I am Makaala Kaaumoana. I'm the Executive

Director of the Hanalei Watershed Hui. And I'm also a

member of the Hawaii State Environmental Council. I'm

vice chair of the board of directors of Kua'aina Ulu

'Auamo. I cite those three hats out of several others

because they pertain to the action today; they pertain to

community process; they pertain to public access to this

kind of process.

The Hanalei Watershed Hui has been active since 1998. I was elected to that position by the community.

We also make our decisions by consensus. We do not take

formal positions on legislation generally, because that's not community process for us. We have initiated and implemented a watershed action plan, a watershed management plan, and a disaster resilience plan. All of these activities occur in our community on an informal, but committed and engaged, way.

I was born in Kaneohe, and I had come to Hanalei because I married a Hanalei boy. I've been involved in the planning of the North Shore of Kaua'i specifically since 1989. And we have a project, although much smaller now, not unlike the one that's being proposed here. We have an affordable housing project in Princeville that, although is less than 50 percent of that which was committed to and promised originally 35 years ago, is now complete. And I represent some voices in the community --certainly not all, and certainly not by vote -- that are disappointed with the appearance, with the lack of fit that this project has with our community. It doesn't look like anything else in our community. It does not conform to the North Shore Development Plan standards. It's not even the right color.

So, for me to be here today and support Jean Souza's petition to intervene was focused on my interest in trying to make a better project. I think when the community is involved and represented and those sentiments

are expressed in a process that only this LUC at this point can offer, the project will be better. The community will be better served, and it will look better. It will be the right scale. It will be in the right place. And it will look better.

This particular petition or this particular action for affordable housing hasn't offered that many ways to participate if you're just Joe Community Guy or Jill Community Gal. And so this process in offering Jean this opportunity to intervene will be positive. She's not long-winded. She's an experienced, well-educated planner. She knows how to proceed with efficiency and efficacy. She will contribute much to this process. And I think it is your kuleana to include the community voice when you are able. And this is the process we have for that to happen.

This is the Mayor's priority project, so we know that he wants it to move. We understand that, but that doesn't mean it doesn't get to be right. When we know better, we do better. We learned something from the Princeville project, and we would like to apply the better process and better content to this project.

This Petitioner has very specific experience, if you look at her petition. She's not the average community member here. This is someone who has expertise and who

has the respect of her community. She and her husband have in their -- in his retirement years and her not-so-retirement years yet, have convened the community on several conversations, not the least of which is disaster planning. So she's fully, fully engaged, and I think will represent her community well.

I'm not going to elaborate much on the other hats that I wear, but I'm very involved in 55 different communities around the state, and many of us are addressing this problem, of course. Affordable housing is key to all of us.

I would make one rather -- I regret to have to make this note, but I'm going to make it here. The use of the word "kibitzer" in the Housing Agency's filing is offensive to me personally and professionally. This is public work we are all doing. Process and vocabulary should respect that.

The one in Princeville, was it -- was the County, in that same format, the developer? And are they the developer of that? Are they the ones who are the

MS. KAAUMOANA: No. No. It was originally intended as workforce housing for a development for the Princeville Shopping Center expansion. And it was originally 100 units. But through the years, it has been diluted; it's now 40. We were able to complain to the County about the appearance of the structure. But, no, it was privately developed. However, affordable housing is under the Housing Agency, and they should have — there should have been an opportunity for the design of it to be a better fit for the community. And one of the factors, I believe, is whether or not an existing party would adequately represent or could adequately represent the positions or interests being taken by the proposed intervenor. So, in plain English, I'm just trying to find out, for example, the Office of State Planning, which is charged by law to take certain positions, whether, in your view, given your experience, you know, in community affairs generally speaking, whether you believe, in this instance, the Office of State Planning would be capable of presenting the concerns which might be presented by the proposed intervenor?

community. I think there are other tensions and stressors in this community. I think there are bigger visions than what might be on OP's radar. I think that -- for people in my community, for people in Hanalei to share their feelings and their thoughts and their concerns with the Office of State Planning, I can't count on one hand how many times that's ever happened in the 20 years that I've been in the community, providing that kind of leadership.

What they do is call me. What they do is call Jean. And the reason for that is that this is scary stuff. Just sitting here right now with the microphone and having been sworn in, this is not community friendly; this is tough stuff. And you have to do it for 20 years to not sit here and just shake.

So I really feel strongly about thanking you for coming to Kaua'i. That is a big deal. And there is no process that I know of from OP that would duplicate this, that they would all come here and they would participate with us. I see no avenue, and I see no protection for -- for the average citizen of Ele'ele to freely and easily participate in without accepting the petition of Jean Souza. And I see no problem with accepting it. It's not going to make your process worse. It's not going to make it longer. It's not going to make it bad. Then why wouldn't you err on the side of inclusiveness?

intention of doing that. I think that, with my experience, my background, that I can lead to a more complete record for the Land Use Commission to consider approving a project with appropriate mitigation measures. In fact, some of the information that has been available through the Environmental Assessment addresses some of the impacts but not as complete as some of us would have hoped.

submitted for this project or any other public reports that are prepared for this project. We were not informed by the Petitioner about the deliberations before the County Council on the 201H process. We were not informed about the availability of the Final EA. And we were not informed by them about this Land Use Commission process. So there is some lack of communication with the community about processes that they're going through.

I think that the Land Use Commission process affords a non-County forum to address this project. As Makaala had indicated, this is a priority project for the Mayor. And I've seen televised video of the County Council hearing after the fact on the 201H process, and I didn't hear any public testimony in opposition to the project. So I think that, for the most part, community members that have concerns have not been adequately addressed or adequately informed about the processes. And in fact, the County Housing Agency came to talk to the Hanapepe-Ele'ele Community Association to update us on the 201H process after they had already gotten the County Council approval.

Just to clarify the questions about the association, I am representing myself. I am an active member with the association. But I deliberately -- when I thought about getting involved, I deliberately recommended

to them that the intervention be -- would be personally and not as an representative of the organization. I know, just through my work experience through the Office of Planning, in many controversial projects and large projects on Oahu, on the Big Island, I think even Kaua'i, too, that some of these things can be nasty and can be very stressful. normally would be difficult for me to answer that. But I will -- I do have an answer.

Back in the days when I used to be with the Office of State Planning, the office did conduct regional plans in response to some economic conditions. For example, with the demise of sugar on the Hamakua Coast, the Office of Planning did a regional study of the Hamakua area. In light of some of the activities in Maui, there were a group of us that attempted to do some planning work on Maui. I'm sorry you don't know me better. But I'm very much not an obstructionist. I'm a facilitator. And I'm interested in promoting communication, good communication, with communities, and back and forth. And I try to treat people with respect. I try to get as many resources, resource people, to come to help build the capacity, build the skill, build the knowledge for the people in the community and encourage them to get more involved in the processes. It was not my intention in the beginning to show off, to make like I know more than any other, to be disruptive to this process. That's not me.

But there were many concerns that were floating in the community. And as a community member, I was exposed to that. And so as a result of those concerns and my own study of the EA and what was being said by the agency to -- in forums that I attended, I felt that -- I anticipated that they would present some information to you that maybe wasn't complete. And so my hope is that, through my participation, the information is more complete.

And I suspect that one of the things people are concerned about is overcrowding of that park. How would you mitigate that?

Lanai has 3100 population. They actually have a Lanai Planning Commission, where, again, they have public hearings. Those members are appointed by the Mayor. Planning staff goes out there for their meetings.

versus an individual. Because my concern is that an individual may not really represent the desires and wants of that community. That's my concern regarding your request to becoming, you know -- Hana has official positions it generates Molokai and Lana'i in. We have the Kihei Community Association, Waikapu Community. It's very organized on Maui, because our population is about 150,000 total. That's how they felt they could get a voice in County government.

I guess I question also why perhaps, if you think there's environmental concerns, why you haven't had discussions with the Sierra Club. The Sierra Club would then become involved, provide official positions. There's other organization on Maui that are environmentally concerned. They have all created standing credibility with the various government organizations. So I'm just wondering why Hanapepe-Ele'ele hasn't taken that step to organize.

MS. SOUZA: I think I want to address the community organization first. So it seems to me -- and sorry, I'm not more familiar with Maui and Molokai. But it seems to me that those organizations are formal organizations that have formed as a result of some legislation that the County Council has passed, similar to what Oahu has in terms of neighborhood boards. are formally-elected people with a set way of doing things and, as you said, they have a role in terms of convening and having hearings, and all that kind of stuff.

The only thing that Kaua'i has is the Planning Commission. And I know you also have the Planning Commission. Here, there is not something like neighborhood boards, a formal structure within each geographic area that operates in a certain way, like how the Oahu neighborhood boards are -- and I'm a little bit more familiar with that -- in which agency representatives regularly come to the Waikiki or whatever meetings and provide updates and listen to concerns.

The organizations here on Kaua'i are not formed that way. Now, some of the organizations, Koloa, for example, and Kilauea, their neighborhood associations are very old, 40-plus years. This group, as I said, started forming in summer, or June, of 2015. So, in terms of our evolution, we're just neophytes right now. And perhaps, later, we might become -- take action to become a more formal organization. But where we are in terms of our life history is where we're taking baby steps at this point.

But, yet, if you look at pages 4 through 7, we have undertaken a lot of activities in Hanapepe-Ele'ele for the people, not only of Hanapepe-Ele'ele but for the

island as a whole. So we have that flexibility to do that. And that's what I wanted to say about that.

In terms of environmental concerns and why didn't I check with the Sierra Club, at this point, I have been concentrating on my intervention issue. Certainly, if the Sierra Club had concerns, they could have also submitted comments on the Draft EA. I am not sure whether they have done that or not. Some folks have contacted me or one of the members about possibly following up on some things with a Sierra Club member. So it could be that they might be involved in deliberations with the Commission. We're trying to build capacity within our community and not rely on other people to speak for us.

And one of the things is being involved in the County's general planning process. So I also have been involved on special interest kind of activities. so -- and I manage 33 condominiums and subdivisions, homeowners associations, so I do do some group organizations there.

So the question is: In terms of, I guess, speak for yourself, do you think that this is going to potentially improve -- and it's workforce, so it's going to bring workers to the community. I understand it's for that general community as well as the ability for the workers to commute to other locations because it's not that long of a drive. But do you think that that's going to increase or decrease property values in that community with that large housing project coming into the community?

MS. SOUZA: I don't have an opinion on that at this time.

"Can I get the entitlements? Can I then make money on the project?"

This really isn't about money for the County.

It's about providing housing, which has been a challenge on this island, like other islands. So we're kind of coming from it -- at this proceeding from a different perspective than maybe some of the other petitioners you have.

I think the big question here is to -- and I'm kind of hearing that from some of the Commissioners -- is: Where is the community coming from in all of this? I just want to acknowledge that. And I'm going to treat Miss Souza as acting for herself individually. She's kind of said that repeatedly. There's been references to this community association, but there's no formal association, there's no membership, whatever. So I think because she's saying here today and in her petition that she's acting individually and not on behalf of any community group, I think the Commission has to look at her intervention petition in that manner.

this. But this is not a project that has just happened recently. I think my understanding is that the proceedings talking about this and the planning goes back at least to the 2008 period. I'm hearing this correctly. I don't even think Miss Souza is necessarily opposed to the project. I think her concern is she just wants the process to operate the right way before this Commission.

MR. MEE: I guess the only concern I might have is that, on the technical part of it, I can see that she can see, okay, this is what needs to be shown, that's what needs to be shown. I guess the part that I'm grappling with is, is she really reflective of the community when she's taking these positions. I don't know if that makes sense. But that's kind of like two different issues.

She's saying that "I have the technical expertise to analyze what's being presented to the Commission and that I can, you know, analyze that." And the comments: The Department of Planning maintains that it can adequately represent all citizens of Kaua'i regarding this matter. The Department does appreciate Ms. Souza's concerns and commends her for speaking today and everybody else that came with her.

DIRECT EXAMINATION

MR. DAHILIG: Just to respond to Miss Souza's question. When we sit in as a party to the quorum that LUC holds on matters like this, our job is to represent the public's best interests as it sees fit with respect to how the County provides input into decisions of the Land Use Commission. And that in and of itself is the representative capacity that we are charged to undertake when you're -- when we're here sitting at this table, and are our qualifications with respect to evaluating whether or not something is or is not compatible, look into -look at the policy of the State as enumerated by the Hawaii Revised Statutes; also look at our general plans; to look at our community plans; as well as we do receive input indirectly, but also, in this particular case, directly, because the Department was a direct participant in many of the community meetings held by the Housing Agency on this matter.

So we did hear, we feel, a broad array of community input, as well as we are, again, charged by

qualification to, by law, to review consistency with our policy plans as passed by the County Council, as well as taking a look at the particular policy items, particularly because this is a 201H application, that the policy of the State, as it relates to affordable housing, is to provide an avenue for an expedient disposition of any type of petitions on that matter. So we take a look at the broad area of the applicable statutes and policies.

> COMMISSIONER ESTES: I just have one question I want to ask you.

CHAIRPERSON WONG: Commissioner Estes, we'll let Miss Souza continue her questioning.

COMMISSIONER ESTES: Oh, I'm sorry.

did disclose as the -- still required permitting or administrative actions required after the LUC action, let's say it was passed, we are of the understanding that there are Class IV Zoning ordinance as well as the subdivision requirements that would still have to be met with our commission. The Class IV Zoning Permit requirement is still -- I would suggest to the Commission, is, under our laws, a discretionary permit.

Therefore, a similar discussion, whether somebody can or cannot intervene, is still provided as part of that permit process before the Kaua'i Planning Commission. So there still will be many avenues for addressing items relating to things like form and character, whether the color of the buildings are appropriate, those types of things. That is still part of the entitlement process that has been reserved as not part of the exemptions as outlined in the Environmental Impact Statement.

Generally speaking, relative to the petition to intervene, OP has the following comments: First, Miss Souza is no less qualified as an intervener than Keoni Dudley was in Ho'opili or Clayton Hee in Koa Ridge.

Secondly, Miss Souza's participation in the DBA proceedings will not be redundant of or substantially the same as OP's participation. Even though Miss Souza is a professional and experienced planner and was at one time employed by OP, her interests and role in these proceedings are clearly distinguishable from that of OP.

Miss Souza has stated that she's long-time resident of the community where the petition area is located and will personally be affected by the impacts of the project. And she has extensive experience in local community issues. In contrast, OP is a State agency tasked with analysis, formulations, and review of State policies and strategies to provide central direction and cohesion in the allocation of resources and effectuation of State activities.

The standard for naming intervenors is expressly stated in HRS Section 205-4(e)(4), which declares simply that leave to intervene shall be freely granted. The Commission may -- not shall -- deny intervention when, one, the petition of the applicant for intervention is substantially the same as the position of a party already

admitted and, two, admission of the parties will render the proceedings inefficient and unmanageable.

Thirdly, Miss Souza's admission alone will not necessarily render the proceedings inefficient and unmanageable. Because it's an expedited process under HRS 201H, all parties, as well as the Commission, are responsible for working together efficiently and timely. This Commission may employ prehearing conferencing deadlines, limitations on the scope, and time limits on all the parties to provide for better efficiency and manageability of the proceedings. More importantly, even if Miss Souza's participation means additional time needed for the proceedings, the additional time should not bar her participation.

Fourthly, the DBA process in a contested case hearing may result in decisions that could affect people's rights, duties or privileges. The purpose of these hearings is to provide you, as the decision-makers, with the most complete and relevant information to make a proper decision. This Commission should strive for broad public participation and intervention to be freely granted, all in the interest of a full, complete, inclusive open record. Accordingly, OP has no objection to Miss Souza's petition to intervene.

we've heard today. The difference between Miss Souza as a public testifier versus an intervenor, she'll have the opportunity to cross-examine witnesses. And I think that's an important part of her role that she not just say what she feels, but actually gets to question the different parties and -- as far as that will come before And there was a question of whether intervener can you. She said she won't. But, yes, she could do it, as sue. could any other person in the public. She could also sue the Commission for not allowing her intervention. it's been done before successfully on different grounds. I wanted to mention that.

And lastly, I heard a lot about standards for intervention based on education, experience, professional qualifications as an expert, whether she's an individual or she's part of a community organization, and whether she has major concerns, or if she opposes a project. All of these are not part of the standard for entry as an intervenor. Like I said, it is whether -- the standard is that the intervenor shall be freely granted permission into a proceeding. So all these qualifications that you're looking for, I don't believe pertain at all to her as an intervenor. Thank you.

suggested examples that have already been proved by the LUC. And I do mention another one in my testimony, in my statement, on page 9, in which the Gentry Properties project allowed -- you folks allowed Haseko to intervene even if they were not approved. The reclassification without appropriate conditions of approval would adversely affect my interests, and I've identified what those are. I believe there are no other means to protect my interests other than intervention.

I have been involved with a couple of the opportunities that the County has afforded us, but the 25 public meetings were not really open to the public. They were -- a lot of them were focus groups. And so with us only being established in July 2015, we were not notified about those -- many of those. I believe my intervening will help provide a more complete record through cross-examination and providing testimony.
