, that has resulted in at least one death and serious injury to another requiring plastic surgery and prolonged period of convalescence.

It was moved by Commissioner Kagawa and seconded by Commissioner Ponte that the public hearing be closed. Motion was carried.

It was moved by Commissioner Kagawa and seconded by Commissioner Ponte to send a favorable recommendation to the State Land Use Commission for the reasons and with the conditions as outlined by the staff. A roll call vote was taken and motion carried with six ayes.

The Chair called a short recess at 2:25 p.m.

The meeting reconvened at 2:35 p.m. and the Commission took up the public hearings scheduled for 2:00 p.m.

Public hearing on the application of the County of Hawaii Department of Parks and Recreation for a Special Management Area (SMA) Use Permit to allow the construction of a comfort station, parking lot and related improvements at Leleiwi Beach Park (formerly Carlsmith property), Keaukaha, South Hilo, TMK: 2-1-17:19.

Staff presented background and recommendation for approval with conditions, on file.

The petitioner's representatives, Milton Hakoda and Glenn Miyao, were in attendance.

Mr. Hakoda gave some background information, noting that they will be reimbursed 50 percent of the expenditures by the Federal government.

The following is a recapitulation of those testifying on the application:

Jan Moon, representing the Concerned Citizens to Save Keaukaha, and approximately 3,000 petitioners read and presented written testimony, on file. She said they protested that there will be no Environmental Impact Statement and asked that the Commission deny this request as it will take away the beautiful grassy area, block the scenic view, and encroach into the pool area, noting there are other areas along the Hilo coast that need improvements more badly. She stated this project is not in compliance with the Coastal Zone Management Rules and suggested that the marsh area be made into a parking area, traffic bumpers be installed and walkways put in on Kalanianaole Street so that people can walk safetl to the comfort station 250 yards away. She reiterated her statements that the new parking area will not increase the number of stalls presently there, noting cars can be double-parked. said she felt the present parking lot was sufficient and that she had some reservations in the location of the comfort station. Mr. Miyao clarified that the distance from the front of the Carlsmith property to the restroom is 250 yards away and although it appears that possibly two cars could park piggy-back style off the highway that is really not so as they would have to encroach into the right-of-way, clarifying that there is room only for one car to park makai of the property line. He added that the parking area will not encroach into the pond area and expanded on the reasons why they chose this location as opposed to locating the comfort station toward the middle of the park where the existing pavilion is.

CHAIRMAN: Next on the agenda is a public hearing on the application of the County of Hawaii, Department of Parks and Recreation for a Special Permit to allow the development of a motorcycle training and competition facility on 90 acres of land situated within the State Land Use Agricultural District. The area involved abuts the northeast boundary of the Panaewa Drag Strip Complex, Waiakea, South Hilo, TMK: 2-1-13:Portion of 2. Staff?

KATO: (Presented background, and letters dated December 11th from Jack K. Suwa, December 16th from Edward L. Kanahele and Eugene Kalanui, and December 17th from Howard Wagoner, on file.)

Mr. Chairman and Commissioners, maybe, before going into the recommendation, I can just indicate where these parcels are that are being referred to in the letters. This is, as you can see on the map, Railroad Avenue. This is the Puna-South Hilo District Boundary. And this is the proposed motorcycle facility site. Now the Hawaiian Homes Lots that are being referred to are in this area here. The property, in this case, all shaded in sort of blue-green is owned by the Hawaiian Homes, Department of Hawaiian Homes, and has, some of it, if not all of it, has been leased to farmers or potential farmers. The Puna Papaya, we've just determined by looking at the latest tax map, are in this area over here and on the makai side of the proposed drag strip, I mean, proposed motorcycle complex. According to our records, these properties have not yet been legally subdivided, which may account for their legal access problem.

(Presented recommendation for approval, with conditions, on file.)

CHAIRMAN: Commissioners, do you have any questions you'd like to ask of the staff?

IMADA: Mr. Chairman?

CHAIRMAN: Commissioner Kagawa.

KAGAWA: Keith, Condition No. 4, that the construction of the proposed facility commence within one (1) year, etc. Does that include a commitment by the BIMA in the four areas that they would improve about grubbing, clearing, putting in comfort stations, etc., grading for parking?

KATO: At this point, the permit is being issued to the Department of Parks and Recreation, okay. And so depending on what they come in with at the time that they submit for plan approval, that would be what is going to be required to be completed within that time period.

KAGAWA: But the Department of Health recommended some kind of a sanitary facility.

KATO: That's correct. We'd like to, just for your information, this map here shows the existing drag strip and there's a public, there's a toilet located in the vicinity of this parking area over here. It's not directly in the proposed site, but it's felt that it can, at least on a temporary basis, serve those needs.

KAGAWA: Okay, as far as Condition No. 7 about this temporary access road, where is this access road?

KATO: This access road starts at the rubbish dump; and I'm not sure of the exact alignment. It does come down this way, makes a turn up and then back down to the proposed facility.

KAGAWA: Is there a proposed permanent access?

KATO: Yeah. Under the permit that was granted for the drag strip, there's suppose to be a permanent access taken when the Puainako Street extension is completed; and there's suppose to be a takeoff from there toward the drag strip.

KAGAWA: There's no timetable for that?

KATO: No.

CHAIRMAN: Any other questions, Commissioners? None? Is the applicant or representative present? I'd like to swear you in first. Do you swear to tell the truth on the testimony you're about to give on the subject matter now before the Hawaii County Planning Commission?

OKAMURA: I do.

CHAIRMAN: Will you state your name for the record, please.

OKAMURA: My name is Ronald Okamura. I'm with the Parks and Recreation Department.

CHAIRMAN: Mr. Okamura, you have heard the background report and also the recommendation. Do you have anything that you'd like to add?

OKAMURA: Only one thing, that as far as the letters that were handed in stating concerns about noise pollution, I would like to state that all of the activities proposed at the new motorcycle facility would be confined to daytime use thereby the noise factor would be minimized as compared to something of that nature being done at night when sound carries, you know, even further. And I've done, in the past prior to the construction of the drag strip, we've had tests done as far as decibel readings on drag vehicles from the Panaewa Hawaiian Homes area and found it to be almost minimal as far as decibel reading is concerned. This was done with the help of the Police Department. And as far as the motorcycle, without maybe any modifications on their mufflers, the highest decibel reading would be around 90 or 92 and from about 6,000 feet away, very inaudible.

CHAIRMAN: Commissioners, do you have any questions that you'd like to ask Mr. Okamura?

ORITA: Mr. Chairman?

CHAIRMAN: Commissioner Orita.

ORITA: Mr. Okamura, what you're proposing is a motorcycle training and competition facility, am I correct?

OKAMURA: Right.

ORITA: Have you considered possibly using the present drag strip?

OKAMURA: These are, when we talk about motorcycles, these are not street bikes we're talking about.

ORITA: Î see.

OKAMURA: These are dirt bikes and -.

ORITA: But is there any possibility that such a thing can be held at the drag strip?

OKAMURA: I think right now as far as how the drag strip is already built, there would be space limitations. We still would have to encroach into surrounding areas to complete the project.

ORITA: All right, I could be off the subject, sir, but presently how often is the drag strip used?

OKAMURA: Drag strip, as far as regular schedules, drag events, I understand there's about ten of them per year.

ORITA: Ten per year?

OKAMURA: Right.

ORITA: And is the drag strip used seven days a week?

OKAMURA: No.

ORITA: No. So there is a possibility that such a training could be held at the drag strip if it is not being used for any other thing, am I correct?

OKAMURA: I don't think, all activities of this nature, both drag racing and motorcycling, would be confined to weekends; and there would be too much conflict of use if we do have -.

ORITA: Mr. Okamura, I think the public, the letter that staff had read, some of the objections, some of the people objected to the fact that, one was noise. And I think in the background report it states that, "and the requirement that mufflers be installed on all motorcycles should minimize and/or eliminate all potential sources of noise pollution." Can you people guarantee that they will use a muffler up to that strip or will the muffler be put on after they get to the strip, sir?

OKAMURA: I think these bikes are not ridden, you know, they don't ride those bikes on the public highways to the strip. They are carted on trucks.

ORITA: Any particular reason for putting the mufflers, sir?

OKAMURA: I think there are some people from the Motorcycle Association here; and as far as the technical aspects of the use of the bikes, I think they can answer that more than I can.

ORITA: Thank you.

KAGAWA: Mr. Chairman?

CHAIRMAN: Commissioner Kagawa.

KAGAWA: Reggie, this drag strip, isn't that a straight-away, 400-yard type of straight-away and a motorcycle would be somewhere like an oval type?

OKAMURA: Yeah, as far as motorcross, it's not a fixed track, you know. I mean, as far as clearing and grubbing and stuff, we'd be selective where the choice trees and shrubbery would be left in there. As long as there is, I guess, a major course; but it can be a meandering type. It's not fixed like a drag strip.

KAGAWA: Yeah.

CHAIRMAN: Any other questions, Commissioners?

ORITA: Mr. Chairman, just one more question.

CHAIRMAN: Mr. Okamura, who's going to construct the training -?

OKAMURA: The Big Island Motorcycle Association will initially do most of it because I have to confess that the project right now, as far as the funding for any kind of construction, there's no appropriation set aside for it right now.

ORITA: Thank you.

CHAIRMAN: Any other questions? If not, thank you, Mr. Okamura. You may be called back for some questions later on, I think.

PUBLIC: I'd like to ask a question.

CHAIRMAN: Just a minute. I'm getting to you now. Just a minute. This is a public hearing. Is there anyone in the audience who would like to speak for or against this application? I'd like to have a show of hands. Will you all rise so that I can swear you in one time and you can come up and testify. I want to swear you in first. Do you swear to tell the truth on the testimony you're about to give on the subject matter now before the Hawaii County Planning Commission?

TESTIFIERS: I do.

CHAIRMAN: You can sit down; and as you come up, will you state your name for the record, please. We'll start off with you.

DAWRS: I'm Herbert Dawrs with the Big Island Motorcycle Association. We've been working, I guess, about ten years now to find a motorcycle recreation area for off-road motorcycling. And some of the questions that have been asked, I think we've got pretty good answers for. We represent not just bike riders but the families; and we hope to make this a family type recreation area. The Big Island Motorcycle Association is a non-profit corporation that has rules and regulations pertaining to equipment. Specifically, some of the questions that Mr. Orita asked, how the land will be set up, noise problems, well, this is not a unique request. Its been done in Honolulu and all over the mainland there have been sites; and the problems that have been talked about today are common questions that have come up and I think they can all be answered. I'll welcome questions now or later or whenever, at your convenience.

CHAIRMAN: Commissioners, do you have any questions that you'd like to ask of the witness?

DAWRS: I can answer a couple of your specific questions if you'd like. The drag strip as such wouldn't be suitable because the bikes are totally different. They're not street machines. They're off-road bikes. They'd be trailered in or brought in the back of trucks.

The noise limits, generally acceptable limits are 90 decibels or close there to; and that can be accurately controlled by decibel meters if you'd like.

The bikes don't run well without silencers on them. They're loud but they don't run well. And the competition bikes all have silencers.

CHAIRMAN: Any other questions? If not, I get one question here. Your motorcyle, you know, the land and what not, is that going to be flat, levelled, or is that going to be something that I see in the TV, you know, up the hill and down and so forth?

DAWRS: It will be like that, but probably not at that professional level. You know, we'd like to think that we have riders that are that good, but initially our plan is to cut just the width of an area that we need for a particular type of track; and there are different types. There would be motorcross like you're talking about, they're on uneven terrain and there'd be

just purely trailing riding where it's skill, slow. There could be, there's a swamp area in there that we might want to use for laying out mud rides, and just, all different types of terrains. But, specifically, we don't want to knock the area down because that's part of the pleasure of a motorcycle course. You leave everything up where you can except where you specifically have to ride or park or that type.

CHAIRMAN: Any other questions?

PONTE: Yeah, I have a question.

CHAIRMAN: Go ahead, Commissioner Ponte.

PONTE: Will it be used seven days of the week or weekends?

DAWRS: Weekends only because we plan to pretty much control through the organization, through the Big Island Motorcycle Association and the clubs that belong to the Association. That means its gotta be on the weeks because most of us have to work.

ORITA: Mr. Chairman, one more question.

CHAIRMAN: Commissioner Orita.

ORITA: Will funds be made available if such a permit is granted, sir, to your knowledge?

DAWRS: If you mean are we going to ask for monies, no.

ORITA: No?

DAWRS: We'd love to have it but we don't plan to, we planned all along to provide all the equipment that we need to do the grading; and if we come up with slush funds, we'd love to have them; but we're not asking for them.

ORITA: Thank you.

CHAIRMAN: Any other questions? If not, thank you.

WEBSTER: My name is David Webster. I've been a resident of this island for seven years and a resident of the state for about thirty. I'd like to go on record in favor of this facility. I have been a motorcyclist for about 15 years now.

I'd like to address some of the specific questions and objections that were brought up. The drag strip, for instance, is used less than once a month. And the facility of the races there, provided the facilities goes in, the frequency of the races would probably be only once a month. There would be other activities but the activities that generate the most noise which would be the races would still be limited for economic reasons of the members. You just can't afford to race much oftener than that to once a month. And so the people that are concerned about the noise, they're talking about, at the most, once every two weeks.

I'd also like to point out that in the report, the nearest house was over a mile away, there's going to be a buffer zone of trees between the facility and the nearest existing house. I have been

out on the road in front of the Panaewa Farms there when they have been holding drag races; and from that road, you cannot hear the dragsters, which must be, I'd estimate, 20 times as loud as any of the motorcycles. Any of these racing bikes currently come from the factory with mufflers installed, to answer your question; and, in fact, if you remove the mufflers, you suffer a loss in power. They're designed at the factory to operate with those mufflers in place. And as Herb stated, these bikes will all be trucked in there, any of the racing machines will be trucked in there. They're not street, legal, they're not designed to run on the streets; and I don't know anybody that tries to run one on the street.

There was a question raised on the sanitary facility. There are currently at the drag strip two large cement-blocked bathhouses that have any number of urinals and toilets in them; and in the interim period, these could be utilized by the motorcycle facility. There would be a walk of, from your map here, I would guess maybe 200 or 300 feet from the proposed motorcycle facility to the existing sanitary facilities at the drag strip; and I don't see any problem in both facilities using those until the motorcycle facility is able to construct some of their own if they wanted to.

The question that Mr. Orita asked about our training program, there is a licensed training program that is licensed by the State of Hawaii; and that would probably be the course that was taught over And, currently, a gentleman by the name of Lindfield Murphy is scheduled to go over to Honolulu at his own expense in the next couple of weeks and take the State Instructor's Course. So we will have an instructor on the island that will be able to take care of the instruction type courses where they take a new motorcyclist out and teach him how to ride safely and how to use his brakes and And this type of training probably would be done on how to turn. the drag strip, obviously, at times when they are not utilizing the drag strip for racing. But as far as the facility they're planning here, that's an entirely different type of motorcycle. And it is, like you say, the type that you see on TV where they're running over rough natural terrain and you could not use the drag strip for that type racing, to answer your question. If there are any more questions I'll be happy to answer them if I can.

CHAIRMAN: Do you have any questions, Commissioners? If not, thank you, Mr. Webster.

WEBSTER: Okay.

CHAIRMAN: Next.

WILSON: My name is Richard Wilson and I've been on this island for about 22 years now and been riding motorcycles for about 12 years. And I'm in favor of approving the application for the motorcycle track. And, basically, I wanted just to say that people that have been riding have been the younger kids, high school kids, etc., and older ones also that are, how do I want to put this now, let's see, they've been riding in a lot of these areas like in the Panaewa House Lots area, Farm Lots area, illegally. They have been doing it now and for the past 10 years, in the cane fields they've been riding and all over; and there have been some complaints that they tried to get these kids

not to do that. And this is one of the reasons, one of the main reasons we've been going after trying to get a park, an area for them to ride in so they won't be in these other areas. That's all.

CHAIRMAN: Any questions, Commissioners? None. Thank you. Next.

VIERRA: Hello, my name is Dennis Vierra; and I'm the current secretary of the Big Island Motorcycle Association. And I basically just have two things to say. First of all, we've worked for ten years on this, patiently, and with the cooperation of the different agencies in accordance with their laws and regulations. And, secondly, this proposed area was proposed by these agencies, not by us; and I felt that they had given it very good scrutiny as to it being a perfect area for us. Thank you.

CHAIRMAN: Thank you. Next.

C. DAWRS: Good afternoon. My name is Charles Dawrs. I'm a resident of this island. I would like to recommend in favor of this motorcycle facility because I myself compete in events. As it stands now, there's absolutely nowhere on this island where I can take my bike and practice. And when I go to an outer island, I generally represent this island and the rest of the motorcyclists over here. And when we go over there, we're riding, just basically, cold. We have nowhere that we can go and practice. If we go ride on Mauna Kea, we can go up there, and people tolerate it; but we can get in trouble. They can confiscate your motorcyle. All your investments in the sport can go up like that because you have no place to do it. And I'd just like to recommend that after ten years we've tried, we've waited, nowhere, and I think it's about time you get someplace to ride and give everyone a chance over here to go out and see the sport and see what it's about. People just had never given it a chance. They've always pushed it aside for other sports, other interests. I'd just like to say that it's time that we get our fair shake. Thank you.

CHAIRMAN: Thank you. No questions? Thank you. Next.

WILLIAMS: Good afternoon. I'm Doctor Richard Williams. I've been a resident of Hilo for the last three years and a resident here in the state for the last six years. I'd like to go on record in favor of the proposed park. I think we've had a number of the questions answered very well as far as what the motorcycle members have represented so far.

One of the things that hasn't been stated, when Dick Wilson was up here he mentioned that people have been riding illegally in the house lots area and there have been various measures that have been taken by private individuals to restrict riding in this area, and it has created considerable hazards, illegally chaining roads without signs and markers. And it has resulted in at least one death and it has resulted in one very serious injury that required considerable hospitalization, plastic surgery and prolong period of convalescence. If we have a legal controlled area where people can ride, that would be much less of a problem. And, again, if there are any questions anyone would like to ask, I'd be certainly glad to answer any of them if I may.

CHAIRMAN: You got any questions that you'd like to ask, Commissioners? None. Thank you.

WILLIAMS: Thank you.

CHAIRMAN: Anybody else that wants to testify? Okay, Commissioners, what is your pleasure? Continue the hearing or you can close the public hearing.

ORITA: Mr. Chairman, I have a question.

CHAIRMAN: Go ahead.

ORITA: Staff, in the background report, page 3, "The County has developed a master plan for a major sports complex in the general area." This proposed development, is it part of that area?

KATO: Commissioner Orita, with your permissions, I'd like to defer that to the Department of Parks and Recreation.

CHAIRMAN: Mr. Okamura, you have heard Commissioner Orita's question.

OKAMURA: Yes, I have. As far as the proposed major recreation are, it is in this general vicinity.

ORITA: In the general vicinity?

OKAMURA: Yeah.

ORITA: Thank you.

CHAIRMAN: Thank you, Mr. Okamura. Okay, Commissioners, what is your pleasure?

KAGAWA: Mr. Chairman?

CHAIRMAN: Commissioner Kagawa.

KAGAWA: I move that this hearing be closed.

CHAIRMAN: Do I hear any second to the motion?

PONTE: Second the motion, Mr. Chairman.

CHAIRMAN: It has been moved by Commissioner Kagawa, seconded by Commissioner Ponte to close the public hearing. All those in favor of the motion say aye?

COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

CHAIRMAN: Motion is carried. The public hearing is closed.

It was moved by Commissioner Kagawa and seconded by Commissioner Ponte to send a favorable recommendation to the State Land Use Commission for the reasons and with the conditions as outlined by the staff. A roll call vote was taken and motion carried with six ayes.

The public hearing adjourned at 2:25 p.m.

## Special Permit Application TMK: 2-1-13:Portion of 2

The Planning Commission at its duly held public hearing on.
December 17, 1981, considered your application for a Special Permit
to allow the development of a motorcycle training and competition
facility on 90 acres of land situated within the State Land Use
Agricultural District. The area involved abuts the northeast
boundary of the Panaewa Drag Strip Complex, Waiakea, South Hilo,
Hawaii.

The Commission voted to recommend the approval of your Special Permit request to the Land Use Commission, based on the following considerations:

The desired use would not adversely affect surrounding property. The proposed site for the requested use is located in an area which is relatively isolated from residential development. It is within the Panaewa forest and the nearest residential uses are approximately 6,000 feet to the west. Other surrounding uses within less than one mile from the proposed site are basically of a public or large-scale agricultural nature. The lands immediately surrounding the site include the drag strip, macadamia orchards and forest.

In essence, the forest within which the proposed facility is to be located covers a vast area. The entire motorcycle facility site consists of 90 acres in a State-owned parcel of 3200+ acres. Not all of the 90 acres will be cleared, as two hundred (200)-foot wide buffers will be provided. The remoteness from areas of residence and other areas where continuous activities occur effectively mitigates adverse impacts which may otherwise occur.

The land upon which the proposed use is sought is generally unsuited for the uses permitted within the district. The State Land Use Commission's Agricultural designation includes lands which are not suited to agricultural and ancillary activities by reason of topography, soil and other related characteristics. The subject site has a slight soil overlaying a'a lava. Its productivity class, based on the Land Study Bureau Soil Survey, is class E or very poor. Such soils have very severe limitations which make them generally unsuited to cultivation.

At the present time, the proposed site is essentially vacant and unused. The 90-acre area would be partially converted from a forest to a public recreational use. Implementing the motorcycle facility proposal will not result in the loss of presently productive land or of a valuable natural area. The land would instead be used for a needed public recreational facility.

The proposed use will make the highest and best use of the land involved for the public welfare. Motorcycle competition is a recreational activity currently being pursued by a portion of the public and thus by providing a site for such use would help to meet their recreational needs. The location of such a facility must also be in proximity to a majority of its users but still far enough away from population centers so as to not create a nuisance. The subject site meets these criteria.

The Commission further recommended to the Land Use Commission, that approval of your Special Permit request be subject to the following conditions:

- 1. That the petitioner, the County Department of Parks and Recreation, shall be responsible for complying with all stated conditions of approval.
- 2. That tentative subdivision approval be secured by the applicant within one (1) year from the date of approval of the special permit. Final subdivision approval shall be secured within one (1) year thereafter.
- 3. That plans shall be submitted and Final Plan Approval secured in accordance with Chapter 8 (Zoning Code), Hawaii County Code, be secured within one (1) year from the effective date of the Permit.
- 4. That construction of the proposed facility commence within one (1) year from the date of receipt of Final Plan Approval and be completed within three (3) years thereafter.

- 5. That two buffer zones with a minimum width of 200 feet each be provided on the south and west sides of the facility.
- 6. That the Department of Parks and Recreation develop and adopt use regulations for the subject facility prior to its occupancy.
- 7. That the temporary drag strip access road to the facility may be used until the permanent drag strip access is completed. Upon completion of this permanent access, use of the temporary access by the motorcycle facility shall terminate.
- That all other applicable rules, regulations and requirements, including noise and air quality standards, be complied with.

Should any of the foregoing conditions not be met, this Special Permit shall be automatically void.
