We're on the 'O'oma matter. This is a hearing to adopt the Findings of Fact, Conclusions of Law and Decision and Order in Docket No. A07-774
'O'oma Beachside Village, LLC. For the record can I have the parties introduce themselves.

MS. BENCK: Good afternoon, Chairman, the rest of the Commission. This is Jennifer Benck and Steven Lim both representing the Petitioner, O'oma Beachside Village.

CHAIRMAN DEVENS: Good afternoon.

MR. BRILHANTE: Good afternoon, Chair.

CHAIRMAN DEVENS: Good afternoon to you all.

Let me state the record. On November 5th, 2010 based upon several motions the petition failed to receive six affirmative votes to reclassify the Petition Area. Accordingly, pursuant to Administrative Rule 15-15-13 (b) of our rules the Commission must file its Findings of Fact, Conclusions of Law and Decision and Order denying the Petition. This document is before the Commission for consideration, deliberation and action.

Before we get to that issue we'll first hear and take public testimony. For those that would like to provide public testimony, if you have signed up we will call you in the order as you've signed up on the sheet.

Just a reminder, the hearing at this point as far as the decision has already been made. It's merely to adopt the Findings of Fact, Conclusions of Law and Decision and Order. Any testimony that's been given up to this point has been made part of the record and has been transcribed. Are there any witnesses who wish to provide testimony here today? Dan, if you can call them in the order.

MR. DAVIDSON: First witness today is Harry Kim followed by Ron Mitchell.

CHAIRMAN DEVENS: If you could just state your name and address for us please.

9 THE WITNESS: Harry Kim. Address 471 10 Ho'okina Place, Hilo, Hawai'i.

CHAIRMAN DEVENS: Go ahead, sir.

THE WITNESS: Thank you, Mr. Chair, members of the council. Before I start I wish I had more than three minutes to express what I want to say, but I do understand the time limitation. But if it's possible to come back after everyone's finished, I'd sure appreciate IT if that's possible.

First of all, on this I did not come before because I really thought -- and I'm not being facetious -- I really thought this was such a good Project for the island of Hawai'i and its people that it would be a favorable thing to present because of our involvement with Mr. Moresco from the day the planning began.

When I took the Office of the Mayor of this

island, like most people born and raised here we see so many changes. And I knew we had to change this government on how we develop this island. I knew we had to reach the mentality of the landowners and developers in regards to a change in what they do and how they do it.

2.1

I wanted them to change the relationship with the community and their planning. I wanted them to be aware and accountable of cultural as well as sustainability issues. I would tell every single one of the developers, and I promise you, members of the Commission, I talked to every single developer that was interested in the island of Hawai'i and I give them all the same spiel.

I know they have to make money. But I would tell them, "You don't have to make too much or so much. Help me make this a better island, not just a place for you to make money."

The question that I would pose to my cabinet, "How do we get there? How do we reach these people? How do we make changes within our limitations with our limited resources and authority of the county government, the laws of the land? How do we balance what we feel personally and our responsibility of economic development?"

Chris Yuen was my planning director. And when I interviewed him I told him, "Can you be fair? Can you put away your personal and be fair in regards to what is right for the community and obviously the law?" And he agreed. And naturally I hired him.

The responsibility of the mayor many times is really very difficult because you have your personal and you also have your professional administrative responsibilities of economic development. That is your responsibility also, also the rights of the landowner on what their rights are in regards to land purchase and development of that.

I think I talked to so many people, and some of 'em were very successful in regards to listening. Limited to this area, Kekeilani Wahine. In regards to the owner, appealing to him, "Can you withhold the development or sale of this land because this is a very, very special place?" And he agreed. First asked for six months thinking I could find the money within six months to buy it from him. And we failed because of the very difficult times in those years.

MR. DAVIDSON: Excuse me, Mayor, 30 seconds.

THE WITNESS: I'm gonna -- can I come back

24 after, sir?

CHAIRMAN DEVENS: Mayor, you know, because

we don't have that many witnesses and we do have some extra time we'll give you some extra time.

THE WITNESS: Thank you, sir. Limited specific goals of this area. We had a dream, using that word, of a 17-mile stretch for the Kona area that would belong to the people. We knew that we had the Natural Energy Lab and the state at that time wanted to discuss with the county, turn it over to the county government.

We know we had the National Park obviously. And it came back, Kohanaiki issue. The developer was willing to work with the community after, what, 12, 13, 14 years of a conflict including the Supreme Court.

And the community would -- and I wish they were here because people like Angel Pilago, and even Janice Sogi, those were the community people that made Kohanaiki what it was. Don't just make a narrow strip of land for the people. Give them a whole section of that property.

And what they came through was more than what I was expecting, and a lot of joy because how the community worked with the developer.

Then there was 'O'oma. The first approach to 'O'oma was negative. The owner did not want to

work with us. And there was a huge parcel of beachfront. And then came Mr. Moresco. When I found out we have a new majority owner, at least there was still a hope that we can do this because it was the last big piece of the 17-mile stretch for the people of Hawai'i.

2.1

Mr. Moresco committed at day 1 that he would try. If I go way too much -- I really would like to tell you how I talked to him because they're all the same. And I know I'm going to go way over my time. But this is what I told Mr. Moresco in my office.

I said, "Mr. Moresco, next time you go to Kona on the Kawaihae Road, I want you to look makai from the Kawaihae Road junction to Kailua-Kona. I want you to count on your hands how many places there are signs without signs being posted that says, 'E komo mai. This is your place." And all you're gonna find is four or five places even at that, limited.

"Now imagine if this is your land of Hawaiiana. How would you feel with all of these signs that say, "Don't come in"? Help me build a place that makes Hawai'i better. Don't be the last straw that will break the back of people. I want you to help me take off straws."

And that's what I told him. He committed

what I read in the paper, and that's all I know, is that I thought, I bragged to people in Honolulu when I was invited by the Honolulu Magazine in regards to working with developers. I said, "Keep your eye on this place called 'O'oma." And this was way before they went to you, this Commission. "Keep your eye on this issue because they're going to make land use."

And I said, "I asked this man, Mr. Moresco, to help me develop a template that we as people can take to other developers and say, 'This is what you can do. Yes, it can be better, but look at what they did by listening to try to make Hawai'i a better place.'"

I thought when they came in and said this is what they're willing to give -- I don't know the specifics, excuse me -- but I knew it was over a thousand feet. And I used to tell my friends, "That's over three football fields. That's going to be a sign."

I asked them for a development in regards to everything. When the people of Kohanaiki, Natural Energy Lab, the National Park and 'O'oma see this property and the development there's no big sign that says, "Don't come in. This is only for the rich."

Help me create a village that says, "E komo mai." And no insult intended, but don't be the e komo mai like the State Capitol building, a nice big sign with big doors that who wants to go in there? Develop a village that people want to come and eat and drink, sit and play. Help me make a village.

2.1

I'm asking this Commission members to please take a look at what we worked on. I have no ties with any developer. I promise you that. I came here on my own accord because I wanted to talk to you about how this started. That this is a good development and, yes, it can be better.

In regards to working with the developer somehow on the beachfront, how it came to be developed together. So when you drive that 30-mile stretch next time instead of seeing only three or four places you will see e komo mai of Kohanaiki, of 'O'oma that says, "Come on in. This is your place."

And I know I've gone way back, way beyond the time allowed me. I appreciate it, members of the Commission. But this is how strongly I felt that this was good for Hawai'i. That this is a template of all developers that what we can do as -- we have a responsibility for economic development. I know that.

And I promise you there were conflicts

- 1 within me as an individual that this is my home from 2 birth of over 70 years. And I don't like a lot of 3 things I saw. And that's why we made this commitment 4 when we had the fortune of having a job that we could 5 talk to developers and landowners. And we talked to 6 every one of them on this same spiel as I'm talking to 7 Thank you, sirs, for the time. 8 CHAIRMAN DEVENS: Mayor Kim, let me see if 9 the parties have any questions for this witness. 10 None. Commissioners? None. Thank you very much for 11 your testimony and taking the time to be being here. 12 THE WITNESS: Thank you. 13 MR. DAVIDSON: Next witness is Ron Mitchell 14 followed by Daisy Mitchell. 15 CHAIRMAN DEVENS: Can I swear you in, Mr. 16 Mitchell. 17 RON MITCHELL being first duly sworn to tell the truth, was examined 18 19 and testified as follows: 20 THE WITNESS: I swear. THE WITNESS: Aloha, Commissioners. Thank you again for being here in Kona. I'm a supporter of 'O'oma Beachside Village and a linear cultural descendant of this ahupua'a. My testimony today is on behalf of my client, Dennis Moresco, who cannot be here today but who has ensured 'O'oma Beach remains peaceful and clean over the past several years.

2.4

In 2002 Gary and Karen Eoff, organizer, of Protect Kohanaiki Ohana, requested a proposal for caretaker services for what is known as Kohanaiki Beach, aka Pine Trees. The Eoffs were disturbed with the rave parties and the blatant misuse of the beach and they had foresight of our services. Due to the lack of funding the proposal was not executed.

In 2003 Kaleo Kuali'i also requested the same and funding was provided by Kohanaiki landowner and developer. Kohanaiki is an example of our combined five year working relationship between the community, landowner, developer and us.

It became evident to me that the neighboring, property, 'O'oma, needed to be in harmony to gain the same effect. The landowner at the time was Cliff Morris, who was approached with services, but no funding was available.

As a result 'O'oma was crowded with 45

homeless campsites. I was an eye witness to a troubled woman carrying a long knife. And this was a concern.

I stopped her, inquired of her problem. She confessed slashing the tent of a fellow homeless dweller because he owed her money for drugs.

2.1

Access to Pine Trees was through 'O'oma.

And this was one of the many issues which plagued us.

us, O'oma. Mr. Morris hired us. And with the help of community policing, we managed to keep unauthorized campers off of O'oma Beach.

MR. DAVIDSON: Thirty seconds.

THE WITNESS: Okay. Unfortunately they did return after a week. It was advised by former Police Chief Lawrence Mahuna to hire a company to take care of his property on a continuous basis, and that it was not a police function to do so.

At the last hearing tearful testimonies were given to deny this petition. Unfortunately the opposing public does not realize this petition is for the betterment of their children. The 1100-foot setback from the beachfront will remain in conservation and kept for the children's children.

Without Mr. Moresco's participation and cleanup efforts over the past five years, O'oma would not be the beach it is today. It would be a trash

dump, homeless tenancy, housing for every criminal activity you can think of, and the raiding of natural resources, example: Lava rocks and imu stones.

Changing the O'oma lands from conservation to urban would promise the public to use the beach area and even prevent slipping back into the continuous abuse, mistreatment from those who do not understand or do not have the desire to respect the O'oma property. Mahalo.

10 CHAIRMAN DEVENS: Did you get a chance to 11 read everything you wanted to read?

THE WITNESS: Yes, I did.

CHAIRMAN DEVENS: Okay. Any questions for this witness? Commissioners? None. Thank you very much for your testimony.

THE WITNESS: Aloha, Commissioners and thank you again for your valuable time in this matter. I'm a support of 'O'oma Beachside Village. My reason for being here today is because I am an eyewitness of good stewardship of O'oma. Born and raised in Kona my father has taken my family on fishing trips to O'oma and Kohanaiki. It was a must to ask permission from the owner --

CHAIRMAN DEVENS: Sorry, ma'am, the court reporter is going to have a hard time keeping up. If you could slow it down a little.

THE WITNESS: I know I'm within three minutes because I timed it myself. (Laughter)

16 CHAIRMAN DEVENS: We'll let you finish.

17 It's okay.

THE WITNESS: Okay. All right. Let's go back to "born and raised." Born and raised in Kona my father has taken my family on fishing trips to O'oma and Kohanaiki. It was a must to ask permission from the owners or caretakers of the property before entering. Honor and respect of others' property was essential.

My memory of 'O'oma was peaceful, clean and

bountiful for mempachi fish. Going to the beach was a lesson to always leave the place in a better condition than the way we found it. Take our opala, our rubbish, and thank the Lord for provision and enjoyment of the beach. This is generation of good stewardship in my family.

2.1

But as the years passed and the population grew, 'O'oma turned into a well liked beach spot and a colonized camping-ground for mistreatment. I recall an incident when the beach was shut down for potential hepatitis infection. My father's response to this was, "People are taking advantage of the property and there's no party to take care of the land and honor the blessings of it."

I find it amazing after 20 years God has placed my husband and our company at 'O'oma to be caretakers of this property. I personally counted over 45 homeless camp sites at 'O'oma, witnessed drug trafficking, assault, trash dumping and blatant abuse and misuse of the land; eyewitness to a 10-hour late night rave party, counted over 80 cars traveling down the old Jeep road, loud music, screaming and the next morning walking the beach covered with the sea of green beer bottles and passed out participants.

After the beach evacuation in 2003, this was

a blessing from God to naturally clean the beach and restore O'oma to the tranquil beach of my youth. All unauthorized campers were evacuated to safety and not allowed back to reside.

2.1

As a fundraising effort for our youth group to clean up the beach, my husband, Ron Mitchell, made a request to the landowner. Two 12-hour days, a team of 20 adults and teens bagged 75 construction size rubbish bags, organized abandoned cars, furniture, make-shift toilets, beds, a motorcycle, 50 broken and burned pallets, and five truckloads were hauled to the local transfer station.

Thanks to Mr. Dennis Moresco it has been over five years and O'oma is serene. What the opposing public doesn't realize is this: Without good stewardship O'oma will become the dumping ground I witnessed. True, malama the 'aina is 'maka'ainana, which is to be a good steward and caretaker of the land.

O'oma Beachside Village is a responsible future plan. It is in the best interest of this community to allow Mr. Moresco to keep the 1100-foot setback from beach as conservation land for our future generations and allow him to continue his efforts to malama the 'aina.

For without his good stewardship, I am concerned O'oma will revert back to a dumping ground and housing for illicit inhabitants who will abuse the land. Thank you.

THE WITNESS: First of all, I want to thank you for this opportunity to be here. I don't envy you the situation you're in. But, you know, I know that, you know, the decision that was made, you know, you, it kinda really hurts the 'ohana. Yeah?

My family was born, raised here on this

ahupua'a: 'O'oma, Kohanaiki, Honokohau, Kaloko. We traversed that for generations. Today our kids don't have jobs. And this is one of a strong backing that why we backed this Project and we looked at this Project as a great Project. The village, the way they were going to set it up with business on the bottom and your living on the top.

2.1

Two days ago my friend, he's dying of cancer. He has six boys. His boy just graduated from high school. They're looking for jobs. They calling me for jobs, "Can you get my kid a job?" You know, and the worst part about it is not only him. His wife has cancer.

And they don't -- you know, what he's gonna do? If they don't have jobs here what are the kids gonna do? Where are they going? I think lot of these projects will fall on each other so it's gonna give us a long period of jobs for the kids in Hawai'i.

We don't want -- what is Hawai'i without
Hawaiians? If the kids have to move away from here we
won't all have our keikis here. And this is why, one
of the reasons why I really backed this Project.

And another is, you know, I'm down at the beach all the time at the Kohanaiki. And there's so many people coming up asking for jobs. There's so

many people that back this Project but they won't come out, you know. Maybe we should have started a petition, a positive petition on our part. But, you know, it's too late now. Well, I hope it's not too

late.

I hope we can really think about this 'cause it impacts everyone, you know, whether it's Japanese, it's the Portuguese, the Hawaiian, it's gonna impact everybody.

'Cause we want -- we want, I want the people to come back to this ahupua'a 'cause we don't need any more people moving here 'sept we gotta keep our people here. Thank you very much.
