CHAIRPERSON SCHEUER: Good morning. This is the September 27, 2018 LUC meeting and Daniel Orodenker's birthday. (Laughter)

The first item on the agenda -- laughter, because we were chosen for our community interest and not our singing voice.

With the adoption of the September 13, 2018 minutes, are there any questions or comments on the minutes, Commissioners?

Hearing none, is there a motion to approve?

COMMISSIONER OHIGASHI: So moved.

VICE CHAIR CABRAL: Second.

CHAIRPERSON SCHEUER: Mr. Ohigashi moved and Cabral has seconded. Is there any discussion? Hearing none, all in favor say "aye". Any opposed? Motion carries.

Next agenda item is the tentative meeting schedule. Will the birthday boy please go over the meeting schedule.

EXECUTIVE OFFICER: October 24th and 25th we will be in Kona at King Kamehameha Hotel for the Waikoloa Mauka hearing, Motion for Order to Show Cause and the Adoption of the Order for Mauna Kea time extension, if necessary.

On November 14th and 15th we will be in

Honolulu for Kapolei Development Motion to Extend; and November 15th we will be on Maui for Emmanuel Lutheran and status report on Hale Mua.

On November 28th, we will again be here for HHFDC Lanihau and Shopoff Status Report.

December 12th and 13th we currently have open, and January 9th and 10th we have open but we are expecting both of those dates to get filled, but we have some IAL and motions that are in the works.

CHAIRPERSON SCHEUER: Thank you very much.

Are there any questions for Mr. Orodenker,

Commissioners?

And I'll just remind everybody, because we did not set up the microphones to please speak loudly.

The next agenda item Action Meeting Docket SP90-374 Richard Smart Trust dba Parker Ranch (Hawai'i) proposed amendment. Condition No. 7 to extend the life of the Special Permit for the continued operation of an existing rock quarry and related issues on approximately 143.480 acres of land within the State Land Use Agricultural District identified as TMK (3)6-7-001:34 [formerly TMK (3)6-7-001:portion 25].

Will the parties please identify themselves

1 for the record?

MS. GARSON: Good morning, Chair Scheuer and Commission Members, I'm Katherine Garson. I'm from Carlsmith Ball for the Petitioner.

On my far right is Julianna Nahua Guilloz, she is the Secretary for Parker Ranch, Inc., and the Vice President of Business and Administration

Livestock, Parker Ranch, Inc., and they provide support services to PR Mauna Kea, LLC.

To my right is Jason Macy. He is the President of WHC, Ltd., doing business as West Hawaii Concrete.

To my left is Geoy Purdy, General Manager of WHC, Ltd.

MR. KIM: Good morning, my name is Ron Kim.

I'm representing the County, and with me is Christian

Kay and Jeff Darrow from the Planning Department.

CHAIRPERSON SCHEUER: Let me update the record.

On May 10th, 2018, the Commission received a copy of the Office of Planning's correspondence to the Hawaii County Planning Department regarding the proposed amendment.

On July 11, 2018, the Commission received record of the Hawai'i Planning Commission's

proceedings on the Applicant application to amend the special permit.

On August 20th, the Commission received the Applicant's State Special Use Permit application and Exhibits 1 through 37 from the County of Hawaii.

On August 28, the Commission received the \$1,000 filing fee from the Petitioner's representative.

On September 14th, the Commission received a replacement letter to correct non-substantive errors made to conditions that already existed. (No corrections were made to the condition requested to be amended by the Applicant).

On September 18th, the Commission mailed and emailed the September 27, 2018 agenda notice to the Parties and the Statewide and Hawaii County mailing lists.

On September 26th, yesterday the Commission received notice from Office of Planning that they would not be attending today's meeting.

Let me briefly describe our procedure for today.

First, I will give the opportunity for the Applicant to comment on the Commission's Policy governing reimbursement of hearing expenses.

Next, I will call for any individuals desiring to provide public testimony of which obviously there are currently not.

After the completion of initial public testimony, the Applicant will then make their presentation.

After Applicant's presentation, we will receive any comments from Hawaii County Department of Planning.

After completion of the County's presentation, the Commission will conduct its deliberation.

In the absence of the Office of Planning's correspondence on this matter did state that although they are unable to attend the meeting, they have reviewed, commented on and supported the request for amendment for an existing State Special Permit to grant a time extension until September 30th, 2037 to allow continued operation of existing rock quarry.

Also from time to time I'll be calling for short breaks.

Any questions on our procedure today?

Mrs. Garson, has our staff informed you of
the Commission's policy regarding the reimbursement
of hearing expenses?

MS. GARSON: Yes, they have, and we accept them.

CHAIRPERSON SCHEUER: I'm going to note that there is nobody in the room who wishes to provide public testimony. So we can go ahead and proceed directly to the presentation by Petitioner.

MS. GARSON: Good morning and thank you for having us here. We are here to ask that there be a time extension for the Special Permit that is currently in existence to run concurrently with the lease between WHC and Mauna Kea which expires 30th, 2037. We are not asking for any increase in the area, just merely the time extension request.

And there was a bit of an ambiguity as to whether or not we needed to come forward and request the time extension, but we are doing so just to make sure that the record is clear.

Just a little bit of history on the property.

A quarry has been on a portion of this property since 1945. In 1990, special permit was issued for an original 30 acre and an additional about 91 acres, and that happened in 1990.

Subsequently, in 2000 the time extension was granted on the special permit, and the area was

extended another about 51 acres. So the current Petition Area is 143.48 acres.

There is an approximately 8 million tons of rock left to be quarried, which is why we are asking for this time extension to correspond with the lease currently.

The location of the quarry is mauka of Mamalahoa Highway, and it is in between where the Old Saddle Road comes down and Waimea Town. So it's approximately four miles above the highway, three, four miles above the highway.

I know you read the Application, don't want to belabor anything, just wanted to very, very quickly go through the criteria about the unusual and reasonable uses.

The unique thing about this quarry is that it is the only quarry that WHC has that they quarry the aggregate, an aggregate that has a low alkalized silica reactivity. And because of this alkalized silica activity it is less likely to fail when it is used in a concrete form.

And if you have any more questions about that, I am going to have Mr. Macy answer that. That is the extent of my knowledge about the aggregate.

So the rock from this quarry is the bottom

line. One of the other things -- so because of the increased economic opportunities, it supports a local construction industry, keeps things on island, if we can utilize our resources here.

Also affecting the surrounding property, again, this location is fairly remote, and so it's about, again, it's above the highway, but it's about six miles away from Waimea Town. And the nearest residence is probably about that distance away too (indicating).

There have never been any complaints about noise or complaints about dust because of this location. Location is also arid and barren. And, again, it's been quarried since 1945. It's not -- it's not a site which would be good for other types of intensive agricultural use.

In fact, even for pasturing purposes, it has a low carrying capacity, meaning more land would be needed to pasture a particular animal.

And, again, if you want to know more about that, that is why Guilloz is here to speak about that.

As far as burdening any public agencies, there is no -- they use a portable toilet there.

There's no wastewater needs. Water is -- water use

1 is very minimal. It's for washing hands, little bit 2 of dust control. 3 There is maybe 20 to 30 vehicles a day 4 coming in depending on whether or not rock is being crushed at that time. 5 I think I have addressed all the criteria 6 7 for special permit. So that is the presentation, and we're here to answer any questions that you may have. 8 9 CHAIRPERSON SCHEUER: Thank you. County, 10 any questions for the Applicant? 11 MR. KIM: County did not have any questions 12 for the Applicant. Just would note Leeward Planning 13 Commission did give favorable recommendation. 14 CHAIRPERSON SCHEUER: Commissioners? 15 VICE CHAIR CABRAL: I'll ask a question --CHAIRPERSON SCHEUER: Commissioner Cabral. 16 17 VICE CHAIR CABRAL: -- since it's my island. 18 19 You mentioned perhaps the more expert opinion or information I'm looking for is why is this 20 such a superior type of rock? 21

And then, how did that benefit all of our construction on this island? Certainly benefits not to have to ship in those tons for construction.

25 Maybe little bit more about why that is such a good

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1 product.

CHAIRPERSON SCHEUER: Before you go on, I'm going to swear you in as a witness.

Do you swear or affirm that the testimony you're about to give is the truth?

MR. MACY: Yes, I do.

CHAIRPERSON SCHEUER: Introduce yourself.

JASON MACY

Was called as a witness on behalf of the Applicant, was sworn to tell the truth, was examined and testified as follows:

DIRECT EXAMINATION

THE WITNESS: Jason Macy, President of WHC, Ltd.

The uniqueness of the flow is it's an older Mauna Kea flow, so the rock is very dense. And when you're manufacturing concrete, you're looking for as little absorption, which is water absorbing into the rock, and it has a really low absorption, so you are able to save on the import cement that we hire from Asia, and so it gives you lot more productive and reliable product.

We have another quarry in Waikoloa that we do have that uses that's alkalized silica reactive material. And what happens with that material was

when you introduce water to the product, the alkaline is cement that's an alkaloid, and a reaction occurs to where concrete starts to expand after like ten years, which is the worst thing you can have happen to concrete.

Just picture a sidewalk in Waikiki starting to expand, and when it expands, it will start to break.

And so that quarry we cannot use at all for concrete because of that, but it does work for asphalt. So it's primarily an asphalt quarry is what we use that for.

CHAIRPERSON SCHEUER: Any other questions for the Petitioner?

COMMISSIONER OHIGASHI: I'm just curious, you said 8 million tons left?

THE WITNESS: Approximate.

COMMISSIONER OHIGASHI: What is the tonnage per year that you plan extraction?

THE WITNESS: It really depends on the construction site. Right now we are in a pretty good construction type building. So we'll probably export somewhere around 150 to 200,000 tons this year, because right now we're in a pretty good cycle on the Big Island to where the material is needed.

COMMISSIONER OHIGASHI: What extra types of things or procedure that has to be followed in order for you to transport that amount? Do you have to -- there must be certain dust control requirements.

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THE WITNESS: Yeah, Department of Health.

We see them at A minimum one time a year. They will

come out and inspect us.

So to answer that dust control, we do have a water truck, 4,000 gallon water truck that we use to control dust on our haul road.

COMMISSIONER OHIGASHI: That's all? What other -- what are the extraordinary methods, or things that you have to do to transport?

THE WITNESS: It's really not -- we basically hire contractors. We have our own trucks as well, and we just load the material in the quarry, bring it down the haul road, and then from there it gets spread out to various construction locations mainly on the west side of the island. We don't do much work on the east side, mainly west side.

COMMISSIONER OHIGASHI: Are you doing your maximum amount of extraction?

THE WITNESS: No, we're not. Right now, we are not -- we have portable crushers that we bring in to anyone of our quarries, but we are not at maximum

capacity. We still have additional capacity. If the market needed more rock, we have capacity to expand production capabilities.

COMMISSIONER OHIGASHI: Is it in your plan to leave remaining rocks, or leave me remaining areas that won't be mined? Is it your intention to use the Whole 8 million tons?

THE WITNESS: That is our plan is to extract whatever. And there are some inferior rock in that quarry, so some that of that we have to process for a different product that doesn't meet that highest standard for rock.

But, yeah, we pretty utilize all the material on that quarry site, whether it be -- we sell a lot of soil. Waimea's got some really good thick soil layers in there so we'll sell -- some will be distributed in the Kona area where there's only lava aggregate.

The main product coming out of there is concrete aggregate, asphalt aggregate for the construction industry.

CHAIRPERSON SCHEUER: Any further questions?

COMMISSIONER CHANG: Just one.

The request is to run coterminous with the

Parker lease. At the end of the quarry, at the end of the lease term, will you restore the site with vegetation?

THE WITNESS: We choose to restore as we mine. And so the quarry is a little bit visible, but we don't want to stand out like a sore thumb. So as we finish an area, we re-naturalization that. We save a lot of the soil so we can redo that. And especially for the ranch. You know, at the end of the life of that quarry it's going to go back to pasture land, so we need to make sure we're creating usable product for the ranch.

COMMISSIONER CHANG: Is that a condition of your lease?

THE WITNESS: It is.

COMMISSIONER CHANG: Thank you.

CHAIRPERSON SCHEUER: Commissioner Cabral.

VICE CHAIR CABRAL: When you return it,

I've been to the coal -- not mines, but coal fields
in Wyoming where they excavate. They take all of
this information and then they excavate. And when
they return it, it is literally identical, the slope,
the land, everything identical after they've taken
the tonnage of coal out.

Are you guys going to reshape it identical,

1 are you going to make it a nice place? 2 THE WITNESS: What we are doing for the 3 ranch is, we're putting a two to one slope on all the 4 banks in there, so it will all funnel down to where cattle can actually graze on the hills and be able to 5 6 have it bee a viable pasture for Parker Ranch. 7 VICE CHAIR CABRAL: Because you don't know what it will look like in -- okay, thank you. 8 9 CHAIRPERSON SCHEUER: Commissioners, 10 further questions? 11 I have one question. The Applicant briefly 12 discussed or reviewed what is in the record about the 13 failure to provide annual reports to the LUC. And 14 what steps have been taken to address that? 15 MS. GARSON: Annual reports were provided. 16 CHAIRPERSON SCHEUER: There was a period of 17 time --18 MS. GARSON: Oh, there was a delay. 19 can't answer that. 20 THE WITNESS: We have done it. We have 21 rectified the problem, so the annual reports will be

have one other permit that we were late on.

MS. GARSON: And Parker Ranch is also -added -- (indecipherable).

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1 CHAIRPERSON SCHEUER: Do you swear or 2 affirm that the testimony you're about to give is the 3 truth? 4 MS. NAHUA: Yes. 5 CHAIRPERSON SCHEUER: Identify yourself for 6 the record. 7 NAHUA GUILLOZ 8 Was called as a witness by and on behalf of the Applicant, was sworn to tell the truth and examined 9 10 as follows: 11 DIRECT EXAMINATION 12 THE WITNESS: Nahua Guilloz with Parker Ranch as a representative for PR Mauna Kea LLC. 13 14 And to answer partly as well as from the 15 lessor side, we will also have added it to our calendar, so that way we take care of all the 16 17 complaints we will be following up with WHC to make sure every year those get filed and appropriate. 18 19 CHAIRPERSON SCHEUER: Thank you very much. 20 If nothing further, County, do you have 21 anything to present on this matter? 22 MR. KIM: No. Again, Leeward Planning 23 Commission gave favorable recommendation, and I have 24 nothing to present beyond our letter which the

Commission received on September 14th.

Mr. Darrow would like to make a comment. 1 CHAIRPERSON SCHEUER: Do you swear or 2 3 affirm that the testimony you're about to give is the 4 truth? 5 MR. DARROW: I do. 6 JEFF DARROW 7 Was called as a witness by and on behalf of the 8 County of Hawai'i, was sworn to tell the truth, was examined and testified as follows: 9 10 DIRECT EXAMINATION 11 THE WITNESS: My name is Jeff Darrow, 12 Planning Program Manager with the Planning Division for County of Hawai'i. 13 14 We'd just like to make a comment and that 15 is that we're very appreciative to the Applicants for 16 taking this step. This was unique because the 17 condition itself wasn't clear. It was basically saying that the lease ran -- I mean, that the life of 18 19 the permit was coterminous with the lease, but there 20 happened to be a small footnote, and that footnote 21 actually had a date to it. 22 So there was a question: Do we go with the

condition, or do we go with the footnote?

But the Applicants chose to side on the

side -- I mean to err on the side of caution and be

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1 able to present the request so we're clear on the 2 record. 3 So that was also reflected in the new 4 condition that there's actually a date as well as the 5 reference to the lease. 6 CHAIRPERSON SCHEUER: Thank you. 7 Commissioners, do you have any questions for the County of Hawaii? 8 9 Hearing none, Commissioners, what is your 10 pleasure on this manner? VICE CHAIR CABRAL: I'll move to accept the 11 12 -- receive and accept to approve their request. COMMISSIONER WONG: Is this to amend the 13 14 Condition No. 7 to approve? 15 CHAIRPERSON SCHEUER: Let's take a 16 two-minute recess. 17 (Recess taken.) CHAIRPERSON SCHEUER: We're out of recess. 18 19 Commissioner Cabral. 20 VICE CHAIR CABRAL: I would like to go 21 ahead and move that we opt that they would correct, 22 accept their correction of the topographical error in 23 Condition No. 4 renumbered to Condition No. 2. To amend Condition No. 6 renumbered to Condition No. 4 24 25 to:

One, identify the applicant and/or quarry 1 2 operator as the responsible party to cease work, 3 protect any fine, and contact the SHPD; 4 And two, identify the individual at the 5 SHPD contact rather than to rely on a telephone 6 number. 7 To amend Condition No. 11 renumbered to 8 Condition No. 9 to retain language addressing noncompliance with the conditions of the Applicant, 9 10 and to authorize the Chair to sign the order in this matter on behalf of the Commission. 11 12 CHAIRPERSON SCHEUER: Thank you. 13 Is there somebody who wants to second the 14 motion? 15 COMMISSIONER WONG: Can I make a friendly amendment? Let me second it, and can I request for a 16 17 friendly amend? 18 CHAIRPERSON SCHEUER: Please proceed. 19 COMMISSIONER WONG: Can I also authorize 20 the Chair to sign the order instead of us having to 21 come back on behalf of the Commission? 22 VICE CHAIR CABRAL: I did include that. 23 COMMISSIONER WONG: I retract that. I 24 second it. 25 VICE CHAIR CABRAL: The staff got that in

1 there for me. 2 CHAIRPERSON SCHEUER: There is a motion 3 that has been made and seconded to approve the permit with conditions and modifications. Is there any 4 5 discussion on the motion before us? 6 Hearing none, Mr. Orodenker, please pole 7 the Commission. 8 EXECUTIVE OFFICER: The motion is to 9 approve the request to amend the conditions' various 10 changes to Condition 26 and 11 and authorize the Chair to sign the Decision and Order. 11 Commissioners Okuda, Mahi and Aczon are 12 13 absent. Commissioner Cabral? 14 15 VICE CHAIR CABRAL: Yes. 16 EXECUTIVE OFFICER: Commissioner Wong? 17 COMMISSIONER WONG: Yes. 18 EXECUTIVE OFFICER: Commissioner Chang? 19 COMMISSIONER CHANG: Yes. 20 EXECUTIVE OFFICER: Commissioner Ohigashi? 21 COMMISSIONER OHIGASHI: Yes. 22 EXECUTIVE OFFICER: Chair Scheuer? 23 CHAIRPERSON SCHEUER: Yes. 24 EXECUTIVE OFFICER: Thank you. Mr. Chair, 25 the motion passes five votes.
